## Grant for pool upgrade sought

What can the city do with \$900,000 to upgrade the Berea City Pool? The Berea City Council and the Parks and Recreation Committee will soon find out, according to Berea City Administrator Rose Beverly.

At Tuesday's business meeting of the Berea City Council, Beverly announced that after she met with state officials in Frankfort last week, Berea may be in a favorable position to land a \$900,000 grant to upgrade the pool.

At last Thursday's Parks and Recreation Committee meeting, members voted unanimously to pursue the funds, according to committee chair John Payne.

Beverly cautioned that while the funds aren't enough for a substantial overhaul of the pool itself, such as the filtration system, significant upgrades may be possible.

Beverly said the next step will be to consult with a pool designer, who will then pass their findings to the council via the Parks Committee.

In other news, Berea City Clerk Robin Adams drew praise from council members after Berea Mayor Bruce Fraley mentioned it was Kentucky League of Cities Professional

## Pavilion available for rent

The Chestnut Street Pavilion is now a rentable, public multi-use facility according to Berea Business and Tourism Development Director Donna Angel.

Rate sheets, regulations, and reservation forms were scheduled to be published online this week to allow the public to reserve the pavilion for private and public events. The public will be able to rent the facility for parties, family reunions, and other outdoor events, according to officials.

Additionally, the Chestnut Street Pavilion will be a likely venue for upcoming music concerts, after the Berea Tourism Commission recently approved an initiative to invite more local musicians to perform in the city throughout the spring, summer and fall months.

"We had a tremendous response on that from our last meeting," Angel said of the plan to bring more music groups to Berea. "I think music is just a great thing we need to do more of."

Discussion about the future of the Chestnut Street Pavilion took up several minutes during a recent meeting after local resident Jacque Bowling expressed her opinion during the public comments period that the pavilion will not be suitable for public use because it is open to the elements. Bowling asked whether the city would try to modify the pavilion for use in inclement weather.

Commissioner Richard Thomas disagreed with Bowling, however, stating the pavilion was specifically built as a venue for spring, summer and fall events. “You said the building is not functional,” Thomas said. “That’s your opinion. It may not be suitable for a driving rainstorm, but that’s your opinion.”

Angel emphasized the new facility was never intended to be used for events during bad weather, such as heavy rain or snow. “The pavilion was built to be an outdoor, multi-use facility. So, when we think of outdoors, we don’t think of enclosing it.”

Commissioners did agree with another point Bowling made, however. Bowling wanted to know the precise cost of the pavilion, noting that by her accounting, the facility cost approximately \$180,000 more than projected in the current budget.

Commissioners acknowledged there were overages in the project, some of which had to do with the grading and drainage of the parking lot, and they agreed with Bowling’s suggestion that the exact figures should be made public.

“The public has a right to know down to the penny what the money was spent on and where those funds came from,” Thomas said.

All of the commissioners thanked Bowling for her interest in tourism, though at least one took issue with one other objection she made.

“I could care less about the Berea Farmer’s Market,” Bowling said. “They don’t live in Berea, they do not pay property tax, so I could really care less.” Bowling also asserted that some produce at the market is not locally grown.

While thanking Bowling for attending the meeting, Commissioner Laura Carpenter said tourists have expressed very positive opinions about the Berea Farmer’s Market.

“Jackie, thank you so much for coming and caring. I can feel how much you care,” Carpenter said, adding that as the owner of vacation rentals in Berea, she’s had a different perspective on the market. “My clients love the farmer’s

market.” Carpenter added some of her clients tell her that when they visit town, they cook with ingredients they find at the market.

Carpenter did agree with Bowling’s suggestion that city officials should look at other pavilions in other communities to get ideas for enhancing Berea’s pavilion. Carpenter called the Chestnut Street Pavilion a work in progress.

Much of the initial funding of the Chestnut Street Pavilion was secured by federal and state grants won by a coalition of city officials and private citizens.

The city landed a \$250,000 grant from the Kentucky Office of Agricultural Policy, \$100,000 came from the USDA Rural Development Division, and \$10,000 came from the Agricultural Development Committee of the Madison County Extension Office. Berea Tourism gave another \$250,000 toward the effort.

City officials have stated the pavilion presented an opportunity to take advantage of available state and federal funds while allocating local tourism dollars for the public good.

Mayor Bruce Fraley, meanwhile, has expressed his belief that the pavilion will spark economic development

in a very visible gateway into town.

At least one local entrepreneur, realtor Sandy Adams, revealed plans to convert the old Mario’s restaurant building into an ice cream/coffee shop based, in part, on the city’s investment in the Chestnut Street Pavilion and the Tolle Building.

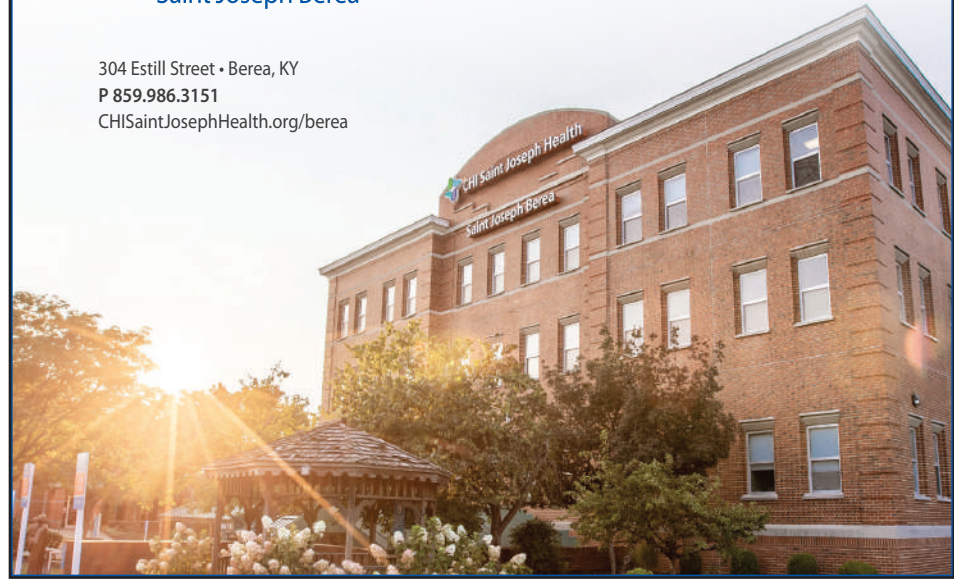

I haven't worked in the fast-food industry in more than two decades but the skills attained while flipping burgers, dunking fries in a grease pit and waiting on customers proved to be valuable leading up to my journalism career.

Working at Hardee's (John Revel Enterprises) taught me discipline, the importance of good customer service, quality, accuracy and the appreciation of earning and saving money. Getting up at 4:30 a.m. five days a week to supervise the breakfast shift all while attending college and covering games at night to gain

journalism experience wasn't easy, but I always took pride in my work whether it was serving a sausage biscuit or a cheeseburger.

Most of the later years were spent during breakfast hours, which were the busiest times at our particular location on the Eastern Bypass in Richmond.

Many of the regular customers were regular visitors and showed up at the same time every morning and we

pretty much knew their order and served it up before they paid.

Because of my experience working in the industry for many years, I pay attention to detail each time I walk into a fast-food restaurant. Are the floors, tables and bathrooms clean? Is the food hot and fresh? Are there napkins and straws in the bag and most of all is my order correct?

This past week alone, I ordered a banana split frozen treat at one establishment and it didn't have one ounce of its namesake in the cup. Plenty of strawberries and pineapple, but not one banana. It happens and all

was forgiven.

It's a good thing I like strawberries and pineapples.

However, an order mix-up happened again, this time at another well-known place in town. Rhonda had picked up dinner for us Saturday since I was pressure washing the front porch and the back deck. She brought it home and my burger had onions and pickles. The cheese also was plastered to the side of the box. The special ticket for no onions and pickles was on the box before I opened it. I scrapped the onion and pickles off the top of the bun and then took a bit and

the burger wasn't done.

It wasn't the first time it has happened at this location. A few weeks ago I ordered two cheeseburgers with no onion and pickles and got a burger with lettuce and cheese inside a salad container. I just laughed it off that time.

Granted, I understand mistakes can and do happen, but it's disappointing when the prices go up because of inflation and the quality doesn't improve with the rising costs. I know times have changed, but I still expect quality and good customer service for my money.

It still matters.

I miss the long telephone conversations with my mother. We talked on the telephone for 30 minutes sometimes twice a



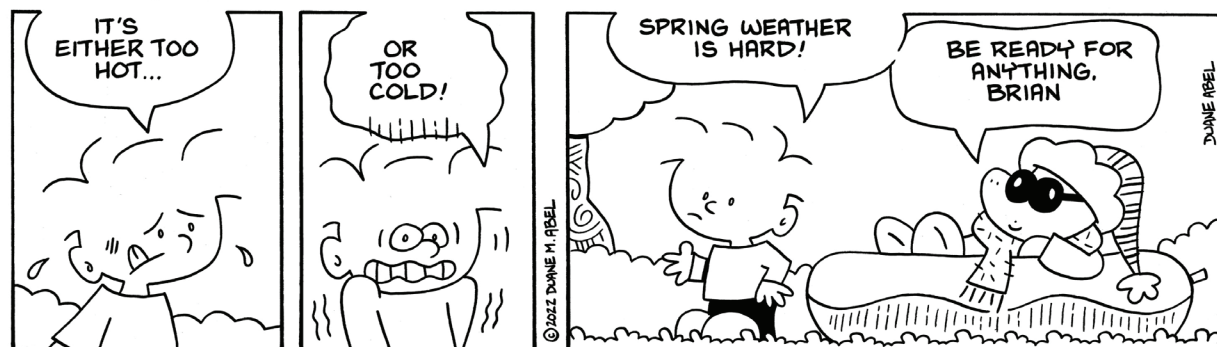

# Reflections

## Berea Citizen Archives

### May 4, 1922 Berea wins again

A.J. Russell, representing the Berea Normal School took first place in a contest held in Barbourville Friday Evening, April 28th under the auspices of The Eastern Kentucky Oratorical Association. This was the first time that Berea Normal had ever been represented in an interschool oratorical contest and Mr. Russell pushed out in the right direction. His subject was “The Call of Five Million,” and his speech was an appeal to the mountain people to become their own missionaries. He gave a vivid picture of conditions of mountain life at the time and pointed out that the proper solution of the problem of the mountains depended upon whether the mountain people were going to be willing to educate themselves to do their work. Mr. Russell did not believe that the people from the plains could solve the mountain problem. Other schools represented in the contest were Eastern Kentucky State Normal, Asbury, Union and Sue Bennett.

### May 2, 1946 Porter wins spelling bee

The annual spelling bee for the seventh and eighth grades at Berea City Schools was completed on Friday, April 26, 1946, and was won by seventh grader Marilyn Porter. Marilyn was the twelve-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Woodrow Porter of Boone Street in Berea. After having been narrowed down by written tests to eight contestants (4 from each grade), it took two half-days to determine the winner. According to Mr. Chester Herren, principle, the

eight were some of the strongest spelling groups in the history of the school and all “were excellent spellers and all deserved to be winners.” Miss Porter was awarded ten dollars by the Louisville Courier- Journal. Runners up were Norma Jane Robinson, eighth grade; Geraldine Williams, eighth grade; Christine Rucker, seventh grade. Others to take part were Emily Rucker, seventh grade; Fred Williams, eighth grade and Martha Lee Witt, eighth grade.

### May 4, 1972 Farewell party

Mrs. Orrin Kenner was the recipient of a farewell party given in her honor by the children, parents, and her co-workers on May 2nd in her classroom at Union Church in Berea. Mrs. Kenner and her late husband Orrin Kenner, operated the Southern Madison County Kindergarten for six years, giving of their time and love voluntarily to this project for child development. More than 140 children benefited from their knowledge and devotion. It had been announced the week previous, that Mrs. Kenner had also been designated as a Star Citizen of the community by the Berea Woman’s Club on the eve of her departure for her home state of Illinois.

### May 8, 1997 People boom

A quarter of a century may not seem long in history, but a lot can happen in 25 years. Madison County’s population had grown by 50% since 1972, making it the sixth fastest-growing county in the 17-county Bluegrass region.

