Judge/Executive candidates spar at debate/forum

The 2010 Rockcastle County Forum and Debate was held at Rockcastle County High School last Thursday night and provided information to help voters in the county make their decisions for the upcoming May 18th primary.

The debate was broadcast live over WRVK Radio Station and on the local access channel Monday.

The event was sponsored by the Rockcastle County Chamber of Commerce, in conjunction with the Rockcastle County High School Y-Club.

Arielle Reese, president of the Chamber of Commerce, welcomed the crowd and the introduction of candidates was made by Bethany Clontz, Y-Club president and Starla Bond, treasurer.

The debate between the two candidates for Rockcastle County Judge/Executive was probably the main draw of the evening for the approximately 300 guests in attendance at the debate.

This part of the program was moderated by Chief Circuit Judge Jeff Burdette.

The format for this part of the debate allowed for 1 1/2 minutes for the original response asked of the candidate, with the order of the questions received being determined by a coin toss at the beginning. After the initial answer, the other candidate was allowed a 30 second response with a 30 second rebuttal then being provided to the candidate the original question was put to.

Each candidate was also allowed a three minute opening and closing statement to the crowd.

Incumbent Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis was designated Candidate #1 by the coin toss and was allowed to make the first opening statement. better roads and a new jail. But, he cautioned, "there is a lot more to do," and the county has to have the revenue to do it. She also noted that the county had to borrow \$500,000 in 2007 for operating costs. She said she was worried about our county and our safety and that was why she decided to run for office.

Economic development in the county, the judge/ executive's and RCIDA's role in it was the subject of the first two questions.

The candidates took opposing views with Mrs. Hodges declaring for economic development being advanced primarily by private interests. Hodges said she would have RCIDA go low tech instead of high tech by contacting companies in New York and New Jersey to

Guilty plea in Lovell death

Jose Santiago Cuevas, an illegal immigrant with multiple prior DUI convictions, has pled guilty in the connection to the death of Sheila Lovell, of Mt. Vernon, according to Commonwealth Attorney Eddy Montgomery.

Appearing in Circuit Court and before Judge Jeffrey T. Burdette last Friday, Cuevas pled guilty to second-degree manslaughter; first-degree wanton endangerment; and first-degree criminal mischief.

According to Montgomery, on June 21, 2009, on

Hwy. 39 north of Somerset, Cuevas crossed the center line, swerving into Lovell's lane. Cuevas admitted at the scene to consuming up t o five beers. The Kentucky State Police lab put Cuevas blood alcohol level at .29, which is 3 times the legal limit.

Montgomery stated that he would recommend 20 years imprisonment for Cuevas' multiply felonies. Judge Burdette set final sentencing for May 13, 2010.

Montgomery noted that Lovell's family had endorsed the plea deal.

Wouldn't it be nice if there was a single place where the public could view the works of hundreds of Kentucky artisans?

That was a dream of Berea community leaders in the aftermath of a tornado destroying many of the shops in the quaint college town that had become the arts and crafts capital of the state.

A proposal was made to then Governor Paul Patton, and the dream became a reality in 2003 with the birth of the Kentucky Artisan Center at Berea.

The growth has been nothing short of phenomenal, according to Debby Giannini, assistant director of the facility located just off I-75 north of Berea.

"We had the works of 260 artisans on display when we started, and now we have 650," she says.

"It's a stop more and more people are starting to make," says Gwen Heffner, an information specialist who has worked alongside Giannini since the center opened. Although most come by to view the crafts, the center has also become a popular rest stop for travelers, including Dave Hunter. Author of the continually updated book, "Along I-75," Hunter has proclaimed the center has the cleanest and best restrooms on the interstate that spans from Michigan to Florida.

Lots of people have come to associate the center as a clean and economical place to pick up a quick snack or partake of a full meal featuring Kentucky cuisine.





From the well to the bottle

While doing some grocery shopping, I noticed on my list that we needed bottled water. We probably use about 24 bottles a week for just my wife and me. When I was young, it certainly never occurred to me that when I became a senior citizen I would have to purchase water in plastic bottles to drink. When I was just a boy, water from our well was used to quench your thirst - and it was delicious and cool and very refreshing.

During the early days living on our small farm in Rockcastle County, our only source of water was the well in the yard next to our house. The well was dug before I was born, but my brother Al remembers when it was constructed in the late '30's. He says, "Daddy had a man come to our house with a huge drill rig on the back of a truck. They had to bore through limestone to reach water." Al believes the well was approximately 65 feet deep. After reaching water, they had to place a metal casing in the hole to keep the dirt from caving in and contaminating the water.

The "bucket" that was used to reach the water was about four feet in length and only four inches wide. It was attached to a frame which allowed us to use a pulley with a rope to draw the water from the well. I can remember my mother (Bee) saying that the water was the best in the area and very sweet.

Both Al and I were required to draw water for the needs of our family. At least once per day, we had to fill two porcelain buckets that Bee kept in the kitchen for drinking and cooking. In one of the buckets she kept a dipper for us to pour water into glasses. The other bucket was used for cooking and cleaning in the kitchen.

When we needed to take a bath, water was drawn for that purpose at the time. The water was heated on top of our wood burning stove in the kitchen. Bee kept a large tub hanging on the wall outside the kitchen door to use for bathing. The tub was carried inside when it was bath time and placed near the kitchen wood stove when it was cold outside. At that time, we had no indoor plumbing, but Bee insisted that Daddy provide a sink in the corner of the kitchen so that she could pour waste water into it instead of having to carry it outdoors. The drain was constructed so that the water would empty in the yard outside the house. I distinctly remember the grass in that area being very green, and it grew extremely fast. My grandparents also had a house on our farm that they had built long before my parents lived on the property. Pop

Our great friend and neighbor, Dan Ledford will be 92 years old in July. Dan is like family, having hauled our kids on his school bus from the time they were in kindergarten until they graduated high school. On a clear day you can stand in Dan's back yard, there high on the hill above our valley, and see our house through the trees down here in Lowell Branch, but you can't look up the hill and see his even though we know just where it is.

Dan drove the school bus through our end of the county until he was in his eighties and the school board finally forced him to retire. Problem was (for the Board of Education) that he kept passing rigorous and regular physical examinations including hearing and evesight, blood pressure and all sorts of other physical and emotional examination tests that folks half his age could not replicate. For several years, after our kids had graduated high school, Dan always made a point of honking the bus horn when he drove by our place in the mornings and afternoons, whether or not we were outside.

After his wife, Laverne, to whom he had been married for more than 60 years, passed away several years ago, it seemed to me that a lot of life also went out of Dan. In fact, he can scarcely mention her name right now without welling up. His grief for her is easily the deepest I have ever witnessed. And their love for each other was a marvel to behold when I visited their home or saw them out together.

For many years Dan would call me up at least once a week late in the evening to share a political joke. He was, and still is, particularly fond of picking on Hillary Clinton. But he was, and still is bi-partisan. Republicans bore the brunt of Dan's one liners as frequently as Democrats. The jokes were often risqué and better left out of your newspaper but most often they made me laugh out loud.

Several years ago Dan jokingly asked me when I was going to write him up in the paper and I told him I was going to wait until he died because he might shoot me if I told the truth. He shook his head and told me that he'd never make the paper because he was sure he'd out live me.



I'm confident if the fiscal court was convinced that the need was real, and they would see big payoffs, in their actions they would be more willing to help.



friendly argument ensued as to the exact wording until someone noted that he was sure Dan had it right.



"WHAT IS WRITTEN"





The Cook Family Comes Through Cumberland Gap (continued)

Last week, we left off with the Sherman Cook family going back to live in Little Sycamore Valley after spending some time in Georgetown, Kentucky. This story is intended to depict the life and times of a typical rural mountain family a few years prior to 1900 who would retrace their steps back through the Cumberland Gap to Ken-



to William Campbell, and lived there about four or five years. The house sat near Little Sycamore Creek, where Jane set up her wash kettle and battling board, which was a forerunner of the brass or zinc-coated washboard.

The cabin's main room was of log construction, and was sixteen or eighteen feet square, and contained three doors. The fireplace was made of local fieldstone. There was a lean-to kitchen, and a lean-to bedroom. In the rear, there was still another lean-to bedroom. One of the bedrooms contained a trundle bed. Around the house was a fence made of split chestnut or red oak boards about four feet high, and pointed at the top to prevent chickens from flying and landing on the top, and getting over the fence.

In the winter, there was a lot of activity around the hearth. Corn and beans were strung on threads, and hung to dry. It was the season for neighborly gathering, and the enjoyment of each other's company. It gave the young folks a chance to do some courting. Games such as "Thimble-thimble-who's-gotthe-thimble" and a dance similar to a square dance, "Skip To My Lou, My Darling", was enjoyed.

One night, some of the family had been to the community Baptist church, where a protracted meeting was being held, otherwise known as a "revival service", these days. The altar call had been made, when suddenly, from outside the church building a



choir of voices burst forth in song, and seemed to circle around the building. It was a well-known altar call song entitled "He's Calling For Me Now". Some went outside to find no one there.

It was getting harder for Sherman to make a living. Very little work was available to supply the family's needs, and when there was any work, it paid only in the form of bacon, flour, or decreased the debt to the store. One day, in the summer of 1906, Hiram Thacker came for a visit. He and Jane's other brother, George, had bought several acres of wooded land near the Wilderness Trail in the Big Hill country of Rockcastle County. The Big Hill Coal Company had sold them the

virgin timberland for a dollar an acre. Sherman and Jane were asked to move there, and Sherman was to help work the timber. After their fall harvest was gathered in, Sherman and Jane prepared to move again to Kentucky.

This time, when Sherman and Jane traveled to Kentucky, it was by train that picked them up in Tazewell, Tennesee. They changed trains in Cumberland Gap. A recent tragedy was fresh in the minds of the local people; it was the caving in of a trestle over Lonesome Valley, which caused the train to jack-knife, and killed several people. A folk-song had been written about the wreck, and the Cook family looked forward with interest to seeing the site

where it had occurred.

In the early afternoon, Sherman, Jane, and the children arrived in Wildie, near the junction of the Roundstone, Clear Creek, and Renfro waterways, later the site of the famous Renfro Valley Barn Dance. Wildie was a thriving railway center in Rockcastle County. People also received freight in Wildie, and hauled it up the different valleys to the little stores.

Meeting the train at Wildie were Hiram Thacker and his brother-in-law, Jim Pennington. They were married to the sisters, Nora and Mary Owens, daughters of Granville Owens, a store-



May is Osteoporosis Awareness and Prevention Month Getting Enough Calcium

Presented by Dr. Karen Saylor

Today's woman hears plenty about calcium. She needs to eat lots of it--1000 to 1500 mg. a day. Calcium is not only important for the bones, but also is necessary for the teeth, normal clotting mechanisms and for numerous other cellular functions.



How does a woman get enough calcium in her diet? Dairy products are one of the best sources of calcium. Milk, yogurt and hard cheeses are quite high in calcium and one serving provides about a quarter of a woman's daily calcium needs. The milk can also be used in puddings, soups, in baked goods or as ice cream.

For people who have difficulty digesting milk, the lactase enzyme can be added to the milk, or acidophilus milk can be used because the lactose sugar is pre-digested. Yogurt is also well-tolerated in most people with lactose intolerance. It is an excellent source of calcium since it is a concentrated form of milk.

The cheeses highest in calcium are Swiss, Cheddar and American Cheese. Another good source of calcium is fish which are canned with the bones, such as sardines or salmon. Oysters also provide ample amounts of calcium.

Vegetables which are good sources of calcium include collard greens, cooked spinach, mustard greens and broccoli. Most dried fruits and almonds are very good.

