Plant damaged in fire, crews praised for response

The Berea Fire Department, as well as other fire-fighting agencies throughout the county, were praised for knocking down a fire on Monday at the Novelis aluminum processing center on Mayde Road. At Tuesday's meeting of the Berea City Council, Fire Chief Shawn Sandlin said crews were called to the scene at approximately 3:30

p.m. after a blaze started inside the processing center. The initial cause of the fire is under investigation, Sandlin said.

Citing the blaze as probably one of the worst fires in the Berea Industrial Park, Sandlin said the situation was particularly dangerous

Subdivision green space released to developer

Green space in Stoney Creek Subdivision that has fallen into disrepair will be turned over to developers after a vote from the Berea Planning and Zoning Commission.

The unanimous vote came at a recent business meeting following a presentation by developer Patrick Sowers. Sowers stated that on a plot on the southern portion of the subdivision, there is an approximately five-acre parcel that includes a pond. He added that the pond and surrounding area has become overgrown and untended. "We're not set in stone, but we're trying to do something with the land to make it viable so we can mow it and maintain it and also take care of the pond," Sowers told the commission.

At one point, Commission Chair Betty Olinger asked if the current pond was secured for safety, to which Sowers replied: "There is no protection around that pond. It's just open. So, the proposal is the [owners of the] bottom tract will take over the maintenance of the pond and secure it in a way that makes it safe."

Codes and Planning Administrator Amanda Haney explained that the subdivision was originally designated to be a planned-unit development, or PUD, which included amenities like bike trails, a park, green

First Responders Camp returns

The First Responder Camp, sponsored by the Berea Police Department and the Berea Fire Department, will return this summer after a budget amendment by the Berea City Council.

The popular summer camp that educates youths on safety and the roles of first responders had been suspended

since the global pandemic of 2020, but the Berea City Council approved restoring funding the program for \$14,000.

"With COVID, we had to shut it down for two years, and luckily, Jason was on board with starting it up again," Berea Fire Department Chief Shawn Sandlin said of his counterpart in the police department, Chief Jason Hays.

The last First Responder Camp in July of 2019, featured activities and demonstrations by the Berea police and fire personnel, as well as Madison County EMS and others.

Council Audit and Finance Committee Chair Steve Caudill said he was grateful to see the program back on for summer.

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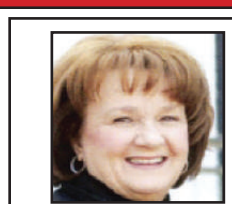

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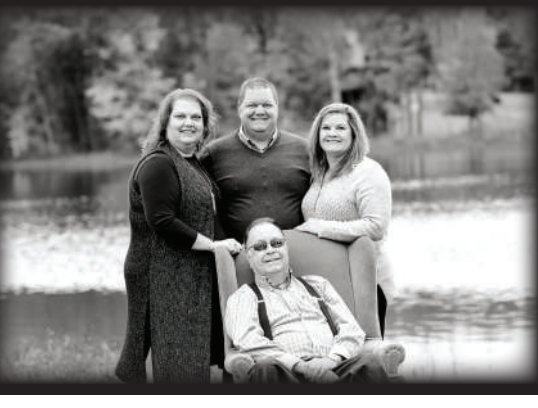
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Longing for the old days of college sports

Kentucky has gotten away from competing against rivalry teams and instead has focused on "bigger" games against Power 5 opponents on a neutral site. Home-and-home contests against rivals such as Indiana, North Carolina are now a thing of the past.

Reportedly talks are under way to resume the Kentucky-Indiana series on the basketball court, although progress on a possible breakthrough isn't known. Rupp Arena is one of the

top college basketball venues in the nation and should be used as a bargaining chip when it comes to negotiating a home-and-home series with the Hoosiers and other big-time programs.

Grill safely

The Federal Emergency Management Agency and the U.S. Fire Administration offer these simple fire safety tips that every grill master can keep in mind as summer grilling season hits full swing.

- Only use a grill outside. Grills should never be used indoors, and that includes in garages with the doors open. Before lighting a flame, make sure the grill is at least three feet from siding, deck rails and eaves.

- Establish a safe zone around the grill. A three-foot safe zone around the grill can decrease the likelihood that pets will run into and potentially tip over the grill. Kids can be taught to respect this zone as well so they avoid being burned.

- Open a gas grill before lighting it. Charcoal grills, hybrid grills and smokers cannot be lit unless the lid is lifted. That isn't the case with gas grills, but gas grills should never be lit with the lid closed. If a gas grill is lit with its lid closed, gas can build up inside and that could cause an explosion. Even if there's some summer rain falling, open the lid on a gas grill before turning the ignition switch.

- Keep an eye on the grill at all times. It's tempting to walk away from a grill while food is cooking, but someone should always be tasked with staying close to the grill. If cooks must walk away, ask another adult to stay close to the grill until you return. All it takes is a few seconds for a fire to start.

- Clean the grill regularly. Regular cleaning of the grill is both healthy and safe. Cleaning helps to ensure the cooking surface is clean and unlikely to cause food poisoning. But a grease-free grill also poses less of a fire hazard than one that hasn't been cleaned.

- Let coals cool before discarding them. Coals from the grill should be given ample time to cool before they're removed from the grill and discarded.

- Remember to turn the gas valve to the off position after cooking. When cooking with gas grills, cooks must remember to turn the valve to the off position once all the food has been cooked.

Simple safety measures can ensure summer grilling season goes off without a hitch.

All-Requirements Power Supply

The City of Berea, Kentucky ("City") is seeking proposals from electric power suppliers ("Suppliers") for the total power requirements of its system. In planning for future power supply arrangements, the City desires to examine indicative bids from potential Suppliers and to begin establishing a basis for future negotiations. As the planning process for power supply proceeds, the City anticipates future power supply negotiations will be entered into based on respondents to this RFP.

GENERAL

The city owns, operates, and maintains a combined utility system that provides electric, water, and wastewater services. The electric system provides power supply and energy delivery to approximately 5,300 customers within its service area including 4,627 residential, 583 commercial, and 58 industrial customers. At present, the City purchases its electric capacity and energy requirements from American Municipal Power, Inc. (AMP) and Kentucky Municipal Energy Agency (KYMEA) through agreements and contracts which expire April 20, 2024. The City purchases electric energy and planning reserves from AMP which has contracted with a third-party source for the City's full requirements energy. The City is also currently a municipal member and has existing contracts and agreements in place with KYMEA which provides transmission service an additional 10MW of planning reserve capacity during the months of January, February, and March.

For the 12 months ending December 2022, the City's annual purchased power requirements were approximately 130,000 megawatt hours with a peak demand of approximately 34.7 megawatts.

THE PROPOSAL

The City desires proposals for total capacity and energy requirements including firm transmission service and ancillary services. Under this arrangement, the Supplier will provide the City's total firm power supply on an all-requirements or native firm load basis.



June 12, 1924
51st Commencement
Berea College would conduct their fifty-first commencement exercises. The first class graduated from the collegiate department in 1873 and consisted of four students. Since that first graduating class, Berea had grown in many ways and was then a different "Berea." While the campus had changed, there were still the same basic ideals within the student body. The one great ideal was that simple living in order to do great living – bearing out the fundamental ideas of Berea's founders. There was at the time a greater Berea in numbers of students as well as an increasing spirit of service which came naturally with progress. The 1924 graduates were going out into a great world that was rapidly changing and in just such an ideal was of "inestimable value." Berea had thrown open the doors to all former graduates and friends from far and wide and the hope and expectation was that they would enjoy sharing in all the festivities that commencement week held.

June 5, 1948
Memorial Park to open
On Monday, June 7 at 10 a.m., the Berea Memorial Park officially opened for the summer season of 1948. Two full-time recreational directors were employed for the season to direct and supervise activities. Mr. Robert D. Huey, coach and physical education director for Berea High School's upcoming school year and Mrs. Ruth Romiger Washburn, recreational assistant to the park the previous year's summer would be on hand during regular business hours. Mr. Huey and Mrs. Washburn both had previous experience in recreational work. Mr. Huey was a graduate of Eastern State College in Richmond and had been trained in this type of work. He and his family had recently relocated to Berea. Youth who were interested in "good wholesome recreation" under professional leadership were encouraged to be in attendance on June 7th to register and become acquainted with the recreational leaders. A program/activities committee comprised of Mr. John Allen, Mr. Wilson Evans, Miss Minnie Maude Macaulay and Mr. Clarence Wyatt had drawn up a selection of suggested summer activities for the program.

