One arrested after break-in at Dollar Store in Brodhead

A Lincoln County woman was arrested and charged with burglary, third degree, after attempting a break-in at the Brodhead Dollar Store early Saturday morning.

According to the Rockcastle Sheriff's office, Deedra Shipp, 22, of Stanford, had allegedly broken the glass to the front door of the store when a resident in the area heard the commotion and called 911. The resident was able to give a description of the car to police, and Sheriff's Deputy Joe Rush, who was actually already in Brodhead responding to the burglar alarm at Brodhead Pharmacy, immediately responded to the attempted break-in.

Rush spotted the vehicle and chased it along Hwy. 150 into Lincoln County before getting the vehicle stopped. Rush and Deputy Ronnie Bradley, Sr. arrested Shipp and charged her with burglary, 3rd degree, fleeing and evading police, possession of burglary tools, and operating on a suspended license.

Another arrest in the case was expected after press time Wednesday. Deputy Joe Rush is continuing the investigation.

Plans underway for purchase of Cedar Rapids

In an effort to keep Cedar Rapids Recreation Center operating for the citizens of the county, a group of current and former members have joined together to purchase the facility, located on Hwy. 2750 (former U.S. 150).

The recreation center has been the center of much controversy recently. In October, County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis introduced a motion to the fiscal court to purchase the property and make it a county-owned facility open to the public. His first motion failed without the votes of magistrates Lee Earl Adams, Bill McKinney and William Denny.

Rockcastle men return from Iraq

They were escorted home by police cruisers, fire trucks and they deserved it.

Two Rockcastle men were escorted into Mt Vernon last Wednesday after spending seven months in Iraq as members of the National Guard's 617th MP company.

Chris Bishop, 39 and Jeff Parker, 24, both of Mt. Vernon are with their families for the first time since May and, during the seven months they were gone, Jeff had to welcome his first

child, Emma Grace, via Skype during the latter part of November.

Both men, who roomed together in Iraq, served as MPs in Iraq, guarding upper command personnel and training Iraqi troops. They are both very glad to be home.

Parker, who is married to the former Kayla Cameron, has now been in the military 6 1/2 years and says he is not sure of his future with the military but will prob-

ably not reup when his present enlistment runs out in 2014.

However, Bishop, who did not join the guards until he was 36, says he is looking to further his career in the military and hopes his two sons will take an interest in the profession but "it's a decision they will have to make themselves," the A-4 Specialist said. As to his military service, Bishop said, "It has made me look at things a lot differently - in a more positive way."

Chris worked at the Bluegrass Army Depot before his enlistment but his department moved out and he would have had to relocate to keep his job. That was when he made the decision to enlist saying it was something he had always wanted to do.

"My wife has been so supportive, along with the rest of my family, and I really appreciate that," he said.

The two men have until March before they have to

report back to their unit in Richmond and will be serving one week end a month and two weeks in the summer until another hot spot in the world calls for their deployment. Both think it's unlikely they will be sent to Afghanistan.

Jeff, the son of Bonnie Parker of Mt. Vernon and Jeff Parker of Berea, plans to resume his job as a Mt. Vernon City Policeman in late January. When asked his opinion as to the Iraqi troops' readiness to assume the role of defending their country, Jeff said the Iraqi troops were capable enough but whether they will or not is another story. "They are very smart about tactics," he said, "and, we helped them by giving them all the tools they need."

Chris, who has been very busy since his return home enjoying Christmas with his entire family, hunting with his buddies and then getting away to Tennessee with family and friends for a few days, is married to the former Sabrina Mink and they have two sons, Dakota, 12 and Dustin, a sophomore at Somerset Community College. He is the son of David and Barbara Bishop of Brodhead.

"I want to thank the people of Mt. Vernon for welcoming us home the way they did, it was very touching," Bishop said.



A look back at what made news in 2011

An election, state championship, census results and deeply discussed proposal dominated the headlines in 2011. Here is a look back at all of the events that kept our attention from January through June of last year.

January saw new County Clerk Danetta Ford being sworn in, as well as incumbent County Judge Buzz Carloftis and a fiscal court with two new members, Lee Earl Adams from District 1 and Garry Burdette from District 4.

Changes to the Renfro Valley Post Office were announced, with the closing of the old post office in the village. The new Community Post Office opened inside the Kentucky Music Hall of Fame.

The Rockcastle County Board of Education accepted the resignation of

their board counsel, Jerry Cox.

Michael Allen, 29, of Mt. Vernon was sentenced to 24 years in prison after pleading guilty to Manslaughter, Second Degree and Assault Second Degree in a vehicle collision that killed Juanita Davis and injured her granddaughter Becky Davis.

RCHS Girls Head Coach Chrysti Noble got her 400th win against the Clay County Tigers.

In February, a misunderstanding during a phone call to the Rockcastle Animal Shelter led to an outcry and adoption of over 53 of its occupants in a two day period.

The U.S. Forest Service's plan to commercially log and spray herbicides in areas above Climax Spring and other national forest lands drew sharp

criticism from several local residents, who voiced their concerns at a meeting in early February.

Kentucky Education Commissioner Terry Holliday, visited RCHS, RCMS and the vocational school in an effort to visit each school district in the state.

UK Football Coach Joker Phillips was a no show as guest speaker at the annual Farmers-Business Banquet. UK Offensive Lineman and former Rockcastle County graduate Brad Durham, who was originally slated to introduce Phillips, filled in for him and spoke about his accomplishments and the importance of good leadership.

The Proctor family of Rockcastle County travelled to the National Institute for Health and was given news

what is best for it. I am in awe of the civic-minded folks who are trying to improve the state of our lives, who really do believe in and more importantly work for, the greater good.



Landmark Restaurant Has Become a Memory to Sarah Kirby-Harris Part II

Now that the holidays are past and life is getting back to normal, the Roots series will focus on resuming where we left off in the last column. The last column looked at the early life and times of Sarah Kirby-Harris. As a teen, she began work at the local landmark restaurant, the Belly Acres.

The Belly Acres Restaurant began in the mid- to late-40s in Renfro Valley. Sarah seems to recall that one of the Renfro Valley performers, Lil Eller, founded the restaurant. In the rear of the eatery there stood a series of small cabins that were rented to the tourists that flocked to the music shows. Sarah helped clean the cabins as well as waitress at the restaurant.

The restaurant changed owners periodically. There were people from "out west" that bought it; then at one time, Jack Albright from Brodhead owned it.

Sarah remembers working there on hot, sultry days when there was no air conditioning. In those days, although the weather was hot people didn't seem to mind because nobody had air conditioning, so they had no idea what they were missing. They were thankful to just have a fan.

Saturday nights were especially crowded. Renfro Valley was putting out three or four shows a night. The Saturday night shows featured such performers as Al Ballinger, Pete Stamper, The Coon Creek Girls, Red Foley, Lil Eller, and locals. Sunday mornings showcased a religious meeting with music and singing. John Lair usually spoke about half an hour or so, along with the musical portion that lasted about an hour. The program was broadcast live on the local radio station.

The restaurant had a variety of food on the menu. There were various soups,

Late yesterday afternoon, an hour or so before dark, Loretta and I ventured from Paint Lick to Berea on Highway 21. We rounded the bend that brings us up to what I call, the big bottom and there they were. The most wild turkeys I have

ever seen in one place at the same time.

We are quite accustomed to seeing a flock of 30 or so turkeys somewhere in a field along the way and such sightings are usually miles apart. We have shot so many photographs of them that I don't even bother having a camera in my lap anymore, but I keep my eyes peeled because I enjoy the sightings. This time however, I wished I'd had my camera ready because this was no run of the mill flock of turkeys.

The big bottom is, by my estimation, ten or fifteen acres. It was literally covered with turkeys; so many that it was impossible to do anything near an accurate head count, but at least 200 and probably more. As far as I could tell they were thinning the winter wheat that some farmer had sowed or maybe they were caucusing to select a Republican nominee for President. We all know that the party needs something viable to put on the ticket with the other turkeys come election day.

Desperate times call for desperate means. A feathered bird would, at least, be more authentic and probably get more votes than any of the current front runners.

Speaking of desperation, I used to hunt wild turkeys. I spent over \$600 on a shotgun set up specifically for turkey hunting. I decked myself out in camo, blackened my face, wrapped my shotgun in camo and looked pretty much, by my estimation, like a tree stump when I sat down. I practiced calling turkeys for hours on end with a variety of calls. Loretta has run me out of the house on numerous occasions as I tried to learn to gobble in the living room.

Opening morning of the spring gobbler season would find me crouched, a hour before dawn, at the edge of Junior Helton's big woods,

Recycling Center Is Now Open!!!

Rockcastle County is now offering a recycling drop-off program. Recyclables may be dropped off at the Rockcastle County Recycling Center on US 25 South (2528 South Wilderness Rd.) during the hours of 7 a.m. until 3 p.m. Monday thru Friday (closed major holidays).

The following items may be recycled:

Newspapers w/inserts, magazines, books & catalogs, office paper, junk mail, phone books, plastic bottles & jugs (#1-7) (any size soda and water bottles, laundry detergent jugs, bleach and fabric softener jugs, milk and water jugs, cooking oil bottles and jugs, shampoo bottles, dish liquid and alcohol bottles (please rinse out jugs), metal cans (rinsed), empty aerosol cans, aluminum cans, glass bottles and jars, sheet glass, ceramics, computers, radios, phones, vacuum cleaners, clocks, cameras, camcorders, vcr/dvd players and satellite boxes.

Rechargeable batteries such as those found in: cordless power tools, cellular phones (the whole phone can be recycled), cordless phones, laptop computers, digital cameras, two-way radios, camcorders and remote control toys. If its says rechargeable on it, then it's recyclable!

Clean used motor oil may also be dropped off at the Rockcastle County Road Department during regular business hours.

Recycling trailers are also available at the following locations: City of Brodhead (gravel lot across from Citizens Bank), City of Livingston (gravel lot across from old Livingston Gymnasium), Brindle Ridge Volunteer Fire Department (at Conway) and at the Pongo Volunteer Fire Department. The trailers will only be pulled out to empty them and will then be taken back to the same location. Please help us make this a successful venture by being clean and/or neat with our recycling habits. Do not put anything in the individual bins except what is labeled on them. Do not leave recyclables on the ground! If you drop something on the ground, pick it up. **Absolutely no trash is to be put into the bins!** Remember, camera surveillance is utilized in Rockcastle County and it is illegal to improperly dispose of trash.

hunkered down and with slate or box calls between my legs and crow or owl calls between my lips pretending I was wild bird.

Male turkeys will often gobble on the roost if they hear an owl or crow nearby so imitating those birds is a good way to locate them and sneak in closer. After daybreak, I would switch off to my prize turkey calls and try to imitate a horny hen turkey. I actually bagged a few tom turkeys over the years before I discovered that the meat had about the same consistency as the leather and laces in my boots. Since I don't be-

lieve in harvesting game that I can't eat, I gave up my turkey hunting habit nearly 30 years ago.

