## Donald Martin pleads guilty to porn charges

Prosecutors with the U.S. Attorney's office in Lexington announced last Thursday that a Mt. Vernon man had pled guilty in a child porno case.

Donald R. Martin, 47, of Old U.S. 25, pled guilty to one count of producing child pornography and one count of possession of child pornography.

Martin was arrested on April 7th of this year by Rockcastle Sheriff's Detective Matt Bryant, after Bryant said Martin had pornographic pictures of three children ages 11-13 in his possession, which he had apparently taken at his photo shop, Southern Stars Modeling, located on Main in Mt. Vernon or at his home on Old U.S. 25. Martin was originally charged with 208 counts of child pornography. 200 of the photos found by police were found in Martin's home located across from Elmwood Cemetery in Mt. Vernon.

When Martin was taken into the Sheriff's office for questioning, he immediately complained of chest pains and was taken to the Rockcastle Hospital, where he was released the following Monday to police who took him into custody.


Martin, who apparently came to Mt. Vernon from Alabama, was not listed as a sex offender at the time of his arrest.

At the plea proceedings, authorities said Martin admitted that he took sexually explicit photographs of three minor children while they were attending modeling classes at his photo studio.

The production of child pornography is a federal offense, according to Bryant, who said that federal officers picked up the prosecution of the case in mid-April.

Martin will be sentenced on December 18, in London before Federal Judge Jennifer Coffman.

Prosecutors did not say what kind of sentence would be recommended for Martin.

## Rockcastle County, Mt. Vernon receive \$55,000 from PRIDE

Eastern Kentucky PRIDE has awarded \$55,000 for environmental improvement projects in Rockcastle County. Through the PRIDE Community Grant Program, the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court received a \$40,000 grant, and the City of Mt. Vernon received a \$15,000 grant.

PRIDE announced recently that 47 grants totaling \$1,106,515, were awarded this year. The one-year grants will be used primarily to remove illegal dumps and dispose of trash collected during community cleanup events, such as the PRIDE Spring Cleanup.

## Arrest made in burglary

The Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department has made an arrest in connection with a recent burglary and theft near the Lincoln County line.

On the morning of August 24th, the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department arrested Matthew Holden, 36, of Mt. Vernon, just across the Lincoln County line. Holden was in possession of several items which were later discovered to have been stolen from two Rockcastle residents' vehicles - Money Ed Cummins, a former Rockcastle Circuit Court Clerk and Teresa Bowman.

The Lincoln County Sheriff's Department contacted Det. Barry Adams, who notified the victims that Holden was possibly in possession of some of their items and they were later able to identify several of the items as belonging to them.

On Tuesday, an arrest warrant was obtained for Holden for Burglary in the third degree. He is currently being held in the Lincoln County Detention Center for related charges and the information will be presented to the Rockcastle Grand Jury at a later date.

"The local officials who applied for these grants should be commended for their leadership," said Richard Thomas, PRIDE executive director. "Congressman (Hal) Rogers makes sure PRIDE funds are available for environmental stewardship, but it is up to communities to put the funds to work."

"Citizens also have a role to play in their local stewardship campaigns," Thomas continued. "For example, volunteers may be needed to help with these Community Grant projects. I encourage you to call your local grant recipients to see if volunteers are needed. Second, throughout the year, citizens can report littering and dumping to their local solid waste coordinator. Cleaning up after a few irresponsible people is expensive, and we need to send the message that we no longer will put up with their illegal activities."

The PRIDE Community Grant program provides up to \$50,000 to counties, cities, other public entities and nonprofit organizations for environmental improvement projects in southern and eastern Kentucky. The program encourages community and citizen involvement in projects to promote personal responsibility for the environment.

"Call it one small mistake by somebody, one giant loss for mankind," the headline read. It was a web story that I read a few days ago. I could not believe my eyes.

The article continued, "The original film footage of astronaut Neil Armstrong's first steps on the moon, one of the most important artifacts of the 20th century has been lost." The moon tapes lost. Unbelievable. Not just unbelievable, unthinkable.

The television footage that most of us witnessed was the equivalent of a photocopy of a photocopy. It came from a television camera pointed at a black and white monitor of the actual television footage. The original

magnetic tapes that recorded the iconic images of man's first footsteps on the moon are missing and scientists fear that they are in danger of deteriorating into dust unless they are found quickly and converted to digital format. The article went on to say, "The tapes have been mislaid, most likely in NASA's vast archives at the Goddard Space Flight Center in Maryland."

Goddard is also home to the only equipment that can still play the 14-inch format tapes of the moon walk. A spokesman for the space agency said, "We're trying to track them down through the paperwork

Some vegetable gardening thoughts and observations. Disclaimer:

This is from my intimate and personal experience and not from the University Agriculture Extension Service. Not that I don't respect them because exactly the opposite is true. It's just that I try a lot of stuff that the Extension Service would not recommend. So take this with the proverbial grain of salt. But it's only going to cost you less than the price of a fast food hamburger to give it a shot.

Summer garden planting time is pretty much over in Kentucky unless you are getting ready to put out onion seed, gar-

lic cloves and sow spinach and kale to winter over for spring harvests. In which case you are too early. It's not quite time for any of those yet.

Turnips and mustard greens will give you a double crop if you sow them now (one in late October and another in March next year), but by the time the current season is ready for onion seed and garlic sets and spinach, most people will have changed the oil in their tillers, run a little WD-40 through the carbs, drained the left-over gasoline out of fuel tanks, changed the fuel filters and hi-

## Improving Your "Good" Cholesterol

Many of us never thought we'd see the day we wanted to raise our cholesterol levels, but now that is just what we want to do.

Researchers have found that there is more than one form of cholesterol. And that the different fractions of cholesterol affect the body in different ways. While the majority of cholesterol in the blood is a "low density" cholesterol (LDL) which contributes to plugged arteries and heart attacks, the "high density" cholesterol, or HDL, has a protective influence on the arteries and heart.

The ratio of the two forms of cholesterol determines the risk of heart disease from your cholesterol. What's more, there are simple things we can do to raise the good cholesterol and lower the harmful cholesterol.

Exercise is a simple way to stimulate increases in the good HDL. Exercising 20-30 minutes three times a week will have a positive effect.

Replace saturated fats (butter, lard, beef fat) with unsaturated fats. Unsaturated fats are mainly found in vegetable oils such as corn oil, margarine and sunflower oils (but avoid palm oil and coconut oil).

Losing weight also appears to raise the level of HDL. Also, one to two alcoholic drinks a day has been reported to decrease heart disease, possibly by affecting the HDL. However, this must be weighed against the risk of alcohol use.

Cholesterol-lowering medicines and niacin can help raise the HDL. Your doctor can prescribe these medicines as well as provide further information on the value of exercise and dietary changes

The Kentucky Supreme Court recently upheld an unusual manslaughter conviction. The case arose in Fayette County where Binta Baraka was charged with manslaughter after her father, Brutus Price, died of a heart attack. Father and daughter were fighting when Brutus, a thin and frail man, collapsed.

During a pre-trial hearing, the defense sought to exclude the prosecution's expert, a state medical examiner, who intended to testify that Brutus was a victim of "homicide by heart attack". According to the defense, the doctor's testimony was unreliable and invaded the province of the jury to determine whether Brutus died as the result of homicide. The trial court ruled that the testimony could be properly admitted. Binta pled guilty and then appealed this issue to the Kentucky Supreme Court.

The Court affirmed Binta's

conviction. In its opinion, the Court noted that the term "homicide", does not necessarily imply that criminal act occurred. In fact, the term "homicide" is usually defined as the killing of a human being by another. Kentucky law excuses many forms of homicide, such as killings in self-defense, defense of others, or by accident. Thus, simply permitting the medical examiner to characterize Brutus's death as "homicide" did not imply that Binta had committed an offense. In fact, in Kentucky, there is no crime of simple "homicide".

Justice Cooper also noted that nearly every jurisdiction in the United States has upheld convictions predicated upon death by heart attack. In 1986, the Kentucky Supreme Court upheld a murder conviction where the defendant raped and assaulted an eighty-year old woman who died twenty-nine days later from a heart attack. In that case, there was evidence that the victim, aside from her advanced age, had previously suffered a heart attack and suffered from severe coronary disease. Nevertheless, a jury could properly consider whether her death was attributable to the defendant's acts and that the injuries "hastened her death". Other states have upheld convictions where death by heart attack resulted from "emotional stress" rather than physical injuries suffered during a crime.

Reasoning that it would not be apparent to most jurors that a heart attack was the result of

James Milton Reynolds, 69, of Spiro Road, Mt. Vernon, died Wednesday, August 30, 2006 at Rockcastle Hospital.


He was born August 12, 1937 in Pulaski Co., the son of Simon "Sam" and Beulah Anderson Reynolds.

the physical altercation between Binta and Brutus, the Kentucky Court determined that expert medical testimony was necessary. Since manslaughter in the second-degree requires proof that the defendant wantonly disregarded a substantial and unjustifiable risk that the altercation would result in her father’s death, the medical examiner’s opinion was not tantamount to telling the jury that a crime had occurred.

By permitting his testimony, the medical examiner was not being permitted to testify whether Binta was acting wantonly, recklessly or accidentally. That question was only for the jury and the decision would ultimately determine whether Binta had actually committed a crime.

Often times, unintended consequences result from what might only constitute minor criminal activity. When those consequences include death, Kentucky law may require full accountability.

created at that time. But it’s 35 years ago, so it’s a challenge.”

The story caused me to remember the long sequence of events leading up to the NASA walk on the moon. In 1957 the Soviet Union launched Sputnik, the first artificial Earth satellite. At that time, I was a skinny, flat-topped, 13-year-old teenager and was most impressed. Photos of the orbiting sphere were plastered on the local newspapers and on our black and white televisions.

I purchased a model of Sputnik and hung it from my ceiling light in the center of my bedroom. The idea of this man-made hunk of metal traveling around the earth fascinated me. I could not take my eyes off of my model.

As years passed, the space race between Russia and the United States continued. By the time John F. Kennedy became

President, the next goal was so ambitious that it seemed the stuff of science fiction. On May 25, 1961, he announced the goal of landing a man on the moon. “I believe that this nation should commit itself to achieving the goal, before this decade is out, of landing a man on the Moon and returning him safely to the Earth.” I witnessed President Kennedy making this announcement to Congress that evening and thought it the most exciting dream I had ever heard.

By 1962, John Glenn, Jr. had become the first American astronaut to orbit the earth. In 1968, the United States launched Apollo 8 – the first manned space mission to orbit the moon. Finally, on July 20, 1969 Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin, clad in their spacesuits, sitting in the tiny moon module, settled gently onto the dusty lunar surface and Armstrong radioed to a waiting Earth, “Houston, Tranquillity Base here. The Eagle has landed.” The audio of the actual event was very broken and distorted but our hearts raced with excitement.

I was actually attending the Bluegrass Fair in Lexington but had taken note of a sign directing us to a tent where we could watch the moon landing. The event was even more exciting when Armstrong stepped onto the surface and proclaimed the now famous words, “That’s one small step for man... one giant leap for mankind.”

With eyes glued to the screen, I witnessed the first steps ever taken on the moon’s surface. I watched Armstrong plant the American Flag on the lunar soil. I saw him jump and run on a heavenly body with hardly any gravity. My heart raced as history was being made and I was a witness. At 25, I thought nothing could ever top this demonstration of scientific wonder. It was suddenly awesome to be alive and living in the USA!

I was also reminded of Job 38, which asks the question, “Where were you when I laid the foundations of the earth ... and set the stars in their courses?” That night, in July of 1969, it was evident that He had allowed us to be there on the Moon – standing in the actual dust of the lunar surface.

On July 24, Apollo and its crew landed safely on Earth and marked the beginning of a new age of space adventure. Over the next weeks and months photos of the space walk and video of the adventure were broadcast over all television networks. We could not get enough. Teens watched with fascination and wonder as did our parents and families. We celebrated with the astronauts as they were ushered down main streets of America under ticker tape parades. They were our heroes! Children all over the United States began dreaming of becoming astronauts.

Looking back now, it is clear that we were living in the

golden era of space discovery and exploration. NASA, its programs, and its management are now under severe scrutiny from a multitude of angles. I have remained its champion. However, the loss of the moon walk tapes give me pause.

How could one of the most important films in the history of the US be lost? Why wasn’t some NASA employee given the responsibility to preserve and catalog this famous film footage of man’s walk on the moon? The very idea that it is missing is quite unsettling! Does this mean that changes within the NASA organization have diminished the responsibility of preserving history for mankind? Doesn’t NASA realize that there can only be ONE first moon walk?

bernated their motorized gardening implements until all danger of frost is predicted for 2007.

Nothing wrong with that if you choose to surrender to cold weather.

The only way that I have found to grown decent spinach in our climate is to plant it the first week of November and let it “winter over”. Weeds ain’t gonna take it in December, January or February. It’ll grow a little bit every time the ground thaws and the sun comes up. At least it does for me.

