Fiscal Court approves first budget reading

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court approved the first reading of their 2010-11 budget at a called meeting last

This year's budget, called "fairly conservative" by County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis, totals \$5,636,731 -- a big decrease from last year's \$7,401,803 budget. The difference is primarily accounted for by the fact that \$2,000,000 in borrowed money, for road work in the county, was included in the 2009-10 budget.

Actual receipts expected in all funds is \$5,330,231 with the difference made up in carryover funds in the accounts.

For the first time, money from the general fund --\$391,410 -- had to be included for the road fund, along with \$354,212 as a supplement to the jail fund.

Money for the road fund, from the general fund, had to be included Carloftis said because less revenue is expected in the LGEA (local government economic assistance) from coal severance tax money and expenditures from that fund had to be shifted to the road fund. The most notable, expenditures for the solid waste department of \$47,000. The road fund's budget also includes an increase to \$75,000, from \$45,000, for three work release supervisors. Carloftis said there are three crews set up but, presently, only two supervisors are employed. "We put the extra money in there so that the position will be funded if the court decides to fill it," Carloftis said.. Another increase is in county road worker's wages, from \$315,000 to \$340,000, to reflect wage increase given after the 2009-10 budget was prepared.

RCHS girls' track team wins 10th Regional Championship

The RCHS girls' track team won the Class 2A Region 5 Championship this past Saturday at Knox Central, defeating runner-up Boyle County by a score of 117-91 for the win. This was the 10th regional title for the girls' track program and the 7th in a row dating back to 2004. The girls have won either the regional champion-

ship or been regional runnerup for the past 13 seasons. Overall, the girls won 7 individual regional events and qualified nine athletes for the Class 2A State Track & Field Championships this Thursday at the University of Louis-

RCHS had a tremendous team performance despite the near 90 degree weather conditions which made the track temperature close to 120 degrees and affected times and distances in all regions across the state. Three RCHS seniors, Samantha Smith, Deana Gabbard, and Laura Dollins, also had graduation

ceremonies to attend at 7:30. The girls' 3200-meter relay team got the meet off to a great start with a 2nd place finish overall. The team of Laura Dollins, Rachel Cain, Alyssa Cox, and Jessica Albright ran the second best time of the season for RCHS with an awesome effort of 10:45.81. The team will be enhanced at state with the possible addition of Michaela Hunter who had difficulties with lower back pain and was unable to qualify for state in two of her best events - long and triple jump. Listed as an alternate for the relay, she could possibly drop at least 15 seconds off the girls' best time this season, placing them

When I was very young but old enough to still retain the memory, one of my uncles or an older cousin on my Mom's side of the family came out of the woods one fine spring day in the head of Blair Branch during mulberry season, with a baby groundhog no larger than a chipmunk.

This would have been early in the 1950's—probably 53 or 54-- when it was still legal to hunt and shoot squirrels year round and said kinfolk were out and about with rifles looking for fresh game because we were tired of yellowed pork and the young chickens were not yet old enough or big enough to turn into fryers.

Squirrels were considered a delicacy by anyone lucky enough to shoot one and usually cooked with thick cream gravy to be served on baked, then mashed sweet potatoes. To this day, I hold squirrel gravy among the top two or

three dishes I have ever tasted. I just don't have it me anymore, to shoot something as stupid as a modern squirrel.

It is trouble enough to pick up the stinking carcasses that my dog drags in from the ones that got road killed within a hundred yards of my house. And since nobody locally seems to hunt them anymore, squirrel IQ, it seems to me, has gone from genius down to nearly zero.

It used to be, even in recent memory, that you really had to hunt and stalk squirrels in the woods there among the oaks and hickories in the big woods and that cooking them up in the fryer or dumpling pot was a pretty big deal. It's not like that anymore, but that's another story. Suffice to say that, as of this writing, you could walk along any back road in Garrard County and take your limit with a sling shot.

Car Seats Save Lives

Car seats save infants' lives. And the lives of young children too, if they are used correctly. Statistics show that there is a dramatic decrease in deaths from accidents when children use well-designed car seats and proper restraints.

Children aged 4-6 have not fared as well as infants because parents are less likely to use proper seat belt restraints at this age. The adult-size seat belts do not protect these young children as effectively as they do adults. Also at this age, children are becom-



ing more independent, but using a proper restraint in the car is not one of their choices that is negotiable.

Infants and young children suffer more severe injuries from the trauma of car accidents, even when the accidents appear to be minor. Their heads are proportionately heavy compared to their bodies and can be bounced around uncontrollably on their small, weak necks. This results in increased injuries to both the head and neck. Air bags can also contribute to increased risk to infants and young children if the children are not properly restrained. The risk of airbags comes both from the direct impact of the air bag and also from the head bouncing back and forth on a weak neck after the impact.

Children should be placed in the back seat of a car if at all possible, and always in a car seat or wearing a seat belt. The back seat is the safest place in case of an accident. It also avoids the risk of injuries from air bags.

Infant car seats should be facing backwards to work properly. This gives the greatest protection against injuries to the head, neck, and chest.

Always buy the correct equipment for your children and take the time to learn the proper way to use it. It can save

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
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Rockcastle Memories

Main Street – A Look Back (*Part 2*)

Last week we took a nostalgic look at Main Street in Mt. Vernon during the '50's. We took a walk down the Courthouse side of Main, and this week we will stroll down the other side of the street beginning at the Rockcastle

The Hotel was a conglomerate of businesses both on the Main Street level and on the lower floor. In the bottom of the building were Claude McHargue's Appliance Repair and Ruth Murrell's Beauty Shop. The lobby of the Hotel was a meeting place for residents and local patrons who were just loafing.

Next door to the hotel was the Western Auto Store managed by Colonel Lay. He was J.C. and Bobby's father. The store had a fantastic supply of anything and everything needed for home electrical repairs. The proprietors were always friendly and extremely helpful.

Watkins Florist occupied the next business. The aroma of those fresh flowers flowed into the street and frequently drew patrons into the store.

The Kentucky Utilities building was next but the structure became Kelsey's Restaurant when I was a teenager. I will never forget the number of teenagers crowding into the booths. The fad was to order a fountain Coke with potato chips, which we dipped into ketchup as we listened to Rock and Roll music on the jukebox. Teens could be seen standing outside watching the fabulous customized automobiles cruising up and down the

street. Next were Miller's Drug Store and Magard's Drugs. I usually frequented Magard's because they had such a good selection of magazines. Each month I anxiously awaited the latest edition of Hot Rod, Street Rodder, and Motor Magazine. I carefully one I needed to add to my collection. Usually I purchased the Hot Rod monthly edition.

Bryant's Appliance Store was located adjacent to Magard's. My grandfather (Pop) was a good friend with Logan Bryant, and he took me to Bryant's to purchase my first stereo. Up until that time, Rock and Roll recordings were produced as monophonic sounds. When I first heard the singers coming out of one speaker and the band from the other, I was simply astonished.

I remember taking my new stereo (with a separate speaker) to Bud Cox's house to let him hear the new rock music. I distinctly remember the stereo album that I demonstrated to Bud. It was Gene Vincent and his Blue Caps. His recording of "Be-Bop-A-Lula" quickly rushed to the top of the charts in 1956.

Agnes Ponder had a Beauty Shop next to Bryant's. Larney Durham operated a Barber Shop next to the Post Office. I received my first real haircut there. I can remember Pop taking me, and he sat me on a wooden box in a regular chair. Watching the hair fall all over my body was extremely disconcerting. I kept wondering to myself, "Will it ever grow back?" Men came from all around Rockcastle County to play checkers at Larney's Shop. You had to be really good to play there.

The Post Office was one of the most popular places in town. Many families preferred to come to town each day to pick up their mail instead of having rural delivery. Pop was that way. We never had a rural box. Behind the Post Office was a small, secluded parking lot that was often used by some of us teenagers to spend some time with our girlfriends after a movie or riding around town. You could be parked in five minutes after leaving the Vernon Theater, and most people would never think of looking for you there.

Next door to the Post Office was the Greyhound Bus Station operated by Tommy Gay. My mother (Bee) was the ticket agent at one point, and I spent lots of time playing the pinball machines and listening to the jukebox. After school I walked to the bus station, and Bee would fix me a hamburger and fries. Many men gathered inside to play pool (only one table in the back) or to just gossip. Sometimes the place would be filled with loafers.

Adjacent to the bus station was a Gulf filling station. I distinctly remember Snookie Taylor working on his '50 Mercury there. That classy, customized "Merck" was bright yellow and simply "out of sight." My father became the manager of the Gulf Station when I was very young. He allowed me to pump gasoline when I could barely reach the windows to clean off the bugs. In those days, when

"If you don't have a fenced-in backyard, or if you don't keep your pet on a leash, you shouldn't own one," she

Recently the 62-year-old Bobtown resident was driving home along Highway 39 when she spotted a tiny dog darting back and forth across the roadway near Eden Baptist Church.

The scene sent the self-described "freak about animals" into what has become a typical mode of action.

She parked her SUV, turned on the vehicle's flashing caution lights, and assisted by her 12-year-old granddaughter, Taylor Turner, attempted to lure the animal off the roadway.

Soon, they were joined by Rockcastle County residents Wendy Moore and her 12year-old daughter, Destiny Pickering.

The tiny pup continued to elude all until he couldn't resist coming forward to receive a piece of a leftover Arby's sandwich, allowing Destiny to sweep him up in her arms.

"When I see a dog or cat in the road, I always stop because the animal could get killed or cause someone to have an accident, all due to the neglect of an irresponsible pet owner," says Hammond.

After getting a wayward animal to safety, she always goes in search of the owner immediately by knocking on doors in the immediate area.

When the owner is located, it's not always the most pleasant of reunions, as he or she can expect to receive a lecture from Hammonds about the perils of allowing their pet to roam free.

If her search doesn't turn up an owner, she always takes the animal to the house she and husband Angus share with four dogs of their own, two in the house and two in a fenced-in area around a storm cellar.

Additional steps are taken to locate the owner, including the placing of a classified ad in the Commonwealth-Jour-

If, after seven days, no one has come forward, she takes the animal to a veternarian for shots and any other care it may need, then to the humane society for spaying or neutering. She and Angus pay for all costs and provide foster care while a search is made for a permanent home.

Their permanent and temporary furry friends require the purchase of "at least 100 pounds of food per month," and they make sure it's always high-quality products that are grain-free and packed with antioxidants.



And so, the baby groundhog was tendered to her care.

Mom named him Willie and she basically let him have the run of the house. She fed him veggies out of the garden because we had more than plenty and he would run out the back doors to do his business in the yard. We picked him up and petted on him and basically treated him like a house cat.

We had a couple or three dogs that would spend all day barking and digging around a groundhog hole but they paid no attention to Willie and even let him share the bounty there amongst them come feeding time.

Groundhogs are supposed to hibernate during winter months but Willie had it warm and cozy under the wood cook stove in Mom's kitchen and while he may have slept most of his days away, I can vividly recall him being underfoot around the table come supper time all winter long.

And so the seasons came and went that year and spring rolled round again the next. I remember neighbors wondering if Willie had seen his shadow on Groundhog's Day and Mom telling them that he probably did but it was from the light bulb in her kitchen and that the sun did not shine beneath her stove..

By early April, Willie took to sitting upright on the back porch during the morning hours, front paws crossed on his chest and gazing into the woods behind our house. From time to time he'd shrilly whistle and he wanted no more of the petting and affection we had shown him. And then one morning he just took off. I suppose a prospective wife had whistled back but I don't know much about groundhog courting rituals

someone filled up, we checked the oil, kicked the tires, and cleaned all of the windows. I suppose that is why they were called "service stations."

Located across a small wire fence was Mattie B. Robinson's house. Next-door was Dr. George Griffith's Office. He was our family doctor the entire time that I lived in Mt. Vernon. When we were too sick to come to his office, he came to our house as soon as he closed his office at the end of the day. He was the epitome of what I thought a small family doctor should be. I admired him so much.

Cecil Purcell had a barbershop in a Trolley Car adjacent to Dr. Griffith. Carrie Baker's Clothing Store was on the other side of the barbershop. My grandmother (Mommie Katie) often shopped for dresses in Mrs. Baker's shop.