I have given most of my collector box calls to my nephew and a few friends. I still have my Browning semi-automatic 12 gauge magnum shotgun that kicks like a mule (my late Uncle Willie would say it killed on both ends) but I intend to sell it before season opens this spring. I don't have a thing against turkey hunting unless it is the dozen or so that reside around Tom Miller's place and peck on the glass around his patio demanding corn. I realize that it's an oxymoron but Miller's wild turkeys are tame and anything but game.

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Nor could I, even if I knew it would be as tender and juicy as a Thanksgiving butterball, bring myself to shoot one of the convention gathered last evening in the big bottom. The hunter-gatherer instinct has completely left me.

But do get in touch with me if you are looking a top of the line turkey gun and you are willing to promise you will cook and eat anything you shoot with it.

REGINA'S LASAGNA

This has become our traditional Christmas dinner. All my family likes this—even the pickiest ones. Christmas of 2010 I made two huge pans full and it was all gone in two days. I asked them if they were tired of it yet. They wanted me to make another one!

1 pound ground beef
1 pound sweet Italian sausage

53 ounces of your favorite spaghetti sauce

1 cup shredded parmesan cheese, divided

2 eggs, slightly beaten

1 cup mozzarella cheese, divided

1 cup ricotta cheese

8 lasagna noodles

Preheat oven to 350°.

Crumble beef and sausage in large skillet. Cook until no pink remains. Stir in spaghetti sauce. Heat thoroughly and turn off heat.

Mix eggs with ricotta cheese, 3/4 cup mozzarella cheese and 3/4 cup parmesan cheese. Spray lasagna pan with non-stick spray. Layer as follows:

2 cups sauce in bottom of pan

4 lasagna noodles, uncooked

Half of cheese mixture

Half of remaining sauce

4 lasagna noodles, uncooked

Rest of cheese mixture

Rest of sauce

Remaining 1/4 cup mozzarella cheese

Remaining 1/4 cup parmesan cheese

Bake for 1 hour 15 minutes at 350°. Remove from oven and let sit for 15 to 30 minutes before serving.

OLIVE FLORET SALAD

1 med head cauliflower, small florets

1 bunch broccoli, small florets

2 cups grape or cherry tomatoes, halved

2 medium carrots, thinly sliced

1 can (6 ounce) pitted sliced ripe olives, drained

1 pack Italian salad dressing mix

1 cup crumbled feta cheese

In a large bowl, combine the cauliflower, broccoli, tomatoes, carrots and olives. Prepare the salad dressing according to package instructions; pour over vegetables and toss to coat. Cover and refrigerate overnight. Just before serving, toss again and sprinkle with feta cheese.



Blast from the Past!!!

This week photographs are of Pete "Hoot" Jarber (1923-Dec 2, 1944.) Jarber, an African American and the grandson of a slave, was born in Mt. Vernon and attended the Mt. Vernon Christian Church and School for the Colored his first eight years of school. Rockcastle County did not provide high school level education for blacks so he bused to Berea to attend High School. While there he was discovered by Coach Joseph G. Fletcher of nearby Richmond High School, an all-black school. Blacks and whites were segregated at that time by the Separate but Equal Law regarding schools. Coach Fletcher made arrangements for Jarber to live with a black family in Richmond so he could play for the Ramblers basketball team. Pete "Hoot" was the leading scorer and MVP for the back-to-back KHSAL (Kentucky High School Athletic League) State Basketball Champions in 1942 and 43. He later played a short stint with a Traveling team of the Harlem Globetrotters until being called into military service during WWII. Hoot served as a private in the 74th Chemical Smoke Generator Colored Company. He was killed in action on December 2, 1944 and is buried in the American Cemetery at Normandy, France.

The above photo shows Pete "Hoot" Jarber with the 1943 KHSAL Basketball Champions, Jarber is shown 1st row first from the left number 9. In the below picture, Jarber is shown third from the left while training at Fort Thomas Army Base in 1944. Jarber was killed later that year by indirect German artillery fire during WW II. His name is on the Rockcastle War Memorial in front of the Rockcastle County Courthouse. If you have a photo for Blast From The Past!!! Bible Talk

Our study this month will be on the plan of salvation that is found in Christ Jesus.

Hearing- Hearing the gospel is the first step in the plan of salvation. "So then faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the word of God." Rom.10:17. Man cannot believe in what he has not heard.

Believe- In John 3:16 we read, "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life." Yes, we must have faith in the Son of God. God has given us plenty of evidence to convince any honest soul who will look into the scriptures and consider it. "And many other signs truly did Jesus in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book: But these are written, that ye might believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing ye might have life through his name." John 20:30-31.

Repentance- When we repent it involves a change of heart about sin, to turn from it; and to turn toward God. It is prompted by godly sorrow, "For godly sorrow worketh repentance to salvation not to be repented of: but the sorrow of the world worketh death." 2 Cor.7:10. Now notice that godly sorrow is not repentance, but that it worketh repentance. Repentance is that change of mind that leads to the fruits of repentance, a changed life.

Confession- We learn that we must confess the name of Jesus before men. In Romans 10:9-10 we read, "That if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved. For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation." Notice, that we confess the Lord Jesus, not confess our sins or confess that we are saved. We must acknowledge with our lips, the faith that is in our hearts, that we believe in Jesus.

Baptism - The final step in God's plan to become a child of God is that we must be baptized. Jesus said, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned." Mk.16:16. Notice the Lord did NOT say: he that believeth is saved and then is baptized. This is the way men teach and practice it in the denominations. Consider other texts like Acts 2:38, Acts 22:16, 1 Pet.3:21. When we obey this final step we will raise from that watery grave to be a new creature in Christ. God exhorts his children to be "faithful unto death, and I will give you the crown of life." Rev.2:10. Let us know if you would like to study further.

Rockcastle led 25-20 at halftime, but the Lady Warriors stormed back with an 18-8 run in the third quarter to take control of the game.


The score was tied 31 all late in the third but the Lady Warriors went on a 7-2 spurt to close out the quarter with a 38-33 advantage.

The Rockcastle Lady Rockets won the KHSAA Sweet Sixteen State Championship on Saturday, March 12th by defeating Dupont Manual in overtime, 62-60. Senior Angie Lawrence hit the game winning shot with 1.8 second to go for the victory. The Lady Rockets, who ended their almost perfect season 36-1, was undefeated in the state. The Lady Rockets also beat Madison Central, Clay County and Calloway County on their way to the state championship.

The new portion of Hwy. 150 from the Lincoln County line into Rockcastle County was named after Gary Kidwell, a Rockcastle native and Stanford police officer who was killed in the line of duty in 1991.

The fiscal court held a public meeting to gauge the interest of local support for a new volunteer fire department to serve the communities of Climax, Disputanta, Morrill and Three Links.

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The first ever community wide Good Friday event was held April 22nd at Mt. Vernon Elementary in the form of a passion play put on by members of Northside Baptist Church. Churches from all over the county and from different denominations came together to put on the event.

The 2010 census showed that Rockcastle County grew slightly from 2000, about 2%. According to the census, the total population reported for the county was 17,056.

A new art gallery and studio opened in Mt. Vernon in April. The Church Street Art Gallery and Studio began operating in the back of the former Hiatt's 5 & 10 in Mt. Vernon.

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Mt. Vernon city employees received a 5% raise as a part of the approved final reading of the city's 2011-12 budget.

Storms dropped over an inch of rain on the county and a lightning strike knocked out both pump motors at the Mt. Vernon water plant, effectively slowing the pumping capacity of every water district in the county except Livingston.

Michaela Hunter was named the KHSAA 2A Track and Field Athlete of the Year.

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

Everyone in Rockcastle County knew and remember what a special lady Mary Ida Jones was. She was well thought of and a real blessing to our community.

Back in 1950, Mary Ida was struggling, wondering how she was going to raise her family. Her husband was battling emphysema and wasn't able to work anymore. They were raising four children, the oldest 5 and youngest only 9 months old. Time was hard. They were in debt for the farm they had bought and raising a garden and tobacco just wasn't enough to get by on.

Finally, Mary got a job opportunity working for "Save the Children" Federation. The organization would run a second hand store and let Mary Ida operate it for them. She went to work for them and had two more children. After working all day, she would go home, cook for her family, work in the garden, the tobacco fields or do the housework, whatever she needed to do. She did this for 15 years.

Life wasn't easy. Not only did she raise their children, she put them through

high school, all but one. Everyone helped as much as they could. The older children would help do chores and tend to the younger ones.

Time passed. Mary enjoyed her job. She could pick up clothing for the children, select household goods and have money for working all those hours she put in. She was working on paying the farm off when the foundation announced they were going to have to close, they weren't making enough money after expenses.

Mary once again wondered what he would do. Friends and family talked her into going into business for herself. She already knew about running a store, knew how to get along with customers, knew the billing process, so why not? She pondered this over and decided this was the thing for her to do.

She found a small building to rent and Mary Ida's Trading Post came into being. The rent was \$35 a month, the electric and heat were the only other two bills she had because she had no water. Her son would drive her to Dayton, Ohio where she handpicked what she

wanted to buy to sell. This would cost her a day's business because it took all day to make the round trip. One thing to her advantage, she knew what to buy. She already had her business established and people would also ask her to look for certain things for them.

Business was good and Mary prospered. She always took time to thank God for what He had bestowed upon her. She was a very faithful Christian. She would help any family in need by not charging them for what they needed. She believed in helping the needy. At times, she was known to slip something in people's bags when she caught them looking at something they needed or wanted and didn't have the money to buy. She extended credit for those who needed to pay later. Oddly, she seemed to be able to remember how much they owed without looking it up.

Mary soon needed a bigger store. She found an empty store building right behind the local post office. That grew her business even more. People would drop in when they went to pick up their mail whether needed anything or not. The men would do their business in town and the women would flock to Mary Ida's. They'd gather around the old potbellied stove and talk while customers would pick through clothes and shoes. It was happy times.

Mary stayed at this store site for almost 15 years. Times seemed to get harder when her husband passed away. He wasn't able to work but yet had been her rock. The one she turned to in need. The children had all grown up and most had left home by now. Now it all left to Momma. She kept working hard, putting all her faith in the Lord.

Time went on and Mary paid off the farm. Now it was hers. She got a chance to rent a store building on Main Street. She felt this would help her business so she rented it. It had two big windows where she could display items and she added furniture to sell. Business was good again. Other second had stores came to town but none seemed to do as good as Mary Ida's and they would last long. Business got so good that May Ida was able to buy the store. After 35 years of being in business, she now could afford to buy her own place. Now she had all the responsibility. The building had two apartments upstairs that she rented out. People kept buying and paying, whether it was on time or pay then. Mary was willing to work with her customers so they were able to pay and still have enough to get by on.

Time passed and Mary enjoyed her profits, still remembering the Lord was who had helped her in life and she always remembered to give thanks.

By the time 2005 arrived, Mary had been in business 55 years. She had aged and was unable to hand pick her loads. Traveling all the way to Ohio was hard on her, let alone standing on her feet all day was more than she could bear at her age. She began to get her loads in bales. They weren't as good and she began to sell less. Besides this, yard sales were popping up every week end while she still just got a load every month. Business began to take a turn for the worse. Drastic changes were taking place. She made hardly any profits and it seemed as if it was time for her to close.

