Preliminary hearing held for Lawson

A well-known local man, who is charged with stealing more than \$28,000 from three different bank accounts, appeared in court again this week.

Former Kentucky Music Hall of Fame Executive Director Robert Lawson had his preliminary hearing in Rockcastle County District Court on Monday. Lawson is charged with stealing more than \$28,000 since July 2013 from accounts belonging to the Kentucky Music Hall of Fame, the Rockcastle County Cystic Fibrosis fund and the Tourism Rockcastle Taskforce.

During Monday's hearing, Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds called Kentucky State Police detective Shelby Slone to the stand. Slone is the detective who is in charge of the case and investigation.

Slone testified that he interviewed Lawson about 13 different checks that he wrote to himself for more than \$28,000 from the three

different accounts. He said he also interviewed him about a duplicate payroll check and another \$7,000 check he wrote from one account to deposit in another account.

Slone testified that he interviewed representatives with the governing bodies of the three accounts and they told him they didn't authorize Lawson to write the checks in his name or perform the other two transactions in question.

Slone said he interviewed Lawson and asked if he had an explanation for the allegations against him. He said Lawson told him it was for "production fees" he was due and provided "limited explanation" and no documentation about all the transactions.

Slone went on to say that they have discovered some cash proceeds missing after completing another audit and that the investigation is ongoing.

Rockcastle woman arrested for giving nephew alcohol

A Rockcastle County woman was arrested last Saturday night in Garrard Co. for endangering the welfare of a minor after she reportedly tried to make her 14-month-old nephew drink alcohol.

Arrested at the scene was Angela Spoonamore, 29, of Orlando.

According to Lancaster Police Department records, officers responded to a home on Cardinal Circle in Lancaster after receiving a disturbance complaint at the residence.

Once officers arrived, they found Spoonamore in the parking lot of the complex. Officers noted that they could smell alcohol on Spoonamore and said she appeared intoxicated while performing field sobriety

Witnesses said that

Spoonamore's behavior had gotten out of control and that she refused to leave the residence when asked. Witnesses said she picked the 14-month-old child up and threw him on the floor. They also told officers that she was trying to get the child to drink beer and rum from his "sippy cup."

Officers, who said Spoonamore was supposed to be babysitting the child that night, said the child sustained a cut on his upper lip after being thrown on the floor by Spoonamore. The



Another Day Is Ahead By Howard Coop



Palm Sunday, one of the more significant observances of worldwide Christendom, was last Sunday. This special day commemorates what Christian tradition has named the Triumphal Entry of Jesus into Jerusalem at the beginning of the week before the Feast of Unleavened Bread. Bethany and Bethphage on the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples to the village ahead with instruction, "You will find a donkey tied there, with her colt by her. Until them and bring them to me." When the disciples returned, Jesus mounted that donkey and proceeded over the western slope of the Mount of Olives along the ancient

The awaiting crowd did not overlook the significance of what they saw. They recognized two things: An old messianic prophecy said, "Say to the Daughter of Zion, 'See, your king comes to you, gentle and riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey," and they knew that a king riding a donkey came on a mission of peace.

Recognizing that, the crowd went wild with excitement. Some tore fronds from nearby palm trees, a well-known sign for hailing a conqueror. Others spread their outer garments on the old road. All shouted, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest!" Their hopes, they thought, were fulfilled, and their struggles for a better life were over.

But the Triumphal Entry was on the wrong side of victory. Before the week was over, another mob was shouting, "Away with this man!" and "Crucify him! Crucify him!" And Pilate, the Roman Procurator of Judea, turned Jesus over to be crucified and attempted to wash his hands of any wrong.

Palm Sunday says one powerful thing: Things don't always work out, dreams don't always come true, and hopes are sometimes shattered. But we don't give up. We don't quit. Another day is ahead, and something good is beyond



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



cess to obtain protective orders for other victims, and allows an order to be expunged from someone's record if a judge dismisses

Prior to HB 8 becoming law, victims of dating violence in Kentucky had to file criminal charges against their partner in the hope of preventing ongoing abuse. Only victims who are married to, have a child with, or live with their abuser can seek civil protection from dating violence or abuse, physical violence, or stalking and HB 8 was a responsible measure to protect all victims.

Combating heroin, resolving declining road fund revenues and addressing dating violence were the major bills that the Senate and House acted on in the final days of the session. However, other beneficial measures also were successful in the session's fi-

Tax check-offs. Senate Bill 82 creates state income tax refund check-offs to support pediatric cancer research and Kentucky's rape crisis centers. SB 82 originally focused solely on creating a tax check-off to support pediatric cancer research but was amended to include a check-off for rape crisis centers.

Child booster seats. House Bill 315 requires booster seats to be used in motor vehicles by children who are less than eight years old and are between 40 inches and 57 inches in height.

Ignition interlock. Senate Bill 133 expands the use of ignition interlocks for people caught driving under the influence of alcohol. It supplements hardship licenses – special licenses allowing people with suspended licenses to drive to work, school and doctor's appointments – with ignition interlocks. That's a device about the size of a mobile phone that is wired into the ignition system of a vehicle. A motorist must blow into the device in order to start their vehicle.

My colleagues and I will go back to our districts now, and, beginning in the summer continue to meet and work on issues during the interim period and through joint committee meetings.

USDA extends ARC and PLC deadlines

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack today provided farm owners and producers one additional week, until April 7, 2015, to choose between Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) and Price Loss Coverage (PLC), the safety-net programs established by the 2014 Farm Bill. The final day to update yield history or reallocate base acres also will be April 7, 2015.

"This is an important decision for producers because these programs help farmers and ranchers protect their operations from unexpected changes in the marketplace," said Vilsack. "Nearly 98 percent of owners have already updated yield and base acres, and 90 percent of producers have enrolled in ARC or PLC. These numbers are strong, and continue to rise. This additional week will give producers a little more time to have those final conversations, review their data, visit their local Farm Service Agency offices, and make their decisions," said

If no changes are made to yield history or base

acres by the deadline, the farm's current yield and base acres will be used. If a program choice of ARC or PLC is not made, there will be no 2014 crop year payments for the farm and the farm will default to PLC coverage for the 2015 through 2018 crop years. Producers who have an appointment at their local FSA offices scheduled by April 7 will be able to make an election between ARC and PLC, even if their actual appointment is after April 7.

These safety-net programs provide important financial protection against unexpected changes in the marketplace. As part of the strong education and outreach campaign launched by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) in September, to date more than 5 million educational postcards, in English and Spanish, have been sent to producers nationwide, and more than 5,000 events with more than 430,000 attendees, including training sessions and speaking engagements, have been conducted to educate producers on the programs. The online tools, available at www.fsa.usda.gov/arc-plc. which allow producers to explore how ARC or PLC coverage will affect their operation, have been presented to more than 3,400 groups.

Covered commodities under ARC and PLC include barley, canola, large and small chickpeas, corn crambe, flaxseed, grain sorghum, lentils, mustard seed oats, peanuts, dry peas rapeseed, long grain rice, medium grain rice (which includes short grain and sweet rice), safflower seed sesame, soybeans, sunflower seed and wheat. Upland cotton is no longer a covered commodity.

Producers need to contact the Farm Service Agency by April 7. To learn more, farmers can contact their local Farm Service Agency county office. To find local offices, visit http://offices.usda.gov.

Combine condensed milk, dates, and pecans. Cook over very low heat until mixture thickens—15 to 20 minutes. Let cool. Put by spoonfuls on Ritz crackers. Bake at 350° for 8 minutes. Let cool.

TOPPING: (for two batches)

1 stick margarine, softened 1 box (8 ounce) cream cheese

4 teaspoons vanilla 1 box (1 pound) powdered

sugar

Mix margarine, cream cheese, vanilla, and powdered sugar until smooth. Put on top of cooled date mixture. Refrigerate to set up frosting. Makes 5 dozen.

4 tablespoons butter 1/2 cup brown sugar 2 tablespoons milk 1 cup powdered sugar

3/4teaspoon vanilla Over medium heat, cook butter, brown sugar, and milk until mixture begins to boil. Remove from heat. Add vanilla and powdered sugar. Stir until spreadable and all lumps are gone. Frost cookies. If icing gets hard, add a little milk, stir until it is again spreadable.

2. The real property shall be sold for cash or upon a credit of thirty (30) days with the purchaser(s) required to pay a minimum of twenty five percent (25%) of the purchase price in cash on the date of sale and to secure the balance with a bond approved by the Master Commissioner.

3. The bond shall bear interest at the rate of twelve percent (12%) per annum until paid in full. The bond shall have the force and effect of a judgment and shall be and remain a lien upon the property sold as additional surety for the payment of the purchase price.

4. The purchaser shall pay the 2015 local, county

and state property taxes.

5. Pro rata, to the full satisfaction of all unpaid delinquent State, County and/or City ad valorem taxes including the line of the plaintiff shall be paid from the proceeds of the sale.

6. The purchaser shall have possession of the real property upon compliance with the terms of




Mahala Saylor slides safely into home during the game against George Rogers Clark on Tuesday. The Lady Rockets won the game and are 8-1 on the season.

The top shooter for the RCHS Rockets was Jackson freshman Cromer with a score of 271. Jackson ranked 11th out of all the high school boys at the tournament.





Lawson's attorney Nathan Shirley questioned the checks and Lawson's part in the organizations. Slone said they were all two party checks that were only signed by one person and that he was not given the authority to write the checks for his personal

Slone also testified the memo section on the majority of the checks was left blank and that one had "vent" for the memo. However, Slone said Lawson couldn't provide documentation for it.

Shirley asked if Lawson ever admitted to any wrong doing during the investigation and Slone answered

Shirley also made a motion to the court that Lawson shouldn't be considered a flight risk as several days passed during the investigation leading up to his arrest, pointing out that Lawson had a chance to leave the area but didn't. He also noted that Lawson has no criminal history and doesn't present a danger to himself or others. Shirley also made the motion to amend Lawson's bond to a third party signature bond.

Reynolds retaliated saying that there are still cash proceeds unaccounted for and that the investigation is ongoing. He said Lawson has cooperated but hasn't been able to provide any documentation. He went on to ask that the bond remain the same and for the case to be presented to the Rockcastle County Grand

District Court Judge Katie Wood said that probable cause has been found in the case and that more funds are missing. She ordered that the bond remain at \$30,000 cash/property. Lawson's case is set to be reviewed by the court on Wednesday, May 27th.



The American Revolutionary War Patriots of Rockcastle

Edward Evans Virginia

Edward Evans was born June 1758 Halifax, VA and died 25 October 1838 Lawrence, IN. According to his pension application, Edward gave the following account of his service on 27 August 1827 in Lawrence Co. IN. at the age of sixtynine. He enlisted for the term of eighteen months on or about the tenth day of February 1778 in the state of Virginia in the Company commanded by Captain Thomas Dillard in the Regiment commanded by Colonel Morgan in the line of the state of Virginia as a private in the county of Pittsylvania. He also stated that he was at the surrender of Cornwallis at Yorktown while he was serving under Captain

Haynes Morgan, commissioned on 10 May 1776 in the 2nd Battalion of Minutemen and from 20 December 1776 to 24 June 1777 in the 1stRegiment of the Virginia State Line. Neither of these were considered Continental service that would be covered by the pension laws under which Edward applied. He was rejected for a pension on the grounds that there was insufficient evidence to show that he served long enough to qualify for a pension. On 17 March 1853, Edward's second wife, Elizabeth applied for a widow's pension. A letter from the Pension office dated 25 February 1857 stated that "Bounty Land was allowed her because in a spirit of liberality, it was thought more than probable that her husband had rendered as much as 14 days of service in the War of the Revolution, but could not be admitted that the proof on file justified the allowance of a pension."