Next to Baker's was Rob Cox's Shoe Store. He specialized in Red Goose shoes. Pop loved to purchase his work boots there.

One of my all time favorite stores was Cox Hardware. Both my father and my grandfather frequently visited this popular business. John Cox was the owner and proprietor. He had a large wood burning stove in the middle of the store where men gathered around the fire to discuss the events of the day.

Bordering Cox Hardware was located Fred Baker's Chevrolet. Pop purchased several automobiles from Mr. Baker. I often went with Pop to shop for new cars. On the other side of the Chevy Store was Carter Owen's Standard Oil Service Station.

Adjacent was W. A. Cox Undertaking Company. This was Bud's grandfather.

The last structure was a two-story school or Academy. This is where NAPPA is presently located.

Now we are back to the cemetery. As you can readily witness, Main Street in Mt. Vernon is now very different from its mid-50's origins. Many of the buildings no longer exist or have been remodeled and are used in a completely different manner. Every time I drive through town, I am taken back to my original roots. about \$200 to \$250 per month on the animals," says Angus, a North Carolina native who met his wife while working at the local tobacco market.

Still, they feel the expense is well worth it.

"These animals give us so much more than we give them," says Lisa, noting their Boston Terrier Louise and a mutt named Roo "because he's so ugly, he's cute", sleep at the foot of their bed every night. Lately, they have been joined on the bed by the new pup found on Highway 39.

"If we ever build a new house, it will have a bedroom just for the dogs, complete with their own TV and their own music, which we will leave on for them when we have to be away during the day," says the music lover who still sings on occasion with her two siblings as "The Hargis Sisters."

'We have adopted so many out, and we usually have a home for them right away," she says, noting she has been rescuing "at least a dog a month, and sometimes two or three" over the past two years.

Of course, not just any

home will do. "If the new owners don't intend to keep the pet in the house, or have a fenced-in backyard, I won't let them have it," explains the former Pulaski High student.

The new owners can also expect to be seeing Linda again.

"I always do a follow up visit, and last Christmas, a friend and I delivered packages of treats to all the dogs we could find that we had adopted out," she says, noting that "seeing the need," is what keeps her taking such an active role in animal care.

"It's a God thing," she says, pointing out that dog is God spelled backwards.

"I've never had a dog brought back, and I get emails from people telling me how much joy they are getting from their pets.

"But each time one goes out of here, I cry, because they take a piece of my heart with them.

"I just want to go on forever, helping these little animals find a forever home."

A small jar, made of ordinary clay and red in color, occupies an inconspicuous space on an old filing cabinet that sits beside my desk. That jar, made in Israel to sell to gullible tourists who are eagerly looking for souvenirs to bring home and purchased by one in 1972, was fashioned to represent one of the clay jars that contained the, now famous, Dead Sea scrolls that were discovered in 1947 by a Bedouin shepherd who tossed a rock into a cave in a rugged hill near Qumran and heard something crash. Inside the little jar, there is a small roll of paper placed there to represent those ancient and valuable scrolls.

The clay jar is, indeed, a fragile item. If dropped on a hard surface, it can, and probably will, shatter into a thousand pieces. Too, by itself, the ordinary jar, except in rare and unusual circumstances, is not a thing of great value, and it was not made to have great value in and of itself. Rather, the clay jar was a simple thing that was made to serve as an ordinary container for something of much greater value. At a point in human history, those jars were used in the same way we use plastic jugs and bottles today. Therefore, we have the statement that is almost two thousand years old: "But we have this treasure in jars of clay.

How often have you heard the old adage: You can't judge a book by its cover? But sometimes that does happen, and when it does, value judgments are misplaced. In those situations, attention is misdirected; it is focused on the valueless packaging rather than on the valuable contents of the package. As a result, something vitally important is missed, for the value of an item does not, in any way, depend upon the value of the package.





Charlene Reynolds' Memories of Bloss

Last week, as you may recall, we visited the area of Rockcastle County known as Bloss, located in the southwestern portion of the county. Charlene Reynolds was kind enough to share these memories in an interview. This was the first visit to the Bloss area in the Roots series. This week we will conclude the visit to Bloss as remembered by Charlene.

Christmas was always the most special time of the year. There were apples and oranges, and striped sugar stick candy to be had. Each child had an apple and an orange, or so, and at least one piece of the stick candy. Charlene's mother always baked dried apple stack cakes and jam cakes ahead for the holiday. She would wrap them up in towels, and save them until the big day.

Otherwise, the days in Bloss were uneventful. If you had to go to town, which wasn't very often, the mail truck had to be caught. When the family went to church, they attended High Dry, and wore their best clothes that were reserved and worn on such occasions. Horses were ridden for transportation. Corn was raised and taken to mill. The mill was owned by a man named Childers. The corn was put on the horses, and taken about a mile to the mill. In the fall, the family made their own molasses. Charlene remembers this as a very special time, and scraping the foam from the molas-

When not going to school, Charlene remembers working most of the time, doing chores about the farm. Wood had to be cut for the fire, which was always used for cooking. The garden would need to be hoed

in the summer, and the stock had to be fed every day. Another daily chore was fetching the milk and butter from the spring.

When not working, the children had a few things to enjoy. They played horseshoes, or played ball.

The small community thrived. Charlene remembers some of the other families in the area: Russell Chaney, Swan and Rosie Bullock, Matt and Zi Graves, Roosevelt and Rhoda Norton, and all of their families.

Charlene married Lin Reynolds and they had a family of their own. She hadn't been to the Brodhead Fair since her childhood, until she took her own children. She has been a widow for the last eleven years.

From time to time, Charlene still goes back to Bloss to look around and reminisce and visit the cemeteries where her family and friends are buried. As a testament to her values and her strong work ethic, at the age of seventy-five, she works at the local McDonald's at Mount Vernon. She is one of county's endearinging assets. She gives the restaurant more of a down home feeling with her unique charm and wit. Never being too busy, she always finds time to stop and chat a while, and the customers, especially the tourists, take away something more than iust a meal.

After interviewing her, I asked if she might share some of her old pictures. She related that she always carried her pictures in her purse, fearing something would happen to them at home. Unfortunately, one day while at work, someone had stolen her purse that contained, among other things, her pictures. This was certainly a sad and disturbing event; a life's worth of pictures and memories gone forever.

Deadline is nearing?

The Food, Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008 (the 2008 Farm Bill) provides that individuals and legal entities with average AGI in excess of a specified average AGI limitation are ineligible for payments subject to that limitation In general, the limitations are: \$500,000 average nonfarm AGI for commodity programs; \$750,000 average farm AGI for direct payments under the Direct and Countercyclical Program or ACRE program; and \$1 million average nonfarm AGI for conservation

USDA has worked with the Internal Revenue Service to develop an electronic information exchange process strictly for the purposes of average AGI verification. This process electronically looks at certain line items on tax returns filed for the applicable three-year period; performs a series of calculations to arrive at the average amounts; and then compares these values to the average AGI limitations. USDA receives the results of these comparisons with indicators of whether the participant appears to exceed or not exceed the average AGI limitation amounts. No actual tax data will be included. USDA county office personnel will not view tax return informa-

IRS requires written consent from the individual to provide USDA verification of the average AGI for that individual. This written consent is provided by

tion at any time during this pro-

using form CCC-927, Consent to Disclosure of Tax Information -Individual. The CCC-927 form allows the selection of 2009. 2010, or both years. Selection of "2009" on the form authorizes IRS to perform the average AGI calculations for the 2005, 2006 and 2007 tax years. Selection of "2010" on the form authorizes IRS to perform the average AGI calculations for the 2006, 2007 and 2008 tax years. The CCC-927 must be completed for the same year(s) an individual was required to complete the CCC-926, Average Adjusted Gross Income (AGI). (The CCC-928, Consent to Disclosure of Tax Information - Legal Entity, must be completed by entities for the year(s) they completed the CCC-

Timeliness is essential in order to avoid any delays in the issuance of 2010 program payments and the possibility of refunding 2009 program payments. The consent forms should be mailed directly to IRS at the address given on the form no later than June 15, 2010. Do not return the completed and signed forms to the FSA office.

Failure to provide the written consent may require refund of applicable payments received from FSA and NRCS for the years 2009 and 2010.

in contention for the top five in the event.

Samantha Smith led RCHS once again with an incredible 38 points including three regional championship title wins. She got her day started off in exciting fashion with an amazing long jump performance. On her very first attempt, Samantha jumped an unbelievable 18'7.75", winning the regional title by almost 3'. Her mark established a new RCHS record in the event and ranks 5 all-time in Kentucky among all three state classes. She also surpassed the Class 2A state record of 18'4" but can only get official credit for the record if she achieves the distance at the state championships. Her second jump was an astonishing 18'6" so the state record is easily within reach this Thursday. Going into state, Samantha is ranked over 1' ahead of the next best in the entire state in all three classes. She's also the defending Class 2A State



RCHS senior Laura Dollins won the regional title in the 1600-meter run this past weekend and also qualified for the state championships in the 800-meter run (3rd place), 1600-meter relay, and 3200-meter relay. In the 1600, she ran a personal best of 5:38.

Champion in the event, having won the title last outdoor season.

Samantha went from long jump straight to the 100meter dash. She dominated the field, easily winning the regional title in the event in an impressive 13.0 seconds. She will look to better her own RCHS record this Thursday, while having another opportunity for a state title with a great race in the 100-meter dash state finals. Teammate Kira Deatherage made the top ten at region, finishing with a fast time of 14.04 seconds.

Samantha also won the regional title in the triple jump competition. Despite not getting run throughs, which help athletes properly hit the narrow take-off board, Samantha made great adjustments and leaped an amazing 36'2". Her mark was easily the best in Class 2A going into the state championships and ranks nearly 2' ahead of the next best in all three classes. This Thursday, she has a great chance to win her first outdoor state title in the event.

Laura Dollins led RCHS in the distance events and set her sights on the regional title in the 1600-meter run. She got the race off to a terrific start and surged to the front of the pack. With a strong final lap, Laura easily captured the regional championship crown in the event, finishing with an awesome new career best time of 5:38.61. Laura's time ranks her 6th going into state this Thursday where she will have an exceptional opportunity for the outdoor state title in the event. Rachel Cain continued her impressive season in the 1600 and narrowly missed qualifying for state with an incredible 5th place finish in an awesome new career best time of 6:00.21.

In the 400-meter dash, Michaela overcame complications with her lower back and finally seemed to loosen up. She held off a late surge by the 2 ranked runner in Class 2A, Nicole Coffman from Casey County, and finished as the regional champion in the event with a solid time of 1:00.22. Her time

ranks her 3rd going into state, but she has been ranked at the top of Class 2A the entire season in the event and has consistently posted times under sixty seconds. This Thursday, she will attempt to successfully defend her state title from last year.

Jessica Albright ran a spectacular race in the 300-meter hurdles, along with teammate Alyssa Allen. Jessica ran an impressive 51.23 seconds, one of her best times of the season, and finished 4th overall. Alyssa was close behind, finishing 5th overall with a new career best time of 51.85 seconds. Both Jessica and Alyssa qualified for the state championships in the event with their awesome performances and will be looking to improve once again at state and place in the top eight. Alyssa also ran very well in the 100-meter hurdles, finishing 7th overall with a great effort of 18.21 seconds.

Laura also ran a sensational race in the fast -paced 800-meter run. She finished 3rd overall and easily qualified for the state championships in the event with an impressive time of 2:32.7. Going into state, her best time of 2:27 this season puts her within three seconds

of the top time. She will have an excellent opportunity for her first state title in the event with a personal best performance. Alyssa Cox continued to improve her time in the 800 with another awesome performance. She finished 7th overall with an impressive new career best time of 2:41.21.

Samantha and Michaela gave RCHS a huge boost with their performance in the 200meter dash. Samantha's trade-mark blazing start led the field through the first 150 meters. Michaela closed on the final stretch and won the regional title in the event in a great time of 26.34 seconds. Samantha finished a close 2nd in an impressive 26.57 seconds, nearly a season's best. Both girls enter state competition ranked 4th and 5th in the event and have a tremendous opportunity for a state title.