Mary decided to retire. She sold the building she had purchased and closed. She had done well. She left with most of her customers paying her in full, but some would never pay. She smiled and went on know God would take care of her.

We lost our beloved Mary Ida on July 30, 2011. No one will ever take her place.

of her van when, "All of a sudden I looked up and a woman grabbed my arm, literally grabbed my arm, jerked my purse and garment bag and then took off."

Martin says she chased the robber to an SUV, where a man in the driver's seat was waiting for the woman. "I grabbed her from behind, trying to retrieve my things and I grabbed her as hard as I could, screaming the whole time, 'Give me my purse,'" Martin said.

As Martin chased and then hung onto the woman to try and grab back her items as the woman was getting into the vehicle, the driver suddenly took off, dragging Martin with them for a time. Martin eventually fell to the ground, hitting her head, and watched as the black and tan Ford Expedition drove off. Martin told the *Signal* that she realized she had made a mistake in chasing the woman, because she could have been seriously hurt while she was being dragged or when she fell. "The scariest part was when I realized I was going to be hurt, maybe run over by the vehicle, when it stopped dragging me. Thankfully, the Lord was watching over me and I only hit my head."

Martin said, "I will not let them stop me from coming shopping. I'll just be more careful. People just need to be aware of their surroundings, take a look, take notice. Just be as safe as you can."

Police arrived in the parking lot within minutes but the suspects were long gone. EMS workers did find Martin's wallet in the parking lot where it had evidently fallen out of her purse during the struggle, but she still lost her purse, cell phone, and \$500 worth

of clothing. Martin gave a description to the police of the two people. She told the *Signal* they were a white couple, in their late 20s or early 30s, the man's head was shaved and the woman had long blond hair.

Martin's robbery was the second one in the Fayette Mall parking lot in December. The other robbery also happened in the same part of the parking lot outside of Dillard's.

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
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

Saturday accident claims the life of 7-year-old girl and 5-year-old brother

A two-car collision on Hwy. 150, at the Maretburg intersection last Saturday afternoon, has claimed the lives of two Rockcastle County children.

Jada and Malachi Hayes, ages 7 and 5 of Mt. Vernon, were passengers in a car being driven by Jody Hayes, 23, of Brodhead when, according to State Police reports, the Hayes vehicle, a 1989 Ford Thunderbird traveling westbound on 150, made a left turn toward Maretburg Road into the path of an eastbound 1990 Lincoln Town Car, operated by Wendy Riley, 41, of Mt. Vernon.

The children were rear seat passengers who, the report said, were not restrained in the vehicle. However, the children's father, Tony Hayes, 29, told the *Signal* Monday that he had buckled Jada, and her brother, Malachi, into the vehicle.

Jada and Malachi were flown to the UK Medical Center where Jada died Sunday, January 8th. Malachi

died Wednesday, January 11th.

A third rear seat passenger, Madison Hayes, 3, of Brodhead, daughter of Jody Hayes, who was restrained in a child safety seat, was taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital for treatment and later released.

Jody Hayes was not injured in the crash. Tony Hayes was taken to the Rockcastle Hospital for treatment and later released.

Riley, the driver of the Lincoln, and a passenger, her daughter, Aubriauna Jones, 7, were both taken to the Rockcastle County Hospital for treatment and later released.

Alcohol and/or drug usage is not suspected.

Kentucky State Trooper Ryan Loudermilk is in charge of the investigation.

Additional counselors were on hand Monday at Mt. Vernon Elementary School where Jada was a second grader. Students, faculty and staff released balloons in

Sheriff, County Clerk present 2012 budgets to Fiscal Court

The Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department and Danetta Allen, County Clerk both presented their 2012 calendar year budgets to the fiscal court at the court's regular meeting Tuesday.

The sheriff's budget shows a decrease of \$10,000 in the 2012 budget -- \$470,000 to 2011's \$480,000. The change primarily comes from the dif-

ference of the salary of a HIDA deputy (\$58,000), since Barry Adams, who held that position went to the City of Mt. Vernon as Assistant Police Chief, and the addition of \$30,000 for security provided at the local hospital (reimbursed by the hospital) \$5,000 for additional overtime for deputies, additional hours for bailiffs - \$7,000 and \$4,000 for a 25c per hour raise for

employees of the department. The department presently has 11 employees, including part time.

Deputy Clerk Dale McNew, who made the budget presentation to the court, told the court that \$86,000 was included in the budget as a supplement from the county covering \$24,000 for a gas allowance, \$25,000 overtime funding, \$30,194 pay for one deputy and

\$7,000 funding for 1/2 court security. The county, of course, also fronts the money for positions that are reimbursed through the state and hospital and for KLEFF reimbursement of \$6,240 for a total of \$61,240.

The court approved the sheriff's budget for 2012 and a maximum salary schedule of \$256,000, down from \$270,000 in 2011.

County Clerk Danetta Allen presented her 2012 budget to the court with the good news that her estimate of the excess fees for 2011 of something over \$50,000 had held true and the court would be receiving that amount with her 2011 budget settlement.

The 2012 budget numbers of \$2,290,275 are close to the 2011 budget, Allen told the court with increases in some categories and decreases in others. The excess fees expected for the county are \$52,329 for 2012.

Allen did ask for an increase of \$20,000 in her maximum salary allowance to \$200,000 primarily to allow her to hire someone to "back file" more computer records. Records are currently on the computer only

School board turns thumbs down on smoking ban motion

After taking care of some beginning of the year chores, such as re-electing Martin Vanzant as Chairman of, along with Tina Hasty as vice-chairman and keeping the second Tuesday of each month as their regular meeting date, except at 6 p.m. instead of 7 p.m., the board took up the issue of a no tobacco ban on all school property, including vehicles.

The measure, as drafted for presentation to the board, would have prohibited smoke breaks for personnel during the school day but would have provided for designated areas at athletic events.

Four of the five board members expressed opposition to the ban, including Mike Burdette who said he didn't feel it was right to tell an adult they cannot use a legal product on grounds their taxes pay for.

Vice Chairman Tina Hasty expressed the opinion that the ban might be put off with employees told that it was coming in two or three years. However, Vanzant said he felt this was just "postponing the inevitable."

Board member Angela Stallworth-Mink said she did not think it was right to "take something from them (teachers)" since they can't leave school during the day

except for designated reasons, such as business, illness, etc. "Who are we to tell people they can't smoke," she asked.

Vanzant told members that the board was well within their rights to establish the ban. "GE in Louisville made their grounds smoke free as of January 1st," Vanzant said. Supt. Larry Hammond put forth the argument that research has shown that second and even third hand smoke can be harmful to students.

Vanzant asked for a motion to pass the no tobacco policy but none was forth-

The Pride of the Lions Club History in Rockcastle
 What is the Lions Club? We often drive down the road and see a Lions Club International sign as we enter a town, know someone in the club, attend an event sponsored by the organization, or hear of someone the Lions have helped. Here in the country, we have been fortunate enough at one time to have had three clubs functioning: Brodhead, Mount Vernon, and Livingston. These were some of the very oldest in the state with Livingston's possibly being one of the four oldest.

According to Bing's search engine, the organization began June 7, 1917, with a Chicago business leader, Melvin Jones, asking a simple question: "What if people put their talents to work improving their communities?" Almost a hundred years later, the Lions Club International is the world's largest service club organization, with more than 1.3 million members in more than 45,000 clubs all over the world. There have been thousands of individuals and communities helped by the club.

The club went international in 1920. Helen Keller addressed the group in 1925 and challenged them to be "knights of the blind in the crusade against darkness". The United Nations, in 1945, invited the Lions Club to assist in drafting the United Nations' charter.

The Leo Program, created in 1957, provides the youth an opportunity to develop through volunteering. Since 1990, the Lions have raised in excess of 346 million dollars to fight the ma-

major causes of blindness, cataracts, trachoma, river blindness, childhood blindness, diabetic retinopathy, and glaucoma.


The vision statement is: "To be the global leader in community and humanitarian service". The mission statement is: "To empower volunteers to service their communities, meet humanitarian needs, encourage peace and promote international understanding through Lions Clubs".

One may think of the Lions Club as only an organization to aid the blind but it is so much more, locally and internationally. The club fights hunger internationally, childhood diseases such as measles, donates to typhoon relief efforts, sponsors homes for orphans in India, gives holiday gifts for troops, organizes youth camps, gives gift baskets to health and public safety workers, and entertains patients at hospitals. These are only a few of the many causes the Lions Club International sponsors.

"Whenever a Lions Club gets together, problems get smaller and communities get better. That's because we help where help is needed in our own communities and around the world-with unmatched integrity and energy."

Now that we have more of a grasp of what the Lions Club is all about, we can get a better understanding of it locally. That will be the focus of next week's Roots series.

"David Joe, be sure to scrape off the top layer of snow so it will be clean. Also, make sure to avoid any snow that is yellow!"

When I returned with an ample supply of fresh snow, Mommie Katie used her recipe to make the finest snow cream that you could

ever put into your mouth. Bobby Harper recently sent me a recipe that his mother used to make her snow cream. Mommie Katie's recipe was slightly different, but I am sure they both were very good.

Mommie Katie's recipe was:
 3/4 cups of whole milk
 3/4 cup of sugar
 3/4 teaspoon of vanilla
 1 large aluminum mixing bowl of snow (she always used the same bowl when making snow cream)

Just like Bobby Harper's mother, Mommie Katie mixed the ingredients before adding the snow to make the mixture just like real ice cream. I believe her snow cream was the best I have ever tasted. Everyone in our family savored her concoction. Pop could not get enough of that sweet delight. Every time I had friends over when it was snowing, Mommie suggested that we make snow cream. It was a real treat!

Now that I have reached my "golden years," I still love a good snow storm. My wife and I have a sign hanging over the back door of our house that shows how we feel. It reads: "Let It Snow - Let It Snow - Let It Snow."

So all of you snow lovers (I know you are out there) need to be praying for snow - cause it sure looks like this particular winter is going to need some supernatural help to get going.



Many people start the New Year with a financial resolution: to reduce debt, save money, spend money more wisely, increase their retirement savings or something similar. But despite good intentions, New Year's resolutions often get abandoned. To stay on track, consider the following tips, which are designed to help you achieve your financial goals.

Write down the goals and post them in a visible place to serve as a daily reminder. The fridge, bedroom mirror or your computer are good places to keep your goals in sight.

Plan out step by step what you have to do to achieve your goals. This kind of planning forces you to visualize and then to realize the steps. For instance, if you want to save \$2,000, you might open a savings account and have a set amount moved into the account each time you get a paycheck. That way, the money is "gone" before you can spend it and will accumulate in small increments, usually 26 or 12 "payments." So you aren't tempted to use the money for another reason, think of it as literally paying a debt to yourself.

Track your progress. Putting pen to paper, creating a spreadsheet, or filling in a ledger—these regular reminders help you remember your goals and how important they are.