After the Revolution, Edward's family along with some siblings migrated to Kentucky. Edward is listed in the KY Land Grant Records as receiving 83 acres in Lincoln Co. KY on the Dix River on 15 February 1786. He is also found in the KY Tax List of 1800 living in Lincoln County. Edward married for a second time (assuming that his first wife was deceased) on 21 February 1804 to Elizabeth Howard in Lincoln County. By 1810, the Edward was living in Rockcastle County with his wife and four sons, five

KY-1863 Laurel Co. KY) married Benjamin Poteet (1756-1850). He was an American Revolutionary War Patriot. They had four children: Mary, Charles, Edward and James. Sarah Evans (1792 Lincoln Co. KY-1867 Rockcastle married Williamson B. Graves (1790-1843). They had at least ninechildren. William B, Clementine, Evalina, Sarah, Mary, John, Stephen, Martha and William H. Elijah Evans (1794 Lincoln Co. KY) married Matilda Moore on 5 June 1820 Knox Co. KY. They had at least eight children: Jesse, Jerome, Margaret, TL, James, Henry and Perry. Richard Evans (1798 Lincoln Co. KY-1872) married Nancy Toone on 30 August 1818 IN. He later married a Sarah. He is buried at Pine Grove Cemetery in Peoria, OR. Elbert Evans (1799 Lincoln Co. KY) married Nancy Adamson on 9 March 1826 IN. They had at least eight children. Eliza J. Evans (1802KY) married John Boyd Jr. (1797-1871) on 12 June 1828 IN. They had eight children: William John, Robert, James, Sally, Polly, Emily and Emma. Susannah Evans (7 February 1806KY-4 September 1887IN) married Edmund Adamson on 24 May 1824 Lawrence Co. IN. They are buried at the New Union Cemetery in Lawrence, IN. They had eight children: Lorenzo, Eliza, Ivy, Elbert, Elizabeth, Rachel, Isaac and Susan. 



Bible Talk

In our study this month we want to talk about the three rules, or philosophies of life, as illustrated in the parable of the Good Samaritan in Luke 10:30-35.

Iron Rule - In verse 30 we read, "A certain man went down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell among thieves, which stripped him of his raiment, and wounded him, and departed, leaving him half dead." The thieves spoken of here, were living by the Iron Rule. Do unto others before they do it unto you. Or, might makes right, the survival of the fittest. What yours is mine, and I'm going to take it. Sadly, we still have people like that in the world today. The criminal element live and die by the Iron Rule of living. When we take advantage and run rough shod over people, we are living by this philosophy of life and it is not a good choice.

Silver Rule - In verses 31-32 "And by chance there came down a certain priest that way: and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side. And likewise a Levite, when he was at the place, came and looked on him, and passed by on the other side." The priest and the Levite lived by the Silver Rule of life. Do not do to others what you would not have them do unto you. What's mine is mine and I'll keep it. They did not kick the man that was down, but they didn't help him either. Most people will fit into this category in general, minding their own business and they don't go around hurting or harming others. This is good, but it lacks the positive help that others need to be given from time to time. A self-centered spirit is in this mind set, thinking of "me, myself and I."

Golden Rule - In verses 33-34 we read, "But a certain Samaritan, as he journeyed, came where he was: and when he saw him, he had compassion on him, And went to him, and bound up his wounds, pouring in oil and wine, and set him on his own beast, and brought him to an inn, and took care of him." This Samaritan lived by the Golden Rule of Life. "Therefore all things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so to them." It's the mind set; what's mine is yours, and I'll share it. This rule includes the negative side that I will not hurt or harm you, but also the positive side of what we ought to do to help in times of need. He stepped up to help the man beat up and left half dead. He went out of his way to help and assist in his time of need. Which rule of life do you live by? It is more blessed to give than to receive.

Lawson resigns position on RCIDA Board

Several items of business were discussed at the monthly RCIDA meeting on Monday, including the recent resignation of Robert Lawson from the RCIDA Board.

Lawson resigned from the board after being arrested earlier this month for theft by deception. According to state police reports, Lawson reportedly stole over \$28,000, since July of 2013, from three different accounts he was trusted with managing. Lawson remains lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center on a \$30,000 cash/property bond.

County Judge Executive Doug Bishop attended the meeting and told the board that he talked with Lawson personally at RCDC about the issue. Bishop said that Lawson told him that he had "already resigned" and that a deputy jailer was also present to witness his verbal resignation.

Board member Corey Craig said that he talked with Lawson before his arrest and that Lawson told him he would send an email stating his resignation. However, Craig said that he never received the email but that a verbal resignation to

him and Bishop makes the

resignation effective.

Craig said that the board needed to decide on a new chairperson since Lawson served in that capacity. Board member Dale Whitaker nominated board member Jason Coguer to serve as the new chairperson and the nomination was seconded by board member Tommy Mink.

The board agreed unanimously to appoint Coguer as the new chairperson. The board also voted to remove Lawson as a signer of the RCIDA checking account and add Coguer's name as

Wildfires on the rise in Rockcastle

responded to several wildfires in Rockcastle County this past week. Rockcastle 911 reported

six wildfires in Rockcastle County since last Wednesday that have burned around 65 acres of land. The largest wildfire hap-

pened last Wednesday on Chestnut Grove Road in Brodhead. Brodhead Fire Chief John Dyehouse said the wildfire burned approximately 60 acres and endangered several homes.

"This fire started when a property owner was burning off a field. Once the wind picked up, the fire got out of control and spread to four other properties," Dyehouse said. "We were able to keep the fire from spreading to any structures and no one was injured in the fire. However, one dog and several wild animals like opossums were killed in the fire."

Dyehouse said wildfires

are more common when transitioning from the winter season to spring. He said homeowners and landowners always want to have a "spring cleanup" which almost always leads to wildfires after they attempt to burn something on their

"Fields and yards still have their dead growth from the winter months and the new growth hasn't had time to come up yet," Dyehouse said. "When people start to burn things or burn off areas of their property around this time of the year, tha dead growth ignites quickly and, once the wind is factored in, the fire can get ou of control in a matter of sec-

According to the Kentucky Division of Forestry a spring burning ban is still in effect for Rockcastle County until April 30th. The ban is part of the Kentucky

Time does, indeed, really fly after you pass 60 and then it just keeps getting faster. The reason I know the truth of this is because it does not seem possible that an entire year could have slipped by since I last implored readers of this column to assist my grandson, Tyler Kane Ochs (TKO) and me toraise some dollars to help fight Diabetes. For the last three years

Tyler, along with his family and friends, have participated in the annual Step Out Walk to Stop Diabetes that is held each spring at Keeneland Race Track in Lexington. It is a big event that draws over 2,000 participants from central and eastern Kentucky to join the battle to fight and call attention to this terrible, always debilitating, and far-to-frequently, deadly, disease. This year the walk will take place on the morning of May 30.

Diabetes is the 7th, mostlisted on death certificates, cause of death in our country. However, it is most likely the root cause of a host of other killers such as heart disease, strokes, kidney failure, liver disease, blood poisoning and hemorrhages, to name a few, that are listed as the cause of death without mentioning diabetes. For example, even

though neither of them have done me in so far, I have had two strokesthat the doctors tell me were probably related to my diabetes. The jury is still out on whether my intimate association with Mr. Parkinson was brought on by erratic blood sugar imbalances. The point is, that if either of them had proven to be fatal, my diabetes would not have been listed as a cause of death even though it would, most likely, have been the root cause. Thanks to diabetes, I have just completed one eye surgery and have three to go. Diabetes is one of, if not the most absolute, leading causes of blindness and is, by far, the leading cause of lower extremity amputations among adults. I could go on and on, but I think you get the picture.

The truth of the matter is that, other than visual impairment, I am not much bothered with the disease on a daily basis as long as I take my metformin, orally, twice a day, try to eat responsibly and get as much exercise as possible. Our son, Christopher, is

not so lucky. He has to have two daily injections of insu-

Our six-year- old Grand-


son, Tyler, has to wear an insulin pump, and monitor every bite of food or drink, other than water, that he ingests. Tyler can and does count every carbohydrate that goes into his mouth and doesup to half a dozen blood tests every day. The insulin pump is strapped to his lower abdomen and attached to a needle injected into his belly and he has to wear it 24-7. The needle location has to be changed every three days. While he has not yet mastered the science of changing the needle by himself, he has been doing his own blood tests and carbcounts since he was age

The pump is far less painful than having 3 or more insulin shots ever day and the dosage regulation is also much more precise. But the thing that most amazes me is that TKO does not allow the contraption or the disease to slow him down or prevent him from doing anything he wants to do. I can tell you, for sure that his parents and grandparents cringe and hold their breath every time he slides into second base or home plate but our worry doesn't

The Clothes Line

While driving home from Mt. Sterling, I witnessed two sure-fire signs that spring had indeed arrived. As I came over a hill in Montgomery County, right before my eyes were hundreds of daffodils covering a field. A smile came over my face because I remembered these familiar blooms, which covered my grandmother's yard when I was a boy. The second sign of

spring occurred a few miles later. Passing a small frame house on KY 213, I saw an older lady hanging her fresh wash on a clothes line in the back yard. That, too, reminded me of my childhood in Rockcastle County. My mother (Bee) carefully hung our clothes on her clothes line, which was situated in our yard, nestled next to the woods behind our house.

No one at that time had a dryer to my knowledge. Your only choice was to hang clothes on a line or situate them near the stove or fireplace inside your home. That was precisely what Bee used in the winter months, when it was impossible to hang her wash outside. She arranged chairs

around our Warm Morning Stove and hung her wash there to dry.

Spring meant that Bee could now bring her wash out into the sunshine to dry. The fresh air would add a pleasant aroma to her wash. (Yes, there was a time when "fresh" air was always clean and fresh-smelling.) I remember the fragrance but I find it impossible to describe – it was a delicate and airy scent. It also gave clothing a cool, clean, and crisp feel. I can still hear that snapping sound that it made when the breezes came tossing around.

Bee's washing machine was the old standard wringer-type. She separated our wash into four machine loads: sheets and pillow cases, towels, white clothes, and finally, colored clothes. Each was hung together in groups on the line.

Before the first item was hung, the line was wiped down carefully to remove any bird droppings or insects. The clothes were hung with wooden clothes pins that clipped them to the line. (Come to think of it, those clothes pins were handy little things to have around; they made for a variety of uses.) At the end of each line – she had multiples – Bee used a wooden pole with a fork on the end to keep anything from dragging the ground.

Bee also used another technique in hanging clothes. Because she was such a very private and reserved person, our underclothes were always hung on the line located next to the woods, with the sheets hung in front of them to provide cover. She would never permit such items of clothing to be in view.

At different times throughout the day, Bee walked out to check and see if her clothes were dry and ready to be brought into the house. Each item was carefully removed and folded before it was placed into the laundry basket.

When the baskets were brought inside, Bee set up her wooden ironing board, and another of her chores began. Bee ironed everything! Sheets, pillow cases, jeans, shirts, and even men's handkerchiefs were carefully pressed. She used a RC Cola bottle with a stopper inserted in the open end to "sprinkle" the wash as it was ironed. I can still see that RC bottle sitting on the end of the ironing board.

Shirts and blouses were

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

that will keep coming back year after year. Then let's make a plan. Let's also discuss building that planting "Where should I build

it?" "What should I plant?" We could ask many questions. You can study on where you want planting beds, of you can just pick a spot you desire a new bed and get busy with it. You can choose the design or layout—I like to mark the ground with paint, or you could use lime or flour from the kitchen, or borrow the water hose and play with layouts. You can make a list of plants you want to include—or you could take your chances by going on a shopping spree and see how it turns out. Actual preparation and planting chores, plus decorating the bed when finished with some new mulch are all things we will touch on.

Once you've decided on a location, and the overall look you want, try putting a plan together on paper.

Drawing paper, copy paper, graph paper, the paper is not as important as just getting started. Let's draw up a plan and have some fun doing it.

artist. Draw an outline for the bed on your paper. Sketch in some plants. Some colored pens or pencils or crayons might make this more fun! If you can't draw plants, draw circles of several sizes and then color them or write the name of the plant you are thinking of planting in each circle.

A color wheel can help you decide how to mix your colors. You can do an internet search for a color wheel, or most good gardening books may have one among their pages somewhere. Basically, some colors look much better when planted together than do other colors. This particularly pertains to the blooms of your plants—but yellow or silver or blue foliage mixing with green foliage may also play into the overall outcome of your new perennial bed. The color of the house and trim also should be considered when deciding on plant colors.

