Berea is facing a serious water shortgage, a very unusual occurrence in the winter when usage is at its lowest point in the year. The water in Owsley Fork Reservoir is already 12 feet down - the city will start pumping when it gets down to 13 feet. Two more weeks of average use, without any rainfall, City Administrator Randy Stone reported at Tuesday's city council meeting, and they will be down to 13 feet.

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Yvonne Davis. "In the past we've talked about moving to a village and bringing the arts there," Hal said, who along with his wife, Yvonne, bought the old bank building, and opened up the Paint Lick Community Arts Center. "I've told people here that this may be the smallest community in the country to have its own art center."

Hal and Yvonne moved to Paint Lick this past spring, and have been very busy preparing the community arts center. They had their grand opening on October 5, and were amazed when over 300 people attended.

"We were quite surprised," Hal said. "People couldn't find a place to park. The people were also quite amazed and quite surprised at how many came."

Since their grand opening, the Davises have been offering a few workshops

per week, such as basket weaving and photography classes, along with hosting "An Evening With .

events once a month, where people are invited to an evening with one of their local artists. Yvonne, a professional jazz pianist for a few decades, is giving piano lessons. In all their offerings, the two of them are committed to honoring and encouraging the artistic and creative abilities of the Paint Lick residents. Hal has been working with homeschool students on different art projects on Fridays, and several of their drawings and paintings were hanging on the walls of the Paint Lick Community Arts Cen-

"Every chance we get, we want to help people feel good about the arts and the creativity that they have," Hal said, who taught art to elementary school students in Indiana for 26 years before retiring.

The Davises had no thoughts of moving to Paint Lick even two years ago. They were settled in Hanover, Ind., and were visiting in Berea in August of 2011. They were traveling to Danville, and decided to mail a letter at the Paint Lick post office. They stopped at Friends of Paint Lick, and were instantly captivated with the friendliness and openness of the women there.

"The openness of the women at the Friends was incredible," Yvonne said. "They invited us for lunch that day. The people were so open, very sweet and

Yvonne and Hal had such a good visit that they decided to return to Paint Lick for their Fall Festival. Both were gratified that the people of Paint Lick were such believers; Yvonne said it felt like going to the Land of Goshen.

"When we went to the Fall Festival," Hal said, "Yvonne spotted the bank building, and said, 'wouldn't that make a great community

They still weren't prepared to move to Paint Lick, however, until they experienced the violent storms and tornadoes this past March. As they reviewed their situation, and witnessed the devastation of the towns around them, Yvonne asked Hal where he would go if he could go anywhere and had no responsibilities or worries.

"I said Paint Lick right away," Hal said. "It just came out."

After that, they put their house up for sale, went to Paint Lick, and bought a bank. The renovation took several months, since they redid the upstairs for their living quarters. Even before they opened the center, however, they were busy helping Paint Lick to improve. They bought a new flag for the post office, since the old one was pretty tattered, and had an official flag raising for the Fourth of July holiday. About 80

people attended. The community of Paint Lick has embraced both of them with open arms. After the flooding a couple of years ago, and some businesses leaving town, there was a fear with some people that their community was dying. The Paint Lick Community Arts Center has been a revitalization for the community, as well as a general hub where people can learn, visit and express their creativity. From a fear that it was dying, many now have the feeling that it's booming.

"People keep telling us how thankful they are that we're here," Hall said, who stated that building the community arts center in this Paint Lick Village has been the fulfillment of his dream. "People are feeling the pride of Paint Lick again."

link people, both tourists and locals, to opportunities for recreation and entertainment in Berea.

The group is focused on promoting a full spectrum of tourism opportunities, including eco-tourism, adventure tourism, and sporting events like 5K's, cycling, and tournaments. ally, Reynolds explained, an economic development plan for local tourism would look at ways to develop events or attractions that draw visitors for overnight stays and longer visits.

"Tourism has a great impact on the whole community, and it benefits everyone," Reynolds, who is also a member of the Berea Tourism Commission.

The group is working on plans for an event calendar for the whole community. This calendar would be able to accept submissions from the public and could be used by individuals, organizations, or businesses. The group also recommends formation of an artists' association that could proved a venue for artists to work together on business and tourism

When asked about whether or not the group would advocate for alcohol sales, Reynolds stated, "We have to look at it from an economic standpoint. We think it's important to analyze the economic impact and see how it is working in nearby towns where the laws have been changed."

Another **BEAT** work group, focused on local investment, had strategized about creating a local investment fund that would give investors the opportunity to nurture and expand promising small to medium size businesses in the

community. Danny Isaacs, an Enterprise Development Project Specialist with MACED, chairs the local investment group. "We wanted to figure out how to encourage local investors to support local businesses in ways that would promote growth and entrepreneurship,"

Isaacs said. As they researched examples of local business investment in the U.S., the group found that most models relied heavily on a single person who could spearhead the

development of the project. There are many responsibilities related to the legalities involved in local investment models. Lacking a financial advisor, business attorney, or financial institution that could serve as a principle partner, the group struggled to find ways of moving their strategy forward. "Once we recognized what the costs really would be, we tossed around ideas, but it has fizzled out as time has passed since the last public meeting (in

May)," said Isaacs. Although the local investment group has not yet been successful with its strategy, Isaacs agreed that many positive interactions came as a result of the group's planning work. "The entire group was very much interested in local economic development and local support for small businesses. The challenge is still about how we can be involved in small business and let small business owners know that we want to be there for

Mayor Steve Connelly reported that he is optimistic about the BEAT workgroups and their contributions to local economic development. "The city council is going to pick up strategic planning in early 2013," he said, "and will likely invite the economic advancement teams to report on their ideas and how they envision the

city contributing." Even as the groups are trying to maintain momentum with their strategies, they are having an impact just by working together, making connections, and creating new networks in the community. Reynolds agreed that the BEAT process is an important part of economic development. "We have to plan our future," he said. "We can't just let everything happen around us."


joy to our family. Although she was so tiny and frail, she gave us such courage and hope, and

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

- You can have everything in life that you want if you will just help enough other people get what they



Christmas Trees - An American Tradition?



What would Christmas be, without a Christmas tree? Whether you prefer an artificial or natural

Christmas tree, the practice of decorating a tree and placing gifts under it for opening on December 25th is nearly a universal practice for today's American family. This hasn't always been the case. In fact, America is a relative latecomer in adopting what we now consider a "traditional Christmas".

Americans may be inter-

ested to know that in early America, any celebration of Christmas was banned. William Bradford, famed Puritan leader, considered Christmas a "pagan mockery", and in 1659, the General Court of Massachusetts actually enacted a law making any observance of December 25th a penal offence. Up through American Revolution, Americans continued to have little regard for Christmas; with Dec. 25th, 1789, the first Christmas under the new Constitution, passing by with Congress in session and no holiday recognized.

The early Americans had a problem with Christmas because of its pagan origins. Celebrated around the time of the Winter Solstice, various "sun gods" were worshiped across the ancient pre-Christian The Germanic tribes honored Odin, the Persians Mithras, and the Romans Saturn. The pagan festivals incorporated evergreen boughs in their celebrations to symbolize the return of life after winter. At the solstice, winter's shortening days again began to lengthen; assuring them of the coming summer. Finally, in 350 AD, Pope Julius I chose December 25th as the day to celebrate the birth of Christ in an effort to absorb these pagan traditions. Christians continued to incorporate evergreen branches in their festival to celebrate

everlasting life. In Germany, whole trees were often brought into the home for this purpose. Martin Luther, the Gerbut there are surely some

man Protestant reformer, is

credited as the first to add candles to the "Christmas tree". Reportedly, as he walked home one winter evening, as he was composing a sermon, Luther was awed by the beauty of the stars twinkling through the evergreens. He then wired candles to his tree to duplicate this experience

for his family. Decorated and lighted Christmas trees quickly gained popularity across Germany. German settlers brought the practice to America with them, but Christmas trees were still not widely accepted by most Americans. Finally, Queen Victoria married the German Prince Edward. An 1846 illustration was featured in the Illustrated London News of the royal couple with their children posed around their Christmas tree. Practically overnight, Christmas trees then became the fashion in the English-speaking world. Even so, it wasn't until 1870 that Christmas became a federally recog-

nized holiday in America. I'm not sure, around here, where there are tree farms where families can enjoy the experience of picking out a real tree,

around, and wild-grown

cedar trees make a pretty good Christmas tree too (ask permission if it's not on your property!). Others choose to buy a ball and burlap tree and plant it after using it in the house. Trees are now often available in many different species; from the once dominant Scots pine, to white pine, Douglas and Frazier fir, spruces and others. Wherever a live tree may come from, the Christmas tree farm provide wildlife habitat and erosion control, and if not used for growing trees, would probably be pasture or farm ground. Being a forester, I'll prob-

ably always use a real tree, but artificial trees have come a long way; it's amazing how nice they Remember when look. they looked like they were made out of big pipe cleaners? Whether you choose a real tree or an artificial tree, please do not copy Martin Luther's practice of using candles. Back when they used candles, the tree was not cut and put up until Christmas Eve and was taken down twelve days later on the Epiphany; hence the tree had little time to dry out and pose a fire hazard.

The Berea City Council approved switching cell phone service to Verizon from Sprint because of coverage issues. Berea Utility workers can not get signals in East Berea, at the Wastewater Treatment plant or the other pump stations. The Berea Police have also had problems with the coverage. Police Chief David Gregory mentioned that at the fatality on Highway 21, they were lucky that a police officer had a personal Verizon phone to call in, because they didn't have coverage on any of the city

phones. Gregory, Director of Codes Dale VanWinkle, Economic Development Director Tom McKay and a representative from Berea Utilities were all asked to work together on processing the bids, since all of them were directly impacted by the coverage problems. McKay stated that he would get dropped calls at least once a day, even at the Broadway Street office.

