far.

Francis said that each person counted is worth about \$4,300 in federal funding.



The old saying goes that if March comes in like a lion, it will go out like a lamb or vice versa. (In like a lamb and out like a lion)

And I have found, over the decades, that there is a bit of truth in that. Nice, warm, pea planting weather (lamb-like) is often a pretty sure sign that the end of the month will be miserably cold and dreary. Conversely, cool, blustery winds, cold rain, and hints of snow at the beginning of the month signal time to fire up the tillers and rejoice in blossoms and sunshine come April Fool's Day.

But what if March comes in like a polar bear? (And it did just that here in Paint Lick on Monday) Is it supposed to go out like a seal or a penguin? It's been way too cold here for the last several months for any self respecting lion to be hanging around and all the lambs I know about have been sold to

slaughter. In the spirit of alternative

agriculture crops, one of my neighbors has mentioned that he might turn his green houses into ice houses and start growing penguins. Problem is, like most alternative crops and livestock, there simply is not much of a market for penguins these days because the ice melts off the ponds here well before July and penguins still have problems with our humidity in August.

And then there's the problem of figuring out what farm raised penguins are good for----It is, in fact, perplexing, especially when we can't figure out what to do with pawpaws and persimmons. Which may be a moot point because persimmons and paw-paws require warm climates. If the trend continues and the growing season gets much shorter here in central

March is National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month A Change in Bowel Habits

One of the traditional seven warning signs of cancer is a change in bowel habits. This is for good reason. Once a person is past middle age, his or her bowel habits are quite well ingrained. They do not change significantly for any period of time unless there is a significant cause.

Colon cancer is one of the most common causes of a persistent change in bowel habits. There are about 165,000 new cases of colon cancer each year in the United States.


Any change in bowel habits that lasts three weeks or longer should be evaluated by your physician. The changes may include diarrhea, constipation, passing mucous or blood, or even symptoms such as urgency.

If you develop any of these changes, your doctor will do a general exam, including blood tests which may indicate anemia. Anemia is a common finding in colon cancer because of the microscopic but constant blood loss from the tumor.

Because tumors usually lose small amounts of blood, one of the most useful tests is to check for this blood in the stool. If any trace is found, you will need a look at the whole colon with an instrument called a colonoscope. This allows your doctor to see the lining of the entire colon. If it is perfectly clear, significant polyps are unlikely to develop in the next few years.

If the card tests are negative for blood, your doctor may choose to do a flexible sigmoidoscopy, or "flex sig," which looks at the lower third of the colon.

Other common causes for a change in bowel habits include inflammatory bowel disease, hormonal changes, infections, parasites and side effects from drugs. These problems would also benefit from appropriate evaluation and



Many of us old folk are pack rats

For the past several years my wife has been calling me the world's greatest "pack rat," and I suppose she is right. The last time she called me that, I began to wonder why, and it did not take me long to determine that it is because of my mother (Bee). (Parents take the fall for everything, don't they?)

Bee relentlessly hoarded many things she wanted or needed. Having gone through the Great Depression, she could never give up the habit. And I still think like she did: "I might need that one of these days." Anyone whose parents or grandparents went through the depression knows precisely what I mean. Most items were scarce, and families did not have the money to purchase everything that they needed.

The famous depression began on October 29, 1929 when the stock market crashed, and that day will always be referred to as Black Tuesday. During those dark days for our nation, people struggled to survive. Therefore, absolutely nothing was thrown away.

My older brother Al was born in 1934, when the effects of the depression were still being felt by most families in the United States. Unemployment was at an all time high (more than 25 percent) and crop prices fell by 60 percent. It was necessary for families to stretch their budgets to include only the bare necessities. Bee learned to stash away items that could be saved for a "rainy day" or make do with simple pleasures. She kept those habits for the remainder of her life.

When Bee moved to Lexington in the mid-seventies, she lived in a small apartment in the Lansdowne section of town. Because she did not have an automobile, it was my responsibility to purchase her groceries for her. I was living in Lexington at that time also. On a weekly basis for nearly 13 years, I drove across town, picked up her grocery list and purchased what she needed for the coming week. Sometimes my wife would accompany me to the grocery store, and she would question why Bee had something like toilet paper on the list when she had multiple stacks of it already. I explained that Bee felt the need to hoard certain items - leftover habits from the depression days. Kathy understood but still thought that Bee went way overboard. For example, Bee usually kept on her pantry shelf at least a couple of large boxes of powdered milk, even though she had fresh milk purchased for her every week. Of course, that habit occurred when she could not purchase enough milk for our family in the depression era. She simply did not want to do with-

out milk for her cooking and drinking needs.

I don't think there could have ever been enough toilet paper stashed away to make her feel like the stockpile was sufficient. She had a closet in her bathroom that housed an abundance of rolls of toilet paper. Once I asked why she kept such a supply; she replied, "What am I going to do if you get sick and cannot go to the store for me?" It seemed completely irrelevant to her that in such a dire case, Kathy would have been glad to pick up any necessities she might need, or that she had another son who would also be glad to help.

I also recall that Bee stashed away was small cans of meat – Spam, canned ham, and Deviled ham. I remember her telling me that she could use these meat products if she really was in a bind for a meat recipe. To the best of my memory, I cannot recollect a time when a family meal was prepared with these cans on her shelf. However, I guess they made her feel secure.

At any rate, I have adopted her "hoarding habits," and I am sure that I inherited the reason from her quirky routine. However, my pack rat status has taken an additional turn. Since you are reading this column, then you probably know that I have been writing a weekly column for the past five or six years. I have boxes in an upstairs closet containing copies of every paper in which my col-

umn has appeared. Kathy occasionally asks why I need to keep every paper, and to tell the truth I cannot for the life of me explain why it is necessary. I just do not want to throw them away. I suppose that I want my grandchildren to have them to read when they get older. As

Immediately following the 2001 attacks on the World Trade Center, a few of her fellow middle school students told Afsi Siahloohi she should "go back where you came from."

That wouldn't have been hard to do.

Like most of her classmates, she was born and raised in eastern Kentucky. On a farm at Spout Springs, to be exact.

Her father, Karim, is a native of Iran, and her mother, Kimberly, was born and reared in the Kentucky hill country

"Growing up, I always knew I looked different, but I never thought I was different. The words of a few of my classmates brought a whole new perspective," she says, while sitting behind a desk in her spacious office on the Eastern Kentucky University campus.

It was an eye-opening experience that, coupled with the support of a loving family and outstanding teachers has helped her advance to a unique position.

She is the current student body president of E.K.U., where she will graduate in May with a degree in public relations.

The confidence and ability to lead a 16,000-student university were gained in a much smaller academic setting, the now closed Hargett Elementary, where she spent her first four years of formal schooling.

"I loved Hargett," she exclaims, noting an instructor at that school has had a major influence on her life.

She didn't settle for the status quo, always pushing me to do more and realize my potential....that I could do things."

She also credits her mom, an English teacher at EKU the past eight years, for providing guidance.

"I've been lucky to have a mom like her. She has always said that if you're going to do a job, do it right or not at all. By the time she had

From her grandfather, who she says can raise potatoes that are "so delicious you don't have to put anything on them," she has obtained an appreciation for gardening and healthy eating.

"There's nothing better than fresh food directly from the garden," she says.

Besides knowing how to raise a garden, she can sew ("if I have to"), rotate her tires, and change the oil in her vehicle.

"I feel like everyone should know the basics in life," says the former youth



league soccer coach, who grew up attending Salem Baptist Church.

She even picked up surveying skills while accompanying her dad, a civil engineer, to work.

Originally a broadcast major, the self-described "people person" says she knew she wanted to seek the office of class president from the first day she stepped onto campus and met the then current leader.

Using her mom's office as her campaign headquarters, she ran with the slogan, "I give hugs, not handshakes," and the election drew a record number of voters.





"What Is Written"

Today we want to study the seventh beatitude in Jesus' teachings from the sermon on the mount. "Blessed are the peacemakers. for they shall be called the children of God." Mt.5:9. Now notice it did not say the peacehopers, or peacewishers, but the peacemakers. The goal of the faithful children of God is to seek to win people to Jesus, that those that are lost may find peace with God. Men and women are enemies of God by their sin and wickedness, Col.1:21, "And you, that were sometime alienated and enemies in your mind by wicked works, yet now hath he reconciled." A peacemaker seeks to get people to be reconciled to God, by teaching, encouraging, admonishing them to obey the gospel of peace. True soldiers of Christ have their feet shod with the gospel of peace, Eph.6:15, "And your feet shod with the preparation of the gospel of peace." Peacemakers also seek to bring peace between men who have had a falling out between themselves. Consider the book of Philemon, where Paul sought to reconcile Philemon and Onesimus who was a runaway slave that was converted. Now there is a "risk" in seeking to be a peacemaker. When word was received that New Hampshire had ratified the constitution, a timetable was set for the new government to begin, and on March 4, 1789, that government, created by the constitution, met for the first time and became operational.