You can have a "hot" garden, a "cool" garden, a white garden or even a green garden! The green garden would be different; you'd need to use various shades of green and many contrasting textures of leaves and some with large leaves and some with small leaves, etc. It's your garden, so following rules is up to you of

To work up your planting site, here are some options: Dig up the grass (a sod cutter is great here), and begin planting. Another idea is to

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Spring is prime time for trophy bass

A winter back-loaded with cold, snow and high water can make the season's stay seem unusually long and especially harsh.

The first warm days of the year never come soon enough. But when they do, a feeling of euphoria sweeps over anglers because springtime offers some of the year's best opportunities for trophy largemouth bass.

"Fall is a great opportunity to catch a big one, but your best shot at the biggest bass of the year or your life is right now," said Geoff Roberts, a conservation educator with the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources and an avid

The longer periods of daylight and the warming water temperatures of springtime tell largemouth bass that it's time to move shallow. It's also at this time when the big bass are at their heaviest, especially ravenous females that must pack on weight in preparation for spawning.

Kentucky boasts numerous lakes that hold "good" to "excellent" populations of largemouth bass. In its annual Fishing Forecast, Kentucky Fish and Wildlife classified almost 40 fisheries in those two categories.

Anchoring the list of "excellent" largemouth bass options are Kentucky Lake and Lake Barkley in the west and Barren River Lake in the southwest. Also making the cut were 760-acre Beshear Lake in Caldwell and Christian counties: 8,270-acre Cave Run Lake in Bath, Menifee, Rowan and Morgan counties; and 784-acre Cedar Creek Lake in Lincoln County; 32-acre Fishpond Lake in Letcher County; 767-acre Lake Malone in Muhlenburg, Todd and Logan counties; 169-acre Wilgreen Lake in Madison County and 36acre Spurlington Lake in Taylor County.

Fish population survey work conducted by fisheries biologists last May on Ce-

dar Creek Lake found vast numbers of 19- to 21-inch largemouth bass. There is a one-fish daily creel and 20inch minimum size limit on the lake. Anglers have been catching bass in the creeks, and the areas around the KY 1770 bridge and mid-lake boat ramp near old U.S. 150 are two proven spots in a lake full of them.

"The number of really large fish is impressive,' said John Williams, southeastern fisheries district biologist with Kentucky Fish and Wildlife. "The area by the U.S.150 ramp has a lot of cover and shallow water with access to deep water."

Wilgreen Lake's bass population stood out in last year's research in the northeastern fisheries district. It yielded good numbers of fish over 15 inches and 20 inches, but bass don't have to search hard for food with gizzard shad prevalent in the

"You can fish pretty much across the whole dam on that lake," said Tom Timmermann, northeastern fisheries district biologist with Kentucky Fish and Wildlife. "We see some nice fish across the dam. That would be a nice place to try. If you're fishing Wilgreen, Lake Reba is just on the other side of Richmond. It has nice numbers of fish over 15 inches as well, and half of that is bank accessible. Those two lakes being the size that they are, it might make for a good day to fish one in the morning and then try to fish the other in the evening."

Grayson Lake in Carter and Elliott Counties showed improvement last year, earning the 1,512-acre reservoir up-and-comer status in this

use weed killer and begin planting a day or two later. My favorite is to kill the grass with Spectracide or

Roundup and bring in a load of good topsoil and spread it creating a rasied bed that will also have fewer weeds and grass (that is if you can get weed-free and grass-free soil). In this new bed you easily and more quickly can plant. When planting is done, putting down some Preen or other brand of preemergent herbicide, perhaps some slow release fertilizer, and then finishing off the bed by mulching it. When it comes to mulch, everything from wood chips to hardwood mulch to cypress or cedar, pine needles, (even chocolate (cocoa) bean hulls that smell so wonder-

Shopping for new plants is one of the most fun things for some people. You can go to a big box store or a major garden center, especially in larger towns, and find most of what you may be looking for in one spot.

But if you're into the adventure, I'd suggest finding some out-of-the-way little greenhouses and garden centers and even roadside stands where local farmers and gardeners have some unusual stuff to sell that may not be carried by the big stores. (Note: Buying direct from the local grower is better for the local economy and may be a more sustainable way of gardening. Plus you'll often meet new friends and may find lots of knowledgable folks willing to share free

Online and mailorder are fine choices. Many nurseries ship actual potted plants these days, not just the cheaper springtime shipments of bare-root items. Getting shipments of growing plants in hot weather or in very cold weather is frought with some concerns though, unless you pay the cost of airmail/airfreight. (Your plants could literally cook in a UPS truck all day.) Order with caution in summer and winter, but I've done it successfully most of the time over the years.

Are you ready to go shopping? Or do you have your plants and need to get the shovel or spade out? Trowels, picks, even my rock hammer gets used sometimes to make planting holes. For those into big power tools, a post hole digger, a bobcat with a big auger, or an electric drill with a smaii auger—you can make your planting tools.

That's more a man's way of taking care of the planting chore I would suppose.

No matter if you choose one of the ways suggested above, or your own method that works for you, consider creating a new bed of flowering perennials. Even mid summer is OK for this project, so long as you have a hose or other means of watering your new plants from time to time until they get well established. I know you will have a lot of lovely blooms before summer is

Crappie time is just around the corner

Although the redbud trees may or may not have bloomed yet, it isn't too early to start fishing for

Black crappie are likely along rocky banks now in lakes that have them.

"With the water temperatures still in the mid-40s, white crappie are likely staging in deeper water right now," said Jeff Crosby, central fisheries district biologist for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "With the longer photoperiod and the warmer temperatures on the way, they will be moving up to the shallows.'

The big twins of western Kentucky, Kentucky Lake and Lake Barkley, along with Green River Lake and Taylorsville Lake all receive oodles of fishing pressure for the crappie that swim in their waters. However, Kentucky is also blessed with other less known waters holding bountiful populations of crappie that don't receive the adulation and fishing pressure of their more well known brethren.

While known for its excellent largemouth bass fishing, wood strewn 2,315-acre Yatesville Lake in Lawrence County holds good numbers of quality white crappie with many in the 15-inch range.

"In our latest population sampling, Yatesville had the most crappie we've ever sampled in the 10- to 14inch range," said Kevin Frey, eastern fisheries district biologist for Kentucky Fish and Wildlife.

Yatesville Lake, near the West Virginia border, more resembles a flatland reservoir with abundant woody cover than a mountain lake. Probe the fallen tree tops and submerged trees with live minnows suspended under a bobber and adjust the depth until you get bites. The timbered coves and banks near the confluence of Blaine and Greenbrier creeks hold crappie.

"In the upper part of Blaine Creek at the Rich Creek boat access, we've placed fish structures and cut down trees for bank anglers to catch crappie," Frey

said. "There are numerous pull offs along KY 32 for bank anglers. It is good fishing in that area in spring."

Cave Run Lake is full of 2- to 3-year-old crappie, providing excellent opportunity for both black and white crappie. The deep weedbeds in the mouths of Skidmore and Leatherwood creeks in the Beaver Creek arm attract black crappie in March and into April. Black crappie tend to move into the shallows earlier in the year than white crappie. White crappie stay out in deeper water along creek channels while blacks may be in just a few feet of water along rocky banks at the same time.

The abundant woody structures around Bangor Boat Ramp and fallen trees along the island near Poppin Rock Boat Ramp in the North Fork Arm of Cave Run provide excellent fishing for white and black crap-

One of the crappie sleepers flows off of Pine Mountain all the way to northern Kentucky. The Kentucky River holds considerable numbers of crappie a foot long or better. "The river goes in cycles, but there are some good fish in there," Crosby said. "The crappie in the Kentucky like those creek mouths and backwater areas with little current."

Tributaries at their confluence with the Kentucky River have abundant root wads, undercut banks and washed in tree tops and brush. Probe all of these with live minnows suspended under a bobber or with 1/16-ounce chartreuse Roadrunner style spinner baits dressed with a matching 2-inch curly-tailed grub.

"Another flowing water to consider is the Ohio River. It is really, really good for crappie right now,' Crosby said. The Ohio River offers good crappie fishing from Ashland downstream to the Purchase Region in far western Kentucky.

He recommends backwater areas along the river, often formed where tributaries meet the main stem of the Ohio. "With all of the flooding on the Ohio, those embayments should have fish right now. Target brushy areas with live minnows in those embayments."

Guist Creek Lake covers 317 acres in Shelby County. It is also overlooked for crappie. "We saw some really nice crappie last fall in our population surveying," Crosby said. "I think most of the fishing pressure there is on largemouth bass."

Early spring is a good time to catch large white crappie 11 inches and longer on Barren River Lake in Allen and Barren counties. Known throughout the Midwest and upper South as a superior largemouth bass lake and written up in national magazines, Barren River Lake holds a burgeoning population of black crappie as well, which now make up 60 percent of the total crappie population in

Casting banks composed of pea gravel with limegreen 2-inch curly-tailed grubs rigged on red 1/8ounce leadheads is a productive presentation for black crappie. Drifting live minnows along creek channels in March and early

April fools big white crappie on Barren before they move into the shallows to spawn.

The huge snows of just a few weeks ago are now in the dustbin of history. It is time to get out and catch some crappie.

year's Fishing Forecast.

"There are some nice fish in there, but it's a tricky lake to fish," Timmermann said. "Grayson Lake and Cave Run aren't that dissimilar in the fact that they're deep, clear, eastern Kentucky mountain lakes. If you don't put your time in to learn your spots you could struggle. But those guys that know what they're doing on Grayson tend to have fun

with it." Bass typically start to

move shallow when the water temperature ranges from 55 to 65 degrees with farm ponds and smaller lakes warming up first.

"At a certain point, you've got fish in all three phases: pre-spawn, spawn and post-spawn," Roberts said. "If you try targeting the pre-spawners and you strike out doing that, try something a little different like sight fishing. And if you can't get anything going there, look for the postspawn fish."

Good lures to have on hand in early spring are jig and trailer combinations, spinnerbaits, square-billed and lipless crankbaits, suspending jerkbaits and other shad imitations.

Try to intercept bass at spots that lead to spawning areas, Roberts said, such as deeper points and the deeper stretches of banks that lead into embayments, creeks or a big pocket, and work back.

What you want to try to find are basically what bass use as highways," he said. "Bass like to feel secure and they like to have ambush points, so they're going to use whatever cover is available as they work their way back in until they go to where they're going to spawn. And then they're going to do the exact same thing coming back out.

"When they do get shallow, look for any stumps, lay down or structure like that because that's what they're either going to be spawning next to or hanging out by either in preparation for spawning or immediately after they

Compare award letters to find best college deal

By now, most high school seniors should have completed the college application process and will begin receiving financial aid award letters. Seniors and their parents should compare those letters to find the one that offers the best financial aid package, the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA) advises.

The letter will usually show the total cost of attendance — what that school costs for one year, including tuition, fees, room, meals, books, supplies, transportation and personal expenses.

It may also show how much the student's family is expected to pay toward those costs, the expected family contribution (EFC). The EFC is subtracted from the total cost of attendance to get a student's financial need. The letter will then list various sources of financial aid offered to pay for the costs not covered by the EFC. Students can accept or reject any or all of those proposed sources.

Students can also appeal the awards made if they believe their family's financial circumstances changed. One consideration is how

much of the aid being offered is in federal student loans, which will have to be paid back after a student finishes school. If the package includes federal loans and isn't enough to pay all expenses, students may be looking at a private loan. Comparison shopping is a must in that case.

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

The law calls for any successors to be appointed to a four year term. The law also states that a member may be replaced as a result of misconduct or a conviction of a felony.

Bishop said that he was concerned about an appointment of an eighth member putting four people on four year terms. He said the law states an eight member board must have two members for two years, three members for three years and three members for four years.