It ranked ahead of Lexington, Frankfort, Winchester, and Danville in growth during that period. Berea grew 53% in that same period, while Richmond grew 41%, according to the U.S. Census of Population and the state Data Center. Madison County’s rank in population was something to ponder. There are other statistics more indicative of progress, though, which prove that the county was a leader in the Bluegrass. Education levels of residents was one such factor. In Madison County in 1970, 44.3% of the population had less than a ninth-grade education. By 1990, that number dropped to 19.2%. Madison County ranked only behind Fayette, Franklin, and Woodford counties in the percentage of residents with college degrees, according to the Census Bureau, 19% of the population had at least a bachelor’s degree. In 1971, Madison County had an unemployment rate of 4.8%. In 1996, it had dropped to 3.1%. The poverty rate for the same span of time, dropped 6 percentage points. That drop in poverty and unemployment was due in part to more or better jobs. Around 4-% more industry jobs were created in Madison County between 1973 and 199, based on the state Employment Services, Research and Statistics. Where Madison County did not rank a well was in per capita personal income. At the time it ranked 46%. According to the Regional Economic Information System, the per capita personal income for Madison County was \$3,117 in 1972. By 1994, it had risen to \$15,525, a 398% jump. Still, Madison ranked higher than Estill, Garrard, Lincoln, Nicholas and Powell counties in per capita income.

# Berea rolls past Model

The Berea baseball team picked up an impressive 23-4 win over Model last week as six players recorded at least three RBIs. Tommy Banderman led the way with four RBIs on a 4-for-5 day at the plate. Ty Thompson, Cameron Thompson, Zac Himes, Logan Abney and Koty Roberts finished with three RBIs. Cameron Thompson picked up the win by working four innings and striking out nine. Berea (6-9) fell to Jackson County, 16-3. Statistics from that game were not posted on the Kentucky High School Athletic Association website before the deadline.

- The Madison Southern Eagles won two and lost one last week to improve their record to 8-13. The Eagles defeated Bourbon County, 12-2, and North Laurel, 7-3, but fell to Wayne County, 9-2. Corey Causey, Kaden Carrwhite and Caleb Cobb knocked in two RBIs against Bourbon County. Cobb picked up the win by going four innings and striking out six. Against North Laurel, Braden Hudson and Cobb collected a pair of RBIs, while Zach Morgeson went five innings and struck out five for the win.
- The 2022 Berea and Madison Southern softball teams continue to struggle to find success on the scoreboards. The teams combined to go 0-5 last week. Berea (1-5) lost a pair of games to Williamsburg by the identical score of 14-7.

The Lady Pirates have been led this year by Mackenzie Howell’s six RBIs and .545 batting average. Taylor Johnson has batted .455 with three RBIs. Southern (1-16) fell to Scott County (16-0), Estill County (13-5) and North Laurel (7-5). Katelynn Bollen and Goss Kayley have each knocked in six runs this season, while Chloe Rison has knocked in five runs. Bella Strunk leads the pitching staff with 36 strikeouts.

- Madison Southern Lady Eagles basketball standout Morgan Flannery will take her talents to Asbury University in Wilmore.

In the fall, Flannery averaged 8.9 points and 5.2 rebounds per game during her senior season at Southern.

Southern Coach Josh Curtis said Asbury is getting a player who will compete when she arrives on campus.

“She competes as hard as any player I’ve been around, whether in practice, games, or the classroom,” Curtis said. “She has so much potential and is still growing as a player. I believe she is two years away from being the best version of herself as an extremely athletic point guard.”

He added that she sparked Southern’s defense last year as she was often tasked with taking on the opponent’s best player.

“She was our best defender who would guard the other team’s best player regardless of size,” Curtis said. “She was the heart and soul of our team, and we fed off her energy.”

“We will bring back a lot of good players next season, but we won’t be able to replace a player like Morgan.” (Mike Moore)

It’s probably one of those things where everyone sees you every week but nobody realizes how much work you do and how much we all depend on you to keep the wheels turning.”

In presenting a proclamation designating May 1-7 as National Small Business Awareness Week in Berea, Mayor Fraley congratulated two local businesses – The Native Bagel and Mountain Association, who are being recognized as Kentucky Small Business Development Center businesses of the year for 2022.

Fraley noted that only eight businesses in the Commonwealth were selected, two of which were from Berea. The proprietor of The Native Bagel, Katie Startzman, was recognized as the 2022 Kentucky Woman Small Business of the Year while the Mountain Association was recognized as Small Business Administration Financial Services Advocates of the Year.

“I think that’s a phenomenal accomplishment given all the great businesses that are out there in our commonwealth,” Fraley said. “We want to recognize Katie and the Mountain Association for their achievements,” Fraley said.

In receiving the Small Business Week proclamation on behalf of all businesses in the city, Startzman stated:

“Tomorrow when I go to the capitol rotunda, I’m bringing my manager, Rhonda Patton, because no business or organization can function without its employees and I’m really grateful for the staff that we have,” Startzman said. “I just don’t want to be doing this work anywhere but Berea. I’m so grateful to have a business on Chestnut Street and in Berea. I think we have such awesome momentum, and I feel like it’s a really exciting time.”

In other business, the council unanimously approved four appointments to city boards. James Anderson was appointed to a three-year term on the Code Enforcement Board. Pastor Rick Fulton was appointed to a 4-year term on the Housing Authority Board. Peggy Baker was tapped for another three-year stint on the Berea Ethics Board, and Diane Kerby was appointed to a one-year term as a Berea Ethics Board alternate.

Also Tuesday, the council unanimously adopted the amended budget for 2021-2022. According to the revised spending plan, the city had an ending fund balance of \$17,952,000. Total amended revenue total for the year was \$16,213,000, while total amended expenditures are projected to reach approximately \$18,026,000. Revenue under expenditures was \$1,812,000, according to the ordinance.

During Mayoral Comments, Fraley welcomed officers Steve Wood and Austin Shoals to the Berea Police Department. Both men come to Berea from the University of Kentucky Police Department, he said.

On a related note, Beverly encouraged citizens to thank local police officers for their service in recognition of National Police Week, which runs from May 15-21.

The next council meeting is slated for May 17.

## NIL changing game and not for the better

Let the bidding begin. It appears some college players and their agents - yes, agents - are beginning to treat the transfer portal and the name, image, and likeness rules more like free agency than an opportunity to receive fair compensation for their talents while attending college to obtain a degree. Reportedly, South Dakota State stand-out Baylor Scheierman had a cover letter of NIL demands attached to his resume and Kentucky eased off recruitment. Scheierman eventually committed to Creighton. It should be of interest that Kansas State transfer Nigel Pack reportedly received an \$800,000 NIL package from Miami and is represented by the same agent as Scheierman.

If you read between the proverbial lines, Scheierman, one of the top outside shooters in college basketball last season, likely has an NIL deal awaiting before plays his first game for the Blue Jays. We're not even a year into the NIL era and recruiting stories such as the one featuring Scheierman and Pack are starting to surface. It's no surprise that transfers want NIL deals to be part of their decision-making process so they can receive a compensation package. Never mind a free college education and a degree that are still meaningful amid the many changes that are taking shape along the college landscape. Despite the changes, some schools, such as Kentucky, aren't jumping on the pay-for-play bandwagon

disguised as NIL before transfers even enroll on campus. When it comes to recruiting, the program sells itself without adding money to the mix.

"Our basketball program has and continues to be ahead of everyone else," Kentucky Director of Player Development TJ Beisner said. "I know. I have these conversations with recruits and other schools. We just don't flaunt it on social media because we don't need to. It's Kentucky, the biggest stage for everything."

Because of its rich history and status as one of the bluebloods of college basketball, a claim that only schools such as North Carolina, Kansas, Duke and a handful of others can boast, the name on the jersey has enticed student-athletes to play for the Wildcats for decades.

It has always been that way for state and national recruits. Playing for Kentucky has plenty to offer without adding NIL deals to the mix.

Kentucky, Beisner said, "will not guarantee money as an inducement to anyone, ever, period."

"We don't need to," he said. "We haven't missed out on anyone because of that."

Beisner's boss, Kentucky coach John Calipari, an outspoken proponent of NIL, said UK players are "making more money than anyone the right way."

"NIL won't hurt us and hasn't for any kid we've really wanted," Calipari said.

"If NCAA or federal government make changes, we'll adapt and continue to lead."

To prevent a culture of possible non-regulation, the NCAA needs to step in and impose rules and regulations regarding NIL deals and transfer portal problems before things spiral out of control.

## 'Go be great'

LEXINGTON (KT) – Kentucky football coach Mark Stoops urged each of his four players who were taken in the NFL Draft to "go be great" at the next level.

"NFL Sundays are going to be exciting to watch for years to come," Stoops said after Wan'Dale Robinson, Josh Paschal, Luke Fortner and Darian Kinnard were chosen in the draft that concluded on Saturday in Las Vegas.

Robinson, a versatile wide receiver, was the first former Wildcat taken in the draft and was the 43rd overall selection by the New York Giants. Prior to the draft, Robinson was confident he would be taken in the early rounds.

"I always felt like I was talented enough to be picked this early," Robinson said. "I just felt like somebody just had to believe in me and not believe in the hype thing and just believe in the football player."

The Giants also are confident in Robinson's ability to make an immediate impact.

"(Robinson is a) good football player we've had our eye on, generator with the ball in his hands, very good run after the catch, very good route runner, can separate," Giants General Manager Joe Schoen said. "And for what we are going to do offensively, we thought he would be a very good fit for us."

New York head coach Brian Daboll added Robinson is "versatile, got quickness, explosiveness, he's tough even for a smaller guy."

"(He's) been a very productive player really going back to high

school when he played there in Kentucky — a guy we're anxious to get our hands on and work with and implement into our scheme," he said.

Kentucky defensive standout Josh Paschal followed Robinson as the 46th player chosen and will begin his professional career in Detroit with the Lions.

"I'm a guy that can change locker rooms," he said. "That's my goal is to come in, learn from the guys, the veterans there, but also step into a leadership role."

A talented player, the Lions were equally impressed by Paschal's demeanor off the field.

"You're wowed when you turn on the tape, but then you find out about the human being and you're just impressed even more," Lions general manager Brad Holmes said.

Luke Fortner will join former teammate Josh Allen with the Jacksonville Jaguars after he was selected in the third round with the 65th overall pick. Darion Kinnard was the No. 145th pick of the draft and was chosen by the Kansas City Chiefs.

Following the draft, several former Kentucky players signed free-agent contracts: Yusuf Coker (Giants), Marquan McCall (Carolina Panthers), Justin Rigg (Cincinnati Bengals) and Dare Rosenthal (Atlanta Falcons).

Former Louisville defensive back Russ Yeast was selected as the 253rd overall pick by the Los Angeles Rams. Yeast finished his career at Kansas State.

## Elzy adds two SEC transfers to roster

LEXINGTON (KT) — Kentucky women's basketball coach Kyra Elzy added a pair of transfers to her revamped roster on Monday.

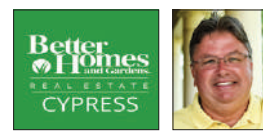
South Carolina's Eniya Russell, a guard, and Ajae Petty (LSU) have transferred and will have three seasons of eligibility remaining. Russell played in 23 games last season for the national champion Gamecocks,

while Petty played in 31 for the Tigers and is considered one of the top post players in the nation.

Russell, 6-foot-1, averaged seven minutes a game for South Carolina and scored a season-high 14 points during her freshman season two years ago.

She was recruited by the Wildcats before eventually signing with South Carolina.

## P&Z recommends zone change at Farristown

The Berea Planning Commission unanimously voted to recommend two zone changes for Farristown, designating an 87-acre tract as I-2 industrial park.

The vote followed a public discussion at Tuesday's business meeting in which some Farristown residents expressed concern about

preserving the history and heritage of that community, which was predominantly African American. The hearing was an extension of a discussion that began at an April 26 Berea Planning Commission business meeting.

The Berea Industrial Development Authority (BIDA), which has acquired the 87 acres of land in Farristown

over a period of 15-20 years, submitted zone change requests for two parcels. One was a 1.26-acre tract that had been in the county, while the other request involved rezoning some properties designated A-1 agricultural and R-1 residential into the industrial zone. The properties zoned A-1 or R-1 constituted approximately one third of the

entire 87-acre tract, officials said.