"We the people," the first words of the preamble of that constitution, are most important. They assert unequivocally that the people of this land created the government of the United States of America and that government receives its power from them. As Abraham Lincoln said in the famous Gettysburg Address, this government is "of the people, by the people, and for the people." The Declaration of Independence, a document of primary importance for citizens of this nation, declares that, when this ceases to be true, the people have the right and the duty "to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security." This is recognition of an inherent right of the people of this nation.

At a critical moment in human history, "We the people" assumed responsibility and acted to accomplish a specific purpose. They wrote a constitution "in order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defence, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity." Although the constitution they wrote 221 years ago has been amended sparingly across the years, the purpose of government has remained unchanged.

As that constitution has been a faithful guide for this nation for 221 years, may it continue to do so for years to come?





The Concerned Citizens For Fair Government would like to take this opportunity to respond to County Judge Executive Buzz Carloftis' campaign add and to the challenge contained therein. The truths that Judge Carloftis states in his add are true and are without factual inconsistencies. The CCFFG does not dispute those truths. We at CCFFG, acknowledge that the court has never discussed, nor considered zoning and have no plans to bring them up. in fact, we have never stated anything publicly to the contrary, even though the Judge alleges otherwise. However, those stated truths do not preclude zoning and permitting, from coming before the court in the future. Judge Carloftis does make allegations that CCFFG leadership has purposefully misinformed its members, citizens and candidates that the court has plans for P&Z. His allegations have no basis in fact, are not true and are, in fact, campaign rhetoric on his part. A petition was presented, respectfully, at an open session of the Fiscal Court several months ago, by the Concerned Citizens For Fair Government. A synopsis of that petition, which contained in excess of three thousand signatures, requested that should zoning and permitting ever come before the court, that it be defeated. The reasoning behind our petition, was the position taken by the Rockcastle Development Board, in its public presentation, recommending that zoning and permitting should be implemented in Rockcastle County. In presenting our petition, we were wanting to convey to the court that the Rockcastle Development Board's quest for zoning and permitting was in contrast to the will of the people. We now challenge the Judge to take a public stand regarding zoning. Does he support and/or agree with the efforts of the Development Board to implement zoning or does he oppose it? Judge Carloftis is well educated, in his fifties, a life long resident of Rockcastle County and has served as Judge for many years. Does it seem reasonable that he does not have an opinion on zoning, especially since the people that elected him are opposed to zoning? It should be noted that the number of citizens that signed our petition against zoning far exceeded the number of votes that it took to elect Judge Carloftis. Judge Carloftis, in your own words, "Show us what you got." The opportunity to be forthcoming is now at your door step.

Judge Carloftis states that the printing of materials from other cities and Lincoln County has absolutely nothing to do with Rockcastle County. Approximately one year ago, the Rockcastle Development Board held a public meeting in the conference room of the Rockcastle County Courthouse. The meeting was chaired by Jeremy Reynolds. This meeting was held to discuss and solicit public input regarding the implementation of zoning in Rockcastle County. Mr. Reynolds had a member of the Lincoln County zoning department in attendance to answer our questions. When an official from Lincoln County's zoning department is brought in to answer questions about zoning, it absolutely does have something to do with Rockcastle County. Again, Judge Carloftis' statement dismissing the importance of our referencing Lincoln County is without merit and is made to promote his campaign. Many of our members have lived in communities where they experienced the oppressiveness that comes with zoning and permitting. They shared those experiences and their opposition to zoning at the meeting that Jeremy Reynolds chaired. Those shared experiences are not printed materials from other cities, as the Judge alleges, but rather are the negative experiences that accompany zoning as have been experienced by many of our members. Judge Carloftis also stated that no club or organization's wish list is an ordinance and has no legal standing. The Rockcastle Development Board is an organization that, in our opinion, is certainly almost a club. Its wish list certainly does not have legal standing. However, it does have enough standing to be funded through grants derived from our tax money and then recommends the implementation of zoning and permitting, which the vast majority oppose.

It should be noted that Claretta Hodges, a candidate for Judge Executive, has the core value to publicly state her opposition to zoning. She is insightful, intuitive, well educated and knowledgeable of the workings of the fiscal court. If elected, she would be conservative and discriminating with the taxpayer's dollar, especially during this economic down turn.

The Lady Rockets will now face Monticello in the second round of the region on Friday night at 7:45 p.m.



If the Lady Rockets win they will play the winner of Southwesthern and Lincoln County, the host team.







Longbeards banquet is another success



They hope the historical building, which dates to the early 20th century, can be preserved, Leigh Anne Hiatt said.

"The year after I was born, Dad took over the business from my grandfather, O.V. Hilton, who had bought the store during World War II and run it for 17 years," Leigh Anne said. "It's been part of our family for as long as I can remember.

"I came by the store the last Saturday it was open and went up to the stock room and had a good cry. I have happy memories of growing brother, Willie, and I played in the toy aisles when we were little. I followed in the footsteps of my mother, Barbara, and worked there as a clerk during high school and college."

Leigh Anne said her father had a bit of a double standard when it came to job performance. "I was the oldest and Dad had high expectations when it came to my working at the store. Willie obviously didn't get the memo. When he started there as a clerk, he would sit on the checkout right in front of the customers.

"That's when Dad moved Willie out of customer service and gave him a job painting the stock room. Willie spent more time cranking up his boom box than he did painting and Dad sent him home. That was the end of Willie's career at Hiatt's 5&10."

After Billy Hiatt retired in 2007, he leased the building to his longtime manager, Betty Miller, who bought the business with partners Harold and Mary Woodall.

"Betty, Harold and Mary did a terrific job carrying on the tradition of Hiatt's 5&10," said Willie, who lives in Memphis, Tenn.

"The store couldn't have been in better hands. Dad, Leigh Anne and I were pleased they operated the business for another three years. Unfortunately, we learned several months ago that the building needs extensive repairs and made the difficult decision to close it."

Miller and the Woodalls began an inventory close-out sale in late January and sold down to the bare walls in a matter of weeks.

"The store was so busy during the final days that customers lined up down each aisle to get checked out," Leigh Anne Hiatt said. "We were amazed that the community was so emotional about the news that the store was closing. People who had shopped here for years were sad to see this chapter of downtown Mt. Vernon come to an end. Hiatt's 5&10 was an incredible joint venture with this community. We appreciated the customers and they were loyal to us." she said.

Hiatt said the store held a special appeal for children, who used to come from all over to shop for toys. She said her one regret is that she ran out of time to bring in children of her own to shop at Hiatt's 5&10.

"I didn't quite make that deadline," said Hiatt, who is in the last stages of adopting an infant from Kazakhstan.

"I'm late in the game to motherhood, so I had to come up with Plan B. During the store-closing sale, I shopped like mad for all the toys I enjoyed as a kid. I brought home a Raggedy Ann and Andy, wooden puzzles, children's books, a Slinky, a bicycle horn, a fake snake, a scooter, a truck, plastic gardening tools and a bunch of other things. I also took plenty of photos and video of the store.

"When I finally adopt the baby, I'll have plenty to show and tell about growing up in one of the last dime stores in Kentucky."



(3) Income reported on Schedules C, D, E, F, 4797 and 4835 may be subject to the local occupational tax.

(4) Income reported on ALL business returns are subject to the local occupational tax.

USDA-NRCS announces for Kentucky \$775,000 available for Organic Initiative

Tom Perrin, State Conservationist for Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) in Kentucky recently announced that \$775,000 is available in Kentucky for the 2010 National Organic Initiative to encourage more organic agriculture production. Funding for the initiative is being made available as part of the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP). Applications are being accepted now until March 12, 2010. These funds can and will serve to assist organic growers and producers in Kentucky.

Nationally, \$50 million has been set aside for organic producers and those desiring to transition to organic production. Organic producers may also apply for assistance under general EQIP. Applications received now through March 12, 2010 will be ranked according to the nationally established ranking criteria based on resource concerns linked to the National Organic Program (NOP) objectives and core conservation practices. Costshare funding is available to certified organic growers and producers as well as those transitioning to organic production.

Senate Week in Review...

The General Assembly takes its role in overseeing the State's education system very seriously. In recent years, we have taken several steps to en-

courage students to take r i g o r o u s coursework that explores subject material in depth, but this week,



we moved to increase the breadth of knowledge in our schools.

Senate Bill 142 would allow students to take a high school course on the historical, social, and cultural influence of the Bible. The key to the course is that it is designed to teach, not preach. It is hard to conduct a high school literature course without studying a work with reference to the Bible, from Paradise Lost to The Chronicles of Narnia. Some of the greatest films of history have referenced the Bible, including the classic The Ten Commandments and modern hits like Dan Brown's The Da Vinci Code and Angels & Demons. And, understanding any number of historical events — the Crusades, Renaissance art, the Reformation, even the Pilgrims arriving on this continent — is dependent on knowing the Biblical context. There is no doubt that the Bible, as a work of history and literature, has influenced our modern society, and understanding the Bible outside its strictly religious context can benefit students in many ways To make sure that the course prepares students for the wider world instead of mimicking Sunday school, there is a two-step process for implementing the plan. First, the State Board of Education would develop guidelines on how the course would be taught, including the focus on how the Bible has influenced modern society through literature, history, and culture. Second, each school-based decision making council would have to approve the course before it could be offered to that high school's students. Additionally, any coursework, whether on the Old Testament, New Testament, or both, would be an elective and not required for graduation. Students would also have their choice of books to use rather than being forced to read a particular

translation of the Bible.