Wanna grow garlic? Buy some Kentucky grown bulbs right now and be patient. Long about the first of November, trowel up some garden soil, separate the bulbs into individual cloves and plant them about an inch deep about six inches apart in whatever pattern you choose to bed them. Harvest the fresh blossoms next spring when they burst out for salad or soup seasoning. Pull the new bulbs up in June, wash them off and let them dry. Save a couple or three bulbs for replanting and repeat the cycle.

Onions. I grew big (half pounders) Walla Walla onions this year from seed. Directly seeded in the garden; I forget which company I got them from (Parks, Twilleys?) but a packet of seed cost like a dollar for like a hundred seeds.

I Planted the tiny seed, meticulously, about an inch apart on Thanksgiving

Day last year and every seed as far as I could tell, sprouted. I planted them about an inch apart and by early March they were crowding. Walla Walla are grown in Washington State and they are not good keepers, but they are far sweeter than the Vidalia look-alikes that wind up tasting and burning like sulfuric acid when they are grown in our climate.

In the meantime, the Bodacious Sweet Corn is in . I

only have two short rows--- maybe twelve dozen ears---but enough to serve at a few special celebrations before it’s here again in 2007.

Last week I was at an Amish farm in Lincoln County, actually looking for an overripe German tomato that I could get for seed. He had sweet corn out the kahooty for two bucks a dozen, but he had the Bodacious priced at \$2.75. He was leading his saddled horse about in front of an immaculate barn and two young ladies were tending the vegetable stand.

“So what’s the difference between Bodacious and everything else” I wanted to know?

“It’s better corn but the seed is hard to get and its hard to grow “. He slapped his hat against his leg to kill a fly and shooed them off his horse.

“Some local yokle started growing it fifteen years ago and now everybody wants it..”

“That would be me,” I told him. “I ordered the seed from Twilley’s there in Trevoise, PA and I’m pretty sure I made it popular over the last decade because hardly a year goes by that

I don’t write about it at least once or twice.”

“Good for you,” he said. “Now go over into Casey County and see if you can buy a

seed tomato. I don’t have a single one for sale.”

He climbed on his horse and rode away and the girls just stood there and giggled.





## "What Is Written"

In Rom. 1:14-16 Paul says, "I am debtor both to the Greeks, and to the Barbarians; both to the wise, and to the unwise. So, as much as in me is, I am ready to preach the gospel to you that are at Rome also. For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek." Let's notice these 3 "I am's" that Paul speaks about this passage.

Paul said "I am debtor." Paul felt a debt of obligation to all people. A debt of gratitude no doubt was in his heart. "For the love of Christ constraineth us; because we thus judge, that if one died for all, then were all dead." 2 Cor. 5:14.

Paul said "I am ready." Paul was eager, willing, ready to go to Rome to preach the gospel. He said, "So, as much as in me is," that is, he was ready to give a 100% effort to preach.





**20 Years ago this week 1986**  
While looking for indian arrowheads, two boys found two skeletons of two persons buried in a shallow grave under a cliff overhang in a wooded area at Red Hill. A state pathologist, who was called to the scene along with local coroner Bill Dowell, determined the bones were that of a teenage boy and older woman. However Dr.

David Wolfe said the bones were not that of Indians and he could not determine how long they had been under the cliff. "Maybe 20 years, maybe much longer. This one will be recorded as unsolved deaths," Wolfe told the Signal. No one in the area had been reported missing and the case did go down as an unsolved death case.

The highly disputed ownership of Lake Linville road, (Rose Hill Road/Oak Hill Road) was determined to be owned by the county.

A search of the records at the Rockcastle County courthouse uncovered a deed dated September, 1970 was found, and showed the road being deeded over to the county by the city of Mt. Vernon. The state has since taken over ownership of the controversial road, which neither the city or county wants because of the high cost of maintenance.

At Gauley Branch, J.B. Morris and his family went to Pulaski County for the Somerset Fair and W.H. Ponder and family reported a fine time while at the London Fair.

# Rockets come from behind; down Thoroughbreds 47-25

If Charles Dickens had been the author of Friday night's football game at the ROCK, he may have called it the tale of two halves.

But it was the Rockcastle offensive unit who wrote the tale of two halves and a unit which left the best reading until after intermission, when the ROCK scored six times to defeat visiting Harrison County 47-25.

The Rockets, now 3-0 in the 2006 season, were flat both offensively and defensively in the first half of the first ever UNITE Bowl. The defense allowed a 71

yard run by Harrison County, from scrimmage, for a touchdown, two and half minutes after the Rocket's punt team allowed a 67 yard punt return for a touchdown.

With 9:31 left in the second quarter, the Rockets found themselves behind 19-6.

Offensively, the Rockets had done nothing after scoring on the first drive of the game to take a 6-0 lead.

After only five minutes of play, senior Dusty Miller took the ball in from the two yard line to cap off a 61 yard scoring drive.

The offense, however, would strike one more time before half.

The Rockets got the ball back deep in Harrison County's territory to set up the must score for the Rockets, on a fumble recovery by senior Izak McQueary. The score came on a 17 yard pass from quarterback Izak McQueary to senior receiver Shawn Childress. It would be McQueary's second straight pass completion on the night on his way to nine completions in a roll.

Senior placekicker Brad Durham added the extra point and the Rockets had cut the Harrison County lead to 19-13 at the half.

In the second half, the Rockets first offensive drive ended when the Rockets turned the ball over on downs, but sophomore defensive back Steven Trimble got the Rockets back on a completely level playing field with Harrison County, when he picked off a pass and ran 54 yards for the score to tie the game at 19.

Although the Thoroughbreds would put one more score on the board, they would never lead in the contest again.

After an interception by McQueary on the next Thoroughbred series, Miller again got the call and rambled 30 yards for the score to give the Rockets a 25-19 lead.

The Rockets would score two more times in the third period.

First McQueary hit Childress on a 32 yard touchdown pass and Miller added the two extra points for a 33-19 lead.

Harrison County would score with 40 seconds left in the third quarter to pull within eight, but that would be as close as they would get.

With 9:49 left in the fourth quarter, McQueary found Childress again, this time for 26 yards and the Rockets were up by two touchdowns again.

With 3:31 left in the game McQueary would take the ball in from the one for another touchdown.

On the extra point attempt the Rockets faked a kick and McQueary, the holder on extra points, found Childress all alone in the end zone.

The Rockets racked up 427

yards of total offense on the night and held Harrison County to 230 yards.

Offensively, McQueary was nine for eleven for 116 yards and he rushed ten times for 51 yards. He threw three touchdown passes, an two-point extra point throw and he rushed for one touchdown.

Senior tailback Dusty Miller had his best game of the young season with 206 yards rushing on 27 carries and he caught two passes for 17 yards. He scored two rushing touchdowns and one two-point conversion.

Senior fullback Adam Hensley had 33 yards on eight carries and sophomore Cody Mize had 27 yards on six carries.

Childress caught four passes for a total of 77 yards, but all four catches counted. Childress had three touchdowns and one two point conversion catch.

Sophomore Tanner Perkins had three catches for 22 yards and Durham was one for four in extra point kick attempts.

Defensively, the Rockets were led by Defensive Player of the Game Donovan Pigg, who had five tackles and assists and two sacks.

McQueary had four tackles and assists, picked off a pass and recovered a fumble.

Miller had almost as good a game on the defensive side of the ball as he did on the offensive side, with six solo tackles.

Sophomore Casey Hayes wasn't too far behind Miller with five tackles and assists and Perkins had three tackles and he intercepted one pass.

Other Rockets with tackles and assists on Friday night were: Durham, two; Josh Garrison, one; Scott Daughtery, one; Hensley one; Childress, one; Willie Martin, one and Trimble, two and an interception for a touchdown.

"I was certainly proud of the way our team fought back on Friday night and if we are able to win on the road this week, we will have to give our best effort," head coach Tom Larkey said.

The Rockets will take their perfect 3-0 record on the road to Lincoln County to take on the Patriots.

After the Lincoln County game the Rockets have a week off before heading into district play against Letcher County Central. The September 22nd contest will also be homecoming at the ROCK.





Sophomore Casey Hayes had five tackles and assists in Friday night's win. The Rockets travel to Lincoln County on Friday night to take on the one and one Patriots.





Those are some of my nominees for Great Feelings of Life. What are yours?

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



ronment. Recipients must match the grant with a contribution worth at least 10 percent of the grant amount. “PRIDE Community Grants have been used to clean up over 2,000 illegal dumps,” Thomas said. “It was the first PRIDE grant program, and it has made a tremendous impact on our region’s landscape. Since the region-wide cleanup campaign has progressed so well, PRIDE will begin to shift more resources toward envi-

ronmental education. That’s the key to preventing our past pollution problems from re-occurring.”

Since 1997, PRIDE has invested \$24,937,449 in grants to tackle the region’s solid waste problems. So far, local governments and non-profit organizations have used PRIDE grants to clean up 2,268 illegal dumps across the region.

PRIDE promotes “Personal Responsibility In a Desirable Environment” in 38 counties by encouraging and providing resources for communities to clean waterways, end illegal trash dumps and promote environmental education. PRIDE was founded in 1997 by Congressman Hal Rogers (KY-5) and the late James Bickford, former secretary of the state’s environmental protection agency, and is funded by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

The final day to register to vote in the General Election is October 10th in Houk’s office. Voters can also change precincts if they have moved, addresses if they have moved into the county and party affiliations until October 10th. The voter registration books close on the 10th of October and will re-open November 13th.

Approximately 11,200 Rockcastle Countians are registered to vote.

## MRSA education and awareness

The local hospitals and health departments remind citizens that this time of the year, especially among sports teams, a nasty but common bacteria rears its ugly head. Community-associated MRSA, Methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus Aureus, is a type of infection caused by Staph bacteria that is resistant to some common antibiotics, such as penicillin. The infected area usually starts out as a small bump resembling a pimple or a boil, which becomes red and often develops pus drainage. Many people go to their doctor's office with what they think is a spider bite and then a lab culture reveals that it is MRSA.

Staph bacteria are commonly carried on the skin or in the nose of healthy individuals. Staph and MRSA are spread by close contact either through direct physical contact with an infected individual or by touching objects contaminated with the bacteria. In most cases, MRSA infections are mild and can be treated successfully with proper hygiene and the appropriate antibiotics. If left untreated, MRSA can progress and become more difficult to treat.

Here are a few guidelines to help prevent and control the spread of MRSA in the locker room and community:

- Wash hands frequently with soap and water.
- Avoid sharing personal items such as towels, washcloths, razors, clothing, or uniforms.
- Report any suspicious skin sore or boil to your healthcare provider or school nurse.
- If you participate in sports involving close personal contact, shower with soap and water immediately after each practice, game or match.
- Non-washable gear should be wiped down with alcohol before and after each use.
- Athletic equipment such as wrestling or gymnastics mats should be wiped down regularly with an antibacterial solution.
- Athletes should receive a body check prior to a game or match.
- If you are not able to keep your wound covered with a clean, dry bandage at all times, do not participate in activities where you have skin-to-skin contact with

other persons (such as athletic activities) until your wound is healed.

•Any cut or break in the skin should be washed with soap and water and a clean dressing applied on a daily basis.

## Court wrestles with road closing request

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court met in regular session Tuesday and the main item discussed was a request by a landowner on East Fork Road, off Chestnut Ridge Road, that 528 feet of the road be closed to county maintenance.

Wayne Corona told the court that the 528 feet went only to his home and he needed the road closed to county maintenance in order to protect his property and for privacy.

The request had been made at the August regular meeting by Denny Smith, co-owner of the property with Corona, and, at that time, the court declined to

take any action, saying it was a matter to be decided in the court, failing a resolution between parties.

At that meeting, another landowner in the area, Louise Spall, told the court that closing the 528 feet would interfere with ingress and egress by her to the back side of her property and would affect access to a cemetery in the area.

Corona told the court that he had told other landowners in the area that, if the county quit maintenance of the 528 feet and he put a gate across it near Chestnut Ridge Road, he would provide them with a key to the

gate so they might have access to the property. Corona also said that, it was his understanding, that the Spalls wanted to log the area in question and bring the logs out over his private property to the 528 ft. county road.

Corona also told the court that, while remodeling the house on the property, a central air unit and new water heater had been stolen. "If the road stays the ways it is, people have

## Bishop, Polly plead guilty to sex crimes

Two local men pled guilty to sex crimes and another to burglary in Rockcastle Circuit Court on Friday.

Another man pled guilty to a drug charge and another local man had his probation revoked.

According to a news release from Commonwealth Attorney Eddy Montgomery's office, those pleading guilty were Richard Bishop, 37, of Mt. Vernon, Matthew Polly, 43, of Hummel on sex charges and Mark Bradley, 21, of Brodhead on burglary charges.

Bishop pled guilty to two counts of second degree rape and three counts of second degree sodomy.

Assistant Commonwealth Attorney Jeremy Bartley, recommended a total sentence of ten years in the state penitentiary.

Bishop was indicted in November of last year on two counts of first degree rape and three counts of first degree sodomy, involving two females under the age of 12.