Speaking on behalf of BIDA, Berea Mayor Bruce Fraley said the nearly two-decade effort to acquire the land is part of a long-term plan to spur economic development.

"From the time that I was in high school, many of our best and brightest young people felt like they had to leave Berea to make a good

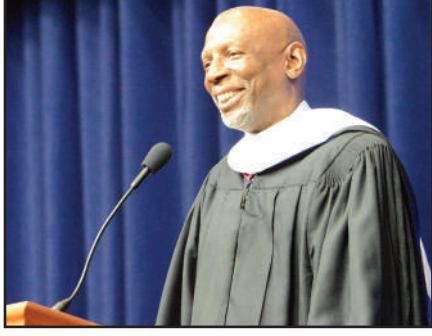

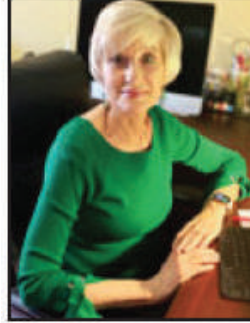

### What is the role of an elected official in the position you are seeking?

## What is the biggest issue or issues facing Madison County?

The 4th District borders the Depot on the South & West sides and while the Blue Grass Chemical Agent Destruction Pilot Plant (BGCAPP) has been extremely successful destroying 246 of the 523 tons of agents to this point, the M55 rockets containing the deadliest nerve agent in the world, GB (Sarin) remains. Absolutely no mistakes can be made in the final phase of destroying the remaining M55 Rockets. In 2023 when the last GB M55 Rocket is neutralized I would like to see the chemical weapons equipment, that billions of dollars of taxpayer money were spent on, be repurposed to destroy conventional weapons and the stop open air detonation of conventional weapons. Should this be possible we

other serious issues facing us in the next four years. We still battle daily with the war on drugs. new jobs, such as the 350 new jobs coming soon at AppHarvest. This will help our economy, but we can’t stop there. I would like to seek and attain grant money to develop an Industrial Park which will bring additional jobs and expand our revenue base.

We must also continue to improve and promote the Central Kentucky Regional Airport, which is a gateway to further our economic development. In my next term I will work with State Legislators to ensure the completion of the Highway 52 Connector to Duncannon and lobby for a new road to connect the Central Kentucky Regional Airport to the Highway 52 Connector. This will be a key component to economic development in Madison County in the future. I will also seek grant money to provide for water line improvements along the 52 Connector to Duncannon and Caleast.

Finally, I believe going forward we must improve the safety of our roads in the 4th District which is why I have continued to pursue a turning lane on US 421 into Kingston Elementary School and will also pursue turning lane at the intersection of US 25 & US 499.

**Dr. Larry  
Stephen Kelley**

Dr. Larry Stephen Kelley, 75, of Richmond passed away peacefully in his home on May 2, 2022 after a brief but courageous battle with pancreatic cancer. His family and his faithful dog Bella were by his side.



Dr. Kelley was born on January 1, 1947, in Boyd County, Kentucky but primarily grew up in Bath County where he attended primary and secondary school. The son of the late Steve D. Kelley and Georgia E. Arthur, he was the 6th child born by the mother of eight. Dr. Kelley earned an Associates of Arts and Bachelor of Science in Nursing at Eastern Kentucky University in 1972 and 1975, respectively. He obtained a Master of Science in Nursing from the University of Tennessee in 1979 and a Doctor of Nursing Science from Indiana University in 1999. Dr. Kelley was the first in his family to obtain a college degree.

Dr. Kelley was a former Professor of Nursing at Eastern Kentucky University's School of Nursing, teaching in both the undergraduate Baccalaureate Nursing Program and Master of Nursing Program, Rural Health Family Nurse Practitioner Tract. Dr. Kelley was instrumental in the development, implementation and credentialing of the FNP program at Eastern Kentucky University. He served as the Family Nurse Practitioner Curriculum Coordinator from the program's inception until his retirement. During his tenure at Eastern Kentucky University, he served on various committees within the Department of Baccalaureate and Graduate Nursing including the Advisory Committee, Faculty Evaluation Committee, Graduate Committee and the Committee on Promotion and Tenure for which he served as Chair in 2001 and 2006. Dr. Kelley served the College of Allied Health on the Alumni Affairs Committee, the Sabbatical Leave Committee and the Promotions and Tenure Committee, as well as serving as a Faculty Senator from 2002-2005. He retired from Eastern Kentucky University in 2010 after 32 years.

Dr. Kelley was an ANCC board certified Family Nursing Practitioner practicing in Madison, Fayette, Clark and Knox counties during his career. After his retirement from Eastern Kentucky University, he continued to practice as a Family Nurse Practitioner for several years, working with United States Army Reserve and United States National Guard members in Kentucky, Indiana, Ohio and Tennessee as well as providing Medicare services for home bound seniors. He was an active member of the Kentucky Coalition of Nurse Practitioners and Nurse Midwives serving on their Board of Directors. He advocated, through the Coalition, for unencumbered access to medical care in Kentucky especially in its most rural regions. He worked with the Coalition to lobby Kentucky Congress for the expansion of practice rights for Kentucky Nurse Practitioners, including allowing NPs who had completed a 4 year

collaboration with a physician to abolish their Collaborative Practice Agreements, legislation which successfully passed and went into effect in 2014. Dr. Kelley was a member of the American Nurse Association and served on the Council of Primary Care Nurse Practitioners. He was an inductee of Sigma Theta Tau, the National Honor Society of Nursing and was recognized with a Research Grant in 1996 by the organization for his Leadership in Scholarly Activity. In 2003, Dr. Kelley received the Outstanding Alumni Award from the Associate Degree Nursing Program and in 2006 he received the Outstanding Alumni Award from the Baccalaureate and Graduate Nursing Department from Eastern Kentucky University. In 2002, Dr. Kelley was a nominee for the Kentucky Coalition of Nurse Practitioners and Nurse Midwives for NP of the Year Award. In 2007, he received the Ellen Bailey Share the Light Award. This award is presented by the Kentucky Coalition of Nurse Practitioners and Nurse Midwives to a NP that displays quite leadership, clinical excellence, quality patient care and service to the profession and community where they practice.

In addition to his distinguished academic and professional careers, Dr. Kelley was a veteran. He enlisted with the United States Army in 1965 at the age of 18. During this enlistment he was a Medical Specialist and served approximately 11 months in Vietnam. Shortly after his honorable discharge in 1968 he joined the US Army Reserve. In 1990, the US began Operation Desert Shield and Operation Desert Storm. Dr. Kelley's unit, the 810th Convalescent Unit out of Lexington, KY was activated in December 1990. He served with 912th Mobile Army Hospital Army Surgical Hospital in Saudi Arabia, Iraq and Kuwait. He spent approximately 8 months in the Middle East. During his service with the US Army Reserve, he rose to the rank of Colonel and several commendations and service awards. He retired from the US Army Reserves in 2006 after more than 30 years of service.

Dr. Kelley loved to fish and especially enjoyed his annual trip to Arkansas to visit with friends and fish.

He is survived by his beloved wife of 54 years, Peggy Shrout Kelley of Richmond, KY; a daughter Krista Kelley Isaacs (Charles Isaacs) of Richmond, KY; one sister Kathy Kelley (Jimmy Dale) of Carlisle, KY and many nieces and nephews. 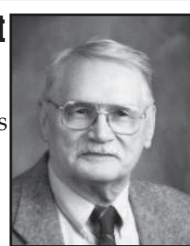

# Vote!

There are no excuses.

Now more than ever, voters have more options when it comes to voting in the primary and general election, whether it be in-person or by absentee. Prior to the pandemic that gripped our nation more than two years ago, to cast a vote, voters were given basically 12 hours the third Tuesday in May and November to cast their ballots in local, state and national elections.

The polling sites were divided into precincts, depending on your residence, creating restrictions on where voters could cast ballots. During the state of emergency, especially in 2020, voters were given the choice to vote by absentee while requesting a ballot by mail delivery and also could vote in-person by simply showing up with an ID and casting a ballot regardless of your previous precinct location.

In the past two years, Kentucky Secretary of State Michael Adams has made a push to make voting easier for constituents in the Bluegrass. Clerks in each of the state's 120 counties have the choice whether or not to use precincts, adding even more flexibility for voters.

"This was a good legislative session for Kentucky, especially for voters," Adams said. More state funding was allotted to removing deceased voters from the rolls and for updated voting equipment to help ease the process for voters. Adams is hopeful by the end of his current term, New Year's Day 2024, all counties will have state-of-the-art voting machines "to vote on," which includes paper ballots in order to do audits and recounts.

The biggest change for voters is the addition of early voting that will be offered starting Thursday-Saturday at three locations in Madison County. Voters can vote at the Russel Action Center (Berea), Madison County Extension Office) and the Madison County Clerk's Office (Richmond office only) from 8 a.m.-4 p.m.

Adams and the General Assembly implemented voting changes in House Bill 564 that clarified early voting locations must be open for eight hours and added six days of in-person absentee voting before early voting begins. The bill also codified an existing policy of not connecting voting machines to the internet and making it a felony to connect a voting machine to the internet. The bill also expanded the definition of election worker for the sole purpose of protection from intimidation.

On Tuesday, May 17, voters in the primary election also can vote during a 12-hour window, 6 a.m.-6 p.m. at seven locations throughout the north, south and central parts of Madison County. Voters can cast their ballots and the Folk Center, the Berea Church of God, Eastside Community Church, White Hall Baptist Church, Madison County Extension Office, Mule Barn (The University at Arlington) and Big Hill Christian Church.

Adams credited Madison County Clerk Kenny Barger for his efforts in creating an easier process for voters in Madison County. "He's one of the best in the state," Adams said. "That's saying something because we have a lot of really good ones."

Rainy or snowy days may eventually get to us. Too many bills and not enough money to pay them can work on our minds. A sick or troubled family member may worry us or make us feel bad. Our own personal health battles can make us feel down. Too much to do is troubling. Terminal illness that is rapidly getting worse puts us in a state of desperation to escape the outcome sooner rather than later.

Keep in mind that people successfully deal with mental illness every day. It does not have to be the end. People seek counsel, medical help, faith in God and find coping solutions to dealing with depression and mental illness. Mental illness does not have to end badly.

Try to think of those left behind.

Try to think about the spouse, the children and the loved ones who are left to go on. I have known people who were so physically sick that I understood their pain and desire to escape their bodies. Try to keep in mind that God made us and we all have an appointment with death. We don't have to push the appointment. It's coming to us all.

Try to find a way to find purpose and peace with the brief life God has given to you. It will all end soon enough.

• A 2017 study from the Institute for Health Metrics and Evaluation estimated that 792 million people across the globe lived with a mental health disorder. If that figure is startling, it's likely even greater as a result of the pandemic. Data from the Kaiser Family Foundation indicated that about four in 10 adults in the United States reported symptoms of anxiety or depressive disorder during the pandemic. That marked a significant uptick since the summer of 2019, when one in 10 adults reported such symptoms. The pandemic undoubtedly posed significant challenges that affected the mental health of people across the globe. But those challenges won't necessarily go away if and when life returns to pre-pandemic normalcy. Nor is there any guarantee that new challenges that pose a threat to individuals' mental health won't arise in the years to come. That reality underscores the importance of learning to recognize signs of mental illness in both adults and children.

living and to live the American dream. One of my goals as it relates to economic development is to attract good paying career jobs to our city where future generations can feel like they can stay in Berea as they enter their professional careers if they choose to do so," Fraley said. "With the recent expansion of Hyster-Yale group, the new ag-tech jobs at AppHarvest, and the advanced manufacturing jobs that are coming at Hitachi Ostemo Electric Motor Systems, who will be making the electric motor for the Honda Accord and the Honda CRV, I think we're well on our way to achieving that goal."

Planning director Amanda Haney noted that the public has been invited numerous times to provide their input on the Future Land Use Maps of the Berea Comprehensive Plans of 2015 and 2020, and that over the years, residents have been notified when zone changes were up for considering before the planning commission. Notification is sent to residents who live in adjacent properties, a sign is posted on the property under consideration, and the proposal is posted on city's website and social media, and was advertised in the newspaper in past years.

