At Monday's regular monthly meeting of the RCIDA, the board agreed to go ahead with evaluating the benefit of Rockcastle County join-

ing the Bluegrass South

Regional Economic Development Coalition. The coalition, which includes several surrounding counties, enhances the economic prospects of the member

counties by allowing

them to identify them-

selves as a region instead of a single county, and it also opens up more doors to large corporations who would not have even looked at a proposal from a single county.

The county's investment into the coalition is based upon its population, so there will be minimal investment for what should be greatly multiplied exposure to bring economic progress to the county, Hopkins told RCIDA members.

In other business, Hopkins said she had facilitated a request from Mt. Vernon to the Kentucky Heritage Council regarding the Renaissance status of Mt.

Vernon. Through the facilitation, Mt. Vernon is being offered the opportunity to submit a letter requesting reinstatement to the program. If accepted, the city would be eligible again for grant monies available through the program.

Livingston has also asked Hopkins to try to speed up the process of their receiving the \$400,000 in grant money they were awarded for sidewalk improvements from the Transportation Cabinet during the tenure of Governor Ernie Fletcher. The city has not received any of the money as of yet.

Citizen surveys for the proposed Recreation/ Health and Wellness Center are being finalized to be given to the public for input. This project, which is being facilitated through Brushy Fork Institute, is ongoing and citizens of Rockcastle County should be on the lookout in upcoming months for the survey.



Boyd's Porcelain Lined Lids

Last week I was strolling through my woods on Furnace Mountain and discovered a partially buried Mason Jar Lid in the dirt next to one of my trails. I carefully pulled the lid from the ground and noticed that it had a like-new white porcelain liner inside the zinc lid. I carried the lid back to my automobile and washed the liner with Windex to see what I had discovered. The lid itself had disintegrated almost completely, but the liner was almost pristine. Engraved on the liner was the following inscription: Boyd's Genuine Porcelain Lined Cap.

As soon as I cleaned the liner and read the inscribed message, I was immediately taken back to my childhood days living in the Pine Grove section of Rockcastle County. My mother (Bee) my grandmother (Mommie Katie) both used these liners in their canning process when I was a little boy. Our cellar was filled to the brim with a wide variety of fruits and vegetables that they both canned to be

from Lewis R. Boyd, who was born in Connecticut in 1832. He began making jar lids in 1862. The reason he came up with the idea to use porcelain liners was to separate the stored food from the zinc lids, which imparted a not-too-desirable taste to the food which came in contact with the lids. He was granted a patient for the liners in 1869. Some experts say that he used these liners from approximately 1869 until sometime in the 1930's.

Boyd designed his lids to be used on the popular Mason jars, which were used across the United States. Several markings appeared on the popular lid liners. The ones marked as Boyd's Porcelain Lined Caps are the most valuable to collectors. Prices for these liners can range from \$6 to \$15.99, depending on the condition and the individual collector. I were always glad when Dad and Mom needed to go to town or to a funeral wake because Aunt Lona would "baby sit" us which meant we got away with mischief that our parents would not tolerate. She even taught us how to roll and smoke rab-

bit tobacco, a wild herb also

know as life everlasting.

She wore a big apron with a pocket on the front where she carried a can of Prince Albert tobacco and a pack of OCB (Old Country Boy) rolling papers. Her every day aprons were dotted with dozens of tiny brown holes where slivers of burning tobacco had fallen while she sat and smoked.

It also meant making fudge, baking cookies, popping corn and, in warm weather, frying potatoes, bacon and cornmeal fritters in a big iron skillet on an open fire outside. Sometimes we might kill a frying chicken and fix it over the open fire and it would be flavored by the wood smoke from the fire she made of wood chips scattered about the chopping block.

Essentially all she did was give instructions and we boys did all the work such as peeling and slicing the potatoes, scalding and picking feathers off the chickens, gathering up the wood chips and keeping the fire going, stirring fudge until our arms

I can remember whining and complaining when Mom asked me to perform the same chores but with Aunt Lona, any chore turned out to be great fun even if it was moping the linoleum covered kitchen floor. She was a jolly woman and her constant happy demeanor was infectious. She laughed loudly and often and her eyes twinkled with delight when she was in the pres-

ence of children. It was practically impossible to be around Aunt Lona and not feel secure and at ease with the world. She was also one of those rare individuals whose cooking was so distinct that you could almost always tell that whatever you were eating had been prepared by Auni Lona, whether it was fried chicken, gingerbread or breakfast gravy.

No other woman in our huge extended family could fix what we called "fruit cake" that was in the same league as Aunt Lona's "Fruit Cake" was actually a dessert made from 5 or so thin layers of spicy short bread with sauce made from dried apples spread between each layer and then finally the whole thing was covered with the sauce.

Aunt Lona would let the cake sit atop her refrigerator for a day to allow the juices from the apple mixture to soak in and the result was something rarely found this side of Heaven. She never measured her ingredients. A pinch of nutmeg. dash of ginger and two or three dashes of cinnamon and allspice. A few scoops of flour, some baking powder, and just enough sugar The spices and flour were sifted several times in an old hand cranked sifter, a chore that I dearly loved to per-

Into the dry stuff went ar egg or two, molasses, sugar and melted lard. The end result was a dough not quite as thick as biscuits that she patted down to less than an inch in cast iron skillets and then baked in a coal and wood fired oven. There was no thermometer involved but Aunt Lona knew how to

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

One story (not confirmed) says that the outlaw Jesse James filled several Mason jars with silver dollar coins and buried them in several locations across the United States to be dug up as they were needed. If there was ever any truth to that rumor, none of these jars have ever been located.

The decline of home canning began after the end of WWII as a result of the rise of the supermarket, fastfood restaurants, and the development of frozen TV dinners.

Boyd died at the young age of 42 in 1874. His invention of the porcelain liners changed the entire process of canning. They probably are strewn all over the US, even in Rockcastle and Powell Counties. This particular one is now dear to me for bringing back some wonderful memories.

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

SAWDUST SALAD

My sister-in-law introduced this salad to the family back in 1977. It was an instant hit with Will's family as much as it was mine. The "sawdust," of course, is really shredded cheddar cheese sprinkled on top.My family eats this as a dessert instead of as a salad. Either with your meal, after your meal, or as a snack, it is worth the effort. It makes an excellent potluck dish. In the summertime, the whipped topping and cream cheese may tend to melt some if it's left out in the sun too long, but you usually don't have to worry about that. It is among the first dishes to disappear. In San Francisco, I took this to ADP when I worked there and it turned out to be a favorite of co-worker Steve Aguirre as well as some of the other co-workers.





Bible Talk

Our study this month will be on the dual nature of Jesus: Son of Man - Son of God.

Son of Man- The phrase "Son of man" is found 89 times in the new testament, all but one has reference to Jesus Christ. This expression emphasizes the humanity of Jesus. The Savior has a dual nature: the Son of man, his humanity; the Son of God, his Deity. "And the Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us, (and we beheld his glory, the glory as of the only begotten of the Father,) full of grace and truth." Jn.1:14. The phrase "was made" shows a point of beginning. Jesus was born physically of the virgin Mary in the town of Bethlehem over 2000 years ago. The inward person was eternal for he was God, Jn.1:1-3. Now notice Heb.2:16-18, "For surely it is not angels that he helps, but he helps the offspring of Abraham. Therefore he had to be made like his brothers in every respect, so that he might become a merciful and faithful high priest in the service of God, to make propitiation for the sins of the people. For because he himself has suffered when tempted, he is able to help those who are being tempted." Truly Jesus took on the nature of men to live in a body of flesh. Some denied this truth in the 1st century, "For many deceivers are entered into the world, who confess not that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh. This is a deceiver and an antichrist." 2 John 7. If we fail to grasp the human side of Jesus, we will have a warped view of the Messiah.

Son of God- Jesus is the Son of God, a phrase that emphasizes his Deity, his Godhood. This phrase is found 47 times in the N.T., 46 times it refers to Jesus. John affirms the Deity of Jesus in Jn.1:1-3; "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. The same was in the beginning with God. All things were made by him; and without him was not any thing made that was made." Consider Paul's statement in Col.2:9, "For in him dwelleth all the fulness of the Godhead bodily." Godhead or Godhood is the state of being God. (Like manhood is the state of being man.) Paul affirms the Divinity (and humanity) of Jesus in Phil.2:6-8, "Who, being in the form of God, thought it not robbery to be equal with God: But made himself of no reputation, and took upon him the form of a servant, and was made in the likeness of men: And being found in fashion as a man, he humbled himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross." This word "form" carries the idea of being identified with the nature, being, personality of God. He also came and took the form of a servant, and was made in the likeness of men. Because Jesus is God, he has the right, the power to speak and command. We need to listen to all that he says. We can fully trust and expect him to fulfill all his promises. If we fail to grasp the Divine side Jesus we will have a warped view of the Messiah. Have you fully trusted in Jesus the Son of God? Have you obeyed him?