Bartley said that when Bishop is released after his sentence, he will be required to register as a sex offender for life. Bartley says Bishop faces a period of monitored conditional discharge.

Polly pled guilty to one count of sodomy, second degree, three counts of sodomy, third degree and two counts of

unlawful transaction with a minor.

Bartley recommended a total of six years in prison and Polly too will have to register as a sex offender and his probation will also be monitored.

Polly was indicted in September of last year on fourteen counts involving sex acts with three juveniles. Tamara Estes, 27, was indicted for complicity in the sex crimes and pled guilty in January to three counts of unlawful transaction with a minor and received a probated sentence of 12 months in jail.

Bartley commended Rockcastle Sheriff's Department Detective Matt Bryant for his work on both the Bishop and Polly cases.

Circuit Judge Jeffery T. Burdette ordered that both Bishop and Polly complete a sex offender evaluation prior to final sentencing on October 13th.

Mark Bradley pled guilty to seven counts of burglary, third degree, two counts of theft by unlawful taking and two counts of criminal mischief, third degree.

Bartley has recommended a sentence of eight years imprisonment for the string of break-ins in the Brodhead area earlier this year. He was indicted on May 12th.

I always tell everybody the same thing. "First come, first served."

## VIEW FROM THE BENCH

### Touching Our Hearts

I was recently fortunate enough to be invited to a flag retirement hosted by the Girl Scouts. Coming as it did immediately before our nation's remembrance ceremony for victims of 9/11, the timing could not have been better.

For those who have never attended, a flag retirement is the formal disposal and destruction of an un-serviceable flag of the United States, usually by fire as required by the U.S. Flag Code. The service may involve a single flag, or as in the Girl Scouts' ceremony, multiple flags. Custom dictates that when any flag is retired, it must

be replaced by a serviceable flag.

The first Flag Act in 1777 provided for the establishment of an official flag for the new nation. Congress resolved that the flag consist of the now world recognized alternating red and white stripes with a blue field containing one star for each state, for a total of thirteen. Stars have been added on each July 4th following the addition of a new state to the Union.

Few ceremonies are as moving as a well executed flag retirement. Participants dedicate a flag, or a portion thereof to service members, past and present, and then the flag is reverently committed to the flames of a small fire built and used only for the retirement ceremony. Conducted at dusk, the solemn consecration of the U.S. Flag by fire represents the reverence for those men and women who have served and died in our service and speaks to the collective responsibility of American citizens to ensure the future of our country and the well being of mankind.

The U.S. Supreme Court has consistently decriminalized attempts to punish flag burning when completed as part of political protest. The rationale has always been the same, that "freedom to be intellectually and spiritually diverse or even contrary" will not disintegrate American society. Justice Harlan, in 1969, wrote that "[f]reedom to differ is not limited to things that do not matter

### What's Your Medical Family Tree?

Presented by Karen Saylor, M.D.

Just as you may have inherited blue eyes, brown hair and "your father's nose," you may have inherited traits for certain illnesses. During a routine exam, your doctor is likely to ask about illnesses your parents and grandparents had or died from, how old they were, and if other relatives suffered from familial illnesses.

These traits are inherited in different ways. Dominant traits require only one gene from either parent to get the illness. If a parent had it you have a 50% chance of having it. Recessive traits need genes from both parents, making them much less common. Other illnesses, such as diabetes, hypertension, and certain cancers depend on a number of interacting genes. A couple of genes involved in breast cancer have now been identified.

One of the most important times to review genetic illnesses is during pregnancy. Your doctor will ask if any relatives had miscarriages or children with birth defects, or if relatives suffered from illnesses during pregnancy, such as toxemia, diabetes, or other medical problems that may relate to childbirth.

Since your family history can be very important, it is wise to take a few minutes before your appointment to write down the illnesses your relatives have had and their ages when the illnesses occurred. It is much more significant if a parent had heart disease at age 40 than at age 80. This record should be given to your doctor to review and keep in your chart.

Knowing your family's medical history can help find and treat illnesses at the earlier stage. Equally important can be finding out that you do not have an illness that runs in the family, lifting a burden of worry from your mind.

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



### Support needed for DSL service...

To residents of Scaffold Cane Road area:

I contacted Windstream phone company (formerly Alltel) last week to request

Broadband/DSL service with them. They stated they would have to run a test on my phone line to see if my line would support Broadband and they would contact me within 48 hrs. to let me know.

Today, I was told I live 4,600 feet too far to receive DSL. I just live four miles out Scaffold Cane Road towards Scaffold Cane Baptist Church.

I am writing to appeal to all residents living on, or directly off Scaffold Cane Road in Rockcastle County, that would like to have Broadband/DSL service available in their home. Please contact Windstream at 800-347-1991 or online at www.windstream.com and let Windstream know that you like Broadband/DSL service offered in our area.

If you are like me and pay approximately \$45 per month for your home phone and approximately \$10 per month for dial up Internet service that is extremely slow, Windstream offers a phone and Broadband/DSL package for approximately \$59 per month.

I was told by Lynn at Windstream that Windstream would react faster in updating equipment, and phone lines to support this service, if a large number of people in my area would contact Windstream to inquire about DSL.

She also stated it would be beneficial to get my neighbors to sign a petition requesting DSL service be offered in the Scaffold Cane area. I plan to come around asking for signatures. The petition does not in any way commit you to getting DSL -- it just lets Windstream know you would be interested in having Broadband/DSL service available in our area.

much. That would be a mere shadow of freedom. The test of its substance is the right to differ as to things that touch the heart of the existing order."

While great disagreement continues over the wisdom of the U.S. Supreme Court's stance, Justice Harlan was absolutely correct in one aspect: few things touch our hearts as the reverence most feel for our flag. Standing in the twilight, listening to a young girl honor her grandfather, watching as she conveys a tattered red ribbon to awaiting flames, and the resulting column of black smoke ascending to the heavens is powerful stuff.

I don't know if the country will ever amend the Constitution to prohibit desecration of the flag or not. But after last week, my own faith in the sense of our youth was renewed. I trust that those who participated in this ceremony will never forget that liberty and all else represented by a sometimes old and worn flag transcends even the purging flames. Good job, girls.

I promise you that you'll get a laugh and that Loretta will tell us we ought to be ashamed of ourselves after she gets over the giggles.

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



## The Family Room

By: Dr. Roy Don Whitehead

"What should I do?" she asked her friend. "If you were in my shoes, what would you do?" he asked the counselor. "I can't decide, so tell me what I should do," she begged.

Do people ask you for advice? They do me. As a counselor for the past 18 years, I have had many people ask me what they should do. The situations have included affairs, divorces, child custody, job changes, retirement, problems with children and many more.

Earlier in my career I gave some advice. It was hard to resist the plaintive plea of a fellow human being in distress. When they asked what I would do if I were in their shoes, I sometimes told them. When they asked what they should do, I sometimes told them. What happened next will not come as a surprise to many of you: they ignored my advice and did what they wanted. That is correct: they did not take my advice even though they asked for it.

This was my first clue that giving advice was not necessarily the best way to approach a counseling situation. While people may be desperately seeking a solution to their woes, this does not mean that they will act on advice from others.

These experiences led me to formulate Whitehead's Rules of Advice Giving. I share them with you for what they are worth.

1. They will not do what you say. They will do what they want. Even if they ask you for

advice that does not mean they will act on it, especially if the advice involves sacrifice or pain. We human beings do not like to hurt and will do all we can to avoid it.

2. Give advice only when asked. If they do not ask, then you do not tell. If it is their problem, do not make it yours and try to solve it for them. Most of us have plenty of problems of our own. We need to spend our time solving those rather than trying to solve someone else's difficulties.

3. Give advice only sparingly. Advice is cheap. Anyone can offer his or her two cents worth on any subject. Do not add your two cents worth. Wait until you are certain that your advice is worth at least a nickel before you offer it.

4. Do not say, "If I were you I would..." You do not know what you would do if you were in his shoes. If you have not been in a similar situation, you have no clue what you would do. Even if you have been in a similar situation, you are a different person and would react in your own way.

5. Never say "never." "I would never put up with that," she said. "If my husband did that he would be out on his ear." Two years later when her husband did the same thing, she stayed with him.

6. Do not judge the one who asks for advice. Instead, be understanding.

7. Do not make "should" or "ought" statements. "You shouldn't have done that" is not a helpful thing to say. No one can go back and undo what he has already done. Look to the future without judging the past.

8. Ask questions to help the advice seeker decide what he should do. The best advice is no advice. The best advice is "let me help you figure out your next move." People are more likely to act on conclusions that they draw themselves. If she decides to change her life, she is more likely to do that than if you tell her to change.

Advice is cheap. Ask questions instead.



the right to come straight into my property, day or night,” Corona told the magistrates.

County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis made a strong recommendation to the court that the 528 feet be closed to county maintenance. Carloftis pointed out that there were several “county roads” in the county which were designated county roads before he took office. “The time has come for us to clean up this mess,” Carloftis added.

However, Magistrate William Denny said he was not comfortable with closing the road, saying he felt the matter should be decided in the courts rather than by the fiscal court.

Magistrate Billy McKinney also expressed concern about “landlocking” other landowners by closing the road.

Carloftis pointed out that the 528 ft. does not penetrate into any property except that of Corona/Smith and that the court closing it to county maintenance would not put them into the position of “taking sides in the issue.”

Early in the discussion, Carloftis made a motion for the county to being the process of closing the 528 feet of road to county maintenance, however it died for lack of a second.

Carloftis went on to point out that several roads off Chestnut Ridge Road were little more than private driveways and do not meet the state criteria for a county road. “If we want to start shutting down private driveways that are designated as county roads, this is as good a place to start as any.”

He went on to tell the magistrates that he did not feel that maintaining private driveways was a proper administration of taxpayers money or the county’s time and resources. He also said that he received calls all the time from the people these driveways served demanding “blacktop and more blacktop.”

However McKinney’s feeling that “today is not a good day to close that road,” seemed to be the general consensus of the rest of the magistrates and the matter was tabled with Carloftis telling Mr. Corona that the Magistrates wanted to look over the situation more and talk with County Attorney Billy Reynolds to see if there would be any repercussion for the county in taking the action to close the 528 feet.

Denver O’Neal of the Clay Lick Branch Road (Oscar Isaacs Road) was also before the court again to reiterate a request made at the August meeting that something be done about a landslide on the road caused, according to O’Neal, by removal of trees when the road was widened.

O’Neal presented the court with a proposal compiled by Randall Templeman with the Department of Agriculture, to remedy the situation, along with photos of the slide, and the court took it under advisement for later action.

The court also heard a proposal by Ken Leathers, a state electrical inspector, asking them to make Rockcastle a “closed” rather than “open” county for electrical inspectors.

Leathers said the action would give the county “more control over what is going on in the county, require more accountability by electrical inspectors and protect consumers from what he called “circuit riding electrical inspectors,” presumably those who go from county to county certifying electrical installations without really inspecting the work.

Leathers told the court that the county presently has five or six inspectors and if the county became closed, inspectors would have to be on the county’s approved list of inspectors before they could operate in the county. And, he pointed out, the court would have control over rates charged by the inspectors, thereby providing consistency for consumers. He said there are presently half of the state’s 120 counties

listed as “closed.”

Leathers provided each magistrate with an information packet listed the advantages of being a “closed” county and the court tabled the matter until a later date.

At a called meeting of the court last Thursday, the court approved a Resolution for the County Road Aid Discretionary Bond Funding which amounts to \$250,000 this year.

The process on spending this money, according to Carloftis, is that the magistrates come up with road projects they need in their district. These lists are then turned in to the state Transportation Cabinet who then approve the projects. The county then gets costs estimates from a contractor prequalified by the state and these figures determine how much road work each magistrate can do in their district. The work must be completed and paid for before the state will reimburse the county from the funds, Carloftis added.

The court also approved a resolution to be submitted for funding from coal severance monies for the Lovell Lane Sidewalk Project and for partial funding of restrooms at the City Park in Mt. Vernon. The city council will pick up the approximate \$15,000 difference.

Also, at the called meeting, the court approved the sheriff department’s tax settlement for 2005. This is the item which actually necessitated the meeting since this action had to be taken before the county can send out its 2006 property tax bills.

counts involving illegal drugs.

In the indictment, Anna Mae Morris is accused of committing the offense of trafficking in a controlled substance by selling Hydrocodone to a confidential informant on March 30th of this year.

Her husband, Jerry is accused of complicity to trafficking in Hydrocodone by counseling, promoting, planning and aiding his wife in the sale. Bond for the Morris was set at \$15,000 cash. The case is being investigated by Rockcastle Sheriff’s Det. Matt Bryant.

James Cody Spoonamore, 19, of Castle Village Drive, Brodhead was indicted for trafficking in Hydrocodone, first offense. He, too, is accused of selling to a confidential informant, on April 12th of this year. His bond was set at \$10,000 cash or property. Bryant is the officer in the case.