June 7, 1973
County school board seeks compromise
The Madison County Board of Education would be having a meeting with officials from the Kentucky Department of Education, including Superintendent of Public Instruction, Dr. Lyman Ginger by the middle of the month. The board had made the decision at a regular meeting concerning a School Facilities Survey Report which was presented to the board on May 4th. The survey, which was conducted by a team of investigators from the State Department of Education, recommended amongst other things, that a second Madison County high school and a second middle school be built, both in southern Madison County. The survey was conducted at the insistence of the Southern Madison Education Association, a citizen's group which had been protesting the long-distance busing of students to Richmond and Kirksville. County School Superintendent Russell Roberts, who made no secret of his misgivings about the state report, made claims that the recommendations ignored the problems of overcrowding that were an issue at the time at Madison Central High School. The School board had planned to construct an addition to Central. However, the state report made no mention of the need for the expansion and instead recommended that a second high school be built near Berea. If the board didn't reach a compromise with state officials, the local board could decide to appeal the recommendations of the survey and would have to present an alternative plan of its own regarding facility needs and submit to the state board for approval.

June 4, 1998
Johnson honored
More than 300 people gathered at the Arlington Mule Barn to observe what Madison County Assistant Schools Superintendent Glenn Marshall called, "a happy time and also a sad time," as a reception was held to honor retiring Superintendent Shannon Johnson. Johnson would be retiring effective June 30, 1998. People from all walks of life and from the county stopped by to shake Johnson's hand and share memories. "He's a real popular guy," said Linda Young, school/community relations director. A wall of photographs celebrated Shannon Johnson through the years. The jazz band from Madison Central provided the crowd.

space, commercial areas and even an assisted living facility. But those amenities in the 300-acre development were to be funded by the establishment of a Stoney Creek Homeowner's Association, which never happened.

Haney explained the city had two choices, either maintain green space in what is private property, or turn it over to the developer to clean up the pond and integrate the acreage into an existing lot for development. Haney emphasized city officials did not want more property to maintain,

but the current condition isn't desirable, either.

"It's not being used as greenspace. It's not being used as a park or a walking trail or any other of those things that a green space is meant to do," Haney said.

Commissioner Ben Robinson III expressed reservations about turning the green space over for further development, noting its already a high-density subdivision with only one entrance and exit.

"Now it just seems like we've moved away from, by definition, a PUD into a highly, densely populated subdivision," Robinson said.

Sowers replied that with further development of

Stoney Creek, it is possible two more exits will be built at the rear of the subdivision. He also noted that any development around the former greenspace will likely be limited.

The commission unanimously voted to release the green space requirement for unit one, lot one of Stoney Creek Subdivision, subject to the approval of the commission for future developments.

Access to the lot would be from a proposed easement leading from Winding Branch Road.

In other action, the commission unanimously approved the amended final plat for Garden Gate Drive – Villages of Beaumont

Farm. The development proposes the construction of 11 four-plex units off of Legacy Drive near Peggy Flats Road.

Also approved unanimously was a development plan at 309 Pauline Drive by AR & T Enterprises for a storage facility. A representative of the development stated the plan is to develop and pave phases one through five of the project, but then gravel phases six through nine until they are needed. The commission voted to approve the plan on the condition that the developer put up a bond for five years, guaranteeing lots 6 through 9 will be paved subject to requirements by the city.

Referring to old business, Commissioner Martin Richards inquired about the status of a proposed zone change application at 596 Chestnut Street. The applicant, Susan Horn, told commissioners at the March 28 meeting that she intended to open a coffee shop and support center for victims of breast cancer.

The application was complicated by the fact that the property was divided into two lots and would require zone changes on both from R-1 residential to B-1 business.

Haney explained that application will not be moving forward and that the property has subsequently sold to another buyer.

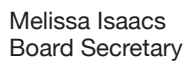

Super feat: Cats one step away from CWS

LEXINGTON (KT) — Kentucky is going to the NCAA Super Regionals for the second time in school history.

The Wildcats defeated Indiana 4-2 to earn a ticket to the Baton Rouge Regional, where the Wildcats will take on LSU in a three-game series starting Friday. Kentucky, seeded 12th in the NCAA Tournament, won two of three games against No. 5 seed LSU in April at Alex Box Stadium. The first game is set for 3 p.m. Saturday on ESPN.

The Hoosiers sent the Wildcats (40-19) into the elimination bracket with a stunning 5-3 triumph on Saturday night, but Kentucky won three straight in two days, including two in a row over the Hoosiers



to bounce back in impressive fashion.

A record crowd of 6,796 fans witnessed the clinching victory on Monday night at Kentucky Proud Park. Kentucky made its previous appearance in the Super Regionals in 2017, where it fell to short against Louisville in its bid to reach the College World Series for the first time in school history.

“This team was built a long time ago,” Kentucky coach Nick Mingione said. “When you think about recruiting in baseball, guys commit when they’re freshmen in high school, and sophomores. And to have all those guys come through and deliver in that moment and watch them celebrate, it doesn’t get any better

as a coach because they’re the ones that have made the pitches. They’re the ones that have made the plays. They are the ones that went to the workouts. They’re the ones that went to class. They’re the ones that do it.”

“And when you get a chance to just see pure joy, it’s one of the best feelings as a coach. That’s the only thing you could ever hope for on a field is to watch your team celebrate. And I was soaking in it. And I was loving every second of it.”

The hosts broke a 2-2 deadlock in the sixth inning, scoring two runs for a 4-2 advantage and held on for the final margin. The Wildcats collected six hits off three Indiana pitchers,

paced by Devin Burkes, who collected a pair of hits, including a double. Hunter Gilliam drove in two of Kentucky’s four runs in the contest.

Kentucky pitchers Darren Williams and Mason Moore scattered 10 hits on the mound and combined for nine strikeouts. Moore held the border rivals to four hits in the final four innings and fanned five batters.

Six of 10 Southeastern Conference teams who received a bid to the NCAA Tournament advanced to the Super Regionals. No. 2 seed Florida, No. 5 LSU, No. 12 Kentucky, No. 15 South Carolina, No. 16 Alabama and Tennessee will compete in the Super Regionals this weekend.

Safety a factor in roundabout decision

The City of Berea will be getting a roundabout at the intersection of the Berea Bypass and Highway 1016 after the administration raised concerns about traffic safety in the area.

Berea has never had a traffic roundabout before, but it will be getting one soon at the intersection of Highway 1016 and the Berea Bypass, it was announced last Tuesday. While the solution was not the city administration's first choice for traffic control, state transportation officials expect it will significantly

reduce the risk of fatalities at the intersection of the two state highways.

Residents may recall there was a traffic fatality on the first phase of the Berea Bypass at Mayde Road shortly after the road was completed. At the time, the intersection was only controlled with stop signs until local officials lobbied for the installation of traffic lights.

On Friday, Mayor Bruce

Fraley said it was his hope to avoid the same mistake. "When we were first briefed by the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet, we were advised that there would be two stop signs. I requested a traffic signal. The state advised that traffic lights do not drastically reduce the number of accidents and they did not favor putting in a traffic light there," Fraley explained. "Instead, they felt

the roundabout is the better option for that intersection due to speed with two state highways coming together, and that they had successfully installed roundabouts on other locations at similarly situated intersections."

Fraley noted that while the decision is up to the state, the roundabout solution seems more likely to help the city

MCBOE reaches deal to remedy racial issues

The United States Justice Department announced a settlement agreement on Monday with Madison County Schools to resolve its investigation into complaints of serious and widespread racial harassment of Black and multi-racial students.

The department opened its investigation in October 2021 under Title IV of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.

Madison County Schools officials, in response, said they had fully cooperated with the investigation.