Another education-related subject we tackled was the growing specter of teen suicide. House Bill 51 would require every public middle school and high school to distribute suicide prevention materials to its students. The bill goes hand-in-hand with SB 65, passed earlier this month, which would require teachers to receive training to understand the signs of a suicidal student. Suicide is the third-leading cause of death among teens, and the fourthleading cause of death among preteens. A key to preventing suicide is knowing the signs and getting people the help they need. The more we can help friends and colleagues recognize who is most at risk, the more we can prevent senseless tragedies.

Finally, this week, we also passed legislation to aid service members returning home from the front line. HB 19 would allow returning military personnel up to one year to renew their concealed-carry permit upon returning home from deployment. There are many deadlines we take for granted as civilians, such as a driver's license. It is much more difficult to meet those deadlines when deployed overseas for a lengthy period so HB 19 gives these heroes the extra time to get their affairs in order when they return home. In addition, the bill allows them to renew their permit via mail, if possible, and then receive their new permit at their duty station rather than at their home. It is a small convenience, but an important one for those who serve our nation so honorably. Rep. Joseph "Eddie" Ballard, D-Madisonville, has been a champion of veteran issues since he came to the House of Representatives in 1987. We recognized the work by Rep. Ballard on behalf of veterans in Kentucky by adding his name to the Western Kentucky Veterans Center in Hanson in his honor. We have now finished the second month of this 60-day session, so the important work of the budget will take greater precedence with each coming day. As the pace picks up, it is more important than ever to stay in touch with your elected officials in Frankfort. 



Logging and strip and surface mining have long since erased the timbered swag there on the north side of the mountain where Pap once had a "sugar camp" high on the hill in the head of Blair Branch just around the slope from bee-tree gap where you could short cut through the hills between Rock House and Smoot Ccreek without having to hoof another dozen miles.

Before he died in 1955, the forest land and all its trees were sacred and not a tree from the old growth forest was taken unless he needed lumber for a special project and, even then, he only culled out trees, one at a time, that were diseased or had been hit, especially hard, by fire or lightning.

A few dozen big sugar maples were scattered here and there throughout 60 acres of woods on the high side of the mountain. Mom used to



tell us that she could not remember a time when the sugar camp did not seem to need some repair every spring and she was born in 1914. She was sure the furnace was built before 1900 because she had sales receipts showing that Pap had sold or traded sugar for other goods in the 1890s

The sugar camp consisted of an open shed, say 10 feet wide and 12 feet long, roofed with white oak shingles to ward off falling weather. The shed covered a rock-walled burning pit/furnace some three feet deep and wide and perhaps ten feet long on top of which was mounted a stir off pan of similar dimensions and it was erected on one of the reasonably flat places on the mountainside.

I can remember Uncle Stevie Craft cutting elder berry branches, poking out the

Putting a Stop to Diarrhea Presented by Dr. Callie Shaffer

Diarrhea is very common. People frequently get the stomach flu, food poisoning or other illnesses that cause diarrhea.

Most cases are self-limited and not very serious. Their main risks come from dehydration and



loss of potassium. Dehydration is present when a


person's body weight drops by 3-5%. When it drops 8-10%, it is very serious and needs intravenous replacement. Using a person's weight is one of the easiest ways to measure the level of dehydration.

The fluid lost with diarrhea can usually be replaced by drinking more fluids. Sports drinks and special formulations for small children help replace both the fluids and electrolytes, but nearly any type of fluid can be consumed--diluted juices, soft drinks or plain water. Milk should be avoided, however, since it is difficult to digest and may prolong the diarrhea.

Medicines can help limit diarrhea. One of the most effective medicines, called loperamide, is available without prescription. This is quite safe to use as long as the diarrhea is not caused by a parasite or invasive bacteria. However, if the diarrhea persists, abdominal pain increases, your have a fever, or if there is blood in the stool you should see your doctor promptly and not take loperamide.

Rarely are prescription medicines used to control diarrhea, and they generally carry greater risks and side effects, including accidental overdoses.

Medicines cannot work well unless a person also uses dietary discretion. At times of diarrhea, it is wise to avoid milk, greasy foods and excessively sweet foods. Foods that are easy to digest are plain rice, potatoes, toast, crackers and bananas.

Everything is comfortable to us there because we know the area, do not have to ask for directions, and some of our favorite restaurants are within a few miles.

On Saturday night we went to one of our choice spots for dinner in Gatlinburg called the Cherokee Grill, and on our return to the condo, we stopped at Krispy Kreme to pick up a dozen prized doughnuts. We usually make this stop instead of having dessert at the restaurant so we can continue to enjoy them all weekend.

Krispy Kreme began serving their secret concoction on July 13, 1937 in Winston-Salem, North Carolina and has expanded its stores all over the United States. It is hard to believe that the company is 93 years old and still growing.

Every time I bite into one of these famous yeast-raised doughnuts, I am reminded of my grandmother (Mommie Katie) and her own recipe for home-made doughnuts. I am not positive just how she made them, but I did watch her very carefully when she got into the mood to deep fry her special treats. She allowed me to sit on a tall kitchen stool and watch her do her magic. I am not a cook so I am not sure why she did some of this, but some of you "real" cooks might be able to explain her process to me.

The first thing Mommie Katie did was to get out all of the ingredients and set them on her kitchen table. This much I remember in great detail because I loved them so! The ingredients included: whole milk, real butter, sugar, salt, fresh eggs, dry yeast, flour, and cooking oil. After selecting these items for her doughnuts, she prepared her large deep black iron skillet using either grease or Crisco—I am not sure which. There is one thing she did that I do not understand – she scalded her milk, or at least that is what she called the process. If some of you real cooks know why she did this, please let me know because it is a mystery to me. One other thing I remember is that she used two and a half eggs. I am not sure if she used the white of the third egg or the yolk. But I distinctly remember watching her separate the third egg and using only part of it. That too is curious to me. In a large bowl, she poured the scalded milk over the butter, sugar and salt. And then



mixture sit for a pre-determined time. Finally, she slowly added the flour and mixed the ingredients until she had formed a soft dough. She let it rise for about 45 minutes.

As the smell of the yeast began to filter through the kitchen, I always wanted to know how long it would be until we had hot doughnuts. I can hear her now, "David Joe, you must be patient - anything good is worth waiting for.'

Finally, she placed the dough onto a flour-covered cutting board and rolled it to a desired thickness using a long bottle that she always used as a rolling pin. I have no idea why she did not use an actual rolling pin, but that bottle stands out in my mind so clearly.

Then she cut the individual pieces into doughnut-shaped sections and carefully dropped them into the hot oil in her iron skillet. After about 2-3 minutes, she dipped them out onto a plate covered with a fresh clean towel.

The last step was to make the glaze that she "drizzled" over the warm doughnuts. I am not sure about her recipe for the glaze, but it included confectioners' sugar, water and vanilla extract - in what amounts I have no idea.

Oh, my goodness! How perfectly scrumptious they were with a cold glass of milk. They were my favorite sweet treat that Mommie Katie made in her kitchen. As I said before, the only doughnut that even comes close to hers is the Krispy Kreme brand.

Someone recently asked me how I remember the details of my past so well, and

By Don White Merchandise made by prison inmates a real steal

That Kentucky license plate on the back of your vehicle was made by a prisoner.

You may have known that already, but are you also aware there are dozens more items made by inmates that are for sale to the public?

Merchandise varies from furniture to clothing, and even includes a pencil drawing titled Calipari & The Gang.

The artwork depicting the University of Kentucky basketball coach and two players sits on an easel just inside the front doors of Kentucky Correctional Industries (KCI) in Frankfort.

The price is \$125.00, but the work program that "helps to fill the days" for inmates is "priceless," according to Nathan Lynch.

He should know.

The 41-year-old Louisville native was charged with murder following a two-vehicle crash that claimed the life of a 50-year-old woman five years ago. The charge was amended to second degree manslaughter.

A recovering alcoholic up for parole in October, he spends most of his time at the Frankfort Career Development Center.

For the past four years, the clean-cut and handsome man who looks more like a Boy Scout than a prison inmate in his tan clothing, has worked as a clerk at KCI.

Manning the front desk, he is usually the first person to greet visitors to the former Lowes building at 1041 Leestown Road.

A long row of numbers beneath the name imprinted on his shirt is the only clue to his being a prisoner.

"I had a woman come in once, take a look at my shirt and say..."You're a criminal, aren't you," he says.

While not hesitant to share the good and bad in his life, Lynch prefers to share the respect he has for the skills of fellow inmates while showing off the dozens of items on display.

Near his desk in the large showroom are elaborate office suites made at the Green

Sexual Assault Awareness Month focuses on educating both victims and the general public that sexual assault is a crime that has long lasting emotional effects, physical effects, economical effects to both the victim and to society, and can be prevented with everyone's involvement. Prices range from 7.25 for "genuine prison shirt" to \$1,790 for some handcrafted wooden office furniture. Wing back guest chairs can be purchased for as little as \$125.