The natural sources of calcium are best-always try to get calcium from healthful foods. If you are unable to get enough calcium from your diet, it can also be taken as supplements or as other forms of medicines such as the calcium containing antacids. These are available without a prescription, but check with your doctor to be sure they are right for you.



structure, and was attended in a July to Christmas school year. Sherman eventually rented another farm about a mile from there. Sherman farmed a few acres of corn, made a garden, and worked timber. In 1912, Sherman bid on a US mail route, called "the Star Route", from Climax to Boone's Gap on the L&N Railroad, a distance of eleven miles each way. There were two country post offices, where mail was delivered and picked up each day. Cook-Turner, (Edna Sherman's granddaughter, relates that her mother, Laura, remembers the tales of Sherman playing his dulcimer while on the mail route. He later performed at folk music festivals at Renfro Valley.)

After a long illness, Jane died on October 14, 1914. She had complications from arthritis that weakened her heart, and she died at the age of 43.

Eventually, Sherman married Delia Griffin, and had several children, including Henry Harrison Cook, who was born in Rockastle County, and who married Laura Allen. Harrison and Laura had four children: Edna, Dale, Larry, and Stanley, which brings us to the present day.

This is how the Cook family came to Rockcastle County.





Yards to Paradise

By Max Phelps Large Trees for the Large Yard

As you consider a landscaping plan for your home, or perhaps just want a shade tree or two, be sure to keep the plantings balanced according to the size of your home and the lot. For the big home and the big yard, you'll want to plant some big trees. (At least some that will grow to become big trees, even if you wish to economize and buy smaller trees to begin with.)

One acre or more of yard will look even larger with some big trees. Typically, we want a focal point in the landscape. We may wish to frame the house with trees. Perhaps, we just want a big tree for the shade. (Try to resist planting a row of maples or oaks across the front or down the property line, as well as lining the driveway with a row of Bradford pears—these practices accomplish none of the above.)

For the two story (and

taller) home, shrubs and flowers just don't get the job done of making the yard look good, balanced or well-landscaped. A tall narrow tree may be best at the corner of a tall house on a small lot. Design one or more "whopper" or spreading trees into the plan if your yard is lots bigger than the home.

With these points to guide us, what are some large trees we might use? Though there are additional possibilities, I have some pretty and big trees I wish to mention for your consideration.

Maple trees are a mainstay in both rural and urban landscapes. They come in many varieties, still yet, maple trees are over-used and I feel the choices landscapers recommend should be more diverse. Here are some maples for your consideration: red maples (from the tall/narrow "Armstrong" cultivar to the tall/wide/fast growing "Autumn Flame" hybrid), sugar maples, Norway maples and Shantung maples.

Oak trees are generally large trees. From a live oak in the south to a burr oak in zone 6 and northward, you can have monsters a hundred years from planting time. Scarlet oak, red oak, shumard oak, pin oak and willow oak are all good landscape trees in the right situation. White oak and swamp white oak are also excellent giant specimen candidates.

If you want a stately evergreen tree, consider Deodar cedars. Newer clones of varying sizes have been bred so there are choices for all yards with this lovely evergreen from Asia. The blue Atlas cedar is a native option.

Other evergreens could be southern magnolia, Norway spruce, white pine, Douglas fir—and if you're really patient—the American holly. Blue spruce, Serbian spruce and cryptomeria could also fill the bill.

The dawn redwood is the preferred option (except in swampy locations where a cypress is better) if you want the evergreen look in summer and a leafless tree in winter.

For those who want the yard grasses to grow up to the trunk, consider planting ginkgo, Kentucky coffee tree, sweet gum, catalpa, sycamore or the common hackberry. Ash trees also, but there's a borer epidemic.

Beech, and the magnolia already mentioned, will kill grass under them, as will most pine, spruce and fir trees.

Basswood is a huge American native tree that has become rare in the wild. (It's wood is used for things like strawberry cups and baskets of many kinds as thin pieces of it's wood bend without breaking.) Black (wild) cherry and the horsechestnut are also candidates for the yard where you have the space. Tulip poplar can work well in a big yard—just not

Subscribe to the Signal so close that a big limb could break and hit the house.

Think of the shade a tree will create, wind break value, think of it's strength to resist wind and ice storms, can it handle pollution or compacted soils, can it cope with 24/7 lighting (sycamore trees, for instance, have colorful bark and can handle poor soils and air pollution, wet conditions and drought, but perform rather poorly where bright street lights keep them from "sleeping" at night).

Consider things like messiness, fruits, fall color, winter interest and benefits to wildlife. Berries are a blessing to migrating birds, thick evergreen boughs can protect birds, deer, etc., from cold snowy conditions. Peeling or colorful bark or interesting limbs can be an inspirational attribute of a leafless tree.

Big homes deserve some big trees. Surely some of the trees I suggest will enhance and make your place look more lovely, warm and welcoming.

GEAR UP Want a good job? **Do well in English classes**

wonder "when will I ever use this stuff?'

Even employees who don't sit behind a desk all day must be prepared with good English skills when they enter the workforce. "English classes are designed to train students in critical thinking and comprehension skills," says Joe Robinson, Recruitment Coordinator at Tokico in Berea. "On the job, being able to analyze a problem and come up with a solution are imperative to success."

That's just the beginning of why employers value what students learn in English classes. Robinson, as well as Steve Lawson (Human Resources Manager for NACCO Materials Handling Group in

High school students often Berea) addressed some of the specific skills students learn in English class and how they are utilized.

> When students do research papers, for example, they are learning how to find the information they need. Robinson says this is important when someone is looking for a job. These skills can help the job seeker learn about companies they might be interested in. It can also lead to more specific information, like what a company's reputation is like in the community.

Once someone is hired at NACCO, Lawson says, "Employees are asked to be a subject expert." At times, they already possess the knowledge they need. On other occasions,

they must do research to learn. Lawson points out that although there's myriad information available online, it's not all reliable so employees must be able to discern what is useful and what isn't.

Good verbal communications skills are also crucial. Robinson says they come into play as soon as a potential employee contacts the human resources department. "That initial conversation will determine whether or not the company would want to bring them in for a more formal interview," Robinson says. Once invited to an interview, a potential employee must answer questions such as how they respond to stressful situations, what are their strengths and weaknesses, what are their career goals and more.

Although how well someone presents him or herself during the interview is important in getting hired, Robinson says the ability to communicate well becomes even more important on the job. "Being able to communicate with their supervisor about potential quality issues, machinery performance, all the way down to inter-communications with coworkers and support staff is key to ensuring that the company produces quality parts for our customers," he says.

"Across the board each and every employee needs to be able to have effective written communication skills in order to succeed," he says. Although an employee who runs machinery may not do a lot of writing daily, if he or she wants to move up in the company to a leadership or managerial job, then it will be imperative to have the skill to write e-mails, hand-written notes, memos and other documents.

Lawson agrees that writing is important. "Everything is through PowerPoint these days," he says. When employees are asked to give presentations, they will use PowerPoint, which requires good written and verbal skills.

NACCO employees also deal with requests for information. "They generally have a small amount of time to respond effectively. Being able to work quickly will make or break their success and their ability to achieve," Lawson says. Therefore, employees who are confident with their

communications and reading skills will be able to launch into their tasks without hesitation.

Robinson says employees at Tokico also use reading skills daily. Being able to read and understand instructions, part changes, product changes, etc. are vital to safety and quality, which the company relies on to meet its customers' needs.


Lawson also emphasized the ability to read and comprehend quickly. If someone doesn't have good reading skills, he says, he or she will fall behind and not receive a promotion. "In the world of manufacturing, everything depends on quick turnaround to stay competitive," he says.


"To me, high English skills present a level of competence," Lawson says. If he has concerns about a potential employee's English skills, then he questions their skills in other areas, too. So students who want to impress potential employers can begin by becoming a serious English student.



Learn to be credit smart

Once you start paying bills, you start building a credit score. If you have a history of paying bills late, it will be reported to credit rating agencies and affect the interest rate you pay on credit cards, car loans, apartment deposits and even your insurance. When you get a bill, pay it on time — every month.

A credit score is based on your payment history. Credit scores are used by lenders to help determine if applicants qualify for a credit card, loan, insurance or service. Most credit scores estimate the risk a company incurs by lending money or providing a person with a service — specifically, the likelihood that the person will make payments on time in the next two to three years. Generally, the higher your credit score, the less risk you represent.

Some people think you need a credit card to build a credit score. But if you open your utility accounts in your name instead of your parent's name, you can work toward building a credit score in six months.

A late or missed payment stays on your credit report for seven years, even if the creditor has been paid in full. It is better to start off on the right foot by establishing checking and savings accounts, using your credit cards sparingly and paying all of your bills on time.

kindle possible interest for coming here since those states are among the highest taxed in the country and "people are leaving there in droves."

Meanwhile, Carloftis came out strongly for RCIDA, calling it an "absolute necessity. Carloftis went on to say, "We must have a seat at the board, on the state level, to attract industry... and that local people must invest in the county to encourage industry to locate in the county."

Mrs. Hodges agreed that it was the job of the RCIDA to bring jobs to the county but she disagreed with the county's allocation of 40% of the occupational tax revenue to the Industrial Development Authority when, she said, the state had only recommended 25% and that the state probably though it was "somewhat foolish." She also said that, if elected, she would reduce the percentage to 25%.

Carloftis rebutted that it was amazing that his detractors never complained about the \$2.1 million that had been spent on roads but only complain when "I am trying to get jobs in the county."

When asked what their plans were to create an environment that provides more job opportunities for the citizens of Rockcastle County, Mrs. Hodges said one of the first things she would like to see done is for school children to be taught more civics and the constitution in the classroom which would "help us more in the long run" and said she thought Kentucky Highlands Development could be used to acquire more grants and use their expertise in forming entrepreneurship "to help students learn to depend on themselves and not the government." She also mentioned forming a mentoring group in the county to give students exposure to other opportunities in life rather than bad behavior.

Mrs. Hodges called it the recipe for doing things the same way they have been done for many years – depending on someone else to do for us rather than relying on ourselves.

As to how Rockcastle County is perceived in FrankHodges, in effect, called him out on the answer, telling the audience that Carloftis had never said before that he was against zoning.

In the same area, the next question dealt with restrictive land use and how the candidates saw the county's future with or without land use planning.

Carloftis called for common sense being used and said you could not allow someone to build a drag strip in the middle of a subdivision, instead you have to have common sense regulations. Ms. Hodges said that Jim Holton had said in a fiscal court meeting that any industry coming into the county would want to know who their neighbors would be and, to her, that would restrict the use of her property but she did agree that county ordinances might be used to control some areas.

Taxation and grants were then discussed with Mrs. Hodges saying that while she did not think the occupational tax could be abolished, the rate could be cut by reducing spending to the one-half cents she said the state recommended originally. "I do think there are other ways to have money in the county ... I am looking forward to cutting the occupational tax rate for sure," Hodges said.

As to grants, Hodges said that grants would have to be obtained at times but she didn't like being in debt and grants would have to be obtained when the county could afford to pay their portion of any matching grant.

On the two issues, of taxation, Carloftis said that if you really want to go back to the 1930s and not move the county forward of have operating funds for the county you would do away with the occupational tax. He also said the state required the county to levy the tax. Carloftis said he was for going after grants and would always be trying to obtain grants especially for water lines, roads, industrial park and recreational facilities.

As to whether or not the candidates' plans for the county involve making changes to attract and create job opportunities, better recreational facilities, shopping districts and ball parks for our citizens, Hodges said her

Hodges question to Carloftis asked him how much the county was in debt. Carloftis started the answer by saying that when he came into office, the county was \$6 million in debt but there was no money to pay obligations because property taxes had not been raised for 27 years. He also noted that the indebtedness included state obligations and obligations including for the annex which was listed as a county obligation but was paid by the state.

In response, Hodges said the county was \$12 million in debt with payment due each year of \$800,000. On rebuttal, Carloftis denied this saying that the annex, Western Water, Eastern Water, and some fire departments all owed part of this debt and repaid the county monthly for the payment.

In their closing remarks, Hodges went first and told the crowd that this campaign experience had been "wild and wonderful." Hodges said people had been very gracious and she would always "value and be proud of you as citizens." She also pledged to always treat voters as individuals and value their thinking but most of all, she said she wanted to keep the county free that citizens did not need to be forcibly changed. "We don't need debt that will put us in jeopardy," Hodges said.