"The district will continue working closely with the US Department of Justice to implement policy and procedure changes outlined in the agreement, particularly those that pertain to the tracking and analyzing of data pertaining to racially motivated incidents in the district," a statement from the school district said.

The department's investigation uncovered numerous incidents of race-based harassment in which Black and multi-racial students were called the N-word, among

Disposal of weapons at Depot nears completion

It's nearing the end of an era at the Blue Grass Army Depot as a facility built to dispose of the deadly Cold War-era chemical weapons is nearing the end of its mission to destroy its 520-ton stockpile, a milestone that will likely mark the end of chemical weapons destruction proj-

ects in the U.S.

At a June 7 meeting at Eastern Kentucky University, officials said the Blue Grass Army Depot is weeks away from eliminating the last of a stockpile of 51,000 M55 rockets with GB nerve agent that have been stored at the depot since the 1940s. The GB nerve agent, also known as

other racial epithets, and subjected to other derogatory racial comments by their peers. The school district did not consistently or reasonably address the harassment, which included racial taunts and intimidation, and was at times reinforced by use of Confederate flags and imagery. When the district did respond, it often failed to follow its own racial harassment policies and its actions were ineffective in addressing the broader hostile environment. This inaction deprived Black and multi-racial students of equal access to the district's educational opportunities and led them to conclude that the district either condoned the behavior or would not take any action to help them.

"Schools should be safe and supportive environments for all students, not places where they face racist harassment and abuse. Racial harassment inflicts grievous harm on young people and violates the Constitution's most basic promise of equal protection," said Assistant Attorney General Kristen Clarke of the Justice Department's Civil Rights Division. "This agreement will create the institutional changes needed to keep Black and multi-racial students safe and to provide them with a supportive educational environment. We look forward to Madison County

Schools demonstrating to its students and school community that it will no longer tolerate racial discrimination in its schools."

Under the agreement, Madison County Schools will retain a consultant to review and revise anti-discrimination policies and procedures and support the school district as it undertakes significant institutional reforms. Among other steps, Madison County Schools will:

- Create a new central office position to process complaints of race discrimination;
- Update its racial harassment and discipline policies to more accurately track and consistently respond to complaints of race-based harassment;
- Train staff on how to identify, investigate, and respond to complaints of racial harassment and discriminatory discipline practices;
- Inform students and parents of how to report harassment and discrimination;
- Update its centralized, electronic reporting system to track and manage complaints and the district's response to complaints;
- Implement focus groups, surveys, training and educational events on identifying and preventing race discrimination, including discriminatory harassment; and
- Analyze and review discipline data and amend policies to ensure non-discriminatory enforcement of discipline policies.

sarin, a colorless and tasteless toxin, can cause respiratory failure leading to death. It is outlawed under international rules of warfare.

At the same time as the weapons are being destroyed at the Blue Grass Army Depot, another stockpile is being eliminated at an Army facility in Colorado, which is expected to conclude before the Kentucky one.

The two sites have the nation's last remaining chemical weapons that must be destroyed according to a 1997 worldwide treaty.

Kingston Reif, assistant U.S. Secretary of Defense for Threat Reduction and Arms Control, said the destruction of the nation's deadly chemical weapons has been decades in the making.

"As recently as a few years ago, we weren't sure we could achieve our treaty commitment, so the fact that we are now on the doorstep is no small feat," Reif said to the Associated Press.

All other nations who joined the treaty have finished the destruction of their stockpiles.

Speaking to the Associated Press, Reif said the weapons are "heinous" and "the suffering they can inflict is unimaginable."

"Which makes what's being done here in Kentucky all the more important," he said.

The destruction of the Kentucky stockpile began in 2019 after decades of planning and debate over how to dispose of the deadly war weapons.

At the Kentucky facility, workers separate the deadly chemicals from their original rocket or projectile casings and then eliminate the agent, in most cases using a process known as neutralization, where the chemical agent is dissolved in a solution. Kentucky originally had stockpiles of VX, GB and mustard agent that had been stored in bunkers for decades.

The mustard agent was eliminated in 2021 and the final rocket containing VX agent was neutralized at the plant in April 2022.

The final phase of destroying the M55 rockets with sarin has been the most challenging,

because of the age and deterioration of the rockets, said Candace Coyle, the plant's project manager, to the Associated Press. Each rocket carries about 10 pounds (4.5 kilograms) of the nerve agent.

The neutralization process was settled on in 2006 after outcry from residents and environmental

groups that objected to the weapons being burned to eliminate the deadly chemicals.

The weapons kept in Kentucky and an Army facility in Pueblo, Colorado, represent the last 10% of the nation's original stockpile of more than 30,000 tons (27,000 metric tons) of chemical weapons.

avoid fatal accidents like the one at the first phase of the bypass.

"Ultimately, it is the state's call on any traffic control device on a state highway. My purpose was to insist on some sort of traffic control device at that intersection with the hope of preventing a fatality or fatalities," Fraley said. "I felt like with a stop sign only that a fatality would be imminent. It would just be a matter of time, and I don't want to see any family go through a fatality if we can work with the transportation cabinet to prevent that, because I've been through a fatality at an intersection on the bypass and don't want anybody to go through that."

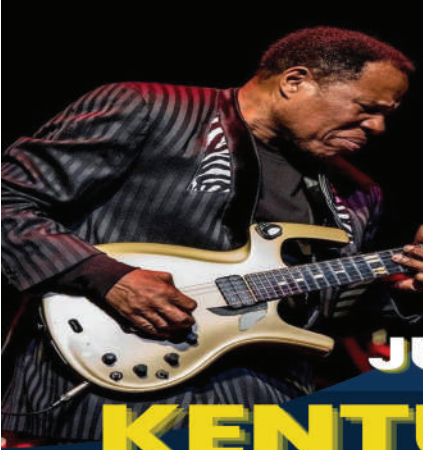

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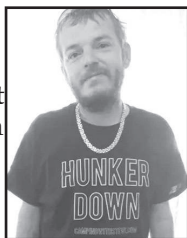
Bonnie Jean Srouder

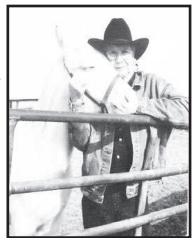

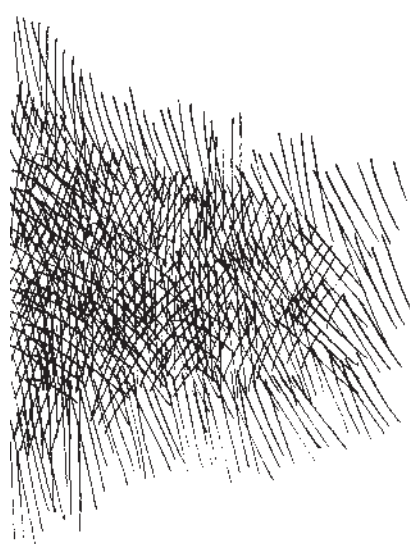

Celebrate National Pollinator Week

To the Editor:
The week of June 18th is National Pollinator Week. This is a good time to walk around your gardens and landscaping and ask yourself a few questions: How do my perennials, shrubs and trees benefit the environment? If your plantings did not co-evolve with our native pollinators, they do not offer high quality food, ideal nesting limb structure or serve as larval food for numerous insects. They do not “fit” into our environment, play-

ing an integral part of the web of life. An example I like to use is Butterfly bush. An attractive shrub that is pushed by the nursery trade, butterfly bush has extremely poor-quality nectar, filling butterflies with nutritionally poor calories, affecting longevity and reproductive ability. Butterfly bush is also being seen along riparian areas and railroad beds replacing native vegetation. Think bush honeysuckle.

Analyze your yard. Does it offer water source for wildlife? Does it have a small brush pile or logs for shelter? Does it offer plants that contain flowers and seeds that sustain life? What to do? Learn about

native plants and add some to your current landscaping. Remove invasive exotics that escape to the wild and alter our environment.

This “Butterfly Lady” will be at our local library June 20 at 5 p.m., giving away native plants grown from seed locally collected. I’ll have a lot of free handouts and information, answer any questions this self-taught plant lady can and offer further resources.