Donald L. Jones, 30, of Hwy. 3425, Brodhead was indicted on a charge of selling Methamphetamine to a confidential informant also on April 12th of this year. However, his bond was set at \$50,000 cash or property, by Circuit Judge Jeffery T. Burdette, who set bonds for all the defendants who were indicted on Friday. Bryant is also the officer in the Jones’ case.

Brian Heath Yauger, 22, of Brodhead was indicted on two counts of possession of illegal drugs.

According to the indictment, Mt. Vernon police officer Jeff Harness discovered Oxycodone and Hydrocodone in Yauger’s possession on May 24th of this year. His bond was set at \$10,000 cash or property.

Jerri Lynn Reynolds, 21, of Carter Drive Apartments, Mt. Vernon was indicted on three illegal drug charges.

According to the indictment, Reynolds committed the offense of trafficking in controlled substances, first degree and second degree by knowingly and unlawfully possessing Oxycodone and Hydrocodone with the intent to transfer or distribute on May 24th of this year. Bond for Reynolds was set at \$50,000 cash or property. The investigating officer is also Harness.

Brad Wesley, 21, of Rt. 3 Brodhead was indicted on a charge of cultivating marijuana over five plants on April 27th. His bond was set at \$5,000 cash or property. His case is being investigated by Kentucky State Trooper Thomas Atkins.

Dallas Clifford, 33, of Mt. Vernon, was indicted on four counts involving an ongoing criminal case.

According to the four count indictment issued on Friday, Clifford is accused of intimidating a participant in the legal process by using or threatening the use of physical harm or force

upon Josh Sowder on August 20th. According to the indictment Clifford believes Sowder to be a witness against him in a legal process.

In count two of the indictment, Clifford is accused of fleeing of evading police after committing an act of wanton endangerment which created a substantial danger of death or serious physical injury.

Clifford was also indicted on two counts of being a persistent felony offender second degree.

Burdette continued Clifford’s \$50,000 cash from district court.

Clifford is being held in the Rockcastle Detention Center. Kentucky State Police Detective Gary Lane is the investigating officer.

Lane is also the lead investigator in a case that resulted in four indictments on Friday.

Doug Vanwinkle, 35, of Flat Gap Road, Mitchell D. Dooley, 22, of Gregory Street, Berea, Joyce Hoover, 24, of Snowflake Lane, Mt. Vernon and Tearl Durham, no age listed, Berea, were all indicted.

Police say the four have been involved in at least six burglaries in Rockcastle, Madison and Garrard Counties in the past several weeks.

According to the indictment, Vanwinkle and Dooley committed the offense of burglary in the third degree by unlawfully entering or remaining unlawfully in a building belong to Anthony Anglin with the intent to commit a crime on August 15th of this year. The two were also indicted for theft by unlawful taking over \$300.

Hoover and Durham are charged with complicity to burglary and unlawful taking in the robbery at Anglin’s residence by counseling, promoting, planning or aiding Vanwinkle and Dooley in the crimes.

Lane said over \$2,000 in stolen property has been recovered in the case.

Bonds for Vanwinkle and Dooley were set at \$50,000 cash or property and Hoover and Durham’s bond was set at \$25,000 cash or property.

Five people, three men and two women, were indicted for flagrant non-payment of child support.

Indicted on Friday were: Christopher M. Legg, 33, of Tipton, IN. He is accused of not paying \$5,171.

Nannie M. Prickett, 28, of Danville, was indicted for \$9,772 in arrears. Tim Profit, 38, of Nicholasville, is charged with failing to pay \$22,400 in child support. Kimberly A. Hansel, 37, of Dunnville is accused of failing to pay \$3,002 in child support and Thomas B. Dooley, 35, of Brodhead was indicted on two counts of failing to pay child support in the amount of \$14,255.

Judge Burdette set all five of the bonds in the child support cases in the amount owed by the defendants as cash bonds, which would be forfeited by the defendants to pay the back child support.

Sheriff-Elect Mike Peters investigated the case and presented the evidence to the grand jury.

Bartley noted the fine work of Peters in “identifying and bringing the man responsible for damaging several local businesses to justice.” Bradley too will be sentenced on October 13th.

Newton Steve Clinton, 41, of Mt. Vernon pled guilty to possession of methamphetamine precursors at his first court appearance on Friday. Clinton is currently serving a ten year sentence in Whitley County. Bartley recommended that the sentence be imposed to run concurrent with the ten year sen-

tence in Whitley County.

Timmy Denny, 42, of Mt. Vernon had his probation revoked on Friday and his original sentence was imposed. Denny had pled guilty to trafficking in a controlled substance and was given a five year suspended sentence, but he broke probation and was remanded to the Department of Corrections by Judge Burdette.

Montgomery said he was pleased with the outcomes attained by his assistant, Bartley.

Referring to the Bishop and Polly cases, Montgomery said,

“It is important that these men receive lengthy sentences and my office makes it a priority to assure that offenders such as Bishop and Polly are labeled and placed on the sex offenders registry for the rest of their lives.

Under Kentucky law, sex offenders are prohibited from living near schools, playgrounds or day care centers. “If sex offenders try to break the law by moving into these areas we will charge them accordingly,” Montgomery said.

# Rockets fall behind again and lose 21-18

The Rockcastle County Rockets football team dug themselves another hole on Friday night, but this time it was just too deep for them.

The Rockets basically dug their own grave in Death Valley in the first half when, with still over eight minutes left in the second quarter, the Rockets found themselves behind the host Patriots, 21-0.

Lincoln County had scored on runs of 72 yards in

the first quarter and, also in the first quarter, completed a 46 yard touchdown pass. In the second quarter they found the end zone again on 21 yard run.

And on all three scores, the Patriots made good on their extra point attempts, which would prove to be the difference in the game.

The Rockets fought back in the second period, scoring twice, to go into the dressing room down only 21-12. In the fourth period, the Rockets scored again with 5:25 left in the contest to pull within three points, but that it is as close as they would get. On all three touchdowns, the Rockets failed to convert the extra point, whether by kick for one or on two two point extra point tries, one on the ground and one through the air, for the final score 21-18. Senior placekicker Brad Durham has converted only one of his last five extra point attempts.

"We must find a way to start the game with more intensity," said head coach Tom Larkey. "It was the same last week against Harrison County, we got behind early and fought back and won, but that was not the case at Lincoln County," the coach said Monday.

"We simply have to find a way to play four good quarters," the coach said.

After falling behind, the Rocket defense toughened, allowing Lincoln County only one first down in the second half and no pass completions. "We actually beat them in every statistical category except the score and that is obviously what counts," Larkey continued.

"Our offense looked really good at times, but we are still getting hung up in the red zone," he said. "We must do a better job punching the ball into the end zone after we get

inside the 20 yard line," he coach said.

The Rocket offense rolled up 274 yards of total offense behind senior Dusty Miller's 180 yards on 25 carries.

Quarterback Izak McQueary was six for 13 passing for 39 yards and one touchdown. He also threw one interception.

Senior fullback Adam Hensley carried the ball ten times for 34 yards and scored all three Rocket touchdowns.

Sophomore Cody Mize had eight yards on three carries and junior Brian Mize had one catch for five yards.

Senior Shawn Childress had six catches for 78 yards and caught McQueary's touchdown pass on a five yard completion. One of Childress's catches was good for 44 yards and was from sophomore Tanner Perkins who took a handoff in the backfield, on a fake reverse, before throwing the completion.

But Perkins would be injured later and have to leave the game in the second half when he took the ball again on a reverse running play.

Perkins received separated ribs on the play but will probably be able to see action next week against Letcher County Central, according to the coaches.

Defensively, the Rockets held the Patriots to a total of 161 yards. Lincoln had 101 yards on the ground and 60 through the air, all in the first half of play.

Sophomore Casey Hayes played an outstanding defensive game with nine tackles and assists from all over the field. "He is listed as a middle linebacker, but we play him and about three others all over the field," said Rocket head assistant coach Tony Saylor.





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## Quail Community Park to receive \$50,000 in funds

## Blood Drive set for 21st

To qualify as a blood donor, you must be at least 17 years old, weigh 110 pounds or more and be in general good health. A picture ID is required of all donors. From start to finish, it takes less than an hour to donate blood, and you can do it every 56 days.

Many CKBC mobile drives offer automated blood collection, which allows donors to give twice the amount of red blood cells, the most transfused product at Kentucky hospitals. And, think about bringing a family member or friend with you when you donate to increase the power of your donation. Naturally, first-time donors are always welcome.

gifted and talented students in the school system, the number of students involved in the program and the activities which are offered through the program.

Bustle is a full-time teacher in charge of the elementary school program which serves 104 students in the elementary schools or eight percent of the 1321 who are enrolled.

Bullock is the full-time teacher at the middle school, which serves 276 students, or 40 percent of the 690 students at the school.

Norton is the coordinator at RCHS which has 242 students

involved with the gifted and talented program, or 27 percent of the 899 students.

The budget for the gifted and talented program is approximately \$150,000. Some of the money comes from the state through grants and some supplies for the program are bought through funds from the school's site based allocations.

Rockcastle School Superintendent Larry Hammond also told owners of Lisa's Little People, George and Lisa Evans that he could not recommend serving the day care center with transportation because it simply would not be feasible and that if the board agreed to haul students, who were with-in two blocks of the school, they would have to honor all requests.

"We would simply be opening up a flood gate," he said.

The Evans operate a day care center on Crawford Lane in Mt. Vernon with over 20 children ages four to ten.

## Garden/park at lake is labor of love for the Hamptons

Folks driving around Lake Linville in Mt. Vernon these days can't help but notice a beautiful flower garden growing in a park-like setting across from the home of Cecil and Ann Hampton.

Cecil and Ann, Rockcastle County natives, married at the tender age of 16 and moved to Ohio. They have three children and seven grandchildren.

In Ohio, Cecil worked in a paper mill for 37 years and the couple owned and managed several pieces of rental property. Ann also worked as a real estate agent for several years.

During his seventeen-year tenure as a City Councilman in Lockland, Ohio, Cecil served as Chairman of the Parks and Recreation Committee. Fourteen years ago, he and Ann bought a second home on Lake Linville and established a beautifully landscaped yard. After his retirement, Cecil set his sights on the field across the road.

"Two years ago, it was a weed field and I would put a fifty-foot rope on my horse, Shane, and let him graze there," Hampton says. "From my home, I saw mothers and grandmothers bringing their children and sitting on the ground. I thought, 'This is America! They should have a nice park for their children.'"

So Cecil began a labor of love, digging in the dirt with a mattock, a little at a time. He started the flower garden with one large bed. Ann, a certified Master Gardener, helped him plan and transfer plants from their own yard. "It just kept looking better and better so I just kept going," Cecil says.

Establishing the garden spot was only the first step because Cecil works continually to maintain the bright red "Knock-

Out" roses, lush ornamental grasses and multi-colored perennials and mow the grass.

"It was a community project," Cecil says, refusing to accept any credit. Rockcastle Kiwanis Club lent support to the project by purchasing shrubs, rose bushes and bulbs; Modern Woodmen of America (Teresa Webb and Jan Gill) bought two park benches and Jackson Energy recently purchased a flag pole and picnic table. Roy Beasley also donated flowers and neighbors, Larry and Norma Denham, and others have helped with the garden. "I could not have done this without the help of Mayor Clarice Kirby," Hampton says. City workers have helped with the mowing and weed-eating several times this summer.

Today, in an English garden setting beside the lake, children, parents and grandparents can fish and feed the ducks and families often bring a picnic to enjoy in this peaceful place. Recently, the garden was even a romantic scene for a wedding. Cecil joined in the happy occasion by taking photographs of the couple during the ceremony.


"But the work has only begun," Cecil explains with a gleam in his eye. After taking six weeks off for open-heart surgery recently, he went back to the garden to plant more shrubs and to add cross-ties for a parking area. He has also had cross-ties set in an adjacent area where he plans to expand the garden.

"We just wanted to do something for the people," he says. "Every week, I talk with people and I get such a blessing just watching the people enjoy it."



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

A wide range of groups throughout Kentucky now participate, including homemaker clubs, Boy Scout and Girl Scout troops, high school organizations, Rotary clubs, veterans, college fraternities and sororities, sports teams and Kiwanis clubs. (Sorry, those entities established for the sole purpose of pursuing legislative or regulatory changes are not eligible.)

Two-mile sections of highway are adopted for a period of two years. Groups sign a contract with the Transportation Cabinet, which recognizes the need and desirability of a clean environment and permits the group to contribute toward that effort. Volunteer groups may renew the contract at the end of the two years.

Adopt-A-Highway Coordinators can explain the fundamentals of the program to your group, work with group members in locating an available highway, and notify you of news and upcoming events.

Litter pickups are held at least four times per year or as many times as necessary to keep the area reasonably litter free. The Cabinet coordinates three annual clean-up efforts throughout the year.

#### How do I join?

Groups interested in becoming members of the Adopt-A-Highway Program can find specific details and District Coordinator information at <http://adopt-a-highway.ky.gov/>. Safety guidelines are provided to volunteers and should be reviewed prior to each cleanup.