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Former RCHS Track stars help EKU to **Indoor Conference** runner-up finish

Former RCHS track athletes Samantha Smith, Laura Dollins, and Morgan Thacker completed a very successful indoor season recently, helping the Eastern Kentucky University track and field team to an indoor track runner-up finish in the Ohio Valley Conference Championships. EKU finished 2nd behind the host team, Eastern Illinois.

Freshman Samantha Smith had a great indoor season for EKU, competing in both long and triple jump. At the Ohio Valley Conference Championships, Samantha came through with her best performances of the season. In triple jump, Samantha nearly earned all-conference honors. She placed 5th overall with an incredible indoor personal best effort of 36'10.25", missing 4thby only 1.25". Her jump also placed her 5thon the alltime EKU indoor triple jump list. 

Eaton speaks before Congress

Hannah Eaton, a sophomore at Rockcastle County High School, recently testified before the Prescription Drug Abuse (PDA) Caucus in Washington D.C. Members of Congress, their staff and media personnel were meeting to discuss "prescription drug abuse trends and possible approaches to reduce and prevent abuse." The PDA briefing was hosted by the White House, PDA Caucus, Youth Drug Prevention Caucus, and the office of national Drug Control Policy.

Members of the House of Representatives, along with Office of national Drug Control Policy director, Gill Kerlikowske included Congressman Hal Rogers (KY), Congresswoman Mary Bono Mack (CA), Congressman Steve Lynch (MA), Congressman Connie Mack (FL).

Hannah was invited to participate in the PDA

Kerlikowske following a performance of the Rockcastle County High School presentation of "UNITE Presents" at a dinner given by Operation UNITE.

Director Kerlikowske was visiting Kentucky to get a close-up view of the drug abuse problem in the Bluegrass State. "UNITE Presents" is a touring theatre troupe comprised of RCHS UNITE Club members advocating the anti-drug message through drama, mime, music, and personal testimonies.

Hannah briefed the members of Congress and guests on, not only the abusive use of prescription drugs in her community, but also in her family's life. Accompanying Hannah to Washington, D.C. were her parents, David and Beth Eaton, and "UNITE Presents" advisor, Nancy Hale.

In a press release fol-

briefing by Director lowing Hannah's testimony, Senator Mitch McConnell stated, "In my home state of Kentucky, the drug problems are severe. We lose 82 people a month to drug overdose – that's nearly 1,000 a year, more than those killed in traffic crashes. The problems begin early, as Kentucky ranks 8th in the nation for abuse of prescription pain drugs among teenagers. In Eastern Kentucky, the average age a child first gets high off prescription pills is eleven. As long as we have more young role models like Hannah, I feel confident that Kentucky's and America's future can be a drug-free future."

In that future, Hannah hopes to be able to pursue a career in education because "only through the instruction of our youth can this country continue to be a positive role model for emerging drug-free democracies.'



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

Court will help BRFD purchase new truck

At Tuesday's regular meeting of the Fiscal Court, Asst. Chief Brian Mullins, of the Brindle Ridge Volunteer Fire Department, told court of the department's need for a new tanker truck.

Mullins said the department had obtained a \$190,000 FEMA grant for the \$200,000 vehicle but needed the \$10,000 to complete the purchase. Mullins said the department needed the truck to enable them to fight fires where there was no water supply since the vehicle had a vacuum tanker with 48 feet of suction hose that could fill the 3,000 gallon tank in 2 1/2 minutes from a pond, creek,

pool, etc. and unload it onto the fire in 1 1/2 minutes. The truck the department is presently using, Mullins said, carried 2,750 gallons but had to be driven to a hydrant in Brodhead or Mt. Vernon to be refilled, or to a hydrant at the fire station, a process which takes about 15 min-

Mullins said the new truck was also needed for safety reasons since the present truck is not baffled and extremely hard to drive, especially loaded. And, there is the possibility of an improved ISO (insurance) rating for residents of the area covered by the BRVFD which would bring down the cost of insurance,



View Master -65 years of 3-D fun March has come and gone again and so has my birthday. I get to wait a full year for that experience to return. For some reason, I do not get as excited about that date as I did as a younger I was looking through an

old catalog this week and noticed an ad for a very unique device. It was called a "View Master – that shows full color pictures that come alive in three dimensions." The ad made me remember my eighth birthday when my Aunt Ruth and Uncle Charles Brown brought me one of these interesting toys for a special gift. In those days, the latest toys were only available in the larger cities, like Lexington, where they lived. Hilton's Five and Dime on Main Street in Mt. Vernon had not even heard of the toy at that time. Hilton's was owned by my Uncle and Aunt Gertrude and Oscar Helton. She was my father's sister.

I remember that the price for the viewer was \$2, and the reels were three for \$1.

Aunt Ruth had included several different reels in the box for my birthday. They were Bambi, Jack In The Beanstalk, and Pinocchio. The first time I loaded one of the reels into my new View Master, I was never so surprised in my young life. At that time, we did not even have a television in our home so the only time I had seen such extraordinary photos was on the big screen at the Vernon Theater in Mt. Vernon. The clarity was almost unnatural, and the fact that the images were in 3-D made an impression that I have never forgotten. I still recall taking the

box with the View Master inside to show all of my friends at school. None of them had ever seen one of these unique toys either, so they were equally impressed with the clarity and depth of the images inside the viewer. My teachers were also surprised at the toy, and I can remember them passing around the plaything to one

During this period of time, my mother (Bee) was working at the Greyhound Bus Station in Mt. Vernon, and I took the new toy to let her show several of her friends at work. I recall one of the bus drivers saying, "I have to get my son one of these, where did it come

I suppose the one person who was most impressed was my grandfather (Pop) because he was the one that always took me to the theater to see movies in Mt. Vernon. I can hear him saying, "Those pictures jump off the screen when you look through the viewer." He was referring to the 3-D images. Not even movies had that capability, and he could not believe how they seemed to come alive.

For the next few years, I began to collect the reels, which were actually 16-mm Kodachrome slides sandwiched between two pieces of cardboard. Each disk held

My best friend/pal/bosom buddy/brother, Ralph King, has never seen a new invention that he didn't want to take for a test drive nor heard of some new, innovative, no matter how off the wall idea that didn't make perfect sense to him. I mostly tag along for the

sheer entertainment value that is invariably a consequence of Ralph's newest discovery. Over the winter he has lead me to numerous web sites that detail the latest thing in asparagus pickers, vegetable cultivators, roto-tillers, sprayers, mowers, balers, pumps and any number of other devices that will run off a tractor's power take off (PTO). If it is mechanically complex and can be hooked to the back of a tractor Ralph Ralph's old yellow Ford

tractor/end loader, better known as Old Yeller, and which Ralph has owned since Heck was a pup, is finally costing more in upkeep than payments would be on a new tractor. Which, of course, justifies the spending of many hours searching for a machine that will do everything but his laundry and do them in ways that have not been tried within 500 miles of Berea.

He is equally fascinated by simple hand tools, especially things that can be used to dig or cut. If it's a new and different hoe, spade, garden trowel or pocket knife, Ralph will be the first kid on the block to own one. And if he doesn't own it, he is in the process of building it from scratch.

Budget cuts mean little in overall deficit

Dear Editor,

The federal government recently avoided temporarily shutting down non-essential operations with a last minute budget deal trimming roughly \$40 billion

How much is this and how will it impact the overall government deficit and

\$40 billion dollars, spread out among roughly 300 million people, or 75 million average families of 4, is roughly \$530 per fam-

However the overall yearly budget deficit for president Obama's proposed budget was roughly \$1650 billion dollars, or \$22,000 per family.

Hence the \$40 billion in cuts, which democrats repeatedly called extreme, represent only 1/40 of the total deficit or 2.5%.

This is very similar to your family being short \$22,000 per year and cutting \$530 in expenses.