Oh, and don’t get tricked into buying plants listed as “Nativars.” “Huh?” We’ll talk. Happy Pollinator week!

Celebrating FATHER'S DAY

Each year, the third Sunday in June is a time to pay homage to fathers and the millions of other men who have stepped into the role of father. While it may seem as though Father's Day has been around forever, it didn't become a nationally recognized holiday in the United States until 1972, when President Richard Nixon signed Joint Resolution 187 into law.

Many thank Sonora Smart Dodd for making Father's Day happen. In 1909, while attending a Mother's Day sermon in church, Dodd felt fathers were equally deserving of praise. To honor her own father, a Civil War veteran and widower who raised six children alone, Dodd petitioned for a Father's Day on June 5th (the anniversary of her father's death) in her native Spokane, Wash. The celebration was deferred to the third Sunday in June. Another account says Grace Golden Clayton came up with the idea for a Father's Day in 1908 in Fairmont, West Virginia. Clayton was inspired to celebrate fathers after 361 local men perished in a deadly mine explosion. Clayton brought the idea up to the minister of her local church.

Historians say that Father's Day may even be a much older idea. St. Joseph's Day, which was celebrated each year on March 19 in Catholic nations of Europe since the medieval era, and later elsewhere around the world, commemorates Joseph, the husband of Mary and father figure to Jesus. It was said that Joseph should be held up as the ideal example of fatherhood. The Coptic Orthodox Church celebrates St. Joseph's Day on July 20. In the Orthodox Christian Church, the second Sunday before the Nativity is celebrated as the Sunday of the Forefathers — celebrating all of Jesus' male ancestors, with an emphasis on Abraham, the patriarch of the Jewish faith.

June 19, 1924
College Class Day
The college Class Day Exercises were held at Union Church on June 10th. The exercises were originally supposed to be in the chapel, but a last-minute change moved the exercise to Union Church. Senior class president, C. Byrd West, presided over ceremonies. Miss Vava Watkins gave a lass history in which she told of successes and defeats of her class. She followed the lass from their freshman timidity to their senior wisdom. Jordan Bowers gave a colorful oration in which he compared Berea Spirit with the spirit of '76, '63' and '17.

Evans Tennis Runner-up
Berea's Billy Evans was the surprise of the day at the 1948 Kentucky State high school singles tennis championship as he extended Don Ewald almost to the limit before the Louisville Maye star, won out. The 18th annual state meet

was held in Bellevue, Kentucky on June 1st. Evans, son of the Berea College tennis coach, Wilson Evans, defeated Paul Trieshman of Bellevue in the semifinals. In the second round, Evans scored over Monte Price of Harrodsburg and in the quarter finals he defeated third-seeded Jimmy Nutter of Georgetown. Evans was a sophomore at the Foundation school and had been heralded as a player to be reckoned with for the next two years in Kentucky high school tennis circles.

June 14, 1973
Multipurpose building
The Berea City Council approved partial completion of the multipurpose building and further study of the feasibility of finishing the remainder of the project at its second regular May meeting. All council members were present as well as 30 visitors. The decision was preceded by a lengthy, and at times, heated discussion, and a previous

vote against (4 to 3 with 1 abstention which counted as a no vote) completing the entire building. At the outset of discussion of the multipurpose building, Dr. Clifford Kerby questioned the propriety of taking up the matter again, citing 'Roberts' Rules of Order that a reconsideration must be initiated by one voting originally on the prevailing side. City Attorney Roger Oliver said the City Council was not bound by Roberts' Rules, and Erin Connelly said that the Council's agenda had been set up with the provision that any councilman can put any issue on the agenda for a council meeting. In this case, Ted Wright said he had asked that the matter be on the agenda. Mrs. Smith of the League of Women Voters spoke in favor of the project. Mayor Hensley said the city has needed and wanted a community center in the past but hadn't been able to afford one. The current proposal was not as elaborate as he might had hoped for but

would serve for the time being and was within financial parameters. "We have to start somewhere," he said, and he felt that this building and the money involve (\$45,000) provided the city with the best opportunity to get a community meeting place. Mr. Connelly said that regardless of what went on the first floor of the facility, the second floor would be where the community rooms would be and were needed and he felt that money spent on completing the building would have immediate benefits.

June 18, 1998
'Stepp' forward
Berea Community High School hired Aaron Stepp as their new football coach. The program had been without a coach since Anthony Barsch left the post in March of 1998. Stepp had 18 players in summer conditioning and expected to add quite a few more during the summer. "We've

got quite a few for basketball and we've got some on vacation. None of the freshmen have reported yet," Stepp said. "This year we want to get a real good foothold on the program. I want to encourage kids to come out." Stepp said another priority was getting the community more interested in football. "I think there's a strong interest now, but I'd like to see that increase. With the size of this community and the support of this community, this could be a great football town." He said his hope was that people of Berea would get behind the Berea Pirates football team. "I want them to know this is their football team. Everything we do here and everything we're trying to accomplish is done in a manner that we want Berea to be proud of this team and of this school. That's the goal. We want this to be a shining example of what Berea kids can do. That's what my goals are." Said Stepp.

The 26th Annual Stringbean Memorial Bluegrass Festival will be held on Thursday-Saturday, June 15-17 at Stringbean Memorial Park at 1410 Oak Grove Church Road in Tyner.

The festival honors Jackson County native and beloved Grand Ole Opry star David ‘Stringbean’ Akemon. His unique stage attire, traditional claw hammer banjo style, and entertaining stage banter endeared him to fans around the world. ‘The Kentucky Wonder’ was best known for his musical comedic performances on the hallowed stage of the Grand Ole Opry beginning in the 1940’s. and on the television series “Hee Haw” until his tragic death in 1973. Festival headliners include Junior

Sisk Band and Larry Cordle & Lonesome Standard Time on Saturday; Hall of Fame member Larry Sparks & the Lonesome Ramblers on Friday; and Lonesome River Band on Thursday.

Captain James West, Grand Army of the Republic Post

The beginning of Berea is unique compared with other cities in Central Kentucky. Although many communities and towns had been established earlier, the life breath of Berea did not come into existence until 1853, when a 10-acre tract of land was granted to John G. Fee by General Cassius Marcellus Clay.

Originally the area consisted of a loose community of scattered farms. Madison and adjacent counties were remarkable for the number of citizens who were anti-slavery slaveholders. Clay, a prominent leader and abolitionist, was one of the largest land-owners in Madison County. Clay had noted that “the mountain people were the natural supporters of freedom - owners of land but not owners of slaves”. With the view to establish a rallying place for free speech and liberal sentiment, Clay invited Fee to settle in the region.

Fee, a Presbyterian minister and abolitionist, had already founded anti-slavery churches and suffered persecution in Bracken and Lewis Counties and other parts of Kentucky. Fee accepted Clay’s offer of the land and organized an anti-slavery church, which the membership named “Berea” from the New Testament meaning “well-watered.” Within the next few years, Fee established his home, a one-room school, and recruited the first teachers from Oberlin College, creating the college community. However, in 1859, Fee and the teachers were forced out of the state by pro-slavery supporters.

It would not be until the end of the Civil War that Fee and his followers would return to Berea. It was at this time that the beginnings of the town would rapidly emerge. As the college began to grow, so did the community around it. At the close of the Civil War, many veterans returned to their families and homes, attempting to settle into civilian life. Some returned with injuries and diseases. Many veterans recruited from Camp Nelson in Jessamine County made their way to the area seeking new opportunities to establish themselves and families within a community which had supported abolition and promoted racial equality, and where many of their children and grandchildren could receive an education.

Twenty-five years after the Civil War and through the efforts of the old Civil War veterans, a post of the Grand Army of the Republic (G.A.R.) would be organized at Berea. The Captain James West Post #171 was organized with eleven charter members, being mustered in by Captain A. J. Tharp, Department Mustering Officer, on 24 May 1890. Post #171 was one of only a handful of integrated posts organized within the Commonwealth of Kentucky. It was named in honor of Captain James West, a student at Berea College years prior to the war, who had served with and commanded many of the old veterans living in the area. The group met on the fourth Saturday of each month, with quarterly dues of 15 cents. The rituals and remembrances of the G.A.R. would engage the entire community in patriotic celebrations of this nation’s holidays.