Carloftis thanked the voters for the trust and confidence that has been placed in him for the past 17 years – making him the 4th longest serving judge in the state. He said that although we owed more now than 17 years ago, the difference was that now there was \$5 in the coffers for every \$1 of debt whereas 17 years ago there was 98c for every dollar. He pointed out that state law does not require a county to provide for fire departments, ambulance service, library or for Little league but he asked, "do you want to live in a community without this?" In his opinion, Carloftis said the last time Rockcastle was progressive was 90 years ago when the Rockcastle Better Roads Society was instrumental in bringing U.S. 25 through the county. "After that Rockcastle quit investing in themselves while other counties continued and we helped them do it by driving there to work."

fort and Washington and their plans for maintaining and building upon those relations, Carloftis answer first saying that for the first time, Rockcastle County has decided to make an investment in the county by investing \$2.7 million in the SourceCorp building and \$2.5 million in needed infrastructure at Business Park South. The \$2.7 is being repaid by SourceCorp's lease payments and the bulk of the \$2.5 will be repaid by \$1.7 million in grants from the state.. Mrs. Hodges said she would be interested in good relations with the state but not so much with Washington at this time.

Land use planning was the subject of the next two questions – simply asking the candidates if they were in favor of land use planning when possible in the areas of locations for salvage yards, quarries and landfills.

Mrs. Hodges said she felt that zoning may be of use in the city but she was definitely not in favor of countywide zoning. She added that people were being attracted to the county because they wanted to get away from zoning. "Zoning hinders productivity," Hodges said.

Carloftis again reiterated that zoning had never been brought before the court and never even discussed by them. However, he did say that he felt there should be some protection for private property.

In her rebuttal, Hodges accused Carloftis of not giving the voters a "straight answer" and said if he were re-elected there will be zoning.

Burdette called once more for a definitive answer to the question of for or against planning and zoning and this time, Carloftis said that although he felt there must be some protection for private property he had said several times that he was not for zonplan would be to encourage private enterprise to develop areas for ATVs/4wheelers, waterways, boating, etc. which would return money to the county. However, Carloftis said that private enterprise would be better if helped by local government. He said the county was presently planning for new recreational facilities and helping the horse camps in the county to provide opportunities and recreation for young people.

The question of whether the county should be involved in tourism in the areas of Renfro Valley, Lake Linville and Cedar Rapids, Carloftis said that the county had never been involved in the castle project at Renfro Valley that this was a project of the City of Mt Vernon and the Tourism Board with the cooperation of Rep. Hal Rogers. But he said the court did wish the city and tourism board well on the project.

Hodges said that people in Washington were inclined to push projects on counties and she felt that an attempt would be made ultimately to get the county involved.

Just before the closing remarks by each candidate, the candidates were asked to submit a question to each other to be answered. Mrs. Hodges went first to answer Carloftis' question as to whether or not she though it had been a good idea 12 years ago to spend \$1.2 million dollars to expand the jail, as required by the state.

Hodges said it was probably not a bad idea but she has often noticed that the jail needs funds but would have to see what the cost to the county would be to farm inmates out or building the jail, figuring in the cost of the interest and comparing the two.

Carloftis said that the cost to house prisoners in Danville when the jail was being expanded was \$30,000 a month from Rockcastle taxpayers.

Kentucky in Washington, D.C.

All six candidates in the May primary for the 34th District State Senate seat were present. The three Republicans who will face off in the primary are: Jared Carpenter, Dr. Kent Kessler and Barry Metcalf. All three proclaimed themselves a "true conservative" dedicated to working for smaller government. Kessler made his time a little more personal - telling the crowd that they needed to vote for who they thought could win in November. Metcalf, who once held the seat, reminded the crowd that he had a 100% Pro Life voting record and supported the Second Amendment – the right to bear arms.

The three Democrat candidates for the office are: Mike Cope, Landra Lewis and Lee Murphy. Cope said he was running because it was important to elect people to office who were grounded in their values as he is. Lewis advocated investing Kentucky dollars in Kentucky small businesses and Murphy spoke about his heavy involvement in Democrat party affairs and jokingly asked for the support of the "four or five Democrats in the crowd."

Only three Constable candidates – two from the 4th District – were present to speak, along with Delno McClure from the 2nd District.

All five incumbent magistrates were on hand, along with nine of their challengers. The incumbents laid out their accomplishments while in office, including blacktopping roads in their district and getting rid of almost all gravel roads and wooden bridges. 





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Dinner with a Doctor **Doctors discuss Age-Related Macular Degeneration**

May is Older American's Month and this month's topic of Dine with the Docs will provide important information about a leading cause of vision loss in Americans 60 years of age and older.

"Age-Related Macular Degeneration" (AMD) is the topic of discussion for the Tuesday, May 11, meeting. The meeting will be held in the Lake Cumberland Regional Hospital Conference Center on the basement level of the East Tower. A specially-discounted dinner will be available in Chatters Café at 5:30 p.m. EDT with the program to follow at 6:30 p.m. EDT. The public is invited to attend.

AMD affects the sharp, central vision necessary for seeing objects clearly, or doing such everyday tasks as reading and driving. In some cases it advances so slowly people notice little change in their vision, however, in others the disease progresses quickly and may lead to loss of vision in both eves.


If you suffer from age-related macular degeneration, if you have a family history of AMD, or if you would just like to learn more about this disease, this month's program will definitely be of interest to you.

The featured speakers are ophthalmologists Mark Huffman, M. D. and Jacob J. 



Hartman is a military police member with five years of military service. He is the son of Bobby D.



Tips on flood damaged vehicles **Attorney General warns** against price gouging

Attorney General Jack Conway is putting Kentucky businesses on notice that price-gouging will not be tolerated during times of emergency. Gov. Steve Beshear recently declared a state of emergency in the wake of this weekend's severe thunderstorms that resulted in flooding and widespread damage across the Central and Eastern parts of Kentucky. Additionally, four deaths were also blamed on the severe weather.

"My thoughts and prayers are with the families who lost loved ones as a result of the severe weather," said General Conway. "Be assured, my office stands ready to investigate and prosecute anyone who seeks excessive profits during emergency situations. Those who have fallen victim to this storm should not be victimized again by unscrupulous price-gougers."

The emergency declaration issued by Gov. Beshear triggers several consumer protection measures that will remain in place for 30 days. Among them, it empowers the Attorney General to investigate and prosecute, where appropriate, those who sell gasoline, generators, building supplies, chain saws, hotel rooms and other necessary goods and services at a price grossly in excess of the prices at the time of the emergency declaration unless the sellers costs increased as well.

Attorney General Conway provides the following tips to consumers needing storm repair or clean up services:

•Never pay in advance for repair work or materials. Scam artists often take advance payments from consumers and never return to complete the work. If an advance is needed to purchase materials, offer to purchase the materials yourself;

•Use local, reputable contractors for repairs, if possible. If local contractors bring in out-of-town workers, ask who will be responsible for their work if it is not satisfactory;

•Ask if the contractor is licensed, bonded (if required by the city or county), and insured;

those who offer repair work at unreasonably low prices. Contact local law enforcement about your suspicions.

Mold remediation is also a concern for victims of flooding. Public health concerns associated with water damage include mold mitigation and prevention, carbon monoxide exposure and proper food handling and storage. For more information visit http://tinyurl.com/ 2bb74ys.

Kentuckians should utilize the following tips if their vehicles have suffered water damage.

•Check your oil. A reading of an oil level that is too high may indicate water in the engine. Do not start or run your car, it could cause severe damage. Contact your insurance company immediately. Comprehensive coverage of a vehicle includeslosses other than collision, such as flood, fire, theft, vandalism, falling objects and colliding with animals

•If you have a car loan, notify your lender of the damage.

•Act quickly to determine the vehicle's current NADA average prior to the flood damage. Owners will need to know this when dealing with an insurance provider, and perhaps, in dealing with any lender.

•Determine how high the flood water reached on your vehicle. If the water reached the midpoint of the tire, there may be severe damage to electrical systems generally located along the bottom of the floor. Some experts consider the vehicle a total loss if this area is flooded.







<u>Kentucky Afield Outdoors</u> **Planting for Wildlife**

With the last frost date fast approaching, now is the time to get started on seasonal plantings for wildlife.

This includes food plots, stands of warm season grasses, legumes, such as clover, and preparing soil for plantings later in the year.

A field of sunflowers, planted for dove hunting in the fall, is one of the most common food plots. You should plant sunflowers no later than the third week in May so fields will begin attracting local birds as the seeds ripen.

"You want ripe, mature flowers by the second or third week of August," said Rocky Pritchert, migratory bird program coordinator for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

Hunting for mourning doves in Kentucky traditionally starts Sept. 1.

"We recommend opening up (mowing) about 25 percent of the field by mid-August," said Pritchert. "As opening day approaches, mow additional strips in the sunflower field, to spread seeds on the ground."

Field preparation in the spring should start with plowing, and then disking the soil until the plant bed is loose. Pritchert highly recommends a soil test to determine whether the field needs fertilizer.

If you do need to fertilize, 20-10-10 (20 percent nitrogen, 10 percent phosphate and 10 percent potash) is a good choice. Apply it at the rate of 200 to 250 pounds an acre. Apply fertilizer then lightly disk it into the ground about a week before you plant.

Black oil sunflower seed – the kind used in birdfeeders – is a good choice. The seeds are small, and a 50-pound bag is inexpensive compared to the price of sunflower seed that has a certified germination rate.

Sunflower seed should be planted with a corn planter or drilled into the seed bed to a depth of about 1/2 to 1 inch. Rows can be 20 to 40 inches apart. Broadcast seeding rarely gives the desired results because it is difficult to control weeds between the sunflower plants.

Dovas are particular about

life, especially quail. Ben Robinson, a wildlife biologist with the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, recommends a 2to 3-year rotation of plantings. "Say you have three acres of winter wheat, then the next year you would re-plant one acre of wheat, and leave two acres fallow," he said.

Fallow areas provide shelter for quail chicks. "They can find room to move underneath the cover, and some seeds of native plants will sprout in the area where the soil has been disturbed," Robinson explained.

In pre-settlement days, grasslands covered an estimated 3 million acres in the state. Warm season grasses, such as eastern gamagrass, switchgrass, big bluestem and Indiangrass, provide food and overhead cover for rabbits and quail. Deer also use stands of tall grass for bedding areas.

Site preparation is important. Prior to planting, treat the area with an herbicide if necessary to rid the area of fescue. Warm season grasses, which can reach heights of 5 to 8 feet, actively grow once soil temperatures reach 65 degrees. Plant these grasses in the spring.

"Broadcasting is a good way to sow warm season grass seed," said Robinson. "It creates a sparse, less dense stand of grass, which gives rabbits and quail more room to move."

Established stands of legumes, such as clover, can last for 2 to 3 years and provide a food source that deer, wild turkey and small game will use from early spring until heavy frosts kill back vegetation in the fall.

Clover builds soil nutrients, attracts insects – an excellent food source for young turkeys – provides high-quality forage, and grows tall enough to offer cover for young rabbits.

Clover thrives in welldrained, sunny fields with moderately fertile soils. Since clover grows best in soils with pH levels between 6.0 and 7.0, you may need to add agricultural lime if the soil is too acidic.



Doves are particular about the fields they'll visit. "It's important to cultivate between rows, to keep weeds to a minimum," said Pritchert. This gives birds easy access to bare dirt between the rows, where they can dust their bodies and forage for seeds that have fallen to the ground.

Food plots ranging from one to five acres are the recommended size to concentrate deer and wild turkey for viewing or hunting. Plant each plot in a long strip near escape cover, such as woodlands or brush. Corn, left standing, is an excellent winter food source for deer.

Chufa, a bunch grass with a peanut-like tuber, is a favorite food of wild turkeys. It matures in about 100 days, in early fall. Buckwheat is another top crop for turkeys. Birds readily eat the large black seeds produced when this leafy plant matures.