The Verizon monthly charge would be approximately \$400 more than Spring, but there was a zero equipment charge. Stone estimated that they would ultimately save

when calculating in the zero equipment charge. The City of Berea currently spends \$1,900 a month on cell phone coverage which also includes the air cards for the vehicles.

Two other benefits of the Verizon contract will be 30 "throw-away" phones they give to cities in case of disasters. One phone call activates all 30, and they can be given to city officials for their use during the disaster. They automatically get priority of calling over the other phones. Verizon also will automatically send a charging trailer for residents to use, once they hear of a disaster hitting an

Stone mentioned that at some point in the future, city council members should discuss what type of technology they might prefer for city staff to send information to them. It would be a great paper saver, Stone commented. A few members mentioned tablets, and Stone stated that was one of his considerations as well.

When the three governments had their joint meeting in November, Berea staff and council members first heard that a new 911 center may be built. CSEPP will be receiving an appropriation of approximately \$6 million for the new center, where all the CSEPP

activities could be consolidated.

Stone mentioned that it looked like a very lucrative deal for the county, but they were concerned with who would be responsible for the future upkeep and expense. Council member Virgil Burnside agreed, stating his concern that once all this money is put into the new building, the question becomes responsibility for upkeep. Once the chemical weapons are neutralized, there will be no more federal money to assist in those expenses.

Different concerns were expressed from staff and city council about the 911 department, and the lack of communication to the City of Berea. As an equal partner in paying for the upgrades to the 911 equipment, someone pointed out, the City of Berea should be kept informed and updated on all 911 activities. One council member stated his concern that the response time of 911 was very slow.

"It sounds like we need to be more involved," Stone said. "We need more substantial information on what's happening, and we clearly need to be treated as a partner."

A representative from Bereans from Fairness stood up during the meeting, and reported that

during the group's participation in the Christmas parade, they were not announced at the college square, unlike the float before them and behind them. They investigated into the matter with the Berea Chamber of Commerce; the Commerce reported back that Bereans for Fairness weren't targeted, but it was an innocent oversight. The Bereans for Fairness representative stated that the discomfort she felt at the parade reflected her general feeling of discomfort in Berea with being a member of the LGBT community.

"It's difficult to be open and out," she said.

She requested that the city council pass the Fairness Ordinance, to help change the climate in Berea and create a more welcoming community.

The newest police officer was introduced to the city council, with badge number 429 and fresh from graduation. The German shepherd, named Parko, would be working with drug sniffing and tracking. He had just had first mission, and helped to recover some marijuana. His handler will be Detective Parker of the Berea Police Department. It's been several years since the department had a canine officer.

The December Learnshops – titled "Make It, Take It, Give It – are for Berea instructors only. In winter weather, local artists are more reliable with getting to the instruction sites, and the tourism department also sees this as a way to build added value for being a local instructor. The most popular Learnshop this year has been Michelle Weston with her ornament making – where participants are able to actually blow their own glass Christmas tree bauble. Other popular ones are Dinah Tyree's watercolor class and Steve Farmer's workshop where he teaches people to make stools with grass woven seed on them. One new vendor/instructor is Fiber Frenzy, that has been holding classes at their shop.

While a few participants do come from further away, the vast majority of people who have signed up for the December Learnshops are local people, or people from the surrounding counties. The summer Learnshops bring in a much greater percentage from outside the region, since people travel more and tend to be more mobile. The offerings of Learnshops that count as continuing education for teachers also assist them in getting participants in the summer.

Jackson plans to ask the artists to discuss and brainstorm how many times they would like to hold these Learnshops. Currently, Berea Tourism hosts two a year – in the summer and in December. Tourism is willing to publicize and market more, however, if the artists/instructors are

interested. "The goal of the Learnshops has always been to be a festival," Jackson said. "We can go year round, if

they choose." Some options, Jackson said, would be to hold Learnshops every month, every quarter or every other month. Depending on the interest and energy of the instructors, Berea Tourism is prepared to ramp up their education and arts offerings.


Breaking Dawn Part 2 is at best just a straight film representation of its







Human Rights Commission Looks to Fill Three Vacancies

Members of the Berea Human Rights Commission discussed both their need for new members and their ambition of creating a type of "State of Discrimination" report at their meeting on Monday night, as suggested by Mayor Steve Connelly. There are currently only four members on the HRC, three short of the seven required by city ordinance.

When Connelly first appointed people to the commission in November 2011, he picked Chad Hembree and Jonathan Schinhofen for one year terms, Tim Hampton and Jeannie Gregory for two year terms and Mae Suramek, Lisa Vaughn and Paula Dunson-Woods for three year terms. Since that appointment, Hampton and Gregory have resigned, and Schinhofen elected to not seek another term after his year was completed. Hembree, who was serving as co-chair, stepped down after his election to Berea City Council. Bryan Thompson has been the only appointment since

The mayor mentioned at the meeting that there needed to be diversity and broad representation of the community sitting on the commission. He is pursuing getting a representative from the business community, and would also like to have a representative from the housing side of things.

the commission members were talking about recommendations of people who could serve on the commission, Connelly said, "I have a list as long as up to my elbow of advocates who want to serve. But we need a broader rep-

resentation." Three members of Bereans for Fairness – a group that is trying to get the

Fairness Ordinance added on to the Berea Commission's standard ordinance – were present at the Human Rights Commission meeting. The Fairness Ordinance would add sexual orientation on as a protected class in issues of housing, employment and benefits; a class not covered federally or by state statute. The Berea local government would be responsible for enforcement.

The Commission, which has now been meeting for one year, has elected to meet every first Monday of the month. They have spent, according to earlier reports to Berea City Council, much of their first year setting up their infrastructure and doing some outreach to the commu-

Vaughn and Suramek discussed the process of filing their first complaint through the commission, a case that involved discrimination in employment on sex and sexual orientation.

Since sexual orientation is not a protected class, the complaint was filed under the gender discrimination. However, after the filing, the person decided to not pursue it since they had been hired in another position and wished to get on with their life.

"I want to say how appreciative I was for the help and guidance from Kentucky Human Commission," Rights

Vaughn said, when speaking of how they guided her through the filing process.

Juan Pena, a field supervisor from the Kentucky HRC, was presented at the Berea meeting. He stated at one point that he was still hoping that the sexual orientation class would be added to the standard charge of the Berea Commission, since that was the area where they saw the most discrimination in the

The four members of the Berea HRC spent some time discussing the State of Discrimination, and how they would gather data and reports from the community. They stressed that a multi-faceted approach would be necessary to gather information from all parts of the community,

and Vaughn expressed her desire to have experts in data analysis and public surveying speak to the commission, and guide them through their first

The Berea Human Rights Commission is currently working on a website, that hopefully will be launched in a few months.



Brain Damage Major Concern for High School Football



Every Friday night in autumn, all across the country, thousands of parents, friends, teachers and classmates gather together to cheer their local football heroes -- and possibly watch them suffer brain damage on the football

This harsh assessment may sound like an exaggeration, but recent research is proving this to be undeniable and inevitable.

Football, whether it be sandlot football or professional, is a rough sport. Every limb, joint, and mass of cartilage is subject to a more brutal pounding than most people can stand. Traditionally, these risks have been considered part of the bargain. No guts, no glory. They have also been considered acceptable to some extent because rarely was there any obvious permanent injury. All of that has changed in the past decade.

In 2002, a trickle of reports that retired football players were suffering from chronic traumatic encephalopathy (CTE) turned quickly into a flood. CTE is a degeneracaused by head trauma. It resembles in many ways Alzheimer's disease and

Parkinson's disease. The high school football community did not generally consider these results alarming, as the diagnosed cases were in professional football players who had long since retired. Then a case was found in a player who died during his career. Amateur adult athletes were shown to have had it. Then a case was diagnosed in a college football player. High school football was appearing to be less and less safe.

Today, there can be no doubt that high school football poses a serious

tive disease of the brain risk of permanent cognitive damage even to those who never move on to college or professional football. In 2010, a group of researchers from Purdue put instruments in the helmets of high school football players and measured every hit they took during practices and in games. Cognitive testing and functional magnetic resonance imaging of the athletes' brains showed measurable declines in memory-related tasks during the season.

A recent study of the brains of athletes who received blows to the head throughout their lives found evidence of CTE in 80% of them. The subjects ranged in age from 17 years old to 98 years old. Comparisons to brains from individuals of similar ages with no history of head injury made it clear that football players are at risk of permanent cognitive damage regardless of the level at which they play.

Even more damning is evidence that permanent injury can occur even if there is no clinical evidence of a concussion. These sub-concussive hits over the course of a football season can actually cause more damage than one big hit resulting in an obvious concussion. Play-

ers who never even feel the impact of a hit to the head can still become impaired in the long run.

Equipment is developed and rule changes are introduced to try to make the game safer. Whether these are going to address the underlying issues, however, is questionable. The hits in question hap-

pen on every play of every game. No one hit is to blame, and evidence of an injury surfaces only when it is too late.

In 1905, 19 athletes died playing college football. Changes to the rules were introduced in the hopes of making the game safer. A century later, we are still trying to make the game safer. In the light of new discoveries, however, we have to ask ourselves if it can ever be made safe enough.



The steady rain that Berea received last weekend took the town out of its immediate water crisis, but Owsley Fork reservoir is still not as full as it should be for this time of year, according to Berea Utilities Director Ed Fortner.