<u>Hidden Among Us</u> The American Revolutionary War Patriots of Rockcastle

By Karen Hamm Adams

To celebrate and honor the county's American Revolutionary War Patriots and to enlighten the community about the service and sacrifice of these brave men, on behalf of the Rockcastle Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, I have compiled highlights of the service of the known patriots living in the county and who applied for a pension between the years of 1818 and 1842. All information was taken from the patriot's own account from his pension application and other historical documents. More information can be found on each patriot at the local library or the Rockcastle Historical Society. (Copyright Pending). > James Kincaid Virginia

James Kincaid was born 10 March 1763 Albemarle Co. Virginia and died on 8 July 1841 in Platte Co. Missouri. According to his pension application, James Kincaid gave the following account of his service on 5 November 1833 Lafayette County, Missouri at the age of seventy. While residing with his father in Castlewood Settlement on the Clinch River about 25 miles north of Abington VA, James volunteered in the spring of 1776 serving as a private in Captain John Duncan's Virginia Company serving and guarded the Virginia settlements on the frontier for at least twenty eight days. He enlisted in the summer of 1777 to go to the aid of the frontier stations in Kentucky and served under Captain Henry PaulingCompany, Colonel John Bowman's

Virginia Regiment. They marched to Boonesborough and stayed there aiding the people of the fort. After some time, they received word that the settlement where James' father lived had been raided by Indians. James and his older brother Joseph received a discharge from Colonel Bowman in order to return home. Their time of service for this expedition was about fifty days.

In 1779 his father moved to Kentucky. James and Joseph enlisted and served under Captain Thomas Quirk's Company, Colonel John Montgomery and Colonel George Rogers Clark. James was appointed Quartermaster Sergeant and served under Quartermaster John Read. James was at the engagement at the Chickamauga Indian towns and then marched to Kaskaskia in Illinois and joined Colonel Clark, returned to the Falls of the Ohio and served until the fall of 1779. He enlisted in May 1780 and served eight weeks under Colonels Benjamin Logan and James Harrod and went on an expedition with General George Rogers Clark against the Shawnee Indians and was at the Battle of Pickaway Towns.

In the summer of 1781, he was appointed ensign and served under his brother, Captain Joseph Kincaid and Colonel James Harrod for a period of one month. He was stationed at McAfee's Station. In early 1782, he served one month as ensign under Colonel James Harrod and was in the Battle of Blue Licks (19 August 1722). His brother Joseph was killed during this battle. He served in 1782 as a Lieutenant under Captain John Irvin and Colonel Benjamin Logan and was in General George Rogers Clark's expedition against the Shawnee Indians, surviving several skirmishes and served a total of five to six weeks.

In 1787, James was appointed Captain of a Company of militia in Mercer Co. KY and served two tours, one lasting seven days and the other lasting fifteen days under Colonel Benjamin Logan against the Cherokee Indians. In 1791, he served thirty three days as a private soldier in Wilkinson's expedition against the Wabash Indians.

James lived in Kentucky for nearly fifty years. His residency ranged from Mercer Co, Madison and Rockcastle Counties. At one time the Kincaid family was one of the largest landowners in Rockcastle County including the Great Saltpetre cave. He later movedto Missouri, first to Boone County and then to Lafayette. He received his government pension on 5 November 1833 at the rate of \$58.11 annually. James applied for his bounty land but his application was reiected. James died 8 July 1841 in Platte Co. MO and is buried with his wife on their farmland.



Eligible losses may include excessive heat losses experienced from or winds, flooding, bliz-Oct. 1, 2013, through Sept. zards, hail, wildfires, light-

ning strikes, volcanic eruptions and diseases, or in the case of honeybees, losses due to colony collapse disorder. Beekeepers, most of whom suffered honeybee colony losses, represent more than half of ELAP recipients.



Mamaw's Kitchen

By Regina Poynter Hoskins

SAWDUST SALAD

My sister-in-law introduced this salad to the family back in 1977. It was an instant hit with Will's family as much as it was mine. The "sawdust," of course, is really shredded cheddar cheese sprinkled on top. My family eats this as a dessert instead of as a salad. Either with your meal, after your meal, or as a snack, it is worth the effort. It makes an excellent potluck dish. In the summertime, the whipped topping and cream cheese may tend to melt some if it's left out in the sun too long, but you usually don't have to worry about that. It is among the first dishes to disappear. In San Francisco, I took this to ADP when I worked there and it turned out to be a favorite of co-worker Steve Aguirre as well as some of the other





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

School Board votes on amended school calendar and 2015-16 school meal prices

The Rockcastle County School Board amended the school calendar and voted to keep school meal prices the same for the 2015-2016 school year at their monthly board meeting Tuesday night.

Director of Pupil Personnel Becky Isaacs told the board that district personnel had analyzed the food services data and that she spoke with a Kentucky Department of Education consultant about the issue of school meal prices. She said they came to the conclusion that the prices set this year are

enough to "sustain" the food services budget.

The breakfast meal prices for the 2015-2016 school year will remain at \$0.30 for reduced priced student meals, \$1.00 for full priced student meals and \$1.75 for adult priced meals. The lunch meal prices will also remain at \$0.40 for reduced, \$1.95 for full and \$2.95 for adult.

Isaacs said the prices are the same at every school with the exception of a full lunch meal price being \$1.25 for preschool students



Streams will return to normal and so will smallmouth bass fishing

Many of us who remember the March 1997 floods in Kentucky recently had uncomfortable pangs of foreboding as storm systems dropped heavy amounts of rain freight-trained across the state.

It looked like another 1997 for a day or so. Small, normally docile neighborhood creeks suddenly filled basements, eroded roadways and carried away belongings. Lexington set an April record for rainfall over the span of one day.

"The biggest problem from all of this rain is not only is the flow too high to

fish, but it will take awhile for the clarity to come back," said David Baker, stream biologist for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "Temperatures are in the mid-to high 50s on some streams, so it will soon be a good time for fishing. We just need a little more time."

Baker believes smallmouth bass waters lying downstream of major lakes such as Green River or Barren River will likely be blown out for a considerable time. Smaller streams clear and return to normal much quicker than larger streams and make the best option for smallmouth bass right now.

"This is a time when you can catch some of the biggest stream smallmouth of the year as they prepare to spawn," Baker said. "They are a little more accessible and easier to catch."

Wading is an excellent way to fish smaller streams for smallmouth bass, especially after the recent high water events likely undercut many streamside trees, tipping them over into the stream, providing potentially dangerous impediments to paddling.

The streams in southcentral Kentucky near Bowling Green in the Barren River drainage such as the Gasper River and the Drakes Creek system are good places to try.

"The Gasper usually will come down pretty quickly," Baker said. "We do see smallmouths up to 18 inches and we get reports of 20 inchers from Gasper."

Baker said the Drakes Creek system drains a large geographical area in karst topography and takes longer to flow out, but contains a healthy population of smallmouth bass from 12 to 16 inches long, with a few in the 18-inch range.

The Drakes Creek system and Gasper River are part of the Warren County Blueways, a cooperative project from governmental agencies, Western Kentucky University and other groups to provide access to streams in south-central Kentucky. website www.trailsrus.com/ blueways/ contains good information on access points with a detailed map.

Baker said those streams flowing through public land in eastern Kentucky provide productive wading fishing opportunities for smallmouths. The Middle Fork of the Red River inside Natural Bridge State Resort Park in Powell County holds a decent population of smallmouth bass with good access.

Rock Creek inside the Daniel Boone National Forest in McCreary County offers wading anglers easy access with roads parallel-Creek. Rock Creek is known

ing the creek for most of its length. The best fishing is upstream of Rock Creek's junction with White Oak







as one of Kentucky's true mountain trout streams, but the creek holds a stable population of smallmouth bass. The Russell Fork in Pike

County offers several productive public wading spots for smallmouths. The public river access at Ratliff Hole (also known as Potters Ford) inside the boundaries of Breaks Interstate Park on KY 80 south of Elkhorn City makes one of the most scenic wading spots in Kentucky.

Wading anglers may also access the Russell Fork at Carson Island Access via Carson Island Road off KY 80, just east of Elkhorn City. The Elkhorn City Park in downtown Elkhorn City grants anglers public wading access to a productive stretch of the Russell Fork.

Elkhorn Creek in Franklin County fishes well even when the water is up a bit. Anglers may wade fish the Elkhorn at T.N. Sullivan Wildlife Management Area off KY 1262 and at the two Voluntary Public Access spots near the junction of Peaks Mill Road (KY 1900) and KY 1262.

All the lures you need for a successful wade easily fit inside a cigar box. A pack of 1/8-ounce leadheads, some black finesse worms, a bag of green-pumpkin tube baits along with a bag of 4-inch Senko type soft plastic jerkbaits in the same color all catch stream smallmouths. Add a floating/diving minnow lure like a Rapala and you're set.

"Look for gravelly bottoms adjacent to the current," Baker said. "A lot of times you can see the smallmouths in spring. Pitch a tube or soft plastic bait rigged on a leadhead near them and they will attack. Also, work areas adjacent to current with a soft plastic jerkbait or a floating/ diving minnow smallmouths. The thing I love most about smaller streams is that any cast can be a good one."



Sitting on the front porch glider-swing that Rufus Harrison crafted for Loretta over ten years ago, last Friday morning, enjoying my too-manyth cup of coffee and a bowl full of good English pipe tobacco, waiting for the mail to run, watching the grass grow and, generally, just minding myown business, I heard the rumbling roar, coming from way up the road, a full minute before I saw its cause.

I may never know who owns it nor what it was doing on Charlie Brown Road, but I want the owner of the quintessential, lemon-yellow, "hot rod Lincoln" to know that he absolutely made my day, if not my decade. I had not seen one of these babies since the late 1960's when a few owners would shine them up and drive them in parades in Pikeville, Prestonsburg and Paintsville.

I believe the popularity of the vehicle was inspired by a band, in the mid 1950's, called Commander Cody and The Lost Planet Airmen. They had a huge hit song, called Hot Rod Lincoln, that received as much radio air play on country music stations as it did on early rock & roll radio, so it may well have been one of the first ever successful "cross-overs" betweenthose genre's. All you have to do to hear the song is google "hot rod Lincoln" and you will hear why it was so well

The song was still going strong, as late as 1963, on Whitesburg's WTCW, 920 on your AM dial, when Jimmy Branham signed the station on with his country/ bluegrass "show" at 6:00 AM and Ron Statzer shut it down at 6:PMwith his "rock show". "Hot Rod Lincoln" got played at least twice on both programs, along with Bill Monroe and Merle Haggard in the morning and Elvis Presley and Jimmy Gilmer and The Fireballs in the late afternoon. The hot rod Lincoln was

not a Lincoln at all, but a Model-A Ford body and chaises with a V-12 cylinder Lincoln Zephyr motor stuck in the frame where a straight 6 cylinder Ford motor used to be. It was neither practical nor much ingenious because the big Lincoln engine was much stronger, in terms of raw horsepower, than the Ford frame and drive train were made to handle, but it was still a rich boys' favorite toy for a decade or so between 1955 and 1965.

The only one I ever drove and took for a ride was owned by a kid in Pikeville, last name was Coleman, in the summer of 1968. The young man's father had actually built it around 1960 and allowed his son to drive it out to then Boy Scout Camp Shawnee on Dewey Lake, near Prestonsburg,



Grit Magazine

When I was around ten or eleven years of age, the only job I had ever had was mowing my grandfather's yard. He paid me fifty cents an hour to complete the job—a more than generous amount for the time. But I mentioned several times to my mother (Bee) that I wished that I could make some extra money. She saw an ad in the Courier Journal encouraging young boys to deliver a weekly Grit Magazine from door to door. We discussed the possibilities of the position and decided to at least check it out.

Bee called the company in order to find out the particulars of the position. The magazine would be sent on Thursdays so that I could make the sales and delivery it over the weekends. The job did not require any sales of subscriptions. The company simply sent me a huge stack of the magazines, and I was to sell them door to

The customer paid 10 cents for each paper, and I was permitted to keep 4 cents for each paper sold, not counting tips--which usually turned out to be more than the profit from selling the papers. It is my recollection that I averaged making eight or ten dollars per week. In 1954 that was a HUGE amount of money for a ten-year-old young man. This very profitable position allowed me to visit Helton's Five and Dime and buy all the model cars that I wanted.

Of course, most of my sales were made in my own neighborhood. However, Bee also took some of them to the Greyhound Bus Station (where she was the ticket agent) and helped me sell a few to her fellow employees. I also took the routes of my friends' streets in Mt. Vernon in order to sell a few copies on Saturday afternoon. That turned out to be a great idea because most of them would not say no to

I think the company initially began by sending me 50 copies of the paper. By the end of the first month, I was ordering double that amount. The contents of the magazine actually appealed to many. Most of the articles were on a national basis with a few that were just funny. For example, the paper in 1954 had five sections included in the 44-page magazine: News, Comics, Family, Women's, and a personal Story section. Ordinary people could write stories and submit them to the

magazine to be considered for the story section.