Seventy-one Union Civil War veterans are known to be buried in the Berea Cemetery. Names of these veterans came from a list provided by the Works Progress Administration (W.P.A.) in the 1930’s. A few of the veterans were still living at that time. The cemetery contains more Union soldiers than any other single cemetery in Madison County. The men who served, not only represented Kentucky, but Indiana, Illinois, Ohio, North Carolina and Tennessee.

Some of these veterans rest in plots marked with family headstones, however twenty-one have no indication as having been veterans. Some have military headstones which have deteriorated over time, their names no longer visible. Ten have nothing marking or identifying their grave site.

Ten of these veterans had been captured during the war. Records indicate that all ten men returned home with diseases, in particular dysentery, which affected them for the rest of their lives. The ten were George W. Bogie, William H. Burdette, Henry Calvin, L.C. Duncan, Lewis Gabbard, Alfred F. Hays, Curtis Kelly, Alex Moore, Robert Ramsey, and Jesse Chasteen.

At the time of their military enlistment, these seventy-one veterans ranged in ages from 14 to 45. William H. Robe was 14 at the time of his enlistment in the 59th Ohio Infantry. In 1867 Robe began preparatory school at Berea. John Lee Ballinger was also 14 at the time of his enlistment in the 4th Kentucky Infantry on 1 January 1863.

Simpson Gentry and Anderson White were 45 years of age at the time of their enlistments. Both men served in Company K, 13th United States Colored Heavy Artillery and returned to farming in Madison County.

Charles Lester and Arthur J. Hanson became early trustees of Berea College and along with Professor L.V. Dodge and William H. Robe were members of the Prudential Committee, the financial governing body.

Records indicate that the first burials of veterans in the Berea Cemetery may have occurred prior to 1876. Local tradition says there were three Union soldiers who had been wounded either during the Battle of Big Hill or Battle of Richmond and who later died in Berea. Their graves originally marked by a metal G.A.R. star and later a small monument are immediately inside the stone wall at the front of the cemetery. The monument is inscribed “3 Unknown Dead, U.S. Army 1862.”

The first documented burial of a veteran is that of 55-year-old Jefferson Reed, who served in the 12th United States Colored Heavy Artillery. Reed passed away 29 January 1878.

The last of the Berea Civil War veterans died in 1935. Barton P. Ambrose died just short of his 90th birthday on May 26. His death was attributed to “infirmities of old age.” William Henry Bicknell, the last of the old veterans, passed away of pneumonia just short of this 91st birthday on July 7.

Although the Captain James West Post was only in existence for 39 years, few today are aware of its incredible role in Berea’s early history.

The biographies of each of the Civil War veterans buried in the Berea Cemetery will be featured in the Citizen in the upcoming weeks.

Sthan 500 miles of roadways, including 762 individual roadways, over a four-month period from January to April. The roads were scored by a data driven metric by looking at factors such as traffic flow, rutting,

alligator cracks, pot-holes, cracked seals, and bumpiness, among other factors.

The fiscal court requested Shepherd complete this assessment in November. “We determined that each district was equally in need of repairs,” Shepherd said.

Based on the scores of the assessment, Shepherd recommended

the following roads be completed as soon as possible: In District 1, a partial section of Floyd Branch road at a cost of \$99,594; In District 2, KY River Road and Valley Road at a cost of

\$173,367.49; In District 3, Muddy Creek Road, Mill Iron Road, Kidwell Lane, and Cedarview Drive at a cost of \$254,518.23’ and in District 4, Tom

The cost to improve and repair those roads total \$1,323,472.82.

In order to fund the road improvements, the county received \$312,734 in Flex Funds from the state legislature and \$425,000 budgeted in the general fund for road work. Those amounts present a budget shortfall of \$585,738.82.

“How do we develop a long-term solution to maintaining the county roadways?” Shepherd asked the court. “We have to do something different than what we are currently doing.”

County Judge-Executive Ragan Taylor told Shepherd and the magistrates that their job is to determine what that different is, and to improve the county roadways.

“It’s a lot more costly to simply resurface the roadways because our regulations now require curbs and gutters and the width of the roadways to be larger,” Shepherd said.

Shepherd said to mill both sides of the roadway cost an estimated

\$2.20 per foot. “Any decent sized job could cost an additional \$25,000 for the milling job.”

Taylor said the court would continue to work with Shepherd and the road department to determine the best course of action to repair the roadways.

On second reading the court approved a zone change request for 3502 and 3506 Lexington Road from UC-1 single family residential to PUD, UC-11 planned unit development.

Richmond attorney Stuart Olds told the court Jeff and Ann Randall of JAR25 Development own 105 acres on Lexington Road, north of Richmond, between Boonesboro and the Interstate 75 exit at Clay’s Ferry. The developers are requesting 31.95 acres to be rezoned to PUD, Planned Urban Development.

“The basis of this change request is that this complies with the terms and provisions of the county’s comprehensive plan,” Olds said. “This area will be the focus of the most intensive development outside of the cities of

City offers incentive to Hitachi for expansion

In an effort to retain the Hitachi Corporation, the Berea City Council agreed during its meeting at the City Hall Annex on Tuesday to forgo 1% of the city's 2% of any occupational license fee to the corporation.

The council is offering the incentive at the request of the Kentucky Economic Development Finance Authority.

The incentive is to encourage the location of Hitachi Electric Systems America to remain in the same location on Mayde Road that previously

housed Hitachi Automotive Systems.

"This is a \$153 million investment in their current manufacturing operation in Berea," said Berea Mayor Bruce Fraley. "This will include additional manufacturing lines and equipment for the current facility."

The project will require an additional 752,000 square foot addition to the current building on the total footprint of 62 acres of land.

Hitachi's investment will create 167 new jobs, bringing the total

State sees an uptick in ticks

A warmer February in Kentucky has likely contributed to an uptick in ticks, and Kentuckians aren't happy about it. Some even sound ticked off.

"We just had the seventh hottest February on record, so some of our [tick] species are going to be more successful because they weren't exposed to as harsh of a winter as they might otherwise have been," said Jonathan Larson, an extension entomologist at the University of Kentucky. "They got a head-start on the season."

The longer season, combined with with Kentucky's tick-friendly living conditions, has resulted in more calls about ticks than Larson has had in the four years he's been at UK.

"The tenor of calls and inquiries, they're sort of angrier" than in previous years, Larson said. "It seems like people are seeing more of them on their property and getting more on themselves"