"You could say we went from Code Red to Code Orange," Fortner joked.

Bereans were encouraged at the last city council meeting to conserve water any way they could, since Owsley Fork was down 12 feet. If it had hit 13 feet, the utilities workers would have stopped pumping and started using the reservoir they keep in reserve.

It was incorrectly reported in the Citizen last week that city workers would start pumping at 13 feet.

The rain received over the weekend ended up putting four more feet of water in Owsley Fork, a much needed increase.

"It was a good rain for us," Fortner said, "nice, slow and steady. It took us out of the short-term crisis, but we're still asking for voluntary conservation. We've never actually moved from asking for voluntary conservation since the summer."

During the winter, according to Fortner, is the time when the reservoirs need to recharge for the upcoming seasons when water usage is much higher. By the spring, it needs to be completely full.

Taking care of this year's water crisis, however, does not solve the longer-term problem of having enough raw water volume to serve the city's needs. During this past election cycle, different Bereans running for city council remarked on the water problem of Berea. The plan in the past has been to create a new reservoir in Upper Owsley Fork. That long-term plan has changed, because of another problem that has

WorkGroup Focuses on Energy Efficiency

This is the final in a series of articles on the plans of small Berea groups that were formed after the economic development consultant worked with the city for a year. Called B.E.A.T. (Berea Economic Advancement Team), these groups are working on such issues as local food sustainability, tourism and energy efficiency.

All BEAT participants learned about economic leakage during the public meetings in fall 2011 and

Berea Municipal Utilities does not generate its own electricity but must instead purchase it; nearly 80 percent of expenditures go toward buying the energy that Bereans consume. Bills explained that, by implementing system-wide energy efficiency programs, a utility can reduce both overall consumption and peak demand. This in turn reduces the costs

for that utility to purchase

Reducing energy consumption also has benefits for the consumer. For small businesses, Bills said, "It improves operating expenses and reduces overhead. It also generates jobs, such as those trained to conduct energy audits and contractors to carry out the building improve-

On-bill financing is a mechanism that lets individuals or small businesses pay for energy efficiency improvements over time. On-bill financing is

the United States as a cost effective way to decrease energy consumption in a community, improve building comfort and reduce utility bills. Although open to any utility customer, on-bill financing extends opportunities for home or business energy upgrades to those who might not have access to traditional home improvement loans. The efficiency upgrades often result in an overall lower monthly utility bill. On average, cus-







That name alone would indicate it was indeed a hit. As with most treats during the Christmas season that particular hot chocolate recipe however, is probably not going to land on a list of low calorie concoctions.

So here's the recipe for a billion calories in a cup, • 1 and 1/2 cups of

- heavy cream • 1 can of sweetened
- condensed milk (14 oz) • 2 cups of bittersweet
- chocolate chips
- 6 cups of milk
- 1 teaspoon of pure vanilla extract.

In a large pot over low heat, combine all the above ingredients. Stir regularly for 30 to 40 minutes until chocolate is fully melted and incorporated with other ingredients.

Or you can put everything in a crock pot for a few hours and get the same result.

It's time to get started with the candy making too. Today, as clear as it is, would be perfect for turning out some Seafoam and pull candy. Both of which I've almost given up on. I need to call Mom and coax her into working on that project.

When my sisters and I were growing up making Pull Candy was a fun time. I remember one year Mamaw Ada was in on the candy making. At the time she was probably younger than I am now. Anyway she must have had a hotflash or something since she went outside with a handful of the hot taffy. The look on her face when it went completely brittle as it hit the cold air was priceless. Good times.

Another of my favorite Christmas treats was the Orange Slice Cake she always baked. Even though I follow her recipe to the letter I can never get one to come out quite the same as she did.

In case you'd like to try it, here is that recipe.

- 1 cup butter, softened
- 2 cups white sugar
- 4 eggs
- 1/2 cup buttermilk
- 1 teaspoon baking

- 3 1/2 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 pound dates, pitted and chopped
- 1 pound orange slices candy, chopped
- 2 cups chopped
- 11/3 cups shredded
- 1 cup orange juice • 2 cups confectioners

sugar Preheat oven to 250. Lightly grease and flour a 10 inch tube pan.

In a mixing bowl, cream butter and sugar until smooth. Add eggs one at a time, beating well after each. Dissolve baking soda in buttermilk and add to the creamed mix-

Place flour in a large bowl and add dates, orange slices, and nuts then stir. Add flour mixture and coconut to creamed mixture. The dough will be very stiff.

Pour batter into the tube pan. Bake for 2 1/2 to 3 hours. As soon as cake comes out of the oven, combine the orange juice and confectioners sugar and pour over hot cake. Let stand in pan over-

Be Careful About Fairness Demands

For 27 years, I served as an employee in the Lexington 911 Center.

Throughout my career, with each paycheck, I faithfully contributed to my pension. My pension was a benefit promised to me by my employer, the City of Lexington, administered through the state of Kentucky.

While I lived up to my obligation, the state legislature failed to do so. Year after year, the legislature failed to put in its required amount. Money that was supposed to go toward pension benefits was diverted to other uses.

The Kentucky Retirement Systems is in financial peril, especially the largest fund, the Kentucky Employees Retirement non-hazardous fund. Its assets are dangerously low in comparison to its long-term obligations. This is the umbrella system for my CERS retirement.

As a result, our pension fund has been called one of the worst financed in the nation. I am deeply concerned about my benefits and those of thousands of

other public servants. Legislative neglect created this crisis. The General Assembly must act now to

avert a financial disaster.

The General Assembly should begin providing the full contribution to the pension fund starting in Fiscal Year 2014-15, as recommended by the Kentucky Public Pensions Task Force.

We ask for all Madison Countians to stand up for fairness. Support your government employees and retirees and add your voice to the call for action by the General Assembly.

A typical process for onbill financing begins with an energy audit for the home or business. If that energy audit identifies improvements that can save more money on average per month than the cost to finance those improvements, then the customer qualifies for on-bill financing. Programs often require that applicants be in good standing with the utility company and have no unpaid bills over the past twelve months. The cost of the improvements is usually tied to the meter, rather than the customer. This means that if a person moves or sells, the repayment obligation falls to the next occupant.

Bills pointed out that 'the bottom line is savings on the electric bill plus a

Bills explained MACED is currently completing a two-year pilot of on-bill financing with four different energy cooperatives in Kentucky. The project, which will wrap up in early 2013, tested the effectiveness and feasibility of on-bill financing with Jackson Energy, Fleming-Mason Energy, Grayson Energy, and Big Sandy Energy – all cooperatives that served distressed Appalachian counties.

The BEAT Energy Efficiency group plans to use MACED's pilot results to inform its recommendations to the city. However, both Bills and Mayor Steve Connelly acknowledge that there is some resistance to on-bill financing with the local utility.

"Berea Municipal Utilities is a relatively new entity, having only been in existence since 2005," said "There's interest there, but it may not yet be the appropriate time to embark on a project of this

tions about how well the model would work for a small local utility and concerns about the risk that the utility could lose money if customers couldn't keep up with payments.

"Because it is a fairly recent acquisition for the city, balancing the revenue stream with costs is very important," said Mayor Connelly.

However, on-bill financing is also included as a recommendation in the Berea Energy Cost Savings Plan, or BECS, which was adopted by the city council in September 2012.

"There are several parallel initiatives going on right now. There is a lot of community interest in energy efficiency and on-bill financing," said Bills. "This was envisioned as an energy efficiency program that could be implemented as a partnership with other organizations."

The Energy Efficiency group sees organizations like MACED and Home Energy Partners as important contributors to the success of an on-bill financing program in Berea.

Others contributing to the Energy Efficiency work group include Steve Boyce, Steve Wilkins, Vonda Poynter and Gina Cham-Although the berlain. group has not met since the early summer, they submitted a strong plan at the last BEAT meeting with consultant Michael Shuman in May and are prepared to make further recommendations, based on the results of MACED's pilot project, to the city in the coming spring. Bills explained that the group wants to have good data to share before making a pitch to the city.

"We want to carefully consider what types of onbill financing would pan out for our community," he said.

in the last several years. Around 20 homes would be directly impacted if something happened to the dam, resulting in the high hazard status. Because of this, Berea Municipal Utilities personnel are checking out new designs for the dam, with higher flood walls, that would take the dam out of high hazard status as well as almost double the amount

of water that can be held in the Owsley Fork reservoir. Currently, the reservoir holds around 650 million gallons of water; the improvements would take it to a billion. With this type of improvement to the current dam, there would be no need to build the new Upper Owsley Fork reservoir and it may also turn out cheaper in the long

The main thing Fortner and his staff are involved with now is researching for funds to assist in paying for this reconstruction, which could cost millions of dollars. There may be some money from the NREC, but that is still being checked into. Best case scenario, Fortner said, would be to start on the project in 3 - 5 years.

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



New Coach, New Leaders for Berea Pirates

There are lots of big shoes to fill in the Berea Community High School Pirates basketball program this season. The team lost a handful of key players who were seniors last year, and long-time coach Bill Smallwood has moved on as well. Seniors Daniel Hubbard, Eli Woodie, and Nolan Sweet will be expected to step up their games this year. At head coach, the Pirates have brought in Cameron Jackson, formerly head coach of the Campbellsville Lady Eagles.

At Campbellsville, Jackson inherited a team that had won barely 11 percent of its games over the previous 6 seasons. His 27-88 record over four years was a huge improvement for Campbellsville. Before Campbellsville, Jackson was coach of a Paul Laurence Dunbar freshman boys team that posted a record of 24-6 and was ranked

sixth in the state.