Deana Gabbard and Alyssa Cox had the most difficult task of the day - competing in the grueling 3200-meter run. A race made much more difficult by the high temperatures, the 3200-meter run is a test of will power for the athletes that attempt the eight laps that make up the

race. Deana ran a spectacular race and finished 5th overall with a very impressive time of 14:12.91. Alyssa also ran extremely well, finishing 6th overall for RCHS with a personal best time of 14:16.88. Interesting to note, both girls actually ran over forty seconds faster than one of the state qualifiers who made it due to finishing in the top two in her region.

The girls' 1600-meter relay team qualified for the state championships with an awesome season's best performance. The team of Jessica Albright, Laura Dollins, Alyssa Allen, and Kira Deatherage finished 3rd overall in a very impressive time of 4:24.94. The team will once again benefit from alternate Michaela Hunter, who did not achieve a mark in triple jump resulting in her being eligible to participate at state in this relay. With all four competitors running their best, the team has a great shot to win state in the event.

her first-ever regional crown

in the event, throwing an amazing 30'7" to take the title. In the discus competition, Amy threw a very impressive 92'5" and finished as regional runner-up. Going into state, Amy has the potential to do some major damage on the scoreboard. She was ranked as high as 4th in discus this season and in the top ten in shot put. With career best efforts at state, Amy will have a chance to place in the top five in both shot put and discus. Potentially, she could throw discus far enough to have shot at the

The Class 2A State Championships will be held this Thursday at the University of Louisville. Competition in the throwing events gets underway at 3:00, while the first running event, the 3200meter relay, begins at 4:30. RCHS has a great chance to win the state title, having been ranked anywhere from first to fourth the entire season. The team has placed in the top four in the state championships for eight of the last nine seasons. This streak includes two state runner-ups, two 3rd place finishes, four 4th place finishes, and one 7th place finish.

The jail's supplement is higher than in 2009-10 when it was \$125,000 but reflects actual expenditures by the court during the current fiscal year.

Å breakdown of funds and their total estimated receipts

Fund: General \$2,644,001 which includes \$1,310,000 from the occupational tax and \$100,000 from the net profits tax; \$60, 000 from the county's share of the motor vehicle license tax; \$420,000 insurance tax receipts and \$270,500 from real and personal property tax. The total budget for the general fund is \$2,148,379 which includes a carryover from the current year of \$250,000 and a transfer out of \$745,622 for the road department and jail

Road Fund: \$1,447,410 made up primarily of \$855,000 from the state for county road aid; \$172,000 from the truck license fee and the \$391,410 supplement from the general fund.

Jail Fund: \$1,178,162 with \$650,000 expected revenue from housing state prisoners, \$65,100 for the jail bed allotment from the state and the \$354,212 supplement from the general fund.

The \$650,000 is \$103,000 less than the current year's because of several weeks of more county prisoners incarcerated than state prisoners.

LGEA: \$1,65,000, down from \$230,500 in the current year because of an expected drop in coal production and mineral severance funds.

Forestry: \$2,450 (\$2,010 2009-10).

Fairgrounds: \$13,000 (\$14,000 2009-10).

911 Fund: \$288,100 up from \$247,500 because in the current fiscal year, the county did not receive the full cell phone tax due 911.

LEPC: \$2,700 (\$2,245). **CSEPP:** \$338,730 up from \$184,386. These are re-

stricted use federal funds that only pass through the county's coffers.

A second reading of the budget and final passage will be considered at the regular meeting of the fiscal court on Tuesday, June 8th.

In other action, the court approved payment of several claims from work done on flood damaged roads, totaling \$17,507.63. The county will be reimbursed all but 12% of the total from the federal and state governments.

Also during the meeting, Carloftis broached the subject to the magistrates of paying off some of the county's indebtedness earlier than scheduled, if excess money is available and refinancing the detention center note to save on interest.

Carloftis said the first thing he would like to pay off is the \$84,000 still owed on the Pongo Fire Department -- possibly within the next year. He also told the magistrates that some projects that needed attention included assisting Western Fire Department in paying off the note on their fire station, which they have been paying themselves; building a new fire station in Livingston and forming a new department in the Climax/Three Links area. Carloftis said that an interlocal agreement with Jackson and/or Madison counties might be worked out since the three counties adjoin in that area.

During May, Peters said his office made three DUI arrests; issued nine traffic citations; made 10 drug-related arrests; 17 criminal arrests; served 17 arrests warrants; nine Rockcastle bench warrants and nine bench warrants for other agencies; worked 20 traffic collisions; served eight criminal summons and 72 civil summons; opened 20 criminal cases; took 19 incident reports; transported 12 adult prisoners and one juvenile to other facilities; served nine mental health petitions and inspected 35 vehicles.




were Sheriff Mike Peters and Mt. Vernon Police Officer Nathan Swartz.

What the American Flag symbolizes

(The following information, regarding the original design of the flag by our founding fathers, was found in the American history book, "America's Story." It was copyrighted in 1831 and used in the country's primary

schools for many years. Note: The current secular military flag symbolism was changed from its Christian symbolism during the Eisenhower administration. 1. The U.S. flag is composed of three colors which represent the Holy Trinity of God. 2. The three colors represent: Red-the blood of Christ. White-the Lamb of God without blemish. Blue-Heaven.

3. The stripes on the flag represent the stripes Christ received from the Roman whip. 4. The stars in the blue canton represent the individual states as Christ was the bright & morning star.

5. The original flag had 13 stars in a circle. The circle represented the Heavenly Father who is without beginning

or ending of days. 6. The U.S. flag is always displayed at the far right when displayed with other flags. This represents that Christ sets at the right hand of God. 7. The American Flag is raised at dawn and lowered at dusk. This represents the death and





...submitted Some Memorial Day History

Traditional observance of Memorial day has diminished over the years. Many Americans have forgotten the meaning and traditions of Memorial Day. At many cemeteries, the graves of the fallen are increasingly ignored and neglected. Most people no longer remember proper flag etiquette. While there are towns and cities that still hold Memorial Day parades, most have not held a parade in de-

cades. Some people think the day is for honoring any and all dead, and not just those fallen in service to our coun-

Here in Rockcastle County, for many, Memorial Day brings to mind images of a trip to the family cemetery with picnics and baseball games. What's sometimes forgotten are the reasons for the holiday: The sacrifices made by American soldiers in times of conflict.

As the United States' death toll passes 1,000 in Afghanistan, Memorial Day takes on an especially poignant meaning this year. Here's a brief look at how the holiday got its start, and how people are searching for ways to honor the brave men and women who have lost their lives

Originally, the holiday was known as "Decoration Day." It was started by a Civil War general John Logan, who was Commander-in-Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR.) The GAR post in Mt. Vernon was the M.M. Frazier Post 127, named in memory of Dr. Milton Frazier, who was a captain in the 4th Kentucky Infantry and died during the Civil War. General Logan sought a way to help the country come back together after the horrors and divide of the Civil War.

The holiday was first observed on May 30, 1868, and Gen. Logan chose that date for two very important reasons: First, the day did not mark the anniversary of a Civil War battle, and second "flowers would likely be in bloom all over the United States." Indeed, many took flowers to Arlington National Cemetery, an activity that still occurs every year.

General Logan left a tremendous legacy that goes well beyond his efforts to honor fallen soldiers. According to a museum dedicated to his memory, Gen. Logan led an inspired life and enjoyed a tremendous career. At dif-

ferent points, he was a United States congressman, a senator, and a candidate for the vice presidency. He and his running mate, James G. Blane, lost their bid but "Logan's popularity with veterans contributed to the narrowness of the defeat."

This may come as a bit of a surprise, but Memorial Day, despite having been around for over 100 years in one form or another, didn't become an official federal holiday until 1971, when Congress passed the National Holiday Act and asked all Americans to fly the National Colors at half-mast from dawn to 12 a.m. This created a three-day weekend at the end of May. Prior to this, different states observed the holiday on different days.

Also worth noting — the "National Moment of Remembrance," This observance takes place at 3 p.m. local time on Memorial Day and lasts for one minute. According to Remember.gov, "the Moment does not replace

traditional Memorial Day events; rather it is an act of national unity in which all Americans, alone or with family and friends, honor those who died for our freedom. It will help to reclaim Memorial Day as the sacred and noble holiday it was meant to be. In this shared remembrance, we connect as Americans."

This year, as you go to pri-

vate and public cemeteries to decorate the graves of loved ones, take time to look around and note the veterans also buried there and maybe place a flower there to honor their service.

We cherish too, the poppy red That grows on fields where valor led.

It seems to signal to the skies That blood of heroes never dies.

2) Do not put garbage out until the day of pickup. Do not store pet food outside and only put out enough for one meal at a time.

3) Never approach a bear or run from a bear as this could trigger its instinct to give chase. If approached, stand your ground, raise your arms to appear larger and yell

until it leaves. 4) If attacked, fight back aggressively and do not play

5) Bears are very curious animals and may come close

Fiscal Court votes to begin condemnations on Lambert Rd. of the court in 1992.

The 13 property owners on Lambert Road, who have not signed easements for widening and ditching on the road, will have one more chance to do it the easy way. The Rockcastle Fiscal Court voted at their regular meeting Tuesday, to direct County Attorney Billy Reynolds to send a letter to the property owners giving them 20 days to sign an easement or condemnation proceedings will begin.

The action came after a lengthy discussion, during the meeting, with some of the property owners on the road who have signed an easement and are wanting work to begin on the narrow, sometimes not quite two lane, road.

County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis told the group that he had tried to do it (obtain easements) the "easiest, quickest and cheapest" way but it hadn't worked and that the condemnation proceeding might take "two to three years." The judge also noted that surveys of the properties will have to be obtained, causing more expense for the

For over a year, the court has been trying to get all 50 some property owners along the road to voluntarily sign an easement so work could begin on widening, ditching and repaving the "worst road in the county," according to Carloftis. One of the residents noted that two cars cannot pass safely on much of the road and cars have to be pulled from ditches where they land while trying to pass

another car or school bus. The residents also told the court that the speed limit on

the road was not being enforced However, they were told that was not the fiscal court's responsibility but rather that of law enforcement. The group also asked if the road department could at least fill some bad potholes in the road in the mean time and were assured that would be taken care of.

Two property owners on Jo Nanc and Shady Lane roads were before the court to present them with the necessarv easement for the county to take over the two roads for maintenance.

There are six residences on Jo Nanc Road and five on Shady Lane which makes them eligible for maintenance.

The number of residences required on a road (four - occupied), was set by an order

During Tuesday's meeting, Carloftis told the magistrates that he felt the order should be amended to read four residences/businesses. One road, which serves a motel, Mexican Restaurant, service station and Pizza Hut, does not have any residences but the county has been asked to include it in their road maintenance program. Another road in the county, Carloftis said, had three residences and one business and the county has also been asked to provide maintenance

The court approved the change in the order to four residence or businesses and agreed to take the two roads into their county road main-

Zippo Lighters

One weekend while I was attending the University of Kentucky, I noticed a rash on my leg just under my right pocket. I self-medicated the red area for several days with no improvement. Finally, I decided to check with our family physician, Dr. Griffith, while visiting my mother on a weekend.

On Saturday morning I drove down to his office and patiently awaited my turn to be seen. Finally, I was told to go into his examination room and wait for the doctor. When he came in he asked, "David Joe, what is wrong with you today?" I explained and showed him the rash.

After carefully examining my leg he said, "Do you smoke?" I was puzzled with his question but answered yes. Next he asked, "Do you carry a lighter?" Again I replied, yes. Now I was totally confused with his questioning. Then he said, "If you will quit filling your lighter so full, your rash will disappear." He was right; the rash was a result of the lighter fuel and, just as he said, it went away in a few days.

When I first started driving in 1960, my first real "girlfriend," Barbara Sue, gave me my original Zippo lighter, and she had my name engraved on the side. She presented it to me at the Valley View Drive-in Theater as a gift. Not only was I utterly surprised, but I also thought the gift was totally appropriate. I started smoking Lucky Strikes when I was 15 and continued to smoke until I was 40. (On September 9, 1984, I took my last puff of a cigarette.)