In terms of the overall US government debt – the yearly deficits combined the current total of roughly \$14,000 billion dollars, or \$190,000 per family, is set to increase to a little more than \$210,000.

Could your family afford to pay off this amount in your lifetime?

A small lever was located on the right side of the unit giving the viewer the ability to change slides and move onto the next view.

I have no idea how many reels that I eventually collected, but I do remember the following: Rudolph -The Red Nosed Reindeer, Mt. Rushmore, Rin Tin Tin, The Lone Ranger, Gene Autry, Roy Hopalong Cassidy, and Tarzan – The Ape Man.

I was surprised to learn recently that the View Master was originally marketed as a way for viewers to enjoy stereograms of colorful and picturesque tourist attractions. It was introduced at the 1939 New York World's Fair as an alternative to scenic postcards. It was originally sold at photography shops, stationery stores, and scenic-attraction gift shops. William Gruber had no idea that it would eventually become one of the most popular toys ever invented. It was only after Walt Disney Studios capitalized on the idea for children that the idea really caught on

and led to its popularity. In 1981, GAF toy company sold the View Master to Ekco for an estimated \$24 million. Totally, there have been about 25 different models of the original toy. Despite its long history, the same basic design remains, and every disk ever sold will still work in every model ever produced. View Master is part of the National Toy Hall of Fame of the United

Aunt Ruth and Uncle Charles had no idea how popular this inexpensive toy would become. I will never forget how pleased I was when they presented the wonderful gift to me on my eighth birthday. the same day.

We always enjoyed train rides. In the summer, you rode with the windows open and you would have cinders all over you. They had "Butch Boys" on the train that would come around with a basket of candy, gum, and fresh fruit that he sold to the passengers.

One time, my grandmother McKinney took us to Knoxville, TN, to visit some of the Hendrickson relatives. We had never met the people, and I never saw them again.

The L&N trains stopped at all town on their route. My friend, Audrey Fletcher, and I used to ride to Mt. Vernon and spend the afternoon. You could ride for 10 cents, and the train stopped at Maretburg.

Mail came in on the train. You could go to the Post Office in the morning, and then go back in the afternoon to see if you have mail that came in on the noon train. Trains took on water at Brodhead, and the L&N built a dam on Dix Rover; but when diesels came along, there was no need for water, and they tore the dam down. We used to have baptizings there.

People used to ship cream by rail to Cincinnati, Ohio; also butter, chickens, eggs, and strawberries.

When people died away from here, their remains were shipped here.

The Brodhead Fair was a big attraction here. L&N would put on extra cars to bring people. People would stay in local hotels that week. Elizabeth Mullins said that a "hack" wagon with seats would take people to the Fair from the

We had three nice railroad restaurants at this time: Murphy's, Frith's, and Clark's. There were no dining cars then, and the res-

taurants would prepare box lunches for passengers. L&N would telegraph the depot and tell them how many to prepare. We would get 25 cents for putting lunches on the train.

When World War II came along, it was more difficult to ride the train. Servicemen got seats first, which they should have. Troop trains came through, and we would go over to see our servicemen, going off to



Bear season and deer zone changes proposed

The Kentucky Fish and Wildlife Commission at its quarterly meeting March 4 proposed bear season occur one week earlier than in past years and recommended deer zone changes for two

The Commission recommends all hunting, fishing and boating regulations for approval by the General Assembly and approves all expenditures by the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. All recommendations must be approved by legislators before they become law.

In wildlife-related business, the Commission proposed to the General Assembly that bear season be one week sooner on Dec. 10 and 11, 2011. Winter weather plagued the first two seasons. Moving the season forward one week could improve hunter opportunity. The Commission also recommended making it illegal to take bears from

For the 2011 deer season, the Commission recommended changing Rowan County from Zone 2 to Zone 3 and Lee County from Zone 3 to Zone 4.

In fisheries-related business, the Commission recommended adopting Tennessee's trout regulations on Dale Hollow Lake. Anglers may keep seven rainbow or brown trout per day, singly or combined.

The Commission also removed the special fishing regulations on Taylorsville Lake Wildlife Management Area (WMA) ponds, effective March 1, 2012.



Ney also noted that in 2010, 52 patients from Rockcastle were admitted into their program and 19 have already been admitted in 2011 -- some of those into the compassionate care center.

The center is a 12 room/ 13 bed facility where the average stay for patients is seven days, although some stays are as long as three weeks. However, Ney said patients of the center go home again 50% of the time and, on average, care from the center provides an additional 18 days of life.

The court approved the one-time \$10,000 donation but voted to split it into two donations, six months apart, from the Local Government Economic Assistance Fund.

The board also approved an amended calendar for this school year. Students missed 16 days for snow, so the final school day will be Thursday, May 26th. Classes will not be held May 17th because of the primary election.

In other business, the board approved the 2010-11 RCHS Annual Verification of Title IX Procedures, which assures equality in sports for females. The reapportionment will relate directly to the population in the districts which must not have a variance of over 10%.

According to 67.045(2), The court may adopt the report of the reapportionment commissioners in total, or it may amend the report and redraw the districts, including altering the number of districts, as the court sees fit. tucky. All proposals developed by the Recreation Task Force must be approved by the Fiscal Court.

The Task Force is comprised of several volunteers that represent all aspects of the community. Two primary objectives were identified at the first few meetings. The first objective was to identify suitable properties for a comprehensive complex. Many factors needed to be taken into consideration when choosing the site. The committee has spent the last year narrowing the sites down to approximately five locations.

The second objective was to identify the needs of the citizens of Rockcastle County. The complex needs to address the needs of everyone from the smallest childto the seniors of the county. These needs could include sports facilities, walking trails, swimming pool, indoor and outdoor wellness facilities, outdoor stage for summer programs, outdoor shelters for family gatherings and much more.

Once the needs are identified then they must be prioritized based on several factors including cost to implement and how many citizens will utilize the facilities.

The Task Force received a grant to perform a feasibility study for the Complex. MSE engineering was selected to assist in this task. MSE has been given the five sites and charged with ranking the suitability of those sites to assist the Task Force in selecting the final location of the Complex.

MSE was also asked to create a citizens survey to help the Task Force identify the needs of the county. According to Co-chair Sam Hamilton, "We have a great opportunity here to provide facilities that can help each and every citizen improve their quality of life in this community.

Later this week a citizen's survey will be handed out to students at all of the schools in Rockcastle Countyand at many other locations throughout the county. Every citizen is encouraged to take the time to complete the surveys and return them.

The goal of the Task Force is to build the facilities that will be most utilized by the citizens of Rockcastle County. Once these surveys are collected the Task Force will use them to develop the long range strategy for the Recreation and Wellness Complex.

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

General CRP Sign-up 41

The Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) general signup begins on March 14, 2011, and continue through April 15, 2011. During the signup period, farmers and ranchers may offer eligible land for CRP's competitive general signup at their county Farm Service Agency (FSA) office.

Land currently not enrolled in CRP may be offered in this signup provided all eligibility requirements are met. Additionally, current CRP participants with contracts expiring this fall may make new contract offers. Contracts awarded under this signup are scheduled to become effective Oct. 1, 2011.

FSA, which administers the CRP program, will evaluate and rank eligible CRP offers using an Environmental Benefits Index (EBI) that shows the environmental benefits to be gained from enrolling the land in CRP. The EBI consists of five environmental factors (wildlife, water, soil, air and enduring benefits) and cost. Decisions on the EBI cutoff will be made after the sign-up ends and after analyzing the EBI data of all the offers.

In addition to the general sign-up, CRP's continuous sign-up program will be ongoing. Continuous acres represent the most environmentally desirable and sensitive land.

2011 DCP Signup

Enrollment for the 2011 Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP) will continue through

June 1, 2011. USDA urges producers to make use of the eDC automated website to sign up, or producers can visit any USDA Service Center to complete their 2011 DCP contract.

USDA computes DCP Program payments using base acres and payment yields established for each farm. Eligible producers receive direct payments at rates established by statute regardless of market prices. For 2011, eligible producers may request partial direct payments as an advance on the total amount.

Livestock Programs Available

FSA administers several programs that may be available to assist livestock producers who suffer natural disaster losses, resulting from drought, flood, fire, freeze, tornadoes, and other calamities.

Among the key programs is the Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP). For livestock death losses to be eligible under LIP, producers must file a notice of loss with their local FSA office within 30 calendar days from when the loss is apparent to the producer.