Custom woodworking is available, and no requests are turned down, according to information printed in a KHI brochure stating....'If you can imagine it, we can built it."

One of the most popular services lately has been furniture refurbishing and upholstering, according to Lynch. He speculates the increase in demand may be due to the poor economy.

Shipping is offered to private businesses, but individuals must pickup purchases at KCI's central warehouse in Frankfort.

Warehouse hours are 8 a.m. until 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

--Raisa M. Gorbachev When I was a child, even though we did not have an abundance of money, we did have an abundance of blessings. I think I am able to remember the details of those days because they are so precious to me. The remembrance of watching Mommie make doughnuts and devouring them while they were still warm certainly ranks as one of the most precious. My mouth waters at the thought. But for now I will just have to settle for those from Krispy Kreme.

A Local Board, made up of Rockcastle Co. Judge Buzz Carloftis and other local govt. and charitable organizations will determine how the funds awarded to Rockcastle County are to be distributed among the emergency food and shelter programs run by local service agencies in the area. The Local Board is responsible for recommending agencies to receive these funds and any additional funds available under this phase of the program.

Under the terms of the grant from the National Board, local agencies chosen to receive funds must: 1) be private voluntary non-profits or units of government, 2) be eligible to receive federal funds, 3) have an accounting system, 4) practice nondiscrimination, 5) have demonstrated the capability to deliver emergency food and/or shelter programs and 6) if they are a private voluntary organization, they must have a voluntary board. Qualifying agencies are urged to apply.

Rockcastle County has distributed Emergency Food and Shelter funds previously with Daniel Boone Community Action Agency, Inc. participating. This agency was responsible for 134 nights of lodging, assisted 26 families with rent/mortgages and 30 families with utilities.





I <u>will not</u> have a family member on the payroll taking the place of a Deputy. Un-paid Deputies will be interviewed by myself and the Steering Committee to assure they are qualified in both law enforcement and people relations.

As Sheriff, I will go after money to hire more Deputies by pursuing additional budget, grants, drug forfeiture property and contributions.





The Great Fires That Changed Mount Vernon

The past few years have brought about a craze that is reaching new heights. There is a desire to discover our heritage as never before. Information about our ancestors, where they lived and how they lived has never been more in demand. Historical societies are cropping up, as well, as are ancestry sites on the worldwide web, and organizations specializing in family research.

There were two great fires that changed the face of Mount Vernon forever. There was at one time a Joplin Hotel on the site of the current Cox Hardware Store. The Cox Building was erected in 1907, so therefore the fire occurred prior to that. The fire was said to have started in the basement of the hotel, where a restaurant was located. The hotel had been built by Ashley Owens, and named for Doctor Josiah Joplin.

The fire that caused the most devastation was the fire that destroyed the old courthouse in 1873. The fire was of unknown origin, and was a bit suspicious in nature, making it a source of rumors for decades.

All of the marriage, death, land, and any other kind of record was destroyed. This was quite the blow to those searching for documents regarding their family. As a result of the fire, one must rely on federal census records, cemetery records, or records held by such organizations as the Historical Society. Some cemetery records are incomplete.

To make matters even worse, the 1890 census records were destroyed by fire in Washington D.C. in the early 1900s. The census records prior to 1850 list only the name of the head of the household, and only numbers other individuals living in the household with given age ranges such as "under 5", "5 to 10", etc. The dates of birth begin to appear in the census of 1900. No census records are in the public record after 1930, at the present. I assume it is due to the various privacy acts in effect today. However, the 1940 census will be made public in April, 2012. Remember, I'm always looking for a

pith inside them and whittling them into spouts to tap the sugar trees. And then following behind him as he took a brace and bit auger and reamed out new holes a few inches into the sides of the trees. The elderberry spouts were tucked into these holes and every bucket or was tub we could lay hands on were placed under the spouts to collect the sap that would pour from them this time of year.

The sap was collected, many gallons at a time, hastened to the stir off pan and after much care and patience, rendered off into a syrup that would form cakes of maple sugar if it was boiled to perfection and drained into ev-

By the time I was in 8th grade in 1962, I was helping Dad cut down and harvest every mature tree in the forest, including the sugar maples, for \$12 to \$15 per thousand board feet of projected lumber. And that harvest amounted to several hundred thousand board feet of ash, oak, poplar, maple, beech, hickory, hemlock, linden and other species until the hills were stripped of mature timber.

Since then, mining and gas and oil drilling have rendered the old place unrecognizable. I can't even begin to figure out where the old sugar camp once set and where ginseng grew there on the north slope and I tagged along with Uncle Stevie.

Our birthright sold for not much more than a bowl of

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ery tea cup on the place. I remember Mom saying that it too ten gallons of sap to get a single cup of sugar.

By the time I was 8 or ten years old, the old camp had been abandoned and we simply brought the sap down off the mountain and boiled it down in a number 2 wash tub behind the home place. Mom and my Aunt Nan stored most of this as syrup instead of letting it turn to sugar but after pap died, they soon decided that the work was way too much for the pay off. It was one of those old habits that didn't take much doing to set aside.

In the meantime, Pap was long buried, the farm had been split between several heirs, and nobody had much reason to consider the woods to be of the same value Pap had seen in preserving it.

porridge, the same way Pap had parted with the coal he did not know existed.

I realize this column has turned into crying over spilled milk, but when the land and it's natural resources are gone, it's really, really gone and if you have ownership of forest land, please consider turning it over to the Nature Conservancy or some other nonprofit who will assure that it goes and remains wild and free.

I promise you faithfully, that my Grand Pap would have given everything he owned away to preservation if he'd had an inkling about what was to come after he was planted. And if that had happened, we might still be able to make a small batch of maple sugar there in the head of Blair Branch.

The RCHS girls' track team won their 4th straight Class 2A Indoor State Championship title this past weekend in Louisville at the 50th Annual Mason-Dixon Games Indoor State Championships. The girls' defeated Lloyd Memorial, a strong rival from Erlanger, by a score of 69.5

to 63.5.

The girls' team has been undefeated during indoor state championship competition since their first indoor state title in 2006. They went on to repeat as champions in 2007. In 2008, the meet was cancelled for the first time in its history due to a foot of





plenty of comments on the new calendar but, in the end, the board approved taking four days of Spring Break, April 2nd, 5th, 6th and 7th as four make-up days and going to school on Saturday, March 27th and on May 29th, which will also be the last day of school as it stands now, if no more days are missed because of bad weather.

School Superintendent Larry Hammond told board members they could come up with a different schedule and "we will make it fly."

If the board had not of approved the new schedule, school would not have been dismissed for this school year until June 7th.

Mrs. Brown told the board that one of the concerns of going into June was the fact that many teachers are scheduled to go to summer school to continue their education and that colleges, mainly EKU, do not change their schedules.

Hammond, Brown and finance officer Richard Bray, also reminded the board that parents could take their children out of school at anytime, if they are willing to sign the proper papers. "It is totally up to mom and dad, if some students do not attend some of the make-up days during Spring Break," Bray said.

Mrs. Brown said principals are required to sign off on any requests made by parents.

Board member Mike Burdette, who said that he had already made reservations for his family in Florida for Spring Break as had other families, agreed that the board's decision was a "no win situation.'

Board member Anna Goff was the only board member to vote against the calendar committee's recommendation, although Chairman Martin Vanzant and board member Angie Stallsworth, also expressed their displeasure of the new calendar, mainly because of students having to go to school on Saturday. Board member Dr. Tina Hasty said she did not think there was a better option for the school system.

Some board members ked about extended days, but Brown told board members the the State Education Commissioner had made it very clear that extended days were not an option for school districts. Supt. Hammond also reminded the board that by going into the first week of June the RCHS track team, which will "no doubt" be competing in the state, would also be affected. And he said state law does not allow high school graduations before the last day of school.

For now, graduation will be held at RCHS on Saturday, May 29th, the last day of school.

The board also approved the school calendar for next vear.

The first day for students will be on August 5th and, if no school is missed because of bad weather, the last day of school for students would be May 4th.

The calendar committee also did not include a Spring Break for next year, but Mrs. Brown told the board that if the school system did not miss too many days, the calendar committee would ask the board to consider a Spring Break the week of March 14th through 18th.

State Budget

On Tuesday, a Kentucky Congressional House panel approved a \$17.5 million budget, which cut two instructional days for the state's public school systems.

Brown said, if the budget bill was passed into law, the local calendar committee would have to come up with another recommendation for the board to consider for the 2010-11 school calendar. The state currently requires 177 instructional days, which determines the amount of pay for school employees. The budget approved on Tuesday would cut the number of instructional days to 175, which would lower wages for state education workers thus saving the state money.

maximum of \$250,000 for employees' salaries.

In 2009, Houk paid her employees \$174,000 gross and Clontz pointed out that the \$235,000, approved by the court in January, would have allowed \$200,000 gross for salaries, or an average of \$40,000 per employee. Since only \$174,000 was paid in 2009, Clontz said his recommendation for 2010 was for a maximum of \$180,000 gross for employees' salaries plus \$20,000 for matching Social Security and \$15,000 toward employees' retirement for a total of \$215,000. Houk also received support from a Al DeChambeau who gave Houk's office high praise for their efficiency and professionalism and suggested that there should be "a meeting in the middle" (between Houk and the Court).