Over the years many people have given me Zippo lighters for various occasions, and I have loved every one. One outstanding feature of the lighter is its guarantee. Since the first lighter was made in 1932, the company has repaired every model sold. The idea was the "brainchild" of George Blaisdell, who originated the company. He said, "I want our lighters to have a free, lifetime warranty." The concept began with the first Zippo and has remained the same to the present day. Zippo repairs all types of defects without charging a cent.

The Zippo lighter originated in a small Pennsylvania town in a time when the United States was being consumed by the worst depression in history. The year was 1932. Since that time over 400,000,000 Zippo lighters have been produced.

For most of my teenage years and throughout my adult life, I had a Zippo in my pocket. I even developed the trick of opening my lighter and producing a flame using only one hand. That came in very handy if I was sitting close to my girlfriend at the Drive-in with my arm around

A few weeks ago I was cleaning out a drawer in my home desk and found several Zippos from my high school and college days. There in the back of a small drawer was my original lighter. It brought back many happy memories.

Even though I have been a non-smoker for over 20 years, on a rare occasion I will indulge in a fine cigar. Nothing beats a Zippo for lighting smokes outside when the wind is blowing. My friend Steve and I love to sit around a campfire in the woods while puffing on a great Cuban "stogie."

Last winter we were sampling a couple of cigars and used my wife's Elvis Zippo for a light. The click of the lid and the flick of the flint bringing forth the flame was a reminder of how "cool" it was to have a Zippo in your

Kathy and I are planning to spend a long weekend in Gatlinburg soon. We almost always visit the Smoke Shop on Main Street while in the Smokies. My wife has purchased 3 different Elvis lighters there, and she always wants to see if they have anything new.

I think that this time I am going to purchase my own new Zippo as my souvenir of my trip to the Smokies. My only decision will be to choose the right emblem on it. Countless designs are now available including: old cars, Harley Davidson, rock stars, special places, specialized armed forces, and individual engraving. If I can locate an Eric Clapton edition that will be my first choice, or an old Chevy might be my second choice.

Since I was sixteen I have been a lover of Zippo lighters and now I discover that many of the older lighters are collectors' editions. The fact that the company produced a welldesigned product and supported their lighters with a toolproof warranty tells me the company has been on the right page for over 75 years. I

Kentucky's longest-serving Farm Bureau Agent has led an eventful life

The young solider from Dug Hill doesn't recall being frightened when a bomb ripped apart the ship he was serving on in World War 11, killing dozens of his com-

His biggest fear would come a few years later while selling his first insurance policy to "the stingiest man in the county."

"He wanted seven policies, and it came to \$380 total for the year. It scared me to death to tell him that," says John Paul Tuttle, 91, the longest serving Kentucky Farm Bureau Insurance agent in Kentucky after six decades.

Since he "retired on paper" five years ago, Tuttle has been faithful in reporting to his Main Street office in Irvine, missing only two days.

Most days will find him seated on a couch in the building's lower level, visiting with old friends and reminiscing about his eventful life. while his wife, Daisy, and their son, Mike oversee dayto-day operations. Their only other offspring, John Paul, is a urologist in Lexington.

With 55 years of service, Daisy is the fourth longest serving Farm Bureau agent in

A teacher when they wed

66 years ago, John Paul says it took a bit of persuasion from him and company officials to get Daisy to become an agent.

Farm Bureau assured her she would be afforded the same benefits as teachers received, but John Paul feels a light-hearted threat from him may have been the deal clincher.

"I told her if she didn't come and work with me, I was going to go out and find the prettiest girl in the county to bring in," he says, laugh-

The pair began their courtship when John Paul, the son of a man who was a teacher and county engineer, attended a pie supper at Crooked Creek School.

He had his eye not only on Daisy, but on what he remembers as a butterscotch pie that he still thinks may have been baked by her mother, "one of the greatest cooks ever."



He recalls entering the President's home as being a bewildering experience.

"While I was walking up the steps, I could feel my knees buckle, but once inside, I saw they were men, just like

A member of the army's First Infantry Division, he came close to losing his life in 1942 when a bomb destroyed the ship he was serving on.

He suffered numerous injuries, but was among a handful of soldiers able to be rescued onto a nearby ship. For awhile, a tag reading "Not dead yet" was placed on his

While in England recovering for the next 10 months, he became a faceless warrior, and twice the army sent telegrams to his mother. The first said he was missing in action, and the second, that he had been wounded in action.

Finally, she was notified her son would soon be departing from England and would arrive in New York.

"Daddy got the telegram and took it down to the hen house where she was feeding the chickens. They say she let out a yell that woke up everybody in Dug Hill that day." says John Paul.

Despite his injuries, the man who served with pride and regrets he wasn't able to do more, has never received a much-deserved Purple Heart for his heroic deeds.

'Congressman John Watts looked into it and was told the army has no records of my being on a ship bound for North Africa," says John Paul

"That bothers me because they halfway make you feel like they think you're making something up," says John Paul, further noting he feels Chandler did all he could and that he'll still vote for him.

John Paul may not have had a Purple Heart, but the people of Estill County knew a good-hearted and trusted businessman when they saw



A Time to Show Respect

Patriotic citizens who love their country and appreciate the freedom they enjoy respect and honor the flag of their homeland whenever and wherever they see it. They do so because it means something special to them. A genuine sense of pride fills their hearts any time they see that flag wafting in the breeze on a clear day. At the sight of it, they are reminded of that for which the flag stands, and gratitude wells up in the depths of their hearts.

Although it is not a legal holiday and may go by without notice by some people, June 14 is a very special day in the United States of America. Throughout the land, the day is known as Flag Day, and it commemorates the anniversary of the adoption of the flag of this country by the Second Continental Congress on June 14, 1777.

The origin of Flag Day has been traced back to Waubeka, Wisconsin. On June 14, 1895, Bernard John Cigrand, a nineteen-year-old teacher in Stony Hill School, placed a small flag in a bottle on his desk and asked the students to write essays about the flag and its significance. Through that simple act, a young teacher began a devoted effort to bring about national recognition and observance of Flag

The efforts of Cigrand were successful. They came to fruition on May 30, 1916, when President Woodrow Wilson issued a proclamation that called for a nationwide observance of Flag Day. His efforts came to full fruition in August of 1949, when President Harry Truman signed an Act of Congress that designated June 14 as Flag Day and made it a national observance.

The flag is more that a plain piece of cloth that displays a combination of colors and a dazzling display of geometric designs. It is the standard of the nation and the ensign of the people, and it stands for freedom, independence, and unity. Therefore, Flag Day is a time to display the flag and show proper respect to it.





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Smith wins long and tiple jump state titles

RCHS girls' track team places 3rd at state championships

The RCHS girls' track team closed out another historic season with a great meet at the Class 2A State Track & Field Championships this past Thursday at the University of Louisville. Weather conditions were extremely hot with temperatures reaching 90 degrees, not to mention the added heat from the track and the turf field. Despite the seemingly unbearable conditions, the RCHS girls' displayed an incredible team performance.

Senior Samantha Smith concluded her brilliant record-breaking career at RCHS with an amazing state meet finale. She led all of Class 2A in scoring with an amazing 27 total points. Samantha also received the KHSAA Class 2A Sportsmanship Award for her outstanding meet performance and display of sportsmanship throughout the state meet.

On her very first long jump attempt, she set the mark that would establish the precedent for all three state classes. Her incredible state meet personal best leap of 18'0.75" was not only the top jump in Kentucky during the state finals, but it also helped her successfully defend her state title in the event from a year ago. Winning the state championship title by over a foot more than her closest competitor, Samantha just missed the state meet record at the event by only 3.25". Interesting to note, she had at least five jumps at the meet good enough to win the title, with five of the six approaching 18'. At last weekends' regional meet, Samantha passed the state record twice

with jumps of 18'7.75" and 18'6" while establishing a new RCHS record in the event. Samantha will be an automatic first team all-state selection in the event for the second straight year.

The RCHS girls' 3200meter relay team hoped to break into the top eight in the first running event of the evening, despite the tough field of teams in the competition. Senior Laura Dollins, iunior Jessica Albright, 7th grader Alyssa Cox, and freshman Michaela Hunter ran a hard-fought race finishing just out of scoring position in 9th place overall. Their time of 10:30.54 was their best this season by an impressive 8 seconds.

Next up for RCHS came Samantha Smith in the 100meter dash against a field of the fastest sprinters in Class 2A. Samantha held her own and came through with another state meet personal best performance in the event. She dominated her heat, winning with an awesome time of 12.89 seconds which placed her 5th overall. She was only hundredths of a second from 4th and less than two tenths of a second away from a state runner-up finish. She also finished as the top senior in the event.

Laura Dollins competed next for RCHS in the 1600meter run, an event made even more difficult due to its length and the high temperatures on the track. Against some amazing competition, Laura turned a great start into an exceptional race. She stayed with the lead pack throughout and held on for an incredible 6th place finish in a very impressive time

of 5:43.18, her second best ever in state championship competition. She defeated the race favorite from Paducah Tilghman by an amazing 9 seconds.

Michaela Hunter sought a repeat victory in the 400meter dash after capturing the state title a year ago. Michaela got the race off to a great start, saving the majority of her energy for a strong finish. Down the last stretch, Michaela held on against two other talented freshman for the state championship win. Her unbelievable time of 58.51 seconds was a new personal best and only nine hundredths of a second away from the RCHS school record. Michaela will be an automatic first team all-state selection in the event for the second year in

Jessica Albright and Alyssa Allen were the only RCHS teammates to make it to state in the same event. In a very talented field of hurdlers, Jessica led the way for RCHS with a solid 16th place finish in an impressive time of 51.94 seconds, one of her best ever at state. Alyssa, running in her first state meet race ever, finished an impressive 18th overall with a great time of 53.51 seconds. Alyssa was the top 8th grade and under athlete

Laura Dollins was back on the track for the fastpaced 800-meter run, an event that has nearly turned into an endurance sprint over the last few seasons. Laura saved the best individual race of her brilliant career for last, blazing her way to an awesome 4th place finish against one of the most talented field of competitors in the event to date. Her amazing effort culminated with a state and career personal best time of 2:25.41, an amazing improvement of over 3 seconds. Laura will likely be named at least 2nd team allstate for her exceptional performance. Laura was the top senior in the event.

Samantha Smith continued her sensational meet performance with another great effort in the fast 200-meter dash. With most of the 100meter sprinters competing, the race got off to a fast start. Samantha ran a strong race, blazing her way to an awesome 6th place finish overall in an incredible time of 26.77 seconds, her best performance in the event ever at the state championships. Once again, Samantha was the top senior in the event, making her the top senior 100 and 200-meter sprinter

in Class 2A. Michaela Hunter came into the state meet with one of the top times in Class 2A in the 200-meter dash and was ranked 2nd during the regular season. Lower back pain combined with apparent fatigue and near dehydration proved to be too much for her during the event, allowing her to only finish 18th overall in 27.41 seconds.

Freshman Amy Johnson

came into the state championships unranked despite a regional title in shot put and a runner-up regional performance in distance. Amy had a firm grip on what she wanted to accomplish and came through at the state meet with two great performances. In her first competition, Amy threw the discus an incredible state meet personal best of 98'10" to claim 7th place overall for RCHS. Amy was also the top freshman thrower in the event. Her impressive meet continued with her performance in the shot put competition. Throwing shot put for the first time ever at state, Amy placed 8th overall with an unbelievable effort of 31'7.75". She was the top freshman thrower in shot put

She also hoped for a shot at the state meet record of 37'8" in the event, but with the meet length approaching six hours during the point when she triple jumped, most athletes were exhausted and records were just out of reach. Earlier this season, Samantha surpassed the Class 2A triple jump state mark with her personal best record-breaking

leap of 38'5". With triple jump in the books, Samantha's ten points propelled RCHS into 3rd place in the team standings. Louisville Central finished 2nd, while Ft. 





ited the services of someone as talented and bright as Aaron to fill the role as their first ever Executive Director. While Aaron's tenure was short, he made a very positive impact on our organization and the community. Rockcastle County is very fortunate to have this young man in our community and the RCIDA wishes him nothing but the best as he takes the reins as editior of the Mount Vernon Signal. The RCIDA looks forward to continuing to work with Aaron in his new role and continue to be optimistic that the future is very bright for Rockcastle County.