Take pride in your accomplishments, even the small ones, because they add up quickly. Eating

breakfast at home every morning could save you \$3 to \$5 dollars a day which, over a year's time, adds up to a savings of \$750 to \$1250. Even forgoing just one breakfast out a week could put an extra \$150 to \$250 in your wallet.

Don't get discouraged if you need to rethink your goals. Economic uncertainty is the new reality, so it's important not to underestimate how things can change quickly. Unforeseen circumstances, such as a reduction in working hours or a large medical expense, could force you to change your savings plan. The best way to cope with these kinds of situations is to be fiscally fit, and if you are already following a plan, then you working to achieve fiscal fitness.

to 1990 and Allen said records should be on for the past 30 years. However, Allen also told the court that of the \$180,000 approved for 2011, she only used around \$160-165,000 and the court decided that the maximum

should be left at \$180,000 with the caveat that if she found the need for an increase the court would be receptive.

With tongue-in-cheek, Allen bemoaned the lack of a reward for a job well done with salaries in 2011 but agreed to change her maximum salary request to \$180,000. This also changed her total budget to

\$20,000 less than originally planned and added \$20,000 to the excess fees column. The court approved both the salary schedule and budget for 2012.

Michelle Newcomb, a member of the Livingston Volunteer Fire Department made a presentation to the court concerning the need for a new building for the

department.

“Our building is pitiful,” Newcomb said, speaking of the metal quonset type building now in use. Newcomb also told the court that she, and other members of a newly-formed fire department committee, had recently taken over the finances of the department and said that, in future, everything concerning finances would be posted on a bulletin board at the department for everyone’s information.

The main concern at the time, Newcomb said, is \$8,580 owed on an adjoining lot that the department does not have the money to pay. She also presented the court with a drawing by Mark Carpenter of a building the department would like to have and asked the court’s help with the project.

The department is now set up as a city fire department and Magistrate Bill McKinney suggested the reorganization of the department into a rural department. “That way the fire department would have control over its officers and not be by anyone who might be elected Mayor and didn’t like the ones in office,” McKinney said. Newcomb agreed and said that Mayor J.C. Griffin would like to see it re-organized as a rural department an assertion later verified by Griffin himself who came into the meeting at a later point.

After much discussion, County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis made a motion that the court purchase the lot the department owes the \$8,580 on, along with the lot the present building sits on. The motion carried.

Carloftis also polled the court to see if there was agreement that the department needed a new fire department building. There was and it was agreed that the necessary paperwork would be started by the department to change their status to a rural department before the court went further with plans for a new building.

Russell Barron is presently chief of the department that has three fire trucks owned by the county and one truck supplied by the state forestry service.

The other item which created the most discussion was another request from Constable Richard Dean for the court to help constables with their expenses in carrying out the duties of their office.

Dean drew one supporter from the audience, Al DeChambeau who told the court that he didn’t understand their reluctance to help the constables. “With crime as bad as it is, any help to law enforcement is a good thing.”

County Attorney Billy Reynolds also told the court how helpful Dean had been in serving papers

for his office. “They have helped me out a lot and gotten me caught up on papers I needed served.” However, Reynolds went on to say that his first duty was to the citizens of the county, alluding to the fact that the court feels that if they supplement the constables they might face potential liability for their actions.

Magistrate Bill McKinney pointed out that only Class A city’s with a population of 500,000 or more pay constables and Jefferson is the only county in the state that fits that description.

Constables presently receive \$10 for serving a citation, warrant, etc. and sometimes two or three trips are required to make

service, Dean said, causing the service of the papers to cost more than he is paid. Dean told the court that in 2011, he served 78 citations, 49 warrants, 58 summons, worked twelve break-ins, answered 492 distress calls and put 22,463 miles on his vehicle. “We just need a little bit of help with our expenses,” he told the court.

Carloftis ended the discussion by appointing a committee of four to study ways the county might help constables with expenses without exposing the court to liability. Members of the committee appointed were: magistrates Gary Burdette and Ralph Allen, Al DeChambeau and former Livingston policeman Carl Swanigan.

The Rockets were only down 5 at the end of the first


quarter, 13-18 but were outscored 30-6 in the second quarter and 25-6 in the third before taking the fourth 13-9.



coming. He then made the motion himself but it died for lack of a second.

The board then went on

to discuss finances and Finance Director Melanie Lyons presented a financial report to the board showing a cash balance of \$1.7 million in the general fund and 10-11% of the budget in a contingency fund. The board is required to keep 2% in this fund but Supt. Hammond told the board that some school districts with only the required 2% have been facing difficulties with recent budget cuts to school districts from the state.

As to those cuts, Lyons told the board that the state recently told districts that SEEK (student education excellence in Kentucky) funds would be cut by \$366,200 in the January to July period of this year. This follows a cut of \$310,000 the districts had already absorbed last year. And, Lyons added, the board will be losing \$800,000 in stimulus money they received which was used to pay the salaries of 13 certified and classified workers (mostly certified). “Without those funds, there would have had to be layoffs,” Lyons said.

The board presently has a 20-1 student/teacher ratio, one of the lowest in the state, but that may have to change, Lyons said. And, she said even without pay increases, the budget for salaries has to be increased because of rising retirement costs and increment raises mandated.

“The 2013 budget will give us a true picture of where we stand financially,” Lyons told the board.

Chairman Vanzant reminded the board that the first joint meeting of the board and the superintendent screening committee is set for Wednesday, February 1st. To date there have been four applications for the position.

The February 1st meeting is the first in a series of four meetings that will culminate with candidate interviews during the Feb. 20th-March 10th period and the new superintendent being named on March 15th.

Members of the screening committee are Jason Coguer, Janet Wells, Tracy Gabbard, Sean Burdette and Sherry Spragens.

In other business, Hammond told the board that the calendar committee’s recommendation of the week of March 12-16 for spring break would be presented at the February meeting. Because there has only been one day missed because of weather this school year, the full



Mr. Ford is the longest serving representative in the Republican Party since 1900. During his tenure he has played integral roles in helping establish the Kentucky Music Museum and Hall of Fame; worked to upgrade Highways 27, 150 and 461; worked to upgrade and improve school facilities and assisted in bringing public water service to over 96% of the 80th legislative district that currently includes Rockcastle and Lincoln Counties, and a portion of Pulaski County.

During his years in the House of Representatives he has been honored as National Republican Legislator of the Year and served as the Minority Whip in 1993-1994, and the Minority Floor Leader from 1995-2000, and is currently the Minority Whip.

Redistricting plan moves Rockcastle to 2nd District

A first round of petitions have been presented to Representative Danny Ford in opposition to Rockcastle County being moved from the 5th District to the 2nd. Among other counties in the second district would be:

the western part of Pulaski County, Edmonson, Green, Jessamine Mead, Monroe, Metcalf and part of Jefferson.

The petition drive, which has collected 1500 signatures thus far, was organized by RCHS students: Caroline Green, president of the Young Democrats Club; Hannah Eaton, president of the Teen Republican Club and co-captain of the RCHS UNITE Club, Ashton Arvin, current KYA president and co-captain of the UNITE Club and Brianna Copenhaver, UNITE member.

One reason the petition were circulated was that the redrawing would result in Rockcastle not being able to participate in Operation UNITE. Rockcastle County's elementary,

middle school and high school all presently carry the designation of Outstanding UNITE Club in the state.

In an effort to raise awareness of the need to fight this redrawing, the four students met with the Rockcastle Chamber of Commerce Tuesday to seek their help. It was pointed out by Eaton, that passage of House Bill 2 would impact the lives of every person in Rockcastle County.

Arvin told the group that "nearly 30 students from RCHS who are Rogers Scholars are in college because of scholarships they received as Rogers Scholars. The Rogers Scholars program for high school and the Rogers Explorers program for middle school students would be totally

eliminated if we are removed from the Fifth." Arvin went on to point out that "we would also lose the PRIDE program, Forward in the Fifth and numerous programs and grants made available through the Center for Rural Development. He added that there are many economic grants and tourism grants that only counties in the Fifth can apply for and for which Rockcastle would be ineligible if moved to the Second District.

Eaton told chamber members that "we currently have over 30 people from Rockcastle County in drug treatment programs, thanks to vouchers from Operation UNITE. However, those vouchers are available only


In fact, I was just beginning to envision an annual trek to Florida with the rest of the "snow birds" but, instead, I had to dust off my limited reportage skills.

1931 Model A Ford

While having a discussion with my friend Bud Cox about some of the automobiles we owned when we were young, I made the connection that he was the proud owner of a 1931 Model A Ford and that my grandfather (Pop) had purchased his own '31 when the vehicles first arrived on the scene. Pop had told me several times that he purchased his brand new Model A for a mere \$600.

Pop was enormously proud of his new automobile, and he strived to keep it spotlessly clean. One afternoon, one of Pop's neighbors asked if he could "hitch" a ride to Mt. Vernon. Pop graciously said that he could. As they rode toward town, the gentleman needed to spit his tobacco juice. Because the windows were so clean, he thought that the passenger window was rolled down and tried to spit

out the window. To his dismay and Pop's horror, the spittle splattered on the glass and ran down into the interior of the door. Pop never forgot this sordid incident about his new car.

Bud explained how he had located and purchased his own '31 Model A in 1961, "Jess Baker was working on a house in Jessamine County when he noticed the automobile had a for sale sign on the window. Henry Hines, Billy Jackson, and I drove over to take a look at the car. I made an offer, and the owner accepted my bid. After several unsuccessful attempts to get it to start, we decided to pull the car back to Mt. Vernon with a chain. The next day, I cleaned out the gas tank and it started right up."

When asked what he did to the vintage automobile, Buddy replied, "I drove it! I eventually changed the wheels and covered the seats." I can remember riding with him on many occasions in that vehicle when we were in high school together. One particular trip that I remember was when we drove the back roads from Mt. Vernon to Renfro Valley. Everyone that saw us passing by would look at the vehicle as if it was a special ride, and indeed it was.

The Ford Model A was produced from 1928 until 1931. During that time, 4,849,340 Model A's were manufactured. Prices for the Model A ranged from \$385 for a roadster to \$1,400 for

The Pride of the Lions Club History in Rockcastle, Part II

After taking a look at the Lions Club International's history last week, the Roots series will focus more on the local Lions Club in Livingston this week. This is because there is presently a new club forming in Livingston that will be known as the Livingston Community Lions Club.

Last week, I had mentioned that the old club in Livingston was one of the oldest in the state. After some further reading, I've found that isn't the case. The first club to form in Kentucky was in Paducah on April 16th, 1920. It was followed by a club in Mayfield, Owensboro, Louisville, and Lexington in the same year. Hazard's was formed in 1922, and Frankfort's in 1923. Ashland and Fulton's clubs were formed in 1924. Maysville joined in 1929. In 1931, Bowling Green, Paris,

Winchester, Richmond and Harrodsburg joined. These were the fifteen earliest clubs in the state. The Livingston Lions Club was formed in September of 1940. They met twice a month on Tuesday nights at the school. It was founded by Dr. Robert Webb. Over the years, there were several members that would come and go. Some that came to mind other than Dr. Webb, were Willard Whitaker, Harold Durham, Forester Mullins, Calvin Webb, Charles Parsons, Jerry Mink, Bobby Webb, Carlo and Buzz Carloftis, Dell Ponder, Bill Kelsey, Cleo Bryant, and Bobby Wilson. Cleo Bryant's husband, Edgar, served as club president for many years.