"It is not intended to be a secret. We want people to know how property is zoned and how it can be used," Haney said.

Some residents in attendance expressed concern, however, about how the zoning might negatively impact the community. Patricia Gailey stated her concern for public health if the area is industrialized, specifically as it relates to the environment and quality of life. Gailey stated she heard there may be concerns about the water quality at Farristown Middle School as a result of industrial development in the area. Gailey urged the commission to reject the zone change. Commission Chair Betty Olinger, meanwhile, suggested the city should look into water quality issue.

Aaron Banther, whose family has deep roots in Farristown, stated the community is worth preserving, both for its historic value and its meaning to African American residents. "It might not mean something to a lot of people, but it means something to us, and it means something to the history of Berea and how John Fee discovered what we are at now."

Residents also expressed concern about the state of the bridge that leads into Farristown, which has been closed because it is breaking down. Commissioner Martin Richards thus attached an amendment to the zone change motion for the 87 acres, urging the city to do all it can to compel state officials to repair the bridge and improve public safety for Farristown residents.

The commission unanimously adopted the two recommendations, which are to be passed on for review and final approval by the Berea City Council. Both recommendations will come up for review in an upcoming meeting of the Berea City Council, Haney said.

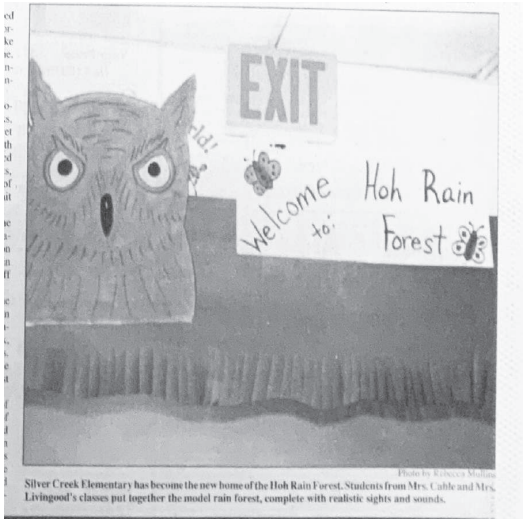

## May 11, 1922 Jackson County Road project assured

A delegation from Madison County, comprised of County Judge Goodloe, Messers, Kellogg, Turley, Zaring and Baxter from Richmond along with Merris, Gay, Stephens Dean and Clark went to Frankfort on Monday May 8, 1922, to meet with the State Highway Commission for the purpose of discussion a Jackson County Road project. After a conference of some length, the commission voted unanimously to approve the building of the road from Richmond to McKee. It was thought that the surveys would be made, and contracts let in time for the road work to begin in the spring of 1923. The exact location of the road would be determined by the engineers. It would probably be necessary for all landowners along the route to be decided on by engineers to give a free right of way through their property. It was the plan of the road commission to eventually extend the road from McKee through Manchester and Red Bird to Pineville. The project would be an enormous undertaking and would require three to four years for completion.

## May 18, 1972 Fort Sequoyah has been rejuvenated

When Fort Sequoyah in Livingston opened in the spring of 1972, the only way to recognize the attraction would be by the signs and even those would be different. Throughout the past winter months, the owner, Mr. and Mrs. Carlos Carloftis have been working with Loest and Stanley, Inc., to redevelop the attraction. The change is so complete that the site is now known as Fort Sequoyah Indian Village and Riverboat Town. The decision to renovate the attraction was made after Interstate 75 bypassed the Indian Village, causing serious loss in trade. It would have been possible to move the attraction as others did, but Mr. and Mrs. Carloftis decided not to. Like he said, "I believe we have something worth showing people, both tourists and our local friends. Fort Sequoyah is built right on the site of a real Indian village." After the Carloftis family decided to change the attraction, Loest and Stanley, Inc. studied the site and developed a comprehensive plan for an attrac-



tion that would be popular with tourists and local residents. Fort Sequoyah, the Indian village had taken on a new look, but real Indians were still very much a part of the attraction. What really stood out was the riverboat town and the "Rockcastle Queen," the riverboat. Instead of erecting a town just to erect tourists, the Carloftis family had scoured much of Eastern Kentucky collecting artifacts that could be displayed in the town. The town featured an actual post office built at the turn of the century, a bank general store, tavern, blacksmith shop, barber shop, doctor's office, schoolhouse along with several other structures. The "Rockcastle Queen" was an authentic replica of a paddle wheeler that once traveled the Mississippi River. The boat at Fort Sequoyah traversed the Rockcastle River, giving younger generations a chance to imagine themselves as Tom Sawyer's and Huck Finn's. Other changes included the addition of a restaurant, picnic facilities and a new craft shop which featured hand made Kentucky crafts.

## May 15, 1997 Silver Creek Elementary becomes Hoh Rain Forest

Traveling the halls of Silver Creek Elementary in the past few weeks were greeted by the peepers of a giant hoot owl that peered down on them from the top of a doorway, a spindly plastic black snake was also trailing down from the door frame. Would anyone dare to enter? Those who had an interest in rainforests and great elementary school artwork would! The halls were decorated with construction paper ducks, silver foil cloaked turtles, fish, and yet more snakes and paper flowers with petals in

full bloom. Each petal was marked with a student's name. Birds' nests, plants, and décor from the homes of student teachers added atmosphere. Ms. Cable and Ms. Livingood, the student teachers, played "nature sounds" music in the hallway on occasion for the full effect of being in a forest. Sometimes, they even turned the lights off for more mystery. This rain forest was the students' likeness of Hoh rainforest, a temperate rainforest in Washington State's Olympic National Park. "The word 'Hoh' is said to come from an Indian word meaning fast water. The rainforest has an average of 355 cm of rainfall a year, most of which falls between November and June," according to an informational poster that was on display. Judging by the paper animals on the walls, turtles in the Hoh are magnificent. Those created by the children were dotted with foil spots for a finer amphibian look. Spectacular, and why not? This was not a stereotypical rainforest based on an interesting fact that was explained on another poster. It explained the lines between a temperate rainforest as opposed to a tropical rainforest. "The forest is hot and dry in the summer. It snows in the Hoh rainforest during the winter, whereas the temperature in a tropical rainforest does not change within seasons.

## May 16, 1946 Berea telephone system sold

In accordance with the actions taken at a stockholder meeting of Associated Public Utilities Corporation on April 10, 1946, the General Telephone Corporation acquired the assets of the Associated Public Utilities Corporation. The Ashland Home Telephone Company, which operates 17 cities and towns in Kentucky, was a subsidiary of the Associated Public Utilities Corporation. The operation of Ashland Home Telephone properties would be directed, beginning May 15, 1946, by the General Telephone Corporation through the Lexington Telephone Company, which is also a subsidiary of the General Telephone Corporation. There was no change in the local personnel and the corporate name of the Ashland Home Telephone Company would continue to be used. Mr. Robert Gay would remain as district manager of the Lancaster district, and all other would continue in their previous positions.

# Weckman shares knowledge of search and rescue dogs

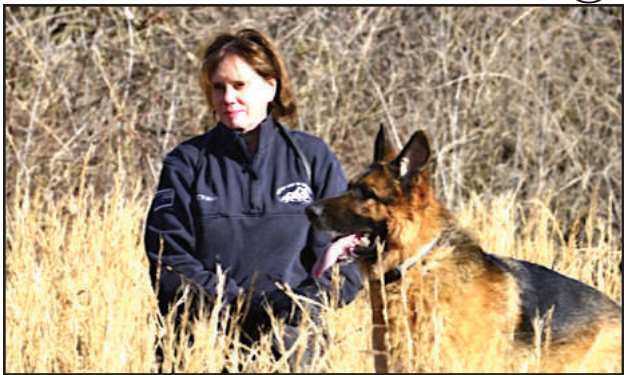
Judith Weckman, who is the Director of Institutional Research and Assessment at Berea College, shared information with which few are well informed.

With a love of the outdoors and dogs, Weckman began her intensive training. She explained the physiology of the dog which gives it olfactory abilities 40 times that of the human being. Not all dogs in this program are trained for finding both live and dead bodies as her German Shepherd Ki is.

Kentucky has less than 25 certified and trained volunteers with dogs.

Ninety percent of the bodies that are located are dead bodies. Weck-



man has written a book called, "The Last Child and Other Stories," which recounts her experiences on actual cases.

During the Q&A period she noted that it costs about \$25,000 to have and maintain such a dog. The dogs do not have to be pure bred breeds but most are. In situations where the trainer and dog do not agree the adage is "trust the dog."

## Calipari adds Thiero to class

LEXINGTON (KT) — Kentucky men’s basketball coach John Calipari added a third member to his current signing class on Monday with the addition of Adou Thiero.

Thiero joins Cason Wallace and Chris Livingston, both Top 10 prospects this fall. Thiero is a 6-foot-5, 180 combo guard who averaged 23.3 points, 10.3 rebounds and 5.9 assists per game, leading Quaker Valley to a 27-1 record and a 14-0 mark against league foes.

“Ever since I went to my first Kentucky men’s basketball camp I’ve wanted to go to Kentucky,” Thiero said. “My whole life I’ve been working to get here and when I got this opportunity, I knew I was going to take it because I just liked how Coach Cal is able to develop guys into pro players. He has always been great to his players and my dad played for him, so he had great things to say about him.

“I know Coach Cal and the staff will be able to help me get to where I want to be. This is a once in a lifetime opportunity and I can’t wait to get on campus and work to improve my game and help make this team better.”

Calipari welcomed the addition of Thiero.

“I am excited to have Adou join our program. He is a great kid who comes from a terrific family,” Calipari said. “Adou is a winner who fought through some adversity last summer and then led his team to the state championship game. Much like Dom (Hawkins) and Derek (Willis), Adou understands the grind and process of development here. “He knows nothing will be easy, but he has great size and has the makeup of the kind of guard who excels here, someone who can play on the ball or off and can finish at the rim in a variety of ways. I can’t wait to coach him and help him reach his goals.”

Thiero’s father, Almamy Thiero, played for Calipari at Memphis from 2003-06 and Mariam Sy Thiero who was drafted No. 33 overall by the Washington Mystics in 2006 after starring at Oklahoma City University.

maries to advance to the fall election.

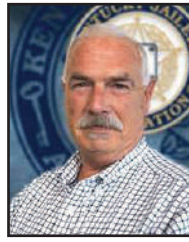

Republican Brian Combs defeated David Richardson (995-493) and will face Ben Robinson III in the fall for the District 1 Magistrate seat.

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# Council to hear more on Farristown zoning

Berea City Council members asked for more citizen input before casting a final vote on a proposed zone change in Farristown.

The request came during Tuesday's business meeting after the council heard the first reading of an ordinance that consolidates 87 acres and a 1.2-acre parcel into an industrial zone on Mene-la-us Road. Two thirds of the land has already been zoned industrial for years, however, some remaining plots are still zoned R-1 Residential and A-1 Agricultural. The city proposes changing the zoning to I-2, Industrial Park District.

Residents from Farristown, along with other citizens, have asked the city to reconsider the plan to turn the area into an industrial zone, citing the a potential impact on remaining Farristown residents as well as the need to preserve the neighborhood's unique history as an African American community.

"This is our history and we must respect that," said resident Aaron Banther, who stated the heritage of Farristown is valuable to people of all races. "That's before arts and crafts, the Spoonbread Festival – that's Berea and the principles upon which John Fee founded this area, which used to be called Glades."

After expressing concern about the potential environmental and safety impact of industrial development in the area,

Banther urged council members to see the community and consult Farristown residents before making a final decision.

Tuesday's discussion stems from a May 10 meeting of the Berea Planning Commission when that body unanimously voted to recommend the zone change to the Berea City Council. Some commissioners expressed sympathy with Farristown residents, but cited the need for jobs in the city. At that meeting, officials also noted there have been several opportunities for citizen input over the years, including widely publicized meetings concerning the drafting of the Berea Comprehensive Plan and the Future Land Use Map, both of which date back to 2015.

Berea City Council members Steve Caudill and Katie Startzman suggested hearing further input from citizens, at which point Caudill proposed a future work session before the city is required to cast a final vote.