Annual grains, such as winter wheat or rye, make good food and cover for wild-



President Obama declares Rockcastle federal disaster area

U.S. Congressman Hal Rogers (KY-05) announced that President Obama has authorized a federal disaster declaration for 11 counties throughout Kentucky that were devastated by severe flash flooding, tornadoes, mudslides, high rains and water damage beginning on May 1, 2010 and continuing. This is in response to Gover-

nor Beshear's initial May 3, 2010 request. Immediately following, the Kentucky congressional delegation sent a bipartisan letter to President Obama in support of the Governor's request.

"I applaud the President for declaring a federal disaster in counties throughout Kentucky, including Rockcastle and Rowan, so that our affected families and communities now have access to federal funds to help with the clean-up from these devastating storms," said Rogers. "The damage from these torrential rains was overwhelming and this declaration will begin the process of cleaning up our schools, homes, and businesses. There are many challenges to overcome as we move forward, but this declaration is a step in the right direction." The counties being declared a federal disaster area and designated for Public Assistance (available to state and local governments and certain non-profit organizations for repairs/emergency work) include Allen, Hart, Lewis, Logan, Metcalfe, Monroe and Rockcastle Counties. Casey, Lewis, Lincoln, Logan, Metcalfe, Rockcastle, Rowan, and Woodford Counties are eligible for Individual Assistance (available to individuals and households for certain storm-related services/repairs). Other counties may be included as additional damage assessments are completed. All counties in the Commonwealth are eligible to apply for assistance under the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (available to state and local governments and certain private non-profit organizations for actions taken to prevent or reduce longterm risk to life and property from natural hazards.)

Individuals and local governments claiming a stormrelated loss and seeking assistance from storm damages should contact the Federal **Emergency Management** Agency (FEMA) at (800) 621-3362 or TTY (800) 462-7585 for persons with speech or hearing disabilities. Addi-

I would like to say thanks and congratulations to all of the individuals who participated in the political forum and debate on April 29th. Those who are running for office should be commended first of all for their willingness to file for their respective offices but also for being willing to participate in a forum where the public can gather and hear all of the platforms, opinions and ideas that each candidate has. Public speaking can be very nerve racking and intimidating, but I thought that all of our candidates did a good job and that each one represented themselves well.

Many thanks also to the Chamber of Commerce, Y Club, Debate Committee and RCHS officials for sponsoring, organizing and hosting the event. It is team efforts like this that make our community a great place to live. Also, I appreciate Judge Jeff Burdette for agreeing to moderate the debate. This was a tough task, but I thought he did a good job of keeping the candidates on point and kept the flow of the debate moving.

I thought that the questions that were asked were all very appropriate. Several of the questions had to do with economic development and

more specifically the role that the Rockcastle County Industrial Development Authority (RCIDA) plays in our local economic development efforts. The format of this debate didn't allow the candidates to have notes with them so every answer or comment they gave was from memory. That being said, there were some comments and statements represented as fact regarding the work of the RCIDA that were either partially or altogether incorrect. As the current Chairman of the RCIDA, I would like to take a moment to correct some of these issues.

THE FACTS

It was implied that the South Business Park Project has excessively put the county into debt that it will take many years to pay back. There are two parts to this project. The first part is the construction of the building that is being leased by SOURCECORP. The cost on the site prep and construction costs for this building were \$2,886,982. We borrowed \$2,700,000 from Community Trust Bank for this part. The current balance is \$2,538,517. The monthly principle payment on the loan is \$16,071.43 and the monthly lease payment paid

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



During the time I was attending Mt. Vernon High School, my mother (Bee) and I lived in a tiny house that was located on the small farm owned by both her and her parents (Pop and Mommie Katie). The two houses were situated on either end of the property. After my high school graduation and leaving for the University of Kentucky, Bee decided to move in with Pop and Mommie Katie so that she could take care of them and not have the expense of maintaining her own home.

That week I drove around Lexington looking for just the right pet for my mother. I was absolutely sure Pop would never consider having a dog or cat in his house so I had to be somewhat creative with my selection.

The second pet store that I visited had several birds on display. I asked the manager if he could recommend a pet for a lady my mother's age. His face lit up and he said, "I have just the right pet in mind." He showed me a baby blue parakeet that was approximately six months old. He explained, "We have been working with this bird, and he can already say several words including: Hello, Hello Baby Want a kiss?, and the word Treat." I was so glad the bird already had some practice speaking. I purchased the bird and lots of supplies for Bee. In the book that I bought to accompany all the supplies, I learned that parakeets are highly affectionate and intelligent. It included information about how to train them to speak several words. Males can easily acquire a large vocabulary – sometimes up to 100 words. Parakeets love to climb, and I provided Bee with lots of toys, perches, and a cuttle bone to keep its beak in shape. 

by the tenant is \$25,395.83and the lease term is 7 years. The entire lease payment is being applied to the loan each month. Our goal is to have this debt paid off in about 9 1/2 to 10 years. In order to accomplish this goal it will require all of the cash flow received from the tenant and the occupational tax received from the jobs created by the tenant to be applied to the debt each year. The second part of the

project is the acquisition of land, construction of the new access road, construction of all utilities, etc. This part is not completed yet, but in the end is expected to cost \$3,132,457.41. The RCIDA has received three grants for this part of the project totaling \$2,058,000. Keep in mind that you do not have to repay grants. First we received a \$420,000 grant from the Economic Development Administration (EDA). This is a restricted grant to be used for the construction of the utilities, i.e. conduit, water and sewer lines, lights, etc. This grant requires \$180,000 match from the RCIDA. Or in other words this is a 70/30matching grant meaning that for every dollar spent on this work up to \$600,000 the EDA will reimburse the RCIDA 70% up to \$420,000. The second grant we received was from the Kentucky Cabinet for Economic Development's Access Road Fund in the amount of \$338,000. This money was for the specific purpose of the cost associated with the construction of the access road from Henderson Drive in front of B&H Tool back to the new building. This grant cost the county nothing. The third grant we received was from the Kentucky Department of Transportation in the amount of \$1,300,000. This grant was for the construction of the access road from Henderson Drive to Hwy. 150, the construction of the new turn lanes off of Hwy. 150, conduit for lighting on the highway, etc. This grant cost the county nothing. So, at the end of the project there will be a balance of \$1,261,439.51 that the RCIDA and the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court will be obligated to debt service. To summarize, you have the first part of the project that has a current debt of \$2,538,517 that is being serviced by cash flow from the tenant of the building that hopefully will be paid in full within 10 years. The second part of the project will have an estimated balance of

\$1,261,439.51 that will have to be serviced by cash flows available from the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court. So, in other words you have a \$6,019,439.51 project in which the County will be servicing \$1,261,439 or 21% of the total cost.

Another point that should be addressed regarding this project is the issue of landscaping. It has been stated and implied that the RCIDA has committed to spending an excessive amount of money on landscaping the park. This is not true. While it is true that at some point there will be some landscaping and signage done on the park, nothing has been done to this point. This part of the overall project will have to be advertised for bids just like every other phase has. So, we will not know how much this will cost until we have received and opened bids, which again, has not happened yet.

The second thing I would like to clarify is that the RCIDA does not receive 40% of the occupational tax receipts each year. It is true that the Fiscal Court allocated 40% of the total occupational tax receipts to economic development. They did not allocate 40% to the RCIDA and the Fiscal Court does not give the RCIDA a check equivalent to 40% of the occupational tax revenue each year. The RCIDA must submit a request for any type of funding that they may need and then it is up to the Fiscal Court to approve or deny the request.

Lastly, it was implied that the RCIDA was spending money to have the hay cut at the South Business Park by bidding the work. This is not correct. We will be paid by the winning bidder for the hay. This is an income stream, not an expense.

These are just three of the issues I heard that I felt like needed to be corrected. It is important to the RCIDA that as it pertains to the work we are doing, the public have accurate factual information.

The RCIDA is working very hard to try to create an environment that will be conducive for job creation and retention. This takes time and effort and many tireless hours by many volunteers. The RCIDA welcomes all ideas, input and suggestions that anyone may have. We meet the first Monday of every month on the 3rd floor of the Rockcastle County Courthouse at 11:30am. In the 200-meter dash, Michaela placed 1st in 26.3 seconds, while Samantha placed a close 3rd in a season's best 26.72 seconds.


Jessica, Laura, Lacey, and Kira placed 2nd in the 1600meter relay in 4:28.05.

In the Third District, incumbent Billy McKinney faces one opponent in the primary, Alan B. Cromer and Troy H. Cromer, a Democrat, will face the winner in the fall.

Jan Stevens, incumbent Magistrate in the Fourth District has no opposition in the primary. However, in the fall, he will face the winner of the Republican primary for which six candidates are vieing. on the horse riding trails in the county." The Judge went on to say that the intent of the court's action was to keep 4wheel riders from being ticketed after they park in Rockcastle County and ride through the national forest into Jackson County which has opened all their county roads to ATVs.

The question of whether or not the roads could be opened to local riders only as brought up but was quickly shot down by County Attorney Billy Reynolds who said it would be illegal. Philbeck said that people from out -of-state had become aware of the court's decision and were coming in to ride here and "they don't spend a penny here, they even bring their own gas." Philbeck's wife, Rosalind added that out-of-state people that had been coming to their horse camp had told them "they wouldn't be back (because of the ATVs)."

Carloftis said that the court noted, when the motion was passed, that if the action created a problem, it would be readdressed and he reiterated that again.

Philbeck then told the court that he was "asking, respectfully, that you rescind this motion today.

Carloftis told the magistrates that he would entertain a motion that the original motion be rescinded but none was forthcoming from the magistrates.

Also on the subject, it was brought up whether or not the ATV had to be licensed and insured. After the meeting, Carloftis looked again at the statute governing the vehicles on public roads and found that the driver must have a valid operators license but had to contact the state attorney general's office as to whether the vehicle itself must be licensed and insured. As of late Tuesday, he had not received an answer.

Carloftis once again laid out the restrictions on operating an ATV on a public road. Besides a valid driver's license, they include: wearing a protective helmet, at least one headlight and two taillights (in use at all times) on the vehicle and operation shall be restricted to daylight hours.

One of the items of business, including Carloftis telling the court that the county's help had been requested for four water projects -- two each for Western Rockcastle Water and Eastern Rockcastle Water. The projects include extending water lines on Mullins Station Road and the Hummel Road and Eastern's projects include extensions on Wolf Creek Road and Green Pond Ridge.

The Mullins Station Road project will involve securing a permit from CSX Railroad that could cost as much as \$10,000. Carloftis said. Some of the other expense to the county will include in-kind labor by county workers.

The Green Pond Ridge project, estimated at a cost \$155,000, and the Hummel Road project will both include pump stations and, Carloftis said, engineering work had been started and the two water associations hoped to secure state funding through Rep. Danny Ford and Sen. Ed Worley.

This information drew a reaction from Gary Mason who told the court that he felt the court should cut off funding for Eastern until they opened their meetings to the public, including their water customers.

However, Carloftis pointed out that the court had no control over Eastern since they were viewed as a private entity. The county can obtain low interest loans for the association when are paid by the county and the county is then reimbursed by Eastern.

County Attorney Billy Reynolds even ventured the opinion that Eastern was not subject to the Open Records Law.

The recent severe flooding in the county was also addressed by Carloftis who told the court that he had declared the county in a State of Emergency which had brought several federal and state teams into the county to begin assessing the damages to pubic and private property.

Carloftis said that private contractors were being hired to deal with damage to public property and three bills were presented to the court by Carpenter's Custom Bulldozing and included \$5,855 for work on Wolf Creek Road, \$760 on the McCollum Road and \$90 on New Hope Tower Road.

These bills must be paid by the county before they can be reimbursed 88% - 75% by the federal government and 13% by the state.

Carloftis said that four contractors were presently working on damaged public property: Clifford Collins, Goff Excavating, James Carpenter and Gary Mink.