Your Adopt-A-Highway coordinator will help you get in touch with your county's Maintenance Crew Superintendent to arrange

warning sign placement on the date of your pickup. Trash bags and safety vests can be obtained at each State Maintenance Facility, and litter removal is provided by the state highway crews.

# Fiscal Court to discuss paying Sheriff's salaries

A special meeting of the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court has been called for 9 a.m. Thursday (today) at the request of Rockcastle County Sheriff Darrell Doan.

According to Rockcastle County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis, he was contacted Tuesday, following another special called meeting of the court, by members of the sheriff's department and was told that the department would be unable to meet the payroll scheduled for Friday for the Sheriff and deputies and will not have payroll funds until county tax money begins coming in October.

Carloftis said the called meeting was necessary because he had to have the approval of the magistrates to grant the request and had to get the approval in a legally called meeting.

After contacting four of the five magistrates, David Gibbs is on vacation, Carloftis said two of the magistrates were "basically non-committal" but Magistrate Billy McKinney said he had "no problem" with the request as long as the Sheriff's department would sign legally-binding agreements that: (1) the

sheriff's department would reimburse the county for vehicles purchased by the county for the department when Doan came into office, from forfeiture funds the sheriff has and which was the original agreement, and (2) that the sheriff's department reimburse the county for all general fund monies expended for all salaries through November when, hopefully, the sheriff can begin using his fees from property tax collections for that purpose.

## Phase I water project complete at Mt. Vernon

# City can now pump four million gallons

At Monday night's regular meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council, city engineer Luther Galloway told the council that Phase I of the water project, which put new intake lines in the lake, was 95% complete. "We have quite a bit of 'little work' left to do but we should have 100% of the operation completed by the council's next meeting date," Galloway said.

Mayor Clarice Kirby and council members applauded Galloway's statement and, on question, Kirby said that "preliminary paper work is being done" on Phase II of the project.

"We hope to get some direct appropriation money and low interest loans to finance Phase II," Kirby said.

Phase I doubled the plants pumping capacity to four million a day. The plant has been able to pump the four million since its renovation several years ago but, until the new intake lines were installed this summer, the plant could only get two million gallons a day from the lake.

"You should be able to tell a difference in the water taste within the next few days," Galloway said.

Galloway also said that with this phase completed, the north

end of town was taken care of and that Phase II would take care of the south end of the town. Phase II, about a \$3 million project, will build one new storage tank along U.S. 25 south, renovate the tanks on Town Hill and put new distribution lines through town.

The court also held the second reading for the motor vehicle tax rate and the real and personal property tax rate.

## In marijuana case Charges dismissed







Only those government agencies involved in adoption proceedings, or can anyone surf the database mining for evidence of confidential trusts? Anyway, Jennifer, Christopher and I drove over to their home on a cold December night just before Christmas and there lay Mama Cat all stretched out on her side in the middle of the living room floor while eight or nine kittens fought to see who got fed next.. marketing ). Several of the kittens were already marked with a felt pen as sold, not that it mattered, because the darkest one with the most pronounced, fawn-colored, tips on his ears, feet and the very end of his tail was still available.

It was love in an instant. Money changed hands and the kitten had an “A” carefully inscribed on the outer fur of his back. We could take him home after the first of the year.

He'd been born on Thanksgiving Day, 1988 and the Poages figured he ought to stay with Mama for at least six weeks.

Christmas came and went as did the New Year Eve celebration. The kids and I, much to Loretta's amusement, had already settled on naming our kitten to be, “Socrates”

We were already calling him “Soc.”

As in, “When can we bring Soc home?”

I called the Poages on New Year Day, 1989 and Nina said he was perfectly house trained and that we could come and fetch him home.

That night we put him in a big card board box with a blanket out in the living room and the kids went upstairs to bed after loving on him. About midnight, Loretta woke me up complaining that she couldn't sleep because the kitten was crying.

I couldn't hear a thing.

“I'm gonna bring his box in here beside the bed and if he cries again, I'll just reach down and pet him but I'm not letting any cat get in bed with me.”

Thirty minutes later Soc was cuddled up on Loretta's chest. He was purring. She was snoring.

At least a hundred variations on that theme occurred over the years. Soc took to sleeping between Loretta and me and he'd get jealous when we got touchy feely. We'd kick him out of bed and he'd go sleep with Chris or Jennifer. Anytime we had house guests, Soc believed it his ultimate duty to make them feel at home by being a bedfellow.

Two or three nights a week, he would move in with Chris and Loretta would mutter that she was thankful that he was visiting upstairs and not pushing her out of bed.

But, as I said, he had been rapidly declining since the first of the year. Last Thursday morning he was so weak he couldn't eat nor drink. He'd gone from 15 pounds to no more than three. He cuddled up in front of his food/water bowls and went to sleep.

only made things worse. I called Stanley at work, and he came home right away. I told him that there's no telling how long the leak had been there without our knowledge of it. 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



Kentucky greetings, Woody readers. Please excuse my singing, but I am PAWSatively excited to be on tour! Mom, Dad, Chloe and I are in the Woody Bus, I mean, Woody Boat, traveling down the river. "Why a boat?" you ask? Remember when Dad told me the Woody Bus wouldn't start? Dad tried everything, but nothing worked. Chloe and I were afraid the tour would be canceled, but Mom reminded us that winners didn't give up. "Woody, how do you think people traveled before cars?" Mom asked. "I thought cars had always been around. I was born in 1999 and they were around then." I said. Chloe giggled and pointed out how granddaddy told us about walking three miles to school every day in rain and snow. Sure, that was fine for granddad. He was in great shape, but I couldn't

walk the Woody Tour. I could run fast when chasing butterflies, could even flex my muscles (sniff, sniff), but long distances were a different story. I was getting worried when Chloe said, "Hey! The Salt River is just down the road! We know plenty of fishermen who could help!" I kissed my sister for saving the day!

Dad unloaded the bus and Mom instructed us to pack the necessities. "Woody, your GameDOG is NOT a necessity!" I obeyed Mom and packed my journal, pencils, Kentucky map and toothbrush.

We hugged our siblings and headed south on Highway 61 to the Salt River. It was two miles from home to the riverbank. While walking, I made a note to myself to start exercising more. Two miles were challenging. The boat was a super idea, but it would be tough to make the entire tour by boat. My thoughts were interrupted when we reached the Salt River and

saw our buddy, Mr. Sullivan, in his flat-bottom fishing boat. We told him about our problem with the bus. He was more than happy to help. "Which way are you going?" Tough question! Dad explained the Salt River was 140 miles long. It began near Danville and ended at the Ohio River near West Point. West it was! We buckled our life jackets and settled in our seats. Mr. Sullivan put the oars in the water and off we went!

Mr. Sullivan was no stranger to the Salt River. His great-granddad journeyed up the river to get to Pitts Point. Once a town in Bullitt County, Pitts Point was used by people to ship salt produced by Bullitt's Lick. It even had a college. 
• All posters must be designed on, or affixed to, .016 ply construction paper, poster board

Winners will be chosen by grade 4, 5, 6, 7, & 8.



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



ing to court records.

Marlow and his son, Charles "Chuck" Marlow, 36, both of Tanglewood Drive just off old Hwy. 461, were arrested on August 29th, by members of the Kentucky State Police Eradication Team.

State troopers, including local troopers Tommy Cromer and Jason McCowan, discovered more than one patch of marijuana growing on the Marlow property, with the help of the eradication team's helicopter.

Police said they also found Marlow Sr. in a patch of 161 marijuana plants.

Marlow senior was charged with cultivating marijuana and Chuck Marlow was charged with possession of marijuana and possession of drug paraphernalia, both misdemeanors.

Chuck Marlow has been scheduled for a pretrial conference on November 13th and remains free on a \$2,500 property bond.

The eradication team also made two other arrests recently. On August 30th, Johnathon Lewis, 21, of Rt. 5 Mt. Vernon was charged with cultivating marijuana under five plants. The same day, Darron Kelly, 41, of McCollum Road was also charged with cultivating marijuana under five plants.

Kelly was arraigned after press time on Wednesday and Lewis will be arraigned next Wednesday.

The charges against Kelly and Lewis are misdemeanors and both men were released on a \$250 cash bond.

During the Labor Day weekend, Trooper Cromer and constables, Roger Pigg and David Mason located a marijuana patch on Sand Hill.

Cromer said the 50 marijuana plants were almost ready for harvest and were being guarded by someone who ran off when police arrived in the area.

The trooper said the "pot" had a street value of \$100,000 because of the size of the plants. Police destroyed the plants and say they have suspects in the case.

system's entire technology system.

Clark's comments came during a thirty minute presentation at the board's regular September monthly meeting.

The board gave approval for the advertisement of bids for the construction of new fiber optic lines, which will carry computer communications from each school in the county to the central office.

The school system will own their own lines and the new fiber optic cable will increase the speed tenfold over current capacity.

"The increased speed of our system will be a great asset, but the instructional value that will come with the upgrade will be immeasurable," Clark said.

Whoever gets the bid for the new lines will build fiber optic lines from each school to the central office where they will join the server farm at the central office.

"Currently each school has two servers of their own but, with the upgrade, only four will be needed and this will also cut down on maintenance of the lines," Clark said. "If any problems occur we will be able to correct most of them right here in the central office," he added.

The technology upgrade for the school system is not going to come cheap. Finance officer Richard Bray and Clark estimated the cost of the project at between \$250,000 and \$300,000. "It is going to cost us about \$15,000 a mile to run the new cable but we will not be paying a lease fee on the lines we now use and we will simply have the best system available on the market," Clark said. The school system will own their own lines.

Clark estimated that it would take 18 to 20 miles of new cable to connect the schools. The new area technology center, which will be built next to the current high school, will also be served by the upgrade, although the upgrade will be finished before the new technology center.

Clark said that once the upgrade is in place, the lines at the central office will be connected to new lines from the Kentucky Department of Education, which are currently being upgraded as well.

"The Department of Education is spending in excess of \$20 million statewide to upgrade the system in Frankfort and we are going to get our work done about the same time, so that both upgrades will coincide," Clark told the board.

Currently the school system has well over 1,000 computers, one for all administrators and teachers and the 3,000 students in the system have a three to one ratio of computers at their disposal.

The local school system matches a grant from the Kentucky Education Technology System each year to help fund their technology and they also provide some local funds to the technology budget.

Bray said the money for the massive upgrade is in the budget. He and Clark said the project should be completed in the summer of 2007, when the switch would be made in order not to disrupt any instructional time.

In other business, the board approved emergency substitute teaching applications for Jessica Cobb, William Blair, Jeremy Rowe, Tanya Hasty and Monica Phillips. The board also approved the creation of two instructional assistant positions at Mt. Vernon Elementary and one at the high school.

Superintendent Hammond also told the board that results from state testing for last school year would be released Thursday (today).

the court voted to "front" salaries in the sheriff's department that are reimbursed, either by the federal government, state government or local school board. Those deputies include court bailiffs, drug enforcement officers and the D.A.R.E. officer for the local schools.

The fiscal court's only statutory obligation is to meet the salary of the sheriff and "this department has been the beneficiary of the largest amount of funds ever given by the county fiscal court to any sheriff's department in this county's entire history," Carloftis said Wednesday.

"Although the magistrates and I have not always agreed with the way the Sheriff's department utilizes its funding, we recognize the fact that the sheriff has sole authority to determine this utilization, I agree with Magistrate McKinney that the fiscal court has an obligation to the citizens of the county to assure that the sheriff's office remains open," Carloftis added.

"I have called a special called meeting for Thursday at 9 a.m. to bring this before the Magistrates. I know, at this point, only how Magistrate Billy McKinney and I feel about the request. I honestly have no idea how the majority of the magistrates will react to this request by the sheriff's department," Carloftis said.

### Tuesday's Called Meeting

At the special meeting called Tuesday, the court approved a ten-year lease of the fairgrounds in Brodhead to the Rockcastle County Fair Board. The lease was necessary so that the board could apply for available grant funds, from the Kentucky Fairgrounds Board.

The state board has grant money available, from \$25,000 to \$100,000, for renovation of fairground facilities throughout the state. The applications for the funds are due October 1st and the local board plans to remove the old wooden bleachers at the fairgrounds and replace them with aluminum bleachers.

In an informal session after the meeting, the magistrates dis-

cussed their problem with the county jail's financial squeeze due, primarily, to state regulations which determine a prisoner's status.

Carloftis said that until a prisoner is actually sentenced for a crime, he is technically a "county prisoner" and the jail doesn't receive anything for housing, feeding and providing medical care from the state. The only thing the jail receives for "county prisoners" is a monthly allotment which is based on a bed count made in 1972 by the state and the county had 12 beds at that time. The jail regularly keeps an average of 40 "county prisoners" for which they are paid by the state by the 12 bed count allotment.

Magistrate Billy McKinney noted that, in one case, the county housed a prisoner for 360 days before he was actually sentenced and, at sentencing, the prisoner was given two months with credit for time served. This means that the jail kept the man for almost a year and was paid nothing for their expenses. "We actually owed the man 10 months of something," McKinney said with tongue-in-cheek.