Jackson said that he was left with "great kids and a great program," and is confident that he can continue offering a strong basketball program.

There is always a period of adjustment with a new head coach, and each year high school teams have to cope with the loss of their seniors. After Tuesday night's 82-51 loss to Eminence, it was clear that this season's team is still rough around the edges. At times, the offense was passing the ball well, getting it inside to Daniel Hubbard and taking shots from the perimeter when Hubbard could not shoot. But they were not accurate, sinking just 18 of 47 shots from the field.

On defense, there were times that Berea's signature tough play inside was on display, yet they failed to come up with many defensive rebounds and allowed too many uncontested shots from the outside.

Still, the elements of good team play were there, and the errors committed by Berea players tended to be errors of execution rather than mental mistakes. In other words, Jackson does not need to teach them basketball fundamentals. The players just need to get more comfortable with each other and take better shots when they have the opportunity.

As always, the key is getting ready for the postseason. in Berea's district, one win in the playoffs is enough to send the team to regional play. That means being ready to play Madison Southern, Model, and Madison Central in February.

The Pirates' first taste of district play will be on January 4, when they host Model at 7:30 p.m. On January 11, they host Madison Southern at 7:30 p.m. On January 16, they meet Model in the 11th Region All A Classic. The Pirates do not face Madison Central in the regular season.

Hubbard Selected for KY/TN All-Star Game

Berea Community High School offensive lineman Daniel Hubbard has been selected to participate in the 6th Annual "Border Bowl" Senior All-Star game featuring the top high school football players in Kentucky and Tennessee. Hubbard, a 6' 6", 310 lb senior, was selected as one of the top 10 offensive linemen in Kentucky by the Border Bowl Committee and will be a member of the blue squad as they attempt to return the Border Bowl trophy to the Commonwealth.

Hubbard anchored both the offensive and defensive lines for the Pirates during the 2012 season and served as a team captain. Defensively, Hubbard racked up 68 total tackles this season—including 25 solo tackles. He also had 5 sacks, 2 blocked kicks and 2 fumble recoveries. Hubbard's leadership on the offensive line was key to the Pirates' 250 yards of rushing per game this season and he was selected as an All-District player in both the 2011 and 2012 seasons. Hubbard's size and speed have attracted a flurry of recruiting attention this winter from multiple schools, primarily as an offensive lineman.

The "Border Bowl" kicked off in 2008 as a non-profit organization established to promote high school football in Kentucky and Tennessee. The objective of the Bowl is to provide an All-Star game featuring the top players in Kentucky and Tennessee and allow players to have the opportunity to practice and play with some of the top talent in the states. It also allows high school seniors an opportunity to gain exposure and possible college scholarship opportunities. All players were nominated by their

high school coaches and the team selection is made by a well-respected state-wide committee of coaches as well as Border Bowl found-

This year's game will take place on Saturday, January 12, 2013 at 12:30 p.m. at James H Taylor Stadium on the campus of the University of the Cumberlands. The Tennessee squad pulled out a 24-10 victory over Kentucky in last year's game, moving the orange squad to a 4-1 lead in the series. The National Guard is the primary sponsor of the KY-TN Border Bowl.

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

ORDINANCE NO. 18-12

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF BEREA, KENTUCKY, ESTABLISHING SERVER TRAINING FOR ALCOHOL LICENSE HOLDERS IN THE CITY OF BEREA.

WHEREAS, the City of Berea desires to promote responsible serving of Alcoholic Beverages in the City, and

WHEREAS, a Server Training Program would benefit the citizens of Berea and would help in the responsible serving of alcoholic beverages.

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Berea, Kentucky, does ordain as follows:

SECTION ONE

That the Code of Ordinances of the City of Berea, Kentucky, be amended by adding §55.020, so that such Sections shall read as follows:

§ 55.020 ALCOHOL SERVER TRAINING REQUIRED

SECTION ONE

- (1) All persons, corporations, associations, restaurants, businesses, clubs or other entities licensed by the city for the sale of alcoholic beverages or the managing of premises on which such sales are offered are to complete a responsible beverage service training class approved by the city. This shall not apply to any manufacturer of alcoholic beverages is defined in KRS 241.010(29) or any other person, corporation, association, business or other entity licensed for the wholesale of alcoholic beverages.
- "Server" for purposes of this ordinance shall mean any person employed or working in any capacity, whether as an employee, volunteer help or as a working proprietor, in any premise licensed for the sale of alcoholic beverages by retail sale and/or dispersed by the drink or where malt beverages are sold by retail or by the drink and whose job duties include the sale, dispersing or service of alcoholic beverages on the management of the licensed premises; provided, however, no person working at a special event for which a temporary alcoholic beverages license has been approved shall be required to comply with this Ordinance.
- Training; standards for certification: All persons, corporations, associations, restaurants, businesses, clubs or other entities licensed or employed in the sales and service of alcoholic beverages, including the retail sale of alcoholic beverages by the package or drink, shall participate in and complete a mandatory responsible beverage service training program approved by the city. Before approval is granted, the city shall first be satisfied that the training program is genuine and effectively trains all participants in the recognition of false identification and age documents as well as the human characteristics of alcohol intoxication.
- No person shall be employed by a licensed premise as a server unless the server has successfully completed a city approved alcoholic beverage server training program. This training program shall be completed for all newly hired servers within thirty (30) days of the first date of employment.
- Licensees, employees, officers or agents who fail to complete the mandatory responsible beverage service training within the prescribed time shall not sell or serve alcoholic beverages on the licensed premises until they have successfully completed the required training. Servers successfully completing the training shall receive a server certification from the server-training program. Each server shall successfully complete a new server-training program to be recertified not less than once every three (3) years.
- No licensed premise in which alcoholic beverages are sold by retail sale or consumed by the drink or malt beverages are sold for consumption on the premises or retail sale shall allow any server employed over thirty (30) days to sell, dispense or service any alcoholic beverage or malt beverages or to manage any such licensed premises unless that server is the holder of a current server certification. This includes all holders of an alcoholic and/or malt beverage license.
- Each such licensed premise shall maintain a file at the licensed premise for each such server for whom training is required. The file shall contain the name, job description, date of employments and proof of certification of each server regulated by this Ordinance. This information shall be available during hours of operation to any alcoholic beverage control officer or any police officer. Training records shall be retained by the licensee for a minimum of one (1) year.
- (A) Any person who sells and/or serves alcoholic beverages in a licensed establishment shall participate in and successfully complete a responsible beverage service-training program approved by the City of Berea. The city will not require enrollment in particular classes, but only that the training be obtained from a recognized program meeting the goals expressed in this ordinance.
- (B) For a responsible beverage servicetraining program to be approved by the city, it must effectively train its participants in the following:
- Applicable federal laws, state statures and regulation and local ordinances regarding the sale of alcoholic beverages;
- (ii) Verification of age forms of identification and methods of recognizing false or misleading age documents;

- (iii) The effect of alcohol on humans and physiology of alcohol intoxication;
- (iv) Recognition of the signs or characteristics of alcohol intoxication;
- (v) Strategies for intervention and preventing underage and intoxicated persons from consuming alcoholic beverages; and
- (vi) Potential liability for persons selling or serving alcoholic beverages.
 - Penalties.
- (A) No persons, corporation, association, restaurant, business, club or any other entity holding a license for the sale of distilled spirits, wines and/or malt beverages by the package or drink shall intentionally, willfully, knowingly, or wantonly authorize, direct, permit, allow or cause any employee, officer or agent of the licensee who has not completed the mandatory service training required, to sell or serve any alcoholic beverages to anyone on the licensed premises.
- (B) Any person, corporation, license, association, restaurant, business, club or other entity or any employee thereof, found to be in violation of any subsection of this section, shall upon conviction thereof, be fined in any amount not to exceed one hundred dollars (\$100.00); for subsequent violations within a two-year period and upon conviction thereof, a fine not to exceed five hundred dollars (\$500.00). Each day a violation occurs shall constitute a separate offense. The provisions of this Ordinance may be enforced pursuant to the provisions of
- (C) If a person who violates any provision of this Ordinance is a Corporation, Partnership, Joint Stock Company, Association or Fiduciary, then the president and/or the principal officer or partner responsible for such violations may be fined as authorized by this section § 55.005 of this Code.

SECTION TWO

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed. This Ordinance shall be effective on the 4th day of December, 2012, and shall be published according to law.

wealth. There are also state, national and international non-profits that local individuals represent. Each organization brings displays and information, and visitors can "shop" for the non-profit whose mission suits their in-Typically, a single non-profit processes the gifts, enabling a giver to write a single check and have the money dispersed among the nonprofits of their choice. There is no extra charge for that oversight.

Chamberlain reported that the program has averaged

about \$7,000 in donations each year. One year, proceeds reached almost \$10,000. In recent years, program organizers have combined the non-profit donations with a fundraiser for Berea Faith Community Outreach (BFCO), the umbrella organization for the Berea Food Bank, Bereans United for Utility and Rent Relief (BUURR), and the Frank Gailey Transient Aid Fund. Parishioners donate soup, sweets, and drinks, and the money raised from the sale of these lunch refreshments is donated to BFCO. Last year, lunch sales generated over \$500 in additional funds for BFCO. Betty Hibler, board member

and secretary for BFCO, said, "All around, it's a great collaboration. We get so much support from across the community."

"Christmas shopping can be crazy and nerve wracking and crowded," said Chamberlain. "This is a way that you can buy something that reflects what your family and friends are passionate about. Maybe they care about the environment, or healthcare, or children's issues, or housing. You can give them a gift of hope for the future, without the hassle of searching for parking spaces."

joined the service prior to their recognition ceremony later that afternoon.