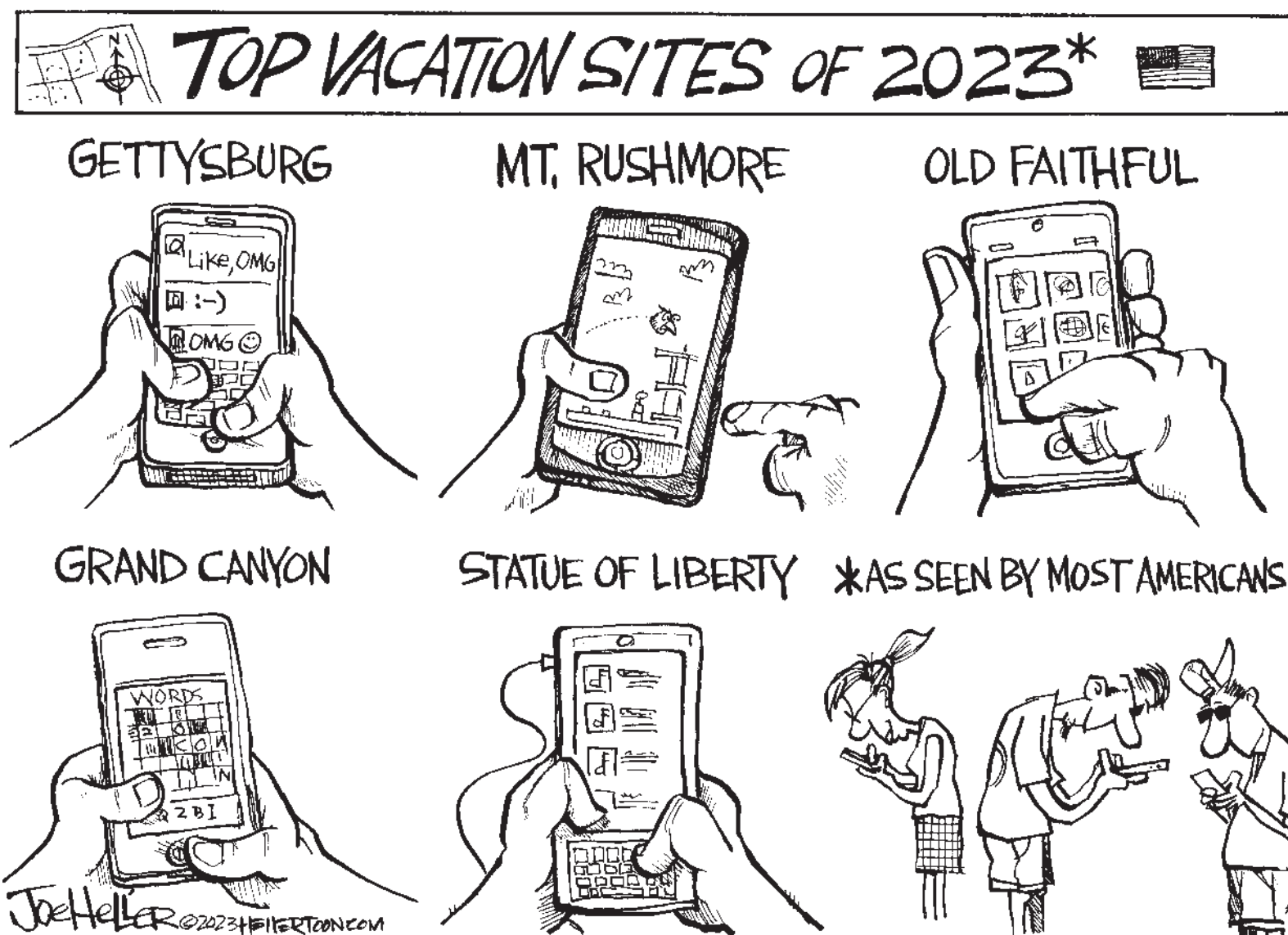

Each individual must be evalu-

ated by each American. We have to look at all of the candidates circumspectly. Do they have the experience? Do they have the knowledge and skills. Are they articulate. Does the candidate demonstrate leadership skills that we need to lead this country forward to better times? Will the candidate be a strong presence on the world stage and be a peace maker and leader?

Seventy million Americans do not want a President who is going to cut Social Security or Medicare benefits. Millions of Americans over 50 do not want the Social Security retirement age raised from 67 to 70. No one in this age bracket is going to support a candidate who infers either of the changes. The full benefits age should never have been raised

1 A consumer reported a Facebook customer service scam to BBB. The consumer’s daughter was scammed via phone by someone claiming to represent Facebook’s customer service team. BBB warns consumers to be extremely cautious when giving out financial information, including payment app account information, over the phone.
2 A consumer purchased a product from what appeared to be Dicks Sporting Goods’ website but turned out to be a fake look alike site, and the consumer never received the product. BBB advises consumers to avoid clicking on ads and instead visit companies’ websites directly when shopping online.

3 Scam Publishers Clearing House phone calls are on the rise again in BBB’s service area. As a reminder, the real Publisher’s Clearing House only contacts winners by mail, not by phone or text. Any “sweepstakes” that claims you need to pay money upfront to claim your winnings is very likely a scam.
4 A consumer attempted to buy Stanley brand cups by clicking on a Facebook ad, but never received the cups. BBB warns consumers to be wary of prices that seem too good to be true, and to avoid clicking on third party ads. It’s best to visit the manufacturer or company’s website directly.
5 A consumer reported a puppy scam to BBB

that occurred via a Facebook group. After joining the group and attempting to purchase a puppy from the group’s administrator, the consumer received multiple requests for money from the alleged seller – and never received the dog. The consumer was later blocked by the seller. BBB advises consumers to always view a pet in person before purchasing, check a breeder’s reviews and credentials, and always pay with a credit card.
6 A consumer attempting to sell a desk on Facebook Marketplace was scammed by a fake buyer. BBB reminds consumers when selling items online to never give out personal information to potential buyers, including phone

numbers.
7 BBB warns consumers to be on the lookout for medical bill scams. If you receive a bill, verify the claim first, look up the customer service number listed on the bill and make sure it’s registered with an official business, don’t give in to scare tactics, and guard your personal information.
8 A consumer attempted to purchase a Ninja knife set for what seemed like a very low price, only to be scammed. BBB reminds consumers that if a price seems too good to be true, especially for name brand or high-quality items, the website is likely a scam selling counterfeit products – or no products at all.

9 BBB saw a rise in reported work-from-home job scams during the month of May. BBB advises consumers to always check a company’s profile on BBB.org before interviewing, be wary of any interview that seems to go too quickly, and if the employer sends a check to purchase supplies or equipment, it is very likely an employment or fake check scam.
10 As we enter summer vacation season, BBB warns consumers to beware of online hotel booking scams. Only book hotels through official websites, research any hotel or business you aren’t familiar with, and pay with a credit card.

Cal signs Hart

LEXINGTON (KT) — Kentucky has added a seventh freshman to its roster for the upcoming season.

Joey Hart, a 6-foot-5 180-point guard from Linton, Indiana, signed to play for the Wildcats. He joins a top-ranked freshmen class that includes Aaron Bradshaw, Jordan Burks, Rob Dillingham, Justin Edwards, Reed Sheppard and DJ Wagner.

“I’m excited to get started at Kentucky,” Hart said. “I chose UK because of coach (John) Calipari, the supportive fan base and Kentucky’s ability to develop players. I’m looking forward to having the opportunity to compete and play in the NCAA Tournament.”

Last season at Linton-Stockton High School, he led the team to the Class 2A State finals. He shot 40 percent from the three-point line and 23.6 points per game.

“Joey can really shoot the basketball but also brings a tremendous all-around game to this class,” Calipari said. “His best days of basketball are ahead of him and I look forward to watching him develop alongside the rest of the class.”

- Kentucky is expected to have at least one former player, possibly three chosen in the NBA Draft on Thursday night.

Cason Wallace, is expected to be one of the top 15 players chosen in the draft. Wallace is one of 19 players who have been invited to the Barclays Center in Brooklyn. Oscar Tshiebwe and Chris Livingston also are among the top former Kentucky players available in the draft.



Murray savors title

Jamal Murray was speechless after Denver won its first NBA title.

The former Kentucky guard scored 14 points in the Nuggets’ 94-89 win over Miami to clinch the series for Denver’s first league championship. The final moments were all “hard to put into words.”

“I couldn’t really hold it in — it was just a surreal moment,” he said. “Everything was hitting. Everything was hitting at once, from the journey, to the celebration with the guys, to enjoying the moment, to looking back on the rehab, to looking back at myself as a kid, as the other viewer, looking from the crowd in or from the camera lens in, and now looking back at them.”

For Murray, winning the title has been a lifelong journey. Murray overcame an ACL tear in 2021 and didn’t play during the 2021-22 season but came back this year to help Denver make history.

“It was just something I’ve been working for my whole life,” he said. I think Mike said it, Porter. Every real hooper wants to be on this stage and play in the game and be in this moment. To see it full circle,

going from my rehab, not being able to walk, go up the stairs, not just for a month or two. It was for a long time. A lot of different things going through my head. A lot of tears. A lot of blood, sweat and tears, and real ones.

“Like I said, just to see it full circle and have total belief in myself, have the team have total belief in me, people back home have total belief in me, that’s all I could ever ask for, and just to see it like this is amazing.”

Murray struggled in the first half, but settled down in the final two quarters.

“That adrenaline kicks in, and you want to do something so bad,” he said of his first-half struggles. “That’s why I was ready to go at halftime, calm down and reset myself and do whatever the team needs me to do to get the win.”