Producers also need to document the number and kind of livestock that have died as a direct result of any natural disaster.





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Free GED testing runs through June 30

Are you one of the 5,118 individuals in Rockcastle County that don't have a GED or High School Diploma? Then this message is for YOU. The GED test will be free in Kentucky March 15-June 30. Kentuckians taking the test during that timeframe will not have to pay the usual \$55 fee, which will be paid by Kentucky Adult Education, a unit of the Council on Postsecondary Education. "Most of us have been af-

fected in some way by the tough economic times over the past couple of years, and the impact is even greater if you are looking for work and do not have your high school diploma," said Reecie D. Stagnolia, vice president, Kentucky Adult Education. "We see this as a way to help the individual student and to help increase GED attainment in Kentucky at the same time.

"As the economy recovers, this is an excellent time for people who do not have a high school credential to earn their GED and transition to postsecondary education so that they're prepared for the workforce. The GED tests provide

adults who did not finish high school with the opportunity to certify their attainment of high school-level academic knowledge and skills.

The GED consists of five parts: reading, writing, mathematics, science and social studies.

Completing the entire test battery takes just over seven hours.

Free GED classes are available through the Rockcastle Adult Education Center, located at 955 West Main Street, next to Rockcastle County Middle School. To be eligible to take the GED, students must first successfully complete the GED Official Practice Test to make sure they are prepared for the actual test. In 10 years, nearly 105,848 Kentuckians have earned a GED, ranking Kentucky 13th highest in the national in the percentage of nonhigh school completers earning a GED.

The GED tests are currently offered only in a paper-pencil format at official GED Testing Centers – the tests cannot be taken online. State GED administrators often receive reports from adults who have spent time and precious resources pursuing what they believe are accredited high school equivalency credentials online. Consumers find, after spending \$200-\$1,200, that these dubious credentials are not accepted by employers, colleges or univer-



County is growing according to census

According to census figures from the 2010 count, Rockcastle County has grown slightly since 2000, about

The total population reported for Rockcastle Countty is 17,056. This population number is lower than all of the surrounding counties except Jackson and Garrard.

The majority of residents who responded identified themselves as white, with 19 identifying themselves as black or African American; 45 American Indians and Alaska Natives; 14 Asian; 1 Native Hawaiian and other Pacific Islander; 39 some other race; 155 two or more races and 103 Hispanic or Latino.

There are a reported 703 housing units in Rockcastle, with 6,750 of those occupied and 953 vacant.

In comparison, the populations of surrounding counties are Pulaski with 63,063, Madison with 82,916, Lincoln with 24,742 and Laurel with 58,253. All of these counties saw an increase in their population from 2000, with Pulaski and Madison seeing a double-digit growth.

The cities of Mt. Vernon, Livingston and Brodhead were also reported with Mt. Vernon having the largest population of 2,477, Brodhead the second largest with 1,211 and Livingston with the lowest at 226.



UnforgettableAmbulance Ride

A couple of weeks ago my wife was suffering from the terrible flu that has been circulating through the area, and on a Saturday night she began to have breathing difficulties. At first I thought I could take her myself to the emergency room, but her breathing was quickly becoming more labored. When she suggested that maybe we should call 911, I immediately complied with her

In just a few minutes, the ambulance arrived and the two Emergency Medical Technicians administered medication that began to relieve her difficulty breathing. They suggested that we go ahead and take her to the emergency room, and I agreed to follow the ambulance in my Tahoe. As we drove up the Bert T. Combs Mountain Parkway, I was reminded of the days in Rockcastle County when the ambulances were provided by the local funeral homes.

Bud Cox and I have been friends for such a long time that I cannot really recall when our friendship actually began. However, I do remember that when we were both driving we spent many nights cruising around the streets of Mt. Vernon listening to our beloved rock and roll music on the AM radio.

Since Bud's father, Bill Cox, owned a funeral home. Bud was assigned the task of driving one of the ambulances when he was not in school. In those days, Cox Funeral Home had three ambulances: a 1958 Chevrolet, a Oldsmobile, and a 1954 Cadillac. Bud recently told me that most of the ambulance runs involved automobile wrecks, fires, and individuals who were suffering from some illness that was serious enough to be taken to Mt. Vernon Hospital or to Berea Hospital.

Bud is one year older than I, so we probably were juniors and seniors in high school when he was driving an ambulance. When our "gang" was gathering at one of the local hangouts in Mt. Vernon, such as the Dinner Bell Restaurant or Kelsey's Restaurant on Main Street, Bud had to call home and tell Mr. Bill where he was going to be in case there was an emergency ambulance run that he had to take. If we decided to move the party to one of our homes, Bud had to call again and inform his dad where he would be. I can remember many occasions when Bud would receive "the call" and off he would go with lights flashing and sirens sounding. His professionalism at such a young age always impressed me and most of our friends.

I don't think I will ever forget that Bud was the first EMT in Rockcastle County. He was assigned the duty of driving that black 1958 Chevy whenever he was on duty at night. One of the reasons that it stands out in my mind was because my first automobile was also a black '58 Chevy, and from the drivers seat they looked identical. The major difference from that viewpoint

The sand hill crane is a beautiful though awkward, slow flying, timid, contraption of wings and legs with a six foot wingspan, up to two or three foot legs and on a good day, when it sticks it neck straight up, nearly five feet tall. It has gray feathers and a red top knot and when it is wading about in the marshlands and it's plumage is a wonder to behold. But even with all that wing span and height and feathers, it seldom weighs more than 8 pounds or so and most of that is feet and feathers. Up to 60,000 sand hill

cranes migrate through Kentucky, especially in the western part of our state and of late, some certifiable idiots at the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife (KDFW) have determined that sand hill cranes should be a game species. In other words, if you own a shotgun and have some political pull, you should be allowed to shoot sand hill cranes because that's what shot guns are made for and some gun owners will shoot anything just to prove the gun works. On the other hand, nobody that I know of has ever proclaimed the KDWF to be a bastion of sanity or even common sense.

Absolutely, there are gun owners who will pay high dollar for a hunting license to shoot something as tame as a kitten---and actually shoot a kitten if the season is open. So why not open

season on kittens or at least on robins and cardinals and wrens and eastern blue birds? There's probably way too many songbirds and they are getting too tame and if you subscribe to the philosophy of the KDFW the best way make them wilder is pull out a shotgun and kill off bunch. That'll teach em

Don't get me wrong here. I have no problem with hunting rabbits, squirrels, deer, quail and the like if you are going to eat it and if hunting said game is at least as important in the eating end of that equation as killing it. There's hardly anything I like better on the table than fried rabbit, hasenpfeffer, squirrel gravy and baked sweet potatoes. venison chops, stuffed quail and so forth.

The KDWF claims, in a news release dated April 15. that sand hill cranes are excellent table fare but I can't find a recipe on the internet KDWF also claims that hunting them is challenging Apparently pointing a gun and pulling the trigger at some, peaceful, unsuspecting bird is a challenge in Frankfort. The truth of the matter is that KWDF is way over staffed and at least some trigger-happy people have wayyyyyyyyyyyyyyy too much time on their

Advertising began to appear in the Mount Vernon Signal for the store operating from the Fish Building around 1910. It was a mercantile store and the owner, Jones Fish, was said to be quite the businessman. He had emblems of fish printed on the bags or boxes which were used by the customer



to carry the merchandise home. There were three fish designs carved into the sidewalk on the Church Street entrance. This was to represent Jones and his two sons. These carvings still remain today, but are very faded by

There were two entrances to the store: the one noted on Church Street, and what we consider the "main entrance" on Main Street today. The design of the Main Street entrance was popular from 1895 until 1925. That same design can be noted on buildings of the era all over the county.

As the years passed, the store was home to various businesses. The second story, as noted earlier, was used for Masonic and East-

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ern Star meetings, and for the Confederate War veterans to meet, as well.

As another occupant prepares to make the Jones Fish building home, another chapter of history is about to be written for the Fish Building and for downtown Mount Vernon. Also, there is soon to be the Church Street Studio and Gallery, to open in the back portion of the building. The entrance will be facing the courthouse. It may be the first art studio and gallery in the county.

was the size of the engines in those two vehicles. My car was a six-cylinder and the ambulance was a high performance V-8 with loads of power and speed. Bud was driving my car one night and he forgot that he was in a six-cylinder and shifted into second gear at approximately 55 mph and almost caused my transmission to lock up. I am quite certain that there must have been a look of sheer horror on my face!