The Board agreed that they should move quickly in identifying Anderkin's successor. IDA Chair Corey Craig will reinstate the interview committee that was formed in January of this year. All members voted to have the committee make a recommendation to the full Board regarding how to move forward with options that include hiring someone from the previous pool of candidates, or finding someone who did not apply but meets the qualifications and experience needed

"As we begin the daunting task of filling the vacant position of Executive Director, we intend to move very expeditiously. We have already reassembled the hiring committee that was organized at the beginning of the initial search. The committee expects to have a recommendation, for the RCIDA and Fiscal Court, as to how they will proceed by the end of June.

The RCIDA is committed to finding the best fit possible to lead our organization and represent Rockcastle County at the state, national and international levels in this most important economic development commitment. Our future can be whatever we want it to be, but we must continue to strive to work together for the future of our children." Craig said.

In reference to the 2009-2010 Fiscal Year budget, the RCIDA is asking for roughly \$232,000 in support from the Fiscal Court. The major appropriations are associated with three items: having a full-time Economic Development Director, applying an additional \$100,000 in debt service to the SourceCorp building loan, and the utility bill associated with lighting both the North and South Industrial Parks, which is presently budgeted at \$52,000. However, both Anderkin and Craig emphasized that the plans would be revised in the coming weeks to cut the utility expenses by more than half by cutting the number of lights installed from 74 to 24.

Original plans called for lighting the two parks, Hwy. 461 and 150 and the entrances. However, because of the cost of power for that many lights, the project will be scaled back to lighting for the parks and their entrances. The \$52,000 figure was left in the budget because Jackson Energy could not supply

the actual cost as yet.

Applying the additional \$100,000 in debt service on the SourceCorp building is the "responsible thing to do", Anderkin said. If disciplined enough to pay the extra \$100,000 per year towards the principal on the \$2.5 million loan, the building will be paid off in 8 and 9 years, instead of the original 20 years the loan was drawn up for.

The RCIDA also extended deadlines for the contracts that are still underway for work on the Business Park South. According to Project Manager Jim Holton, inclement weather and some unexpected holdups in obtaining certain permits have delayed work longer then anticipated. However, all of the work, with the exception of the landscaping, is still expected to be completed by September 30th of this year.

The court also heard from Aaron Anderkin, Executive Director of the Rockcastle County Industrial Authority, who presented IDA's budget for 2010-11 and notified the court that he was submitting his resignation as executive director.

Anderkin told the court that due to the recent death of his father, Rick Anderkin, long-time editor of the Sig*nal*, he would be filling that position. He expressed his appreciation to the court for the opportunity to serve as the IDA Executive Director. Anderkin was hired in January of this year and assumed his duties in February. (See IDA related-story elsewhere on this week's front page).

In the \$232,500 budget, a principal payment of \$100,000 was included on the newly-constructed building for SourceCorp. The court had to approve the budget and Magistrate Jan Stevens offered some resistance. "Ralph (Allen) and I have the worst roads in our districts," Stevens said, "and we have managed to improve them. But, it's my job as magistrate to get all the money I can to work on roads in my district."

County Treasurer Joe Clontz told the court that he felt the \$100,000 in additional principal could be handled by paying \$25,000 each quarter from proceeds of the occupational tax.

The budget was approved with Stevens voting yes.

The court also approved a \$10,000 donation for onethird of the expenses associated with Blast in the Valley on July 4th. The county, city and tourist commission split the cost of the event which was attended by an estimated 5500 people last year.

Magistrate McKinney told the court that he didn't think the event "generated anything for businesses," but Magistrate Ralph Allen said he hated not to help with the event because of the children in the county toward which the day is geared, especially the fire-

Carloftis made the motion to support the event, Allen seconded the motion and it

was approved on a voice vote.

The court also approved: The payment of \$7,000 for work on the county's ball fields at Brodhead;

Claims totaling \$105,862 for work on roads damaged by the spring storms. All but 12% of the money expended will be reimbursed to the county by federal and state governments.

The payments were made to Clifford Collins, Carpenter's Custom Bulldozing and Reynolds Excavating, for work on various roads in the county which were heavily damaged during the May

The court also authorized Carloftis to sign Renewal Certificates with KACo for insurance, including work-men's compensation, for the next fiscal year totaling \$177,813.

The payment of the claims for road work, which have to be paid before the county can be reimbursed, and other expenses caused the court to have to transfer funds to the road department for the second month. The road department showed a balance of \$15,832.60 as of June 8th but has claims for May totaling \$279,000 and payrolls due for June. The court transferred \$250,000 from the occupational tax account to the general fund from which it will be transferred to the road department. A \$50,000 transfer was made to the road department at May's regular meeting.

Carloftis also reminded the court that four slips on roads in the county will have to be repaired and paid for before the county can get reimbursed.

The slips are on Buffalo Road in the Pongo area; two on Maret Cemetery Road and one on Old Dixie Hwy., above Elmwood Cemetery.

The court will hold a called meeting Thursday, June 17th at 1 p.m. for the second reading of the 2010-11 budget.

On Saturday, June 12th, we will celebrate the 20th "Ballard's Day" in Wildie. Ballard's birthday is June14th, he would have been 70 years old. This is a pitch-in meal and everyone is invited, you don't have to bring anything to attend, just yourself.

Ballard Parsons was born on June 14, 1940. In the summer of 1952 he was helping his Dad haul milk and bale hay. He was already driving both the truck and tractor and was on his way to becoming a farmer. He was a big and strong 12 year old boy. This

was about to change. Around the first of July, Ballard began to get sick. His parents thought he had a cold or the flu. His younger sister Libby was sick too. Ballard began to have trouble keeping his balance and he stumbled a lot. This was really out of the ordinary for him because he was such a strong young boy. By July 4th, he couldn't walk. Kenneth Stewart, his cousin, came by to check on him and immediately loaded him in the car and went to Mt. Vernon to find Dr. George Griffith. Dr. Griffith met Ballard, Kenneth and Ballard's Dad, Shirley Par-

sons at his office. Without delay, Dr. Griffith sent Ballard to Berea Hospital and asked about any illness in other family members. When he found out that Ballard's sister, Libby, was sick too, he ordered her brought to his office. When he examined her he sent her to the Berea Hospital too.

What the family and Kenneth Stewart feared was unfortunately true. Both Ballard and Libby had contracted infantile paralysis, or polio. Ballard had reached the critical stage, but Libby's had been caught early. Libby was treated and sent home, Ballard was not so lucky.

From the hospital in Berea Ballard was sent to St. Joseph Hospital in Lexington. The disease had already done a lot of damage to Ballard's strong body. He was losing use of his muscles and they began to waste away. He was also losing his ability to breath on his

Ballard was sent from St. Joseph to Cardinal Hill Hospital in Lexington for treatment. Cardinal Hill was almost brand new then. It was built especially to treat people with polio, mostly children. 



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

breathe on his own by the summer of 1953 and he came home.

He was in a wheelchair and he could only move his left arm and his right leg, both very little.

A couple of years later his Dad, Uncle Shirley to all of us nephews and cousins, bought Joe Bullen's store in Wildie. Ballard ran that store every day but Sunday from then until he died in 2003. Here is where the real story of Ballard Parsons begins for

I speak for many people that grew up and/or lived in Wildie. Ballard's store was the place to be.

When I was very young it was Uncle Shirley's store and I went there almost every day. If it was in the summer and school was out I went two or three times a day to talk to Ballard and just

When school started back I would go after school and usually I would go at night with my Dad, because everybody in Wildie came to the store to loaf and exchange gossip. When my older brother, Tommy, was still home he loafed at the store too, when my younger brothers, Mark and Lynn, got old enough they then learned the art of loafing at Ballard's from professionals.

Ballard would sit there in his wheelchair and be the center of all the conversations. There was a good reason he was in that position, it was because he was always the smartest person in the store and he knew more about what was being talked about than everybody else.

He was never a pretender about what he knew and he was never smug, he was just smart. Ballard could add numbers in his head as quick as a calculator. When people bought groceries from him he would add up the total simply by the customer holding up the item bought. It didn't matter how many items were bought, Ballard was never wrong in his addition. He was also the best checker and Rook player I have ever seen.

Ballard was my cousin. I loved him as much as anyone could love a cousin. I most favorite Saturday spent a lot of time with him memories are when my three

over the years and I will never feel like one second of that time was wasted. He was always happy and he was positive in his outlook. He appreciated hearing a good joke and he was good enough at telling them that you would laugh until your belly hurt. He loved bluegrass music and you could often walk in on him singing along with the radio. For all of Ballard's many talents, and he had more than most. singing was not one of them. But he loved to sing and that was all that mattered.

Ballard and my brother Tommy taught me to love the Cincinnati Reds and the Kentucky Wildcats. They both loved these teams and when Tommy went to the store they talked endlessly about them, depending on the season. I always felt lucky to be there just to hear what I thought was their expert opinion.

The first teams I remember rooting for were the 1956 Cincinnati Reds and the 1958 Kentucky Wildcats. The '56 Reds team had great hitting and poor pitching. It was Frank Robinson's rookie season and he was voted rookie of the year in the National League. Johnny Coffey and William Henry Branaman (Ballard's uncle) took Tommy and Ballard to Cincinnati to watch the Reds play that year. The '58 Wildcats won the NCAA that year. We listened to the championship game on the radio in the back of Uncle Shirley's store.

Ballard was the best farmer around, and he never left the wheelchair in the store. After Uncle Shirley died in 1970 Ballard helped his brother Donnie with the farm. For well over thirty years neither Donnie nor any other farmer who loafed in the store did anything without first consulting Ballard. He was always right too.

As I got older and went to the Army and then to school, I didn't get to Ballard's store as often as I had in the past. But, after I got out of school and settled back in the county, I started going to see Ballard almost every Saturday. When I could I would take my girls with me, I simply wanted them to know Ballard and his special place in the world. Some of my


brothers and me would sit with Ballard for two or three hours. We ate our lunch there. We would eat pickled bologna. Vienna sausage. potted meat or whatever else was on the menu.

Ballard died in 2003, just before my Mother did. My trips to Wildie were reduced in number greatly. I still go to church there and I still go to see my sister and brotherin-law, but a great part of the place is missing.

It goes without saying that my parents and my grandparents were great influences in my life. But, I can say without a doubt in my mind that Ballard Parsons was one of the greatest positive influences I've had. I don't know how many times I have gone to see Ballard when I was feeling down or a bit depressed. All it cost me to feel better was a pop and bag of potato chips alone with a conversation with my cousin.

I always thought if Ballard could be as happy as he is, why can't I be just a little happy myself. And, as I write this I now realize I had those thoughts and didn't even realize at the time I was

thinking like that. It happened so much it became an unnoticed habit. What a blessing I experienced by growing up around Ballard Parsons. I am sure I speak for a whole lot of other people too.





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

Suspect sought in robbery of woman at McDonald's

Mt. Vernon police have identified a suspect, in the Monday afternoon robbery of a woman at McDonald's, and are in the process of getting an arrest warrant, according to Police Chief Terry Jackson.

The robbery occurred shortly before 1 p.m. when Norma Cummins and her daughter Becky, who had just come from Rite-Aid where they had a prescription filled for Becky's poison ivy, went to Mc-Donald's to get an ice cream cone.

After parking, a woman, who had likely followed them from Rite Aid looking for drugs and money, approached the Cummins' car and asked for directions to Somerset.

"This lady came up and wanted directions to Somerset. So I was giving her directions and she started saying she wanted the purse. She held up her blouse and said 'don't make me hurt you' and she had a gun there," Cummins

The woman took the prescription first and, when she saw it was only topical cream, demanded the wallet. Cummins handed over her purse and the woman left the scene in a 2001 silver PT Cruiser, bearing NC registration plates YYL-4940, headed south on U.S.

Cummins immediately called 911 and police officers went onto I-75 and began stopping cars fitting the description of the getaway vehicle, going both north and south.

On Tuesday, Mt. Vernon Police said they were in the process of getting warrants for Rhonda Spivey, 31, of Fair Bluff, North Carolina and Anthony Ennis, 38, also of Fair Bluff. Both are wanted in North Carolina for another robbery. Ennis was not involved in the McDonald's robbery.