A steady rain was falling outside, but the inside was filled with light and love. As the service began, a beaming Union Church Pastor Kent Gilbert proclaimed to some 375 people, "What a joyous day this is!" Loud applause echoed throughout the sanctuary signaling agreement from the congregation.

Although founded 159 years ago, the present building that houses Union Church, officially known as Church of Christ, Union, has been a Berea landmark at 200 Prospect Street for 91 years. The Chapel at Union Church is some 30 years old. But age, water and mold problems, and the need to upgrade both space and systems led to the million and a half dollar project that was coordinated by Dave Kobersmith, church administrator.

"With a new high-efficiency heating and cooling system and upgrades of the lighting system to use LED or fluorescent bulbs, we were able to significantly lower our carbon and energy footprint," said Pastor Gilbert.

A system that monitors the building and shuts down heating and lighting when not needed is another cost and energy savings. Pastor Gilbert explained that an important mission of Union Church is to be good stewards of the earth and creation.

Although significant improvements in space were made, the physical footprint of the 39,000 square foot building remains the same. But the church, the community and the college will benefit for years to come from the new fellowship hall and classrooms, renovated lower level restrooms, a new baby nursery, a renovated toddler nursery, a new sprinkler system, reconfigured office

space and a thoroughly modernized kitchen. Not all work was complete on Dec. 9, but it should be in about two weeks, according to Pastor Gilbert.

While renovation took place, the congregation met at Gray Auditorium in the Presser Music Building at Berea College.

Pastor Gilbert said, "We are so grateful to the College for the use of this space."

An important symbol of the return home was the return of the cross, the altar Bible and the Peace bell. The procession on Sunday was led by Merlin Kindel, moderator of Union Church, who carried the cross. He was followed by a beaming Colin Perman, age 7, who carried the large Bible. Union church member and mid-year graduate Courtney Matthews held high the peace plaque representing the peace bell that is rung at every service. As worship leader for the day, Matthews rang the peace bell during the service and participated with

fellow students in lighting the advent wreath.

The procession also included Pastor Gilbert; Rachel Small Stokes, the new associate pastor; Gail Bowman, the director of Berea College Campus Christian Center; and Lyle D. Roelofs, president of Berea College. Also in the procession was the frock-coated preacher for the day, the Rev. John G. Fee as represented by Obadiah Ewing-Roush of the Kentucky Chautauqua program. His text was excerpted from actual sermons preached

by the Rev. Fee. Finally, a rainbow procession of 68 mid-year graduates entered the building wearing caps and gowns, some individualized with Kinte cloth and other bright stoles. The Rev. Fee, who founded both Union Church and Berea College to be a place of unity of races and gender, would have been very proud of the happy faces representing African American, Caucasian, Arabic and Asian peoples from

many states and countries. How was the decision made to undertake the ren-

ovation project? "We really did have problems that were causing structural damage. We didn't have much choice if we wanted Union church to be a safe and good place to invite the community,"

Pastor Gilbert said. Church leadership set a modest goal to raise \$625,000 to resolve water issues in the basement. The good news is that the fund raising, with lots of folks giving what they could, raised enough to enlarge the project.

The capital campaign co-chairs were Jean Boyce and John Culp. The design team was led by Bob Boyce and Marlene Payne.

The service on Sunday was a joyous occasion from beginning to end with beautiful liturgy, music and a church filled with thankful people.

"We are very, very blessed," said Pastor Gil-

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

For Michelle Weston, art has been a part of her life for as long as she can remember, but once she discovered art glass in college, she never looked back.

"The teamwork aspect was interesting," Weston said, who owns the shop, The Glass Studio in Old Town. "And it's a very immediate art; once you start, you have to keep going.

Weston, a native of New Zealand, moved to the U.S. when she was around six years old. Her parents were artists and potters, and Weston has memories of a childhood in Nebraska drawing and painting, and sketching natural objects. She eventually went to Hastings College and received a bachelor's in both painting and glass. She first encountered the glass art when she had a class in the department.

"I hung out in the studio a lot before I could get into the class, because classes stayed so full. They eventually put me to work," Weston said chuckling.

Weston was fascinated with the fluid nature of the process, and working with the glass itself. She also loved the experimentation that went along with glass blowing and sculpting, as well as the constant challenges and development of the art.

During her time as an undergrad and also as a graduate student in art glass at Bowling Green, Ohio,

Weston worked a few summers at Cedar Point Amusement Park. Though she didn't enjoy working at an amusement park itself, it ended up being a valuable experience for her as an artist. She worked on a round stage with other glass workers and a furnace that would heat to 2,000 degrees in front of an audience, with the making of art glass as a live show at the amusement park. They were allowed to make whatever they wanted, with the amusement park footing the bill for materials, so Weston was able to play around and practice with different forms and products, while announcing what they were doing on a microphone for the benefit of their watchers.

Weston ultimately received her MFA in art glass, and moved back to Nebraska. After teaching for a few years, and opening a studio in Wilmore, she moved to Berea 11 years ago and opened up her glass studio where she works and sells her art. She also sells to 360 galleries around the country

"I had been looking for property around here for quite a while," Weston said. "I knew about Berea even when I lived in Nebraska, though I can't tell you how I knew about it. But I wanted to live in this art community."

When Weston heard about the availability of the building in Old Town, she moved her operation to Berea and has never regretted it.

"I love it here," Weston said.

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Kiplinger Ranks Berea College the Nation's "best-value private college under \$20K"

Kiplinger's list of the best-value private colleges where students pay less than \$20,000 a year. In determining the ranking, Kiplinger cited Berea College's generous financial aid and commitment to providing an education to students with limited financial resources. Berea College "trumps all the others [with] the remarkable deal it offers every student," the ranking

Kiplinger reports that the average net cost to a student attending Berea is \$2,641 annually, well below the average cost of a two-year public college and almost \$10,000 lower than the second-ranked school on Kiplinger's list. The list of 10 schools is drawn from Kiplinger's larger lists of the 100 best values in private colleges

and 100 best values in lib-

Berea College tops eral arts colleges, where Berea is ranked 98th nationally.

Kiplinger ranks schools based on five criteria -cost and financial aid, student indebtedness, competitiveness, graduation rates and academic support. Each factor is weighted differently, to reflect differences in relative importance, with cost and financial aid being the greatest factor.

This is Berea College's second number one national ranking this year as the college was also ranked as the nation's least expensive private college when calculating the costs of tuition and fees, according to a report by the U.S. Department of Education (DOE).

The College Affordability and Transparency Center, a DOE website that helps parents and prospective students

learn about and compare college costs, reports that Berea College's tuition and fees amount to \$910 per academic year. The national average for the cost of tuition and fees is \$21,949, but the most expensive schools charge twice that amount.

"I am deeply appreciative to all those who for more than a hundred years have generously given to Berea College so that an affordable and high-quality education could be available to those academically talented students whose families cannot provide it," says Chad Berry, academic vice president and dean of the faculty. "Such generosity in Berea is a big reason that our education is sometimes referred to as the 'best education money can't buy.'"

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


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

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

Weston both glass, which results in her ornaments, bowls and vases, and she also sculpts glass with hand tools. Her preference is the sculpt-

ing, and many of her hand tools are repurposed such as butter knives, tweezers and cleavers. She often shops around for kitchen items that she can use at her shop.

"I don't know what these are for in the kitchen," she laughed, holding up a few items with spokes in them and oddly shaped handles. "But they work great for me. They even came in different sizes."

Her experience teaching in Nebraska and working at the amusement park prepared her well for the recent development of art and education in Berea,

as she has been a popular instructor and presenter for the Learnshops as well as the schools groups that have been visiting different Berea artists as part of their curriculum. Unlike some artists who prefer to not deal with the public, Weston loves interacting with people and teaching them the history and processes of glass art, finding that it inspires her creativity and energy as well. Every Learnshop she has offered has been sold out, including the ones in the most recent "12 Days of Christmas," - not a surprising occurrence, since glass art is often considered the "rock star" of the art world.



adjacent to the Berea, paying for it out of the fifty cents a day she earned working around town. Upon her death her youngest son Sidney Diggs, decided the land should be devoted to Christian service of mankind and it had never been used for any other purpose up until December 1972. It had held a school, church assemblies, recreation facilities a community center and up

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Berea School May Have to Cancel Energy **Efficiency Project**

It is almost certain that Berea Community Schools will have to cancel their future plans to replace the HVAC system in the elementary school, which would have increased energy efficiency with a geothermal system and energy recovery unit, as well as other measures they were going to implement such as electrical upgrades and envelope closures. The school board members heard the bad news from their architecture firm, Tate, Hill and Jacobs at Monday night's board meeting, when it was reported that estimated costs for the project had increased over \$600,000.

The school board and school administration had been planning some major construction since last summer, when they discovered their bonding potential was \$2.8 million. Though they had hoped to build three new classrooms for the high school, since three teachers are currently floating, they gave up that plan for lack of funds and moved forward on replacing the "flat" areas of the roof and replacing the old HVAC system. The roof and HVAC system are very old and have needed to be replaced for a while.

The initial construction costs of the project were projected to be \$2.3 million, and with the other project costs, the school





What does one say about such a painful tragedy in our country? What could I possibly say in this column about the Sandy Hook massacre that would have any meaning, or insight or comfort? In this office, we've struggled with the same questions, discussions and anguish as everyone else in their different offices and homes and hang-outs.

Usually in these types of situations, I come upon something wise, something touching. But this time, everything I touch and read simply reflects the same horror that I feel, as the same question reverberates again and again, bouncing around the edges of my mind, bouncing around the edges of our culture. WHY?