One weekend there was a serious wreck on US 25 just south of Mt. Vernon, and Bud responded to the call. The gentleman in one of the automobiles was taken to the hospital in Mt. Vernon with a severe back injury. After several days of recuperation, he called Cox Funeral Home and spoke with Mr. Bill. The man wanted to hire an ambulance to take him back to his home in Richmond, Virginia.

Mr. Bill gave the assignment to Bud, and I was

asked to accompany him in order to assist with the lifting of the stretcher. I remember my mother (Bee) giving me \$25 in case we had an emergency on this very important trip for two relatively young men. Twenty five dollars was a fortune in the early '60s.

Bud and I loaded the gentleman into the ambulance and away we drove. In those days, interstate highways were limited, and we mostly drove on highways much like US 25 or US 150. I recall us staying generally on US 60 from Lexington through the Blue Ridge Mountains at White's Gap in Virginia. I suppose that road stands out in my mind is because it crossed very rugged terrain which was much more challenging and vastly more weather sensitive than it was in Kentucky.

Bud had to put all of his focus on his driving because of the back injury of the man we were transporting. On several occasions we had to stop for food and to allow him to be carried into a rest room for relief. The oneway trip was approximately 500 miles and took over ten hours to complete. Bud drove considerably faster coming home, and I have to admit it was more fun on the way back to Mt. Vernon.

I cherish my memories of driving with Bud as a teenager whether we were transporting an injured person or just "cruising" the streets of Mt. Vernon. Some of my fondest memories involve being in a car with my long time friend, Bud Cox. Thanks for the memories!

P.S. If you are wondering what happened with my wife, she was treated for what they referred to as bronchial spasms, and I took her home after a few hours in the ER.

Cancer survivors exhibit promotes colon screening

Rockcastle Regional Hospital & Respiratory Care Center will host a poster exhibit featuring Kentucky colon cancer survivors beginning April 22 until May 2 in the hospital lobby and the Outpatient Services Center lobby.

Each poster has a photograph of one of nine featured survivors, along with a brief personal statement. Titled "Faces of Colon Cancer," the exhibit was developed by the Kentucky Cancer Program (KCP) to spread the message that colon cancer screening saves lives. Suzanne Gibbs of Knox County is the regional representative of the Cumberland Valley area.

"It is important to raise colon cancer awareness during each month of the year, not only during March," said Arielle Reese, Rockcastle Regional Community Relations Director. "We extend an invitation to everyone in the community to visit the hospital, see the exhibit and get some education too."

Colorectal cancer is the

second leading cause of cancer death among Kentuckians, but with a screening colonoscopy, the disease can be detected early or even prevented entirely by removing pre-cancerous polyps at the time of screening. Even when there is a positive finding of cancer, colorectal cancer can be cured about 90 percent of the time, when the disease is found in its earliest stages.

"The colon cancer screening rate in Kentucky rose from 34 to 63 percent of the age-eligible population from 1997 to 2008," stated Debra Armstrong, Program Director for KCP East. "We have seen a corresponding decrease in incidence and mortality from this disease, but if progress is to continue, we must continue to get the word that everyone age 50 and older should get regular colon cancer checks.'

About 2,400 Kentuckians are diagnosed with colon cancer each year and around 800 die of the disease annually. In 2006, Kentucky ranked fourth among

the states for colon cancer incidence and sixth for deaths from the disease, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Pre-

vention.

"Faces of colon Cancer"
will be displayed in various
communities throughout
Central and Eastern Kentucky during 2011. KCP is
a state-funded cancer control program jointly administered by the University of
Kentucky and the University of Louisville. It includes 14 regional offices
across the state. KCP at UK
serves Central and Eastern

Kentucky.








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Lawrence named to second team

Frankfort Report...

As with much of life, the 2011 General Assembly Session had its share of successes and disappointments. We made advances in eco-

nomic development, education, and healthcare and definitely raised the debate on what is

the appropriate conservative use of the tax dollar and did our best to sound the alarm about what happens when the bill finally comes due.

The 2011 General Session started off with the Senate passing a comprehensive transparent and responsive government known as the Agenda for Prosperity. While most of these bills were blocked in the House of Representatives, the Senate found consensus with Senate Bill 7 that requires all three branches of government and state universities to create website where all financial transactions can be viewed by the public. Senate Bill 8 creates a comprehensive website for businesses to incorporate, renew permits, pay taxes, and file reports. And finally, Senate Bill 12 would have allowed superintendents to select principals in consultation with the School Based Decision Making Council. Unfortunately, a bill to stabilize the public employee pension system while protecting the tax payer from everspiraling pension costs, a bill to authorize charter schools, a bill to help local governments fight illegal immigration, a pro-life bill



it easier to root out Medicaid fraud did not find favor in the other chamber.

Below is a brief outline of some of the other major issues addressed during the Regular 2011 General Assembly Session.

One of the highlights of the 2011 General Assembly Session was the passage of House Bill 463 that was a strong bipartisan effort to reform the corrections system by protecting public safety while lowering correctional costs and the state crime rate by reducing the recidivism rate. Through programs that are smart on crime, not just tough on crime, state taxpayers are expected to save as much as \$147 million over the next 10 years.

The Senate has always believed in addressing issues comprehensively. Diabetes is one of the top diseases Kentuckians battle. With Senate Bill 63, the appropriate state government agencies will work together to identify goals and benchmarks to reduce the incidence of diabetes in Kentucky. It will also develop a blueprint for budget purposes. This will make the first time a collaborative and comprehensive plan will be developed.

Also in the heath care field, Senate Bill 114 will allow private insurance plans to offer incentives or rewards to members who participate in wellness programs. The state health insurance plan, for example, offers people pedometers to encourage walking or running as a form of exercise. Studies have shown wellness programs such as this to be effective against obesity by encouraging people to make healthy choices. All three of these bills were signed by the Governor.

We also worked through a Special Session to address the Medicaid budget shortfall. Despite pleas from the Senate not to call us back without a prior agreement, the Governor insisted on immediately bringing us back to Frankfort. The Governor wanted to move money from next year to this year - akin to using a Visa to pay the Master Card. Through reasonable across-




the-board reductions in government spending and strong reporting and accountability measures, the Senate proposed fully funding Medicaid services while protecting you, the taxpayer. As you know, with his veto pen, the Governor ended giving himself all the money without the accountability and the Majority in the House of Representatives refused to return to the Capitol to override these vetoes.

Compounding this unfortunate turn of events, Moody's bond rating company joined FitchRatings in downgrading Kentucky bonds. This makes it potentially more expensive for the state to sell bonds. The reasons they gave are the same themes Senate Republicans have sounded for a long time: a large unfunded state employee pension liability, high debt levels and debt restructuring, and a reliance on one-time funds or non-recurring budget balancing measures. The Senate has passed legislation to address these problems only

to see the bills die in the House of Representatives or at the hand of the Governor. We will continue fighting for the conservative and responsible use of your tax dollars.

Elder recounts WWII experiences

David Madison Elder. a native of Rockcastle County, enlisted in the United States Army, at the age of 19, on February 2, 1943 at Cincinnati, Ohio.

He was stationed at Fort Knox for basic training and, from there, was sent to Camp McCain in Mississippi. He then performed maneuvers around Nashville, Tenn. where he says that it was so cold that when he set his boots outside of a foxhole during the night they froze to the ground.

From Tennessee, he and other trainees were sent to Fort Jackson, SC to complete their training. David was trained as a light mortar crewman and as a rifle marksman. He was then sent to Fort Meade, Maryland to await deployment to Europe. He shipped out April 24, 1944, arriving in Oran, Africa on May

Pfc David Elder was part of Company K, 47th Infantry, 45th Division,

Thunderbirds. After landing in Oran, Africa, David and his company began the long walk to Algiers in North Africa where they boarded LCT boats and sailed to Naples, Italy then on to the Anzio beachhead. Anzio was approximately 25 miles from Rome and it was in Anzio that David and his company started walking and fighting all the way into Rome, all in one day. Along the way, David was on Mussolini's farm and talked to his daughter who told him that Mussolini had undergone plastic surgery on his face by grafting skin taken from his leg. While in Rome, David saw St. Petersburg

From Rome, David and his company walked back to Naples, Italy, loaded into a truck and traveled some distance to the sea where they boarded a ship and sailed for 10 days while doing amphibious training. They sailed past the islands of Sardinia and Corse to Marseille, France. But now it was August 15, 1944 and the soldiers were on French soil and walking again.