Carloftis said that at an upcoming annual meeting of the state's County Judge/Executives, the group would be looking into the problem and would again, no doubt, make a request of the state legislature to look into this problem and make changes. However, Carloftis didn't hold out much hope for a ready solution since any changes to the system would cost the state money.

Carloftis also pointed out to the magistrates that Rockcastle was fortunate to not have the problem of some counties who have to put 40% of their general funds into supporting jail operations.

The Rockcastle County Jail gets no direct appropriation from the general fund, even

paying their own share of matching employee's withholdings, including health insurance, and their share of property, liability and workmen's compensation insurance and they meet medical bills for the inmates which amount to several thousand dollars a month. The jail also almost always meets their yearly payment for the renovations of the jail of around \$70,000.

However, Jailer James Miller said recently that the high number of county prisoners, as opposed to state prisoners for which the state pays a daily allowance, the jail has had to hold recently is creating a financial squeeze.

The fiscal court recently began looking into building a new, larger jail in the county in the hopes of increasing revenues.





A combination hunting and fishing license in Kentucky is \$22.50, hunting license are \$15 as are fishing license and deer tags are \$25.

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
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
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## Gear-Up Activities engage students in learning

Once students move beyond elementary school, their options increase for how to get involved in school. Clubs and teams beckon with opportunities for making new friends and new ways learning. Counselors agree that extracurricular activities can contribute to a student's academic success.

"I think that a benefit of participating in extracurricular activities is that it helps to promote a healthy self-esteem and a sense of belonging. A good self-esteem and a sense of belonging are especially vital for student success in middle schools," says Rockcastle County Middle School guidance counselor Leshia Cromer. "They also help to build other skills that assist with student success, such as problem solving and critical thinking skills, and teamwork and other social skills. These skills are not only important for academic success, but also for lifelong success."

Activity involvement typically means being part of a "team" of some sort, whether that team is a group of students working on a service project or exploring their love of music. Teams all

need players with a variety of skills. While working in an after school setting, students have opportunities to learn about their skills by filling different roles. For example, someone who is good with detail might want to be the secretary and take notes at meetings while another member who is good at organizing people might try being a leader in the group.

Students at RCMS can choose from a wide variety of activities. Cromer says many activities do not require the student to be especially athletic or strong academically. For example, there is a Student YMCA which includes nearly 100 students each year. Other opportunities are the RCMS Unite Club, Girls in Science, Fitness Club, Academic Team, Students Learning About Math and Science (SLAM) and FCA. The school also has peer mediators, yearbook staff, band, choir, Holiday Express Art club, student council, leadership team, dance team and a wide variety of sports activities.

"We coincide many of our after-school activities with our Extended School Services program

so that bus transportation can be provided for students who would not otherwise be able to attend," Cromer says.

Parents can play a role in supporting their child's extracurricular efforts in three ways. If students are hesitant to get involved, parents can encourage children to do so. If transportation isn't available, they can arrange for it. Finally, once students begin to participate, Cromer says, "It is important that parents are there to see what their child is doing. They need to attend every special event the club or team has so that the child knows that they are supported."

"I try to do what is best," Vera told me, "but our marriage just keeps getting worse!" (All characters are fictitious.)

"What kind of things do you do to improve your marriage?" I inquired.

"I'm always the first one to say 'I'm sorry,'" she replied. "Momma told me that this is the Christian thing to do, so anytime there is trouble, I apologize first."

"What if it's not your fault?" I asked.

"Well, it usually is," she laughed. "Or at least that's what Norm tells me. Even if it's not my fault, I can't stand for Norm to be mad at me, so I always make up with him."

"Be the first to say you're sorry' has been your motto, hasn't it?" I asked.

"Yes, but I must not be doing it right," she added sadly, "because our marriage is in worse shape than ever."

For many marriages "be the first to say you're sorry" is good advice. Some people are stubborn (we know who we are!) and refuse to give in. We will defend our actions even in the face of overwhelming evidence that we are wrong. We need to learn to say "I'm sorry."

However, Vera's marriage is of a different kind. Vera (and others like her) apologize too quickly! They are the victims of emotional or physical abuse who believe that the abuse is their fault.

Josie did the same thing Vera did: she always apologized after she and her husband had a "fight." (The fight could be more accurately termed "physical abuse.") It happened each time her husband got drunk, which was almost every weekend. "Even when he hits me," Josie said, "I apologize, because I can't stand for him to be mad at me."

"When you apologize, does he stop his abuse?" I asked.

"For awhile," she replied, "but then he starts again the next time he's drunk."

Marcie's story is much the same. Her husband does not drink but is physically abusive to her. "I keep apologizing to him for making him so mad," she said, "but he keeps on shoving me. What am I doing wrong?"

What Marcie is doing wrong is being the first to say she's sorry. This is not what Marcie or Josie or Vera need to do. They need to say "goodbye" as soon as possible before being seriously injured or killed.

Women (and men) who are being abused often apologize even if they have done nothing wrong. For these women (and men) the advice to "be the first to say you're sorry" is not helpful. They already say "I'm sorry" too much! They need to learn to stand up for themselves and get out of a dangerous situation.

Apologizing to an abuser may calm him for a short time, but it is not a long term answer. No matter how much the victim apologizes, the abuser will continue to be angry and abusive.

For those of you who never apologize, try it sometime. It will do wonders for a relationship. For those who are always apologizing, try something else: stop apologizing and go get help!

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## Local test scores are good again

Of the 176 school districts in the state of Kentucky, the Rockcastle School District is ranked 15th, according to test results released last week.

The local system had the eighth best scores among non-independent school in the state for the 2005-2006, after being seventh among county schools and 18th overall a year ago.

Brodhead Elementary again had the best academic index score of the county schools with a score of 112.9. The lowest academic scores were again at RCHS where students scored 78.6, which was a 3.6 point gain from a year ago.

Brodhead students had the fourth best overall scores of the 1,249 schools state-wide.

"As always I am proud of everyone involved in our education process at Brodhead and we will continue to make every effort to provide the best education for our students possible," Principal Caroline Graves said.

In a nutshell, all county schools improved their scores from a year ago and all the county schools met the two year goal set forth by the state. The

## 33 more acres purchased for Industrial Park

The Rockcastle County Industrial Development Authority has added 32.88 acres to their Industrial Park South on old 461.

The addition came from part of the sale of the Grace Bowling property last Saturday. The tract was part of four purchased together at the auction for \$126,000 by Judy and Cecil King, according to Sam Ford, whose company Ford Bros, handled the sale. "This tract (the 32.88 acres) has the best terrain of the four tracts," Ford said Tuesday. Purchase price for the 32.88 acres, according to Corey Craig, chairman of the authority, was \$90,000 who said the seller to the industrial authority would be Doug Brock, a member of the board who bought the tract from the Kings.

Craig said that the addition now makes 82.88 acres avail-

able for development in the park.

At Monday's regular monthly meeting, the development board took up a number of items of business.

One of the most interesting was of the good possibility that a new factory will be locating in Industrial Park #1, between the Hwy. 461 bypass and KY 150.

Lynn Tatum, project coordinator for the board, said that FPL Door Locks and Hardware of Oxnard, CA plan to relocate here by the end of the year in the former tool and die building of Mt. Vernon Plastics, presently owned by Dr. James Chism and his wife. However, Dr. Chism said Tuesday that the transaction was not completed but he hoped it would be "by the

## Doan lays off two deputies

Last week's called meeting for Thursday of the Rockcastle Fiscal Court was cancelled on Wednesday afternoon.

The meeting was called, at the request of sheriff's deputies purportedly at the behest of the sheriff, to get magistrates' approval for the county to front deputies' salaries until the sheriff's office begins receiving their fees for collecting taxes -- about the first of November.

County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis said Thursday that two stipulations, that would have probably been attached to granting the request by the county, evidently caused the meeting to be called off, again by a sheriff's deputy.

Tuesday of this week, Sheriff Doan issued the following statement to the *Signal*.

"This week, effective Monday, I have had to lay off two more of my deputies, Chief Deputy Nathaniel Price and Sergeant Joe Rush. Both of these men are good deputies who have given their all to Rockcastle County.

The reason this has occurred is simple -- there is not enough money left in the fee account to pay these deputies' salaries until we begin receiving our tax commissions around the first of November. Last week's *Signal* reported that the fiscal court was more than willing to assist the sheriff's department in

meeting payrolls provided that we pay back money we owe them for vehicles purchased and that we pay back money for the payrolls covered in October with the November commissions. Although I did not request a meeting with the fiscal court, I am more than ready to agree to both of these conditions -- just show me where to sign.

What the article did not tell you is that I owe the fiscal court \$19,700 for vehicles. Buzz (Carloftis) and Bill McKinney (magistrate) want me to pay the original debt of \$39,700, al-

## Teenager killed in car wreck Saturday

An entire county is mourning the tragic death of a 16-year-old Rockcastle County High School student, who died in a single car accident on the old Brodhead road around noon Saturday.

Carl Lee York, 16, of Brodhead, a junior at the high school, was pronounced dead by Rockcastle County Deputy Coroner Bud Cox, shortly after arriving at the Rockcastle Hospital, from injuries he received in the wreck which occurred on the Old Brodhead-Mt. Vernon road near the intersection with Purr Rigsby Road. Cox said York died of blunt force trauma to the head and chest.

Family members said York lost control of his late model Ford Escort on the rain slick road and struck a Locust tree. York was thrown from the car into a field. TA fence had to be cut in order for ambulance service EMTs to get to York.

The accident occurred less than a mile from York's home, according to Kentucky State Police Trooper Tom Atkin, who is conducting an investigation into the wreck.

Police have not released a

## VIEW FROM THE BENCH

### Discarded Babies, Stolen Babies

Baby Abby is home! All of America tuned into the nightly news earlier this month anxiously awaiting word about the 11 day old child and whether police had determined her whereabouts . . .

Abby's alleged abductor, Shannon Beck, attacked 21 year old Stephanie Ochsenbine with a knife and took the infant to her own residence only a few miles away from the Ochsenbine home. Apparently, Beck had delivered a stillborn fetus the same day. Police were able to locate Baby Abby after Beck's sister-in-law noticed makeup on her forehead. News reports had indicated that Baby Abby had a pronounced birthmark on her forehead. This bizarre incident is only one in an apparent spate of infant abductions perpetrated by women who themselves have lost a child.

On the opposite end of the spectrum, many may recall the horror prompted by sensational allegations of baby abandonment. In one instance, a college honor student delivered her baby in a crowded airport bathroom stall, then leaving her son in the toilet bowl. In a similar 1998 incident, another college student delivered her own baby and then wrapped him in a towel while she attended class. Upon her return, the child was dead and was then disposed of in the trash. Like baby abductions, cases of baby abandonment capture the attention of America, prompting strong feelings of re-

vulsion and outrage.

Despite the perception that these types of incidents are becoming increasingly common, both events are fairly unique. It is perhaps the uncommonness of these horrible stories that engender so much public attention.

According to the U.S. Department of Justice, infant abductions, that is those involving victims less than one year of age, are very rare, only about 200 cases annually. Newborns, those children less than 24 hours old, are abducted in about 11% of all cases, and children between one and six days of age are victimized in only 2.9% of abduction cases. Thus, statistically speaking, mothers may have little to fear regarding the possibility that a child, particularly an infant, will be abducted. The understandable neuroses of parenthood suggest otherwise because the emotional impact of a child abduction are so incredibly devastating.

The frequency of abandoned babies is likewise rare. The most recent figures that I could locate suggest that less than 125 babies annually are abandoned in public places. Almost half of these will be tragically found dead. Far more, perhaps 30,000-40,000 may be abandoned in a hospital setting. At least in the latter circumstances, abandoned babies are left in a safe and nurturing environment.

Kidnaping laws across the nation are uniformly and appropriately harsh including federal statutes directed at abductions for profit and interstate abductions. Many states have also adopted "safe haven" statutes designed to provide parents with



## Marlow case is still open...

Dear Editor,

First of all, I want to thank the citizens of Rockcastle County for the support shown to me during my tenure as County Attorney. As I often say, I want to be a County Attorney the people of Rockcastle County can be proud of, because I am very proud to be a resident of Rockcastle County.

Secondly, I have received numerous inquiries as to why I dismissed the cultivation of marijuana case against Charles Marlow. In response to this, I want the citizens of Rockcastle County to know that the County Attorney prosecutes misdemeanors and only has jurisdiction of felonies until the cases are indicted by the Grand Jury.

In the case at hand, the defendant, Charles Marlow, was released on a \$15,000 property bond the same day he was arrested. The case was arraigned in district court on August 30, 2006 at which time he remained out of jail and a preliminary hearing was set for September 18, 2006.

On September 18, 2006, I subpoenaed Eradication Team Detective T.W. Young to court and, after discussions with him, along with the defendant already being out of jail, I determined that a preliminary hearing would hinder our case, as it is still an open case.

Detective Young also informed me that he would present the case to the Grand Jury on October 13, 2006, which is the next available date to have the defendant indicted.