Truly the unanswerable question, and I don't think we are ever going to get good answers. Perhaps we're asking the wrong question. Two main issues have

drifted to the top of the heap, as people try to find solutions, things that could prevent our children from being mindlessly killed. Both gun control and mental health care have been discussed. I agree both with bans on assault weapons, and the need for many more resources for mental health care. I've lived through different family members and friends struggle with finding mental health care they can afford. So I'm glad these issues are being discussed, and perhaps changes will be made, but I don't think those discussions begin to address the true horror and agonizing heart of this issue.

And what lies at that bleeding, screaming heart are our children, children with their front teeth missing and their smiles and the assumption for most of them that their world is fairly safe. We failed to protect them, our children, and it's impossible to understand how a flesh and blood human being could walk out of his house and take them down like they were targets at a shooting

My cousin has a glass

slide that some teachers use in teaching language. The quote on it says, "Now we shall go very slowLY." That's how I feel, as different wild ideas keep surfacing on the news, and reporters are muddying the waters even more with their speculation and complete misunderstanding of what mental illness is. We do have to think about where we go from here as a country, but not too quickly. We have to grieve, and pray and be silent and cry and somehow live with the fact that 28 families and more will be going through absolute hell this Christmas, while our families are intact.

We must figure out how to mourn for children we don't know and teachers we've never met and a town we've never been to.

Then I would hope we could think about our mental health care, and much greater caution with our weapons and finally how to deal with the fact that none of that will ever be able to completely keep our children safe.

And during it all, Let us please go very SLOWly.

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What Fiscal Cuts Mean to Schools

Dear Editor:

You have probably heard a great deal about the looming fiscal cliff facing our nation. I want to bring the debate closer to home by sharing what that cliff means for Madison County Schools and the future of the children and youth of our community. Sequestration, the fiscal policy procedure adopted by Congress to deal with the federal budget deficit, generates automatic cuts for each of nine years – fiscal years 2013 to 2021 - totaling \$1.2 Trillion. Without Congressional action to prevent sequestration, the first round of cuts will take place January 2, 2013. The 2013 cuts apply across-the-

board to "discretionary" spending, and are divided between reductions to defense and non-defense spending including educa-

As a school system leader, I can assure you that these education cuts will not heal quickly, if ever. The impact will be severe and far-reaching and threatens to undermine the success of our local schools in preparing students to be college and/or career ready. Kentucky legislators have made a concerted effort to protect state funding for education. Despite those efforts, the local district proportion of school funding has more than doubled in the last 20 years - from 18% in 1990 to 40%

in 2010 – even though we have more students than ever before.

Under sequestration, education funding will be subject to cuts ranging from 9.1% (in 2013) to 5.5% (in 2021) according to the Center on Budget & Policy Priorities. The reduction in FY 2013 would amount to \$4.1 billion. These cuts will devastate the already fragile economic condition of our local schools and will set the new baseline for future federal allocations. This is simply unaccept-

I believe that Madison Countians understand the critical role education plays in the long-term economic

We are deeply troubled and sorrowful to hear of the great tragedy in Connecticut at an elementary school on Friday. Our thoughts and prayers go out to the Sandy Hook Elementary School community that was devastated by the loss of their children and educators.

Our children and staff are our most precious resource and to that end, we take this tragedy as a stark reminder of the importance of our safety procedures and our check-in process for all visitors to our schools. While there is no indication that this is anything but an isolated incident far away from our Berea Community Schools, we do want to take this opportunity to remind all of our families that we conduct regular drills, including those for a building lockdown, and that we have secure doors at the main entrance

to each school. All visitors to our schools must enter and sign in with the school office. Other exterior doors to the buildings remain locked at all times and only staff can access those doors. Additionally, we have a full-time school resource officer assigned to our school.

These are just a few of the procedures that we have in place to help ensure student safety and security. Certainly in this day and age we can never be absolutely protected against all circumstances, but we do educate staff throughout the year, practice and revise our safety plan and rely on our parents, first responders and the community to help us practice and respond using our safety procedures.

We know that children may raise questions and concerns about this tragedy. The American Psychological Association (APA) recommends several tips for parents to consider:

If children ask questions, talking to them about their worries and concerns is the first step to help them feel safe and begin to cope with the events occurring around them.

Keep home a safe place -Children, regardless of age, often find home to be a safe haven when the world around them becomes overwhelming.

Watch for signs of stress, fear or anxiety -

After a traumatic event, it is typical for children (and adults) to experience a wide range of emotions including fearfulness, shock, anger, grief and anxiety. They may experience trouble sleeping, difficulty with concentrating on schoolwork, or changes in appetite. This is normal for everyone and should begin to disappear in a few months.

Take "news breaks" -

Your children may want to keep informed by gathering information about

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

would have been able to squeeze both in. But when the architects reported that updates expenses and updated designs resulted in \$600,00 more in expenses than they thought, Berea board members knew they would have to give up part of their plans. With the roof needing monthly patching and repair, it was clear that it needed to be the first priority with fund-

There is a slight chance that the HVAC system could still be replaced, if the construction bids come back lower than expected. The project will go out to bid in January. Board members questioned why the cost estimates had increased so dramatically since the last meeting. They were informed that the former development plans were fairly undeveloped, and once they finished the fully developed document, the costs had changed. Some construction costs have also increased in the past few months.

Both Berea school board members Elizabeth Crowe and Will Bondurant expressed their disappointment that they wouldn't be able to replace the HVAC system, a very old, inefficient one, which would have led to future savings in energy costs.
"The part, ironically, that will save us

money in the future is the other stuff, that we won't be able to do," Crowe said.

Crowe asked other school board members to help her look around for other ways to pay for the replacement of the HVAC system, such as funding for making school systems much more efficient.

Elementary School Principal Emily Reed presented the school board with some demonstrations and examples of the Leader in Me program that they have conducted for a few months now.

The school board members heard from their accounting firm – Brandon Hardy, Mather and Co. – and the school received a clean audit, or unqualified opinion.

The two principals of the elementary school and the middle and high school thanked Superintendent Mike Hogg for his leadership over the weekend after the Sandy Hook tragedy. Hogg had called a meeting on Sunday night for the administration and the board to meet to review safety procedures.

"Those were our colleagues that fell in Connecticut," Hogg said, when speaking of some of the anxieties teachers and students had on returning to school Monday, "and our kids that fell in Connecticut."

disease. Her prognosis was

not good. "I wasn't supposed to mature. It was supposed to stunt my growth," she said. "But here I am, healthy and getting ready to graduate from high

school.

Eventually, Taylor's disease became so severe that doctors gave her parents two options. She could undergo a surgery to remove her colon, which would require that she wear an ostomy bag on her side for the rest of her life, or she could try an experimental drug that had not yet been approved for use in children.

Taylor said, "At that age, I just couldn't imagine the idea of a hole in my stomach and a bag on the outside." So she said she wanted to take the

experimental drug.
"We're so glad that we chose that option," said her mother Elizabeth, because the treatment worked, and Taylor's symptoms gradually went into remission. Now she has very little trouble, enjoys a diet with no restrictions, and gets regular check-ups with blood tests to keep an eye on things. The drug that she took experimentally has now become a standard treatment for children with advanced ulcerative colitis.

As they described Taylor's experiences at UK Children's Hospital, she and her parents laughed at some of the memories. But Taylor turned serious when she said, "We laugh now, but at the time it was horrible.'

Taylor was almost nine years old when she got the idea for "Taylor's Fun Factory." She had to stay in the hospital frequently and sometimes for long stretches.

"It was my second home," she said. "For a kid to stay in the hospital, it can be pretty scary. I'd get bored, too. I realized that I wasn't the only I thought, 'Maybe if I give them stuff to do they would feel less scared."

That's how it started, with the desire to give other children things to help keep their minds off what was happening. Taylor asked her mom to bring drawing paper and crayons for her to share with the other children. She made them drawings and decorations, and she decorated the windows in the ward.

Now, she and her father and mother take packages for each child with at least five different crafts. They don't limit their generosity to the Christmas season, typically delivering packages three to six times a year. For the children that are going to be in the hospital over Christmas, they also bring fiber optic Christmas trees to help cheer up their rooms.

Taylor's generous spirit hasn't gone unrecognized. In 2006, when she was eleven, Taylor was chosen to represent Kentucky as an Ambassador in the Children's Miracle Network "Champions Across America" program. As ambassador, Taylor travelled with her family to Florida and Washington, DC, to participate in public relations events promoting Children's Miracle Network. Taylor had photo shoots with Leann Rimes and with Tracy Byrd. Ultimately, her photos were in advertising around the world.

"They treated them like celebrities, like little queens and kings," Elizabeth said. "She had felt bad for so long. It was good to see her get to experience something positive."

The Lake family encourages people to contribute to the Children's Miracle Network. Money raised from donations stays in the state. In Kentucky it goes to UK Children's Hospital, providing up-to-date medical equipment, playrooms for the children, and comfortable arrangements for

parents and caregivers. "We know where it goes," Pat said, "We've seen the ben-

one that felt that way. Then efits of those donations firsthand."

Although the Lake family provides most of the materials for "Taylor's Fun Factory" on their own, they receive small donations from local Wal-Mart stores, and churches have occasionally contributed, too. This Christmas, a generous donation of collector's edition Beanie Babies from Robert and Alice Linville in Berea helped them fill the packages.

Taylor and Elizabeth de-"literally scribed buying "literally buggy-loads" of school supplies during back-to-school specials or clearance sales, then storing it all until time to bring it to the children.

"It's not cheap," said Elizabeth. "But it's a good cause," Pat added.