During the peak years, the club had a membership of ten to fifteen members. They had an active club that did quite a bit of good in the

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

the top-of-the-line Town Car. The engine was a water-cooled L-head 4-cylinder with a displacement of 201 cubic inches. That engine provided 40 horsepower and had a top speed of 65 mph.

The Model A's fuel tank was located in the cowl, between the engine compartment's fire wall and the dash panel. It had a visual fuel gauge, and the fuel flowed to the carburetor by gravity. A rear-view mirror was optional. Buyers could purchase an aftermarket cast-iron unit to place over the exhaust manifold in or-

der to provide heat to the cab. Adjusting the amount of hot air entering the cab was a small door. I remember Pop talking about how hard it was to adjust the temperature in the automobile when it was very cold outside.

I remember Bud's Model A well - and how fast it could get moving from a standing start. As Bud would say, "It would get gone quick!" Once he told me that he believed he could beat almost any car of the early '60s if the race was only 25 feet. I always loved it when Bud suggested that we take his Model A for a ride in the country. It was a fun car in which to ride.

Bud and I have shared many interests over the past 50 years, and one of them has been vintage automobiles. Presently, he owns a 1959 Cadillac hearse that he is restoring. I cannot wait to take a ride in this classic beauty. I am sure that when this interesting project has been completed, Bud will give me a call and we will try it out. Mamaw's Kitchen

REGINA'S LASAGNA

This has become our traditional Christmas dinner. All my family likes this—even the pickiest ones. Christmas of 2010 I made two huge pans full and it was all gone in two days. I asked them if they were tired of it yet. They wanted me to make another one!

1 pound ground beef
1 pound sweet Italian sausage
53 ounces of your favorite spaghetti sauce
1 cup shredded parmesan cheese, divided
2 eggs, slightly beaten
1 cup mozzarella cheese, divided
1 cup ricotta cheese
8 lasagna noodles
Preheat oven to 350°. Crumble beef and sausage in large skillet. Cook until no pink remains. Stir in spaghetti sauce. Heat thoroughly and turn off heat. Mix eggs with ricotta cheese, 3/4 cup mozzarella cheese and 3/4 cup parmesan cheese. Spray lasagna pan with non-stick spray. Layer as follows:
2 cups sauce in bottom of pan
4 lasagna noodles, uncooked

Half of cheese mixture
Half of remaining sauce
4 lasagna noodles, uncooked
Rest of cheese mixture
Rest of sauce
Remaining 1/4 cup mozzarella cheese
Remaining 1/4 cup parmesan cheese
Bake for 1 hour 15 minutes at 350°. Remove from oven and let sit for 15 to 30 minutes before serving.

Most small communities have at least one run/walk event in a year. Some have more, maybe three or four at most. In 2012, Rockcastle County will have 12, one in each month of the year.

The initiative, called the 2012 County-wide Stride, is being led by Rockcastle Regional Hospital.

Entry fees are inexpensive. Giveaways and age-division trophies are given to participants. There are incentives as well. Those who complete seven of the 12 events will receive a free long-sleeve County-wide Stride T-shirt. Participants get the shirt and a \$25 gift certificate for completing 10, and an additional personalized plaque for finishing all 12 races.

A publication called Rockcastle Strides, which highlights the races and local runners and walker, is also being distributed this week throughout the community. 



Marine Divisions in California, Okinawa, and Southeast Asia. He participated in the evacuation of American citizens from Cambodia when the government there fell to the Khmer Rouge, the evacuation of Saigon when the North Vietnamese overran that country and participated in a helicopter assault of Koh Tang Island in Operation Mayaguez when a U.S.-flagged merchant ship was seized by the Cambodian government in May of 1975.

After his release from active duty, Coldiron attended the University of Kentucky where he earned his Bachelor's Degree in Chemistry, graduating in December of 1978. In September of 1979 he was commissioned an ensign after graduating from Officer Candidate School. He decided to become a Surface Warfare Officer. His first shipboard assignment was in a Spruance Class destroyer, USS Moosbrugger, homeported in Charleston, South Carolina. He made his first deployment to the Mediterranean Sea on Moosbrugger.

Following his tour there, he was assigned to Combatant Hydrofoil Squadron Two in Key West, Florida as the Squadron Operations Officer. Although an experimental program for the Navy, the Hydrofoils, which were capable of 50 knot speeds, proved instrumental in fighting drug trafficking in the Florida Strait.

He then taught at the Surface Warfare Officers' School in Newport, Rhode Island for two years before attending Department Head School and reporting to USS Dahlgren a guided missile destroyer homeported in Norfolk, Virginia.

While on Dahlgren, Coldiron deployed to the Persian Gulf in 1988 and was involved in the so-called Tanker War. Dahlgren spent 117 straight days at sea, patrolling primarily in the North Arabian Sea and the Strait of Hormuz, escorting unarmed merchant ships warding off the threats from Iranian small boats and land-launched missiles.

Coldiron went from Dahlgren to become the Surface Operations Officer for Commander, Carrier Group Two which was homeported in Norfolk, though he saw little time in the United States during that tour.

When he reported to the Group, the staff was embarked in USS Coral Sea operating in the Eastern Mediterranean in response to Syrian threats to shipping and an increase in terrorist activity in Lebanon.

The Group changed ships mid-deployment from Coral Sea to USS America, extending its deployment. The group returned to Norfolk in 1998 but after thirty days in port, was sent to operate with a joint task force in the Caribbean Sea embarked in USS John F. Kennedy. Group Two and Kennedy had just arrived in Norfolk on August 2, 1990 when Saddam Hussein's forces invaded Kuwait.

On August 11th, Group Two was given 96 hours to prepare Kennedy, four cruisers, two destroyers and

a frigate for extended deployment. Kennedy departed Norfolk on August 15th and returned after the final Iraqi surrender in March, 1991.

During the deployment, Coldiron was responsible for the planning, target selection, and launches of the first Tomahawk missiles from the battle groups' cruisers and destroyers.

Coldiron was then selected as the aide-de-camp to Vice Admiral Paul Reason, Commander, Surface Forces, US Atlantic Fleet.

Coldiron then served as Executive Officer or second-in-command in USS Thomas S. Gates, one of the early Aegis cruisers in the Atlantic Fleet.

He was then appointed Chairman of the Professional Programs Department at the United States Naval Academy in Annapolis. While running his own department, he also taught Leadership and Ethics in the Department of Leadership and Law as well as ship handling and navigation in the Department of Seamanship and Navigation.

He then got his first chance at command when he took over as Commanding Officer of the destroyer USS Stump.

His change of command occurred in Augusta Bay, Sicily at the beginning of an eventful deployment. Coldiron took the ship into the Black Sea to operate with ships from countries that were members of the former Soviet Union. After spending three weeks in the Black Sea, Stump's Tomahawks were called upon to launch against Al Qaeda targets in the Sudan after the attacks on the U.S. Embassies in Kenya in Tanzania in 1998.

After his first command tour, Coldiron was assigned to the U.S. Naval War College in Newport, Rhode Island where he earned a Masters Degree in National Security Decision Making. Upon completion of the course, he went back to sea as the Commander of Maritime Prepositioning Squadron One which was permanently deployed to the European Theater of Operations. The five ships in Squadron One held enough equipment to support 17,000 Marines for thirty days in combat. For example, the ships carried among them 60 M1A1 Abrams tanks, several dozen artillery pieces, hundreds of HUMVEEs as well as light attack vehicles.

He was then selected by Admiral Grog Johnson to be the Inspector General for U.S. Navy Forces, Europe. Admiral Johnson as Commander, Sixth Fleet, was Coldiron's direct reporting senior when he commanded the Squadron. Admiral Johnson was then promoted to Commander of all U.S. Navy Forces Europe and took Coldiron with him to his headquarters in London, England.

Coldiron's last tour was as the Defense and Naval Attaché to the Kingdom of Denmark, an office he held from 2006 until his retirement in 2009.

As the senior U.S. military officer in Denmark, Coldiron was responsible for maintaining a close working relationship between the United States and Denmark as well as advising the Ambassador on issues related to the military, including armament purchases and intelligence mat-

ters.

Upon his departure from Denmark, Coldiron was knighted by order of the Queen and made a Commander of the Order of the Dannebrog, the highest honor that can be given a non-Danish military officer.

His other awards include the Defense Superior Service Medal, the Legion of Merit, Six Meritorious Service Medals, two Navy Commendation Medals (one for heroism), the Navy Achievement Medal, three Combat Action Ribbons, the Navy Good Conduct Medal as well as numerous campaign and unit awards.

After his retirement in 2009, Coldiron returned to Rockcastle County and started a small business: Kentucky Iron Horse LLC, an auto repair shop.

As to his decision to run for the office of State Representative, Coldiron said, "I've always had an interest in politics. Although I've been gone from Rockcastle County for a long time, I've spent a lot of my life here and came back because I want to continue to serve the people I love in the place that I love. My roots are very deep here and part of me never left the hills of Kentucky."

I started a business here because I wanted to see what business people have to face on a day-to-day basis. Although I still own the building and the tools, I have turned over the business to Johnny Joenborg, a friend from Denmark, a hard worker and very bright man who is thankful, I think, for the opportunities he sees in our country and our Commonwealth.

I sincerely believe that the Navy prepared me well to face virtually any challenge that comes my way. I hope the people of the new 80th District will give me the opportunity to represent them in the Kentucky Legislature.

I have little money, little name recognition, and no political organization but I do have a strong desire to serve. Having none of those things puts me at a distinct disadvantage but it also means I am beholden to no one. I have no favors to return and no borrowed political capital. I can do this job and I can do it honestly. I pledge, if I am elected, to do what is best for the people of the District. I am not doing this for personal gain or for glory—a lot can be accomplished if no one cares who gets the credit.

I think Danny Ford did a great deal of good for the District. I hope I can, as we said in the Navy, steer as steady a course as he did and I would be proud to follow in his wake."

Roger Coldiron is a member of the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution, American Mensa, the Navy Mustang Association (an organization for officers who have served as enlisted members of the Navy and were awarded a Good Conduct Medal), and is a lifetime member of the Navy Surface Warfare Association.

to residents of the Fifth Congressional District.”

Eaton urged everyone to “not be complacent” and to call and email and sign the petitions “so we can get back to the business at hand -- making our county and our commonwealth drug-free.”

Each member was given a petition and asked to gather signatures and return them to the high school early Friday morning so they can be forwarded to Frankfort, hopefully before the Senate vote on HB2.

Nancy Hale, UNITE Club sponsor, whose husband, John is chairman of the Rockcastle/Unite Coalition, told chamber members that the redistricting plan could end up in court because of the number of counties divided (6) but the volume of response from the counties affected will be one of the most important parts of getting HB2 defeated.

State Representative Danny Ford told the *Signal* Tuesday “I think it will get changed (HB2) and we'll wind up back in the 5th.” Ford's 80th district was realigned. It now runs from the Kentucky River, taking in a wedge of Madison County, a shoestring section of the northern part of Pulaski County and all of Rockcastle and Casey Counties. Lincoln County was taken out of his district entirely.