Murray was happy to see Den-

ver succeed after failing to reach the finals despite being the No. 2 seed the past two seasons.

“We have the best homecourt for a reason,” he said. “I just felt like all season long, even the past couple seasons we were hurt. They were just there for us. When we didn’t have the energy, they brought us energy. They gave me energy. They gave me energy to come out and do an arrow or make a couple shots or show a little bit more emotion than normal. They would really help me going. That’s why everybody loves to play at home. I can’t shout out these fans enough. I’m so happy for the city of Denver, Kroenkes. We really, really earned this one.”

Through his struggles, Murray had his doubts but he overcame them when it mattered the most.

“Somebody asked me about butterflies,” he said. “That’s what makes you alive. That’s what makes you care. When you doubt yourself, that’s what makes you try to find a way to turn it around. In whatever sport, in whatever injury, in whatever career you’re in, when you go through adversity, it’s how you envision and visualize yourself at the end of it.”

Homes, businesses damaged by high winds, baseball-size hail

A severe storm swept through the area Sunday, leaving almost 17,000 Madison County households without electricity and caused damage across the region.

"The safety of our citizens is always our biggest con-

cern and we are grateful that Madison County did not experience fatalities as a result of the storms that impacted so many of our citizens," said Madison County Judge-Executive Reagan Taylor. "Our teams of First Responders, Dispatchers, EMA and Road Department have worked around the clock to make

sure our roads are passable, but also to support many citizens in assessing damage and getting that reported to the State and Federal agencies. It takes a village and I am proud of our teams when they all work together for the people of Madison County. I've seen a lot of that the past few days and that is always a good thing when everyone is

working together for the betterment of Madison Countians – all 95,000 of them,"

The storm blew across Kentucky, leaving more than 100,000 homes across the Bluegrass without power. Residents reported large hail and property damage as a result of the high winds.

Alcohol sales set to begin in July

Details of how and when liquor licenses can and will be issued in Madison County gained first reading approval at the June 27 Madison County Fiscal Court meeting at the Richmond City Hall. Madison County Judge-Executive Reagan Taylor said the county can begin accepting applications for liquor licenses July 18. Kentucky statute allows for applications to be received 60 days after the results of the local option election were certified. Citizens voted May 16 to expand alcohol sales across the county.

"We are trying to stay ahead of that date (July 18) because we have many citizens that are going to be wanting some type of license," Taylor said.

The application start date comes after the court gives second reading approval at its July 11 meeting.

In order to sell alcoholic beverages in Madison County, businesses must have an Alcoholic Beverage Control license through two governing agencies- the state of Kentucky and Madison County.

The county has made the process of applying for a license easy by adding the application

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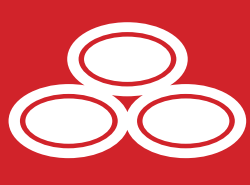
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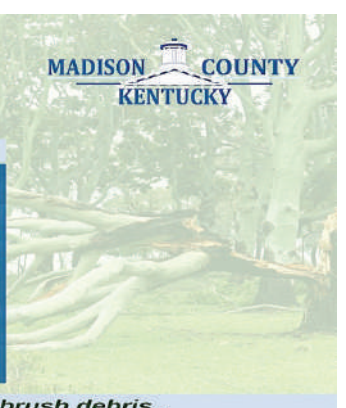

Meteorologist Chris Johnson at FOX 56, reported hail as large as baseballs and winds of up to 70 mph.

According to the National Weather Service, Madison County experienced a macroburst. The NWS defines as an outward burst of strong winds at or near the surface with horizontal dimensions of 2.5 miles or larger and winds of 100 mph or more. The macroburst had peak winds of 110 mph, along a path that was nearly 8.5 miles long and 2.5 miles wide. It affected an area from the Hillview to Bybee communities of Madison County.

Madison County Fire Chief Tim Gray said as of midmorning Tuesday about 746 county residents remained without power but crews are working to remove trees from power lines and restore power.

Taylor said the areas with the most reported damage include the Waco, Speedwell and Brassfield, but damage reports span most areas of the county.

Damage was reported at the Lake Reba baseball fields, with roofs being removed from dugouts and outfield fencing blown over, Roy Kidd Stadium on the Eastern Bypass saw fencing blown down and scattered across the roadway, an entrance to the Richmond Mall suffered glass breakage, and numerous business signs were damaged, as well as trees blown down across the area.

Madison County Sheriff Mike Coyle said several cruisers suffered hail damage and a tree limb fell on two vehicles inside the county impound lot.

Berea Fire Chief Shawn Sandlin said the department responded to 13 storm calls within a one-hour period mostly related to reports of trees down.

The Madison County Road Department began clearing roads around 10:30 p.m. June 25 and worked through the night in order to get roads passable for citizens.

Taylor said all county roadways have been cleared, but crews continue to work to clear damages. “Our teams from EMA and Road Departments have been out assessing the damages that have been reported so we can pass that along to Kentucky Emergency Management and FEMA.

“ This is what will allow us to qualify for public assistance and for citizens to receive individual assistance.”

Gray said the CSEEP-issued Alert FM devices receive weather alerts from the National Weather Service, which are activated for tornados and not severe thunderstorms. Madison County receives alerts from the NWS offices in Louisville and Jackson, not the Emergency Management Services in the county. Gray said he issued the command to sound the outdoor alert sirens to warn those outside to go inside and seek further weather-related information.

Taylor asked that citizens whose property was damaged during the storm to contact the Madison County EMA at (859) 624-4787.

inside the same portal as business owners currently use to apply for a business license.

“This can be a one-stop shop, making it extremely business friendly,” said Jill Williams, Madison County Deputy Judge Executive. “They can go online and apply for their licenses, upload their state license application and all of the paperwork that is required.”

Williams said new business and liquor licenses can be applied for at the same time.

According to Kentucky state law, the county will be restricted to a certain amount of licenses based on population. Steve Amato of Lexington-based McBrayer Firm said there are no longer any licenses set aside for any municipality. “There’s a total pool available of 41 licenses- 16 have already been issued,” he said. “So, there will be 25 available package licenses once this goes into effect.”

Amato said five guiding principles went into the creation of the alcohol license ordinance. Of those he cited consistency with state law, consistency to a degree with the alcohol ordinances with the city of Richmond to ensure there was no inconsistency in the hours of sale and enforcement issues, as well as basically allow the county to administer and enforce these laws at the criminal level and district court and through the civil administrative proceedings that will be led by the county administrator.

The Kentucky liquor license process typically takes between 30-and-120 days, but if there are issues that come up throughout the process, it can go up to 175 days or longer.

The court also approved on second reading the county budget for fiscal year 2023-2024. The budget totaled a little over \$90 million, in line with last year’s budget. The county general fund totals \$37.5 million, road fund \$4 million, jail fund \$5.3 million, clerk fund \$160,000, opioid settlement \$1 million, American Rescue and Recovery Act \$8.5 million, 911 \$2.5 million CSEEP \$27 million, federal grants \$750,000, and health insurance \$2.4 million.

Madison County Sheriff Mike Coyle told the court his office collected \$59,363.47 in local tax settlements for 2022.