I requested the case be dismissed from district court and for Detective Young to seek an indictment against Marlow on October 13th. I would not do anything to hinder the prosecution of a felony drug case.

Finally, I have an open door policy and appreciate each citizen of the county. Should you need to call upon me, feel free to come in or make an appoint-

ment. Also know that my staff and I are working tirelessly against the drug problem, in conjunction with local officials, D.E.A. and UNITE, along with our child support recovery obligations, delinquent taxes, our cold check program and representation of the Fiscal Court.



an anonymous means to leave an unwanted child in a safe environment. Kentucky permits parents to place newborns with an emergency service provider, police station, fire department, or hospital without fear of legal reprisal so long as the infant is not a missing, abused or exploited child. By doing so, the parent waives the right to contest the initiation of termination of parental rights proceedings.

The polar extremes of baby abandonment and baby abduction are both frightening to contemplate. Yet with thousands of children awaiting adoption in this country, no justification can exist for either scenario.

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

Some of the activities in which the students participated included:



## Gear Up

# Activities engage students in new ways of learning

Once students move beyond elementary school, their options increase for how to get involved in school. Clubs and teams beckon with opportunities for making new friends and new ways learning. Counselors agree that extracurricular activities can contribute to a student's academic success.

"I think that a benefit of participating in extracurricular activities is that it helps to promote a healthy self-esteem and a sense of belonging. A good self-esteem and a sense of belonging are especially vital for student success in middle schools," says Rockcastle County Middle School guidance counselor Lesha Cromer. "They also help to build other skills that assist with student success, such as problem solving and critical thinking skills, and teamwork and other social skills. These skills are not only important for academic success, but also for lifelong success."

Activity involvement typically means being part of a "team" of some sort, whether that team is a group of students working on a service project or exploring their love of music. Teams all need players with a variety of skills. While working in an after school setting, students have opportunities to learn about their skills by filling different roles. For example, someone who is good with detail might want to be the secretary and take notes at meetings while another member who is

good at organizing people might try being a leader in the group.

Students at RCMS can choose from a wide variety of activities. Cromer says many activities do not require the student to be especially athletic or strong academically. For example, there is a Student YMCA which includes nearly 100 students each year. Other opportunities are the RCMS Unite Club, Girls in Science, Fitness Club, Academic Team, Students Learning About Math and Science (SLAM) and FCA. The school also has peer mediators, yearbook staff, band, choir, Holiday Express Art club, student council, leadership team, dance team and a wide variety of sports activities.

"We coincide many of our after-school activities with our Extended School Services program so that bus transportation can be provided for students who would not otherwise be able to attend," Cromer says.

Parents can play a role in supporting their child's extracurricular efforts in three ways. If students are hesitant to get involved, parents can encourage children to do so. If transportation isn't available, they can arrange for it. Finally, once students begin to participate, Cromer says, "It is important that parents are there to see what their child is doing. They need to attend every special event the club or team has so that the child knows that they are supported."

# Real Solutions For Tough Problems











## 5 Years ago this week 2001

Lamb had just been in District Judge Mike Henry's court on several charges, including possession of a firearm by a convicted felon and possession of marijuana.

Henry released Lamb on a \$7,500 bond and when Lamb left the courthouse he got into his vehicle and drove off. Adams and Mink knew that Lamb was driving without a license and the pursuit began, which ended after Lamb wrecked his vehicle on Calloway Hollow Road.

Monroe Brown, 68, of Quail died in a single vehicle accident on Hwy. 70 and a Guatemalan man was being held in the Rockcastle County Detention Center, after trying to obtain a fake identification card in Circuit Clerk Teresa Vanzant's office.

The Rockets defeated Knott County Central 79-7 and head coach Tom Larkey returned to the sidelines after two weeks off because of cancer surgery.

## 15 Years ago this week 1991

An estimated 150 supporters rallied at the Livingston PTA meeting in hopes of encouraging the public to resist the new recommendation for Livingston School to be a transitional school, which meant no money could be spent on new construction or repairs at the school.

Then principal, the late Jerry Mink, encouraged those in attendance to stand up against the state's recommendation. Now County Judge-Executive Buzz Carloftis was chosen by the group to represent them at a hearing, being held by the Kentucky Department of Education the following week.

The Rockets were ranked

15th in the state after a 31-0 win over Pulaski County. The win upped the Rockets' record in 1991 to 4-0. J.D. Harris had 171 yards on 22 carries to lead the Rockets to the win and a number four ranking in Class 2A.

## Local man's barn depicts Americana

Thomas Benton Miller, of Pine Hill, has a piece of "Americana" on his farm and it has gotten him special recognition in the past few years. *The Courier Journal* published an article entitled "Mail Pouch Barns depict Americana" that featured Miller's barn in May of 1999. Also, the barn was pictured in the 2004 edition of *Kentucky 24/7 - Amazing Photographs of An Extraordinary State*.

*The Courier Journal* article, written by Byron Crawford, featured Miller standing in front of his barn and read as follows:

"At least 100 times a year, Benton and Wanda Miller glance out the window of their Rockcastle County farmhouse to see someone snapping pictures of their old barn with the Mail Pouch chewing tobacco ad painted on one side.

When Miller's father bought the farm 47 years ago, the barn, which sits beside U.S. 25 about five miles south of Mt. Vernon, had already been painted with the Mail Pouch advertisement, Miller recalled.

"I don't know whether they come back and touched it up or not," he said. "Surely it wouldn't have lasted 40 years, would it? I was raised around here and that sign's been there about as long as I can remember."

Since 1965, when the Highway Beautification Act went into effect, the Mail Pouch barn ads have grown into genuine relics of Americana, right up there with Burma Shave and See Rock City signs. Mail Pouch barns are such a fixture of the Americana landscape that when the states recently reached agreements with the tobacco companies banning outdoor ads for tobacco products, Mail Pouch barns were specifically exempted.

"Particularly those of us in the South were certainly aware of that issue and wanted to make sure that it would not prove to be a problem," said Scott White, one of Kentucky's assistant deputy attorneys general. "It would just be a nightmare to try to do anything about them, and not only that, they do have a cultural significance."

Many of the fading Mail Pouch barns in Kentucky, Indiana and surrounding states were painted by 74-year-old Harley Warrick of Belmont, Ohio, who has been called the Michelangelo of barn painters.

Warrick was 21, and fresh out of the Army, when a Mail Pouch barn-painting crew came to his

family's dairy farm in Ohio and he hired on as a helper. For 48 years thereafter, he brushed the distinctive yellow and white on black Mail Pouch ads over approximately 20,000 barns in 13 states, from Missouri to Pennsylvania and from Michigan to Virginia. The ads, which he often initialed and dated, encourages passersby to "Chew Mail Pouch Tobacco - Treat Yourself To the Best."

"They're probably all in pretty bad shape in Kentucky, because we didn't get back to repaint them too much after they passed the billboard law, about 1965," Warrick said by phone from his Ohio home. "The barns are getting more popular. They're starting to disappear, so people have to have them."

Warrick retired from the company that makes Mail Pouch in 1994. He suffers from Emphysema but still chews Mail Pouch and still works almost every day in his shop, painting small replicas of Mail Pouch barns. He is five months behind in filling orders.

Network news commentator Ted Koppel hired Warrick to paint a Mail Pouch ad on one of the barns at Koppel's farm in Maryland and, several times each year, Warrick demonstrates his barn-painting at events around the country where often hundreds of onlookers gather to watch.

"Anything that's got to do with work anymore is interesting," Warrick said, "because there's not much of it done."





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

**I**t is almost time to make a decision on who will be in the position to lead Mt. Vernon for the next four years. I am hoping that you will place your trust in me again. I have always attempted to work for the best interests of the City, moving us to another level to be competitive for new jobs while retaining the existing charm of our community. I have accomplished this without raising taxes—in fact, the City's property tax rates have been reduced each year during my term!

I have worked diligently to develop and strengthen working relationships with other elected officials—this effort has been the foundation for my effort to acquire State and Federal grants to upgrade our City's infrastructure (streets, sidewalks, sewer and water systems, parks, economic development, etc) and to date we have received over \$5 million in grant funding.

- We have secured funding to add sewer lines around Lake Linville to help protect our raw water source from possible contaminants, enhance the quality of Lake Linville, and raise the value of adjacent properties. Additional grant funds have been secured for future extensions.
- We have worked to provide better water pressure to our customers, added or are adding new distribution lines to provide water to more people throughout our community who still have no potable water service, and next year will undertake additional water tank projects.
- We are improving more roads through re-paving (both new and old roads) and plan on continuing to make improvements.
- We have made significant improvements to the Mt. Vernon Police department to better serve the citizens in our community:
  1. A new Finger-Printing Machine
  2. Weapons
  3. Computers/Software (The department, plus the eight cruisers are now fully equipped with laptops, capable of running drivers license and tags, and also contain video cameras to insure the justice of both citizens and officers alike.)
  4. 8 Cruisers, all of which are marked the same.
  5. We have also up-graded the system for receiving clearer signals for dispatch.
  6. The starting wages for police have risen to be competitive resulting in 0 turnovers in the last 3 years
- We have performed necessary daily financial functions and reporting requirements enhancing our ability to get grant funding for various projects:
  1. Audits of all City services as required by law were performed (caught up 4 years of no audits prior to my Mayoral term)
  2. Current Bills are paid on time
- 3. City departments now operate with updated computers, printers, software, equipment, and vehicles
- 4. We have developed an annual balanced budget without borrowing from the Water Department
- 5. I have furnished monthly Financial Reports to the Council and Public
- We have expanded local events for our citizens and children:
  1. Enlarged the participation in our Bittersweet Festival through donations, vendors, events
  2. I have added a spring festival titled Old Fashioned Tradin' Days
  3. I created a safe event for our young trick-or-treaters titled Halloween On Main and we have expanded this to include parents & businesses and promote a safe and fun event for our children
- We have worked to make our community more attractive and been highly successful:
  1. Our PRIDE cleanup events have been winners each year of my term
  2. I personally was a finalist for Congressman Roger's ENVI award
  3. Our City has received more than \$100,000 for community clean-ups
  4. We have been presented with \$15,000 for a cleanup in October 2006
  5. We have continued to promote our Main Street Program and we have added new flags on Richmond Street
  6. I developed a new department—Maintenance Crew—directed to mowing, sweeping, and general maintenance of our City streets and parks
  7. We applied for and received grant funds to improve our sidewalks along Richmond Street and Lovell Lane. Main Street is next year.

## Whitaker pleads guilty

Loretta Whitaker, 39, of Mt. Vernon, has pled guilty to two counts of first-degree trafficking in a controlled substance, according to Commonwealth Attorney Eddy F. Montgomery.

Whitaker entered her plea at a hearing last Friday in Rockcastle Circuit Court.

According to court records, on two separate occasions in July of last year, agents from Operation UNITE purchased Oxycontin from Whitaker.

According to UNITE Prosecutor David L. Dalton, in each case, a confidential witness was able to buy an 80 milligram pill from Whitaker for \$100.

Whitaker was indicted in March and April of this year on the two drug charges.

Following her plea of guilty, Rockcastle Circuit Judge David Tapp set final sentencing for October 27.

Dalton indicated that he would recommend 12 years imprisonment for Whitaker's multiple sales of OxyContin. Whitaker remains in the Rockcastle County Jail pending final sentencing.

high school fell only one point shy of their goal and is listed as a progressive school.

The second highest scores at the elementary level were at Roundstone with an academic index of 99.3 with Mt. Vernon Elementary a close third at 97.2. Roundstone students raised their scores almost seven percentage points from a year ago.

At the middle school, students scored 87.0, 4.5 points higher than a year ago and there scores were the 19th best of the state's 216 middle schools.

The results are from the Commonwealth Accountability Testing System, which tests students in reading, math, science, social studies, arts and humanities, vocational studies, practical living and writing.

Student performance on the test is categorized into four levels: novice, apprentice, proficient and distinguished.

The lowest percentages across the state of novices, or the lowest scores, by subject area were in science at the elementary level, reading at the middle school and writing at the high school level.

"I simply want to commend everyone, from the members of the board of education right on down, for their hard work in our continuous effort to give our students the tools they need to obtain a good education at all levels of our school district," school superintendent Larry Hammond said.

"We are no doubt pleased with last year's results, but as always there are many areas for improvement," he said.

Rockcastle out-distanced all neighboring school systems, except for East Bernstadt independent in Laurel County, which ranked 14th in the state. East Bernstadt is also just a primary through eighth grade school.

## "What Is Written"

In Acts 1:4-5 we read, "And, being assembled together with them, commanded them that they should not depart from Jerusalem, but wait for the promise of the Father, which, saith he, ye have heard of me. For John truly baptized with water; but ye shall be baptized with the Holy Ghost not many days hence." According to Jesus, Holy Spirit baptism is a promise, not a command. Ten days after Jesus speaks to the apostles, they are baptized on the day of Pentecost, Acts 2:1-4. Some claim that more than the 12 apostles were baptized in the Holy Ghost that day, but such is not true. Who is the "they" and the "them" here in Acts 2:1-4? Next week we shall look at the only other case of Holy Spirit baptism, Cornelius and those with him, Acts 10-11.