On a related note, Farristown residents expressed concern about the now-condemned Farristown bridge, the closure of which forces emergency vehicles to take a much longer route to reach emergencies in Farristown. Berea Mayor Bruce Fraley noted that the city is actively lobbying state officials to do something about the broken bridge, but that it is part of a state road, and thus under the control of the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet. City officials

have urged citizens to join the city in contacting state authorities to voice their concerns.

In other news, the council unanimously adopted a resolution in support of a National Heritage Area Designation to preserve Kentucky wildlands and parts of rural Appalachia. Speaking in support of the resolution, Dr. John Fox cited the need to preserve areas for their historic and tourism value. Fox has spearheaded an effort to preserve pathways throughout Kentucky, including Boone Trace Trail, which was forged by Daniel Boone.

Also adopted unanimously by the council was a resolution endorsing a municipal road aid agreement between the city and the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet. The agreement provides for \$300,667 in funds for construction, reconstruction and maintenance of certain roads and bridges.

Tuesday's meeting also included the presentation of proclamations and recognitions. Codes Enforcement Administrator Amanda Haney accepted a proclamation declaring May 2022 as Building Safety Month in Berea. As part of Building Safety Month, codes and planning officials are encouraging citizens to ensure their house numbers are clearly displayed on their homes to ensure emergency services personnel can correctly locate addresses when police and fire departments, or Madison County EMS are called for assistance.

Meanwhile, Berea Public Works Director

Roy Curtis and his staff were honored as part of a proclamation for National Public Works Week, which runs May 15-21. Public works was honored for greatly contributing to the quality of life of the city, including maintaining city infrastructure, public areas, water ways, and other infrastructure that is vital to citizens.

Accepting a proclamation for Older Americans Month 2022 was local author Jeff Reuben, who is an advocate for policies that encourage a more inclusive community for local seniors. Reuben called for a continued recognition of the contributions of older citizens.

The council also ac-

cepted a recommendation from Public Works Director Curtis to purchase a used tractor mower and boom for \$127,000. Curtis said buying the equipment used would allow the city to benefit from the new equipment, but still save money. His request was unanimously approved.

Berea Municipal Utilities General Manager Kevin Howard and BMU staff were honored for

receiving the American Public Power Association award for reliability. The award is based on U.S. Energy Information Administration, and was awarded to BMU for a second year in a row, citing the utilities lack of outages as well as its ability to quickly recover power during emergencies.

The next Berea City Council business meeting is slated for June 7.

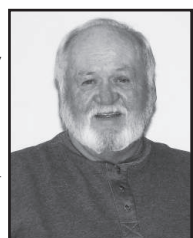

## Armed Forces Day history

On August 31, 1949, Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson announced the creation of an Armed Forces Day to replace separate Army, Navy and Air Force Days. The single-day celebration stemmed from the unification of the Armed Forces under one department -- the Department of Defense. Each of the military leagues and orders was asked to drop sponsorship of its specific service day in order to celebrate the newly announced Armed Forces Day. The Army, Navy and Air Force leagues adopted the newly formed day. The Marine Corps League declined to drop support for Marine Corps Day but supports Armed Forces Day, too.

In a speech announcing the formation of the day, President Truman "praised the work of the military services at home and across the seas" and said, "it is vital to the security of the nation and to the establishment of a desirable peace." In an excerpt from the Presidential Proclamation of Feb. 27, 1950, Mr. Truman stated:

"Armed Forces Day, Saturday, May 20, 1950, marks the first combined demonstration by America's defense team of its progress, under the National Security Act, towards the goal of readiness for any eventuality. It is the first parade of preparedness by the unified forces of our land, sea, and air defense".

The theme of the first Armed Forces Day was "Teamed for Defense." It was chosen as a means of expressing the unification of all the military forces under a single department of the government. Although this was the theme for the day, there were several other purposes for holding Armed Forces Day. It was a type of "educational program for civilians," one in which there would be an increased awareness of the Armed Forces. It was designed to expand public understanding of what type of job is performed and the role of the military in civilian life. It was a day for the military to show "state-of-the-art" equipment to the civilian population they were protecting. And it was a day to honor and acknowledge the people of the Armed Forces of the United States.

According to a New York Times article published on May 17, 1952: "This is the day on which we have the welcome opportunity to pay special tribute to the men and women of the Armed Forces ... to all the individuals who are in the service of their country all over the world. Armed Forces Day won't be a matter of parades and receptions for a good many of them. They will all be in line of duty and some of them may give their lives in that duty."

The first Armed Forces Day was celebrated by parades, open houses, receptions, and air shows. In Washington D.C., 10,000 troops of all branches of the military, cadets, and veterans marched past the President and his party. In Berlin, 1,000 U.S. troops paraded for the German citizens at Tempelhof Airfield. In New York City, an estimated 33,000 participants initiated Armed Forces Day "under an air cover of 250 military planes of all types." In the harbors across the country were the famed mothballed "battlegroups" of World War II, the Missouri, the New Jersey, the North Carolina, and the Iowa, all open for public inspection. Precision flying teams dominated the skies as tracking radar were exhibited on the ground. All across the country, the American people joined together to honor the Armed Forces.

Evil people will find a way to carry out their evil schemes. They will find a way to get guns or use cars, planes, trucks, fire or whatever to hurt others. The people killing people in



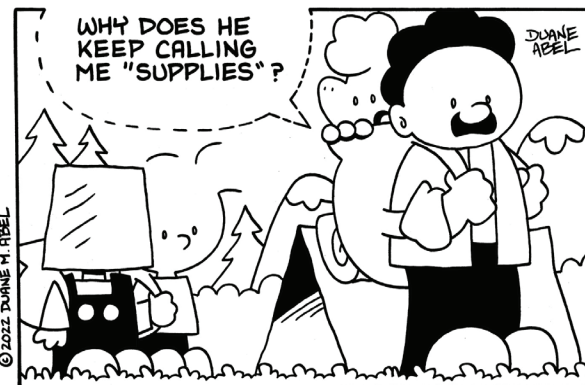
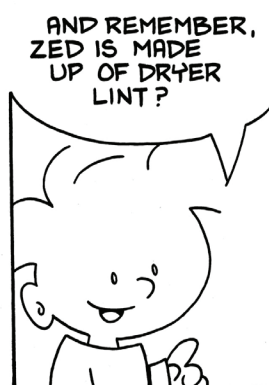

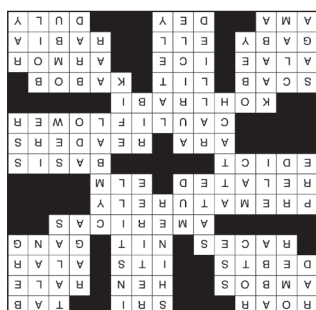

## May 18, 1922 Yeggmen flee with \$25,000

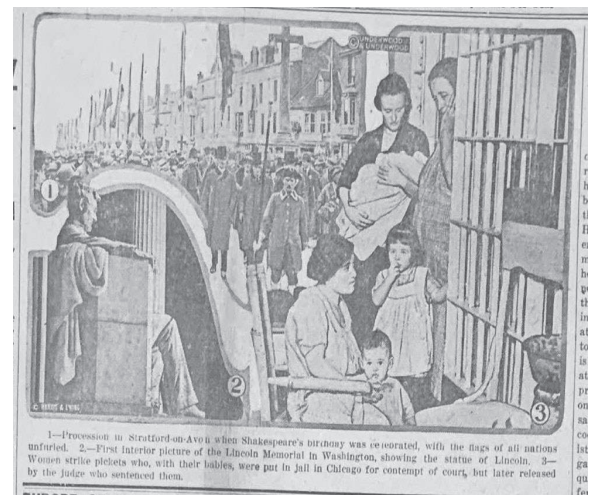
In one of the biggest and most daring robberies of its kind ever attempted in Cincinnati, six expert cracksmen, after binding and making prisoners of two watchmen, Sunday night, drilled one vault in the basement and with several charges of nitroglycerin blew open another vault in the offices on the sixth floor of the H and S. Poage Company's store. at Fourth and Race Street, one of Cincinnati's largest and most exclusive mercantile establishments. They obtained loot estimated in excess of \$25,000, most of which was in banknotes and currency of small denominations. In addition to the loot obtained, which represented part of Saturday's receipts for the store, the yeggmen in blowing the large the large office safe on the sixth floor, wherein, in addition to the large amount of cash, were also all of the important records and documents of the establishment. These items were damaged along with the safes, office equipment and goods on display on the sixth floor. The estimated damage to the floor was \$15,000

## May 23, 1946 Berea Taxi Lines Combine Service

Mr. D.W. Rice disposed of the taxi business which he operated for so long in Berea to Mr. D. Frank Carter. Shortly after making the purchase, Mr. Carter made arrangements to transfer the Rice interests to the K-Taxi Service, bringing the total taxis on call to four. The K-Taxi business was started a few months ago when Neal Kavanaugh and his brother Marvin opened the service. Later Neal Kavanaugh disposed of his interests to E.E. Gabbard, who had been actively engaged in the operation of the business. The consolidation brings together the only such local services operated in Berea and was to be operated out of the central location of the E.E. Gabbard Restaurant and would receive calls both day and night for local and distant trips.

## May 18, 1972 BCS organizes Beta Club chapter

A chapter of the National Beta Club, a leadership service organization for high school students was established on Wednesday, May 3, 1972, at the Berea Community School. The National Beta Club, with



more than 2,650 local chapters and about 102,000 members in high schools of 20 states, is now in its 38th year. Objectives of this non-secret, leadership service organization are to encourage effort, to promote character, to stimulate achievement among its members, and to encourage students to their education after high-school graduation. Carolyn Coffey, teacher of English at Berea Community was appointed as faculty sponsor for the chapter. Permanent officers for next year are Ann Adams, president. Mike Carter, vice-president; Liz Balke, treasurer; and Neena Ambrose, secretary. The third RCRA Class 2 Permit Modification, Alternative Management of Problematic GB Rounds in the Main Plant facility, is being submitted to KDEP for review and approval. All three Class 2 Permit Modification Requests are being submitted on May 12, 2022.

A 60-day public comment period will begin on the date of this notice. In addition, BGCAPP will host a public meeting on June 9, 2022 at 6:30 pm at the Blue Grass Chemical Stockpile Outreach Office, 1000 Commercial Drive, Suite 2, Richmond, KY. Representatives from BGCAPP will be present to answer questions and discuss the proposed revisions and modifications. their high school years. When asked how significant of an impact the pandemic had on her as a student, Morgan replied, “Adjusting to pandemic life as a high schooler was definitely difficult. Managing thoughts about missing out on memories and activities with friends during what was supposed to be the most memorable time of my life was something I had to deal with and accept. However, it made me and my classmates appreciate the time we did have together in person all the more.” When reflecting on if there were any positives of the pandemic, Morgan said, “Being able to do schoolwork in my pajamas was a huge perk, I was able to create somewhat of my own schedule during