Jackson said the pair are wanted in North Carolina for an alleged home invasion of Spivey's mother and stepfather, early Sunday morning, during which the PT Cruiser was stolen, along with prescription medicine belonging to Spivey's mother. During the invasion, Spivey's stepfather was beaten and then tied up with duct tape.

FEMA office now open in courthouse

FEMA opened a disaster assistance recovery center in Mount Vernon on Monday to aid Rockcastle Countians affected by the May 1st flooding. The center will be open from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. on the second floor of the courthouse.

This comes as a result of President Barack Obama's declaration on May 12th, placing Rockcastle County in an area eligible for relief funds.

According to FEMA **Public Information Officer** Michael Skeels, 115 people in the county have already registered. Those still wishing to register have until July 12th. However, Skeels asked that those in

need move much faster than that and take full advantage of the resource the recovery center brings to the community.

To become registered, you can visit the recovery center, or go online to www.disasterassistance.gov, or call 1-800-621-3362 (FEMA).

Skeels said on Monday that grants are available up to \$29,900 for property damage caused by the flooding. The goal of the federal funds is to simply make the properties "safe, secure, and sanitary," he said.

And so we wound up, kids in vans and cars in what was



"Hey Baby!"

A few days ago I was listening to my iPod when a single from 1962 started playing, bringing back memories of one of my favorite "blues" singers. The song was Hey Baby by Bruce Channel, which topped the charts in 1962 when I was a senior at Mt. Vernon High School. Little did I know then that the highly touted harmonica player on that record would become my favorite artist to see in concert by the time I became an "old man." That blues harp player was none other than Delbert McClinton from Lubbock, Texas.

The lyrics of that song explain just how a teenager of the era felt when he saw a cute girl walking down the street.

When I saw you walking down the street

I said that's a kind of girl I'd

like to meet She's so pretty, Lord she's fine I'm gonna make her mine all

Hey, hey Baby!

I want to know if you'll be my

Delbert McClinton is practically a legend among Texas roots music aficionados, not only for his longevity but also for his ability to combine country, blues, soul, and rock and roll. He was born on November 4, 1940 and has been playing his harp and singing for the last 50 years. He even gave harp lessons to John Lennon while on a tour of England with Channel.

I did not actually become a huge fan of Delbert's until the early 90's when my wife and I attended an outdoor concert of his in Bardstown. The music was exciting, stimulating, and jam-packed with the sound of the blues; it brought the entire crowd to its feet. Fans rushed to the edge of the stage and remained there for most of the concert. At one point, some of the ladies had to be forcefully removed from the stage. Everyone wanted to touch the Texas blues singer.

In 1991, Delbert combined his talent with Bonnie Raitt on the CD Luck of the Draw. Their song Good Man, Good Woman won a Grammy for Best Rock Vocal, Duo or Group. This recording raised his public profile tremendously, making his concerts even more popular. Over the next several years, my wife and I traveled back and forth across the state attending a half-dozen of his concerts.

half-dozen of his concerts. For the performance in Owensboro, I delighted my wife with front row seats. We stood for most of the entire show singing our hearts out along with Delbert, and his excellent stage band. By that time we knew the lyrics to almost every one of his songs. During a break between songs, Delbert looked down from the stage at my wife and commented, "This lady on the front row in the red sweater is sending me into the Ozone Layer!" We both about fainted. Needless to say, it remains a bright and clear memory.

One of my favorites of Delbert's songs is called,

When Rita Leaves. It tells of a woman who was "crazy when she's been done wrong." She finally has had all she can take and leaves her man never to be seen again – but not before extracting a little revenge. The lyrics go like this:

She left a lipstick letter on the mirror

shattered on the bathroom floor.

All I could put back together was

'...never see me no more.' I had a sky-blue, ragtop Mus-

tang, 1964. She drove it off into the night till it just wouldn't go no more. She caught a ride on into

Bought some gas and laid the top down.

Then she burned that Pony to the ground

on the desert in New Mexico. When Rita leaves -- Rita's gone.

She gave me every chance a man could want.

I've never known a love so strong

Or so crazy when she's been done wrong.

When Rita leaves, Rita's gone.

Delbert released his most acclaimed CD in 2001 called, Nothing Personal. It proved to be the most popular recording of his career, with national radio play, and it was one of the year's biggest hits on Billboard's blues charts. Delbert won his second Grammy for Best Contemporary Blues Album with that recording.

Music critic Genevieve Williams explained, "Delbert's new CD is getting down to basics with the raw, stripped-down material that sounds best when you know it comes from experience. Nothing Personal is moving out of the realm of merely good, and into the ranks of art." If you wanted to purchase just one of Delbert's albums, this one is the best example of his fabulous talent and showmanship. Better still, find out where he is appearing and go see him in concert. You will not be disappointed.

June 14-22 is National Men's Health Week PSA—The Prostate Blood Test

A blood test for prostate cancer has gotten a lot of attention in recent years. This test, called the prostate specific antigen or PSA, is a measurement of a protein that is made only by the prostate.

When the level is high, we know that something is going on with the prostate. Unfortunately, it does not tell us specifically what is wrong. While it is frequently elevated in prostate cancer, it can also be elevated in benign enlargement of the prostate or from infections.

The test is most useful in conjunction with the old-fashioned rectal exam and the new ultrasound studies of the prostate. The PSA may pick up some cancers that cannot be felt on exam, and some cancers can be felt that cannot be picked up by the blood test. The test can be especially useful, however, in screening high-risk groups of men such as African-Americans and men with a family history of prostate cancer.

It is also useful in following known cases of cancer. If the PSA is increasing, the tumor is very likely enlarging. If it drops to zero after a prostatectomy, this is a favorable sign that the tumor may be cured. The PSA may be checked every 3-4 months in these cases. The test can be useful when a lump is felt on the pros-

tate. If the test is low, it is not likely that the tumor has spread beyond the prostate. This indicates a favorable prognosis, but does not eliminate the need for a biopsy.

This blood test is useful, but remember an exam will pick up some cancers that would not be found by the blood test alone. There is still no substitute for the old-fashioned exam.



it improves bone strength. In the state of Kentucky, we have 52 state parks. Each state park offers a different view of the treasures in our state. There are over 300 miles of trails and they are for all types of hikers – there are easy and moderate trails. There are also many choices for those with more experience, such as the 28 mile hike at the Pine Mountain Trail State Park, known for strenuous climbs and breathtaking

Whichever trail you choose, here are a few tips to keep in mind:

•Follow all written and posted trail rules

•Do not hike alone

•Take plenty of water

•Know the level of the trail and be aware of your ability to hike it

•Wear good socks AND shoes – hiking shoes or boots are suggested and will help stop blistering

•Dress in layers - the weather can change as you get into the woods

•Let others know where you are going and when you expect to return

When you are out on the trails please keep the following in mind:

•Take your time.

•Be careful when hiking up and down hills – especially if they are covered in gravel or lose dirt.

•Watch your step if you are crossing a stream - rocks in the stream can be very slip-

•Do not leave trash behind.

•Use sun screen and wear a brimmed hat to protect the face and ears from sun burn.

Students can earn money for college with KEES

Kentucky students can earn money for college through the Kentucky Educational Excellence Scholarship (KEES) program. The KEES program rewards students for making good grades in high school and doing well on the ACT or SAT. The awards may be used upon graduation from high school. No application is necessary. KHEAA will send the funds to the eligible college once the school verifies the student's enrollment.

Students may use their KEES awards at any public college or university in Kentucky, at most private colleges and universities in the state

Here's how KEES works: Students earn a KEES base award for each year they achieve at least a 2.5 grade point average (GPA) at a certified Kentucky high school. Students who earn at least one base award can also earn a bonus award for scoring 15 or higher on the ACT or 710 or higher on the SAT. Students







John L. Lair, Modern Day Pioneer

Recently, I have acquired some information from Ann Henderson, daughter of John L. Lair. The information is a portion of a scrapbook she has prepared, and has so graciously shared with us.

John L. Lair was a native of Livingston, born in the late 1800s. "In the later years of the 1800s, Livingston, KY was in its heyday. It was the railhead of the Knoxville division of the L&N railroad, serving eleven counties in Southeastern Kentucky. With an important roundhouse where trains could be turned around in direction, with large railroad shops and coal bins of 50-car capacity to feed the iron horses, many groups of train crews were headquartered there...it boasted three large sawmills which were fed by logs floated down Rockcastle River with each tide. Coal mines were operated along the river to the Jackson County line, and big rock crushers to furnish ballast for the railroad had been estab-

lished nearby. Livingston counted more than 800 souls and business was booming, especially just after the pay train ran. Pool rooms flourished. Said a newspaper article at the time. 'A well-known married lady stoned a pool room and scattered the crowd that included her bad-half. She has the best people of the town backing her. Down with the pool rooms!' Livingston was in 'dry' territory, but occasionally there would spring up what was variously called a speak-easy, a blind-tiger or blind-pig. Moonshine stills, near and far away, prospered.

It was into this Livingston that the arrival of John Lee Lair was a blessed event in the home of Thomas Burke and Belle Coffey Lair on July 1st, 1894. The family claimed he was actually named for all his uncles: John Allen, Leander, Jones Porter, Armistead Adams Lair, but for convenience it was shortened to John Lee Lair (good thing, too, it would never have fit on a marquee on the roof of a barn). At the time of his birth there was another emerging side of Livingston society: the thriving Presbyterian and Christian churches (his parents are listed as charter members of the latter), the Masonic, Maccabean and Red Men Lodges, E. B. Smith's weekly, 'The Kentucky Colonel', and the citizenry hungry for the education of their children. After the close of the 5-month public school, the subscription schools of Professor Dickerson and Mrs. R.C. Wade were both well patron-

Hunters take a number of turkeys during Spring season

For the second year in a row, hunters took a record number of wild turkeys during the state's spring season.

Hunters telechecked 36,094 birds during the 23day season, which closed May 9. It was the first time since 2002 that hunters had posted a record harvest for two years in a row.

Kentucky reached its record despite high winds, heavy rains and extensive flooding which made the hunting difficult during the last two weeks of the season.

Steven Dobey, wild turkey biologist for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources, said he believed the foul weather had an impact on the harvest. "It rained the last two weekends of the season," he noted. "If it had been clear, I think over 40,000 birds would have been

The final tally for the 2010 spring season was an increase of 24 percent over the 29,007 taken during the 2009 spring

Kentucky wild turkey flock currently has an estimated 220,000 birds. Dobey said while turkey populations have "reached capacity in some areas, there is still room to grow in others."

Kentucky held its first modern day, statewide spring wild turkey season in 1996. Hunters are experiencing quality hunting in all 120 counties, where suitable habitat is available, with a stable percentage of adult gobblers in the harvest.

Clearly, Dobey said, flocks east of Interstate 75 are continuing to expand.

"The biggest increases in harvest occurred in the mountain counties, especially in the 7th (Fish and Wildlife Commission) District, where the harvest was up 42.3 percent over 2009," he said.

The 7tt District contains 13 counties bounded by Pike, Lawrence, Owsley and Harlan counties. Eleven of those counties are within Kentucky's elk restoration zone, which includes a substantial amount of reclaimed coal mine land. "There's lots of good habitat for turkeys in elk country," said Dobey.

The 9th District, which stretches west past Lake Cumberland along the state's southern border, includes public land in the Daniel Boone National Forest and Lake Cumberland Wildlife Management Area. That district posted a 32.6 percent increase in harvest.

In the northeastern 8th District, which stretches from Ashland to Bourbon County, hunters took nearly 25 percent more turkeys than last

It also calls for stronger documentation in identifying the animals, the day they enter and leave, and how the disposition of the animal takes place.

Chism said RAIN is in the process of exploring a low-cost spay and neuter program. They will seek grants to assist in their ef-

In a move unrelated to the agreement, the Fiscal Court hired a new Shelter director this week. David Carpenter, a local minister, was hired to take over the reins for former director James Kidwell. Kidwell resigned recently due to ill-

grants are not in place to duplicate insurance or any other type of reimbursement the property owner might receive because of their loss.

Those not qualifying for FEMA Assistance can still be eligible for a low interest loan from the Small Business Administration (SBA). SBA loans are available for either real property or personal property that doesn't meet FEMA relief standards. Loans for physical damage to a residential area can be extended up to \$200,000, with a separate personal property limit of up to \$40,000.