He told the court that he did not know when the county might be declared a disaster area by the state which would make assistance available from the federal government. However, late Tuesday afternoon, Rockcastle was declared a disaster area, one of 11 counties in the state (see separate story on front page).

In other action, the court approved releasing \$2,000, the last of the coal severance funds awarded to the Mt. Vernon Rescue Squad, for the purchase of a boat to be used in water rescues;

Approved a donation of \$500 to the City of Brodhead for their Dix River Festival, and

Approved reimbursement of \$3,008.83 to the Brindle Ridge Fire Department for 90% of their utilities for January, 2009 thru June, 2009.



and humid conditions and spreads by making spores.

"Though mold is almost always present in the air, it grows best in damp areas where humidity levels are high," said William Hacker, M.D., DPH commissioner. "The recent heavy rains throughout the state caused significant flooding, and many homes experienced water damage. This is a concern for homeowners not only because of damage to their home, but also because problems due to mold may result if left untreated.'

To recognize the signs of mold, look for discolored walls possibly showing water damage, or green or black spots apparent on walls. Mold also has a musty, earthy smell or a foul stench. Allergy sufferers tend to be most affected by mold exposure.

To decrease exposure and reduce mold in the home, DPH recommends that homeowners keep the humidity level of the home between 40 and 60 percent. The use of an air conditioner or dehumidifier may be used to achieve a lower level of humidity. Always use exhaust fans when showering and cooking. Mold inhibitors for paint are also available from home improvement stores.

When cleaning up small areas affected by mold, use protective glasses or goggles. DPH also recommends wearing rubber boots and waterproof gloves, and washing clothing afterwards. If there is a heavy mold growth area, you may wish to use a basic respirator or suitable mask to prevent breathing the spores.

Other recommendations include:

Ensure that the area is well ventilated before beginning

Remove all previously soaked porous items that have been wet for more than 48 hours and are not able to be cleaned and dried

- Disinfect hard surfaces; a solution may be mixed of 1 cup of household bleach with 1 gallon of water.

Contact a mold heit or lower.

"If you are not sure a particular food is cold enough, take its temperature with a food thermometer," said Delius.

DPH recommends limiting the opening of freezer and refrigerator doors, even if an appliance has been out but returns to function within a couple of hours. If the freezer is not full, DPH strongly advises that poultry and meat items be grouped away from other foods to prevent juices from contaminating other items.

When the refrigerator and/ or freezer are operating again, follow these guidelines to decide what to do with foods:

- Refrigerated foods should be safe as long as power is out for no more than four hours.

- Throw out any perishable food in your refrigerator, such as meat, poultry, lunchmeats, fish, dairy products, eggs and any prepared or cooked foods that have been above 40 degrees Fahrenheit for two hours. Bacteria can multiply to unsafe levels under these conditions.

- Fresh fruits and vegetables are safe as long as they are still firm, and there is no evidence of mold or sliminess

If an appliance thermometer was kept in the freezer, read the temperature when power comes back on. If the appliance thermometer stored in the freezer reads 40 degrees Fahrenheit or below, the food is safe and may be refrozen.

- If a thermometer has not been kept in the freezer, check each package of food to determine the safety.

- If the food still contains ice crystals or is 40 degrees Fahrenheit or below, it is safe to refreeze.

- Raw meats, poultry, cheese, juices, breads and pastries can be refrozen without losing too much food quality.

- Prepared food, fish, vegetables and fruits in the freezer can be refrozen safely, but food quality may suffer.

"Remember, you can't rely on appearance or odor of the food to determine if it's safe," said Hacker. "Food that has thawed or was held above 40 degrees Fahrenheit for more than two hours should be thrown out because bacteria may multiply to unsafe

remediation consultant for severe mold cases.

In addition to mold concerns, DPH staff also cautions people to keep food safety in mind if they have been affected by power outages. This includes keeping freezers closed to maintain the proper temperature for frozen foods. A full freezer will hold the temperature for approximately 48 hours and for 24 hours if the freezer is half full.

Health officials remind Kentuckians that a refrigerator will only hold its temperature for about four hours, meaning food items such as milk, dairy products, meats, eggs and leftovers should be placed in a cooler surrounded by ice if the outage lasts for more than four hours. Dry ice can be used to keep refrigerators cold. If the outage lasts for several days, 50 pounds of dry ice should preserve food in an 18-cubic foot full freezer for two days. (You must be careful when handling dry ice. Never touch dry ice with bare hands or breathe its vapors in an enclosed area. Dry ice is frozen carbon dioxide, a gas.)

"Situations like this emphasize the need for emergency preparedness in the home," said Guy Delius, director of the public health protection and safety division in DPH. "Food that is improperly stored or handled can lead to foodborne illness, which can be debilitating and in some cases life threatening.'

If left without power, purchase one or more coolers, ice and a digital, dial or instantread food thermometer, DPH recommends. Public health guidelines also recommend keeping appliance thermometers in the refrigerator and freezer, no matter how long the power has been out. The refrigerator temperature should be 40 degrees Fahrenheit or below; the freezer should be 0 degrees Fahrenlevels."

To remove spills and freshen the freezer and refrigerator, DPH recommends washing with a solution of two tablespoons of baking soda dissolved in one quart of warm water. To absorb any lingering odors, place an open box or dish of baking soda in the appliance.

People should also be aware of potential risks from walking or working in flood waters. Contact with flood waters is not a risk for tetanus by itself. However, in special circumstances, people exposed to flood waters may be recommended to receive a tetanus vaccination. Unclean flood waters can pose a risk for tetanus to those who have open wounds that come into direct contact with such waters. While most people in this situation will have already been vaccinated against tetanus, a booster vaccination is recommended for those who with open wounds who have not been vaccinated in the past five years and are working in flood waters. More frequent boosters are not indicated and have been reported to result in an increased incidence and severity of local adverse reactions. For questions about whether tetanus vaccination is recommended, contact your regular health care provider or your local health department.

What are molds and where are they found?

Molds are fungi that can be found both indoors and out. They are found almost everywhere in the environment, and can grow all year long. They grow best in warm, damp, and humid conditions, and spread by making spores. These spores may survive harsh environmental conditions which normally do not support mold growth.

In the home, mold is almost always present in the air. It will grow best in damp areas where humidity levels are high, such as in bathrooms or basements. Molds are very common in the home, and while there are perhaps thousands of species of mold, most of the common indoor molds include Cladosporium, Penicillium, Alternaria, and Aspergillus.

How can I recognize mold?

Moldy walls and ceilings may be discolored, or show signs of water damage. Green or black spots may also appear on the walls. Mold also has a musty, earthy smell, or a foul stench.

How are people affected, and what can be done to decrease exposure?

Allergy sufferers are those who are usually affected the most by mold exposure. Symptoms usually include nasal congestion, itchy or watery eyes, wheezing, or skin irritation. More severe reactions may include fever or shortness of breath. Those who have medical concerns regarding mold exposure are urged to contact health care provider.

To decrease exposure, and reduce mold in the home, it is best to keep the humidity level of the home between 40% and 60%. The use of an air conditioner or dehumidifier may be used to achieve a lower level of humidity. Always use exhaust fans when showering and cooking. Mold inhibitors for paint are also available from home improvement stores. These are additives which when mixed with the paint, will stunt the growth of mold on walls.

How can I test for mold in my home?

Remove all previously soaked porous items which have been wet for more than 48 hours and are not able to be cleaned and dried. This includes car-It is generally unnecessary for concerned homeowners to pet and carpet padding, upholstery, wallpaper, drywall, test their homes for mold. floor and ceiling tiles, insula-Determining the species of tion, clothing, paper, wood or mold present will not assist with the health risk assessfood. For more severe cases, or with severe mold infestation, the homeowner may want to consider contacting a mold remediation consultant. A listing is provided with this informational packet. Always be sure when hiring a consultant to check references of previous work.

How do I keep the mold from coming back?

The key to mold pevention is moisture control. For flooding damage, ensure that the home is properly cleaned and dried out by using the aforementioned steps. For small spots, make sure to remove the source of moisture. Mold cannot grow without a source of water. By removing the water source, the homeowner can ensure that the mold growth will not return. If mold growth persists, the homeowner may want to contact a mold remediation professional for further advice. Moisture can also be hidden in the home, and this may be the source of the problem.

What is "toxic mold"? The term "toxic mold" is not correct. Certain molds may produce toxins which are referred to as mycotoxins, but the molds themselves are not toxic. The bottom line with mold contamination is that all mold should be removed from the home, regardless of what type it is. Any mold may have the potential to cause negative health effects if left unchecked.



"We plan to partner with local and area healthcare providers to give Rogers Scholars a complete, in-depth look at many of the career opportunities and professions in the health sector," Melton said. "We realize students need to begin thinking about and preparing for their career whether that is in healthcare or another profession—well before they graduate high school."

Participants—all rising high school juniors— will represent their home communities at one of two week-long summer sessions of Rogers Scholars planned for June 27-July 2 and July 11-16.

Since 1998, approximately 699 high school students have graduated from Rogers Scholars, and potential scholarships valued at more than \$7.2 million have been offered to graduates by 16 participating colleges and universities.

The program, named after U.S. Congressman Harold "Hal" Rogers (KY-05), continues to support his vision and ultimate goal "...that no young person will have to leave home to find his or her future."

All expenses, except travel to and from the host site, are provided free of charge to participants and their families.

Lake is the son of Scott Lake and Karla Lake of Berea.



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Yards to Paradise

There exists quite an array of sounds that are thought of as therapeutic; and topping the list are the sounds of water-be it ocean waves crashing on the shoreline or a waterfall that trickles or roars or a babbling water brookand the sounds coming from songbirds. Other sounds people find uplifting and soothing include wind chimes, wind in the tree tops, even wind whistling in the winter.

A crackling campfire or a flickering flame in a fireplace, firepit or chimenea produces a "warm cozy" feel, is mesmerizing to look upon, and many find the sounds very soothing.

Leaving sights and smell for another time, let's discuss ways to incorporate therapeutic sounds into our lives, homes and landscapes.

There are, of course, tapes, CD's, computer software of everything from "white noise" to tropical waterfalls with songbirds singing to Eastern healing music such as available at New Earth Records. Relaxation and relief of tensions from overly busy, stressed daily lives is truly healthful in a society that seems completely insane sometimes. Classical, Celtic, Irish and Calypso music are found by many to be relaxing sounds also. Even AC units and fans can mask disturbing nosies and be considered relaxing.

Landscaping to incorporate soothing sounds of various types is the main point I want us to focus on a carefully selected wind

at the moment.

Some folks are blessed to live by the ocean where they can open a window to the roar of ocean waves. Some can hear a charming mountain stream with waterfalls from their cabin. For some, just a fire in a fireplace is enough to unwind by at the end of a long workday.

The sounds of running water, followed by bird songs and the crackle of a fire are considered universally to be sounds for therapeutic regeneration.

If you don't live in the perfect setting and recorded music doesn't quite "cut it", what options might you have in order to obtain these comforting sounds?

Perhaps you will want to invest in a quality man made waterfall for some spot in your yard (or even indoors). Sounds from nature can be attracted to the yard by waterfeatures. Perhaps owls, larks, robins, frogs, crickets, katydids, to name a few.

Maybe you have a fireplace, but if not, perhaps a firepit outside or a chimenea will suffice. Or consider adding a fireplace.

Seeing playful flames and hearing the pop and crackle, smelling the wood smoke, getting that "snuggly feeling" to cuddle with a loved one-these certainly can be relaxing moments.

Wind produces therapeutic sounds. It rustles in the leaves, sings through the boughs of pine and other evergreen trees, and plays tunes on the wind chimes. Adding some evergreen trees or acquiring

chime can enhance the wind-powered soothing sounds at your place.

As a child, I recall nothing sounded nicer to go to sleep by than rain on the tin roof. Again, water can be so soothing.