Grit was sold across the country by children and by teenagers, many recruited by ads in comic books and newspapers. I have discovered that during the 1950's, approximately 30,000 children were delivering the publication's 700,000 copies per week.

The paper had a good reputation for strong family values and for telling the truth in its articles. Its first issue was dated "Saturday evening, December 16, 1882," and it is still in publication after 133 years. Today, its format is a glossy, full-color version, although I have not seen one in a very long time.

No one seems to know how the name Grit came to be; however, it is said that it took sheer grit to keep it on its feet in the early days. One reason for its success was because it was being distributed by children, and families found it almost impossible to say "no" to young boys who were trying to earn some money.

I cannot help but note the irony that my first and my last jobs were for magazines. Maybe selling those Grit newspapers planted something in me that did not come to fruition until my latter years—seems fitting, doesn't it?



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

where I was Program Director, at the time.

The Camp Director, that year was a career Boy Scout Executive, nearing retirement, from Grundy or Clintwood Virginia, whose name was Clifford Judd, whoinsisted that he simply be called "The Judd" by his subordinate staff and the 150 or so campers we had every week. Anyway, young

Coleman promptly learned from The Judd that campers, other than adult leaders, were not allowed to keep vehicles at Camp all week. Coleman tried to insist that, at age 16, he was an adult leader of his troop and The Judd told him he wasn't even old enough to be shaving and that he had to get the hot rod off the premises which covered over 900

To make a long story short, The Judd discovered that Coleman only had a learners permit so he called the kid's mom, made arrangements for her to drive me back to camp and I drove the cherry red rodback to Pikeville. I didn't get to the Coleman residence until after I had made a couple of passes through campus to make sure that all the summer students got an eyeful of the hot rod Lincoln.

The car had so many coats of hand-rubbed lacquer on it that it literally looked like it was encased in glass. Most of the engine was exposed, fitted with chrome valve covers and a huge chrome breather cover. An array of chrome manifold pipes ran down both sides. It had rocket spoke magwheels and it looked as fast as it probably was. I never dared try to find out how fast that might have been because all that power seemed way too much for sucha skinny body and frame. I was also terrified that I'd get pulled over by the law because it had no sign of mufflers and, even at an idle it roared.

Amelanchier: The Serviceberry is Pretty and Practical Attention grabbing white blossoms in the hills and woods edge, and in many a home landscape, are a clue that winter is past and spring arrived. The amelanchier or service berry bush or tree is such a versatile native plant, it blooms ahead of Bradford pears, dogwoods or redbuds, and bears delectable purplish blue or reddish purple fruits. Called sarvis, shadbush (named after the little fishes), Juneberry, and Saskatoons. There are some 33 listed species in the world, but probably several are natural hybrids as they are hard to tell apart. This cute, adorable bush (or small tree, depending on species

The serviceberries make wonderful low-maintenance trees for the yard. Somewhat the size or a redbud or dogwood in time, the serviceberry grows pretty slow. A few native ones have reached 70 feet in the wild, but that requires a hundred plus years. Some varieties never seem to get much bigger than blueberry bushes. A multi-stem serviceberry may make you think of a crepe myrtle, except the blooms are white in March or April and the trunks are smooth until they are old, but don't peel like the crepe myrtle. Think of putting one in your yard as a substitute for a dogwood or crepe myrtle or forsythia.

Sarvis or serviceberries are also edible, and really tasty (if you beat the birds to them)! They make a wonderful contribution to the

sustainable, edible landscape. Plus they are wellbehaved, colorful, are a good host for some butterfly species and are loved by most all birds. I often recommend one in a landscape plan, you can hardly go wrong with this lovely little tree. You don't even have to plant two for pollination as they are self fruitful—but I'd plant several so the birds don't eat all of them.

Some of the common species in the Appalachian area are: Amelanchier lavies or Allegheny serviceberry; a. arborea perhaps the largest of the trees as I know where there are a few 60 to 70 feet specimens; a. Canadensis, hardy from Georgia to the Hudson Bay in Canada; a. grandiflora, "Autumn Brilliance" being a common patented variety; a. alnifolia, or downy serviceberry, is also know as a Saskatoon, and has larger fruit and more rounded leaves and seldom reaches more than ten feet or so; a. stolonifera is a dwarf; and amelanchier Lamarckii is probably a natural cross made centuries ago in North America. This one is also called Apple Serviceberry, and has probably the best fruit for snacking. It has been widely planted and has naturalized in England.

The hybrids, such as amelanchier x grandiflora and amelanchier Lamarckii are more adaptable to all kinds of soils. They like moisture rather than drought, but they won't tolerate standing water in the planting hole or frequent flooding. In the wild they often

survive on the poorest hillside and light up a grey world before the leaves of most trees come out in the spring. This is a useful shrub or small tree that I highly recommend for landscape plantings. Even if it didn't bloom or have fruit, it would still be a good little tree that isn't fussy and has some fairly good yellow orange pink or red fall color. Consider it next time you want a new small tree for your

In that verse, a little child opined, "We have the nicest garbage man, he empties out our garbage can. He's just as nice as he can be, he always stops and talks with me." After that observation, the the little child continued to opine, "My mother doesn't like his smell. But mother doesn't know him well." Although we have been

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



"They could put up a sign saying it's maintained by them and for students it would be great because they could log community hours to have when they apply for college scholarships. It would also be safer and more convenient for them too as they wouldn't be on a roadway."

The rest of the council agreed to contact groups to see if they would be interested in adopting a city park to maintain. They also agreed to examine the shelter and determine if it's safe or needs to be removed.

problem with people adopting pets then getting tired of them and turning them loose for them to breed again and we have more animals to pick up.'

Bishop said he would like to see a uniform system that would include animals being spayed/neutered before being put up for adoption. "That is being more humane by not having to euthanize so many ani-

The court also agreed to come up with a policy to deal with all the requests they get for donations to traveling sports teams in the

Tim McIntosh was at the meeting to ask for a donation for a traveling girls softball team he coaches but Magistrate Bill McKinney said that since the team had no affiliation with leagues in the county he felt it might not "be legal" for the court to make the donations.

On Bishop's recommendation, the court agreed to work to set a uniform policy to deal with these requests.

The court was fairly gen-

erous during the meeting on several requests before them. They made a \$1,000 donation to Katha Carpenter to be used for the Founders Day activities planned for May 8 and 9 at Livingston. They also donated \$1,000 to the City of Brodhead for their Dix River Festival and, they agreed to donate \$1,000 for field rental for the Southeastern Tractor & Engine Association for their show planned for October 2, 3 and 4 at Renfro Valley and to furnish a dumpster for the

The court also was asked for a \$7,200 donation by Hospice Care Plus which represents \$100 for each patient Hospice cared for in 2014 from Rockcastle County. However, McKinney said that the county's donation to Hospice last year was \$10,000 and he felt this should be the amount donated since Hospice "serves a great purpose for this county." The motion passed unanimously.

The court also agreed to pay \$4,600 for two historical markers to be used to help mark the Daniel Boone Trace in the county. The payment was made at the request of the Kentucky Historical Society.

Donations were also made to the Kentucky Sheriff's Boys and Girls and the Special Olympics of \$250 and \$300, respec-

The court also agreed to front expenses for Kimberly Gibson to attend four days **DOC MRT Training in West** Virginia. The training is necessary for Gibson, a social worker with the Rockcastle County Detention Center, to administer the "Road to Justice" program which is mandated to be in effect in each county Gibson told the court that

a grant will be applied for to reimburse the court for the \$1500 in expenses through County Attorney Billy Reynolds' office. The court also approved the payment of the court's audit of \$16,902.19 and the

sheriff (\$3,000.53) and the fiscal court (\$3,609.80). The court also found out the premiums for their property/liability insurance and their workmen's compensation for 2015-16. The county's premiums had been locked in for three years but that contract expires as of June 30, 2015. The premiums increased by \$15,775 for property/liabil-

ity and \$21,000 for workmen's compensation for a total of \$252,878. Judge Bishop noted that the county was paying insurance on 38 total vehicles and he said an inventory needed to be done so that

any unnecessary vehicles

Bishop also told the court that the road department needed several pieces of equipment and he felt they could be purchased cheaper through the state

The court approved up to \$150,000 to be set aside for new equipment.

The court also discussed with RCIDA Executive Director Holly Hopkins payment due the county for damage to the former Anchor Packaging building when the company moved

The court was originally told that Anchor would repay the county for damage to two doors and to the concrete floor while Anchor was in the process of mov-

and \$1.70 for kindergarten through fifth grade students.

Board member Angela Stallsworth Mink asked if the proposed 2015-2016 meal prices would keep them in compliance with the federal law that requires meal prices be raised at least \$0.10 every year until a full paying student is paying Isaacs said that she asked

the KDE consultant about that particular federal law and she said they told her that they are no longer using that model for food services. She said the KDE consultant assured her that they wouldn't be reviewed on that model and that the data collected from food services showed that this school year's prices were sufficient.

The board agreed unanimously to keep the school meal prices the same for the 2015-2016 school year.

Isaacs also updated the board about the possibility of all students receiving free meals under the Community Eligibility Provision. The CEP program allows high poverty schools to offer both breakfast and lunch to all students regardless of their parents' or guardians'

Isaacs said they have submitted the required information to KDE and that they are already reviewing their data and making suggestions. She said KDE consultants told her that the number of students receiving free meals are high enough for the school district to consider the CDE program.

Isaacs asked the board to give permission for the district to start the application process for the CEP program while district personnel continues to weigh the "financial feasibility" of the program. The board granted permission to begin the CEP application process.

Isaacs went on to propose an amended 2014-2015 school calendar to the Isaacs said that the state

legislature passed the same provisions as last school year for inclement weather days. She said the state legislature removed the required 170 school days but kept the required 1,062 school hours in place, which ultimately gives school districts more flexibility with amending their calendars. Rockcastle County Schools have missed 17

days because of inclement weather. She said the amended calendar calls for school to be dismissed for Election Day on Tuesday, May 19th and Memorial Day on Monday, May 25th. Isaacs said that the last

day of school will be Friday, May 29th and that the Rockcastle County High School graduation will be on Thursday, May 28th at 6

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

Two arrested in meth bust

Two people were arrested for manufacturing meth last Thursday after police raided a home on Wool Lane in Mt. Vernon.

Arrested at the scene were Joshua S. Cromer, 33 and Donald A. Gadd, 46, both of Mt. Vernon.

According to state police reports, troopers responded to the residence after receiving several complaints of people manufacturing meth there.

Once officers arrived, Gadd answered the door and let them inside the residence.

Officers noted that they could see various drug paraphernalia items lying in plain view throughout the home. Cromer was also later discovered inside a bathroom at the home.

After searching the residence, officers found several items associated with manufacturing meth. They also found a meth lab inside a closet in the master bedroom and suspected methamphetamine hidden underneath a towel in the bathroom.

Both Cromer and Gadd were charged with manufacturing methamphetamine, possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine), unlawful possession of a meth precursor and drug paraphernalia.

The two were lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center. Cromer remains there on a \$25,000 cash/property bond and Gadd was later released on a \$25,000 cash/property bond.

The American Revolutionary War Patriots of Rockcastle

256-2851. Wonsley Baker

Maryland WonsleyBaker was born 1762 in Frederick Co. Maryland and died sometime after 1840 in Laurel Co. KY. According to his pension application, Wonsleygave the following account of his service on 1 October 1836 in Rockcastle Co. KY at the age of seventy four. He was drafted out to Captain Brashear's Militia in the county of Frederick, state of Maryland in the fall of the year or rather he was drafted he thought in the last of August and went to service about the first of September. He could not remember the date of the year, but it was in the year that General Burgoyne was taken by General Gates and about six weeks before as he believed (October

He marched out under Captain Abraham Huff as a guard and was stationed about one mile and one half from the town of Frederick in the state of Maryland where he remained a guard in actual service until sometime in March following and until his term of service

had expired. He was well

acquaintedwith General Gates, Captain Shreeker and Captain Bell and played the fife at the militia musters for Captains Bell and Shreeker. He received a discharge from his Captain but had lost it long since. He had no documenting evidence of his service but offered to the testimony of Bazel Baker and PL Parker.