USDA Announces Disaster Assistance Sign up for 2010 Crop Losses

If you suffered 2010 crop losses, you could be eligible to receive benefits under the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Program (SURE). SURE is available to eligible producers who must have either of the following:

Farms in counties with Secretarial disaster declarations, including contiguous counties, that have incurred at least a 10 percent crop production or quality loss, or both, on all crops grown by

a producer nationwide, except grazed crops

Farms in which, for the crop year, an overall loss on the farm because of disaster-related conditions is greater than 50% of the actual production the farm compared to normal production for that crop year.

All Kentucky counties received a disaster designation during 2010, EXCEPT these counties: Clay, Floyd Harlan, Johnson, Knox, Lawrence, Leslie, Letcher, Martin and Pike.

To meet program eligi-

bility requirements, producers must have obtained a policy or plan of insurance for all insurable crops through the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation and obtained Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) coverage on non-insurable crops, if available, from FSA. Eligible farmers and ranchers who meet the definition of a socially disadvantaged, limited resource or beginning farmer or rancher do not have to meet this requirement.

Signup for the 2010 SURE program will continue through June 1, 2012. FSA provides assistance for livestock losses

Livestock producers who have begun the LIP (Livestock Indemnity Program) application process for 2011 must submit all the necessary documentation required and complete the application by January 31, 2012.



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Kelly Gentry honored by 12th Region officials

If you went to a 12th Region girls or boys basketball game last week, you may wonder why game officials were all wearing black/pink shirts and using pink whistles.

It's a way for them to honor Brodhead's Kelly Gentry, a fellow official who was diagnosed with cancer late last summer and died in November.

"We were shocked when we found out it had progressed so rapidly. He absolutely loved officiating baseball, basketball and football," said Danville's Scott Bottoms, a long-time 12th Region official and member of the Lake Cumberland Basketball Officials Association.

If you have been to 12th Region games, you have seen Gentry work. Maybe you did or did not agree with his calls, but that's part of the job he had. However, he had a passion for high school sports.

"He had a great sense of

humor and always had something funny to say. He enjoyed UK sports and was an avid fox hunter," Bottoms said. "The LCBOA really felt strongly about doing something to honor him during this season. After discussing this with the officials and our supervisor, we came up with the idea to wear pink whistles during all varsity games this week throughout the 12th Region."

It's a fitting tribute and also a way to remind all of us just how precious life can be. Certainly Gentry's fellow officials had to think he was going to be calling basketball, football and baseball game for many, many more years. With his passion for the sports, it was likely he would have officiated 30 more years. He loved it that much.

Schools in the region have agreed — as they should have — to read this short tribute to Gentry before each game this week:

"The Lake Cumberland Basketball Officials Association would like to take a moment to honor a member of its association, Kelly Gentry. Kelly lost his battle with cancer on Nov. 10, 2011. Kelly was also a member of the Lake Cumberland Football and Baseball Associations. Kelly is survived by his parents, Glen and Glenda Gentry, and a sister, Shandra Gentry Rowe.

The officials in tonight's game are wearing pink whistles to honor Kelly and cancer survivors and victims."

Be reverent during the tribute. Then applaud like crazy. Gentry would want that because he would not have wanted any tribute to him to take away the enthusiasm for the game he loved so much.


In fact, maybe fans should take time this week to thank officials for the jobs they do. None of us ever do that. Instead, we second-guess calls the officials make and normally leave convinced there were many more bad calls than correct calls.

Often we can convince ourselves that the officials might have even cost our favorite team a chance to win the game.

Gentry and his fellow officials accept that. It's part of an official's life.

But to go along with what the officials are doing to honor Gentry during games, try to find a way to at least thank the officials for what they do and making it possible for athletes to have games to participate in and for us to have games to watch.

"The LCBOA has lost a dear friend and fellow official. It truly has made each of us realize how fragile life is and to cherish each day that we have," Bottoms said. "Thanks so much for helping with this."

Graves inducted into Ky. Teacher Hall of Fame

The first question Clark-Moores Middle School history teacher Sharon Farthing Graves asks her students at the beginning of each school year is: "What have you heard about me?"

Several kids get brave enough and say, "I heard you're mean." To which Graves replies, "I'm not mean, I'm strict. There's a difference."

Despite her reputation, Graves can barely make it to her classroom without hugs, high-fives and vocal status updates from various students in the crowded hallways.

"I'm the 'mean one', remember? They quickly get over that," said Graves, who was inducted into the Louie B. Nunn Kentucky Teacher Hall of Fame at Western Kentucky University. Graves, a graduate of RCHS, was one of three teachers selected for this statewide honor.

The inductees are chosen on merit and not based on where they teach, said Cathie Bryant, representative from WKU's College of Education and Behavioral Sciences.

"I have found very few teachers — in my lifetime — that have the kind of rapport and association with students that she does," said Ed Ford, retired Berea College public relations director, who sent a letter of recommendation to WKU as part of her nomination.

"She's like a drill sergeant. She's really tough on the students, but she does it

in a tough-love sort of way," he said.

Graves has taught early American history for 23 years, 22 of those at Clark-Moores.

The Kentucky Hall of Fame induction is her fourth state honor as a teacher, having previously won the Daughters of American Revolution (DAR) Kentucky History Teacher of the Year in 2005, Kentucky Department of Education Teacher of Excellence in 2008 and the Kentucky Historical Society Award of Merit in 2009.

For six years, she coached girls basketball but would take two flashlights with her to away games to grade papers on the bus ride home. However, she gave that up so she could be more involved in other student activities.

"I could be a better teacher, but I was never going to be a better coach. I loved it, but there were people who could do it better than me," said Graves, who was a basketball player in high school.

Graves is now a coach for the school's mock trial team, which won the Kentucky Mock Trial Championship last year. The winning middle school team went on to compete in the high school tournament, during which her students defeated four high school teams.

She is also a student council sponsor. Each year, students in each grade compete for the chance to go to a UK basketball game with Graves by collecting the

most box tops.

Every four years, Graves takes a group of 8th graders to the Presidential inauguration.

After 23 years of teaching, she draws motivation from her passion for history and the moments when she has seen the "proverbial light bulb lighting up", over top of her students' heads, she said.

In five years, Graves will be eligible for retirement. Though she always envisioned that she would "just keep on teaching," working in the education system can wear a person down, she said.

However, during trying times, there are moments that make the stress worthwhile.

Graves reflected on her favorite memories as a teacher. While she fought off tears, she recalled a moment when a student said to her, "You teach everybody. You teach every profession. That's why you're important, because you teach all of us."

Graves is the daughter of Thelma Mullins and Buck Farthing, both of Rockcastle County.

Environmental liaison brings PRIDE to schools

Wonda Hammons is bringing PRIDE to Clay, Jackson and Rockcastle Counties' elementary schools, thanks to partnerships among local agencies and PRIDE.

As the counties' PRIDE Environmental Education Liaison, Hammons visits local classrooms to lead fun, hands-on activities that will prepare students for state science tests and life-long environmental stewardship.

She has worked with 1,842 students in the three counties so far this school year.

Hammons was hired through the PRIDE Environmental Education Outreach Program. The program increases children's environmental knowledge by providing curriculum-based lessons, which complement teachers' classroom instruction, and by involving students in cleanup activities. It targets third, fourth and fifth-grade classes, with an emphasis on fourth-graders, who take the annual state science test. Examples of topics covered by the

program's liaisons include native plants and energy conservation.

PRIDE offers the program in 38 counties of southern and eastern Kentucky. In each county, local leaders pay a fee, based on student population, to enroll their schools. During the 2010-2011 school year, 19 counties enrolled in the program, and liaisons reached 26,796 students.

In Clay County, the U.S. Forest Service's Red-bird Ranger District enrolled local schools in the program for the 2011-2012 school year.

The Jackson County Fiscal Court enrolled its school system.

In Rockcastle County, the annual enrollment fee was paid by the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court, Rockcastle County School System and Appalachia Science in the Public Interest.

"We are so pleased these local partners are supporting the program, and we appreciate the cooperation by the superintendents, principals and teachers," said PRIDE's Tammie Wilson.

"Ms. Hammons is an experienced PRIDE liaison," she added. "She works well with teachers to support them and reach as many students as possible. She is a talented artist and integrates art into many lessons."

When Hammons was Jackson County's liaison for the 2009/2010 school year, she spearheaded a contest to create student-designed road signs with environmental messages. The signs are now visible across the county, and the project won a PRIDE award. She is an active

member of the Jackson County PRIDE Committee.

PRIDE is a nonprofit organization that promotes "Personal Responsibility In a Desirable Environment" in southern and eastern Kentucky. PRIDE works with communities to improve water quality, clean up solid waste problems and increase environmental awareness. PRIDE was founded in 1997 by Congressman Hal Rogers (KY-5) and James Bickford, former Kentucky Secretary of Environmental Protection.



4-H Sewing Projects at elementary schools

The 4-H Sewing Projects will again be offered after school at each of the elementary schools. Sewing projects will be different than past years. There will be NO first class meeting; we will begin the classes on the appropriate dates listed below. This year the sewing projects will be conducted by local leaders and the Family & Consumer Sciences Agent. Following is the date and location of the first meeting at each school.

NOTE: Middle School and High School students may meet with the elementary school of their choice.

•February 13th-16th - Roundstone Elementary School

•February 21st -February 24th - Mt. Vernon Elementary School

•March 5th-8th - Brodhead Elementary School

**Students will stay after school until 5 p.m. Students can be picked up at the front door or in the sewing room. Hazel Jackson and/or volunteers must see the individual who is picking up the student.

**Parents, you will need to provide transportation home after classes at 5:00pm PROMPTLY.

During the classes, your child will learn to use a sewing machine, follow directions and construct a useful item. First year students may make a drawstring tote bag. Second year students may make a zippered tote bag or purse. Third year students may make a gym bag. Fourth year students will make a backpack with lin-

ing. Fifth year students will make a 2 or 3 piece luggage set.

Underlined items are most important for each child to have. The 4-H Program has some sewing equipment that can be loaned to 4-Her's for the week. Label all items with your name! Put it in some type of small box for easy storage at the school for the week.



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

UNITE using video and petition to fight necessary drug for meth

With methamphetamine labs continuing to be discovered at record numbers, members of the Rockcastle County UNITE Coalition have embarked on an educational campaign in support of state legislation to curb the one must have ingredient - pseudoephedrine.

That campaign is taking the form of a public service presentation on the local access TV channel during the next two weeks and a petition drive in support of requiring a prescription for most products containing pseudoephedrine - an ingredient in some cold and allergy medications.

The public service presentation is a video, produced by Jerry Burke of Mt. Vernon, which explains the meth problem using segments from an ABC News Nightline presentation filmed in Kentucky and the statewide "So Much Meth" campaign. It will be shown at 7 p.m. each Monday, Wednesday and Friday and at 10 a.m. on Saturdays on Newwave Channel 3 for the next two weeks.