David kept a cup on which he carved the names



of the towns he went through during the war. Bourges was the first large city and then Lyon. Next was the fortress city of Epinal which was divided by the Moselle River and was the hub of communications, road and military defenses. The river was 80 feet wide and the bridges had been destroyed by the Germans and there were mines everywhere. It was no easy task but Epinal was taken, Wangen Medershine. As they were crossing the Rhine River, their pontoon boat sank. The Rhine was about a mile wide but not very deep. David and

about 10 others stayed in the water under the river bridge while German snipers on the side fired on them. It took four hours, at dark, before they were rescued. Two white men in a small boat attempted to rescue them but were driven by German rifle fire. Two black men then came out in a small boat. They were shot at and their boat was hit but they persevered and picked up David and the other and took them to a small town where they waited until the rest of their company joined them. David also went through Selena, France and Bagnoli, Italy near Naples.

Bryant featured in **Cumberlands magazine**

Mt. Vernon Mayor Mike Bryant was recently featured in the 2011 Winter Edition of the University of the Cumberlands alumni magazine, Cumberland Today.

The university chose to do the feature spotlight in response to Bryant being elected mayor. He is quoted in the article, in reference to being elected to the position as saying, "I can see God's hand at work. This is clearly not an accident or a coincidence, but true providence. I do not know and may never know all the 'whys'." He also stated in the article that "This is a 'we' not a 'me' thing. Thinking futuristically, my hope is that by building on things my predecessors began, we can make this a better place, a better town and leave some things in pace for my successors to build upon."

Mayor Bryant graduated from Cumberland in 1969. He also holds Master and Doctoral degrees from International Seminary. He has served on the university's Church Relations Board for more than forty years. He and President James Taylor were students

Cumberland during the sixties. Mike's and Carol's daughter, Melissa, is a graduate of Cumberland; their daughter Marla attended there; son, Matt, is a graduate and son, Michael, attended but graduated from Union. In addition, daughterin-law, Rhonda, graduated from Cumberland; daughterin-law, Holy, attended there and son-in-law, Jon, attended there and later graduated from Ohio State University.

After a ten month campaign, a two month transition and, now, more than 3 and a half months in office, Dr. Bryant is very busy at city hall. He says that he has discovered that "the city is a big business in a small town" and that "while it is a very demanding and challenging job," he continues to be "excited about all of the wonderful things 'we' can do together." He is currently a member of the Rockcastle County Chamber of Commerce, Rockcastle County development Board, Rockcastle County Healthy Board. Community Rockcastle County Housing Authority, Rockcastle County Hazard Mitigation Task Force, Rockcastle County UNITE Coalition and the Rockcastle Kiwanis Club. He is also a member of the Cumberland Valley ADD Board and serves on several committees for that organiza-

The Mayor also hosts the city's monthly Chatter That Matters program on WRVK. It airs the first Wednesday evening of every month at 6 a.m. and replays the following Thursday morning at 10 a.m. Various officials and leaders appear as guests on the program. The Mayor and his wife, Carol, stay busy with work, church activities, hobbies and keeping up with twelve grandchildren. Both want to thank the Mt. Vernon City Council, all of the city's employees and the people of Mt. Vernon and Rockcastle County for the support and cooperation they have been shown. "We have a great community. Now, let's continue to work together to make it an even greater one," Bryant said.

One memory David has is that on the outskirts of Italy, people lived in houses with their cow in a room in the house. Every morning they would clean the manure out and save it outside to put on their gardens. At some point, David re-

members passing though a wooded forest and being there for some time. Research indicates it could have been the Vosges Mountains, a natural obstacle to reaching Germany, or it could have been the Black Forest which was across the Rhine River and also provided security for the Germans. There was a lengthy battle there and American troops were pinned down behind enemy lines. It was there the company took out 12 pillboxes (underground tunnels with small concrete tops with holes for machine guns to fire from) by dropping white phosphorus grenades on the machine guns.

The weather was bad. It was extremely cold and wet and the soldiers were always cold. It was a long, cold, tiring battle but David and his company pushed through Frankfurt, Germany, then Luxembourg, Nuremberg onto Strasbourg, Germany. There was a Jewish prison camp in Germany where David saw people rail thin from starvation, barely alive and also saw a train loaded with dead Jews stacked like cord wood. One of David's memories is of the night they stayed in a house with a long hallway between the rooms and there were Germans on one side an American soldiers on the other with a tank in the hallway. The next morning, the Germany left and there had been no fighting or contact between them during the night.

At this time, it had only been a little over a year since David had joined the Army and he had been very lucky so far. In Strasbourg, Germany, David was fighting and shrapnel hit a tree. The tree burst and came down, hitting David in the left arm. He was hospitalized for 30 days before rejoining his company in battle. The foxhole David had been in was hit by a grenade and the sol-

dier inside was killed. If David had not already been injured, he would probably have been in the foxhole and may have died

The next town David fought in was Ulm, Germany which had a large factory that made bombs and tanks. It was completely demolished by American bombs. It was around this time that David developed pneumonia and was again hospitalized for 30 days before returning again to the front lines and fighting into Munich, Germany's third largest city. David was there for several weeks, during which he and some other took some R&R and went to Paris, France, unloading from their truck in front of the Eiffel Tower. They spent five days before going back to Munich where he stayed

for several months. After the war, David recalls spending some time close to a small town near Munich. It was there they found five barrels of wine in the basement of a building. Each night, David would take a wheelbarrow into the town and filled it full, take it back to camp and they would drink it that night. They drank the five barrels in one week.

David left for the United States aboard the Queen Elizabeth on October 16, 1945, arriving at Fort Meade, Maryland on October 23, 1945. For his bravery and service to the United States, David was awarded the Purple Heart, an EAMF Theater Ribbon with Bronze Star and four Battle Stars. He received an Honorable Discharge on October 28, 1945.



NUTMEG SAUCE When I told Wayne about my cookbook, his first response was about this recipe. He couldn't wait to try it again. Many a Rook game was interrupted so we could eat a piece of cake with this sauce covering it. As far back as I can remember, Mamaw and my aunts would make this sauce, but the recipe was not written down. The first reading of the budget for the 2011-12 fiscal year will be read at the May meeting with the second one in June in anticipation of its adoption for the fiscal year beginning July 1.

Chief Terry Jackson reported that the city is in the process of hiring new officers in anticipation of one of their officers leaving for the state police and a new School Resource Officer that the city and Board of Education are in negotiations about.

According to Jackson, the full time resource officer would probably be located at the Alternative School or middle school due to their central location, but the officer would be available to RCHS and MVES also.

In his report for March, Chief Jackson reported that the police department is sued 101 citations; 64 arrests made; 35 wanted persons were found; 7 arrests were drug related and 7 DUI's offenders were apprehended.

Eight speeding citations were issued; five seat belt violations were cited with 24 other traffic citations written. There were ten vehicle accidents, two with injuries. Ten investigations were opened with eight of them being closed.

Fire Chief David Bales reported that fire and rescue made 43 runs in March, using 16,200 gallons of water. They responded to: 8 accidents with injuries and possible entrapments; 7 investigations of control burns; 6 control burns that had gotten out of control; 5 structure fires; 5 grass and brush fires; 3 vehicle fires; 2 commercial fire alarm activations; 1 residential fire alarm activation; 1 smoke investigation; 1 overheated electrical wall plug investigation and 1 dumpster fire.

April is **Child Abuse Awareness** Month

Too often, the simple joys of a child's life in central Kentucky, that many of us take for granted in our own families, are far beyond the reach of even our closest neighbors.

Occurrences of child abuse and neglect in Kentucky are all too common. Let us not forget, Wesley Mullins, the 6-year old who died allegedly at the hands of his abuser. In August 2007, while visiting his grandfather, Wesley was allegedly sexual abused and murdered at the hands of 51-year old Lewis "Buck" Ballard in an effort to keep the boy from disclosing the abuse. Cases such as this remind us all that this nation and our state need to focus more on protecting its children.

Tragically, thousands of children die each year in the U.S. at the hands of family members or others living with them. A new report just out from the Every Child Matters Education Fund shows that more than 10,000 children in the U.S. died from abuse and neglect from 2001 to 2007. In contrast, the number of American soldiers killed in the Iraq and Afghanistan wars is approaching 5,000.