After the Revolution, Wonsleymoyed to Virginia and from there to Kentucky in Madison County and from there to Laurel. He applied for his pension in Rockcastle County because he lived too far out in the country in Laurel County and it was too difficult at his age to make the journey to court in his county. It was closer to file his papers in Rockcastle. Wansley's pension application was rejected by the government on the basis that he served less than six months.

Wonsley was married to Charity Phelps (1766-1853) and had at least eight children according to census records. Their names are not listed in his pension papers or in the census. The possible children of Wonsley Charity WonsleyBaker (1784 NC-1850 Madison Co. KY) married Letty Henderson (1793-1882) on 4 October 1809 in Madison Co. KY. They had six children: Sarah, Lourinda, Elizabeth, Ellender, Charlotte and Wonsley III. Wonsley Jr. served in the 2ndRegiment (Jennings) KY Volunteers as

a Private during the War of 1812. He received 50 acre land grant on 22 March 1838 in Rockcastle Co. on Clear Creek. Braddock Baker (1791-1878

Volunteers needed to assist children in foster care

Citizen Foster Care Review Boards in 46 counties are seeking volunteers to make a difference in the lives of local children in foster care. Volunteers are needed to review cases of children placed in foster care because of dependency, neglect or abuse to ensure these children are placed in safe, permanent homes as quickly as possible.

Volunteers are needed in every region of Kentucky. The counties most in need of volunteers are Anderson, Barren, Bell, Bourbon, Boyd, Boyle, Breathitt, Bullitt, Calloway, Carter, Casey, Christian, Clark, Clay, Clinton, Daviess, Fayette, Floyd, Franklin, Graves, Hardin, Harlan, Henderson, Hopkins, Jefferson, Jessamine, Laurel, Letcher, Lincoln, Madison, Magoffin, McCracken, Nelson, Oldham, Owsley, Perry, Pike, Pulaski,

Volunteers are not required to reside in the county where a board meets.

The Kentucky General Assembly created the state CFCRB in 1982 as a way to decrease the time children spend in foster care. CFCRB volunteers review Cabinet for Health and Family Services files on children placed in out-of-home care and work with the cabinet and courts on behalf of the state's foster children. The volunteer reviewers help ensure that children receive the necessary services while in foster care and are ultimately placed in permanent

All volunteers must complete a six-hour initial training session and consent to a criminal record and Central Registry check. A recommendation is then made to the chief judge of the District Court or Family Court for appointment.

Individuals who are interested in volunteering may get more information and apply to volunteer on the CFCRB web page at http:// courts.ky.gov/ courtprograms/cfcrb/Pages/ default.aspx

Potential volunteers are couraged to apply as s as possible so they may be scheduled for training.

800 volunteers serve as members of the Kentucky Citizen Foster Care Review Board. The Administrative Office of the Courts oversees the boards. The AOC is the operations arm for the state court system and supports the activities of court system employees and elected justices, judges and circuit court clerks. The AOC also executes the Judicial Branch budget.

Country songwriter John Prine wrote a song entitled "Paradise". It was a beautiful area along the Green River in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. (At least until

Mister Peabody's coal train hauled it away!)

I think we can all agree that paradise commonly refers to a beautiful place. A safe and peaceful place. And a restful place. The kind of place I wish we were all able to come home to following a day of work.

When imagining paradise, do we think of lush greenery, flowing waters, and fruit hanging in the trees? Frankly I do.

National Safe Digging Month With the increasing warmth of the season come increased thoughts of mak-

ing home upgrades and repairs, or putting renovation projects in motion. But one detail that often gets overlooked is how to safely execute those projects, particularly when they require

digging underground.

As part of April's "National Safe Digging Month," Louisville Gas and Electric Company and Kentucky Utilities Company urge customers to dial 8-1-1, the Federal Communication Commission's designated call-before-you-dig number, to identify buried lines that could be damaged as a result of excavation

work. Whether it's a home owner or contractor, and whether installing a mailbox, putting in a fence, building a deck or laying a patio - Kentucky law requires all excavators to contact operators of underground utilities before performing any excavation

According to Common Ground Alliance, a national organization focused on protecting underground utilities across the country, an underground utility line is damaged every eight minutes because someone decided to dig without calling

work.

8-1-1 first. How to use Kentucky 811:

 Start by planning ahead Know what you plan to do, where you plan to do it and when you'd like to begin your dig.

• Call Kentucky 811 -Call 8-1-1at least two days before you plan to dig and provide the required information about your dig to the call agent. Kentucky 811 is available 24 hours a day,

seven days a week. • Wait the required time for marking – When you call Kentucky 811, they coordinate with Kentucky 811 member utilities in your area, including LG&E and KU, to have underground utility lines marked. This work is performed at no cost to you.

A "locate request" goes out to member utilities, including those who provide natural gas, electric, telephone, cable and water service. Crews either mark their underground facilities or notify the excavator they have no underground lines in the area.

• Respect the marks and dig with care - Markings are completed using paint or flags according to the standard color code system. If you have any questions, you should contact the appropriate utility directly.

LG&E customers should dial 8-1-1 before they dig. KU customers can visit the company's website to see if they need to call 8-1-1 or KU directly based on the area where they are digging.

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
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
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

Council passed the second reading of their personnel changes ordinance and approved changing the employees' healthcare plans which saves the city almost \$100,000.

The meeting got off to an awkward start councilmember Mullins voted "no" on the minutes from the March council meeting. The policy also creates the position of Lake Linville Manager which oversees the city's marina, restaurant, RV park, park and other recreational centers at Lake Linville.

This is probably way too much information for you readers but I was truly astounded because it's one of the few times that I have been felled with one of the "bugs" that traisp through the community with regular-


My three "local" daughters, did a good job of caring for me and I appreciate it -- Jax and Penny are not real good caretakers in these situations.

As I have probably mentioned before, I received a nifty Brownie Hawkeye camera as a gift when I was in elementary school. In those days, black-and-white photographs were used most because of the prohibitive cost involved in processing

I remember sitting in the rafters at Memorial Coliseum when the Mt. Vernon Red Devils made it to the state tournament. I could barely see the basketball court, so I held my Brownie high above my head and snapped a shot. When the film was developed, I had a wonderful picture of one of our guards making a jump shot. That photo, along with the fact that I had my own camera, set me on a path that I have followed in one form or another until this day.

After I began my teaching career in 1965, I purchased my first 35 mm camera, a Ricoh with interchangeable lenses. Once I began using it, I was truly hooked. Of the 38 years that I taught high school, 35 of those years I was also the Yearbook Advisor at two different schools - Mt. Sterling High and George Rogers Clark High in Winchester, Kentucky. In 1976, the Mt. Sterling yearbook was awarded a National First Place Award by Columbia Scholastic Press Association. I was elated.

I was not only pleased for myself. That year was the school's final one. The following year, it was consolidated with the local county school. Therefore, it seemed somehow appropriate that our yearbook staff ended things on such a high note. I found it quite gratifying.

I soon decided that I needed a better camera. I chose a Nikon F2S, which was the camera that the United States took to the moon in 1969. Because of my love for photography, I

During my earliest years, there in the head of Blair Branch, my Dad would get the itch to trade off the mule he had fed all winter and get one better suited for spring plowing. Which, of course, brings into question, why on earth he had kept the mule all winter to begin with? I suppose it was so he could have something besides the cow and chickens to feed all that corn and fodder that he'd slaved to raise and get into the barn the previous year. And Heaven knows he couldn't have done that without the mule.

That, plus the fact that mules didn't fetch nearly as much, price wise, at the fall stock salesand if he'd sold him then, he wouldn't have had anything to trade on come spring. My Dad, at that time in his life, fancied himself a muletrader from way on back. He was proud of the reputation that you couldn't trade nickels with him without throwing in a penny to boot. He would often trade milk cows so frequently that they didn't even have time to get used to their new names. Sometimes mules only lasted on our place for the week between Saturday auctions at the Isom, Kentucky "Stock

He'd bring one home and discover that he or she walked too fast or too slowly or that it was bad to "take the studs", meaning it would "balk" and simply stop right in the middle of whatever he had it doing and just stand there walling its eyes and swishing its tail and refusing to move its feet. Sometimes he'd discover that it didn't know gee from haw, gidup from whoa, that it was blind in one eye or couldn't hear thunder.

In other words, it took one heck of a mule to suit my Dad. But the truth of the matter is that he didn't mind bringing home a "plug" because that gave him an excuse to go back to the Stock Sale and, in essence, try to trade up to a better model.

But all that was before he brought Ole Dock home one spring in the late 50's.

Dock was not a mule. He a 1600 pound Percherondraft horse that Dad purchased for logging timber. He dwarfed any mule that I had ever seen and nobody at the time, Dad included, would have ever believed he had any utility when it came to plowing a garden because he was about a thousand pounds too big and either one of his front feet would have covered at least 4 mule tracks.

During the first two or three years that we had Old Dock, Dad also kept a plow mule on the place. Unlike most mules, Old Dock was very loveable, possessed a friendly disposition, thrived on affectionate petting and to this day, I believe he thought he was a dog. know, for sure that my Mon loved him better than any dog we'd ever had on the place. Suffice to say that the merest hint that he might sell or trade Ole Dock generated enough ire that Dad, very rapidly dropped the notion.

Dad also discovered that he could turna bottom under with Ole Dock in about half the time required with a mule. A bottom turning plow is about 4 times heavier and as many times harder for a draft animal to pull than a bull tongue plow that was used to prepare most gardens for plowing Mules have to stop and res very frequently and they are notorious for doing just that The old saw, "stubborn as a mule" is well earned, ever though most things, other than my wife, aren't.

But pulling a turning plow was scarcely more strenuous to Dock than a leisurely stroll around the pasture because he was accustomed to pulling saw logs that more than a ton.

I'm not exactly sure how it happened but one spring somebody offered Dad more than twice as much cashfor a little chestnut mare mule than he thought she was worth. Her name was Mertand she turned out to be the last mule we ever had or the place because her absence enabled Dad to discover that Dock was just as nimble at plowing a garder as a mule and far better at

the chore than most. To make a much longer


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

Hospice's Bucket-List Challenge gets challenge gift

Hospice Care Plus launched an online Bucket-List Challenge on its Facebook page on April 9 to raise funds for patients' last wishes. The goal was to raise \$5,000. But a very generous gift from Mrs. Anna Caudill has raised the Caudill contacted the non-profit hospice after seeing its

bucket-list stories on Facebook. She said hospice cared for her father, and that she loved the stories. "She told us to keep telling these stories, and then she

pledged a \$20,000 gift," says Brenna Wallhausser, director of public relations. The donor gave Hospice Care Plus permission to use

her pledge as a matching challenge: raise \$20,000 themselves, and her gift will kick-in to make the total \$40,000 for bucket-list wishes. The stories are about bucket-list wishes that hospice care

helps patients meet: a Texas native who wants to taste the authentic Mexican food of his home and youth, a young child who wants to have Christmas with her family one more time, a grandmother who desperately wants to be there when her grandson boards the school bus for the first time, a mother who wants to live until Thanksgiving and be strong enough to teach her daughter how to make the meal, a bereaved widow who wants to learn to drive, and many more.

The Bucket-List Challenge was originally scheduled to end on April 16, but has been extended to April 27 to increase the likelihood that hospice raises the \$20,000 needed to receive the \$20,000 donation from Mrs. Caudill. As of Friday afternoon, the campaign had raised \$7,040.

"It's ambitious, but I think we can get there," says Wallhausser. "And what's so nice about an online fundraiser is that, even if you truly can't give even \$10, you can help in other ways—by sharing the bucket-list stories on social media, for instance, or contacting friends, family, co-workers and church members and encouraging them to support the challenge.'

"Even if you can't give, just take a moment to read the stories," says Wallhausser. I think that's the common thread that runs through these stories. There isn't a single story about wanting to take a cruise or purchase a big-ticket item. These are simple, modest hopes about things that matter.'

opened a professional studio on Main Street in Mt. Sterling. I continued teaching, but I operated my own studio for over ten years. With the help of an assistant/secretary and occasionally an additional photographer, we concentrated on portraits, weddings, and commercial photography.