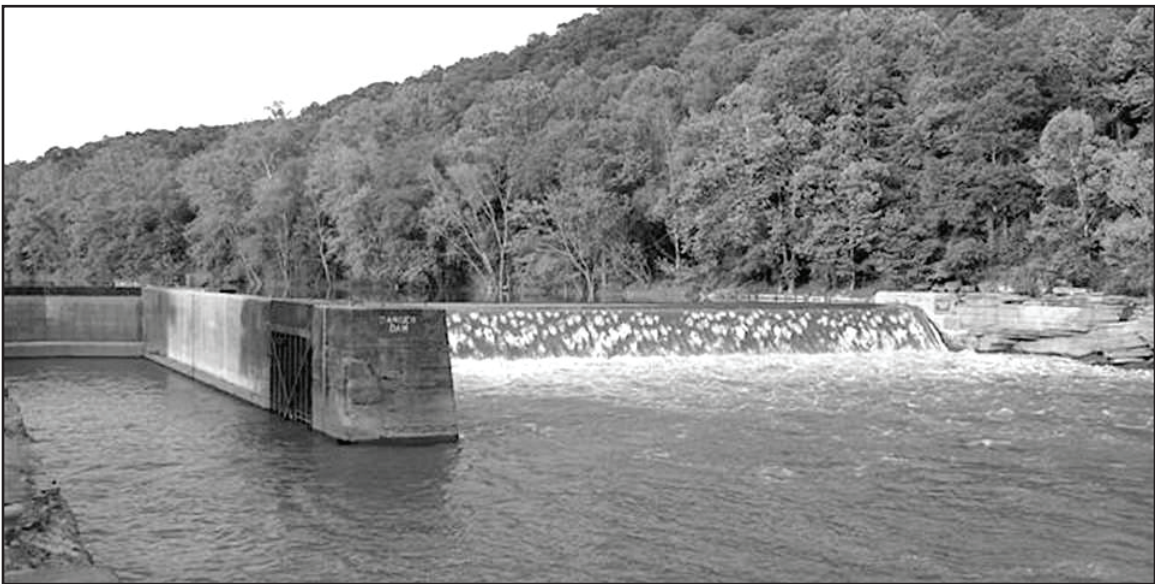
the virtual school day and that helped me stay motivated and productive.” Thankfully some normalcy has returned this school year, including an in-person graduation and Morgan is pleased. She said, “Because of the pandemic me and my classmates are extremely grateful for any in person activities we are able to do. hardships for students, especially those in high school. When asked about those trying times, Morgan said, “I’ve always been a pretty social person. and trying to learn in a virtual atmosphere where nobody had their cameras on or talked during the classes besides the teacher was very hard at first. For sports, it didn’t change much but it also changed everything. Practices ran pretty much the same but we had to wear masks which was very hard, especially because I played basketball which means I was running the entire time. Games were the part that was weird. I went from playing in a mostly full gym to seeing only a couple of parents from each team. every game had the feel of a scrimmage.” Despite the challenges, Morgan could label some powerful positives in the situation. “COVID created a lot of challenges for me at the school,” he said. “We started learning virtually and through a whole new learning platform that I had never used before. But

I stuck with it and figured out the best way to use the given circumstances to become the best student I could be with what I had. The process of ‘sticking through the mud’ was probably the most beneficial experience I had in high school.” Morgan plans to attend Western Kentucky University and study Psychology. In the meantime, he is excited that his graduation will be in-person Friday night. “Ceremonies like graduation virtual feels less real and stale,” he said. “While the in-person ceremony will be a lot more emotion-filled and interesting.” When asked if he has any advice for peers in middle school or high school, he said, “Everyone has something that is hard to get past in school. It could be a certain subject or a teacher or anything. The value in learning to overcome those obstacles and adapt instead of just giving up is more valuable than the actual subject matter in most cases. For me it was math. I had a friend help me with most of my math homework for my first two years of high school and in my senior year, I was a math tutor because I never gave up.”



# Berea College to build 2nd Hydroelectric plant

HEIDELBERG – Berea College is building on the success of the Matilda Hamilton Fee Hydroelectric Station at Lock 12 on the Kentucky River by partnering with Appalachian Hydro Associates to build a second hydropower plant 35 miles upstream at Lock and Dam 14 near Heidelberg in Lee County.

In 2021, Berea College became the first higher education institution in the nation to complete construction of a hydroelectric generating plant, located on the Kentucky River near Ravenna.

Lock 14—like Lock 12—was originally built and used for navigation and was abandoned in the mid-1990s. The dam currently is used for water supply and to maintain the river for recreational use.

In January, the Berea College Board of Trustees gave the go-ahead for the second project.

“As the Matilda Hamilton Fee Hydroelectric Station project matured, and as we started to receive returns on our investment, our Board of Trustees permitted us to proceed with this second project,” said Berea College President Lyle Roelofs. “I like to say that every molecule of water will work twice for us once we get the second project up and running.”

The Lock 12 project—the first new small hydro project built in Kentucky in 94 years—allowed Berea Col-

lege and its partner Appalachian Hydro Associates to learn valuable lessons that are being carried over to the new project. Additionally, new equipment options and design concepts are available, allowing Lock 14 to produce 30 percent more power. The new project will still incorporate many important features demonstrated at Lock 12, such as submersible turbine-generators to handle the huge floods on the Kentucky River and construction in the abandoned lock chamber to eliminate the need for a large cofferdam, which is typical in most hydro-plant construction.

With this second project, the existing electrical usage of Berea College will be more than entirely offset by hydropower.

“With our new project at Lock 14, Berea College is once again demonstrating its commitment to environmental sustainability,” Roelofs said. “With these two projects, we are not just teaching our students about the value of renewable, carbon-free energy generation. These projects demonstrate our commitment to Appalachian communities as we deliver on our commitment to mindful and sustainable living.

“We can do something that’s operationally sustainable, we can be a model for other organizations, and we can do something that will benefit the economy in the counties that have

been hampered by national changes in the economy,” he added.

Other agencies and firms involved in the project include the Kentucky River Authority, Jackson Energy Cooperative, Wright Concrete & Construction of Pikeville, Rimar Electric of Winchester, Modern Welding of Kentucky, Kleinschmidt Group and Voith.

The new Lock 14 powerhouse will be placed in the existing lock chamber and constructed out of reinforced concrete. The powerhouse will be 52 feet wide and 18.5 feet long.

Unlike the powerhouse at Lock 12, the new powerhouse will employ a submerged horizontal trash rack, with the upper pool being maintained with a movable spillway so there is no part of the powerhouse visible above the lock chamber. The spillway can be lowered to allow the river to flush downstream any debris that builds up.

The powerhouse will contain six Voith StreamDiver submersible turbine-generator units, consisting of four 14.9 StreamDiver axial flow 1490-millimeter propeller turbines directly coupled to a 645-kilowatt permanent magnet generator and two 8.95 StreamDiver axial flow 895-millimeter propeller turbines directly coupled to a 225-kilowatt permanent magnet generator. The total output of the plant will be 3,030 kilowatts.

a Republican, edged Ashlie Hatton in the District 2 Magistrate race (752 to 603) and will replace incumbent Roger Barger on the court. Barger opted not to run for another term. Steven Kelly garnered 304 votes in the three-person race. Tudor beat Marty Sewell (723 to 431) in the District

3 Magistrate Democratic race and will face former magistrate Billy Ray Hughes (GOP) in November. Hughes defeated James Ebert (894 to 471) in the primary. Botkin beat Andrew “Pickle” Simpson 1,086 to 622 and will face Democrat Debbie Vescio in the fall. State Senator Jared Carpenter defeat GOP challenger Rhonda Goode 4,996 to 1,365.

Madison County Clerk Kenny Barger, County Attorney Jennie Haymond, County Surveyor Stuart Spencer, Coroner Jimmy Cornelison are unopposed and will retain their seats in January. The squad will travel to Sao Paulo, Campinas and Valinhos during the trip. They also will conduct clinics for local youth and take on Paul Met-

ters, one of the top clubs in Brazil. Ware will be a junior next season and has played in 49 games in his first two seasons with the Wildcats. Watkins, a walk-on, has provided a valuable presence in practice in his first two seasons at Kentucky.

## Mistake led to arrest warrant

LEXINGTON (KT) – A warrant was issued for Kentucky football player Chris Rodriguez who failed to appear at a scheduled court date Friday afternoon but UK officials have said the mistake was made by his attorneys.

Judge Denotra Gunter issued a warrant for Rodriguez's arrest and added a \$200 fine.

Kentucky spokesperson Susan Lax said school officials "have confirmed with Chris' attorneys that this was a scheduling mistake in their office."

"Chris was specifically advised by his attorneys not to

attend (the hearing) because they (the attorneys) would (attend on his behalf)," she said. "They are working diligently to get it corrected."

Rodriguez was charged with DUI (first offense), careless driving and driving with no tail lamps. Rodriguez was pulled over by police at 3:15 a.m. Sunday morning after he was observed driving without his taillights turned on.

According to the citation, the vehicle wasn't "maintaining its designed operating lane" and it took a "delayed amount of time" for the vehicle to pull over. Rodriguez was observed

with "red and watery (eyes and) his speech was slurred" and smelled of alcohol. He was arrested and admitted to consuming "one or two shots" of alcohol, according to the citation.

Rodriguez is poised to become Kentucky's all-time leading rusher next season and is the Southeastern Conference leading returning rusher next season. He rushed for 1,379 yards and nine touchdowns to lead the Wildcats to a 10-3 record and a win over Iowa in the Citrus Bowl.

Former Kentucky Miss Basketball Maddie Scherr, who was a five-star recruit out of Ryle High School in Florence, Kentucky, has announced she is transferring from Oregon to Kentucky, joining an impressive reloaded roster for Kentucky women's basketball head coach Kyra Elzy. Scherr, who officially signed with the Wildcats on Saturday, will have three years of eligibility remaining with the 2022-23 season being her junior season collegiately.

Scherr is the 10th newcomer that Kentucky will welcome to the 2022-23 roster, joining Buffalo graduate transfer Adebola Adeyeye (Brampton, ON, Canada), four-star guard Kennedy Cambridge (Nashville, Tennessee), four-star post Tionna Herron (DeSoto, Texas), Miss Kentucky Basketball Amiya Jenkins (Law-

renceburg, Kentucky), LSU transfer Ajae Petty (Baltimore, Md.), in-state star guard Cassidy Rowe (Virgie, Kentucky), South Carolina transfer Eniya Russell (Baltimore, Md.), All-Ohio performer Zennia Thomas (Lyndhurst, Ohio) and four-star guard Saniah Tyler (Florissant, Missouri).

"We are ecstatic to welcome Maddie Scherr back home to Kentucky," Elzy said. "Maddie becoming a Wildcat is huge for our program. 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## BCS teachers, staff to receive 3 percent pay hike

The Berea Independent Board of Education adopted the 2022-2023 operating budget during a recent meeting, giving teachers and staffers a three-percent pay hike. Board members said they wish the raise could be higher.

"I'd love to give the teachers what they want, but we don't have the money," said board member Tom McCay, noting the district would likely have to raise taxes to pay for a bigger increase.

Board Chair Van Gravitt acknowledged that the increase doesn't do enough to help faculty and staff keep up with

inflation, which has surged in recent months. However, he noted the increase is still more than has been done in the past. "That's the biggest increase since I've been on the board," Gravitt said. "If we did five-percent we might have to be borrowing money from somebody." The pay boost will raise the

overall cost of the payroll by approximately \$69,000, said Tompkins.

"I'd love to pay everybody what they want," Finance Director Tony Tompkins said. "But financially, that's all we can afford. Looking at the budget we're already pretty

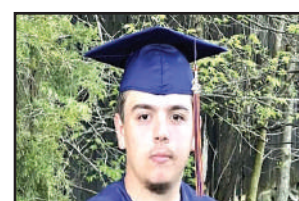

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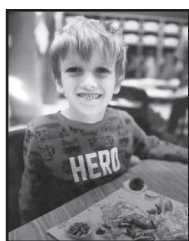

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## We can do better, Madison County

When I registered to vote when I turned 18, I had no idea what political party best suited me at the time. I was young, just graduated high school and facing an undecided future. That was in 1989, back when Madison County was predominately composed of Democrats and no color schemes were used to determine the political parties. That was before opinions were shaped by whether you were a Democrat or a Republican.

When Joe King handed me a voter registration card to fill out, he basically informed me it would be best to register as a Democrat so I could vote in the primary each May. I had no idea what he meant at the time, but as I began to vote in primary and general elections, I understood what he meant. I didn't matter. I couldn't wait to "pull the lever" and cast my vote and counted it an honor to vote in an election after watching my dad cast his vote in each and every election. I watched and learned. The more I took part in the process, the more I looked at the candidate as opposed to the party affiliation and it became secondary. For more

than three decades, I have voted for Democrats and Republicans — person over party. A lot has changed since the 1980s. Madison County has more registered Republicans (35,360) than Democrats (30,485). I'm not sure what the figures were when I became eligible to vote, but I'm pretty sure it was 3-1 in favor of the Democrats. Today, there are 74,232 registered voters in Madison County an impressive number, considering the population of Richmond and Berea is more than 90,000. That means a large number of residents are registered votes. Although we have a lot of registered voters in Madison County, for whatever

reason, voter turnout is embarrassing low, especially during the primaries, which determine the field for the general election every four years. Only 11,580 voters bothered to vote in the May primary, despite the option of early voting for three days prior to in-person voting last Tuesday. Only 1,903 voters took advantage of the early option and 486 absentee ballots were cast. In-person voting remains the most popular option for voters and 9,191 votes were placed on Election Day. Voter turnout was 15 percent, which 18 percent of Republicans and 15 percent of those registered as Democrats turning up at the polls last week.