Michael McGuire, candidate for magistrate in the 5th District, asked the court why they were allowing their "accountant to override what you say." Clontz countered that the matter was only being brought up for discussion and he couldn't override what the court decided.

Houk's annual salary limit for deputies has been a matter of discussion for the court since January of last year when the court first lowered her request for \$250,000 maximum annual salary for employees to \$235,000 and Houk immediately laid-off two employees in her office.

The justification by the court at that time was that Houk's gross salary for her seven employees increased by \$40,000 in 2008, after rising by \$20,000 in 2007. Houk had estimated in her budget for 2008 that she would have approximately \$42,000 to return to the court in excess fees when, in actuality, the excess fee check to the court was for something over \$400. Houk defended this saying she had explained to Carloftis at the time that she had to upgrade computer equipment in her office and the excess fees had to be used to pay for that expenditure. However, that was countered by Carloftis who said that Houk received \$60,000 in supplemental income from the state that had not been figured in her original budget for 2008 and she had used that, plus an additional \$18,000 provided by the court, for the computer update and her excess fees would not have been affected if her salaries had not increased so dramatically.

In answer to the critics at the meeting, Carloftis said he did not understand why the court was being criticized so harshly since they were "obligated to be good stewards of tax money in the county."

On Wednesday, Carloftis noted that the fiscal court provided \$100,047 from the county's general fund to help with expenses in Houk's office and over \$200,000 to the sheriff's office in their 2008-09 fiscal year. After much more discussion, Magistrate Jan Stevens made a motion to accept Clontz's recommendation and lower Houk's annual maximum salary amount to \$180,000 plus \$35,000 for benefits. The motion was sec-

onded by Magistrate John Holbrook and passed unanimously.

Afterwards, Houk presented her unaudited excess fees report to the court, with the remark that her "under qualified and overpaid deputies" had managed to turn in \$31,923.12 to the court in excess fees for 2009

In other business, the court received a check from Larry Denny, representing KACo, for \$12,644.20, representing 11% of the premiums paid them by the county for alllines insurance, as a dividend.

The court also agreed to add 1056 feet on Doe Lane for county road maintenance and 739 feet to Red Bird Lane.

Jail Budget

The court also approved a preliminary budget for the Rockcastle Detention Center, presented by Jailer James Miller. Miller's budget for fiscal

year 2010-11 shows total receipts of \$1,178,162 and expenditures of the same amount.

The main income for the jail is \$766,000 estimated to be received for housing state prisoners and \$233,712 in supplemental revenue to the jail from the general fund.

The main expense items include \$435,000 for office/ supervisor staff, \$180,000 for food and \$98,407 for medical services.

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

The Rockcastle County Government provides that, effective July 1, 2008, the 1.5 % (one & one-half percent) Occupational Tax (Ordinance No. 23) applies to all individuals, employers, and businesses in Rockcastle County.

The provisions of the ordinance are:

- (1) 1.5% of each individual's gross wages, salaries and commissions earned within Rockcastle County.
- 1.5% of the net profits of every business from activities conducted (2)within Rockcastle County.

(3) Income reported on Schedules C, D, E, F, 4797 and 4835 may be subject to the local occupational tax.

For Business Entities:

(4) Income reported on ALL business returns are subject to the local occupational tax.

to our young people. So, what is the lesson we




A lifetime of shoes A few weeks ago my friend Lowell, who is a weekly reader of my column, suggested that I write about how shoes have changed since he and I were young boys. The topic struck a chord, and I began to consider how my tastes in shoes have evolved since I was a child living in Rockcastle County.

Even though we were not wealthy, it was the custom of my mother (Bee) (as it was in many families) to purchase a new pair of shoes each year just before the beginning of school. Of course, with a growing boy, I guess there wasn't much choice.

The first pair that I can remember were cowboy boots. I have a photo of me and Charles Shivel standing side by side at a very young age, and it clearly shows me wearing a scuffled pair of boots. That photo appeared in my senior yearbook for some unknown reason. We were probably seven or eight years old at the time the photo was made. From that time until I was in junior-high, I cannot remember any particular style for which I was fond with the exception of Converse All Stars, either low or high cuts. Most of my male friends wore the "Chuck Taylor" model. I think the girls were usually found in Saddle Oxfords.

When my brother Al turned 16 and started dating, he suggested that I purchase a shoe shine kit in order to keep his shoes shined. He agreed to pay me 50 cents each time I performed the task. (That wasn't bad money for the time period!) I immediately acquired a shoe shine box and started to work.

My grandfather (Pop) and my Dad both allowed me to keep their shoes in top shape also. I felt like the "Chattanooga Shoe Shine Boy." When all of their shoes were gleaming, I used my time to keep my own shoes cleaned and well polished. The experience paid off because when




Then I discovered Bass Weejuns, and for the rest of my high school and college career, they were on my feet. No matter where you were going, it was appropriate to wear your Bass shoes. It was even cool to wear them with no socks. Of course, Bee always made me wear socks but as soon as I got to school, off came the socks and into my locker they went. It was hard to remember to put them back on before going home, but I usually managed.

Sometime during my junior or senior year in high school, someone introduced me to a pair of dress, lace-up, wing-tip shoes. I just could not get used to wearing them. Most of the time, they remained in their box underneath my bed. Occasionally, Bee would make me wear them, especially for a special occasion - like to church or to a wedding or funeral. Notice I said she MADE me wear them! As soon as I came back home the weejuns went back on my feet.

Lowell reminded me that during our high school days, it was popular for men to purchase a brand of shoes called Thom McAn. They were named after the designer Thomas McCann. He copied many of the popular brands and sold the shoes at a reduced price, making them extremely fashionable. However, I don't recall that I ever owned a pair of those shoes.

Pat Boone arrived on television when I was a senior. As a direct result, "white bucks" became wildly popular and so I had to have a pair. I loved how they felt on my feet but could not stand how dirty they looked most of the time.









Kentucky-based band receibing national attention Cynthiana is getting some national attention.

No, we're not talking about the little county seat town in Harrison County.

Cynthiana is the name of a Shelbyville-based rock group voted February Band of the Month by Music Go Round, an on-line mechanism in which thousands of listeners rate bands

The group received a colorful three-page spread in the March edition of Shelby County Life, courtesy of publisher James Mulcahy.

Full of ironies, Cynthiana is made up of four young rockers who (irony #1) would rather crank out some "Sweet Home Alabama" or anything by Led Zeppelin than touch a Lady Gaga tune or see "How Low" Ludacris can go.

Cynthiana's credo, as listed on musicgoround.com:



"We are just four guys in or right out of high school in Kentucky that love old-fashioned rock 'n roll. Our main influences are Led Zeppelin, Tom Petty, Hendrix, CCR, Skynyrd, and many, many more. We feel our music reflects those bands and really gives a vintage sound to new American rock."

The community of Cynthiana, just north of Lexington, is the site of several Civil War battles, one of which was part of Morgan's Raid and lasted two days in June 1864, claiming some 2,000 lives.

That history prompted Reese Bors and Chad Meers to choose Cynthiana as the name of their studio project four years ago.

"In the beginning, when it was just me and him, ours was a kind of folksy, Southern, Bluegrass sound," Meers said. "We wanted something that represented Kentucky, and we thought Cynthiana was catchy."

Two years later, bassist Bors and guitarist/lead singer Meers added two younger members, Will Husband, then 15, and Alex Warford, 14, would play lead guitar and drums respectively.

Audiences not familiar with Cynthiana tend to be taken aback at first by some of the group's cover choices.

"I think the older crowd is surprised that we're so young but we'll play a Joe Walsh tune or a Beatles tune," Husband said.

"They're not expecting that."

But they also perform a lot of original tunes.

"Once we added (Husband and Warford), I started writing music that would compliment what they do....more band oriented music; not so much acoustic projects," Meers said.

Still, they remain true to their musical influences, musicians like Tom Petty, Santana, the Allman Brothers, the Eagles.

"When somebody asks me what kind of music we play, I have a hard time telling them." Bors said. "Sixties and 70s rock, but we're Americana, but we're folky, but we're rock. We're Cynthiana; you just gotta hear us."

tone songs...bluegrassy folk stuff....that's what I would classify my voice as. Will and Alex are more like classic rock style, so together it's kind of this folky, bluegrass, Southern rock band."

Husband registered Cynthiana at Louisville's Music Go Round to compete for Band of the Month, but he never really expected anything to come of it.

"I signed us up for it and forgot about it," he said. They had a thing on the wall to sign your band up. A month went by and I posted a picture and a link to our MySpace. Sure enough, come February we're the Band of the Month."

Some 200 bands compete monthly, Husband said.

"People just checked out our link and voted for us," he said. "We don't know how many, just enough to win."

The contest put them in a limited national spotlight, and prompted a big increase in hits on their MySpace Web site, www.myspace.com/ cynthianamusic.

"It's great exposure," Bors said.

The band records in the studio at Shelby Christian Church, where Bors and Meers met eight years ago. And although not a Christian band, Cynthiana keeps its roots close to the church.