Clarification

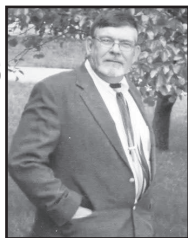

Reading slump

I am in a bit of a reading slump these days. That may be an odd statement coming from a librarian. It's not for lack of good material - there are dozens of new books released every week at the Madison County Public Library that pique my interest. I'll get ambitious and put several on hold or add them to my watchlist, but I find that my to-read pile just keeps getting larger. Reading slumps can be disheartening. When a hobby you enjoy starts feeling like a chore it's difficult to break that mindset. This is especially the case when you're an avid user of Goodreads who treats logging books like a this year/last year comparison report. Feeling down about your current reading habits then facing the reading roll you were on last year really does nothing to improve the situation. When I start feeling this way about reading, I try to get back into the habit with lighter subjects and shorter books. Less contemporary or literary fiction and more mysteries, thrillers, memoirs, and beach reads. I also turn to audiobooks. Listening to the performance of a book tends to hold my interest and encourage more consistency. I listen to so many audiobooks I can name more than a few narrators and have a list of favor-

ites. Libby, the library's app for downloadable books and audiobooks, allows you to search for titles by narrator. Julia Whelan and Marin Ireland never disappoint - both are actresses and their performance style brings a unique nuance to their storytelling. Marin Ireland performs much of Frederik Backman's collection, including the entire Beartown series, as well as several of my recent favorites such as Emma Straub's This Time Tomorrow and Jenny Jackson's Pineapple Street. If you are a fan of romantic comedy-like storylines, Julia Whelan is the Julia Roberts of the audiobook world. Her performances of Emily Henry's Beach Read and Happy Place allow her to display her innate comedic talents. The narrator makes or breaks an audiobook, and the entertainment factor can be the difference maker in digging out of a reading slump. Another (perhaps controversial) tactic when I'm in a reading slump is to watch a screen adaptation before reading the book. I know this goes against everything we've ever learned - the book is always better! Sometimes, though, when I'm struggling to

focus, having an image already in mind helps me engage a bit better with the printed word. Similarly, if a book in my to-read pile has a new TV series or movie, I use that as motivation to read it. One of the biggest books in recent years that I came around to much later, Taylor Jenkins Reid's Daisy Jones and the Six, was released in March as a well-received ten episode miniseries on Amazon Prime. The storyline focuses on a Fleetwood Mac-style rock band in the 1970s, and Jenkins Reid's fast-paced, character driven storytelling, compounded with her world-building (think the Marvel multiverse for historical fiction) lends itself successfully to onscreen drama. Jenkins Reid's ability to create such real characters even led to an album, Aurora, performed by the actors on the show. Riley Keough, granddaughter of Elvis Presley, plays Daisy Jones and performs the original music. Aurora is available for checkout at the Madison County Public Library on CD, and it's also streaming on Hoopla! Enjoy the music along with the book, available in printed format at the library, as well as ebook and audiobook on Libby. Now that I'm reminded of so many options out there, I believe I may have just talked myself out of my reading slump.



Declaration of Independence

The Declaration of Independence is a document that indicates the founding principles of the United States of America. The declaration was issued by the Continental Congress on July 4, 1776, and announced the separation of the 13 British colonies in North America from the United Kingdom. That significance means the public may want to learn more about the Declaration of Independence. Here are some key facts.

1. While Thomas Jefferson wrote the Declaration of Independence, it was carefully reviewed and modified by other members of the Continental Congress, notably John Adams and Benjamin Franklin.
2. The Continental Congress actually voted for independence on July 2, 1776. The written Declaration was dated July 4, 1776, but it wasn't actually signed until August 2nd of that year. John Adams thought July 2nd would be marked as the national holiday.
3. Fifty-six delegates signed the Declaration of Independence, but not all were present on that day in August.
4. While many know that John Hancock signed first, with his prominent signature readily visible, it is believed that Thomas McKean of Delaware was the last person to sign.
5. Others signed according to state delegation and in columns, starting with the northernmost state (New Hampshire) to the southernmost (Georgia).
6. About 200 copies of the Dunlap Broadside were printed. Today, 26 copies remain.
7. The original rough draft of the Declaration of Independence has been lost.
8. The Declaration of Independence was not universally accepted, and many people in the colonies remained loyal to the British monarchy and opposed American independence.
9. The Declaration of Independence has a message written on the back of it. It reads, "Original Declaration of Independence dated 4th July 1776."

Myers: EV's are on the move

Bringing Rotarians up to speed on Electric Vehicles (EV's), Denise Myers shared the "fast and furious" changing face of transportation.

As with many changes due to technology and energy, the picture is rosy but to be viewed with caution. She drives a Volt which runs on rechargeable "fuel," considered by the government as clean energy.

One of the challenges is the location and number of charging stations. There are three levels of these stations which run from 50 hours to 40 minutes to be

recharged.

There are also different types of chargers, which add to the inconvenience factor. Manufacturers need to work for a universal format. However, some stations are public and a few are even free. A simple rule of thumb is 50 hours charging time for 50 minutes of drive time. The EV can cost \$27-28,000 but the government does allow a tax credit of \$7,000.

The federal government has committed \$75 billion dollars to improve the charging infrastructure by 2025. Madison County has 68 registered EV's. Myers emphasized that Blue Grass Energy, where she is

Mitchell commits to UK

LEXINGTON (KT) — It took just one visit to persuade Tre Mitchell to determine his future.

The West Virginia transfer committed to the Wildcats after taking an official visit to Lexington last weekend. Mitchell, a 6-foot-9 power forward, entered the transfer portal after Mountaineers coach Bob Huggins resigned earlier this month.

Mitchell will have one year of eligibility remaining as a graduate transfer. He averaged 11.7 points and 5.5 rebounds per game last year at West Virginia.

"I have a dream and I have the opportunity to follow that dream," he said in a social media post. "I've got (to) think about my future and ensure myself the best opportunity to follow that dream."

Kentucky coach John Calipari welcomed the addition of Mitchell to his team's roster.

"Tre is from Pittsburgh and I've known him for years," Calipari said. "This was a unique situation, but as soon as he put his name in the portal, he was a player I knew we needed to pursue.

He brings leadership, experience, size and versatility and is a great fit for what we want to do. I know this is a win for us and I believe this will be a win for him, too. We are excited to have him as a part of our program."

Kentucky will be the fourth school in five years and third time as a graduate transfer. Mitchell has played at UMass, Texas and West Virginia.

"Kentucky basketball and its fanbase speaks for itself," Mitchell said. "An opportunity to be a part of something like this doesn't come around very often. Coach Cal is a Hall of Fame coach who understands the game and the players he wants to play for him, but it's the lifelong relationships with his players that stood out to me the most. That only happens when you know someone cares about their players.

Wallace looks ahead to NBA career after draft

LEXINGTON (KT) — Cason Wallace didn't have to wait long for his name to be called in the NBA Draft on Thursday night.

The Kentucky guard was selected as the 10th pick by the Dallas Mavericks. Wallace was later traded to Oklahoma City for Dereck Lively II of Duke. Lively was the No. 12 pick in the draft by the Thunder.

Wallace, accompanied by his family and Kentucky coach John Calipari at the Barclays Center in Brooklyn, was elated by the pick.

"There's a lot going on and a lot of emotions right now," Wallace said in a television interview. "I'm just grateful that I'm healthy and I thank God that I'm

here (tonight) and there's still more work to be done."

ESPN commentator Jay Bilas said Wallace has a "very high IQ" as a defender and will succeed at the next level on both ends of the court.

"He's good off the ball, he is excellent on the ball and he can play the point (and) off-guard," Bilas said.

"He's a good shooter, a good shooter in the mid-range, he can knock it down from three

and he's just got a very steady game."

Bilas cited the transition of Wallace when he took over at point guard mid-way through the season last year, which enabled the former Kentucky guard to display his versatility at the collegiate level.

Calipari was elated to be in attendance to watch his former player get drafted in the opening round.

"I love this family and the way they support each other," he said in a social media post. "(I'm) excited for Cason, but also his parents Mike and Kim, his brother Keaton and cousin Terrel. This isn't just a basketball family, this

is a great family."

Former Kentucky standouts Oscar Tshiebwe, Chris Livingston and Jacob Toppin also were eligible for the draft. Livingston was chosen as the 58th and final pick of the draft by the Milwaukee Bucks.

Oscar Tshiebwe was the first former Naismith Player of the Year to go undrafted on Thursday night.

One day later he signed a two-way contract with the Indiana Pacers, NBA insider Shams Charania reported Friday.

Jacob Toppin, who also went undrafted, agreed to a two-way contract with the New York Knicks.

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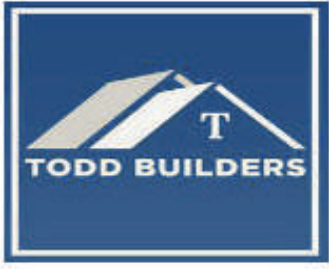