An additional 20 percent beyond those levels is available should the individual desire to take mitigation or preventive measures to keep the damage from having longterm effects on the property. The most important step to take is to "simply get registered," Skeels said.

Local students graduate from Rogers Explorers

Rockcastle County students Jared Lake, Rebekah Ponder, and McKinzii Todd put their math and science skills to work this summer as they participated in and graduated from The Center for Rural Development's Rogers Explorers summer youth program.

The students—-all rising ninth-graders—-received hands-on experience in math and science and developed critical leadership skills at sessions of Rogers Explorers held the week of June 6-11 on the campuses of Lindsey Wilson College and the University of the Cumberlands.

"This has been an exceptional week of having the opportunity to work first-hand with our Explorers on skills that will strengthen their future as well as strengthen the entire region," Jessica Melton, associate director of education and training for The Center, said. "Explorers worked with leading experts to further enhance their math and science skills and develop their leadership ability to help them reach their full potential as the region's next generation of leaders and entrepreneurs."

At Lindsey Wilson College, students learned about the transformation of mechanical energy to electrical energy. Explorers used simple household items, including a piece of cardboard, a nail, some magnets, cooper wire, and tape, to construct their own electrical generator.

"Through this hands-on experience, students received knowledge about how to generate electricity several different ways, and to have fun generating their own electricity by using their fingers and few simple parts," instructor Heather Spoon, director of Energy Technology Career Academy, said.

Explorers at Lindsey Wilson College also looked at common human traits determined by single genes and worked on their communication skills in one of the newest majors offered to participants.

During the session at the University of the Cumberlands, Explorers took a closer look at the stars and planets through active participation in the STARLAB planetarium.

In this exercise, Explorers worked as a group using their math and science skills to resolve mathematical challenges and research problems associated with a simulated crash on the planet Mars.

According to instructor Larry Newquist, students had to determine distance and time needed to return to base and to decide as a group what can and what should be taken in order to make it back to base.

In addition, Explorers on the University of the Cumberland campus received hands-on experience working with introductory and more advanced biological topics, including extracting DNA from a living organism, and took part in a chemistry session studying polymers and the importance of recycling.

"I hope to instill in students the importance of recycling used material, not just plastics," instructor Jeff Schwartz said.

Explorers at both Lindsey Wilson College and the University of the Cumberlands participated in a live videoconference with NASA officials and completed PRIDE (Personal Responsibility In a Desirable Environment) clean-up projects in Adair and Whitley counties as part of their community service projects.





City council **approves \$9,000,000** budget for 2010-11

The Mt. Vernon City Council approved the first reading of a \$9,015,273 budget for 2010-11 fiscal year, at their regular June meeting Monday night. The budget includes \$1,713,088 expected revenue in the general fund; \$161,600 in the municipal aid fund; LGEA fund, \$21,575; \$3,814,311 water fund; \$3,256,592 sewer fund and \$48,107, UDAG fund.

The \$1,713,088 expected revenue in the general fund reflects \$1,185,000 expected from taxes (property, occupational, insurance, etc), \$70,000 in carry over funds from the 2009-10 fiscal year and \$285,050 from grants for work on Newcomb Street. The city has had \$200,000 for some time for the project but Mayor Gary Cromer told the council Monday night that, at his request, Senator Ed Worley and Rep. Danny Ford had secured an additional \$100,000 which will now allow the city to do major work by aligning Newcomb St. and School St. (see related front page story).

The \$3,814,311 shown as expected revenue in the water fund includes \$500,000 in carry over funds, \$1,545,011 for charges for services and \$1,769,300 in funds that the

oxycodone on two occasions. Both drug transactions were recorded by Rockcastle County Sheriff's Deputy Joe Rush.

Knuckles, on appeal, argued that three decisions by Judge Tapp were in error. Each of the arguments were rejected by the Kentucky Supreme Court. Specifically, during the trial, Judge Tapp continued the trial for fourteen days to attend to a family medical emergency and, Knuckles argued that because Rockcastle County was a close knit community, the jurors would discuss the case with others while awaiting the trial to resume.

However, the Court found that the delay in no way prejudiced the outcome. Citing the efforts made by Judge Tapp in instructing the jury to have no discussions about the case, as well as asking them under oath whether they had had talks about the case, the Court found that Judge Tapp acted entirely properly.

The second allegation made by Knuckles was that it was in error to allow the vice chair of the local Operation UNITE chapter to remain on the jury panel. Although the juror never sat on the case, Knuckles argued that it was error to force him to use one of his jury strikes rather than having the juror removed for cause.

During the jury selection process, Judge Tapp found that "it would be impossible to seat a jury if jurors were expected to have no opinions on the issue of drugs." Tapp also mentioned in his ruling that UNITE has three distinct prongs: treatment, education

In fact, there ought to be a law that requires just that, but there isn't and landowners in central Kentucky seem burdened enough, already, about complying with existing laws and without now having to deal with thistles. Unfortu-




Skin Cancers Are Common on the Face

Presented by Dr. David Brabon

Skin cancers are usually easy to find. They are right on your face. The areas that catch the most sun--the lips. cheeks, and nose--are the most likely areas to develop a cancer.

These cancers are called basal cell cancers and are slowgrowing. They grow so slowly that a person often ignores





There are a few different ways to remove these cancers. Often they are simply cut out and the skin sewed together. This will leave a small scar. A scar can usually be avoided by using a more complex microsurgical technique and cau-

For precancerous skin changes, treatments that destroy the abnormal cells are quite successful. This can be done by freezing the skin with liquid nitrogen or with a lotion containing a chemotherapeutic medicine.

You can reduce the sun's damage to the skin and risk of skin cancers by protecting your skin with sunscreens, broadbrimmed hats and avoiding the outdoors during the peak hours of ultraviolet exposure—from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The damage from sun exposure accumulates over the years, so you should start using these protective measures at an early age.


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Rockcastle Memories

"A Lifetime With the Telephone"

A few days ago I was making some adjustments to my iPhone and noticed that I could fine-tune the ring tone to a setting called "old phones." As soon as my phone rang, I was taken back to the days when I was a little boy using our old wooden phone, which was mounted on the wall in the living room of my grandparents' home.

In order to make a call, I had to stand on a stool, pick up the receiver, crank the handle, and tell the operator whom I wanted to call. About that time, Carol Jean Purcell Riddle was 18 years old and was working as one of the operators at Frank Dee's phone company in Mt. Vernon. I recently talked to Carol Jean, and she told me about some of her experiences sitting in front of the "switchboard."

"In those days many people would ask the operator to be connected with someone who did not even have a phone, and we would call the next door neighbor and have them go get the person to answer the phone." I can actually remember that happening to my grandmother (Mommie Katie).

Charity Barnes lived next to my grandparents, and occasionally people would call and ask Mommie to walk out the road and get Mrs. Barnes. I never heard Mommie Katie complain about it though. It was simply the neighborly thing to do.

Carol Jean and I also discussed the "party line" arrangement of those days. There were several people in our neighborhood on the party line of Mommie Katie's. When I was talking to my girlfriends, I could hear the "clicks" of people picking up their phones to listen to my conversations. I remember saying, "Be careful what you say – other people are listening." Then you could hear hem hanging up.

Homes on party lines had different rings so you would know if the phone call was intended for your house. Mommie Katie's ring was "three shorts." Other rings might be a long, a short, followed by another long. In the middle of the night when the phone rang, you hesitated to see if it was your specific ring sequence. If not, you simply went back to sleep.

Carol Jean said most

connected with the person by name. That made me remember asking the operator to "connect me with Carla Baker." Carla and I were great friends, and we talked for hours on that old phone on the wall. It was very uncomfortable sitting on that big old stool, and I had to get up and move around during long conversations.

To call someone in a distant city, you asked the local operator to connect you with a long-distance operator. Then that person would look up the number and ring the call. For billing purposes, the long-distance operator also recorded the amount of time spent talking. Eavesdropping was even a problem on longdistance calls. Occasionally when making a long distance call, you could hear several different families listening to your conversation. Sometimes you could also hear other people's conversations in the background.

About the time I entered high school, Mr. Dees sold the local phone company to Bell, and we received the big, black, table phones. Those phones were so heavy that they might as well have been mounted on whatever piece of furniture they were sitting on. (As a matter of fact, furniture makers developed what was called a phone table – one that was specifically designed for that purpose. They even had an opening underneath in which to place the phone book.) As if a testimony to how hard and heavy those phones were, old movies often show them being used as weapons!

When the Bell Telephone Company began operations in

Killing a fellow human being wasn't something Curtis "Willie" Gilliland, Jr. wanted to do.

He knows Gene Gordon Wells felt the same way.

But that's exactly what the first cousins were asked to do in the late 1960s.

They had grown up less than a mile apart along the banks of Pitman Creek, leading an idyllic life that included fishing, skipping flat rocks along the creek, and nothing more outrageous than skinny dipping.

Both were the products of loving families who made certain they grew up as Godfearing, good citizens.

At Garner Grade School, a two-room frame structure housing grades one through eight, they were respected by classmates for their honesty, cheerfulness, and quick wit.

When the cousins graduated from Pulaski County High in May of 1966, nearly 250,000 of their fellow Americans, mostly teenagers like themselves, were fighting in the dense jungles of Viet-

The war raged on, in one form or another, until 1975.

The final death count: four million Indonesians and 58,268 Americans.

Soldiers drafted into the military were required to serve a year on the battlefields. Most did their time and came home, but Wells wasn't among the lucky ones.

He was killed in action on January 7, 1970.

Gilliland got to come home, but as a changed per-

"Vietnam turned me into a pacifist," he says.

military, he joined peace marches and remains a very strong anti-war proponent, a perhaps not-so-surprising stance for someone who never

wanted to fight in the first

He lost his education deferment "after flunking out of Somerset Community College," and failed in an attempt to join the Air Force.

Soon after, while going through processing at Fort Knox, he made a last-ditch effort to avoid combat by saying he wanted to be a conscientious objector.

"But I was only 19, and I let them talk me out of it," he

"Instead of standing up like I should have, I melted into the crowd."

Being sent into combat following a brief training period proved a harsh reality for the mild-mannered country boy.

'We were told by our leaders to spray bullets into a village without knowing what we shooting at, and that bothers me.

"You had to wonder, were we hitting the enemy or innocent civilians?

"I've run that through my mind countless times after the fact, but at the time I didn't, because we were just following orders.

"They said to 'fire this way' and 'fire that way' and that's what we did.

"We were told in training that these people were the enemy, and we were supposed to shoot them.

Gilliland says "it never sank in" that fellow human beings were being killed un-

til he was asked to go through the personal effects of the vic-

"I'd pull out a wallet, and it would be filled with photos of family members, just as mine was. I then realized the fellows we were firing at had families, just like us.'

Gilliland returned to Somerset with a Purple Heart for injuries received when he was shot in the hand and across the nose, but it was his own heart that had suffered

To this day, he remains unsure if any shots fired from his gun killed anyone, but he's certain that "our bombs killed innocent people."

A retired letter carrier and married father of one daughter, Gilliland has become a familiar name to readers of the Letters to the Editor column daily newspapers in Kentucky.

He says his frequent letters, nearly all with an antiwar theme, are intended to make people think and realize "there is no reason for going to war. To dismiss what's going on today is too easy, so I will continue to protest."

But there's yet another aspect to his life of which most people may be unaware.

Since 1975, he and wife Louise, a Wayne County native, have devoted themselves to aiding Vietnamese people who want to live in America.

"I guess we have helped maybe 60 Vietnamese adjust to life in America by aiding them in the car- buying process, and buying or renting a place to live. Things of that nature," he says.

At his own expense, "after years of thinking and prayer," the ex-soldier has also made more than 20 trips back to Vietnam, usually staying at least a month.

He says he has come to love the people and hopes his actions "might kind of make up for what I did in Vietnam."

"It's a tremendous feeling to go back and walk down those same roads without worrying about getting shot.

"The people are never hostile, and I've played pool with a lot of the men who used to be our enemy."

Although he feels the war was "a huge blunder from start to finish and totally unnecessary," Gilliland feels there was a bit of personal gain for him.