"The songs aren't like 'We love Jesus,' but they're encouraging," Meers said. "We want to be a good example, but we don't want to be classified as just a Christian band. We want to go out into bars and stuff and reach people.

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



He won in 1992 for Best Country Collaboration with Vocals, and in 2000 and 2009 for Best Country Instrumental Performance. In 1998 Wariner won the Country Music Association's Single and Song of the Year awards for his #1 hit, "Holes in the Floor of Heaven," which was also the Academy of Country Music's Song of the Year in 1999. He joined the Grand Ole Opry in 1996. As a songwriter he has earned 16 BMI Country Awards and 15 BMI Million-Air Awards (for songs receiving over one million on-air plays). He was inducted into the Music City Walk of Fame in 2008 and the National Thumbpickers Hall of Fame in 2009. He started his own label, SelecTone Records, in 2003.

Neither have been arrested. Rockcastle Circuit Judge Jeff Burdette set their bonds at \$25,000 cash/ property.

The cases against the Bonds were presented to the grand jury by Rockcastle Deputy Sheriff Jason Kirby.

The Mt. Vernon police department presented several cases on Friday in which many local people were indicted.

Wilburn Lee Pittman, 26, of Mt. Vernon, who police say caused three different accidents on November 20th in Mt. Vernon, was indicted on two counts of second degree assault, five counts of wanton endangerment, a count of DUI and one count of leaving the scene of an accident.

Pittman is being held in the Rockcastle Detention Center under under a \$38,500 property bond. He is scheduled to be arraigned on March 26th

The case against Pittman was presented to the Grand Jury by Mt. Vernon Police theft of a controlled substance, first offense and trafficking in a controlled substance, third degree. Neither woman has been served with a warrant.


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












In her first high-profile effort since becoming First Lady, Michelle Obama will lead a national public awareness campaign against childhood obesity. It is a tough issue to tackle and more widespread than many Americans may realize.

Studies show that nationwide, 32 percent of children between the ages of 10 and 17 are overweight or obese. In Kentucky that number climbs to 37 percent giving us the second highest rate of childhood obesity in the United States.

A number of factors amplify the problem. Lack of physical activity and poor eating habits are two principal causes.

Here are some guidelines to help your child achieve and maintain a healthy body



1. Offer fruits and veg-

etables every day. Prepare them so they are tender but still crisp or offer raw vegetables as an alternative. Ask children to help prepare vegetable recipes. They are more likely to try new foods when they are involved in cooking them.

2. Invest in family mealtimes. Regular mealtimes promote better nutrition. For families that sit down together to eat, this means more fruits and vegetables, fewer fried foods and fewer high-sugar soft drinks. When children get the nutrition they need, it helps cut down on the desire for "empty" calorie foods.

3. Physical Activity Suggestions

Senate Week in Review...

By Ed Worley **State Senator** The most important bill that legislators consider during any session – the budget

bill - moved out of the House and into the Senate this week. In the coming days, we will consider the



House's \$17.5 billion spending plan. The Senate Appropriations and Revenue Committee in all probability will make some changes. The House plan has many encouraging components, particularly its emphasis on efficient State government. Government efficiency and transparency have been points of interest in the Senate lately, and House action on this front is an encouraging sign.

Our budget committee will be working with the House to achieve a final plan that will make government more efficient while providing the services our citizens rely on. With the veto period beginning in a few days (March 30), we will be busy. This may be the most challenging budget we have worked with, but I am confident we will be equal to the challenge.

Before considering the budget bill this week, we approved Senate Bill 175 that would improve the process by which State contracts are awarded each year. The Government Contract Review Committee reviews billions of dollars in State contracts, from engineering to health care to consulting. It is an effective control on State spending, because legislative oversight is crucial to our State government's system of checks and balances.

There are around \$250 million in State contracts each month that never receive scrutiny from elected lawmakers. SB 175 would eliminate many of the exemptions that allow this to happen as well as make sure that more personal service contracts, including expensive technology contracts, are reviewed by a panel of legislators. The effect will be a more efficient examination of the billions of dollars in State spending, from government agencies to our colleges and universities. In economic times like these, when taxpayers across the Commonwealth are tightening their belts, SB 175 will help the State reduce spending as well.

Another efficiency measure, House Bill 276, will help slim down the various boards and commissions that regulate industry groups from EMS providers to barbers. HB 276 will require these panels to justify their staffing levels, and if they do not regulate at least 100 professionals, they would use administrative services from the State's Division of Occupations and Professions, an umbrella body for all these groups. We have learned over the years that many government agencies grow as needs grow, but as those needs shrink, the agency may not necessarily follow. This bill, now headed to Governor Beshear, is a step toward getting maximum bang for our buck.

In 2008, we passed major legislation to protect Kentuckians from inappropriate relationships with people in positions of authority, from teachers to coaches to priests. This week, with SB 17, we added another group with sig-

nificant authority over others prison guards and other corrections employees. SB 17 makes it a Class D felony, punishable by up to five years in prison, for any prison or jail employee to have sexual contact with an inmate. Contract employees would also be covered by the legislation. Guards and other workers have tremendous power over inmates, and that position is one of trust. The Department of Corrections worked with the Senate to develop this legislation, so we are proud to help them keep the focus on prisons as a place to rehabilitate inmates, not punish them outside the bounds of the law.

With our budget constraints, we have to be frugal with our spending. At the same time, we are always looking for ways to recognize our country's heroes and show them our gratitude. This week, we tried to share a small token of our appreciation by passing three bills aimed at our veterans and their families that will bear only minor expense. These veteran-related bills are:

• SB 96 would permit the surviving spouse of a Purple Heart recipient to retain the special plate assigned to the veteran.

•SB 179 creates the Kentucky General Assembly Veterans Hall of Fame to recognize the active military and post-military achievements of outstanding veterans and to

spotlight all veteran's contributions to the civilian workplace. The proposed legislation would require the induction of all veterans who have earned the Medal of Honor; Army Distinguished Service Cross; Navy or Air Force Cross; Defense, Army, Navy, Air Force, Homeland Security or Coast Guard Distinguished Service Medal, or Silver Star.

•HB 106, which has been sent to the Governor to be signed into law, allows certain individuals with proper identification to receive a copy of discharge papers filed with a county clerk, rather than inspect those papers. This legislation also requires the Kentucky Department of Veterans Affairs to send an annual reminder notice of the confidentiality provisions re-

lated to discharge papers.

Kentucky's need-based programs include the College Access Program (CAP) Grant and Kentucky Tuition Grant (KTG). CAP grants may be used at all of Kentucky's public and private colleges. KTG awards may be used at Kentucky's private colleges. Students may apply for the CAP and KTG programs by completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid, or FAFSA, online at www.fafsa.ed.gov.

Perhaps the best known program is the merit-based Kentucky Educational Excellence Scholarship (KEES). Students attending certified Kentucky high schools earn college scholarships based on their yearly grade point average and their best ACT score. High school students who qualify for the free or reduced-price lunch program

apply for a KEES award. If they attend a participating Kentucky college, KHEAA will automatically send the scholarship money after the school reports that the student is attending classes.

KEES, CAP and KTG are funded by Kentucky Lottery revenues.

KHEAA also administers the Teacher Scholarship, Osteopathic Medicine Scholarship and Early Childhood Development Scholarship. Students may apply online for these scholarships through Zip Access.





Rose Hill Road sewer project main topic at council meeting

By: Richard Anderkin A fairly large crowd turned out for a special meeting of the Mt. Vernon City Council on Tuesday night, where only two items of business were on the agenda.

Those items were the over \$2 million Rose Hill Road sewer project, which will provide sewer service to 52 customers and a request from the Rockcastle Tourism Commission that the City of Mt. Vernon be the third party evaluator or government sponsor for a \$7 million grant application to the Federal Highway Administration. The grant will cover construction of the local tourism board's proposed tourist center, which would be built at Renfro Valley.

Several comments were made about the sewer project, but the most vocal citizen was retired educator Glen Vanwinkle, who lives on Magpie Lane (the former Rose Hill Church Road). Vanwinkle told the council that he could not understand how some residents, including he and wife, Marsha, would not be getting sewer service, when it was his understanding that the original plans, drawn up in 2008, included them.

Eddie Brown, an engineer with Kenvirons, Inc., the company who designed the sewer project for the city, explained to Vanwinkle that he may have been misinformed. Brown said he had had to design the project backwards so that the sewer lines would reach the dump stations.

Brown also said that, depending on the bids, more residents could possibly be added from the current funds.

Mayor Gary Cromer also told the crowd that the city would pursue more state and federal grants to add as many people to the city's sewer system as possible in the future.

With this said, I know all too well that many of my fellow RCHS graduates haven't been as fortunate as I became last month. While they haven't wanted to relocate, they have had to take their


skill sets to other communities where the opportunity presented itself for their use. This is why my primary objective is to create opportunities to bring our young people back to the area so that they can live, work, and

I think I visited every business in Rockcastle County in my '58 Chevy. It was also my responsibility to take photos of any business that wanted to include a picture. Because I loved that black Chevy so much, I would sneak it into the photos whenever possible.