Her gastroenterologist, Dr. Shashidhar (Dr. Shashi to all the children), was her inspiration to fight for others. He understood the severity of her disease and supported the family's decision to try the experimental drug treatment.

"He did things for me that no one else would have

done," Taylor said.

Taylor said that she plans to continue with the Fun Factory work when she enters college. She is also thinking about expanding it to include Shriner's Hospital for Children and other facilities that serve pediatric patients. She plans to attend Berea College in the fall and is applying to be a Bonner's Scholar, which would give her the opportunity to carry on with the Fun Factory as a service learning

When asked what benefits come from serving others, Taylor said, "It reminds me to stop and be thankful."

"When I was sick, I spent a lot of time thinking, 'why me?' But I wouldn't be the person I am today without what I've been through. My heart is opened up to everything. I don't regret anything, and I'm glad everything took its course."


"We couldn't ask for a better daughter," said her father Pat. "We're so proud of her. She stands up for other kids who have it hard."





of the successes of the 2013 calendar year at meeting on Tuesday, highlighting some of the major projects that were completed.

It is located between the municipal building and city hall. There have been discus-

sions with Berea Arts Council (BAC) on renting the space to them, CONTINUED FROM PAGE A1 with BAC inhabiting the space with Berea Tourism. Tourism has been setting aside money for the renovation of the property.

Council member Jerry Little brought up the question of whether it may be cheaper to tear down the building instead of refurbishing it, since items such as energy efficiency may be important considerations. After discussion on what aspects may be important as far as sustainability, energy efficiency and the basic use of the building itself, the city council passed a resolution that the building be used for a public purpose, and cost would be a consideration in building or refurbish-

Mayor Steve Connelly informed the council members that a resolution was in no way binding as far as action, but was more a statement of intent or interest.

Josh Bills gave a report as a representative of the Berea Utilities Advisory Board, and informed the council that there was an opening on the board since Gina Chamberlain had indicated she would be stepping down. He stated that the board had been established in 2008, to give citizens feedback on the utilities company, and the board had helped to bring energy efficiency measures by working on the net metering ordinance, LED street lighting and bringing the solar farm to Berea.

Observe Safety Precautions During Holiday Season tree, never put tree branches or needles in a fireplace or wood-burning stove. When the tree becomes dry, discard it promptly. The best way to dispose of your tree is by taking it to a recycling center or having it hauled away be a community pick-up service.

Madison County Emer-Management Agency reminds Madison County residents to observe safety precautions during the holiday season.

When selecting a tree, needles should be green and hard to pull back from the branches, and the needle should not break if the tree has been freshly cut.

The trunk should be sticky to the touch. Old trees can be identified by bouncing the tree trunk on the ground. If many needles fall off, the tree has been cut too long, has probably dried out, and is a fire haz-

Do not place the tree close to a heat source, including a fireplace or heat vent. The heat will dry out the tree, causing it to be more easily ignited by heat, flame or sparks. Be careful not to drop or flick cigarette ashes near a tree. Do not put your live tree up too early or leave it up for longer than two weeks. Keep the tree stand filled with water at all times.

Finally members of the Baptist Student Union were presenting a play.





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Bearwallow Memories

"We had no electricity, no running water. But my parents were very interested in the holidays; Christmas, Easter, Thanksgiving, and they were very good at improvising."

These were Rex Layne's words, who was born in 1924, of a childhood spent on Bearwallow Road near Berea. Rex's memories of Christmas were rich and moving, but very far removed from some modern views where several presents fill up space around the tree and people slog through traffic and shoppers struggle against the clock to buy everything they need.

Rex's family lived on a 13 acre farm in Bearwallow, and there was a large woods near them owned by Uncle Dan. They always traveled to "Uncle Dan's Woods" to chop down a cedar tree of the right size. Then Rex's mother would set the children to popping popcorn to make garlands, and cut-

ting up construction paper for paper chains. They would put a Christmas bell in the middle of the living and dining rooms, and stretch out the paper chains in four lines to the corners of the house. His mother, who was a teacher along with his father, would cut up accordion paper dolls to place around the home as well.

"We always received one major gift under the tree," Rex said, and he has clear memories of which gift he received for most of the years of his childhood. When 2 ½, he received a tricycle with wooden wheels, and he remembers popping wheelies on it, going on the back wheels. His father, who Rex says made over 500 dulcimers in his lifetime, made the tricycle for him.

At 3 or 4 years old, he received a little red wagon, and he was very proud to take the wagon out to Uncle Dan's Woods the next year, to transport the Christmas tree back in his wagon.

"I kept that wagon until I was 30 years old," Rex said with a soft smile.

He had a fond memory of being 9 or 10 years old, and not being able to find his Christmas present under the tree one year. His mother kept telling him to look around the tree, but he couldn't find it. Finally, she pulled out a pop gun that was placed among the branches.

Along with the one big present, Rex and his sisters would receive Christmas stockings stuffed with fruit such as oranges, tangerines, apples and bananas, some nuts and other small items like a box of crayons.

"We grew up poor," Rex said, "but we didn't know it. Everyone lived like that around us. We would barter a lot, going down to the store and swapping eggs for salt and sugar."

When Rex was 11, he received a Hawthorne bicycle.

"I was the only one on Bearwallow with a bike," Rex said, and commented that he never got to ride it, because all the other kids were always taking it out for a spin. He would often take people out for rides on the handlebars.

He remembers one time going to the sock hop at Kingston High School, and taking his sister on the handlebars. She ended up winning a prize there, a gallon of motor oil, and Rex laughed as he remembered the trip home, balancing her on the handle bars while she struggled to balance the motor oil on her lap.

"I have wonderful memories," Rex said, a bit teary eyed as he thought of his childhood on Bearwallow.



In the classic movie "It's a Wonderful Life," George Bailey gets the opportunity to see what would happen if he had never been born. In the early stages of the movie, George longs for a life outside of the small town of Bedford Falls, which he describes as "onehorse." He wants to travel, go to college, and build things. At each point in the movie when he is about to undertake one of his adventures, he is sidetracked by his sense of responsibility to his family, friends, and neighbors.

At a crucial point in the movie, his bumbling uncle misplaces a significant amount of money and George is on the verge of being indicted for fraud. Believing that he is "worth more dead than alive," George goes to jump off a bridge into a raging river. While pondering the jump, George sees what he believes to be another person jumping into the river. As he has done throughout the story, George's sense of responsibility to others emerges and he saves Clarence, who turns out to be an angel. Clarence magically erases George's

existence in the town of Bedford Falls and painfully shows George all the good done through his consistent, small acts of kindness and repeated self-sacrifice. Bedford Falls, absent George there to help others and to stand in the way of the antagonist, Mr. Potter, is a crumbling, oppressive town full of slum lords and crime.

None of us gets the opportunity George Bailey had for an angel to appear and show us what our impact has been on our families, friends, and communities. Of course we long for that knowledge, as we live in a society of instant gratification and immediate feedback. Technology has enabled us to remain "connected" in a way that none of our ancestors could have imagined. Adults and kids sleep with their cell phones so they can instantly know when a text message arrives, an email hits the in-box, or a new picture is posted on someone's social media profile. We have a deep longing for connectedness that I believe originates in the need to be part of a community. We long to matter to each other just as George Bailey longed to know if he really mattered.

One of my favorite things about serving in public education is the occasional note or email I get from a former student, teacher, or colleague thanking me for an encouragement or kindness that I do not remember. (Of course, they could have me confused with someone else!) Those small gifts remind me that the little things we do for each other – like asking someone to lunch, sending a card for no reason, dropping off a bag of the person's favorite coffee, or simply asking, "How are you?" and really listening to the answer - are invalu-

As the title of the movie foreshadows, George Bailey realizes he actually had a life full of love, family and friendship that cannot be quantified like a bank account. George also realizes that his small acts of kindness and sense of responsibility are what helped maintain and nurture the community of Bed-

ford Falls. In this season of gift-giving, remember it's the small, selfless, and seemingly insignificant gifts that build our families, friendships, and communities and show us that we do matter.







A LOOK BACK AT 2012

By Beth Myers Citizen Editor

January and February

Early in 2012, two issues came up that would continue to be discussed in Berea for months after. In the January 19 issue, readers heard about the controversy with the expansion of Highway 25 N, and the proposed redistricting of Kentucky that would have a significant effect on Madison County. Both plans drew criticism from Berea public officials and

citizens. On January 12, 2012 citizens and business owners gathered to review the preliminary drawings from the CDP Engineers, working with District 7, for the Highway 25 North widening project. The project planned to expand Highway 25 from two lanes to five from Ellipse Street north to the intersection with the Berea bypass. With two lanes moving in each direction and a shared turning lane, the widened road would allow traffic to keep moving at all times, and it also included a pedestrian sidewalk on the west side and a ten foot wide shared-use pathway on the east side.

Many business owners were unhappy because of the project's impact on their public parking spaces. Rick Smith of Smith's Tire said at the time, "This will take approximately half of my total parking. We're going to have to figure something out. I'm losing almost my entire front parking area."

Some homeowners and business owners didn't realize that the property they built on right up to the highway was state owned right of way. The right-ofway had been purchased in the 1940s when the highway was first built.

Dr. Dan Sipple of Sipple's Chiropractic and Wellness Center, who later became one of the organizers of the business and residence owners on Highway 25, said at that January meeting, "If this happens, it could shut down the businesses. The state has been very clear with their intent, and we don't expect any changes."