"Serving in Vietnam gave me a greater appreciation for life....mine and those of other people."

Former Defense Secretary Robert McNamara, one of the key architects of the US's war policy in Vietnam, admitted grave mistakes in that policy in his 1995 memoir, In Retrospect.

McNamara, in his book, says that ... "We were wrong, terribly wrong. We owe it to future generations to explain whv.'

Curtis "Willie" Gilliland, Jr. is trying to do just that.

The Roots of Rockcastle by: Tonya J. Cook



The Roots series will take another look at John Lair, his life and his times, this week. The following is a letter written by Mack Martin about John Lair on January 13, 1956. Mr. Martin was a former student in 1916 at the Lexington School and was an assistant to the trainmasters for the L&N Railroad at Corbin, Kentucky. Dear Sir:

This has reference to the conversation with you yesterday in which you asked me to relate some of the facts concerning my association with Mr. J. Lair of Renfro Valley, Kentucky, whom I shall refer to as "John".

I am sure that you already know that John obtained his early education at the old Red Bud School in Renfro Valley section of Rockcastle County, and later at the high school at Mount Vernon, Kentucky. My earliest knowledge of John began in about the year of 1914 when I saw him give a very fine performance in "blackface" in a play given by the students of the high school in Mount Vernon. John later obtained a teaching certificate and came to Livingston, Kentucky, where I was then living and a student in high school, as a high school teacher. This was about the year 1915. While John was a teacher at Livingston, he took a keen interest in the young people in the school, as well as in the town, and never seemed lacking in resources and vitality to keep them interested in the thing that he thought best for them. During this time, he organized a basketball team, of which I was a number, as well as other competitive sports, arranging for us to meet teams of the surrounding towns and, at times, I believe he performed with credit to his efforts. He organized and directed a small instrumental band, and we were, at various times, called upon to perform a "lot" sales and other events. He also organized a rhythm band which he called the "Humbug Band", this band using instruments of some kind of fiber fashioned after band instruments, and through which the music was made by humming. He also organized a male quartet of the barbershop variety, composed of himself (a fine bass), K. M. Cottengin, who was for many years a coal inspector for the L&N Railroad and is now a locomotive fireman at Loyall, Kentucky, F. H. Schrock, address unknown, and myself. This quartet was called upon and invited to sing at many church socials and entertainment events, and for our own amusement whenever we could get together, whether it be on the street corner, in the woods, or on the river or elsewhere. This quartet also performed in the surrounding guage, or intoxicants, and altowns between acts of entertainment, and so on. John seemed to have a born interest in dramatics, and so on. While at ers who were associated with him, and I am sure he's been

Livingston, he organized, directed, and performed in many home talent plays. I recall vividly many of the lines of some of the hometown plays we produced. During this time, there showed up in town a professional "walker" by the name of "Lightfoot Harry", who claimed to have walked across the country several times, as well as in foreign countries. He made several appearances in the town, and then interested John in producing home talent plays in conjunction his performances. I recall that during this time, we produced that famous classic, "Madame X", after a one-day rehearsal. Incident to myself, who was usually cast as the leading man, developed a romance which developed in a very happy marriage, and we are still together. These home talent plays were also produced in the surrounding towns. An amusing incident was when we took one of the plays to Bond, Kentucky, a large labor camp, which has since been abandoned, located 18 miles east of East Bernstadt, Kentucky, on the Rockcastle River railway, which has also been abandoned now. For some reason, the treasurer of our troupe lost the proceeds from the admissions to the play and informed us after the performance that he did not have sufficient money to spend the night in the town, and there was now way for us to get back to East Bernstadt to board the L&N passenger train en route home, until the next day. We took our troubles to the president of the lumber company,

who was also president of the railroad company, informing him of out plight, upon which he asked us how much money we actually had. We informed him that we had on \$8.50. President Bond, through the goodness of his heart, told us

I cannot imagine that he had any idea how far they would progress.


nately, we live in a world that is not very cooperative and on its way to demise, but that's another story altogether.





Difficulties Can Be Overcome

Since January 8, 1964 when I purchased a small paperback book at a used bookstore, the book has occupied space on a shelf near my desk. Twice since I purchased it, I have removed the book to read it, and I was impressed by what I read. Reprinted in 1956 when the author was 76 years old, the book that is entitled MY RELIGION was written by Helen Keller and was first published in 1927 when she

was 47 years old. I came to know about Helen Keller when I was in high school. At that time, she was near the peak of her career and well known because of her outstanding accomplishments. A quotation on the front cover of that book pays tribute to her: "Her life is a lesson of faith, an inspiration of courage, a symbol of religious truth to all the world."

Helen Keller was born in 1880 in Tuscumbia, Alabama. When she was nineteen months old, she contracted a serious illness with high fever that, some records indicate, may have been either scarlet fever or meningitis. That dreadful disease left her blind and deaf; however with the help of Anne Sullivan, she, against difficult odds, learned much. Slowly and painfully, she learned to identify things through touch. In 1904, Miss Keller graduated from Radcliffe College, becoming the first deaf and blind person to earn a Bachelor of Arts de-







city does not actually have in hand but hopes to receive as a Kentucky Infrastructure Authority (KIA) grant for replacement of the city's main water storage tank and distribution pump. Cromer said he had submitted an application to KIA for four projects and had asked for funding for this project first since it was the most needed. He said the tank was leaking badly and has had to be welded several times, including once just re-

In the sewer fund's expected \$3,256,592 is included \$250,000 in carryover funds, \$616,81 for charges for services and the \$2,389,781 KIA grant the city has for the Rose Hill sewer

In the appropriations part of the budget, the city expects to spend, from the general fund, \$401,175 for administrative costs; \$608,275 for the police department, \$96,082 for the fire department, \$43,753 for debt service and the \$285,000 for the Newcomb/School St. project and a balance in the fund of \$278,803. An additional \$12,000 for the police department will come from the LGEA (Local Government Economic Assistance) fund, leaving a fund balance at the end of the fiscal year of \$9,575.

The city expects to expend \$75,000 on streets/maintenance and leave a balance of \$86,600.

Expenditures in the water fund show \$1,505,300 for operation and maintenance of the water department, \$351,660 for debt service, \$26.000 for miscellaneous, taxes, etc. and the \$1,769,300 for the new water storage tank, if funding is obtained.

The sewer fund shows \$654,400 expected expenditure for operation and maintenance, \$71,945 for debt service and the \$2,389,781 for the Rose Hill Sewer Project.

The mayor has also included in the budget an expenditure of \$210,000 for renovation of the former fire station which is now being used as the meeting room for the council.

However, Cromer said the only expenditure that had been authorized from those funds to date was for the architecture's design of the renovation and the plans. He said the rest of the project would not be undertaken unless grant funds were obtained during the upcoming fiscal year.

In Mayor Gary Cromer's budget message to the council, citizens and city employees, he detailed four projects, by priority, in a "wish list" he had submitted for funding to KIA. Only one of the projects, a new water tank and distribution pump was included in the budget in the hope that funding will become available during the 2010-11 fiscal year.

The four projects are: •Upgrade the water tank farm to include a new storage tank and distribution pump at an estimated cost of approximately \$1.7 million.

•Main Street Sewer, which Cromer says, is outdated and in unacceptable condition. This project would cost around \$1.5 mil-

•Main Water Line, from McDonald's to the tank farm. is inadequate for demand and needs to be replaced at a cost of \$1.2 million.

•Renovation of the current meeting room at city hall. The \$210,000 estimated cost of the project is in this year's budget but, Cromer said, the only thing authorized by the council thus far to be spent is for architect's design and plans. The remainder, as with the other three projects, will not be undertaken unless adequate grant/stimulus money is

available. Councilman Don Jones was the only no vote for approval of the budget saying several times that "there are too many miscellaneous item

included.

Jones was referring to a \$25,000 miscellaneous appropriation in the water department's operating budget; \$2,000 in the sewer department \$8,000 in the fire department's budget; \$2,000 in the police department and \$20,000 in general govern-

The council met in special session Tuesday night to approve the second reading of the budget which will go into effect July 1, 2010.

The master plan will highlight the ways in which Livingston can eventually become an "economically vibrant community," Tatum

Tonya Cook, a member of the committee, said the committee is confident that their work will prove beneficial. "There is really no end to the possibilities that we have to work with in this area. We're expecting big things down here. We want to bring tourism and allow for real entreprenuership opportunities," Cook said.

The work has already spurred at least one entreprenurial opportunity in the form of a canoe launch at the Rockcastle River. John Otis has owned the property for years but had decided not to develop it until he saw activity. According to Tatum, he heard of the committee's plans and cleared the land, purchased kayaks and canoes, and opened up on the weekends.

"On Memorial Day weekend, he was so busy that he didn't have enough canoes because of all the traffic, which we consider a good problem to have," said Tatum.

There is no doubt that such early results have the people

of Livingston encouraged. "I think the people of our town realized that we can't stand around with our hands in our pockets expecting good things to happen here. We have decided to come together, work hard, and make things happen," Cook said.

Mayor Griffin emphasized that there is still much work to do. "However, this is definitely a step in the right direction," Griffin said.

He said the most encouraging part of the process has been the collaborative efforts that have taken place. He gives credit to Representative Danny Ford and Senator Ed Worley for securing the transportation funds, along with Lynn Tatum and the Development Board for taking such an interest in Livingston. He said County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis and the Fiscal Court have also been supportive by providing work crews.

"But, the greatest thing about it is the way our citizens have come together and decided we will do whatever it takes to move forward," Griffin said.

and law enforcement. While the juror participated in education, she had no role in law enforcement, the subject of the criminal trial.

In upholding the decision, the Supreme Court opined that Judge Tapp had "made detailed findings" incorrectly allowing the juror to remain on the panel, even though the defense later struck her from the jury without cause.

The final allegation of error dealt with sentencing. Knuckles contended that Bartley had incorrectly "double enhanced" his sentence by putting on evidence of prior felony drug trafficking, drug possession, and escape charges making Knuckles eligible for a higher sen-

The Supreme Court found that there was no error and that it had already ruled on this type of evidence in a 2002 case.

Montgomery said he was pleased with the Court's decision in this case. Concerning the Knuckles drug case, Montgomery praised the work of Bartley in successfully prosecuting what is the believed to be the largest drug trial verdict ever handed down by a Rockcastle County jury. "The jury saw a man who had lived a life of crime and actually was on parole with twelve years hanging over his head while twice being recorded selling powerful drugs. I applaud the stiff sentence recommended by the jury. As importantly, I am glad that the Kentucky Supreme Court found that Judge Tapp correctly followed the law in the case and the sentencing of this individual," said Montgomery.





Better control usage with energy efficiency measures

As temperatures continue to rise across the Commonwealth, so can energy usage. Kentucky Utilities Company encourage customers to take simple energy efficiency steps to help lower energy consumption during a heat wave.

•Set air conditioners to the highest comfortable setting during the day: 78-80 degrees works for most people. Raising your air conditioner setting by one degree can save you 4-7 percent on the cooling portion of your energy bill.

•Turn off all unnecessary lights. Use fluorescent lighting, which is cooler.

•Turn off all unnecessary appliances. Run your dishwashers, dryers and washing machines during the evening hours (after 7 p.m.) when energy consumption is lower.

•Use ceiling fans to circulate the cool air. Fans can help you feel more comfortable at higher temperatures. Window fans, ceiling fans or whole-house fans use much less power and are an alternative to air conditioners. Turn the fan off when you leave the room since the fan does its job by cooling you – not the room.

•Close curtains, drapes and/or blinds to keep the hot sun's heat out of your home.

•Don't close air registers and do not close off rooms completely because it can increase system pressure and damage the compressor. Furniture or drapes should not block air regis-

•Cook outdoors on your grill; use a microwave oven or crock pot or prepare cold meals to avoid heating up the kitchen and adding moisture to the air.

Microwaves use less than half the power of a conventional oven and cook food in about one-fourth the

•Check your air filters monthly — even on extended filters. Change if necessary. Dirty air filters make your air conditioner work harder. Clean the filter in window units as well. It is behind the front panel.

•The outdoor unit of an air conditioner should be kept free from plants, dirt or grass clippings that will interfere with air circulation. Wash the coil periodically with a garden hose.