During that time period, high school yearbooks were produced by what was called "cut and paste" methods. What that meant was we had to take each page and type the information on a regular piece of paper, cut the information, and paste it and the photographs on another paper to send it to the company. They reproduced those pages and printed the book from our layout designs. Most of the time, it was a very tedious process, but we had fun. In our minds, we were producing something equivalent to the Saturday Evening Post.

The advisor for our high school yearbook was the school librarian, Ethyl Owens. She was very patient with us and ran a tight ship. Every time we met as a staff, she moved from table to table watching the book take its final shape. I can hear her saying, "Oh that is such a good job. You all are working so hard!"

Following my graduation in May of 1962, I headed for UK the following Monday morning. That summer I



ism. Upon applying for a teaching position in 1965, I was told that the only available opening was to teach Chemistry, Biology, and be Advisor to the Yearbook. Of course, I grabbed the job without hesitation.

For the next 30-plus years, I taught Chemistry and Journalism in three different high schools in Kentucky: Campbellsville High School, Mt. Sterling High School, and finally George Rogers Clark (GRC) in Winchester. Each time I moved from one to the other school, the position of Yearbook Advisor was available. It seemed to me that it was simply my role to be involved in yearbook production wherever I taught. That was alright with me because I loved every staff that I put together.

While at Mt. Sterling High School, I had one particular staff who was very professionally motivated, and the book was the best one we had ever produced. It was entered in a national high school yearbook contest and won a firstplace award by the Scholastic Press Association. Occasionally, I get out a copy of that annual and read it from page to page, remembering each of the staff members and how hard they worked.

During the last dozen or so years at GRC, the computer age had arrived, making the process not only easier but far more professional looking. It became possible to view each page, including the photographs, to see exactly how it would appear in the final edition. We learned how to use individual fonts and type sizes to produce a book that was professionally designed. Some of my student editors had computer training when they became yearbook staff members and taught others how to layout and design wonderfully artistic pages. I was a very proud Advisor.

When I retired from education, I was given the opportunity to write columns for



All you have to do is tipsy-toe around in soft shoes or barefooted with a flash light and you'll find them. Sometimes they will be making love and you can catch two at a time.

If you are a fisherperson, you already know that night crawlers are the ultimate bait to thread on your hook and catch almost any fish in any lake or stream. I know that socalled "real sportsmen" shell out tons of dollars to buy all that artificial stuff at name your favorite place, but I also know that most of them buy a dozen live crawlers if they really want to catch a fish.

And they will lie about it. Fellow in the back of the boat will haul in a bass and the fellow in the front will ask what



A live night crawler, just in case, will catch more fish than all the artificial bait in the world. But I don't want to argue about it.

Problem is that night crawlers have to be kept alive and healthy. I have an old refrigerator in my garage and I can keep several dozen in a Styrofoam box up until mid June and after that they sort of wilt up and die. And they become hard to catch in the lawn after the first of June.

Junior Helton had a Honda gasoline generator that he used to make the lights come on in his barn or fire up any electric tool he might need out on his farm and one night we were watching television and this fellow was demonstrating how electrical currents could flow from pole to pole many feet apart. He was shocking fish by putting one pole it the water and another several feet away and the fish were jumping out of the water because of the electrical current.

Junior and I decided that if that trick would work on fish, it ought to work on night crawlers and we knew of a nearby pasture where we could catch one every now and again in dry weather. They'd sort of peep up all over the place but not come out of the ground. So Junior and I decided that if we put some copper pipes in the ground, twelve or so feet

Since this seems to be the most appropriate time, I want to take this opportunity to thank my readers and to say "keep on reading." I still have a list of possible column ideas that have yet to be published. Some of you have asked if you could make suggestions, and my answer is a resounding YES! I welcome all proposals. Come, let us brainstorm together – with enough inspiration, we may be able to maintain this arrangement for a considerable length of time.

My, oh my, wouldn't my journalism teachers be proud! Observe what Jesus promised the apostles in Acts 1:4-5, "And, being assembled together with them, commanded them that they should not depart from Jerusalem, but wait for the promise of the Father, which, saith he, ye have heard of me. For John truly baptized with water; but ye shall be baptized with the Holy Ghost not many days hence." And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance." Notice in these verses the pronouns "they", who is the "they"? Well the antecedent of "they" is the apostles in Acts 1:26. Further, those who spake were Galileans Acts 2:7, the apostles were all Galileans, Ac.1:11. Also notice in Acts 2:14a, "But Peter, standing up with the eleven ... " The passage did not say "Peter standing up with the one hundred and nineteen", "but Peter, standing up with the eleven." Thus we must conclude that only the apostles were baptized with the Holy Spirit here on the day of Pentecost. To be continued...



Are volunteers answer to leading task forces?...

Dear Editor.

In the last several weeks, I have taken great interest in the reading and hearing the "beliefs, values and commitments" that Sheriff's Candidate Ken Holt has shared with the voters of Rockcastle County, through both his ads and public address. After listening and deciphering, I now have a few concerns.

In Mr. Holt's March 10th address to the regular monthly meeting of the Rockcastle Unite Coalition, he stated his intentions to have both a drug and property crimes tax force. Mr. Holt clearly expressed

would only work property and drug crimes and the heads of these task forces would be volunteering their services to the Sheriff's Dept. My concern is how these task forces can productively operate when those leading them are only volunteers? Will these volunteers be willing to give all of the time that is required to investigate and pursue these cases? These are citizens in Rockcastle County who no doubt are willing to donate time for their community, but I know few qualified persons who will be willing to give the time and effort that is essential to investigating drug and property crimes. Drug investigations are tedious and deserve the attention of full-time deputies and not simply part-time volun-

teers. In Mr. Holt's sixth ad from his weekly series, he stated his commitment to using "unpaid responsible volunteers" to aid in performing the paperwork of deputies who spend "half their time" doing such paper work. I would like to know exactly what paperwork can retired teachers, who would volunteer as office staff, do for road deputies? The paperwork most closely associated with the work of deputies, such as case reports, collision reports and incidents reports, require the attention of sworn, trained peace officers. Deputies in the process of doing their job have paperwork that

simply must be done, by them, and that paperwork cannot be delegated to nonsworn staff, paid or unpaid.

I simply do not see that adding volunteer staff to ease the paperwork of deputies is an answer to, or even helping to, provide 24/7 coverage for the citizens of Rockcastle County. Neither do I believe that volunteers will be able to work in full-time capacities to investigate all drug and property crimes. I am not downplaying the importance of volunteers or their usefullness. I know and can appreciate the importance of volunteers but I also know that volunteers should only be used as a resource and not the entire solution to staffing issues.

Furthermore, I think it is important that my tax dollars are going to pay deputies who are trained well enouh to handle their paperwork in a timely manner as well as handling calls for service. As a voter, taxpayer and citizen, I have concerns wih a Ken Holt Sheriff's Dept. that would place such a large burden on volunteer staff. We Rockcastle citizens deserve better solutions than this.

ERWA lack of planning could spell failure...

The ERWA did not conduct any meaningful business at its regular March 16, 2010 monthly meeting. This should not come as a surprise to anyone, as this has been its pattern beginning with the tenure of the current ERWA president. This pattern helps explain why the ERWA does not do planning and why it is perched on the edge of impending failure, which will impact all ERWA water users.

Perhaps some improvements are coming in state legislation to force organizations, such as the ERWA, to open their meetings to the public and to set higher standards for their board members and operations. I recently had the chance to speak with Crit Luallen, the State Auditor, who is aware of how tricks are used by county judges to move money around to avoid public scrutiny in projects like the one involving the ERWA in an interlocal agreement in 2007. In this interlocal agreement the ERWA is presented as being a "public governmental agency" to get funds for a project.

Ms. Luallen recently conducted audits of the Kentucky League of Cities and the Kentucky Association of Counties, two organizations whose leaders seriously abused the use of public funds. These two organizations used the same flawed law that the ERWA does to exclude the public. Crit Luallen believes, as do I, if an organization depends on taxpayer provided grants and loans, as does the ERWA, it does not have the right to exclude the public from attending its meetings and watching and hearing its board conduct its business, as it guaranteed by Kentucky open meetings laws.

A bill is being developed in our legislature to correct the abusive practices that prevent public involvement. I will find out who the sponsors are of this bill so that you can urge them to pass this much needed legislation.


apart, spread the connectors and turned the generator up real high, the worms would come right out of the ground and be hauling ass across the grass in which case we would pick them up.

Higher education is necessary during tough economic times

Education is very important, both for teens and for society. Many students graduate high school, attend college, and then get a professional job. However, too many young people today are high school dropouts and many others do not plan to attend college or technical school upon graduating. Without further education or training, and lacking advanced knowledge or skills in a specific field, young people will fall behind in income and skills. As a result, their families will struggle financially.

For some the decision not to pursue education beyond high school is largely a result of parents or other family members who have not attended higher education. The lack of such a role model can be a major obstacle. Another hindrance can also be not having someone available who is familiar with navigating the application process for college or financial aid. If this is the situation, students can talk with the high school counselors or a teacher to learn about various opportunities for education and training beyond high school. The high school counselors also can help students with financial aid applications.