The numbers don't lie. It's a shame that so few people bothered to vote, considering larger venues were used instead of precinct locations in Madison County. Berea voters were given the option to vote at the Folk Center or the Berea Church of God and both locations provided ample space for voters. Some countries, especially communist nations, such as China and Russia, don't give their citizens the option to choose when it comes to leadership at the local, state and national level. That's why I always take the time to vote and exercise my freedom to choose at the polls. We can do better, Madison County.

## Recipe from the heart

### Greek Pasta Salad

**Ingredients**  
•For the salad  
1 1.2 cups, (9-10 ounces) orzo pasta  
1/4 red onion (about 1/3 cup) diced small  
1 red bell pepper, chopped small  
2 Tablespoons fresh oregano  
15 ounce can chickpeas, drained  
1/3 cup Kalamata olives, sliced  
2 cups thin skinned cucumbers, chopped small  
1 pint cherry tomatoes, halved or quartered  
1/2 cup fresh parsley, finely chopped  
1/4 cup fresh basil  
6 - 8 ounces feta cheese  
•For the dressing  
1/4 cup red wine vinegar  
1/4 cup lemon juice  
1 teaspoon dijon mustard  
2 cloves of garlic, pressed or mined  
2 teaspoons dried oregano  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon black pepper  
1/2 cup olive oil

**Directions**  
Cook pasta according to package directions in salted  
water. Drain and rinse with cool water. Set aside  
Make the dressing by whisking together red wine  
vinegar, lemon juice, dijon mustard, garlic, dried  
oregano, salt, and black pepper. Drizzle in olive oil  
while whisking constantly to emulsify.  
Add diced onion and 1/2 cup of the dressing to a  
large bowl. Allow them to marinate while preparing  
the remaining ingredients.  
Add peppers along with oregano, chick peas and Ka-  
lamata Olives. Add cucumbers, tomatoes and parsley.  
Toss altogether. Add cooked pasta. 14 cup more  
dressing and cubed feta cheese. Mix gently.  
Taste and adjust flavor by adding more dressing, salt,  
pepper and a squeeze of lemon if needed.  
Toss with basil just before serving.

Highway to be designated in honor of ‘Mac’ Byrd

By action of the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet and the City of Berea, a portion of Kentucky Route 21 will be designated the “Captain Hugh M. “Mac” Byrd, Jr. Memorial Highway.”

Captain Byrd was a native of Berea and served during the Vietnam War as a member of the 1st Aviation Brigade, 220th Aviation Company. He piloted an aircraft known as the “Bird Dog,” a small Cessna used for reconnaissance and forward air control.

On January 9th, 1969, Captain Byrd was returning to his home base when his aircraft was lost in action.

His remains were never located and he is among the Vietnam War’s Missing in Action.

He was survived by wife, Elaine Seales Byrd and daughter Scott. It is proper and fitting that Captain Byrd’s sacrifice be honored by the

designation of a portion of Kentucky Highway 21 in his name.

Ashton McPherson, DPT, Lexi’s Occupational Therapist, said, “Lexi is a sweet and happy girl who loves physical therapy tasks and has an active imagination. She is working on gross motor skills including bike riding and outdoor play.”

Bluegrass Ambucs has been serving Kentucky since 2015. The presentation of the Amtryke to Lexi was the 185th adaptive bike presented to children in the Kentucky.

## Mathematic equations good way to test mental capacity

Maybe you remember the story about the three little old men who decided they'd go together to the doctor to have their mental capacity tested.

They shuffled slowly into the examination room where the doctor asked the first fellow: "What's three times three?"

"That's easy ... 101," he responded.

The doctor, with a look of concern, then turned to the second fellow and asked: "What's three times three?"

"Three times three is Wednesday," he answered.

The doctor shook his head sadly and turned to the third man. "What's three times three," he asked.

"Nine," the old fellow answered.

"That's great," the doctor said. "How did you get your answer?"

"Simple," he said. "I subtracted 101 from Wednesday."

Those fellows certainly had a unique approach to mathematics. Unfortunately, it was an entirely wrong approach.

You realize, wrong approaches aren't limited to math equations. All too often it extends to spiritual matters, as well.

That's why the Apostle Peter issued a strong warning to doubters. In his day, just as in ours, there were scoffers who doubted God's Word, who refused to trust in Christ, and who doubted that this world will one day come to a fiery end.

In Peter's day, some folks had pointed to all the years that have passed without the end having come.

"Beloved, be not ignorant of this one thing, that one day is with the Lord as a thousand years, and a thousand years as one day," Peter wrote. "The Lord is not slack concerning his promise, as some men count slackness, but is longsuffering to us-ward, not willing that any should

perish, but that all should come to repentance. But the day of the Lord will come as a thief in the night; in the which the heavens shall pass away with a great noise, and the elements shall melt with fervent heat, the earth also and the works that are therein shall be burned up" (2 Peter 3:8-10)

Such a dire warning warrants serious consideration.

Peter urged the people of his day, as well as of ours, to decide how they should live their lives in light of that truth: "Seeing then that all these things shall be dissolved, what manner of persons out ye to be? (2 Peter 3:11).

He supplied the answer: "Be diligent that ye may be found of Him in peace, without spot, blameless. (2 Peter 3:14).

That's clear enough for even mathematically challenged old men to understand.

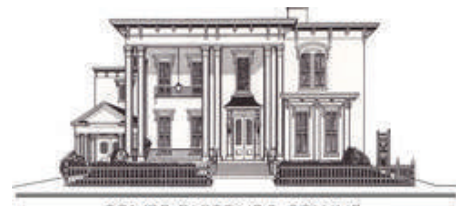

# Make memories with loved ones while you can

Over the course of the past few weeks, this column has been difficult to write. As such, I took a small break. The blame for this break in my writing fell on my doctoral studies, or feeling as though the busi-ness of the day-to-day world had worn me into feeling as though there was just no extra time to devote to writing.

Ultimately, those were excuses. They were excuses to cover just how difficult it is sometimes to share experiences from my own life that are relatable to readers in my community or serve as reminders of days past. There are moments when the memories shared here feel distant to me because of how long ago they occurred. I yearn, at times, to keep them in the privacy of my own mind as they are often the last of their kind in my small world. The thought of others questioning them or doubting their existence in reality often bothers me, because I realize that as much as people think they know about the lives of others, often every moment cannot be accounted for and known by outsiders - no matter their proximity to the events.

During the break in my writing, I received several messages from people who read my column that were missing its presence. I profoundly appreciated those messages, and they brought about the stark realization that, despite the questioning of others, this column serves a purpose. While I may share memories of my own with some small lesson that I obtained from the experience, often my memories remind people of what Kirksville was once like.

Kirksville once was a true community. We knew most of our neighbors, we had regular experiences and gatherings, our families worked together and lived near one another, community members shared meals together...it was the best of the best. Do not misunderstand me, we are still a strong community and there are still moments like those. However, it is not the same. I think that is why so often people who live here enjoy my columns- they can live in the past for a moment with people who are no longer with us, in days and times that feel brighter and more simplistic in nature.

In some ways I think the pandemic tore into our ability to remain tied together so well, but I also think death played an enormous part in that. There are people who naturally bring others together. I know that in my own family the death of my grandparents have left many of us on a limb and feeling isolated from the life we’ve always known. They were the ties that bound us together.

In the words of my father, “my bubble got smaller” when they passed away and became a handful of people.

In recent weeks, I have driven past the store and longed for the days that I could walk in and see my dad, my papaw, my uncles and aunts, our family friends, and join them for a meal without invitation or cause.

I have longed for the days that I was working in flower beds for Dr. and Mrs. Coy while my grandfather mowed and my dad toiled in the shop ... because that was my life during the summer from the time that I was in high school until I was 25 years-old.

In Winter and Early spring I tagged along because they were also my transportation to college daily. These times and experiences afforded me the opportunities to make the memories and lessons that I share here. However, some of the best ones I keep to myself. The best memories are the ones that made such an impact that words cannot do them justice. They are the memories that evoke so much emotion it would not be possible to share them.

I am thankful for my few years with my grandfather that I was afforded several of those opportunities with him - just the two of us or the three of us with my father.

I share what I can here - what will be thought provoking, or encourage the surfacing of a forgotten memory for those in my community.

However, we mustn’t forget that the connections we have to the past shape our present. Using these memories to make more with others is equally important. Make memories with your families and loved ones while you can, and ensure they are the lasting memories where words cannot adequately explain their importance to your life’s story.

## Berea Citizen archives

May 25, 1922

### Madison County prompts meeting to discuss rights of tax commission

At the instigation of Madison County Judge Doak, County Judge of Fayette County, called a meeting of the County Judges of the Bluegrass whose assessments ha been rejected by the State Tax Commission, to reconsider the question of the State Tax Commission’s right to arbitrarily force the County Boards of Equalization to raise the assessment of a county, and the Commission’s right to re-assess any county. The meeting was called by County Judge Doak, of Fayette County in his office in Lexington, Kentucky on May 17, 1922, with Fayette, Madison, Boyle, Garrard, Clark, Shelby and Scott counties present and after a general discussion of the situation, Judge Goodloe of Madison County suggested the meeting be organized and put in nomination Judge Doak, of Fayette County as chairman, which was promptly seconded, assuming the chair temporarily. Judge Goodloe put the vote and Judge Doak was unanimously elected. Judge Doak, then taking the chair, J. P. Chenault was elected secretary, after being nominated by Judge Ward of Scott County. Judge Doak appointed a committee of one to employ the council and determine the proper mode of procedure and to confer with the State Tax Commission on the matter of getting the question before the Court of Appeals as promptly as possible. A number of other counties were unable to be present but signified their desire to cooperate with the committee.

May 30, 1946

### Book on Berea published

Charles T. Morgan of Centenary College in Shreveport, Louisiana, had just written a new book entitled, “The Fruit of This Tree,” which is a history of Berea College, giving a background of Berea’s influence both locally and nationally. It dealt with Berea’s educational contribution in a changing world, in the light of social and economic changes. The book was being printed by Kingsport Press in Kingsport, Tennessee and would be on sale in Berea the following week. The book contained 288 pages with an introduction of Bruce Barton of New York, a former student and trustee of Berea College. The paper jacket for the book was designed by a seventeen-year-old student from Centenary College by the name of Jack Winegaeart. This was Mr. Morgan’s second book, the first of which was entitled, “Flickering Lights,” printed in Berea.

May 25, 1972

### High School Diplomas to be awarded to 75 seniors

Seventy-five young Bereans received their high school diplomas during commencement

exercised held in the Berea Community school gym. The Honorable Julian M. Carroll, the Lieutenant Governor of Kentucky delivered the commencement address. Ralph W. Beiting, pastor of St. Clare Catholic church of-fered invocation and benediction during the program and James K. Miller, principal of the high school presided over the proceedings. Dr. Dwight L. Blackburn, chairman of the Berea Board of Education awarded diplomas to graduates. The high school band performed at the ceremony. Martha Chrisman performed Brahms’ Intermezzo in A Major and Mrs. Homer Jennings sang Albert Malotte’s setting for The Lord’s Prayer.

### Teacher, friend Nicholson honored

Kingston Elementary students, faculty and friends took time out to remember one of their own. Mrs. Mary Nicholson, a long-time teacher at the school passed away in early May due to cancer. Nicholson was a seventeen-year teaching veteran with eight of those years being at Kingston Elementary. With everyone gathered at the school’s flagpole, school counselor, Jo Luxon presented the young holly tree that had been planted in memory of Nicholson. She recalled the story of how Nicholson would have let her class collect cans throughout the school year. At the end of the school year the cans were recycled, and the money raised was used to buy trees to plant in the school yard. Luxon explained that the holly tree was selected because it is pretty year-round, with red berries in the winter. “Now, every time we look out and see this tree, we can think of Ms. Nicholson,” Luxon conveyed to the group, fighting to hold back tears. I want to salute the teachers at Kingston Elementary for the fantastic job they do. In my daughters’ time there, I still remember a few quotes. In Preschool, Mrs. Morman had an often-repeated directive. “Use your words, not your hands.” She and her aide, Mrs. J. Murphy, were so very patient and kind. It was hard to get all the kids settled and sitting crisscross applesauce on the carpet. That was back when Preschool was half day, and there were two energetic classes each day.