Bring more songbirds to your yard by putting out bird feeders, bird houses, bird baths or running streams. Trees such as holly and dogwoods and crabapples hold lunch for a feathered friend. Milkweed, coneflowers and thistles may entice a goldfinch. Pine cones may attract a number of birds in addition to giving them a secure resting spot in the pine tree.

So, whether you find waterfalls, crackling embers, blowing breezes, or the music of cute songbirds gives you relief from stress-you can make fairly easy alterations to your yard and home to provide them. My take is it is a good investment and adds tranquility to one's life.

Recorded music or chantings can do much good as well when it comes to unwinding and letting go.

Truly, it is possible to create a soothing sanctuary at your place to escape the exhausting hustle and bustle and nerve-fraying daily noises of modern lifestyles. Try some of these concepts. Search out others. I encourage you to take some action towards obtaining a less stressed life by adding sound therapy to your home and yard.

Signal editor dies Wednesday morning

Richard Anderkin, 48, of Mt. Vernon, editor of the *Mount Vernon Signal* for many years, died early Wednesday morning at the University of Kentucky Medical Center in Lexington after a short illness.

"Rick", through his work at the *Signal*, about which he was obsessive, was wellknown, as his family found out by the concern shown during the two and a half weeks he was ill.

He was born in Versailles on August 23, 1961, the first of seven children, to James and Perlina Murphy Anderkin.

He moved to Mt. Vernon in January of 1966 with his parents and sister, Jamie, and, with tongue in cheek would remark in later years, that he began working at the *Signal* a few months later. A graduate of Rockcastle County High School, Rick was an avid golfer and sports fan at all levels, especially his beloved Rockets and Wildcats.

The DRC is located at: South Lincoln Community Center (Old Kings Mtn. School) at 11650 Ky. Hwy 1247, Waynesburg, Ky

The center will open Saturday at 8 a.m., and hours will be 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. EDT seven days a week, thereafter. Disaster officials ask that before visiting the center, people first register online at www.DisasterAssistance.gov or by calling 800-621-FEMA (3362) or (TTY) 800-462-7585 for those with speech and hearing disabilities. Help in all languages is available.

Staff at the recovery center can check individuals' cases, answer questions about claims, or review information needed to process their claim. Recovery specialists from FEMA Individual Assistance, FEMA Mitigation, the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA), and the Commonwealth also can supply contacts for other programs that may be able to help. be at the disaster center to answer any questions about the SBA low-interest disaster loan program for homeowners, renters, businesses, and private non-profit organizations of all sizes. These loans are to repair or replace real estate and/or personal property damaged by the storms and flooding.

the lone no vote. At Monday night's meeting, Cromer brought the matter up saying that he was wrong in taking a vote on the matter in executive session. He said he had secured opinions from the Kentucky League of Cities (KLC) and two attorneys that said because the ordinance, concerning recompense for the mayor, was "so vague" that they could not give a definitive answer as to whether or not she was entitled to the payment.

The question was whether or not the mayor is an officer of the city or an employee and Cromer said that KLC's opinion was that the action depended on how the council

wanted to interpret the ordinance.

The ordinance that was passed at the time the mayor began receiving a salary, covered her salary - \$3,000 a month, retirement benefits and health insurance.

Jones ventured the opinion that the council was "treading on thin ice" by making the payment. Jones also told the council that he had requested, and received, an Attorney General's Opinion that said the action of the council in taking a vote on the matter in executive session "was not legal." But, in the 10 page opinion, the AG would not address the legality of the payment itself.

According to an employee of KLC's legal department, when asked by the *Signal* last week, the discussion itself

Rand Paul for the seat of retiring U.S. Senator Jim Bunning and, by and large, returned incumbents to office Tuesday.

For such an important election, only 4,307 of Rockcastle's registered voters went to the polls for 39% turnout.

Claretta Carter Hodges, a newcomer to politics, mounted an aggressive campaign in her challenge to Carloftis. She was backed by the newly-organized Concerned Citizens for Fair Government who have expressed strongly their opposition to any planning and zoning in the county.

In fact, the CCFFG had vowed to try and sweep a new fiscal court into office but, at least two of the five magistrates will be returning in January. William Denney and Ralph Allen won their elections and are unopposed by Democrats in the fall. Democrats Jan Stevens and John Holbrook and Republican Hodges. "I appreciate the support the voters showed in me on Tuesday," Carloftis said.

Carloftis will, reportedly, have opposition in the Fall from Doug Bishop who has filed an intent to be a candidate as an Independent against Carloftis. Bishop has now until August 10th to actually file as a candidate for the office.

Incumbent Sheriff Mike Peters won re-election convincingly with 2,341 votes. Ken Holt finished second behind Peters with 1,204 votes. Former deputy sheriff Rick Brummett received 502 votes in front of Billy Gene Rash's 140 votes.



Charlene Reynolds' Memories of Bloss The Roots series visits the Bloss area this week, located in southwestern Rockcastle County. This is a portion of the county that this column has yet to explore. It will be seen through the memories of

Charlene Reynolds. Charlene was born in Bloss on June 2, 1936, to Logan Prewitt and Mary Bullock-Prewitt. The Prewitts had ten children, Charlene being the youngest. In those days, especially in rural areas such as Bloss, a midwife was used. In this case, it was Mattie Nichols, who was also the local schoolteacher. She not only brought the children into the world, but taught them once they arrived.

The Gum Springs school served the area of Bloss where Charlene's family lived. It was a small two-room facility, relatively close to the Prewitt home. Teachers such as Ella Bullens boarded at the Prewitt's Sunday night through Friday night for two dollars a week. The two dollars included meals and laundry service. The children took their lunch to school in fourpound lard buckets, and ate, weather permitting, under the school that sat off the ground on stones or blocks. The lunch wasn't of today's standards. It usually consisted of milk and cornbread or such. This is what the teacher ate, as well.

The Prewitts raised their



hogs, etc. Eggs were gathered and taken to Green Bullock's store to trade for goods not available on the farm such as coffee or sugar.

Their clothes were made from feed sacks, as well as the curtains and quilts. When these items became dirty, they were washed by hand in Bloss Branch that ran near their house. The clothes were hung on clothes lines to dry, and lye soap was used for the cleaning. Lye soap making is quickly becoming a lost art. Charlene said that she still has her mother's recipe for it somewhere.

To supplement their income, they picked and sold blackberries for ten cents a gallon. Charlene's mother usually canned over a hundred quarts of the blackberries, as well as other goods from the garden each year. While berry-picking, they usually found the chiggers to be as plentiful as the blackberries. The family also dug May-apple roots to sell for ten cents a pound. They sold other natural herbs, as well, such as sassafras root and catnip which was used for tea as a cold remedy. They also gathered golden seal, ginseng, mountain tea, and rabbit tobacco, which was also called "life everlasting".





The swallows have decided that the mulch is excellent stuff to reinforce nests and that it is chopped to perfection when mixed with flood mud.

And much of the load that Chris last dumped was sugar maple and he had cut it when the sap was up. My front yard still smells like breakfast if you like maple syrup. Take my word for it. Barn Swallows love it. And they love to use it when they are building.

lifestyle of living in the country, plenty of exercise from chores, and eating a diet rich in natural foods and herbs, there wasn't much sickness. Colds and such were treated with herbal remedies, and a mixture of lard and coal oil was used to grease the throat. My grandpa was treated with "sheep-nanny tea" as a boy about 1890. Charlene knew all about "sheep-nanny tea". In the rural areas in that era, doctors were scarce, so it wasn't uncommon to use herbs and home remedies. Charlene had never been to a doctor until she was well into her thirties.

Luxuries were few and far between and the family lacked what is thought of as common necessity today. However, most other families were in the same condition. The children didn't have shoes except in winter. They walked to school and stood under the cliffs along the way eating icicles which they thought was a lot of fun. The didn't have writing paper very often. Cut up brown paper bags were usually used. A pencil was cut into two pieces, and the end with the eraser had to be shared between Charlene and her sister.

The children learned to really appreciate what few things of childhood that they had. Charlene had a piece of Bazooka bubblegum that she saved in a matchbox, and was about ten or twelve years old before tasting her first Moon Pie. Although she grew up here in the county, she attended the Brodhead Fair only once as a child. She and others in the family had sold blackberries in order to have

money enough to finance the trip

Once, when Charlene was about eight or nine, her brother who was in the Army, came home for a visit. He had brought her a unique gift. It was her first doll, storebought and all. Upon receiving the doll, Charlene and her niece, wanting to do the right thing, headed to the nearest branch to baptize the doll. Sadly, the doll's hair washed off in the creek. Charlene cried for days.

That night when I went to my Dad's apartment in the hotel, he asked, "David Joe, did

you see anyone with a BB gun when you were down on the street?" I replied that I had not. He said, "Someone shot out one of my windows a little while ago, and I did not see who it was." (I was telling mostly the truth because I did not see anyone with a BB gun. I never told him that I was responsible or showed him my miniature slingshot.)

Once again, I learned a valuable lesson. It was not very difficult to make trouble for yourself with a slingshot, so I had better heed the advice of Pop and try to be more responsible with my nifty toy weapon.



should not have been conducted in executive session because only personnel appointments, dismissals and disciplinary actions are proper discussions for executive session – along with litigation against the city and land acquisitions. And, even then, the council must return to open session to vote on the issue.

Mayor Cromer asked for a motion to approve or disapprove the request and Jones quickly made a motion to not approve the payment. No second was forthcoming and a motion by Councilman Wayne Bullock, seconded by Councilwoman Shelly Lewis, to approve the vacation pay passed five to one, with Jones again the only no vote.

In other action, the council heard a presentation from Cromer on his action, to date, in renovating the former fire station to make it more compatible to the city council meetings now being held there.

Cromer said preliminary discussions with an architect called for an outside stairway at the back of the station for an escape route: an entrance into the room from the present city hall; a new restroom accessible from both areas of the building; an acoustic lowered ceiling, a wood floor. a new front and the walls covered. Cromer said the cost had been estimated at \$210,000 total - \$170,000 without architect and engineering fees – but that he felt that, after architectural plans were obtained, a great deal of the work could be done by city employees which would save a great deal of the cost of the project. Jones expressed his dissatisfaction with the project, saying he would prefer moving council meetings back to the other part of the building where they were previously held and letting the Mt. Vernon Police Department have the space, contending "they need it more than we do.'

Councilman Joe Mullins made a motion to allow the mayor to proceed with the project by hiring an architect to draw up the plans for the renovation – including a materials list. The motion passed with Jones voting no and adding "it's too much money."

Jones also voted no on the first reading of the 2011-12 budget for the city, saying that since it was just presented to the council at Monday night's meeting he would like to have more time to study it. However, Mullins pointed out that approving the first reading of the budget did not pass the budget but only put the council in a position to approve the second reading at the June meeting. The budget must be approved by the council by June 30th.

One of Jones' objections was the allocation for miscellaneous expenses, calling the category "too broad." Cromer cautioned council members that the budget was not to be released to the public by council members until it was officially passed at the June meeting.

The mayor also told the council about a project involving GPS mapping for water meters, manholes and fire hydrants. Cromer said the Cumberland Valley Area Development had a GPS mapping service available which would save the city thousands of dollars and that Mt. Vernon needed the service badly since only one employee, Public Works Superintendent Dennis McClure, knew where all the water meters, manholes and fire hydrants were located. Cromer said it would not only be beneficial to the city to have the locations down on a GPS map but would also provide the size of the water lines and meters and depths of the manholes. Williamsburg, one of the eight counties in the CVADD region, along with Mt. Vernon, recently had their manholes mapped and the cost was less than \$3,000 but Cromer said it would probably cost the city somewhere around \$10,000 for the more encompassing mapping. The mayor told the council that the estimated cost had been included in the 2011-12 budget, split between the water department and the city's general budget.