Where is the outrage about the senseless deaths of our youngest citizens? What are we doing to stop

While it's too late to help the children already killed, we can honor their memories by vowing to protect every child in danger. We can overcome inadequate funding and wide variations in capacity among states, by enacting federal policy committed to protecting children no matter where they live

Child abuse and neglect are national concerns that deserve national solutions. Through the introduction of the We Can Do Better campaign, groups are coming together to raise awareness and press our nation's lawmakers to develop and fund solutions that will save children's lives. Among them are providing more support for the stressed families in which abuse and neglect are more likely to occur, modifying current confidentiality laws to allow greater public understanding every time a child dies, standardizing the way states define abuse and neglect, and providing the funding needed to adequately support child protection services.

Kentucky Child Abuse and Neglect Statistics

88,292* children were reported as abused or neglected in 2008, in the state of Kentucky.

14,802* of these children were confirmed as victims of abuse or neglect.

30* Children died as the result of child abuse and neglect during the 2008 calendar year.

Currently, Rockcastle County has thirty three children in out of home care due to abuse, neglect and/or dependency. To report child abuse individuals can call local office, 606-256-2138 or 1-877-597-2331.



The scholarships are available to those who work at least 20 hours per week or provide training in early childhood development at least 12 times annually for an approved organization. Kentuckians employed as a preschool associate teacher in a state-funded preschool program are also eligible.

Recipients must be working toward an associate's degree or a bachelor's degree in early childhood education or other approved credential. Subject to the availability of funds, the scholarship will pay up to \$1,800 for tuition annually. Students may not take more than nine hours per semester



Federal student aid helps pay college costs

The federal government sponsors numerous financial aid programs that can help students and their parents pay college expenses. Below is a brief summary from the Kentucky Higher

Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA) that describes some of the more common federal grant and loan programs. Grants don't have to be repaid, but loans

•Federal Pell Grant. Pell Grants provide up to \$5,550 per year for undergraduates with financial need.

•Federal Supplemental **Educational Opportunity** Grant. These provide up to graduate students who have exceptional financial need. •Federal Perkins Loan.

\$4,000 per year for under-

These loans are for students with exceptional financial need. Undergraduates can get up to \$5,500 per year, while graduate students can get up to \$8,000 per year.

•Federal Stafford Loan. Stafford Loans are available to undergraduate, graduate and professional students. The amount students may borrow varies depending upon their year in school.

•Federal PLUS Loan. Parents of dependent undergraduate students may qualify for PLUS Loans, depending on the parents' credit ratings. The amount available depends on how much other financial aid the student receives. Graduate students may apply for PLUS Loans if they have exhausted all of their Stafford Loan eligibility. Academic Competitive-

ness Grants and SMART Grants will not be available next academic year. The federal government ended funding for those programs after the 2010-2011 school year. Budget proposals currently under consideration by Congress may result in changes to some of the programs listed above.

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is used to apply for all of these programs.

Program Options

There are two programs in Rockcastle County that offer free preschool education services to three and four year old children. The program includes: The Rockcastle County Public School Preschool and Kentucky River Foothills Head Start Preschool.

Rockcastle County Schools offers these services through a blended Early Childhood Program that meets both state and federal guidelines.

What to Bring for Registration

Please bring your child's state birth certificate, social security card, immunization certificate, proof of income and proof of medical coverage (i.e. medical card or insurance card) to register. Call your school with any questions and to make an appointment to register your child.

Health Requirements

The following health requirements must be met in order to enroll in the early childhood program and kindergarten.

- Physical exam
- Blood pressure and lead screening (early childhood only)
- Dental exam Vision exam

Immunizations

To be eligible for Head Start, your child must be 3 or 4 years old by October 1st and meet one of the following requirements:

- 1. Meet Federal Income Guidelines
- 2. Have a disability
- Be eligible for Public Assistance (SSI, K-TAP, Child Care Subsidy)
- Meet guidelines for being considered a homeless family
- Reside in a foster home

To be eligible for Rockcastle County Public Preschool, your child must be 4 years old by October 1st and meet one of the following requirements:

- 1. Be eligible for Free Lunch
- 2. Have a disability
- 3. Three year olds may be eligible with an identified disability
- Non-qualifying 4 year olds may attend the Early Childhood program as space allows



Slavery and the Possibility of the Underground Railroad in Rockcastle County

Recently, while browsing at the library while preparing to do some research, I came across a book that I've found simply fascinating. It is the true narrative of an escaped slave from Kentucky. The slave, who changed his name after reaching Canada, relates a very insightful look into slavery here in Kentucky. If slavery flourished during its era in Kentucky, why would it not here in Rockcastle?

The era is just prior to the Civil War in 1854, where we find a fifty-year old slave by the name of Francis Fedric. He has changed his surname from Parker, the name of his former master, to Fedric, and has escaped by way of the Underground Railroad to Toronto, Canada. His second narrative, Slave Life in

Virginia and Kentucky, from which I'm reading, was first published in 1863. It hasn't been published since, and never in America until last year.

Francis was a slave in Mason County, Kentucky, and I'm certain that the conditions weren't any different for him than for the slaves here in Rockcastle County, or any other county in the South prior to the Civil War. He had found himself, in 1854, about to suffer yet another brutal beating where he made his second, and successful attempt to escape. His first attempt ended in horrible failure. He resolved himself to return to his master after near starvation while hiding in a swamp for nine weeks. He finally sought the help of a neighbor who was sympathetic to the humiliating

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
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"Quarter Mile Dash"
Drag racing – the straight

run over a quarter-mile from a standing start for the shortest elapsed time – was an illegal form of entertainment that was quite popular among young people of the late '50s and early '60s. The fad grew from match racing on rural roads by highschoolers who had to show off their "souped-up" rebuilt cars. The best way to demonstrate their mechanical skills was to race from a standing start over an identical short distance. The quarter-mile distance was used because even teens knew that a longer distance would be unreasonably dangerous. Books of the era by

Henry Felsen – Hot Rod and Crash Club – were read by teenagers by the thousands, in which the idea of racing "hot rod cars" was glorified. I remember checking out Crash Club when I was a sophomore at Mt. Vernon High School and doing a book report on the popular novel. After giving the oral report in class, several of my friends also read the book.

My love of drag racing originally came from being a spectator as I watched some of my older friends with truly hot cars pair off on US 25 or US 150 in the late 50s and early 60s in Rockcastle County. Straight stretches of county roads that were used included: Conway, the Brodhead stretch, and the area near

In those days, my 1958 Chevrolet was a six-cylinder and was not powerful enough to race the cars with more horsepower, so I went along just to watch the action. Some of the fastest cars that I recall were owned by: Charles Hensley - 55 Chevy; Bobby Fain - 57 Chevy; Hammer Burton -56 Chevy; Billy Griffin – 54 Olds; and Hobart Parrett -57 Buick. I checked to make sure the "statute of limitations" was over before naming these friends of mine.

I distinctly remember being near the finish line that had been marked on the highway at the end of the Conway stretch as Bobby Fain came roaring past the crowd of teenagers when he conquered his opponent from Berea, Kentucky. Car loads of teens piled into cars, gathering at the finish line in order to witness the excitement. We all cheered our Rockcastle hero as he returned from the race, ever ready to talk about his victory. His opponent went on back to Berea - never to be seen again.

By the early 60's, entrepreneurs had noted the popularity of these teen races as well as how dangerous they were. Those smart fellows thought that good money could be made by opening drag strips where these "hotrod junkies" could gather and compete against each other.

Dallas Clark, who is cur-

rently Race Director at the Mountain Park Dragway in Clay City, Kentucky, provided some insight concerning the original intent of the business. He explained, "Drag strips began as a means of getting kids off the street, and we continue to provide an opportunity for the young people to compete here at Mountain Park each Friday night." On Friday nights anyone holding a valid drivers license can race against their friends on a legal track in Clay City. The event is called the "Friday Night Street Scene."