It was hard work but I loved I it. Even though it has been years and years since I ceased doing professional photography, I still get the occasional inquiry as to whether I still shoot weddings. (For the record, I do

During this time, one day I was driving my automobile on a backroad in Mt. Sterling, and I saw the most beautiful sunset that I had ever witnessed. I immediately stopped my car, pulled out my trusty camera and began taking multiple shots as the sun slowly disappeared over the horizon. It was a spellbinding beauty. One of those photographs was entered in a national Professional Photographers of America (PPA) contest and won second place. That photo, now mounted on canvas, hangs in my home to-

Once the digital age arrived, I purchased a Canon EOS 6D and began storing $my\ photos\ on\ my\ PC$ and on my laptop. That involved a significant learning curve for me because all of my photographic knowledge revolved around using negatives or slides and storing them in a physical location. Now I use "flash drives" to store my most important photos. That Canon also came equipped with software which enables me to alter my photographs even after I am away from a shoot. That, I must say, seems almost magical to me.

I am now also using my iPhone to capture images that do not need to be of a professional nature. I believe that I have a bank of more than 700 photos on my phone. Old habits are hard to break.

As the processes of photography evolved, so did I and my equipment. These days, shooting good photographs is not anywhere near as demanding as it was with film. When I am trying to capture a vision that is important to me, I simply vary my exposures and shoot oodles of images. Then, when I am at my computer, I select the ones that are worthy and discard the remaining frames.

That was never a feasible approach using film because it would have cost a fortune. Today, once you buy the

camera, you have most everything that you need. Additionally, having an instant view of each shot located on the backside of a camera saves so much time, not to mention money.

From big blue flashbulbs to digital strobe lights, photography has come a long way. And so have I. And I must admit that, with my increasing age, I'm very happy that getting the shot that you desire is so much

story short, Ole Dock taught all three of my younger brothersand me to plow. He was patient with us too. During the learning process, when we would accidentally let the plow run out of a furrow or a tad too deeply into unplowed ground, he would stop, turn his big head and stare us down until the plow was righted. If we got to the end of the furrow and needed to turn right but, in-

stead, commanded "haw" instead of "gee", Dock would stop and turn his head as if to ask, "Are you sure about that?" I'm reasonably sure that I'm not the only person who has frequently apologized to a horse.

By the time my brother, Keith, was 9 and I was 11 we were plowing most of the gardens on Blair Branch and even Doty Creek and Spring Branch after school and on Saturdays. If the ground stayed dry enough we could earn more money in a week in April, than Dad did shoveling coal for 50 hours in a deep, dark mine.

My old Troybilt horse tiller has finally bit the dustand it pains me to no end that a new one is going to cost me about 3 times as much as my Dad paid for old Dock. I probably don't need to be telling you which one I'd rather have even though my little garden would not come close to getting Ole Dock through a hard winter.







A representative from the Kentucky League of Cities attended the meeting to propose a new health plan for city employees that would save the city around \$8,222.73 a month or

\$98,672.78 a year. Bryant said that the KLC plan has increased benefits for employees at a reduced price. The KLC representative told the council that the lowered premium for better benefits is a result of a "stable and healthy group of employees."

The council unanimously passed the new healthcare plan with the

Kentucky League of Cities. Bryant also said that Bible Baptist Church in Mt. Vernon had asked for permission to use the city's parking lot for a fundraiser. Bryant said the city ordinance states that approval from the council is needed for people, groups or organizations to use the city parking lot for yard sales or fundraisers.

Bryant said that Bible Baptist requested the use of the city parking lot so they could have a fundraiser in order to raise money for a mission trip. Everyone on the council voted yes with the exception of Mullins

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who voted no. The motion passed with a majority vote.

A concerned citizen, who recently had a water leak at her residence while she was gone for approximately two weeks, was also present at the meeting. She said the leak left her with around a \$900 water bill. She was concerned about how she would pay the large bill and asked if the ten percent penalty would be applied to the unpaid balance each month.

Mayor Mike Bryant said every government or utility organization has a "penalized" system and he said the city approves payment plans for "good-paying" customers who aren't trying to "beat the system." He also said that the penalty is just applied one time as long as the customer contacted them and agreed to a payment plan.

The concerned citizen also asked if there was a device that could be hooked to a water meter to alert homeowners if they had a leak. Bryant said that the city is always trying to stay updated with the latest technology and that water employees check the meters once a month.

Police Chief Brian Carter presented the council with his department's activity report for March which showed: 75 total calls for service, one non-injury accident, 31 total arrests, five drug charges, 27 traffic violations, 11 other criminal charges, 21 warrants served, one DUI and two criminal summons.

Fire Chief David Bales gave the council his department's activity report for March which showed: three structure fires, three vegetation fires, nine vehicle accidents without extrication, three vehicle accidents with extrication, one false alarm, two service calls, three public service assistance calls and two automatic aid calls.

Joel Watson - Virginia Joel Watson is somewhat of a mystery. There are very few records of any kind about this man. The only record of his service during the American Revolution is found in the pension application of Rockcastle County Patriot, John Ham. In 1824, Mr. Watson gave an affidavit on behalf of John Hamstating that he was acquainted with John in the Continental Army in Virginia. He served under General Greene in North Carolina and was a soldier in the Army under Colonel Daniel Morgan's Rifle Regiment. He is not in the muster rolls nor did he apply for a pension of his own.

Brodhead Fire Department responded to a trailer fire Monday morning around 3 a.m. on Fort Harrod Road in

Brodhead. Authorities say the home belonged to Franklin McClure and that he was inside the residence at the

time of the fire. McClure was transported to Rockcastle Regional Hospital where he was treated for non-life

War Patriots of Rockcastle

It is believed by some researchers that he was born about 1764 in North Carolina. He would later move to Virginia. Joel is listed in the 1810 Census living in Washington Co. VA with his wife and four sons and four daughters After the Revolution, Joel migrated to Kentucky. He is listed in the 1819 Tax List of Rockcastle owning one horsewith value of \$40.00. In 1820, Joel is listed owning 80 acres on Negro Creekand three horses listing total value of \$250.00. He is listed in the tax records of Rockcastle through 1825. The only Joel Watson in the 1830 Census is Joel's son, Joel Jr. living in Rockcastle County Joel's death date and final resting place is unknown to this researcher.

Joel and his unnamed spouse produced at least eight children. Only three names of those children have been found. Mary Watson (1790 VA-23 March 1857 Rockcastle Co. KY) married Samuel Carson (1783VA-1847 Rockcastle Co. KY) in 1827. Samuel was the grandson of Patriot, James Dysart. She died from cancer. Samuel is buried at the Rock Springs Church Cemetery in Rockcastle Co. KY. It is thought that Mary is also in that cemetery in an unmarked grave. They had at least three children. William Watson (1795VA-October 1852 Rockcastle Co. KY) was married and had at least nine children. Joel Watson Jr. (1801- Garrard Co. KY) was married and had at least six children (listed in the 1840 Census living in Garrard Co. KY).

As to date, no descendant of Joel Watson has joined the Daughters of the American Revolution. He would be considered a new Patriot for the Society.

"We've also secured a grant from a local organization that we are going to use to purchase two water bottle filling stations to place in the high school," said senior council representative, Shelby Ponder.

The installation of these filtration systems will decrease plastic water bottle waste within the school, allowing students to recycle and refill their bottles with clean water.

In addition to the outstanding accomplishments the RCHS Student Council has made this year alone, they are in the process of establishing an honor roll system to recognize and encourage hardworking students, as well as adding items to the a la carte selection at lunch.

The recent success of the Student Council is undoubtedly due to the hard work of their caring and encouraging sponsor, Herbie Brock, who has been working with the council for five years to implement a "Bring Your Own Device" policy.

We have helped in getting more technology per student with the addition of labs and mobile labs. The hesitation toward BYOD is more a result of numerous obstacles that the administration has faced and less about their not seeing the potential benefits of it,"

Brock said. The council is still working to increase student access to technology and plans on doing so until there is full access to technology in the

classroom. As for the future of the RCHS Student Council, representative Shelby Ponder weighed in on her hopes for the council following the graduation of she and other senior representative Anna Poynter.

"Next year and in the years to come, I hope the Student Council will take care of any unfinished business from this year, because we often times have too many ideas and projects to take on at one time. I hope that the Student Council can find an effective way to spread the word about the awesome things we've already done and have yet to do, because the most vital part of our organization is our constituency, and most of them have no idea what we're doing.'





Mulch, mold and fungi

Mulch can be beneficial in many ways on plant beds, around foundation shrubs and other gardening locations in your yard, but mold can threaten its benefits.

In landscape beds and gardens, mulch helps control weeds, prevent extreme soil temperature fluctuation, decrease water evaporation and improve drainage. Mulch also reduces mower and string trimmer damage on shrubs and trees by suppressing vegetation near their trunks. As it decomposes, mulch produces organic materials to improve soil and otherwise benefit

You need to periodically re-apply mulch to continually get these benefits.

Nuisance fungi occasionally grow on mulch. They include shotgun fungus, slime molds, stinkhorns, earthstars and toadstools.

The shotgun fungus shoots masses of tiny black spore structures onto adjacent surfaces such as vehicles and home siding.

Slime molds are more unsightly than harmful. They don't cause plant diseases and aren't parasitic. Slime mold spores usually appear from late spring to fall. Abundant wet weather stimulates above-ground appearance of these fungi that initially appear slimy but quickly become dry and powdery when converting into spore masses. You'll often see slime molds quickly appear and usually disappear in one to two weeks. They tend to reproduce in the same location

every year. Fungicide use isn't recommended because slime molds aren't harmful.

composted, it might contain fungi that cause plant diseases. This situation is rare, however, and only occurs in non-composted mulch. Plant material fertility problems can arise when fungi in decomposing mulch remove nitrogen from the soil.

Insufficient moisture problems can develop when fungi permeate thick layers of dry mulch creating a surface that's difficult for water to penetrate.

To gain the most benefit, you should use composted mulch with a high bark content and little wood material. Avoid finely ground, woody products that haven't been composted.

If you buy fresh wood chips from a tree-maintenance firm, add water to the chips and allow them to partially compost for about six weeks. If this material doesn't have fresh leaves, you can add some nitrogen to speed up the process. Avoid using fresh or partially composted wood chips near the house foundation because they can provide a food source for termites.

Immediately after you put mulch around plants or trees, soak it with water to enhance bacterial activity to initiate decomposition. Periodically wet mulch during the growing season.

Avoid soured mulch because it tends to injure plants. You can spot sour mulch by its acrid odor.

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

Laurel County man arrested after finding human remains near Roundstone Creek

A Laurel County man has been arrested for tampering with physical evidence after he found human remains last Thursday night along Roundstone Creek near Livingston. According to state police

reports, Bruce Lee Smith, 31, of East Berndstadt told officers he was mushroom hunting along Roundstone Creek when he found what he believed to be skeletal remains. Officers later learned that Smith reportedly took a skelatal bone from the scene and he was in possession of it when they met with him last Friday afternoon.

Smith told officers that he found the skeletal bone in a different location and that he believed the bone was not human remains. However, Rockcastle County Coroner Marvin Owens told officers that he believed the skeletal remains were "human."

When officers asked Smith to show them where he found the skeletal bone he had in his possession, he refused to show them. Smith was then arrested and

Storm causes damage and brings large hail to county

An unusual storm system moved through the state last Saturday, brining golf ball size hail to several sections of Rockcastle County. The National Weather

Service issued a thunderstorm warning and a tornado warning for Rockcastle County last Saturday afternoon as the storm blew through the county.

The NWS reported .25 inch hail in Mt. Vernon with larger size hail in northern Rockcastle County. The largest hail was reported in Boyle County at 3 inches in diameter, which is considered baseball size.

Several Rockcastle Countians posted pictures of the hail and hail damage to their vehicles on social media sites. Some Rockcastle Countians even shared pictures and videos on social media sites of what they believed to be funnel clouds The NWS reported no tornados in the county but recorded winds of up to 40 mph.