Some teens believe they cannot afford to attend college or technical school, so they never take the first step to further their education and training. Lack of money should not prevent anyone from attending college or technical school because scholarships such as the Kentucky Educational Excellence Scholarship (KEES), the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), and other student loan services are available. Many scholarships go unclaimed each year because students don't know about them.

The Kentucky Educational Excellence Scholarship is funded by Kentucky Lottery proceeds, and is available to students who earn at least a 2.5 GPA each grade year in high school. The better a student's grades, the more he or she can earn toward college or technical school. At the end of every year of high school, money based on the GPA is calculated toward a KEESeligible student award while attending college or other accredited postsecondary programs. In addition, KEES-eligible students can earn bonuses based on their ACT score. Receiving KEES money beyond the first year of higher education is contingent upon maintaining good grades. Scholarship money may be reduced or eliminated for the next school year if grades are not maintained. KEES money can be reinstated by improving grades.

In addition to KEES, other scholarship money and lowcost financial assistance is available. Be sure to find out what other options, such as scholarships, fellowships, and

other grants may be available. These can save money that must otherwise be repaid after college.

Young people decide to pursue education and training beyond high school for a variety of reasons. Improved career opportunities are clearly a major goal for many people. With the right type of degree, graduates can earn thousands of dollars more each year. Many also enjoy the creative learning environment, learning new things, and the opportunity to become independent. Going away to school especially helps young people broaden

Keeping pay raises in check should apply to everyone..

Dear Editor,

I applaud the Fiscal Courts effort to help working families by limiting the pay increases of clerks in the County Clerks office, as discussed in the Signal.

However after reviewing the records surrounding the \$12,000 raise the fiscal court clerk received, I have to question if this effort applies equally to everyone.

In December 2008 the fiscal court clerk made \$10.75/ hour (\$22,421/year). The clerk now earns \$11.75/hour (\$24,507/year), a 9.3% raise.

But this same clerk also recieved an additional \$12,000 a year for partially overseeing the occupational tax, despite the fact that records indicate that the tax work is done during the normal work day at the courthouse. If there is any weekly overtime the clerk recieves time and a half (\$17.63/hour).

This totals to over \$36,000



a year, a 62.8% raise. Although the July, 2009 minutes of the fiscal court did not record the individual votes of the magistrates, they do show that the motion for this \$12,000 increase was made by county judge execu-

tive Buzz Carloftis. I am happy to hear Buzz talk about, quote, be[ing] good stewards of tax money in the county, unquote (3.11.10 MVS). And I know that Buzz is a good man.





In Judge Carloftis' campaign add, he almost sounds like a benevolent father figure, as he enumerates the many ways that he has helped us. He begins the touting of all of his many accomplishments, by referencing, that free grant money. In fact, he states that it's the most grant money in our county's 200-year history. The way, Barack Obama is giving out stimulus money to the counties, and that combined with the tobacco money, how could it not be the largest receipt of grant money, in two hundred years? It is interesting how Buzz is taking credit, for that grant money that we got from the president. Most of the counties in the state, can lay claim to similar accomplishments, and to the receipt of similar grant money, and they didn't even have Buzz at the helm. Isn't it also interesting, that it was Buzz that made the motion to implement the county wide occupational tax.

Lets also look at how he has helped us at the business park. The SourceCorp building had to have access to US-150, in order for the owner to establish his business here. So in order to have access to US-150, they placed the SourceCorp building at a telescopic distance from 150. That of course created the necessity, for the construction of that lengthy access road. That way, they will also have some place to spend that quarter of a million dollars, of landscaping money. Common sense would have dictated the insistence, of placing the SourceCorp building at the intersection of 150 and old 461. That would have eliminated, the need for spending all of that money for that long access road, as well as the spending a quarter of a million dollars on landscaping. Should and if a company choose to locate here, the road could have been built in a way to accommodate the business, as the need arose. It should also be noted that the purchase of the twenty acres of land for the business park was \$900,000.

Several months ago, Judge Carloftis participated in a question and answer session with editor of the Signal. He was asked about his personal views on zoning. Instead of giving a direct answer, he chose to sit on the fence. His response was as follows "How can I possibly support or be in favor of something that I have never seen for Rockcastle County?" "Likewise how can I be opposed or against something that doesn't even exist?" It is obvious that his answer about zoning, was a politicians answer. He was asked about his personal feelings on zoning. In that same interview, he attempted to make us believe that the Development Board's effort to establish zoning, was something that took place eight years ago. Shortly after the Judge's interview, with the Signal, the Rockcastle Development Board included, in its 2009 recommendations, the recommendation that zoning and permitting be implemented. The citizens and voters of Rockcastle County need to know, that County Judge Executive Buzz Carloftis sits as an official member, on the Rockcastle Development Board. This is the very Board that is trying to establish zoning, yet Buzz implies that he just doesn't know anything about zoning. Does his answer sound reasonable and or even believable? Does he truly feel so uninformed about land use and zoning, that he doesn't feel at ease discussing it in public? The ideas that the majority hold in high esteem, should be the primary motivation in a public officials thoughts, when he formulates his opinions. Judge's Carloftis inability, or unwillingness to formulate an opinion on zoning, give him the latitude, that will allow him to make decisions in the future that do not reflect those ideas. In other words, if zoning comes across his desk after the election, he can sign it into law, without violating his word.

Judge Carloftis, your campaign add makes the inference that integrity and honesty are synonymous with keeping Buzz Carloftis. The citizens and voters, of this rural county are adamantly opposed to the implementation of zoning and permitting. Will you now come forward and tell the voters your true personal feelings and thoughts on zoning? Will you also vow, to veto any zoning, that may come before you? We also make the same challenge, to the magistrates that are running for re-election. Will you now please respond in plain language?





At the beginning of Tuesday night's meeting, Cromer announced that if the 52 resident affected by the sewer project signed easements, before the project was completely finalized, they would only be charged \$117.50, inBrodhead - Mt. Vernon Road, then along the 461 bypass.

The superintendent said that in order to serve the 52 new water customers there would be four pump stations, which would help move the sewer to the city sewer plant on Newcomb Avenue in Mt. Vernon.

The minimum rate for sewer service in Mt. Vernon is \$10.50 a month based on the use of 2,000 gallons of water.

Although the construction of the proposed Rockcastle Tourist Center (the Castle) was strongly questioned by council members Joe Mullins and Don Jones, the city agreed to be the third party evaluator in order for the Rockcastle Tourism Commission to apply for \$7 million dollars in funding from the the Federal Highway Administration and the Kentucky Department of Transportation.

Rockcastle Tourism Commission Director Susan Laws told the council that, because of the regulations involved in applying for the grant, the local tourism commission had to have a government agency verify that any funds received through the state and federal government were actually spent on the project.

Laws told the council that because the city of Mt. Vernon would benefit the most from the "Castle" project, she was asking them to be the third party evaluator. She also said that Rockcastle was the gateway to 47 other counties along Kentucky's scenic-byway and that she could go to any other governing body in those counties, but she wanted the city of Mt. Vernon to be a part of the grant process.

Laws also said that the feasibility study, recently conducted by the tourist commission, projected over 200,000 people getting off I-75 to go to the "Castle" and that Rockcastle County would have a conference center where local meetings could be held. Laws said it would be a huge asset to the county and create 100 jobs at various businesses, including the center.

The city will not be out any money if the grant is received, Laws told the council.

Councilmen Mullins and Jones both told Laws they had received many negative comments about the proposed construction of the "Castle,"/ tourism center but, in the end, council members Shelley Lewis, Sharon Saylor, Jackie Wayne Weaver, Wayne Bullock and Mullins voted for the city to be the third party evaluator on the grant application. Jones was the lone no vote.

Mayor Cromer said he put the tourism's request on the agenda for the special meeting because of the April 2nd deadline to apply for the funds.







"What Is Written"

Today we want to begin a study on the subject of Holy Spirit baptism. Let me begin by first affirming that there are only two historical cases of Holy Spirit baptism found in the N. T. the apostles in Acts 2 and Cornelius and his group in Acts 10. Observe what Jesus promised the apostles in Acts 1:4-5, "And, being assembled together with them, commanded them that they should not depart from Jerusalem, but wait for the promise of the Father, which, saith he, ye have heard of me. For John truly baptized with water; but ye shall be baptized with the Holy Ghost not many days hence." In Acts 2:1-4 we read of the fulfillment of this promise ten days after Jesus spake it Acts chapter 1, that the apostles were baptized with the Holy Spirit. "And when the day of Pentecost was fully come, they were all with one accord in one place. And suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting. And there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire, and it sat upon each of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance." Notice in these verses the pronouns "they", who is the "they"? Well the antecedent of "they" is the apostles in Acts 1:26. Further, those who spake were Galileans Acts 2:7, the apostles were all Galileans, Ac.1:11. Also notice in Acts 2:14a, "But Peter, standing up with the eleven ... " The passage did not say "Peter standing up with the one hundred and nineteen", "but Peter, standing up with the eleven." Thus we must conclude that only the apostles were baptized with the Holy Spirit here on the day of Pentecost. To be continued ...