Nearly identical bills - SB50 and HB79 - are currently making their way through the state Senate and House chambers which would require a prescription for products containing pseudoephedrine. A prescription would not be required for gel-cap versions of the medication, under the proposed legislation which impacts only 15 of the 152 options available to treat cold and allergy symptoms.



Loretta was concerned as to when dinner would start and whether the whole thing would be over 9.

I had been notified that my column had won second place in the "column category" and I had lamented to Willie Sawyers (publisher of *The Sentinel Echo*) and to Carrie Dillard, Managing Editor, that my favorite columnist in any paper, anywhere, Tara Kaprowy, should have won first place. And I had determined that I would mark out my name



Rave On

While "surfing" the Web, I discovered a new CD Box Set of music recorded by Buddy Holly. Since many of my weekly readers have revealed that they enjoy reading about music treasures, I decided to tell about my newly found gem. The set is called Rave On - The Very Best of Buddy Holly. It contains three CD's and is a compilation of 79 songs. I believe that it is the most complete recording catalog of the famous rocker of Lubbock.

I have been a devotee of Holly's music since he released his first chart-topping

single, "That'll Be The Day," in 1957. His hiccup-like vocal style as it combined with abrupt changes of pitch gave him a most distinctive sound. That sound has never been equaled in my view.

I clearly remember purchasing the 45-rpm record (which had "I'm Looking For Someone To Love" on the B-side). Radio stations quickly started playing the record, launching it to third place on the rock-and-roll charts in just a few weeks. The record virtually made Holly an overnight success.

Holly's band was called the Crickets, and they soon found themselves on several national television shows, including: American Bandstand, The Arthur Murray Dance Party, and The Ed Sullivan Show. This was about the time that my mother (Bee) decided to purchase our first black-and-white television set. My friends and I could be found absolutely glued to the TV whenever Holly performed. Two of their earliest releases (which became signature tunes for Holly), "Peggy Sue" and "Everyday," were performed in front of a national audience. It was an incredibly exciting time for teenagers in America.

Buddy Holly only played rock and roll for two short years, but the vast amount of material that he recorded during that time caused a major and lasting impact on popular music. He wrote his own music and lyrics, and he was the first to record such advanced studio techniques as double-tracking. His music influenced such rock music legends as Elvis, the Beatles, the Rolling Stones, Bob Dylan, the Grateful Dead, Linda Ronstadt, Bruce Springsteen, and Elvis Costello.

In 1958 Holly met his future bride Maria Elena Santiago, who was working as a receptionist at a music company in New York City. He asked her to marry him on their first date, and she accepted. They were married on August 5, 1958 in Lubbock, Texas.

In the midst of a winter tour, Holly was killed on February 3, 1959 when his plane crashed in a snow-covered field about ten miles east of Clear Lake, Iowa. Shortly following Holly's funeral in Lubbock, his pregnant widow, Maria, had a miscarriage. Holly's





hood. He had come home to care for family after serving thirteen years in the Korean Conflict. He was knowledgeable about the area and so very friendly.

I've often wondered why some older homes have two front doors, such as this home had, so I had to inquire. There had been, in this case anyway, an original cottage with one single front door. As the family grew, eventually to twelve children, there was an addition made to the house with a second front door.

The small community had a one-room schoolhouse, Anglin Falls School, which still stands. There were two teachers that came to mind from the 1940s, Hilda Gabbard and Evan Mullins. There was a general store, too. It was owned by John Payne and run by the Payne family: Howard, "Cleve" (Cleveland), Stanley, and Patty that was a classmate of Edna's. There was also a local church, Clear Creek Baptist, that still exists, as well. It has always been known locally as "slip-up", but the reason

isn't known.
Also in the community lived the Cook family: Sherman, Delia Griffin-Cook, and their children. One son was Henry Harrison, being Dale, Edna, Larry, and Stanley's father. The Cooks lived on Harvey Hill.

Delia was known in the area for having delicious sauerkraut, which she kept in a large barrel. The locals would come to buy the kraut for 25 cents. She was also known for having a bad temper when aggravated. When things got too dull in Disputanta on the banks of Clear Creek, the locals knew just what to do. Although they meant no harm, the locals would go by and antagonize Delia Cook. She could be counted on to give them a good cussing out and maybe a shot or two fired in their direction. These same locals also did the same to others in the community. I guess that is what happens during the Depression era when you can't get to the movie theatre.

Not to make her look too harsh, she was also known for putting a big meal on the table. She would bid neighbors and family to "come on and eat a little bite". She was known to always serve biscuits and blackberry jam. Her house always smelled like peppermint candy, Dale and Edna remembered.

Edna asked if she looked anything like Delia. She was told she looked somewhat like her. Delia was known as a "short, big" woman.

Sherman Cook was a musician. He played the dulcimer for friends and family alike and at Renfro Valley. He was sometimes seen walking the narrow country road out of the valley so he could catch a ride on the "main road" on his way to perform.

We certainly want to thank our host for a wonderful visit, hospitality, and memories. We certainly look forward to another visit to this wonderful part of the county, and seeing a new friend.

SLOW COOKER CHICKEN AND DUMPLINGS
6 skinless, boneless, chicken breast halves
1/2 teaspoon black pepper
1 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons butter
2 cans (10.75 ounces each) condensed cream of chicken soup
1 onion, finely diced
1 cup thinly sliced carrots
1 package (10 ounce) refrigerated biscuit dough, torn into pieces
Cut chicken into bite size pieces and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Place the chicken, butter, soup, onion, and carrots in a 5-quart slow cooker, and fill with enough water to cover the chicken. Cover slow cooker; cook for 5 to 6 hours on high. Place

the torn biscuit dough in the slow cooker and cook on high for an additional 1 hour or until the dough is no longer raw in the center.
SLOW COOKER CHICKEN CACCIATORE
6 skinless, boneless, chicken breast halves
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon black pepper
1 onion, thinly sliced
1 green pepper, thinly sliced
1 teaspoon garlic, minced
1 can (15 ounce) whole tomatoes, mashed
1 can (about 4 ounce) sliced mushrooms, drained
2 teaspoons tomato paste
Sprinkle chicken with salt and pepper. Place remaining ingredients in slow cooker. Add chicken on top. Cover slow cooker; cook 7 to 9 hours on low.

SLOW COOKER CHOCOLATE PUDDING CAKE

1 box (about 18 ounce) devil's food cake mix Click to see savings
1 box (about 4 ounce) instant chocolate pudding mix Click to see savings
1 container (16 ounce) sour cream Click to see savings
3/4 cup oil Click to see savings
4 eggs Click to see savings
1 cup water
1 bag (6 ounce) semi-sweet chocolate chips
Beat first 6 ingredients at low speed with an electric mixer 30 seconds or until blended. Beat at medium speed 2 minutes. Stir in chocolate chips. Pour into a lightly greased 4-quart round slow cooker. Cover and cook on low setting 4 hours or until set around the edges but still soft in the center. Turn off slow cooker and let stand 20 to 30 minutes; do not lift lid until ready to serve.

Frankfort Report...

It is our Constitutional duty every ten years to realign our voting districts according to population after each census. This act fulfills the requirement of one man, one vote. In this the third week of session, that is exactly what the Senate and House did with House Bill 1. According to tradition, the Senate draws our lines while the House of Representatives decides on theirs. My district changed somewhat with the addition of Estill County. I will continue to represent Madison and Rockcastle counties. (The final congressional district lines are still being discussed between the chambers.)



On Tuesday, the Governor gave the Budget Address outlining his priorities for Kentucky's budget. As I have been warning, we have close to a billion dollar shortfall; \$742 million to be exact over the biennium. I was glad to see that the Governor took a more realistic approach to the budget this time and didn't use phantom gambling proceeds to fund

programs. He also proposed cutting certain agencies by 8.4%. However, the Governor then proposed about \$800 million of additional spending. He is funding new programs and initiatives while applying severe cuts to other parts of government. This does not make sense to many of us in the Senate.

The House of Representatives has assigned the budget proposal to their budget subcommittees. When they have finished putting their mark on the document and the House passes the bill, the Senate will then have our turn at reviewing and revis-

ing the proposal. I will keep you updated on that process. We are in a 60-day legislative session so there is still plenty of time to let me know what topics interest you. The heavy workload of social workers and how to curb meth abuse were just two of the topics that committees focused on this week. A Significant Reminder

On a beautiful November afternoon as the sun was sinking in the western sky, a group of visitors to the Holy Land stood silently in Bethlehem and looked eastward toward the village of Beit Sahur. That little village, named for Ashur who was the father of Tekoa, is about a mile east of Bethlehem, and the rolling fields around the village are known as Shepherds' Fields.

Tradition tells us that, for centuries, shepherds have tended sheep in those rolling fields. Those sheep were not ordinary sheep; without blemish, they were special sheep and more valuable than others. Shepherds raised them for a specific purpose: they were to be sacrificed on the altar of the temple in Jerusalem.

We have the record that, on that night of nights when Jesus was born in a stable in Bethlehem of Judea, shepherds were keeping watch over their flocks of sheep in those fields, but that watch was suddenly and dramatically interrupted. An angel appeared to them, and they were terrified. Then the angel said to the shepherds, "Do not be afraid. I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all people. Today in the town of David (another name for Bethlehem) a Savior has been born to you; he is Christ the Lord. This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger."

Then, leaving their flocks untended in the fields, that which was most

valuable to them, the shepherds "hurried off" to Bethlehem "and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby, who was lying in the manger."

Christmas, the celebration of the birth of Jesus in Bethlehem of Judea, is a significant reminder that there are some things in life more important than valuable possessions. Like the valuable sheep of the shepherds in the fields around Beit Sahur, some things that seem valuable can be left without significant loss, and life may be better.

Over 130 children attended the UNITE basketball camp held at the Rockcastle County Middle School. The camp was hosted by former UK great Jeff Sheppard.

In August, 206 families took advantage of the free basic needs handed out at the Rockcastle Redi-fest. The items help students go back to school with their basic needs met.

A jury found Delbert Wayne Leger, 36, guilty of Theft of Identity, theft by deception and persistent felony offender, first degree.

Roundstone Elementary students got a free day off from school after a main water line for Western Rockcastle Water broke. The line was fixed by 9:30 a.m., but school officials had already decided to call school off for the day.

U.S. Senator Mitch McConnell spoke at a Town Hall Meeting at Bible Baptist Church, where over 100 people were in attendance.

Katie Cowan, a senior at RCHS, was a Queen candidate for the 2011 Thoroughbred Bowl in Harrison County.

The Rockcastle County Rockets football team rolled over Sheldon Clark 45-0 in their season opener at Harrison County.

September saw a Laurel County man charged with murder in a road rage incident that ended on Hwy. 461 in Mt. Vernon. Clyde White, 78, of Corbin, was charged with one count of murder and one count of attempted murder after running his brother and sister off the road. White's sister, 82 years old Dorothy Whitaker of Richmond, died of injuries she suffered during the road rage incident that started on the interstate be-

fore ending on Hwy. 461.

Mt. Vernon Police Chief Terry Jackson resigned his post in early September after personnel issues with Mayor Mike Bryant.