CSEPP Director Hal Holbrook said he visited areas of northern Rockcastle County and didn't notice any major damage. He said Rockcastle 911 only received one report of hail last Saturday night on Copper Creek Road in northern Rockcastle County.

"I drove through the Conway area and other areas in the northern end of the county on Sunday," Holbrook said. "People have been reporting hail damage to cars but I didn't notice any major damage."

Holbrook went on to say that Rockcastle County was spared from the worst of the storm that rolled through the state.

"There were some insurance companies that set up tents in parking lots in Berea so they could better help people with storm damage. There was also some 'dent doctors' coming in to Berea to fix vehicles with hail damage," Holbrook said. "We might have had some damage but we were fortunate not to get the amount of damage that was reported in the rest of the state."



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INSPECTION PERIOD

FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL

The Rockcastle County real property tax roll will be opened for inspection from May 4 through May 18, 2015. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the

This is the January 1, 2015 assessment on which state, county and school taxes for 2015 will be due about September 15, 2015.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse and may be inspected between the hours of 8:00 am and 4:00 pm.

Any taxpayer desiring to appeal an assessment on real property made by the PVA must first request a conference with the PVA or a designated deputy. The conference may be held prior to or during the inspection period.

After the conference with the PVA or designated deputy, any taxpayer still aggrieved by an assessment on real property may appeal to the county board of assessment appeals.

The taxpayer can appeal his assessment by filing in person or sending a letter or other written petition stating the reasons for appeal, identifying the property and stating the taxpayer's opinion of the fair cash value of the property.

The appeal must be received in the county clerk's office no later than one work day following the conclusion of the inspection period.

A taxpayer failing to appeal to the county board of assessment appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person or by designated representative, will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

Appeals of personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provisions of KRS 131.110.

The following steps should be taken when a taxpayer does not agree with the assessed value of personal property as determined by the office of property valuation administrator.

- (1) He must list under protest (for certification) what he believes to be the fair cash value of his property.
- (2) He must file a written protest directly with the Department of Revenue, Office of Property Valuation within 30 days from the date of the notice of assessment.
- (3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110.
- (4) The final decision of the Department of Revenue may be appealed to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.





Elaine Adams tells me she has only found 230 morels (dry land fish/ mushrooms)this year and doesn't really expect to find anymore there in her secret patch of woods in Laurel County. My little Brother, Steve, says that he has found 30, mostly around the edge of his yard there at Hotspot in Letcher County. Steve said he'd actually

found 31 but that he had left one standing "for seed." I told Steve that'd I'd bet good money that Elaine could come on his place, walk over where he'd already hunted, and find at least 30 more. The only other human with whom I've hunted dry land fish who was probably as sharpeved as Elaine at finding them was the late William McClure in Rockcastle County.

I have stood, elbow-toelbow, deep in the early spring woods beside both of them and had them ask, "How many can you see from right here, right now?" Usually I could not see a single one while either Elaine or William would tell me they could see up to a dozen or moreand then they would proceed to pick them. I have accused both that they were willing them to come up on the spot just to spite

One fellow, whose first name I have temporarily forgotten, but his last name was Linville and he lived in eastern Rockcastle County near the corner horn where it borders with both Jackson and Rockcastle County once had them (late 1970s-early 80s) coming up by the hundreds all over his yard and orchard.

Every year he would let half a dozen or so stand for a few days until they started to dry up. Then he would pick them, making sure he got the entire plant, bottom and all, freeze them hard as rocks, wrap them in a paper towel, still frozen, and pound them to smithereens with a butcher knife handle. Then he would scatter the tiny crumbs around his place and even tear the towel to shreds he hid under leaves in his fence row and in the orchard

I'm not sure if that's the reason he had his own little dry land fish plantation but I do know that he repeated the process, year in and year out because I've watched him do it. I also know that he had far, far more in that one little acre spot than I've ever seen found in a 400 acre forest after an entire day of hunting with a team of experts.

William McClure, however, was dubious about propagating morels. William always told me to pick every one you can find because there's going to be that many more that you don't find and they're the ones that will make sure there's more in years to come. He believed that Mr. Linville

had such an abundance because they had found a patch of ground they really loved and that they would

keep coming back even if Mr. Linville hadn't done a thing to help them along in the regeneration business.

Anyway, about 1990 or 91 or so, about this time of year, I went back to the Linville place and discovered that he had gone on over to that great dry land fish patch in the sky. His old house, little barn and orchard were long gone and a pretty little double-wide with a white picket fence sat on a graded-flat lot where his place had been. I didn't even bother to stop and ask whomever was living there if they'd found any mushbecause shroomswould have had to sprout through several feet of disturbed soil. I doubt that they can do that.

My first experience with morels happened when I was in first or second grade. Mom's cousin, McKinley (Kinley) Adams, his wife Ruth and only son, Ronnie,(my age) had just moved back to Blair Branch from rural, southern Indiana and our families had hiked to the top of the mountain for an Easter picnic/ walkabout.

A mine road dead-ended at the edge of Pap's (my Grandpa Mose Adams) old mountaintop apple orchard where the trees were all dead and rotting and Kinley spotted a morel (he called them cow teats). Somehow he convinced my parents that these things were not only good to eat, but, in fact a delicacy that could only be had in late March and

Mom had to watch him eat a couple to make sure they didn't kill him before she was willing to try them, but once we found out how delicious they were, hunting mushrooms was my brother's and my favorite thing to do this time of year.

We later discovered that just about everybody, besides us, on the holler knew about "cow teats" but kept the information to themselves because they didn't want any competition when it came time to hunt for

I do know that on that Easter Sunday in 1954 or 55, Ronnie Adams and I lost all interest in hunting colored eggs because hunting the mushrooms was infinitely more fun than any sport the eggs had to offer. Only a day or two later I discovered that they tasted way, way better too.

I had never heard morels called dry land fish untilI moved "down here" which is actually "up here" if you look at a map, but the hills aren't nearly as high even when you can find one. But I soon caught on the fact that William called them by that name and I've gotten used to it even though Elaine looks at me sort of crooked when I say "dry land fish" because they are simply "morels" to her and need no nickname..

Still, if you slice them in half, roll them in corn meal and fry them golden d brown, they do taste remarkably like a bluegill fil-

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
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



<u> State Auditor Report:</u>

Rockcastle Regional example of financial strength among Kentucky's rural hospitals

State auditor Adam Edelen's special report last month on the financial strength of Kentucky's rural hospitals highlighted Rockcastle Regional Hospital and Respiratory Care Center as a success story.

The study's purpose was to assess the financial strength of the state's hospital network to understand the challenges these organizations face in "an era of unprecedented transforma-

Each hospital's financial health was evaluated and given a score based on their performance in four key areas: profit margin, cash on hand, debit financing, and depreciation. The study found the financial condition of 68 percent of the rural hospitals in the state scored below the national average.

Rockcastle Regional was given a financial health rating of "good," ranking 12th in the state. There are 66 rural hospitals in the state, 22 of which either declined to participate in the study or didn't provide the type of information requested.

The auditor's report spe-

cifically mentioned Rockcastle Regional multiple times as an innovative rural hospital creating a niche for itself to maintain its financial strength.

"Other innovative solutions appear to play a role in hospitals that are not in poor fiscal shape. Rockcastle Regional Hospital, for example, serves a small community but has developed a specialty by providing ventilator-dependent care to patients with spinal cord injuries, genetic

Jesse Williams

Maryland/Virginia

Jesse Williams was born 9 June 1750 in New Castle Co. Delaware and died 29 September 1835 Rockcastle Co. KY. According to his pension application, Jesse gave the following account of his service on 28 August 1832 in Rockcastle Co. KY at the age of eighty two. He entered the service of the United States in the summer of 1776 while living in Baltimore Co. MD as a Private

Maryland Militia serving under Captain James Gittings and Colonel Walter Tolly. He rendezvoused at Baltimore and served a tour of about three weeks and then was discharged.

In the fall of 1777, Jesse served as a Private under Captain Zachariah Union's Company and Colonel Darby Lux's Regiment for about five weeks and was again discharged. In the spring of 1778, Jesse was promoted to Sergeant and served five weeks under the same officers and was later promoted to Ensign in 1779 and served four more weeks. His main duty during his tour was to defend the city of Baltimore against attacks from a squadron made up of British soldiers,

Tories and Negroes who were led by Old Dunsmore (John Murray, 4th Earl of Dunsmore), the former Governor of Virginia.

In 1781, Jesse was called again into service in Culpepper Co. VA under Colonel Slaughter, Major Beal, Captain Lilard and LieutenantTriplett. They marched to Malvern Hills on the James River and continued from there to Blackwater on the Chickahominy, New Castle and finally to Claiborne Ferry. This was in General Steven's Brigade directly in the rear of General Lafayette at or new Claiborne Ferry, where he was discharged shortly before the Siege of Yorktown. Jesse had served a tour of

two months. Jesse stated in his pension application that he was born in New Castle Co. Delaware and lived in Baltimore Co. MD when he entered the service. He lived there until 1780 and moved to Culpepper for eleven years and then moved to Stafford Co. VA. He later moved to Orange Co. VA and from there, he and his family moved to Garrard Co. KY. They lived in Garrard County for about ten years until they finally settled in Rockcastle

County. He was awarded a pen-

Sarah Williams (16 January 1784 VA-1794). Richard Gott Williams (23 May 1786 Orange Co. VA-3 January 1876 Rockcastle

sion in the amount of \$21.26 annually commencing 28 August 1832. Jesse does not mention a spouse or children in his application with the exception of one child, David Williams, who was living in Franklin Co. KY at the time. Jesse married Elizabeth Rachel Gott (3 May 1754 MD-10 October 1794 Culpepper Co. VA) on 24 November 1774 in Baltimore Co. MD. He died 29 September 1835 in Rockcastle County and is buried in a marked grave at the Phillips Cemetery near Wildie, Rockcastle Co. KY. The children of Jesse and


Rachel were: Joseph Williams (16 October 1775 Baltimore Co. MD-14 June 1855 Fleming Co. KY) married Elizabeth Settle (11 February 1778 PA - 9 May1853 KY) on 21 May 1795 Culpepper Co. VA. They are buried at Locust Grove Cemetery in Fleming Co. KY. They had thirteen children: Edward, Nancy, Frances, Elizabeth, Jesse, Lorenzo, Lewis, Louisa, Beverly, Alonzo, Mary, Lemuel and Belleville. Elizabeth Williams (16 March 1778 Baltimore Co. MD-1878 Knox Co. KY) married Levi Vale (1770-1860AL) in 1794 VA. They had three children: Rachel, Daniel and Elizabeth. The National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution actively supports historic preservation, promotion of education and patriotic endeavors. One way the Society promotes education is to sponsor every year in the school systems the American History Essay Contest open to all 5th-8th graders.



USDA Reminds Farmers to Certify Conservation Compliance by June 1 Deadline

Producers May Need to Take Action to Remain Eligible for Crop Insurance Premium Support

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) reminds farmers that the 2014 Farm Bill requires producers to file a Highly Erodible Land Conservation and Wetland Conservation Certification form (AD-1026) with their local USDA service centerby June 1, 2015, in order to become or remain eligible for crop insurance premium support.

Most farmers already have a certification form on file since it's required for participation in most USDA programs such as marketing assistance loans, farm storage facility loans and disaster assistance. However farmers, such as specialty crop growers who receive federal crop insurance premium support, but may not participate in other USDA programs, also must now file a certification form to maintain their crop insurance premium support.

"USDA employees are working very hard to get the word out about this new Farm Bill provision," said Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack. "While many producers will not need to take action, we want to help make sure that those who are required to act do so by the June 1 deadline. We want all eligible producers to be able to maintain their ability to protect their operations with affordable insurance."

Producers should visit their local USDA service center and talk with their crop insurance agent before the June 1, 2015, deadline to ask questions, get additional information or learn more about conservation compliance procedures. Producers that file their form by the deadline will be

birth defects, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) and neurological diseases like amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) and muscular dystrophy. This hospital is the only one of its kind in Kentucky and serves patients from across

Edelen stressed the importance of rural hospitals to the local economies for which they serve. "Rural hospitals provide care to 45 percent of our population. 

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
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