In 1963, I purchased a

new Chevy Impala Super

Sport with a 327- cubic-inch V-8 engine that provided 250 horsepower. My SS came equipped with a 4-barrel carburetor and hydraulic camshafts, bucket seats, four-in-the floor transmission, and a positive traction rear end. My friend Delvin Sparrow Campbellsville owned a 1960 Chevy Impala. His Impala was outfitted with a 348-cubic-inch V-8 with three two-barrel carburetors. It was rated as having 355 horsepower. On several occasions, we took our Chevys to the drag strip in Campbellsville to compete against each other. After several races, we never could determine which of those Chevys was the hottest. Sometimes he edged me at the finish line; other times I was able to slip past him at the end of the quarter mile. It was tons of fun!

At the Campbellsville drag strip, I once registered a time of 78 miles-per-hour from a standing quarter-mile distance. My time was 17.8 seconds. I thought I was Mario Andretti and that I had the fastest 63 Chevy in the country.

Some of the fastest cars now exceed 300 miles-perhour in "the quarter" – a far cry from the drag race depicted in the classic 1955

But back to the story. It was late in the day, two Octobers past, when the mail man popped a little card board carton from a nursery that I had never heard of into our mail box. I tossed in on the kitchen table, assuming that it was junk, but Loretta opens everything that comes in the mail and carefully scrutinizes before she tosses it into file 13.

"Ahhhhhhhhhhhhhhhha a Ahhaaa. "I am going to call my grandson right this minute.!! Do you realize that his tulips have arrived! I have suspected it all along but this just goes to prove that my grandson is a world class genius. Can you believe that we actually got tulip bulbs in the mail because I believed in Braden????"

And so, Loretta lovingly put the bulbs in a little plot beside the porch in November of 2009. And the spring of 2010 came and went and the tulips did come up. They didn't bloom but they did sprout some greenery and my wife fussed over them until they finally died back to nothingness and not a word was spoken about the genius of our entrepreneurial grandson or the church he represented when the deal was cut.

But then about the middle of March of this year I looked out and dark green tulips were sprouting everywhere in Loretta's flower bed and she busied herself with black mulch and snidely said to me, "I believe there is hope for Braden's tulips".

I personally don't put much faith in hope and frankly believe it to be way



conditions facing the slaves. The neighbor helped him join hundreds of other runaway slaves fleeing across the Ohio River and into Canada. I speculate that some using the Underground Railroad made their north through Rockcastle County, at least in part, following the Rockcastle River and other roads such as Boone's Trace, although being sure not to be seen on the road. Francis was born in Virginia in 1805 on a plantation that had, on occasion, as many as five hundred slaves. His grandparents had been stolen from Africa and brought to Maryland. When the tobacco crops had depleted the soil in Virginia, he was taken to Kentucky following the tobacco crops to better soil. Even as a child, Francis

remembered the slave children being humiliated. His master gathered the children together and showed them his sheep, horses, and cows. Then he explained that they were no more than one of these animals, and that they had no soul. When they died, they had no hope of salvation like the white people. In order to save the wages of hiring a white overseer, Master Parker used Francis' uncle as an overseer, threatening to flog him seriously if he allowed the other slaves to get out of control. Francis' grandmother had committed the crime of attending a local prayer meeting. Her own son was ordered to tie her hands, lay bare her back, and give her forty lashes or be beaten himself.

A ration of food was given to each slave family every Monday to use as they liked. They were usually given black-eyed peas for soup, a little pork meat for seasoning, Indian corn for meal which the slaves had to grind by hand, and some salted fish for the adults among other rations. Breakfast was from 10:00 until 11:00, and dinner was from 2:00 until 3:00. The adults ate from bowls, and the children were fed in troughs like the pigs. They were fed sparingly and usually quarreled over their food.

Each slave family lived together in small one-room huts made of logs. Francis commented that English people would be surprised to see the natural modesty and delicacy of the women who huddled together in the huts. An unchaste female slave was rarely found.





Vanwinkle's bond is \$25,000 cash or property and he will be back in court May 13th for another hearing. Vanwinkle, who remains in the Rockcastle Detention Center, is also wanted for charges against him in Laurel County.

An encouraging word:

The Countenance is Revealing By Howard Coop

Many years ago as a high school sophomore, I sat in the Joel O. Cheek Auditorium and laughed heartily as members of the Burkesville High School senior class presented an entertaining dramatic production. That production gave a comedic look at family life in a remote cabin in the Appalachian Mountains. The cast of characters included a grandfather who was head of the clan, his children, grandchildren, and a few neighbors. Although it was a comedy, that drama had an

underlying theme that was

more serious. The years have past, and I have forgotten every line but one of that amusing production, but I still remember that one memorable line. Throughout the play, the grandfather, the patriarch of the clan, said one thing over and over that clearly expressed in understandable terms the basic philosophy of life by which he lived, and the audience found that line amusing. While slouched in an old rocking chair with one gallous of his overalls unfastened, he said emphatically and in poor

grammar, "Never stand up when you can set down, never set down when you can lay down, and never do today what you can put off 'til tomorrow." Even a high school sophomore could understand that such a philosophy of life had a profound effect on life in that remote mountain cabin and on the life of anyone who chooses to live by it.

Lounging about and doing nothing while dodging duty may be satisfying to some, but it accomplishes little and impoverishes life. On the other hand, willingly assuming duty, whatever duty is and whenever it is faced, is the way to achieve real accomplishment and abiding satisfaction. Thomas Carlyle, a nineteenth century Scottish philosopher and essayist, expressed it well when, in SARTOR RESARTUS, he wrote, "Lay this other precept well to heart, which to me was of invaluable service: 'Do the Duty which lies nearest thee,' which thou knowest to be Duty! Thy second Duty will already have become clearer."



INSPECTION PERIOD

FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL

The Rockcastle County real property tax roll will be opened for inspection from May 2 through May 16, 2011. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the

This is the January 1, 2011 assessment on which state, county and school taxes for 2011 will be due about September 15, 2011.

The tax roll is in the office of the property valuation administrator in the county courthouse and may be inspected between the hours of 8:30 and 4:00.

Any taxpayer desiring to appeal an assessment on real property made by the PVA must first request a conference with the PVA or a designated deputy. The conference may be held prior to or during the inspection period.

Any taxpayer still aggrieved by an assessment on real property, after the conference with the PVA or designated deputy, may appeal to the county board of assessment appeals.

The taxpayer can appeal his assessment by filing in person or sending a letter or other written petition stating the reasons for appeal, identifying the property and stating the taxpayer's opinion of the fair cash value of the property.

The appeal must be filed with the county clerk's office no later than one work day following the conclusion of the inspection period.

Any taxpayer failing to appeal to the county board of assessment appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person or by designated representative, will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

Appeals of personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provisions of KRS 131.110.

The following steps should be taken when a taxpayer does not agree with the assessed value of personal property as determined by the office of property valuation administrator.

- (1) He must list under protest (for certification) what he believes to be the fair cash value of his property. (2) He must file a written protest directly with the Department of
- Revenue, Office of Property Valuation within 30 days from the date of the notice of assessment. (3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110.

(4) The final decision of the Department of Revenue may be appealed

to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

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
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

Mamaw's Kitchen

There are many variations of meatloaf, but these three are my favorites. Pop was my father-in-law and a cook in the Army. He was also the cook at home. Mum was my mother and Rhonda is my sister.

> POP'S MEATLOAF 1 1/2 pounds ground beef

1 egg

1 cup oats, uncooked 1/2 cup shredded carrots

2 tablespoons tomato cat-

1/3 cup milk Salt

2 strips bacon

Preheat oven to 350°. Crumble ground beef into large bowl. Add egg, oats, carrots, tomato catsup, milk, and salt. Mix well with a wooden spoon. Turn out into a lightly greased loaf pan. Top with two strips of bacon. Bake for one hour at 350°. Let set for about 15 minutes before slicing.

MUM'S MEATLOAF

1 1/2 pounds ground beef 2 tablespoons tomato ketchup

1 egg

1 can (8 ounce) tomato sauce, divided

12 saltine crackers,

1 small onion, chopped Salt

Pepper

4 medium size potatoes, peeled and cut into wedges

Preheat oven to 350°. Gently mix ground beef, ketchup, egg, 3 tablespoons of tomato sauce, cracker crumbs, onion, salt, and pepper together. Pat gently into an 8 or 9 inch iron skillet, forming a round loaf not touching sides of skillet. Pour the rest of tomato sauce over meat loaf. Rub potato wedges with oil. Place around meat loaf forming a "fence." Bake at 350° for 1 hour. When done, remove from oven and let sit for 15 minutes. Remove meatloaf and potatoes from pan with slotted spatula.