Charles Saylor, chairman of the Rockcastle Tourist Commission told the council that the state transportation cabinet had offered \$20,000 for 6/10ths of an acre for right of way needed for expansion of the northbound ramp when I-75 is widened. Saylor said that he felt \$30,000 would be a more fair price, comparing what the transportation cabinet has been paying per acre for other land needed, and planned to make a counter offer to the state. Any monies received for the right-of-way would be paid toward debt the tourist com-

mission has already incurred in their "Castle" project in the area. The council also approved a

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

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RCHS girls' track team competes at Dunbar Invitational

The RCHS girls' track team found itself in a battle for the top spot in the state after the release of the last set of Class 2A state rankings.

Two-time defending Class 2A State Champion Highlands is ranked 1st with 66 points, while RCHS is only 2 points behind in 2nd place with 64 points. Christian Academy of Louisville, a new private school addition to Class 2A, is in 3rd with 63 points, while state power South Oldham is currently 4th with 54 points, and Louisville Central is 5th with 47 points.

Also of note, Highlands has a 6th grader ranked 5th in the 3200-meter run with 4 points. 6th graders are ineligible to compete at high school state, so their team should only have 62 points which would place RCHS # 1 in Class 2A.

RCHS senior Samantha Smith is ranked #1 in the state, not only in Class 2A, but also sits at the top of the list in Class A and Class 3A in both long and triple jump. Her long jump mark of 17'9.5" ranks her first and her career and season best mark of 38'5" in triple jump is well over a foot better than anyone else in the state regardless of class.

Samantha has narrowed her college choices down to the University of Kentucky, the University of Louisville, and Eastern Kentucky University.

She's made official visits to both U of L and EKU and was impressed with both schools. Next week, she will make an official visit to UK to meet with the coaching staff and tour the campus.

Freshman Michaela is ranked 3rd overall in triple jump out of all three state classes with her best effort of 36'9.5" which also ranks her 2nd in Class 2A. She also ranks 2nd in all three state classes with a jump of 17'8.75", good enough for 2nd in 2A.

Freshman Amy Johnson is currently ranked 3rd in Class 2A in discus with her career best mark of 103'11". The mark also ranks her 2nd alltime at RCHS in the event.

This past week, RCHS hosted it's final meet of the season against Madison Southern. The meet also served as senior night for four RCHS senior girls.

Seniors Samantha Smith, Laura Dollins, Deana Gabbard, and Molly Coffey were all recognized, along with their parents, for their many outstanding contributions to the RCHS girls' track program.

Rockcastle defeated Madison Southern for the meet win. Samantha Smith was the meet MVP, scoring 38 points overall with wins in the 100-meter dash, long jump, and triple jump. She also finished 2nd in the 200meter dash.

RCHS got the meet off to a great start in the 3200-meter relay. The team of Laura Dollins, Deana Gabbard, Rachel Cain, and Alyssa Cox finished 1st with a season's best time of 11:01.2.

Alyssa Allen won the 100meter hurdles in 18.5 seconds, while Jessica Albright placed a close 2nd in 18.6 seconds. In the 300-meter hurdles, Jessica easily won with a time of 50.8 seconds, while Alyssa placed 3rd in 51.4 seconds.

Samantha Smith easily won the 100-meter dash with a new RCHS record time of 12.53 seconds, bettering her previous school record mark of 12.6 seconds. Tanika Chasteen placed 3rd overall with a time of 14.2 seconds.

Laura Dollins dominated the 1600-meter run with a time of 5:44.2, while Amber Collins placed 2nd in 6:11.1. In the 800-meter run, Laura captured 1st with a time of 2:33 and Alyssa Cox ran a personal best 2:43.8 and finished 3rd. Amber Collins finished 4th in a personal best 2:44.8 and Rachel Cain placed 5th in a personal best 2:45.4.

Michaela Hunter and Samantha swept the 200meter dash. Michaela broke her own RCHS record with a new record time of 25.73 seconds.

Samantha also ran a career best time of 26.23 seconds and placed 2nd. In long jump, Samantha took top honors, winning with a leap of 16'8" while Michaela placed 2nd with a jump of 16'3.5. Ashley McKinney placed 5th (11'11.5").

In triple jump, Samantha and Michaela continued their dominance of the event. Samantha won with a jump of 36'3". Michaela finished 2nd with an effort of 34'5".

Deana Gabbard easily won the 3200-meter run. She finished with a great time of 13:45.2.

Michaela and Lacey Gastineau went 1-2 in the 400-meter dash. Michaela finished with a career best time of 58.74 seconds while Lacey ran 1:11.94.

On May 8, the RCHS girls' team won the 14-team E.G. Plummer Track Classic, defeating runner-up Ryle by a score of 104-79. Host Danville finished 3rd with 66 points but provided a tough challenge for RCHS with two of the best jumpers and sprinters in the state, as well as one of the top distance runners. Despite a very windy day at the track, RCHS had several outstanding performances.

Samantha Smith won the meet MVP award after scoring 36 points. She also won the Most Outstanding Individual Performance award for her amazing winning triple jump mark of 36'5". In long jump, Samantha captured 1st with a great leap of 16'9.5". (Continued to A9)






JROTC holds annual Awards Ceremony



ACRE/DCP Enrollment

Deadline Approaching John W. McCauley, State

Executive Director of USDA's Kentucky Farm Service Agency (FSA) reminds producers that June 1, 2010, is the deadline for the 2010 Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) Program or the traditional Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP). This is a mandatory deadline for all participants and USDA will not accept any late-file applications.

McCauley explained that, "It is critical for producers to begin the enrollment process as soon as possible." Over 41,300 farms were enrolled in DCP/ACRE Program during 2009. "To date, approximately less than 25% have been enrolled in 2010 DCP/ ACRE Programs. At the current rate of enrollment, a significant number of farms eligible for 2010 DCP/ACRE will not be enrolled by the

June 1, 2010, deadline."

All signatures of producers receiving a share in DCP/ ACRE payments are required by the June 1, 2010, deadline. It is important producers contact their local office to set up appointments well before the June 1, 2010, deadline.

Reminder: May 31 is the final date to certify Small Grain (Wheat for grain) planted coverage.


cently driving around Mt. Vernon reminiscing about our teenage years and making note of how different Main Street looks now compared to how it looked in the 1950's. Bud suggested that I "take a look back" in this column, detailing how the street appeared when we were riding around in my 1958 Chevrolet. The idea appealed to me; so the following is my recollection of the businesses in those memorable days.

If we begin with the corner of Main and Richmond Streets, the first building on the right was the large, white frame home of Floyd and Daisy Miller. Daisy was the manager of the Vernon Theatre, which was just a couple of buildings down Main from their home. Between their home and the Theatre was a small café called Mary Knight's Restaurant.

The Vernon Theatre was a favorite teen hangout in the 50's. It was possible to purchase a ticket for 9 cents, a piece of chocolate fudge for a penny, and a bag of popcorn for 5 cents. In other words, the ticket, candy, and popcorn totalled a whopping 15 cents. Many of us also brought a fountain Coke from the drugstore across the street. (It is hard to believe the prices of that day. If you had 50 cents or a dollar, you were "in the money.")

Near the theater was a small building which housed the Bank of Mt. Vernon. My grandfather (Pop) was a close friend of N. M. Smock who served as the Bank President at the time.

Next to the bank was the Ideal Café, which was owned and operated by Conard Parrett. I always had a soft spot in my heart for this restaurant because when my brother Al was young (before my time), my dad and my mother (Bee) ran the café. I remember Bee talking about the extraordinary prices they had on food. She said that a vegetable plate sold for a quarter. The next building in line was nothing more than a tiny room, which my father used as a taxi stand for several years. This building later became Bailey's Jewelry Store. Bill Bailey sold me my first watch when I was about 12 years old. He allowed me to pay for it by small, time payments. Adjacent to Bailey's was McBee and Adams Dry Goods Store. This is where we purchased our Levi jeans, Bass shoes, and assorted other clothing. I will never forget the aroma of this store. It always smelled like new wood and seemed very fresh. I loved to shop for new clothes at McBee's. Next door was Winstead's Hardware Store. I can remember my dad browsing the tool



One evening last week, just before nightfall, we had one of those thunderstorms that move in seemingly out of nowhere.

At this time of day most folks here in Lowell Valley are watching television or washing up the supper dishes so there is almost no traffic on Charlie Brown Road or on Old Railroad Grade. It is a good time to be sitting on the porch and being thankful for the opportunity to live a place so serene,

And then the scene turns into July 4th. Suddenly a flash of lightning bursts from the sky followed by almost instantly by a tremendous boom that echoes for several seconds off the ridges and the wind picks up. Another flash and boom and the wind gets more serious and then the rain comes down as though a bucket brigade as been formed up in the clouds and I can feel the static electricity make the hair stand on my arms.

The birds have hushed and disappeared and a wiser person myself would most likely have beaten down the door to get back inside but it's dry where I am standing back against the wall in the middle of my front porch and there are few things that I love more about nature than watching a good thunderstorm progress.

By now the lightning and thunder are a steady roll and I see a big brown dog yelping and running on full throttle come tearing up Charlie Brown Road. He bounds the rock wall and comes tearing through my yard, leaps on the porch and literally crashes against my legs where he shivers before giving a huge shake and drenching me. Every time a bolt of lightning flashes, he whines and leans against me.

I've never seen the dog before or at least I have not noticed him in the neighborhood. It would be hard to





County roads need signs to protect children... Dear Editor,

Imagine you're outside with your kids, on a sunny afternoon. Your child steps into the road to get a ball they were playing with. Then, from out of nowhere, a car flies by, hitting your child. That's just one of my fears when I let my child out to play. If you live on a back road, out of the city limits, my guess is this is often what you fear. There are ways to prevent this kind of worry -- all back roads in neighborhoods where there are kids at play-should have a sign posted that says so and speed limits should be posted. After all, when it comes to the safety of our children, and the next generation, how could cost effect our decisions?

Many people choose to take a detour on my road --Grace Loop - simply because they can drive like they just stole the car and are trying to get away. This is just a small road off Hwy. 25 that loops back around to the main road. What these speed demons don't realize is that there are small children in this neighborhood that often walk, ride bikes and, yes, sometimes play in the road. That's why a sign should be posted to let these drivers be aware of the risks they take on this road. Overall, I think this would slow drivers down and possibly stop people from choosing this road to detour on.

I grew up on this road and I know the fear of riding my bike and having to be extra careful because, any time, someone could fly by and maybe not even notice I was there until it's too late. Not only children are on this road but a lot of adults. People like to walk, job and run on this road. I don't blame them because it is a beautiful neighborhood for these activities. At the same time, people shouldn't have to worry about their safety when they are getting a good exercise in.

My neighbor is currently the constable in this neighborhood and he lives on this road. All it would take would be for him to stop one person, one time. saying that, the local ATV riders have a respect for the horse people and have never had a problem of which I am aware. Although these roads were restricted to horses, the local ATV riders used them without problem to the horse, because they showed this respect for one another. Most of the local ATV riders either have horses of their own or have been around them most of their lives and understand the reactions between the two. The local ATV riders have used these trails along with the horse people for as long as I have been riding these roads. I have yet to meet an ATV rider locally that, when we met they did not pull off and shut down their engine or wait until we wave them on before we pass one another. Most of the time we will sit and exchange greetings as they are either acquaintances or neighbors.

The problem by opening these roads publicly, we will now be encountering people who are not aware of the horses reactions to ATV and/ or dirt bikes. The horses reaction is one of panic and to run. This puts the horse and rider in a dangerous position. I was always under the impression that the ATV and dirt bikes would stay in the S-Tree area of Jackson Co. This worked out fine and we have had no problem of which I am aware. We knew that if we crossed into Jackson Co. we would encounter these vehicles and must be extra cautious. For this reason, I would never take novice riders or young children into Jackson Co. to ride. For those unfamiliar with horses, some ATV riders think the best thing to do is to get past them as quickly as possible, which creates an unsafe situation.

There is room in this area for both ATV and horse people, but we do need a place dedicated to horses and hikers only. By having opened up these roads there are now no dedicated roads to horses in Rockcastle County. By opening up roads, such as Daugherty Road, you give ATV and dirt bikers access to

More facts about **RCIDA** actions...