Superintendent Larry Hammond gave the Rockcastle County Board of Education his letter of intent to retire at the end of 2011-2012 school year.

The Rockcastle fiscal court told Judge-Executive Buzz Carloftis “no” on his request to purchase 25 acres on Hummel Road known as the Brush Arbor site. The cost for the property was \$150,000 and Carloftis told the court he wanted to purchase the property to “move the county's park system forward.”

Mt. Vernon Mayor Mike Bryant announced the hiring of Barry Adams as Assistant Police Chief for Mt. Vernon. Adams had been the DEA Task Force Officer for the Rockcastle Sheriff's Department.

Alexandra Martin, a senior at RCHS, was named the 2011 Jamboree Bowl Queen at halftime ceremonies between the Rockets and Whitley County. Her court consisted of Holly Ham and Katie Cowan.

RCHS and UK graduate Brad Durham also had his jersey retired before the Rockcastle-Whitley game.

A wet/dry petition was filed with the county clerk's office. According to the petition, the proposition on the election ballot will ask, “Are you in favor of the sale of alcohol in Rockcastle County, Kentucky?” The petition was filed by Jess Bullock.

About 50 people attended a special called fiscal court meeting, mostly to voice their support of a recreation and wellness complex for the county. A presentation was made to the court by Chairman Sam Hamilton. Much controversy was generated about the properties that the task force presented to the court for consideration of purchase.

October saw the last portion of the Hwy. 150 open for business from the county line to Hwy. 461. Even though the road had opened, much work still needed to be done to complete the project, including the new exit for Brodhead.

Jordan Kelly and Casey Hunt were crowned homecoming king and queen during halftime of the Rockets 29-27 win over Russell County.

Retiring Superintendent Larry Hammond was Grand Marshall of the Bittersweet Festival parade held in Mt. Vernon.

Work finally began on widening the last mile of Lambert Road in the northern end of the county. The project is for the entire three miles of the road, but only funding for the last mile of the road has been secured.

Both lanes of a portion of Big Cave Road were closed during daylight hours for about two weeks while work to repair the road due to a rockslide was taking place. Residents had to use Cove Branch Road to get around the work area during daylight hours, and one lane of the road was opened at night for residents to use.

Republican gubernatorial candidate David Williams was in town to speak to about twenty people before the general election.

A hotly contested motion by County Judge-Executive Buzz Carloftis to purchase the Cedar Rapids Recreation Center was voted down by the fiscal court. Two magistrates, Garry Burdette and Ralph Allen voted to purchase the property for the recreation and wellness complex. Magistrates Lee Earl Adams, Billy McKinney and William Denny voted to not purchase the property.

Jeremy Rowe of Mt. Vernon, a Rockcastle native and 2011 graduate of the University of Kentucky School of Law, became the new Assistant County Attorney.

A Eubank man was shot

during an attempted home invasion in the Level Green community. Jesse Roberts was shot by Mike DeBorde as he was entering DeBorde's residence illegally.

In November, a suit was filed by Mike Sheliga against the Rockcastle Fiscal Court and Rockcastle County Recreation and Wellness Task Force. The suit contends there were “willful violations of open records and open meetings, violations of Kentucky Employee Retirement System standards, and closure of public roads” by the court and task force.

A Mt. Vernon man was killed after robbing the Shell Station at Exit 59 in Mt. Vernon. James E. Hensley, 20, was allegedly shot and killed by the attendant on duty when Hensley pulled a knife and demanded money and cigarettes. That attendance, Wendell Price, was not charged in the incident, but the subsequent investigation will be presented to the Rockcastle Grand Jury for consideration.

Another motion to purchase the Cedar Rapids property made by County Judge -Executive Buzz Carloftis saw the same results as the first one, ending in a 3-3 tie, which effectively ended the judge's bid to purchase the property for the recreation and wellness center.

25% of Rockcastle County voters turned out for the general election, which was for statewide offices.

The Rockcastle County Middle School was recognized as a Winner's Circle School in the state of Kentucky for outstanding working conditions, school safety and student achievement. This award was shared with ten other schools in the state.

The first major wreck at the new intersection of lights on Richmond Street occurred in late November.

December saw the opening of the RCHS basketball season, with the girl's team

beating Wayne County 55-47, but the boy's team losing to Wayne 70-47.

Three people, and then eventually a fourth person, were charged with the murder of Jackie Bullock, 24 of Mt. Vernon. Gary Lee Kirby, Joshua Cameron and Bobby Peters were charged with Bullock's murder, which allegedly happened during an attempted robbery of Bullock's prescription medication. A fourth person, Mary H. Hunsucker, was also later arrested and charged with murder.

The historic bridge spanning the Rockcastle River between Rockcastle and Laurel Counties in the Lamero section of the county was finished being refurbished, and remains intact as it was built in 1922.

Rockcastle Regional Hospital went live with solar power, which is being used for the hospital's third floor energy needs.

County employees received the second of their two raises for the 2011 year, another .50 cents, during the December Fiscal Court meeting.

RTEC Enterprises had a ribbon cutting and building dedication ceremony after finalizing its efforts to refurbish its offices on Main Street in Mt. Vernon.

The Superintendent search for Rockcastle County School began in December, with potential candidates' applications being accepted through February 15th, while the board received a thumbs up from financial auditors on the state of finances for the district.

An indictment from the Rockcastle County Grand Jury was finally handed down in the road rage incident in August against Clyde White, of Corbin. White was indicted on one count of murder and one count of attempted murder. He is in the Rockcastle Detention Center under a \$1,000,000 cash or property bond.







USDA announces sign-up

USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) has announced that the first of three ranking period cut-off dates for the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) Organic, High Tunnel (Hoop Houses) and On-Farm Energy Initiatives is February 3, 2012. Producers interested in any of these three programs should submit applications to their local NRCS office by the deadline so that their applications can be considered during the first ranking period of 2012.

The Organic Initiative will focus on individuals who are currently certified

Organic or are transitioning to become certified Organic. NRCS provides assistance to eligible producers for installation of conservation practices on agricultural operations related to organic production.

The Season High Tunnel (Hoop House) Initiative will assist producers to extend the growing season for high value crops in an environmentally safe manner. This initiative will

also assist in improving plant quality, soil quality, air quality, reducing nutrient and pesticide transport, along with reducing energy use as well.

The On-Farm Energy Initiative will be used to specifically address energy conservation through practice implementation and for development of Energy Conservation Plans.

Local NRCS offices will accept applications on a continuous basis. The

first ranking period cut-off date as mentioned is February 3, 2012. The second cut-off ranking date is March 30, 2012 with the third cut-off date being June 1, 2012.

SED John McCauley, State Executive Director of USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) in Kentucky, reminds producers they have until Tuesday, January 31, 2012, to submit an application for payment under the 2011 Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honey Bees, and Farm-raised Fish Program (ELAP).

ELAP provides emergency assistance to eligible producers of livestock, honeybees and farm-raised fish who have losses due to disease, adverse weather or other conditions, including losses due to blizzards, and wildfires.

ELAP assistance is for losses not covered under other disaster assistance programs established by the 2008 Farm Bill. FSA is authorized to spend up to \$50 million per year nationwide to provide emergency relief for ELAP eligible losses.

Producer eligibility for ELAP requires that all crops in all counties have crop insurance coverage or Noninsured Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) coverage for the crop year in which benefits are requested.

Producers who feel they have suffered a qualifying loss are encouraged to file an application for the 2011 ELAP. Contact your County FSA Office for more information regarding ELAP or visit our website at www.fsa.usda.gov.





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

Educational campaign to curb pseudoephedrine

With methamphetamine labs continuing to be discovered at record numbers, members of the Rockcastle County UNITE Coalition have embarked on an educational campaign in support of state legislation to curb the one must-have ingredient – pseudoephedrine. Coalition leaders have launched a petition drive and will air a public service presentation on the local access TV channel during the next two weeks.

Nearly identical bills – SB-50 and HB-79 – are currently making their way through the state Senate and House chambers to require a prescription for most products containing pseudoephedrine – an ingredient in some cold and allergy medications.

A prescription would not be required for gel-cap versions of the medication under the proposed legislation, which impacts only 15 of the 152 options available to treat cold and allergy symptoms.

Meth lab response incidents across Kentucky were at an all-time record level of 1,171 in 2011, an increase of 8.4 percent over the previous year, with final statistics still being compiled by the Kentucky State Police.

Some legislators have called this crisis one of the “most important” of the 2012 General Assembly session because of its cost – not only in terms of the danger to children and others, but to the negative environmental and social impacts of meth labs.

A video produced by Jerry Burke explaining the

problem using segments from an ABC News Nightline presentation filmed in Kentucky and the statewide “So Much Meth” campaign will be shown at 7 p.m. each Monday, Wednesday and Friday, and 10 a.m. Saturday, on Newwave Channel 3 for the next two weeks.

A petition urging lawmakers to “return pseudoephedrine to a prescription drug” is currently being circulated throughout Rockcastle County. Citizens can obtain petitions at:

SB-50 is sponsored by senators Tom Jensen, Ray S. Jones II, Joey Pendleton, Robert Stivers II and Johnny Ray Turner. HB-79 is sponsored by representatives

Linda Belcher, Johnny Bell and Mary Lou Marzian.

Both bills are before the Judiciary Committees of their respective chambers and have been the subject of hearings where experts have touted the effectiveness of requiring a prescription for pseudoephedrine as a means to greatly reduce the number of dangerous methamphetamine labs.

Testimony included comments from officials in Mississippi and Oklahoma explaining why a prescription requirement is more effective than electronic sales tracking systems in stopping the proliferation of meth labs.

Additional testimony is expected before lawmakers vote on the issue.

4. The sale shall be subject to all unpaid County and other taxes of record at the time of entry of judgment shall be paid out of the proceeds of sale, however the 2011 ad valorem taxes for the County shall be paid and assumed by the Purchaser.
5. Upon default of said deposit or posting of bond, by the purchaser or purchasers, the Master Commissioner shall immediately resell the property upon the same terms and conditions as set out herein.
6. Full satisfaction of the plaintiff's judgment shall be paid out of the proceeds of the sale subject to the priorities and orders regarding distribution of the proceeds of sale set forth in the order of sale entered on December 9, 2011.
7. The purchaser shall have possession of the real property upon compliance with the terms of the sale.
8. In the event that a party to the action, which has been adjudged to have a lien on the particular tract or parcel of real property bid upon, is the successful bidder then and in that event said parties shall not be required to make any cash deposit or bond. If plaintiff purchases the real estate it shall only be required to pay in the cost of sell if the purchase price is less than the judgment and costs awarded. In the event said party is a junior lien holder other than the Plaintiff then at the end of thirty (30) days, the said party shall pay the full purchase price.
9. The Purchaser at the sale shall have the right to pay cash for the property, by payment of the bond price plus accrued interest if any, on the day of the sale or at any time before the maturity of said bond.
10. The herein described real property shall be sold free and clear of the claims, interest, liens and encumbrances of all parties herein, however the sale shall be made subject to all easements, set back lines, restrictions, encumbrances or covenants of record and otherwise shall be sold "as is".