# Play at Clay County Friday night Rockets slip, slide, pass and run by Cougars 41-6

Although the field conditions at the ROCK were less than perfect on Friday because of all the rainfall, the Rockets still managed to put up 41 points.

And they put them up quickly enroute to their fourth win of the season against only one loss.

The Rockets scored five times in the first half to take a 35-6 lead over visiting Letcher County Central into the dressing room at half-time.

One more score in the third period would do it for the Rockets, who basically ran out the clock for the remainder of the game.

Head coach Tom Larkey, who picked up his 199th win of his head coaching career at the ROCK on Friday night, said after the game that he was pleased with two phases of the game.

"I thought our team improved dramatically in the passing and kicking games," he said.

"Izak (McQueary) was ten for 11 passing, with no interceptions and three touchdown passes," the coach noted.

Placekicker Brad Durham was also three for five in extra point kicks and Larkey praised kicker Donovan Pigg on his kick-offs. "We can't kick the ball into the end zone so our advantage is squibbing the ball and we are doing a much better job of that," the coach said.

The scoring for the Rockets went as follows.

With 9:49 remaining in the first quarter, tailback Dusty Miller scored on a 53 yard run. He also added the extra two points and the Rockets led 8-0. Also in the first quarter, with 4:21 left, quarterback Izak McQueary found Tanner Perkins on a five yard pass and Durham added the extra point.

The ROCK headed into the second period with a 15-0 lead and quickly added to that total when McQueary found Shawn Childress on a 15 yard pass play and Durham added the extra point, making the score 22-0 with 10:47 left in the half.

After holding the Cougars on their next possession, sophomore Cody Mize took the ball and scampered 84 yards to pay dirt. Durham's kick was no good and the Rockets led 28-0.

The Cougars only highlight of the night was in the next series when they scored on a 64 yard pass play, but they missed the extra point and the score was 28-6.

With only 18 seconds left in the first half Miller scored again, this time on a nine yard run and Durham added the extra point for a 35-6 margin at half-time.

On the Rockets' first series of the second half, McQueary found Childress again on a 30 yard touchdown pass. Durham's kicked failed and the Rockets led 41-6.

"Our offensive line worked hard for two weeks on run block and I thought it showed Friday night" Larkey said.

"McQueary was not sacked and we had almost 300 yards on the ground," the coach noted. All total the Rockets had 417

yards of offense, 292 on the ground and 128 through the air.

McQueary was ten for 11 for 128 yards and he threw three touchdown passes.

Miller had 141 yards on 13 carries, caught one pass for 16 yards, scored two rushing touchdowns and added a two point conversion.

Cody Mize had 105 yards on ten carries, he caught one pass for five yards and scored one rushing touchdown.

Childress caught five balls for eighty yards and scored two touchdowns and Perkins caught three passes for 27 yards, one for a touchdown. Durham had three successful extra point kicks.

Adam Hensley had 12 yards on two carries, Shawn McHone added 30 yards on three carries, Dakota McFerron had 14 yards on seven carries and Dustin Bullock had four yards on one carry.

Defensively, the Rockets held the Cougars to only 172 yards. The Cougars had 126 yards passing and 46 yards rushing.

Sophomore Casey Hayes continued his excellent play on offense with seven tackles and assists, which included three sacks. Hayes also blocked a Cougar punt.

Junior Zach Burkhardt made his return to the line-up after battling Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever for the past month. Burkhardt was impressive on Friday night with six tackles and assists and an interception.

Picking up four tackles and assists were: Durham, Childress, Perkins and Abe Kirby. Durham also had two sacks. Miller had three tackles and assists and Hensley, Josh Garrison, Trenidy Coffey and Matthew Bullens had two tackles and assists. Hensley also had one sack. Pigg, Scott Daugherty, McQueary and Lynn Miracle all added a tackle.

The Rockets will travel to Clay County on Friday night for their second district game of the season against the Tigers.

Clay County was ranked 10th in class 3A in the state this week, ahead of the 12th ranked Rockets by the Associated Press.

Clay County also has the number one rated passing quarterback in the state and two of the top ten receivers. "No doubt this is a big game for us,"



They really took Southern out of the game and I'm really proud of the girls for fighting back and winning this match," he said.


The Lady Rockets travel to Jackson County Thursday night and will play in the Follie Classic over the weekend in Harrison County.

Next week they will travel to Wayne for a make-up match on Monday night and on Tuesday they will travel to North Laurel.


Next Thursday night will be senior night as the Lady Rockets host Boyle County for the final home match of the regular season.

The district and regional tournaments will be held at Clay County with the district tournament starting on Monday October 9th and the region being played the next week.



Brooks said that the Leger


was necessary because of all of the injuries this season on the offensive line.

27th while she worked at the Renfro Valley Shell.

According to the original arrest warrant, Nicely supposedly tried to put the bills into circulation at the store and was aided by another person who passed the bills to her.

Local attorney Willis Coffey, who represented Nicely, said that her co-defendant, James Colt Swartz, 23, of Valley View Apartments, pled guilty in the case and testified against Nicely. “The jury apparently did not think his testimony was very convincing,” Coffey said.

Besides Swartz’s testimony, several local law enforcement officials also testified in the trial.

Because of his guilty plea in the case, Swartz faces a possible sentence of 20 years in prison, a \$250,000 fine and three years of supervised release.

The initial investigation into the case was conducted by the Rockcastle Sheriff’s Department.

that, with the help of Wilson’s cellular phone company, they had been able to locate her phone on I-75 at the 97 mile marker, between Lexington and Richmond.

He told state police the couple should be traveling in a white Jeep Grand Cherokee bearing Ohio registration plates.

State police in London then notified state police at the Richmond Post. Officers at Richmond located the vehicle at the 88 mile marker, traveling south, and attempted to stop it.

The news release said that Wilson’s boyfriend Sean Lackey refused to stop the vehicle and a tire deflation device was utilized by KSP trooper Tommy Cromer at the 76 mile marker near Berea. The device deflated some of the tires on the Jeep but the pursuit continued southbound on the interstate where tire deflation devices were used again by KSP Sgt. Lefe Owens at the 62 mile marker near Renfro Valley. Cromer said that the pursuit reached speeds of 110 miles per hour and that Lackey was passing cars in the emergency lane of the interstate.

The news release said the rest of the tires on the Jeep were deflated and that Lackey began striking Cromer and Sgt. Jack Riley’s vehicle. “He hit me in the side and Sgt. Riley in the rear,” Cromer said. Legal intervention was used to stop the vehicle which flipped over in the median before coming to a stop upright. Cromer said that he was concerned that Lackey was going to wreck and kill someone because he was hitting the guardrail during the pursuit. “I felt a little better about the situation after we pitted him,” Cromer said.

Police said Lackey was taken into custody without incident and was not injured in the wreck. However, Deputy Wilson, who was tied up and bound to the back seat was injured during the abduction and was taken to the Rockcastle Hospital for treatment.

Lackey has 17 charges pending against him in Rockcastle County including kidnapping

with serious physical injury. He is being held on a \$250,000 cash bond and is scheduled for a preliminary hearing next Monday. He has been appointed a public defender. Lackey also faces charges in Ohio.

though I have a cancelled check, #1074, for \$20,000 on file here at the sheriff’s department, written on 07/12/2005. They want the money no matter what.

This is their way of saying that if I want to keep my employees working, then I have to pay them \$20,000 on top of the debt. Call it an ‘offer you can’t refuse.’ But I will always refuse an offer that consists of political bullies. Carloftis, McKinney and the whole bunch knows I don’t owe the money and they don’t care. They want to force my hand with layoffs because I wouldn’t march to their political drum beat the last four years.

At the end of the day, the only ones that suffer are Nathaniel Price and Joe Rush and their families. But the Judge/Executive and the fiscal court aren’t focused on that -- they are keeping their eye on the \$20,000 while you go without police protection.

Sergeant Rick Brummett also experienced a sharp decrease in hours as a result of the layoffs, going from 79 hours in a pay period to 20 hours a pay period. This is a substantial financial loss to him and his family.

Also, last week’s payroll, on Friday, was able to be made due to my not taking my salary as sheriff so that my employees could be paid.

So, I agree that I should pay the fiscal court \$19,700 immediately and will then sign an agreed order that I will pay back the payrolls that the fiscal court covers until I receive tax commissions in November. If the judge and fiscal court can get their hands off our forfeiture money long enough, we might be able to get these men back to work.”

end of this week.”

Ms. Tatum said she had been corresponding with brothers, Tim and Randall Goetze who have told her they want to leave California because they are “tired of the fast pace of life there and the cost of doing business.”

Tatum told the board that there was the potential for at least 20 jobs with the company which assembles door locks and reproduction antique hardware.

Tatum said the company also plans to construct a 10,000 sq. ft. warehouse on the back side of the property and will need a variance of the board’s setback restrictions in order to do so. The board presently has a 50 ft. setback from the property line restriction and will have to look into what will be required to waive the restriction so the warehouse can be constructed.

Kathy Robinson, of County Attorney Billy Reynolds’ office, who was at the meeting as Reynolds’ representative, told the board that if the original covenant containing the restriction does not provide for the board giving the variance, each property owner in the park will have to sign a waiver granting the variance.

Another matter, also involving FPL, is the new name, assigned for the Enhanced 911 system, for the road which runs through the park.

The road was originally called Industrial Park Road, Craig said, but had been changed to Workers Way. Tatum and Craig both told the board that there have been several complaints from property owners in the park about the change and also from FPL who said they did not like the inference of the name.

The board approved a Resolution asking the fiscal court to change the name back to Industrial Park Road and will present it to the court at their next regular meeting.

The board was also informed that an option had been obtained for the Isaacs property, adjacent to the Northside Apartments recently bought by the board. The property, located on Richmond Street in Mt. Vernon, is between Northside and the school board property. Purchase price for the property is \$77,000 and Craig said this acquisition would bring the total area to one plus acres for development.

The board also was told that Kentucky Highlands had decided to exercise their option to purchase the nine acres where the former Cintas building sits for \$58,813, with the closing to take place prior to Saturday.

Kentucky Highlands has leased the property since June of 1982, when the purchase price was established, when they constructed the building which Cintas leased until they closed down operations last September.

In her monthly report, Tatum told the board:

report on the wreck, but York’s aunt Eliza York said that her nephew never drove without everyone, including himself, being buckled in. “He wouldn’t even pull out of the driveway until everyone was buckled up and we think the seat belt was probably broken by the impact,” she said.

Ms. York said her nephew was headed to Mt. Vernon when the wreck happened. “They had just mowed the shoulder of the road, which left some grass on the road and the rain just made it that much slicker,” she said.

Neighbors called 911 after the wreck and neighbor Matt Poynter told York’s father John Henry, the bad news. York was able to see his son before he was taken to the hospital.

Over 1,200 people attended York’s visitation on Monday night at Cox Funeral Home. Funeral Director Bud Cox said Monday night’s turnout for York’s visitation was the largest he had seen at the funeral home since 1957 and Tuesday’s funeral was also one of the largest ever held at the funeral home.

“He was an extremely popular young man,” said RCHS principal Jennifer Mattingly. “It is going to be hard for many of our students and staff to cope with this tragic loss,” she added.

RCHS has an average daily attendance of over 900 students, but on Tuesday, approximately 200 were absent from school and another 100 were checked out to

attend York’s funeral.

Several memorials, including one at the wreck site and another at the high school, have been erected in honor of York, who was selected as the student with the most school spirit at a bonfire at the high school on Thursday night.

Several memorial services have already been held by classmates in honor of York and another one will be held on Saturday beginning at 1 p.m. at the Gravel Pit, across from NAPA in Mt. Vernon.

One of the organizers, Ammie Lewis, said the memorial will move from the Gravel Pit to the home of William Collie on the Old Brodhead-Mt. Vernon near the wreck site.

Lewis is encouraging parents to attend the service in honor of a “special young man”.

## Dedication Service held for Rockcastle Substance Abuse Prevention office

The board of the Rockcastle KY ASAP (Agency for Substance Abuse Policy and Prevention) hosted an Open House for the Rockcastle Substance Abuse Prevention office, lo-

cated at 36 Castle Village Drive in Brodhead. This office was made possible by collaboration with the KY ASAP board, UNITE and the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court. The event

was attended by approximately 150 people.

The KY ASAP was created in the 2000 General Assembly to promote the reduction of alcohol, tobacco and other drug use through the implementation of research-based strategies. The agency has awarded funds to allow counties to assess, fund and evaluate prevention and treatment efforts and to encourage increased community involvement and collaboration. His purpose and mission in traveling school to school is to speak to teenagers in hope to impact their lives and get the message out about the obstacles in life. He averages 60 games per week.

Holmes a talented 50 year old, challenged teams made up of Unite officials (including former UK Wildcat Basketball player, Jeff Shepherd), the school's very own volleyball team and student athletes.