Dear Editor,

RCIDA chairman Corey Craig's latest guest column (May 13 MVS) omitted several notable RCIDA actions.

RCIDA redistributed \$175,000 tax dollars in 2006, an 84% 6-year increase, to buy the Northside Inn property (DB 210-689) and tear it down, after it sold for \$95,000 in 2000 (DB 182-63). An adjacent house sold for \$42,000 in 2005 (DB 204-629), before RCIDA redistributed \$77,000 tax dollars in 2006, an 83% increase, only to have it burnt before demolition.

The purchases for this \$252,000 dollar empty lot are representative of other RCIDA purchases I've seen, including the roughly \$225,000 Jones Building (property and outside repaired).

This leads me to several suggestions.





a man who had this unexplainable way of leaving footprints on the hearts of most everyone he encountered. His business was all about people, and his life was all about people. I believe those footprints came from his ability to connect with those people, to let them know he really cared about them. And, as most of you know, as your relationship with Dad grew, the footprints just got deeper and deeper because he demonstrated loyalty to you. It is because of this, today we all carry heavy hearts.

And I wanted to talk about these footprints, these heavy hearts, because they are the reason we grieve. And I'm going to approach this for a second, taking the opportunity to grieve because that's the only way we can ever begin to gain closure in our loss of this fine man.

I grieve and I hurt for my grandmother, for Vonda, for Megan and for all of his siblings. I hurt for all of his friends, those he had from childhood to the more recent ones. I hurt for the innercircle. As Judge Burdette said, I hurt for a community that he personally changed with barrels of ink, a camera, and a can-do attitude. But more than anything, I selfishly hurt for myself.

I hurt for me because I no longer will get to call him 4 times a day to talk about local politics or UK basketball. I hurt because I'll never get to give him a hard time about beating him in golf, even though we both shot scores we should be ashamed of. Next to the Hotel was the Post Office. Many people had post office boxes for their mail delivery. With no rural box, my grandfather (Pop) came daily to pick up his mail. I think Pop liked the idea of coming to town every day since it gave him the opportunity to visit with his friends. The Boston Store was lo-

cated beside the Post Office. It was operated by Noreen Milen. She specialized in clothes and shoes, mostly for ladies. The building was small, and I can remember how narrow the aisles were and how crowded it was inside.

Clyde Barnett operated the small grocery store next door. One of his specialties was offering a great supply of fresh meat, which was cut on the spot in the back room of the store.


On the corner, Oscar and Gertrude Helton owned and operated Helton's 5 & 10 Store. She was my father's sister, and I often spent time browsing the toy aisles looking for a nifty toy. Uncle Oscar usually gave me a discount because I was his nephew. I also purchased comic books there on a regular basis.

The remaining businesses on this side of the street included: the Courthouse, the Jail, Fred Baker's house, Frank Dee's Motel, and the Greyhound Bus Station, which was located across the street from the cemetery.

Each of these places of business played a part in my life's experiences (and for many others from the era as well). Next week I will catalog the other side of Main Street. If I have omitted any business, or if you would like to comment, please let me know.

Deadline approaching for Stewardship program

Rockcastle County landowners still have time to sign up for the Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) at their local Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) office but the deadline for getting signed up for the second CSP ranking period is quickly approaching. According to NRCS District Conservationist Chuck Gibson, now is the time for landowners and producers who have considered applying for CSP to get signed up and submit documentation.

USDA has announced the national cutoff date for CSP is June 11, which requires landowners submit applications quickly.

"If you've heard about the new CSP and talked with other local producers or read about others involved with it, now is the time to roll up your sleeves and get your conservation operation on the list of those recognized for a quality conservation commitment," explains Gibson. "It's important that you get your application and paperwork submitted so you can be part of the 2010 CSP ranking period and funding cycle."

According to Gibson, the clock is ticking for program sign-up this fiscal year. USDA just announced the final cutoff date, which gives producers a brief window of opportunity to get signed up for the CSP signup in 2010.

Tom Perrin, Kentucky State Conservationist (STC) confirms NRCS teams across the state are ready to work with producers and start the process. "If you're already an NRCS cooperator and are in the system, just meet with local field office staff. Let them know you're ready for CSP." Ag producers or landowners who are new to NRCS or USDA will need to schedule an appointment and complete the application process and get the ball rolling. CSP is a voluntary pro-

gram that encourages producers to maintain existing con-





RCMS girls compete in State Championships RCHS girls' track wins Conference Championship

The RCHS girls' track and field team competed in the Central Ky.Conference Championships this past Monday. RCHS won the conference title last year and looked to defend it with a small group of competitors including only six high schoolers.

RCHS easily defended its conference title, dominating the competition and defeating runner-up Danville by a score of 109-74. Boyle County was 3rd with 71 points. Woodford County was 4th with 69 points and Henry Clay and West Jessamine tied for 5th with 66 points each. Several RCHS competitors had performances placing in the top ten.

Samantha Smith won the meet MVP award for her outstanding overall meet performance in which she led all scorers with 34 points. Her incredible performance couldn't have come at a better time, since the jumps coach from the University of Kentucky cancelled practice for the afternoon and traveled down to watch her compete.

In long jump, Samantha dominated the competition, win-

The RCMS girls' track team sought to defend its outdoor state title from 2009 along with their indoor state title in 2010. Nearly 120 teams from across the state of Kentucky competed as well as over 1800 athletes in one of the most competitive state meets to date. The RCMS girls' finished 13th overall with 21 points and several outstanding individual and relay team performances, including several in the top twenty.

The RCMS girls' 3200-meter relay team got the meet off to a great start with a 12th place finish overall in a season's best time of 11:20.73. Team members included 7th graders Rachel Cain, Kristin Brown, Alyssa Cox, and 6th grader Amber Collins.

Next came the 100-meter hurdles. 8th grader Alyssa Allen had a brilliant performance, finishing 3rd overall with an exceptional time of 17.69 seconds. Alyssa also ran extremely well in the 300-meter hurdles, placing 6th overall in 52.04 seconds.





The Mt. Vernon-Rockcastle County Tourism, together with Kentucky Chautauqua, will present *Abraham Lincoln: "I, too, am a Kentuckian"* at 1 p.m. Saturday, June 5th at the Bittersweet Cabin Village in Renfro Valley.

Born on a farm, in what is now LaRue County, Abraham Lincoln (1809-1865) spent his early years in the Commonwealth. When he was 7, his family moved to Indiana and later Illinois. But as his native brilliance and burning political ambition carried him to the presidency and greatness - a panel of historians recently chose him as the most influential American who ever lived - Lincoln always had connections with his native state.

In his law office in Springfield, Ill., he had a partner, William "Billy" Herndon, who hailed from Greensburg. His best friend in Springfield was Joshua Speed from Louisville. His wife, Mary, was from Lexington, a daughter of the prominent Todd family. And his political role model, a friend of the Todd family, was the Kentucky statesman, Henry Clay. During the Civil War, Lincoln was unpopular in Kentucky but, when he said, "I, too, am a Kentuckian," no one could dispute it.

Though he never came close to winning Kentucky in a presidential election, and was reviled by some of the state's most outspoken residents, Lincoln always regarded Kentucky with affection. And he never lost sight of its strategic importance in the Civil War. "I think to lose Kentucky," he said, "Is the same as to lose the whole game. Kentucky gone we cannot hold Missouri, nor I think Maryland." Lincoln read Kentucky newspapers, knew the thinking of opinion leaders, and was sensitive to

living history dramas that have now brought life to more than 50 figures from Kentucky's past -- is an exclusive program of the Kentucky Humanities Council, Inc. Chautauqua characters have told their stories to nearly 500,000 people in every Kentucky county. USDA's Natural Resource Conservation Service (NRCS) is now accepting applications from woodland owners interested in having a conservation activity plan for forest management (CAP-FM) developed for their lands. Owners of woodland that have never had a forest management plan developed, or have a plan needing revision (older than 5 years), are applying for the Conservation Activity Plan for Forest Management through the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP).

The forest management plans will be prepared by a private consulting forester who has met the certification as a technical service provider. The consulting forester will work directly with the woodland owner to prepare the plan and supply all necessary documents to the local NRCS District Conservationist. The plan will include recommendations of practices that are needed to address the identified resource concerns such as forest stand improvement, forest trails and landings, tree and shrub establishment, etc. These recommended practices may then be incorporated into future EQIP applications. Approved applications will receive payment for completed practices that meet with NRCS standards and specifications.

Applications for the Conservation Activity Plan for Forest Management can be made at your local USDA NRCS office. EQIP applications can be made at any time. However, the cutoff for 2010 funding to have a Conservation Activity Plan for Forest Management developed, will be June 4, 2010. All applications received by that date will be evaluated for eligibility. A special EQIP funding pool has been established for woodland owners. Approved applicants are offered the opportunity to enter into a contract and will receive payment after submitting the forest management plan to NRCS. The participant will then reimburse the private consulting forester for their services in preparing the plan. Plans must be submitted within one year of contract obligation.







Our water is purchased from Mt. Vernon Water Works, that is located at Renfro Valley, Kentucky. Our supplier treats surface water from Lake Linville. The source water assessment has been performed to indenify land uses which may inpact the water supply. This assessment indicates that the susceptibility of the Mt. Vernon water supply to contamination is generally moderate. Contaminants present in source water may include microbial contamination, pesticides, and herbicides, organic chemical contaminants, and radioactive contaminants. The primary source of contamination are agiculture, onsite septic systems, and roadways. Activities and land uses upstream of this water can pose potential ricks to your drinking water. The complete source water assessment can be reviewed at Mt. Vernon Water Works. The Brodhead Water Works routinely monitors for contaminants in your drinking water according to Fedral and State Laws. The table enclosed is results of our Monitoring for the period of January 1 throught December 31, 2009, it can be obtained at Brodhead City Hall, 7 West Main Street, Brodhead, Kentucky.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and may pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source water include: Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, (sewage plants, septic systems, livestock operations, or wildlife). Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, (naturally occurring or from stormwater runoff, wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming). Pesticides and herbicides, (stormwater runoff, agriculture or residential uses). Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, (by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, or from gas stations, stormwater runoff, or septic systems). Radioactive contaminants, (naturally occurring or from oil and gas production or mining activities).

ACRE/DCP Enrollment Deadline Approaching

John W. McCauley, State Executive Director of USDA's Kentucky Farm Service Agency (FSA) reminds producers that June 1, 2010, is the deadline for the 2010 Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) Program or the traditional Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP). This is a mandatory deadline for all participants and USDA will not accept any late-file applications.

McCauley explained that, "It is critical for producers to begin the enrollment process as soon as possible." Over 41.300 farms were enrolled in DCP/ACRE Program during 2009. "To date, approximately less than 25% have been enrolled in 2010 DCP/ ACRE Programs. At the current rate of enrollment, a significant number of farms eligible for 2010 DCP/ACRE will not be enrolled by the June 1, 2010, deadline."

All signatures of producers receiving a share in DCP/ ACRE payments are required by the June 1, 2010, deadline. It is important producers con-

tact their local office to set up appointments well before the June 1, 2010, deadline.

Reminder: May 31 is the final date to certify Small Grain (Wheat for grain) planted coverage.

Tree Assistance Program The Food, Conservation,

and Energy Act of 2008, Pub. L. 110-234, as amended by Pub. L. 110-398 and Pub.

L. 111-005 authorizes TAP. TAP provides financial assistance to qualifying orchardists and nursery tree growers to replant or rehabilitate eligible trees, bushes, and vines that were lost by natural disasters occurring on or after January 1, 2008, and before October 1, 2011.

To qualify for TAP, orchardists and nursery tree growers must: suffer qualifying tree, bush, and vine losses in excess of 15 percent mortality (after adjustment for normal mortality) from an eligible natural disaster for the individual stand have owned the eligible trees, bushes, and vines when the natural disaster occurred; however, eligible growers are not required to own the land on which eli-

gible trees, bushes, and vines are planted replace eligible trees, bushes, vines within 12 months from the date the application is approved.