Many business owners and home owners organized under the name, "Berea Citizens for Common Sense on 25N," following that January meeting, because of the fear

side of the project. At the next public meeting, everyone expressed satisfaction with the Highway 25N three-lane design, a valuable example of citizenry, public officials and state government working together for something

that would satisfy all. The redistricting that was proposed for Kentucky in January divided Madison County into four representative districts. It was a measure that had already passed the Kentucky House of Representatives. Representative Lonnie Napier, who had represented Berea and Madison County for several years, would no longer be representing any precincts in the county

One of the districts would have been the 81st Representative district, Rita Smart's current district, who would have kept approximately the same boundaries of her district. The other ma-

The redistricting ended up getting overturned in court, and the judge decreed that Kentucky should go back to its prior precinct map for the upcoming elections. For the round of elections in 2012, Kentucky had the same precincts as the election before, which sent many representatives scurrying at the last minute to file for the right one.

March and April

In March and April, a few different key things happened in Berea, including one of the smaller in-

Hogg served as elementary school principal at Berea Community for seven years before changing positions this past year to Director of District-Wide Services. All together, he has been at Berea Community over 11 years.

May and June

In May's primary elections, Jonathan Shell and Darlene Snyder were the big winners, with Shell getting a decisive win over Nathan Mick in the race to be the Republican candidate for the open State Representative seat in the 36th District for Madison and Garrard County. Long time Representative Lonnie Napier had thrown his support behind Mick for the seat he had filled for so long, but Mick still fell by 590 votes to Shell.

"The results don't show how hard a race this was to win," Shell said at the time. "Mick ran a great race. But our motto from the very beginning was to work like it depends on you, and pray like it depends on the Lord."

In Madison County, Shell won by a much slimmer margin than Garrard, where his family lives, getting 810 votes to Mick's 756 in Madison. In Garrard County he received an impressive 63 percent of the vote with 1,292 votes.

Snyder won the race for circuit clerk against two contenders, taking 45 percent of the vote to Jennifer Webb's 38 percent and Brandy Winkler's 16 percent. With no Republican registered for the office, the primary served as an overall win for the circuit court clerk for Synder.

"I'm very proud and pleased," Snyder said. "We ran a good, clean, positive campaign. I've really enjoyed going door to door, meeting everyone and I've had such wonderful help."

Webb, who ran a strong campaign, came in a close second to Synder, with 2,097 votes to Snyder's 2,489. Snyder's campaign emphasized her experience, with her working since 1988 as chief deputy clerk. She was heavily endorsed by current Circuit Clerk Linda Spurlock Cates, who is retiring.

Shell ended up winning the 36th District seat in the Kentucky General Assembly against Democratic candidate, Bud Montgomery, of Berea, despite stated concerns on his youth and inexperience.

When he spoke of his goals once he served in Frankfort, Shell "First, we need to fix the antiquated tax system, and do some tax reform. We also need to look at these unfunded liabilities. We need to let the people govern, instead of programs and institutions."

The home incarceration program in Madison County started in June of this year, partly in response to the overcrowding of the Detention Center. In a facility with approximately 200 beds, the center routinely has up to 280. The fiscal court was also interested in this option so people could work and/or take care of their family while serving their sentence.

Michelle Albertson, the deputy from the sheriff's department was assigned to the program. When it started in mid-June, two females were enrolled and wearing the required ankle bracelets. By the end of the year, the home incarceration program had around 40 in it. Because of how busy she became immediately, the fiscal court ended up hiring someone else to assist Albertson.

There was some very sad news in July this past year, when the Berea Health Ministry announced that it was closing its doors as of August 31 because of lack of funds. In the same month, while health care was on the way out, ironically, chickens did find safe harbor in the City of Berea.

Despite scrimping, saving and soliciting, the Health Ministry couldn't leverage enough funds to stay open. The board of directors had decided back in May to close their clinic, but did not make that public in case there was a chance to receive enough money to continue.

"It's absolutely awful," Cora Fletcher said at the time, the president of the board of directors of the Ministry. "This was really 12 years of planning, with nine years of operation."

The health ministry had kept their heads above wa-

ter for several years, until 2008 hit with the recession. Berea Health Ministry took double hits, since the number of patients increased who needed their services that didn't have insurance, and the donations decreased.

Staff at the health ministry worked during July and August to find clinics for their existing patients. They stopped the prescription assistance on August 1. They stated that telling the patients that the clinic was closing had been the hardest part.

"It's been devastating. Some of these patients have been coming for years," Fletcher said. "A lot of good things have come out of the last nine years. But our goal was also to see a transformation of the health of our community and we didn't have enough time for that. It takes at least ten years of operation to see behavior change."

Cappie Parsons, the administrator, struggled with her tasks, "It's a grieving process," she said in July. "You keep thinking surely there's a way we can keep

As far as the welcome sign for fowl, the final act in the ongoing drama of chickens in Berea occurred when the Berea City Council unanimously approved an amended chicken ordinance early in July that would send interested chicken owners directly to the codes department for






As a graduate of the school I can say they drug me off rock bottom and gave me confidence, and made me feel I am a valuable person. Now I am in my 2nd semester in college, simply because they helped

me. A lot of the women are survivors or victims of domestic violence, some have very little education, some have lots of health issues. They give mammograms, dental check ups and various other medical checkups to all the women who attend, and have a grant to help the women get false teeth. They basically hand life back to the women. This organization deserves every dime they can get. Last winter someone burnt the office down with all the stuff they use, and they need help to recover from that."



ment. If all requirements are met, and the applicant has no recorded codes violations, the permit would be granted

be granted. The issue of neighbors' rights regarding someone harboring chickens came to a head when Katherine Gardner of Adams Street had applied for a conditional use permit earlier, after having been denied the year before. Both times a few neighbors, or people neighbors, representing testified strongly against Gardner receiving the conditional use permit. The board of adjustments ended up turning down her request for the second time, but did not offer a recorded finding of fact.

September and October

In the early fall of this year from September to October, potential jobs were announced, Frances Moore turned 100 and Berea lost Sue Hays -- who brought the library to Madison County -- when she died of cancer.

Stemco Motorwheel, an industry in town, announced in October that they would be expanding their production in the next few years. They stated that they were eventually planning to add over 100 jobs in Berea, with a distribution center in the vacant portion of their building on Glades Road for phase one, while planning a \$12 -\$15 million renovation and expansion of the business for phase two.

In the first phase of the expansion, Stemco planned to hire for an additional 35 hourly positions and five salaried positions. For phase two, they plan on creating 80 additional Stemco was also looking at Tennesse and Texas for their expansion, but they chose Berea, according to Tom McKay, the director of business development, mainly because of the low electric rate. Other factors were the incentive package that Kentucky offers to new businesses as well as the UPS distribution center in Lexington.

Stemco manufactures a fairly unique brake drum for semi trucks and other heavy equipment.

Staff, patrons and friends of the Madison County Library mourned the lost of one of their staunchest advocates in October, when Hays passed away after a tough battle with cancer. She was the first library director of Madison County, worked hard to get the library started, and then spent the first several years creating a sense of goodwill in the community after it opened its doors in Richmond in 1988. The library in Berea came soon after, in the spring of 1989, opening operations from the storefront at 319 Chestnut St.

"At her birthday party, she came in and talked to me about the library, wanting to know what was going on," Ruthie Maslin said, the library director who took over after Sue retired. "Even ill, she was wanting to know everything that was happening. I told her our circulation passed over 500,000, which is big in the library world, and she was so excited. It was such a big part of her life."

"Sue Hays created a legacy that Madison County can be proud of," Harris said. "Madison County Public Library's continued growth and success will rest securely on the strong foundation she helped build."

Another important woman in Berea's history, former council woman and local historian Frances Moore, celebrated her 100th birthday in October in the building that she fought so fiercely to save – the old L & N Train Depot that was renovated into the Berea Welcome Center.

"It was such an honor to have her celebrate her 100th birthday here," Belle Jackson, Berea's Tourism Director said. "To have her here in the building she was so passionate about was wonderful."

Moore may best be known for her work to save the Depot in the late 1960s. Mayor Steve Connelly stated that this would be her greatest legacy in Berea.

November and December

The Berea City Council elections took place early in November, and unlike the previous two elections, the incumbents were heavily favored. There were 13 people running for the eight available seats, and only one, Richard Bellando, was voted off. Truman Fields chose to not run again. One newcomer, Chad Hembree, will be joining the council along with Chester Powell, who served for 12 years before losing in 2008.

"I'm surprised that I was sixth," Hembree said, who ran for city council in 2010, but didn't make it. "I thought if I did get in, I would barely get in. I'm very excited."

Incumbents Virgil Burnside, Vi Farmer, Jerry Little, Ronnie Terrill, Diane Kerby and Billy Wagers were all re-elected for a second term. Kerby was once again the top vote getter, same as 2010, with 2,807 votes. Billy Wagers, also a usual top vote getter, received 2,745 votes for the second slot.

Hopefuls Robert Johnson, Brandon Rutherford, Jim Lucas and Jerry Knowles all failed to receive enough votes to gain

one of the top eight slots. This was the third time Johnson ran for election and failed, and the second time Rutherford was unable to gain a seat. Lucas and Knowles, both relative newcomers to the city of Berea, finished at the bottom with 2,006 and 1,165 votes respectively.

Hembree was one of the first city council candidates to run on a mostly Internet campaign, placing campaign ads on Facebook, his blog and google ad words. He had 13,000 hits on one of his campaign ads.

Hembree also stated that

Hembree also stated that he would be glad to lend his IT expertise and his technology know-how to the City of Berea, and be a resource and a help to the city.

"I just want to thank everyone for their support," Hembree said after his election. "I love this community with all my soul and I just want to serve it."