I think I remember Mrs. Parks instructing pupils, “You get what you get, and you don’t throw a fit.” That was doubtless due to years of experience dealing with kids. There isn’t always enough time or resources for everyone to have their first choice.

Mrs. Pitts was one hardworking principal. It seemed she attended every extracurricular event and kept an eye on everything

going on. She certainly inspired confidence. My daughters had many teachers that were dear to them at Kingston. ## Rotary Report

Following the successful Election Day pancake breakfast, Berea Rotary had a regular meeting with Dr. Lyle Roelf of Berea College as speaker. Since his retirement will be soon, he shared a decade of what has occurred during his presidency. He spoke of new buildings, improved national standing, a continued carefully managed endowment, and innovations. Two of the latter have been spotlighted in the Citizen since both deal with sustainability of a popular “green” environment. One is the horse logging for sustainability forest management that involves new work skills for students. The other is the hydroelectric generating station on the Kentucky River at Lock #12.

The plan involves a financial investment with a secure return for the college while it helps provide electricity for the community. This project began with two thoughtful engineers, Bob Fairchild and David Kinlock, who reached out to the college for a cooperative effort.

This has materialized with the skills and talents of Bob and David, and, in great part, to the open mind of Dr. Roelf and his board of trustees. It has the potential to become a model for other colleges and universities. Dr. Roelf gave thoughtful responses during the Q&A session for the inquisitive Rotarians.

Both the breakfast and the meeting were held at the Parish Hall of the Methodist Church.

Both the meeting and lunch were hosted by President-Elect Sune Frederiksen. Treasurer Marty Wayland announced that the fund-raising breakfast netted \$1,141 for next year’s scholarships.

Rotary partners, Patty Davis and Nancy Scarlett were present.

# Broadband expansion enters its next phase

Madison County announced Friday its entering the next phase of the countywide broadband expansion project with a broadband validation survey for unserved residents. In March, the County developed a partnership with All Points Broadband (APB) to assist in identifying each address in Madison County who is currently unserved with high speed internet.

A field survey was the first phase of the countywide broadband expansion to bring high quality and affordable broadband to every citizen in the county. APB has completed their field survey and is now validating the address data through a Madison Connect Lookup Tool at [fiber.allpointsbroadband.com](https://fiber.allpointsbroadband.com).

APB was selected by Madison County to determine the specific number and list of addresses in the county that need to be served; develop a comprehensive deployment strategy and apply for state and federal grant funding.

Madison County and APB will focus on areas where residents must use satellite, DSL, cell phones or mobile hot spots, which do not provide adequate speed and data for today's technology. The relationship with APB is a great compliment to supporting existing Internet providers in AT&T, Spectrum and Windstream who all continue to expand their fiber networks and already serve many parts of Madison County.

In order to ensure all areas of Madison County have broadband availability, the expansion will require state and federal financial support and a multi-year construction timeframe.

"Broadband is a topic we hear about from our citizens on a daily basis," Reagan Taylor, Madison County Judge/Executive said. "We have to get this right and use our dollars wisely. We don't want anyone left out. That's why we are being so diligent and using data to make these decisions. It doesn't work if we invest in this expansion and there are still areas of the county unserved. Our goal is access with fiber network for every citizen regardless of how rural you may be."

conversation around the 'why.' And in the communication world, the 'why' drives everything we do. Why are we here? What is our purpose? What drives us? And so, some of that comes from our mission, vision, and values."

Williams added that it was time to write down the mission, vision, and values for Madison County government employees.

"Our mission is who we are, that is what we value," she said. "Our vision is what we want to become, and our values are guiding principles. That's kind of what we live by. We are asking the court to include that in our administrative code this year for the first time."

When drafting the mission, vision, and value statements, Williams said that two different terms stood out when reviewing comments and feedback from the employee engagement survey — to serve and community. Those terms became foundational building blocks for the mission statement.

The mission was read as follows: "Our mission is Madison County Government, it's elected representatives, and employees are committed to enhancing the safety,

education, economic well-being, and quality of life for all citizens by providing public services in a physically responsible and efficient manner. The county will operate in a manner that is worthy of public trust and embraces innovation, diversity, and collaboration in meeting citizen and community needs. The county government recognizes its stewardship role and strives to do what's right, work as a team, and get results." The new Vision statement reads, "To improve Madison County every day, for every citizen." Williams believes that all employees can relate to that vision. She said, "I think we can all relate to that (vision). That is why we are in the world of public service and that's why we are all in this thing...this environment." When discussing the values statement, Williams assures it goes back to the word 'serve.' The Values statement reads, "Service, Educating our Citizens, Responsible Stewardship & Efficiency, Valuing Transparency, and Integrity, Experience." The Values spell out S.E.R.V.E.

lean on administration and operations."

Board member Jackie Burnside, meanwhile, lamented the fact that while the federal government gave local governments extra funds to boost the pay of police and fire personnel, teachers should have also received additional funding.

Board member Della Justice said that while she appreciated the district increasing pay for instructors, she said there is still a disparity in compensation between athletic coaches and instructors who teach in the arts, including dance, music and other

fine arts. With that, Justice encouraged Superintendent Diane Hatchett to boost salaries of those who teach in the arts, and thus demonstrate that the arts are valued by the board.

Overall, the district is projecting an operating budget for fiscal year 2022-2023 of \$13,532,095, with salaries reaching \$10,436,184. Over 68-percent of the district budget is dedicated to instruction, according to a summary presented by Tompkins.

Tompkins noted that overall spending per student will increase in the forthcoming budget when the district receives Support Education Excellence in Kentucky (SEEK) funds from the Ken-

tucky Department of Education. Per student spending will increase slightly from \$4,000 to \$4,100. Overall, Berea schools are projected to receive \$5,804,317 in SEEK funds next year.

Concerning student enrollment Tompkins said the school is expected to have between 1,006 and 1,021 enrolled next year.

Tompkins cautioned that some steep expenditures may be ahead for Berea Independent Schools, including sharp increases in fuel costs. On a related note, Tompkins noted Superintendent Hatchett completed a deal to trade for two used school buses for \$1,500. "That seriously saved about \$200,000 on some of these buses." Tompkins said.

He noted that while the district has eyed hybrid buses as a solution to rising fuel costs, hybrids actually end up costing more in maintenance so far.

At Monday's business meeting, Hatchett announced that the choice for middle school principal would soon be revealed. Casey Poynter was officially appointed to the job the next day, having served in the position on an interim basis.

Also unanimously adopted Monday were a pair of policies amending district policies. The policies are meant to ensure administrators and staff treat parents and the public with courtesy in the course of their duties.

In other action, the board

retained the legal services of Fowler Bell PLLC and Guy Colson as corporate counsel.

Turning to technology, a staff member announced the district will be investing \$180,000 in network upgrades at school facilities, citing a steep increase in the number of devices the network is supporting. Officials said because of the proliferation of both computer tablets for instruction and students carrying cell phones, there are six times as many devices on the district's network compared to when the network was previously upgraded.

The next meeting of the Berea Independent Board of Education is slated for June 20.

## Thomas embraces 2nd PGA crown

The second one was sweeter for Justin Thomas. The former Louisville St. Xavier and University of Louisville standout added a second PGA Championship to his list of accomplishments on Sunday after storming back from a 7-shot deficit to defeat Will Zalatoris in a thrilling playoff at Southern Hills Country Club Sunday.

For Thomas, it was his second major championship, both PGA titles. He captured his first PGA crown at Quail Hollow five years ago but his second one ended a long drought. He won the Players Championship more than a year ago before Sunday's improbable rally.

"At this point any of them is great — I don't care which one it is," he said. "As (quarterback) Tom Brady always says, your favorite Super Bowl is your next one, and that's what my favorite major is."

In a field of unknown contenders seeking their first PGA title, Thomas used his past experiences to overcome a seven-hole deficit during the final round.

"I've matured a lot," he said. "Five years is a long time, especially at this stage of my life. I would like to think and hope that everything has just gotten a little better. There's nothing that's like standing out of a massive difference. I would say the biggest difference is I probably just weigh about 15 pounds more, I don't know — I've put on some weight."

Thomas also strives to keep improving amid his success at Southern Hills last weekend.

"The big part of it is you just want to get 1 percent better," he said. "I don't need to revamp everything. I don't need to hit it 30 yards farther. I don't need to change equipment, change ball, change -- it's just everything that I have and been doing has been working. It's just trying to just get it a little bit better. I just feel like that's what I've done in every facet. There's nothing that stands out, like this is monumentally better. But it's all improved."

As he gains more experience as a seasoned professional golfer, Thomas understands the level of difficulty it takes to succeed on the golf course. He added that "it's just so hard to win."

"I legitimately think it's harder to win now than it was when I first came out on Tour just for the sake of the depth of the Tour," he said. " ... I was walking up 18 in the playoff, and I knew it wasn't over, but I looked up and I wanted to take it in because you don't know when and if it's going to happen again, and it's such an unbelievable, cool feeling that you just want to enjoy it."

After his monumental comeback victory, Thomas was anxious to celebrate with his family members, including his grandmother.

"I'm looking forward to talking to my grandma," he said. "I'm sure she was watching. I know somewhere up there, Grandpa was definitely watching today and pulling for me. It's very, very cool to be able to share this moment with my family."



## Cats fall in region

The Kentucky softball team dropped both games of a double-header Sunday afternoon, falling 9-2 and 5-4 as its season came to a close. Virginia Tech with the pair of wins advances to the 2022 NCAA Softball Super Regionals, something Kentucky hasn't missed since 2016.

Kentucky closes the season with a 38-19 record.

Virginia Tech will face No. 14 Florida in next weekend's NCAA Super Regionals in Blacksburg, Virginia.

Game one saw Kentucky jet out to a 2-1 lead through three innings, but the Hokies would score eight unanswered runs off of four different UK pitchers to force the if necessary game.

The Blacksburg, Virginia area was then flooded with thunderstorms and put a halt to play in between the doubleheader games, and the delay lasted about an hour. Game two then began at 4:30 p.m. ET.

In game two, Kentucky raced out to a 2-0 lead three batters into the game as both Kayla Kowalik and Erin Coffel hit home runs in the top of the first inning. VT then scored five runs to take a 5-3 lead.

In the seventh inning, UK put the first two batters on and push across a run on an Erin Coffel RBI single to the left side. That would be all UK could muster in the inning, as the Wildcats came up one run short to fall, 5-4.

### Tennis

The eighth seed Kentucky Wildcats were unable to overcome the seventh seed Virginia Cavaliers in the NCAA Championship title match on Sunday afternoon, falling by a 4-0 result at the Khan Outdoor Tennis

Complex in Champaign, Illinois.

UK had its best season in program history despite the loss. The Wildcats made its first national title appearance after winning five matches in impressive fashion, including hosting the first and second rounds in Lexington. Kentucky, which was the first eighth-seeded team to advance to the championship final since 2009, now holds a 34-31 record in the NCAA Tournament.

Kentucky finished its historic season with an overall 26-8 record and tied for second in the Southeastern Conference standings.

"I think we took a big, giant leap forward as a program," said head coach Cedric Kauffmann. "In a few days, these guys will realize what they did, get back to work and come to try to do this again."

### Baseball

Jake Plastiak looped a two-run, go-ahead single in the sixth inning and Mason Hazelwood delivered a terrific start before giving way to Tyler Guilfoil as Kentucky clinched its Southeastern Conference Tournament bid with a 6-3 comeback victory in the regular season finale.

Pitching in his final home game, Hazelwood was excellent and retired the final 13 batters he faced before a lightning delay ended his day after five innings.

He allowed just one run on two hits and struck out six, his only blemish a two-out RBI double in the first.

Kentucky (30-24, 12-18) now has won four series against top 20 opponents, tied for the most top 10 wins in the SEC and has five victories vs. the RPI top five.

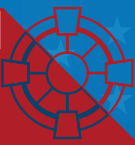
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
